improvements. These gains did not happen by chance. They are the result of a shared, bold vision, generous hearts, and tireless effort.

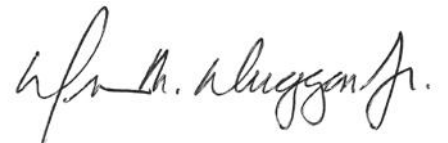

Meet Our Academic Inductees

Mother Augusta Collins, O.S.B. '69



Mother Augusta (Nancy) Collins, a member of the Class of 1969, was inducted into the Academic Hall of Fame in recognition of her exceptional academic record at Archbishop Williams and her lifelong commitment to faith, education, and service as a Benedictine nun at the Abbey of Regina Laudis.

Raised in a faith-filled family in Milton, Nancy and her siblings all attended Catholic schools, including AWHs, where Nancy stood out both academically and socially. A National Honor Society leader, French and Latin scholar, student council member, and cheerleader, she was voted "Friendliest to Underclassmen" and "Most Spirited" by her classmates. She fondly recalls the vibrant and diverse student body at AWHs and the deep integration of faith into everyday life.

Inspired by the selfless example of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth who taught her, Nancy's faith deepened at AWHs. She graduated 16th in the Class of 1969 and went on to Connecticut College, where she majored in English and graduated with honors in 1973. Two years later, her growing spiritual awareness led her to the Abbey of Regina Laudis in Bethlehem, Connecticut, where she embraced a monastic life of prayer, stewardship, and community.

At the Abbey, Nancy undertook physically demanding farm work, which led to earning a Master's and Ph.D. in Agronomy from UConn. Her esoteric research in nitrogen cycling earned national recognition. Moreover, as "Novice Mistress" beginning in 1994, she mentored new Sisters and managed the Abbey's 450-acre farm, balancing faith and science in service to her community.

Today, Mother Augusta continues to promote sustainable farming and spiritual formation. She credits AWHs with nurturing the faith, intellect, and values that guide her vocation. Her journey stands as a powerful testament to living a life of purpose, grounded in truth, love, and the courage to answer the unexpected call of God.

Leanne Gallotta '00



Leanne Gallotta, a member of the Class of 2000, was inducted into the Academic Hall of Fame in recognition of her exceptional academic achievements at Archbishop Williams and her distinguished career in the financial services industry. The daughter of longtime teacher, coach, and Athletic Director Al Gallotta '69, and a devoted career-educator mother, Dianne, Leanne grew up in a family deeply rooted in Catholic faith, education, and service—values that shaped her path from an early age.

Leanne was a high-achieving student and a three-sport athlete at AWHs, excelling in volleyball, basketball, and softball. She was a two-year National Honor Society member, a Brown Book Award recipient, and a Student Council leader. Her teachers and peers appreciated her academic rigor, leadership, and poise. In turn, Leanne credits AWHs for deepening her faith and teaching her

resilience, time management, and how to balance success and setbacks with grace.

Determined to follow in her father's footsteps and attend Brown University, Leanne took the most challenging coursework available at AWHs, maintaining a GPA over 4.0 and graduating 4th in her class. At Brown, she double-majored in Business Economics and Public and Private Sector Organizations, earning honors and graduating in 2004.

Leanne went on to build an impressive career in finance, holding positions at BNY Mellon, Citigroup, Morgan Stanley, and First Republic, before her current role at JP Morgan Wealth Management. She serves as a Client Relationship Director, managing portfolios for high-net-worth individuals and holding multiple licenses in the field.

Leanne remains active in her children's education and sports, volunteering whenever possible. Her induction into the AWHs Academic Hall of Fame reflects not only her personal achievements but also continues a proud family legacy, as she joins both her sister Alyson '02 and her father Al (a member of both Halls) in this prestigious honor. Leanne's journey continues to inspire our students to pursue excellence with integrity and purpose, and to live a life of faith.

Jack B. Keenan, Ph.D. '73



Dr. Jack B. Keenan, a member of the Class of 1973, was inducted into the Academic Hall of Fame for his groundbreaking work in instructional design, organizational development, and corporate training, as well as his decades-long commitment to education and service.

Raised in Hingham, Jack attended St. Paul School before enrolling at Archbishop Williams, because the school's academic reputation and faith-based community aligned perfectly with his family's values. At AWHs, Jack steadily improved his academic performance each year, inspired by

teachers like Lou Volpe and Robert O'Brien, and gained hands-on work experience maintaining the school's facilities as part of Bob Swain's "Swain Gang"—a job that instilled in him the value of hard work and pride in a job well done. On the football field, Jack thrived as a center and nose guard playing for Hall of Fame Coach Hank Cutting, forging lifelong friendships and celebrating big wins, including a memorable victory over powerhouse Xaverian.

After graduating in 1973, Jack earned his bachelor's degree in Psychology from UMass Amherst, the school that would have a profound impact on his life personally and professionally. It was at UMass where he met his wife and muse, Mary, and where a standing ovation while teaching as an undergraduate instructor confirmed his calling to education. He went on to earn his M.A. and Ph.D. in Psychology from West Virginia University, specializing in instructional design and organizational development.

Jack began his career designing training programs for the U.S. Army before moving to Silicon Valley, where in 1983 he founded Jack B. Keenan, Inc. (JBK). Over the next 40 years, JBK served more than 200 top companies, including Apple, Cisco, Google, and Intel, developing innovative sales and marketing training programs like *Selling Beyond the Product™*. His expertise in integrating adult learning with business strategy made him a highly sought-after consultant and leader.

Deeply grateful for his opportunities, Jack has supported AWHs for over 30 years. He also serves on nonprofit boards in Silicon Valley, working to improve education for disadvantaged youth. Both commitments exemplify his belief that true success comes from sharing good fortune to create opportunities for others.

Meet Our Athletic Inductees

Mark Brown '84



Mark Brown, a member of the Class of 1984, was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of his exceptional baseball career at Archbishop Williams and his unique sports journey from a standout catching prospect to a professional golfer. Mark grew up playing baseball in the Milton Little League and went on to star in Babe Ruth and Legion ball. Inspired by legendary catchers Carlton Fisk and Johnny Bench, Mark gravitated to the position, valued for both its toughness and leadership.

Mark made an immediate impact at AWHHS. He started as a freshman on Hall of Fame Coach Connie Carozzi's varsity baseball team and quickly became a cornerstone of that successful program. Known for his powerful hitting and elite defensive skills, Mark earned All-Scholastic and Patriot Ledger All-Star honors. He was respected for his ability to handle pitchers and call a smart game, all while being a consistent threat at the plate. Indeed, his leadership behind the plate and work ethic were described as unmatched.

Mark received a baseball scholarship to Eckerd College in Florida, where he played against top NCAA competition, including future Major League players. His future in the sport looked promising, and summers found him back in Massachusetts, playing in the competitive Boston Park League. He also spent these months working at Presidents Golf Course, where he discovered a passion for another sport—golf.

Having graduated from Eckerd with a degree in Human Resources Management, Mark had opportunities to pursue a career in professional baseball. But he had also risen to the level of Assistant Professional at Presidents, and ultimately pivoted to golf, embarking on what would become a remarkable "second act." Mark became a PGA Professional in 1994 and went on to win numerous titles, including the Met Open, New York State Open, and Long Island Open. In all, Mark competed in 18 major championships, including the PGA Championship and U.S. Senior Open, and joined the PGA Champions Tour in 2022. Fittingly, along

the way, he set the course record at Presidents Golf Course, shooting an incredible 61 (9 under par).

Today, Mark is Director of Instruction at The Yacht & Country Club in Stuart, Florida, where he continues to mentor players of all levels. He credits his time at AWHHS with teaching him the discipline, confidence, and leadership that have defined both of his sports careers. His message to today's student-athletes: keep chasing your dreams—and know that when one door closes, another one will open.

Stephen J. Daly '71



Stephen Daly, a member of the Class of 1971, was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of his record-setting Track and Field achievements and his broader impact as an athlete, teammate, and leader. A native of Braintree, Stephen enrolled at AWHHS in 1967, guided by his mother's strong belief in the value of Catholic education. He quickly distinguished himself as a fierce competitor in football, baseball, and track.

Though talented in all three sports, Stephen's greatest accomplishments came in Track. Encouraged by Hall of Fame Football Coach Armond Colombo, and coached by Hall of Famer Art Svensen, Stephen worked to become the school's fastest sprinter, setting multiple records and winning the Massachusetts State Championship in the 50-yard dash in 1970. The following year, he captured the New England Catholic Championship in the 100-yard dash, while simultaneously playing varsity baseball. In all, he helped lead AWHHS to three consecutive State Championships in indoor track and was named captain as a senior.

Stephen was also a key contributor on the football team as a wide receiver and kick returner, earning All-Catholic honors in 1970, and he stood out in baseball as a center fielder and team captain. His trademark "track" speed made him a game-changer in every sport, every season.

Beyond athletics, Stephen contributed to the Glee Club and yearbook staff. After graduating in 1971, he studied Criminology at Northeastern where he played Division I baseball. After graduation, he built a successful 33-year career with United Parcel Service in management and leadership roles.

Later, Stephen gave back as a youth baseball coach in Marshfield, leading multiple championship teams. Today, he enjoys time with his family, including his six grandchildren. Grateful for the influence of his coaches and teammates, Stephen's advice to today's AWHHS student athletes is simple: "Always do your best and work hard."

Erin Dwyer, D.M.D. '13



Dr. Erin Dwyer, a member of the Class of 2013, was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of her outstanding hockey career at Archbishop Williams. She has the distinction of becoming the first player from the Girls' Hockey Program to receive this honor.

Raised in Weymouth, Erin's family's strong Catholic faith and commitment to education led her to Saint Francis Xavier School and later to AWHHS, where she quickly became a standout student-athlete—excelling both on and off the ice. She was a National Honor Society member, Academic Merit Scholar, Peer Minister, and an Admissions Council member.

As a four-year varsity hockey player and two-time team captain, Erin led the Bishops to three MIAA tournament berths and a school-best 15–3 record as a senior. She graduated as the program's all-time leading scorer with 154 points and earned numerous accolades, including four Catholic Central League All-Star selections, three Patriot Ledger All-Scholastic honors, and the prestigious Hobe Baker Sportsmanship Award. She especially treasures her time playing alongside her younger sister Kiera '15 and competing in the "Frozen Fenway" game.

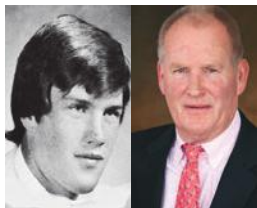
Erin went on to play NCAA Division II hockey at Saint Michael's College in Vermont on a full

athletic scholarship. Over four years, she became one of the program's all-time leaders in goals, points, and games played, and was elected team captain as a senior. She received the Victor V. LeMieux Award for Loyalty and Leadership and was deeply involved in community outreach, mentoring young athletes, and supporting special needs clinics.

A gifted student, Erin graduated magna cum laude with a double major in Biology and Psychology and a minor in Chemistry. She then attended Tufts University School of Dental Medicine, earning her D.M.D. in 2021. During COVID-19, she also served as an EMT, reinforcing her desire to work with children. She completed her pediatric residency at UConn and became a board-certified pediatric dentist in 2024. Today, Erin practices at Norwell Pediatric Dentistry, the very office she visited as a child.

Still involved in youth hockey, Erin credits AWHS with preparing her for every step of her journey. Her Hall of Fame induction celebrates not only her athletic legacy but also her inspiring commitment to excellence, service, and leadership. One would be hard-pressed to find a better inaugural inductee for our Girls' Hockey program.

John Morrissey '77



John Morrissey, a member of the Class of 1977, was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of his exceptional football career and lifelong commitment to leadership, mentorship, and service. Growing up in Holbrook in a faith-filled family devoted to Catholic education, John was inspired by his older brother, Paul '75, a standout multi-sport athlete at AWHS. He attended Paul's AWHS football games, absorbing the spirit and camaraderie that would one day define his own high school experience.

John's football journey began at an early age and quickly accelerated. He captained the Holbrook Black Knights youth team to a perfect 12–0 season before arriving at AWHS, where he flourished as a three-sport athlete in football, hockey, and baseball. A true school citizen, he also acted in school plays and earned the title of "Best Dressed," a nod to both his confidence and his mother's sense of style.

On the football field, John was a dominant line-backer under Hall of Fame Coach Hank Cutting. Known for his tenacity and leadership, he served as Team Captain, and earned All-Scholastic honors from *The Boston Herald*, *Patriot Ledger*, and *Brockton Enterprise*. As a senior, John was chosen for and captained the South Team in the prestigious Harry Agganis All-Star Game. He credits Coach Cutting with instilling in him the discipline, accountability, and resilience he would benefit from long after his football playing days ended.

John continued his athletic career at Northeastern University on a full football scholarship. He started as a freshman, and by senior year was Team Captain and MVP, repeatedly recognized for his standout play. He graduated with a degree in Criminal Justice in 1981 and launched a successful career in sales and business development, holding leadership roles at Sara Lee, Unilever, and Solina USA.

Throughout his impressive career, John remained committed to service—coaching youth football, supporting cancer charities, and advocating for adoption. He is retired and living in South Carolina with his wife Sandy. He reflects with gratitude on his AWHS experience and the lasting, positive impact it's had on every chapter and aspect of his life.

Riccardo Titus '08



Riccardo Titus, a member of the Class of 2008, was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of his extraordinary high school basketball career and the lasting impact of his leadership, character, and service. Raised in a home grounded in Catholic faith and discipline, Riccardo found a second home at AWHS that nurtured his academic, athletic, and personal growth.

Introduced to basketball at an early age, Riccardo quickly developed both a love and an aptitude for the game. At AWHS, he transformed that passion into excellence. Under the mentorship of coaches Paul Donoghue and Jed Phelan, Riccardo emerged as one of the most dominant players in school history. He was a Catholic Central League All-Star, League MVP, Boston Herald All-Scholastic, and Hall of Fame Classic MVP. He averaged 25.2 points per game as a senior—ranking among the top five scorers in Massachusetts.

Riccardo fondly remembers joining the select "1000 Point Club" in a game against archrival Cardinal Spellman. The game was stopped, and he was honored at center court and presented with the game ball, which is now a treasured keepsake symbolizing years of dedication. He is proud to have been just the fourth player to achieve that feat in the school's then 50-year basketball history. Moreover, the fact that it happened on Valentine's Day was not lost on him. As Riccardo puts it, "The game I loved just loved me back."

But Riccardo's legacy goes beyond statistics. As team captain, he fostered a culture of unity and accountability, always supporting younger players and setting a powerful example. His commitment to being a good school citizen extended off the court as well. He excelled academically, with a deep sense of discipline and intellectual curiosity. He even stepped into new territory by joining the Drama Club senior year, encouraged by his beloved history teacher, Mr. Lawlor.

Further, through Campus Ministry, Riccardo also embraced service, participating in food drives and outreach programs that helped shape his values. After graduation, he followed in his father's footsteps, entering the healthcare industry, where he worked his way from patient registration to clinical lab work and eventually into IT. Today, he is a Network Technician at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, helping to ensure the technology that supports patient care functions flawlessly.

Grateful and humbled by his Hall of Fame induction, Riccardo embraces the responsibility of being a role model. His advice to current student-athletes: "Trust the journey, focus on fundamentals, and enjoy the process. Hard work and discipline will always pay off in the long run."

Nancy Sheehy '90

Writing Your Own Story: Sheehy Urges Graduates to Embrace Life's Plot Twists



In her heartfelt and inspiring commencement address to the Archbishop Williams Class of 2025, alumna Nancy Sheehy '90 reflected on the school's powerful community and the personal journey that began for her in the same auditorium 35 years earlier.

She shared the emotional story of her older sister Suzanne, an AWHs graduate from the Class of 1986, diagnosed with brain cancer just weeks after graduation, and how the unwavering support of the school community helped her family through the heartbreak of Suzanne's passing. She also noted that the structure and support from AWHs helped her find purpose and healing, shaping her into who she is today.

Nancy's own experience at Archies became the foundation of her commencement message: life is a movie full of unexpected twists, and each graduate is the star of their own story. She offered three lessons learned: overcome adversity with resilience, embrace change and take opportunities, and believe in yourself with confidence.

"Opportunities don't always arrive in perfect packages or with a big flashing sign! Sometimes, they show up disguised as change or even uncertainty. Be open to both, because that's how your story moves forward."

Using humor and relatable stories, Sheehy encouraged students to lean on their friendships, chase unexpected paths, and not be afraid to fail. She reminded them that confidence grows through struggle and that their AWHs foundation will serve them wherever life takes them. In closing, she welcomed them to the alumni family and urged them to write bold, meaningful stories of their own.

Boys Golf Captures First CCL Championship Since 2003 with Record-Breaking Season

The Archbishop Williams Boys Golf Team delivered a historic 2024–25 season. Led by coach Pam Kiley, the Bishops captured their first Catholic Central League (CCL) Gold Championship in over two decades. With a league record of 5-1, the Bishops sealed the title with back-to-back wins over Bishop Fenwick and Bishop Feehan. Senior Night at Granite Links was also one for the record books. The team posted a stunning Stableford score of 266—the highest ever recorded at Granite Links and a new AWHs program record, smashing the previous mark of 245 set in 2023 by Bishop Feehan. Congratulations to the team and coaching staff on a truly unforgettable season!

Volleyball Sets the Standard in Service and Scholarship



The Archbishop Williams girls' volleyball program was honored with the MIAA Sportsmanship Award for the fall sports season. Chosen from more than 300 schools statewide, AWHs earned this award for the team's inspiring efforts to fight cancer. The Bishops raised \$1,100 for the Mass General Gastrointestinal Cancer Fund in honor of an AWHs parent undergoing treatment. The team was proudly recognized during halftime of our Thanksgiving football game. The program also earned the 2025 American Volleyball Coaches Association Team Academic Award for maintaining a year-long GPA of 3.3 or higher on a 4.0 scale. 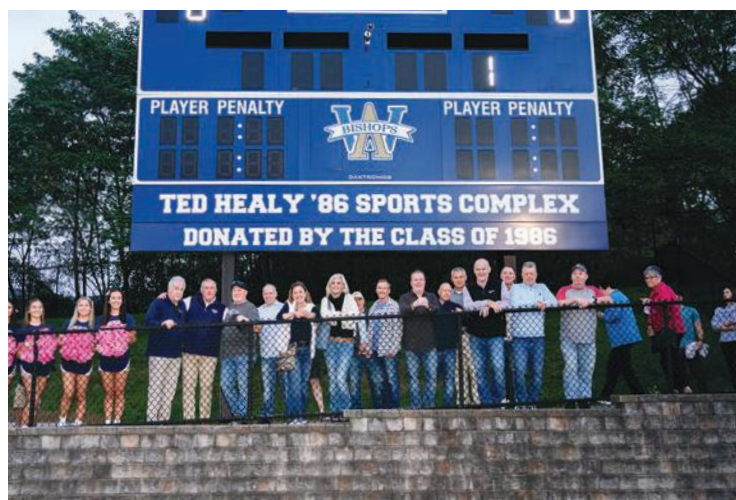
Archbishop Williams Triumphs Again in Gravy Bowl

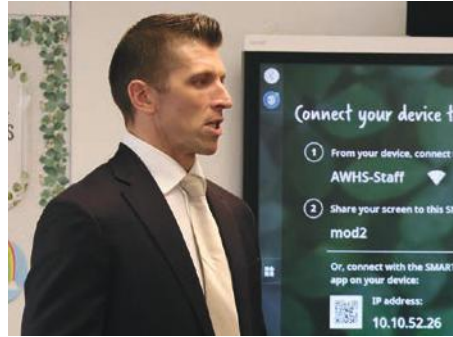
