Decatur is officially a UNICEF USA Child Friendly City!

Decatur has earned recognition as a Child Friendly City by UNICEF and is the third in the country, alongside Houston and Minneapolis, to earn this prestigious designation. The milestone reflects a commitment to making Decatur a place where all children feel safe, supported, and empowered to thrive.

City leaders and community partners shared the announcement in March at a press conference, and kicked off a celebration that included the next day's Fair on the Square, a vibrant, youth-led festival organized by the Decatur Youth Council and Child Friendly City Initiative Teen Leadership team. The event brought the

community together with games, activities, and performances, all in honor of Decatur's dedication to putting children first.

This achievement is years in the making, and reinforces Decatur's pledge to continue fostering a city where all young people can thrive.



Dates to Remember

City Budget Process

Decatur's fiscal year 2025-2026 budget process is underway. If you want to get involved in the process, participate on these important dates (subject to City Commission approval):

- **May 19** Formal presentation of the budget to the City Commission and adoption of tentative 2025 millage rates.
- June 2 Public hearing on proposed FY 2025-2026 budget and revised 2024-2025 budget and 2025 millage rates.
- June 4 Extended work session on proposed FY 2025-2026 budget and revised 2024-2025
- June 9 Public hearing on proposed FY 2025-2026 budget and revised 2024-2025 budget and 2025 millage rates (if needed).
- **June 16** Public hearing and scheduled adoption of proposed FY 2025-2026 budget and revised 2024-2025 budget and 2025 millage rates.

All public hearings on the budget will be held in-person and via Zoom. Access to information and meeting times will be published on the City's website at decaturga.com/budget.

Copies of the FY 2025-2026 budget and revised 2024-2025 budget will be posted online beginning Wednesday, May 21. Hard copies will be available at Decatur City Hall, 509 N. McDonough St., and at the Decatur Library, 215 Sycamore St.

Decatur Presents Inaugural Hometown Habitat Award

ongratulations to Donna and Wayne Robertson for being Decatur's first Hometown Habitat Award recipients. The Decatur Hometown Habitat is a program sponsored by the City of Decatur Environmental Sustainability Board (ESB) to recognize city residents making efforts toward more sustainable practices when caring for their property. By highlighting residents like the Robertsons, the committee hopes to educate, inspire and create a community appreciation for environmental efforts.

The Hometown Habitat Committee includes Kate McAlpin of Woodland Gardens, Mark Collins of Appleseed Tree Service, Annie Archbold, Kristy Bible and Jane Lomas from the ESB and Allison Ericson, Decatur City Naturalist. The committee selected The Robertson's home at 257 Mt Vernon Drive from several nominees.

For the Robertsons, environmental responsibility has always been a priority. Wayne remembers environmental awareness during his youth in the Boy Scouts and then on to the consulting world with a LEED construction consulting. For years, the couple tried to maintain the lawn with little success because of shade trees. Several years ago, they both decided to rethink their front yard in a more creative and environmentally friendly way.

They chose a local landscape design

company who provided a complete design plan for their review. Unlike previous landscape projects, this plan took a more holistic approach to their yard that incorporated existing plants, added more native plants, and reduced the lawn to a small patch leaving space for their grandchildren to kick a soccer ball around.

The Robertsons have also seen cost savings now that they don't use a regular landscape

service as well as a much lower water cost than previously to maintain their lawn.

All Hometown Habitat recipients receive a custom plaque for their yard designed by Decatur High School student Penelope Lesser. The plaques are a community-wide collaboration, crafted using wood supplied by Appleseed Tree Service, laser design by Decatur Makers member Caroll Bible, and metalwork by Carroll Bible and Pleasant Hugh Studio. the following: native plantings and invasive species removal, stormwater solutions, recycled or reused materials, a healthy tree canopy, or eco-friendly maintenance practices.

Do You Know the History Behind the Bell at Decatur Fire Station One?

The large bell in front of Decatur Fire Station One is more than just a decorative fixture—it is a historic piece of the City's firefighting legacy.

On Jan. 28, 1913, the Decatur Fire Department purchased the 800-pound bell to summon volunteer firefighters to emergencies. For decades, its ringing signaled the need for an immediate response to fires across the city.

In 2008, the bell was damaged when someone attempted to rock it back and forth, requiring repairs to restore it. Today, it stands as a symbol of Decatur's firefighting history and a reminder of the City's early emergency response efforts.

Visitors are welcome to stop by Decatur Fire Station One to see this piece of local history—just do not try to move it.

Want to be a Dementia Friend?

he Georgia Division of Aging Services will host a Dementia Friends Informational Webinar on Tuesday, June 24, from noon to 1 p.m.

This free, one-hour virtual session is offered each year in June and February and is open to anyone interested in learning how to better support individuals living with dementia.

Dementia Friends is a social-action movement that aims to improve society's understanding of dementia. People who live with dementia can continue to be vital members of our communities—shopping, dining, working and thriving. The webinar's goal is to shift the conversation from viewing individuals as "suffering from dementia" to "living with dementia," promoting inclusion and community engagement.

Dementia is an umbrella term for a group of symptoms affecting cognitive abilities, memory and behavior. The symptoms range from mild to severe.

Alzheimer is the most common cause of dementia. Other types of dementia include vascular, frontotemporal, and Lewy body. Dementia is not part of the normal process of aging.

Why become a Dementia Friend? Over 10,000 persons in DeKalb County are estimated to be living with dementia. In 2024, the DeKalb County Board of Commissioners presented a proclamation recognizing the county as dementia friendly, meaning that the county is working with other agencies and businesses to make DeKalb a positive place for both those with dementia and their caregivers.

As part of these efforts, DeKalb opened its first Connection Café in April 2024 at the East Central DeKalb Community and Senior Center in Stone Mountain. The Café offers a monthly opportunity for individuals with dementia and their caregivers to connect in a supportive environment. Meet Francesca Piccione and Fernando Lopez, May's Walk & Roll Superstars. Francesca, originally from Lafayette, Louisiana, moved to Decatur in 2020. Fernando, born in Brooklyn and raised in Atlanta since age 13, relocated from Midtown to Decatur after meeting Francesca. They were married in November 2024. Over the last few years, they have prioritized an active, healthy lifestyle with an intentional effort to get more physical movement throughout the day.

During the film industry strike several years ago, Francesca and Fernando found themselves impacted. They decided to turn the unexpected situation into a positive and travel to Europe. While Francesca had visited the continent before, it was Fernando's first time. What struck him as the starkest difference between the United States and Europe was the walkability of the latter's built environment.

They traveled for a week, did a work stay in Denmark at a sustainable farming community for three weeks, and capped off the trip with one more week of traveling. Francesca and

Fernando adored the more active lifestyle. Francesca realized she needed more physical movement in her life.

Once they were back home, they engaged in some deep thinking and ultimately made a commitment to lead healthier, more active

lives. This included more physical activity as well as healthier, less processed food. They made an effort to cook more meals at home and decided to eat out only if they walked or biked to the restaurant, and they continue to honor this agreement with themselves. Francesca went a step further and switched to doctors in Decatur whose offices were within walking distance, and she began walking or biking to work when possible, also utilizing MARTA when it made sense. Francesca reports feeling better than she has in years.

In addition to health benefits, walking and biking in the city have allowed Francesca and Fernando to see aspects of Decatur they might



have otherwise missed. They love the walking trails in their Lenox Place neighborhood and appreciate the small, almost hidden green spaces one notices when spending a lot of time as a pedestrian. One evening, they

stumbled upon an informal comedy night in the woods organized by neighbors. Francesca enjoys catching sight of details like fairy gardens and fun yard decorations when walking down the street.

Francesca is interested in pedestrian and bike safety and has joined Decatur's Active Transportation Committee, a group of citizens working to promote walking and biking safety. The newlyweds continue to enjoy all Decatur has to offer as they walk to various festivals and events in town.

Womble aimed to increase awareness and preparedness. The first class was filled immediately showcasing a strong interest from the community in this lifesaving education.

Womble was inspired to take a CPR course after the birth of her first child. While initially reaching out to Decatur

Fire regarding a school fundraiser, she saw an opportunity to engage her school's Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) and offer CPR training to other families who had similar goals. With PTO support, lunch was provided for all participants.

The event fostered connections among parents, teachers, and Decatur emergency professionals. Womble emphasized the importance of building community, learning about local resources, and helping ensure the safety and well-being of neighbors.

Blazing Brave Girl's Fire Camp Grows in Year Two

n March, Decatur Fire Chief Toni Washington, in partnership with DeKalb County Fire, hosted the second annual Brave Girls' Fire Camp, providing young women with hands-on experience in the fire service.

Thirty participants from 14 to 18 years old participated in a one-day camp where they wore protective fire gear, operated fire hoses, learned hand-only CPR, experienced aerial

ladder operations, made new friends, and discovered the career of firefighting.

Decatur Fire personnel including Chief Ninetta Violante, Fire Inspector Jazzmin Rullan, Fire Apparatus Operator (FAO) Kamisha



Sims, and FAO Orielle Thomas, served as group leaders and mentors throughout the day as the girls experienced four different stations and demonstrated what they learned.

Four participants were recognized with the "Blossomed and Brave" award—an honor for the participant who demonstrated the most personal growth throughout the day. Winners received a Decatur Fire challenge coin presented by Chief Washington and DeKalb

Fire Chief Fullum.

n April, City officials, partners and community stakeholders gathered at the community bandstand to commemorate the groundbreaking of the Decatur Square Shake Up, the highly anticipated redesign of Decatur Square. The Square Shake Up is one of the direct utcomes of the 2023 Town Center 2.0 master plan. Through extensive engagement, including partnering with the Downtown Neighbors Association, business interviews, festival pop-ups, online surveys, and live input sessions, the community feedback inspired seven key goals:

- **1** Balance land use patterns with humancentered design;
- **2** Stimulate economic growth in the downtown area:
- **3** Create welcoming and vibrant open spaces, parks, and plazas;
- **4** Promote mobility enhancements that improve connectivity;
- **5** Support a resilient & environmentally sustainable downtown:
- **6** Enhance downtown's historic character and unique identity;
- **7** Improve the quality of the downtown experience.

Within these goals was an expressed desire to enhance Decatur Square, with



hopes for a more comfortable daily experience and space adaptable to special events. The plan also proposes initiatives to better connect the energy of Decatur Square to its surroundings by creating pedestrianfirst environments in current parking areas, improving the MARTA Bus Terminal, and enhancing walkability on surrounding streets. The redesigned Decatur Square aims to address these wishes and offer a public

plaza that can evolve with the needs of our community.

Phase One will feature:

- A new children's hillside play area
- Expanded greenspace in front of a new performance stage
- Permanent public restrooms
- A redesigned gateway to the square from North McDonough Street and the MARTA Bus Terminal
- A performance stage with a green room to host entertainers for live events such as concerts and performances, as well as a large screen for projected viewings.

The iconic Celebration statue will move from its current home at the center of the Square to the North McDonough Plaza as a welcoming gateway to the city's center.

While construction is expected to finish by Spring 2026, pedestrian and ADA access to the Square and its surrounding businesses will remain available.

Decatur Presbyterian Church Funds Local and International Missions

As part of its bicentennial celebration and capital campaign, Decatur Presbyterian Church (DPC) has awarded two \$50,000 grants to local nonprofits, Hagar's House and A Home for Everyone in DeKalb, to support their work with unhoused and displaced individuals in the community.



Founded in 1825 and incorporated in DeKalb County in 1827, DPC is marking its 200th anniversary with a yearlong campaign themed "Renew God's Church, Strengthening Our Mission." In keeping with that mission, the church's governing body, known as the Session, committed to designating 10% of all campaign funds for local and international service projects.

With pledges totaling over \$2.5 million and donations already exceeding \$1.4 million, the church distributed the first grants to organizations focused on housing insecurity in Decatur and DeKalb County.

A Home for Everyone in DeKalb will use its grant to support the development of Georgia's first Women's Workforce Transition Program, housed at 232 East Lake Drive in the Oakhurst community. The funding will help cover renovation and furnishing costs, first-year operations, and multiyear maintenance. The project aims to create a stable and supportive environment for women transitioning into the workforce, addressing both housing and career readiness.

Hagar's House, operated by the Decatur Cooperative Ministry (DCM), is the only emergency family shelter in DeKalb County. The facility was severely damaged by Hurricane Helene in September, with stormwater infiltration causing widespread destruction and bacterial contamination. The funds from DPC will help rebuild and restore the shelter so that it can continue serving families in crisis.

Hagar's House can accommodate up to five families at a time and plays a critical role in keeping families together during housing emergencies—something many shelters are not equipped to do.

DPC's bicentennial celebration also honors its longstanding partnerships with institutions such as Agnes Scott College and Columbia Theological Seminary, along with a legacy of community outreach and mission work that spans two centuries.

PORCH-Decatur: Combating Food Insecurity at the Front Door

More than 85,000 residents—approximately 11.2% of the population—face hunger, and 59% of those do not qualify for SNAP benefits, according to FeedingAmerica.org.

In response, PORCH-Decatur was founded in July 2020 by Barbara Hardin, Hope Baker, and the late Dot Moye during the COVID-19 pandemic. What began as a neighborhood food drive initiative has grown into a dedicated, volunteer-driven effort to fight hunger locally. The leadership team now includes Ellen Bishop and Sue West, alongside co-founders Barbara and Hope.

PORCH-Decatur is part of the national nonprofit PORCH Communities and is supported locally by Holy Trinity Parish. The organization collects non-perishable food and cash donations monthly to help at-risk families in Decatur.

How It Works

- Collection: Donors leave food on their porches, for Neighborhood Coordinators (NCs) to pick up.
- Sorting: NCs bring collections to Holy Trinity Parish (515 East Ponce de Leon Avenue) on the second Sunday of each month from 3-4:30 p.m., where volunteers sort the items.
- Distribution: Partner organizations ensure the food reaches families and individuals in need.

Donations and Impact

In 2024, PORCH-Decatur collected approximately \$34,000 in donations, supporting local organizations such as:



- Decatur Emergency Assistance Ministry
- · Decatur Housing Authority
- Decatur Education Foundation
- Casa Alterna
- Holy Trinity's sack lunch program for the unhoused.

Neighborhood Coordinators emphasize the positive impact on both volunteers and recipients. Participation in PORCH strengthens community connections while meeting a vital need. Many volunteers describe their monthly involvement as meaningful, simple, and deeply rewarding.





Agnes Scott College and the City of Decatur Partner on Climate Resilience Plan

ince 2007, Agnes Scott College has been committed to setting ambitious carbon reduction goals, including achieving net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2037. It has been the long-held belief of Agnes Scott that in order for the college to deliver on its mission to educate its students to live honorably and engage in the intellectual and social challenges of their times, students must have a robust understanding of climate change and climate justice. Nearly a decade ago, Agnes Scott expanded its climate goals to include implementing a groundbreaking Climate Resilience Plan (CRP) that would ensure both the college and the City of Decatur were working at the local level to build community resilience to respond to the impacts of climate change.

As global average temperatures increase, the Southeastern United States is expected to have some of the largest economic losses from climate change nationwide. Decatur is already experiencing longer and more frequent heatwaves. The region is also experiencing an increase in heavy rain events, which is compounding the decline of the region's infrastructure and leading to critical compromises in the region's wastewater infrastructure.

Like Agnes Scott, the voices of the City's youth population have been critical to driving change for climate action. A youth representative on the City's Environmental Sustainability Board said it is inspiring, as someone who grew up in Decatur, to see the City and Agnes Scott College lead the way in addressing climate change. It shows even a small community can make a big difference with collaboration and action.

With the full support of Agnes Scott President Leocadia Zak and City of Decatur Mayor Patti Garrett, the college and the City began developing a joint Climate Resilience Plan in 2018. Implementation of the plan began in July 2021. The purpose of the plan was to identify together the most pressing impacts of climate change anticipated in the region and outline the strategies for addressing these impacts, both in terms of preparation and response.

Since 2018, Agnes Scott and the City of Decatur have been supported in developing and implementing the CRP through a network of partner organizations. Currently, the CRP is managed through an Implementation Task Force made up of staff from Agnes Scott College, the City of Decatur, City Schools of Decatur, Columbia Theological Seminary, Georgia Interfaith Power and Light, as well as members of the City's Environmental Sustainability Board and Decatur residents.

The CRP Task Force strives to produce transferable solutions and frameworks for other communities resulting in mutually beneficial collaborations, shared capacity, subject matter expertise, and opportunities to engage the broader community. Moving forward, the CRP Task Force will be providing regular updates in The Decatur Focus about this work and sharing opportunities for the Decatur community to both engage in this collaborative process and take actionable steps to improve their own resilience to these compounding challenges.

Agnes Scott Mental Health Counseling Program Earns Accreditation

gnes Scott College's Clinical Mental Health Counseling master's program has received eight-year accreditation from the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP)—a nationally recognized standard for counselor training programs.

Now entering its fourth cohort, the program was launched in fall 2022 and integrates a unique, intersectional framework that emphasizes holistic and social justice-based approaches to mental health counseling.

The program is led by Dr. Jennifer Fulling-Smith, Ph.D., LPC, ACS, RPT-S, and has gained recognition from community partners for the quality and preparedness of its students. These partnerships provide essential clinical supervision and fieldwork opportunities, further strengthening the student experience.

Since its inception, the program has demonstrated strong career outcomes. Among the inaugural cohort, 78% of students secured counseling jobs before graduation, and 94% were employed in the field within four months of completing the degree.

CACREP accreditation affirms that the program meets rigorous

academic and professional standards required by many state licensing boards, enabling graduates to pursue licensure as Licensed Professional Counselors (LPCs).




