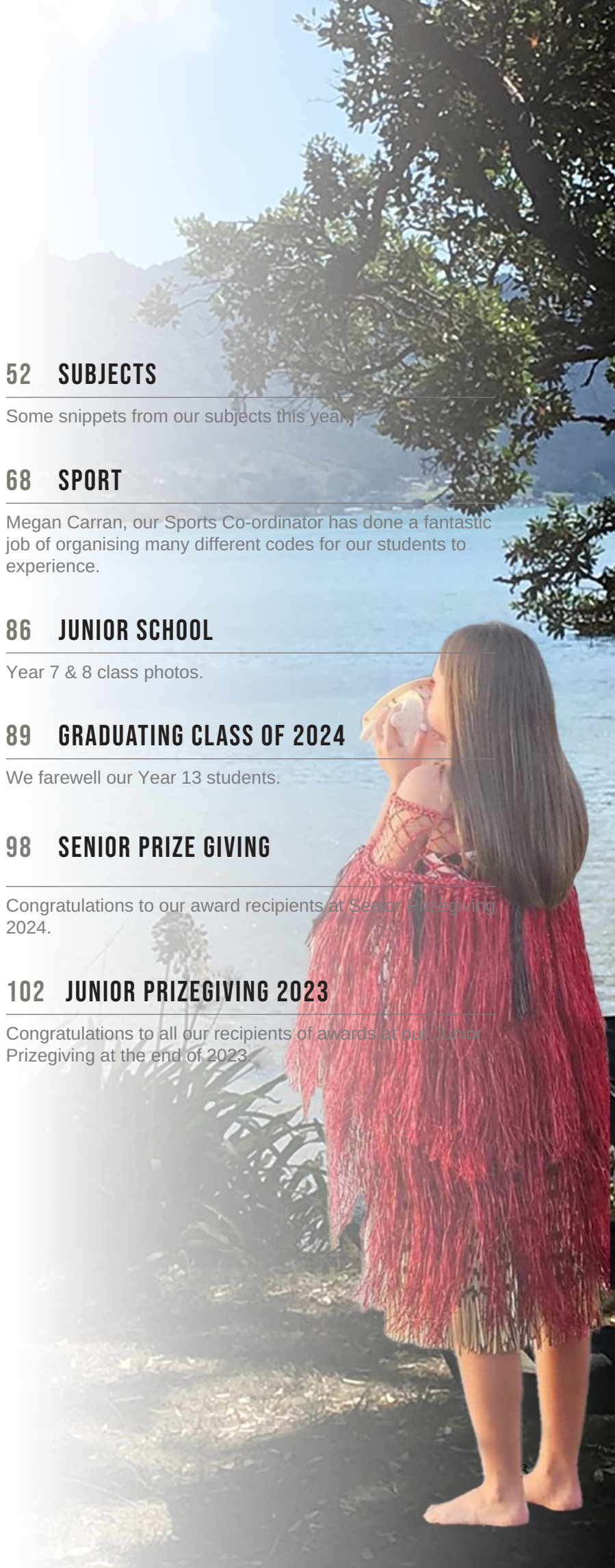

FROM THE PRINCIPAL MR J COSGROVE

Tēnā koutou katoa

As we wrap up 2024, it's a good time to look back on a year filled with successes and growth across our school. From academics to sports, arts, and community service, Bream Bay College students have given their best in many areas, bringing pride to our school and community.

In the arts, we saw strong performances in Showquest, rock bands, and a series of exceptional performance evenings. These events showcased the creativity and effort our students and staff put into their work, making the arts an exciting part of our school life.

Sports teams had a standout year as well. Our First XIII rugby team made history by winning the Adam Blair Shield, marking us as Northland's top school. Many of the same players were part of the First XV that reached the Northland Championship final. Both teams showed focus, teamwork, and represented the Bream Bay College community with pride.

We continue to receive positive feedback from people across our rohe about the contributions that our students make to the wider Bream Bay College community. Through Surf Lifesaving, tree planting, helping organise events at Takahiwai marae, supporting events run at our contributing schools. Our students show an exceptional dedication to helping bring our community together.

4 We also saw real progress in student attendance, with a 7% increase overall. This means thousands more learn

ing hours, with Bream Bay College now among Northland's top-attending state schools. We have focused on improving support for students who may need extra help, with a strong turnout from whānau at our Parent-Student-Teacher days - up over 100% this year. This cooperation has helped us work closely with families, making sure each student has the support they need.

Removing phones during the school day was another important change, and we've already noticed the positive impact on student engagement. The strong backing from families made it easier for us to set clear expectations for our students.

We say farewell to four valued staff members this year: Miss Brockman-Palmer, Mrs. Dimpi Nayar, Mrs. Jo Mayne, and Mrs. Ella Buckle. Each has made a huge contribution to our school, and while we will miss them, we wish them all the best in their next steps.

Our main goals for next year remain steady. Attendance will still be a key focus, as it's central to student success and well-being. We'll also be working on building solid, connected junior programmes across Years 7–10, with assessments that help everyone understand progress in critical areas of development for our young people.

For senior students, we are returning to six-subjects for Years 11 and 12, giving students a wider range of options as they head toward their final year. We will be encouraging students to aim high and focus on achieving their best qualification.

We are excited to refresh our school values in 2025. This work will help us be clear about what it means to be part of Bream Bay College and ensure we're all moving forward with shared goals and a strong sense of community.

As Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, "The function of education is to teach one to think intensively and to think critically. Intelligence plus character - that is the goal of true education."

Thank you to all the students, staff, whānau, and wider community for being part of Bream Bay College's journey in 2024. We're looking forward to making 2025 another positive year for everyone.

We have opened the school facilities including the turf, courts, fields, gymnasium, Whare, auditorium and swimming pool to be used by the community. We have employed heads of department, senior leaders, a new principal and a principal's executive assistant. We have enabled our students to transition seamlessly into the digital world, ensuring each and every one has the opportunity to reach their potential.

Most importantly we have seen our students continue to grow and achieve in all aspect of school life in the environment we are providing.

As a parent I have watched my own children achieve excellent results at Bream Bay College, grasping all the sporting, cultural, academic and leadership opportunities that have been offered. They are now both excelling in their chosen tertiary pathways, thanks, in part, to the grounding and support they have received here.

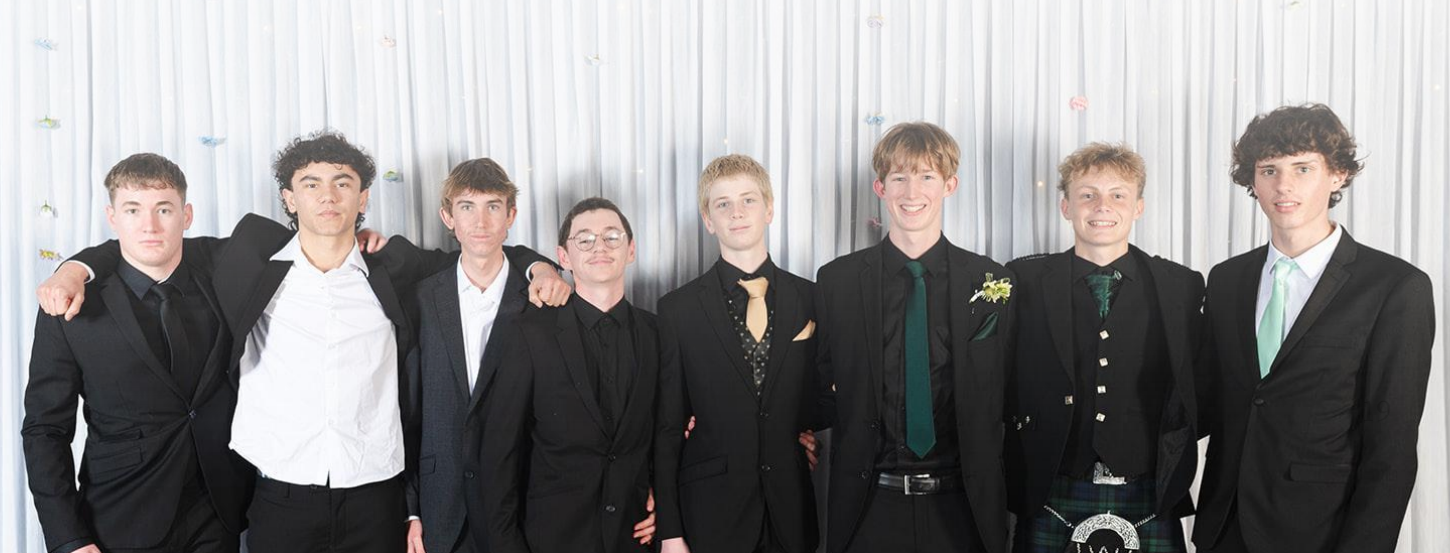

Emer Lea was a stand out contestant in the Stars in Your Eyes Waipu as Blondie.



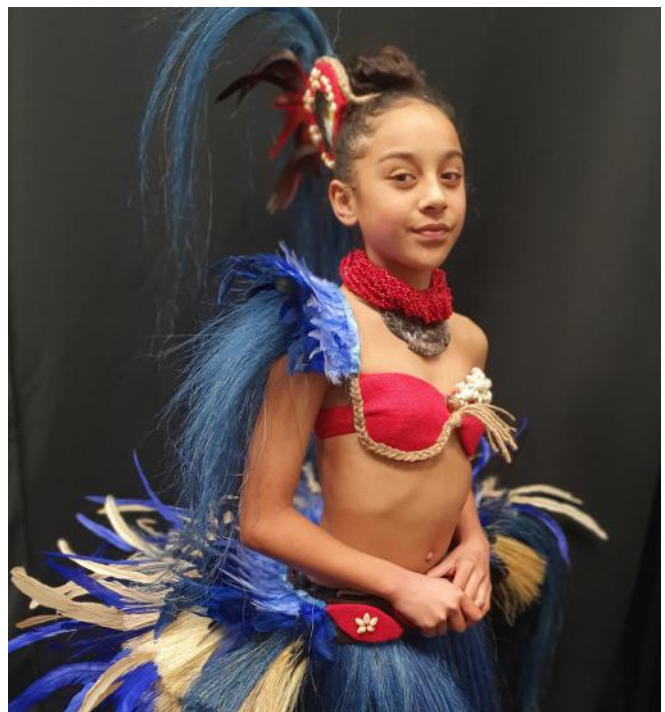

Friday the 7th June saw a 36 student team off to Forum North for this year's Showquest!

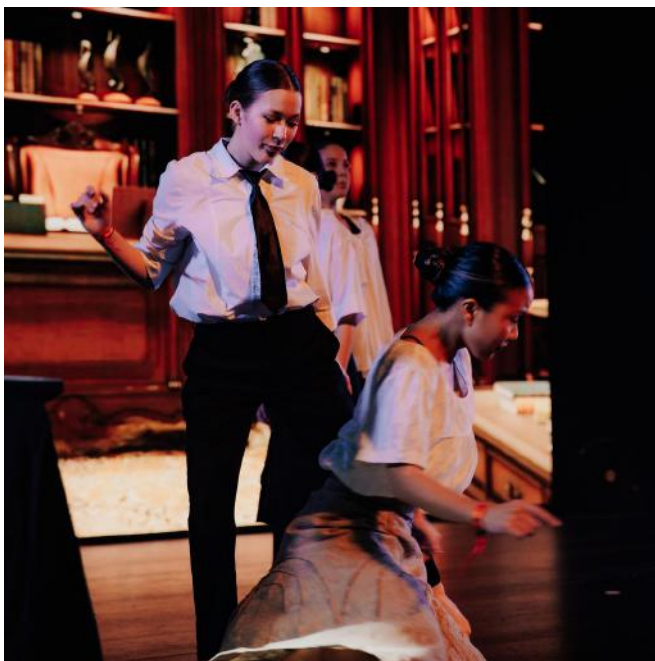
The team had been working hard for a few months, creating and learning choreography, getting fitted for costumes, editing music and creating video walls.

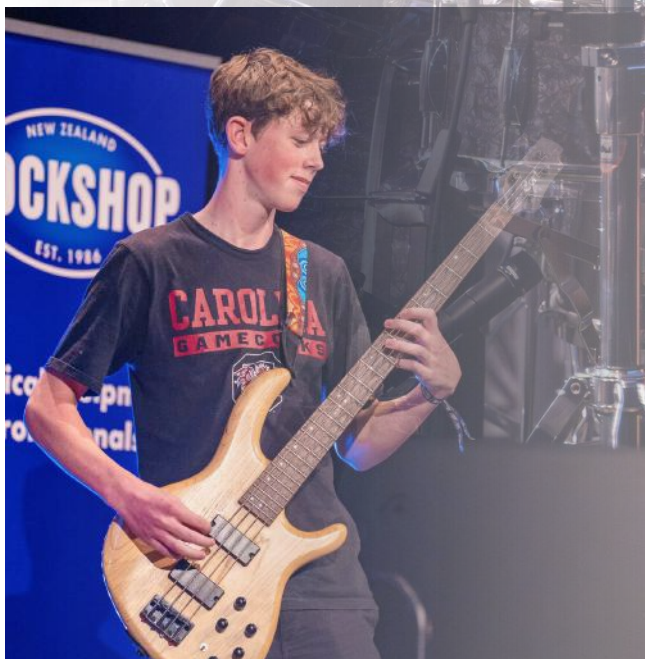

A group of our senior girls took part in the annual Women in Infrastructure event in Whangarei. They were able to explore careers that are generally considered a 'male domain'.



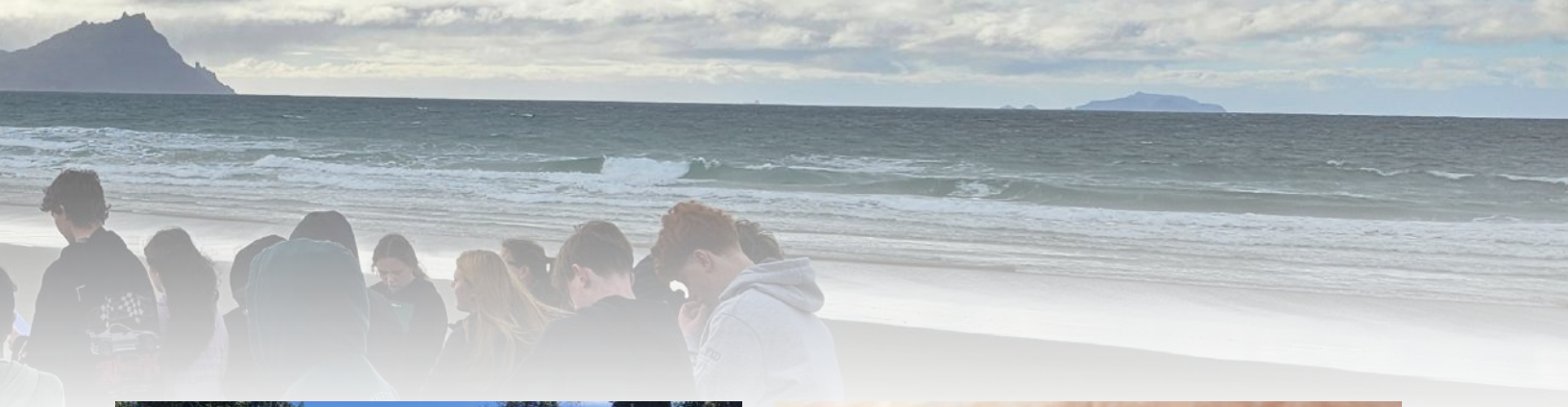
Our Year 11 Geography students visited coastal communities in our local area to collect data on levels of coastal erosion. Senior Biodiversity Advisor, Laura Shaft from Northland Regional Council spoke about the role of the sand dunes and dune planting in managing coastal erosion.



Year 13 Geography students worked with Piroa Conservation Trust to collect data on the health of the Waionehu Stream in Waipu and the Ruakākā River. The trip involved velocity testing, chemical testing for E.Coli and nitrate levels as well as getting to play with some friendly eels. A big thank you to Graham, Caroline and Lloyd who helped us on the day.



The year 12 and 13 Business Studies students met with six other Northland schools at a reserved lounge in the Semenoff stadium. They learnt about other people's ideas and how they could validate their business idea. They also had a chance to introduce their business ideas to business coaches from around the country.



The Level 2 Outdoor Education class travelled to Kowharewa Bay in Tutukaka and spent the day learning about Waka Ama. This is part of an assessment related to risk management. Ngā mihi Mitimitaga o le Pasefika Va'a-alo Canoe Club for running this day with our students.



Our Year 11 Art students visited local coastal sites around Ruakaka and One Tree Point to take photographs to work from back in the classroom.



Year 12 Geography students kayaked along the Ruakākā River with a group from Ruakākā Primary School. We managed to collect two bags of rubbish and got to see our local environment from a new perspective.



Three groups of debaters entered the Northland Regional Debating Competition. They also had the privilege of listening to some wise words of wisdom from ex MP, Emily Henderson and Honourable Minister of Health, Dr Shane Reti.



Year 11 Agricultural Science students had an enriching experience during their visit to two local dairy farms and a dairy and beef feed supplier. They explored the daily operations of the farm, and learnt about the care and management of dairy cattle. This visit provided a practical insight into the agricultural industry, complementing their classroom learning and inspiring future studies in sustainable farming practices. A massive thank you to our local community especially, Southend Farms, Bruce Paton and Nutrinza.com



A group of students from Year 10 Te Reo Māori spent a day planting native trees and plants along a section of the Ruakākā River. We joined up with a number of other community groups and Mountains to Sea who organized the day, to plant a total of 905 trees!



Our Level 2 Outdoor Education class completed the Mangawhai Cliff Top walk. This was linked to an assessment around planning an outdoor activity and leadership.



11 Ag/Hort students went on an Industry visit to learn more about the primary industries in New Zealand. Thanks to Maungatapere Mushrooms and Blueberry Country in Waipu.



Six Senior Students attended a Future Trades Day at the Dyer St campus doing workshops on Hospitality, Horticulture, Automotive, Fencing, and Plumbing. They saw what these courses involve and participated in some of the skills and learning done in these programmes.



Five senior students from our kapa haka roopu experienced a Gateway Māori Tourism Cultural placement in Waitomo in the holidays. This placement will give them skills and credits that supports their knowledge and understanding of Māori Tourism as a career pathway, drawing on, and building their strengths in this field.

BBC and Ruakākā School were successful in gaining Creatives in Schools funding to work with Ben from @arajourneys this year, learning to create art to turn into content to tell stories about our local area. The first trip was to Takahiwai Marae and the Pou Rāhui on Ruakākā Beach.

NIWA

The Year 10 Social Studies students paid the local Niwa site a visit to support their learning in regards to kaitiakitanga and sustainability. We had a wonderful time at Niwa; their staff were very friendly and informative as they showed us a glimpse of the science behind the aquaculture practices. They showed us how they farm kingfish from baby size to a 15 kilogram adult fish in one year. Our students loved witnessing this really cool stuff and they did represent our school with dignity and curiosity. We look forward to maintaining this whānaungatanga with Niwa and Bream Bay College in the future.



The Year 12 and 13 History classes travelled to Kerikeri to attend a naturopathic medicinal workshop, which supported the work that they have been doing around Rongoā Māori and the Tohunga Suppression Act. Students went on a hikoi to look at identifying healing plants in their natural state, learned how and when to harvest based on cycles of the moon, and then had a go at making their very own kawakawa balm.



On Monday, 16 September the Year 13 Geography class journeyed down to Muriwai Beach to explore caves, arches, sand dunes and pillow lava. We also checked out Tree Adventures in Woodhill forest which saw our bravest students (and teacher) climbing up 15 metres to complete a series of obstacles.



At the end of August, students from 9A Social Studies got to work with the help of Bruce Paton and Graham Matthews from the Piroa Conservation Catchment Group. We planted native plants as part of a project to help restore a wetlands area for inanga spawning and a habitat for the bittern bird. We also got really muddy and almost lost a gumboot or two!





Students in Year 11 Geography had been learning about the Ōmaha environment and formation of Mangatawhiri Spit and the Whangateau Harbour. So they headed down to Ōmaha to see the environment for themselves. A special thank you to Ari Carrington and Vernessa Langridge for coming on our trip. The students had a great time playing games on the beach and creating diagrams in the sand.



Our annual Year 9 museum trip was a success. Students ended up asking if they could stay longer because there was still much more to explore and learn, which was a reflection of their engagement and enthusiasm. They learned how NZ was formed geographically and explored a lot of topics, ranging from the early time when Māori travelled to Aotearoa, the ancient fauna and flora of NZ to the involvement in WW1 and WW2.

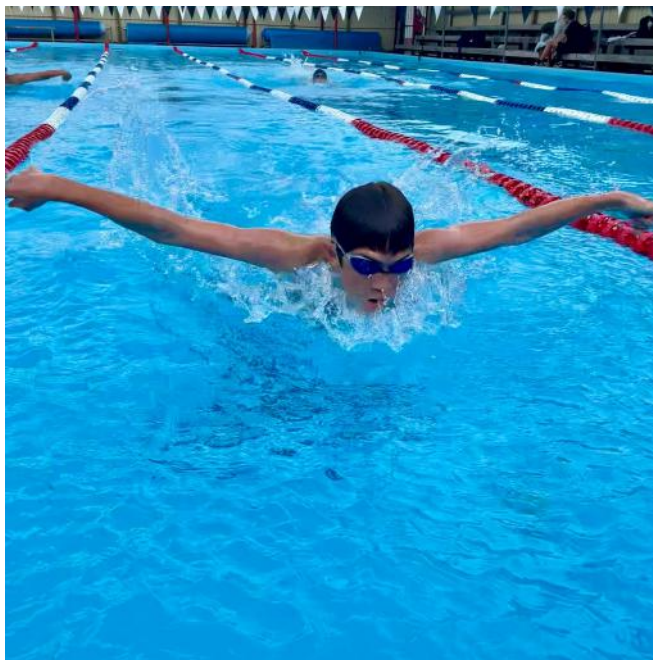

FROM THE HOUSE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - MRS MOLLOY

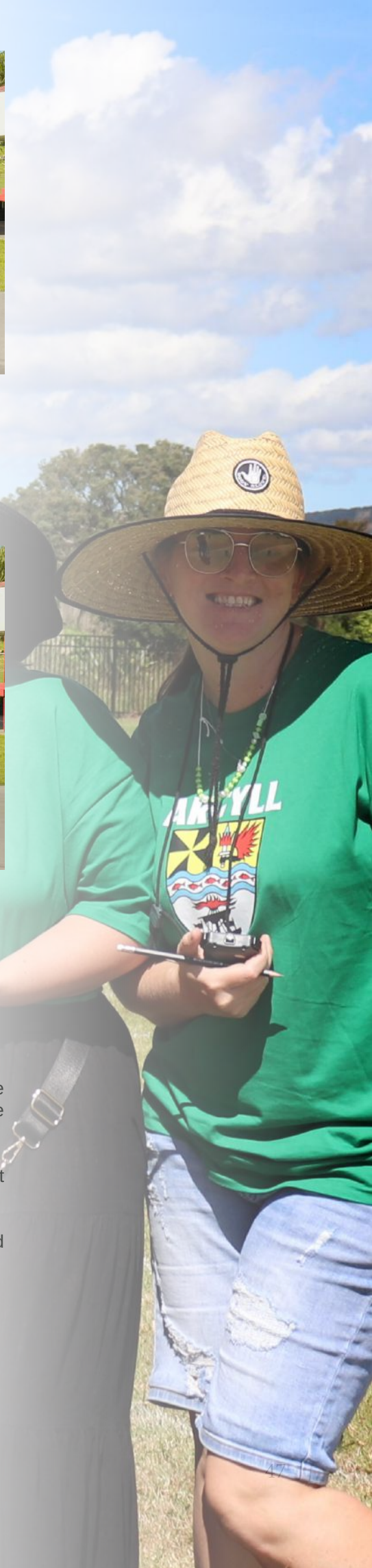

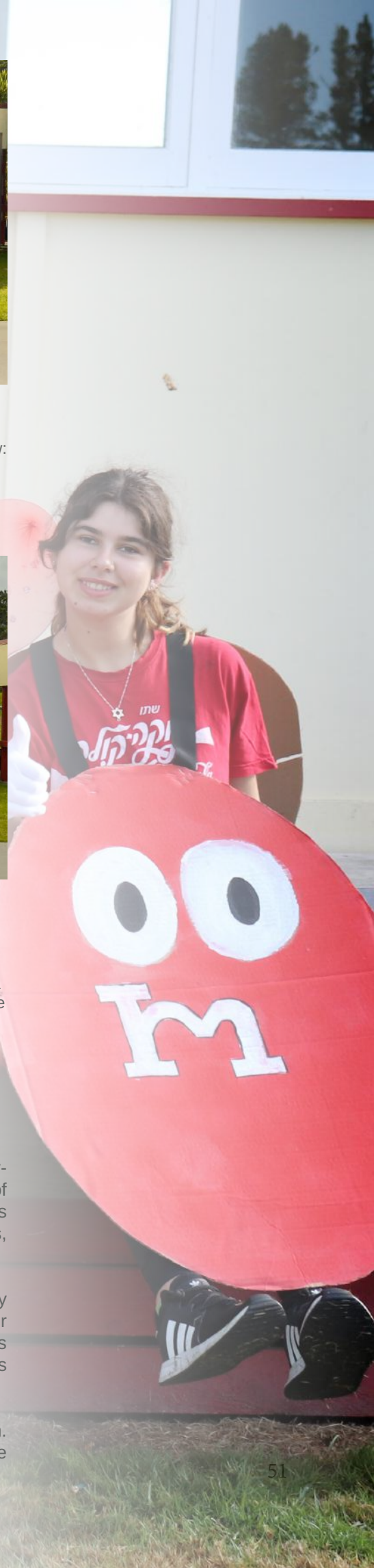
FROM THE HOUSE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - MR BAYER

SOCIAL SCIENCES



In 2024, our Year 9/10 Social Studies students dived into a wide range of fascinating and key topics. The curriculum covered Economic Activity, Human Rights and Game Changers, Sustainability and Kaitiakitanga o te Moana, and Society and Organisation, with an insightful exploration into Culture Clash.

To support the learning we have done in class, Year 9 students went to the Auckland Museum in Term 4 to explore artefacts from different cultures through time as well as look at the remnants of the volcanic cone that the museum sits on. They also had a virtual reality experience through Blake Trust looking at the health of our oceans and the impact of marine reserves.

We hope our Social Studies students have left this year with a greater appreciation of the environment, society, and the power of responsible action.

2024 has been a great year for Business Studies. In Year 10 students learnt to develop a financial budget, studied marketing strategies, and experimented with foreign currencies and trading stocks.

2024 was the first year delivering the new Level 1 Commerce course in which students take a dive into the financial decision-making process of an organisation as well as the interdependent financial relationships that connect organisations, communities and individuals.

Senior Levels 2 and 3 students developed a marketing and business plan. They engaged with local community events, the Waipu markets, Bream Bay United Football Club and the Kerikeri Packhouse market. The internal assessments have been offered alongside the Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) to support our students with financial tools, marketing and networking with young entrepreneurs from across Northland.

This year's businesses included custom-made jewellery, Dutch pancakes, gourmet cheese and cracker boards and hot dogs & churros.

Students in Geography have been out and about in our local environment and further afield. Year 11 explored the local coastal environment as well as Ōmaha Beach.

Year 12 collaborated with Ruakākā Primary and kayaked along the Ruakākā River to pick up rubbish and explored the pattern of where rubbish collected along the river and the type of rubbish that was found.

Year 13 students joined up with Graham Matthews from the Piroa Conservation Catchment Trust to test the water quality of different awa (rivers) in our environment. They went to Muriwai Beach to experience a west coast, black sand beach and how the natural processes are different to white sand east coast beaches.

Other topics explored were where populations live and the vulnerability of communities to coastal erosion and sea level rise for Year 11. Year 12 learnt about the Amazon Rainforest and patterns of crime in Chicago. Year 13 learnt about human trafficking in Nepal and the global pattern and significance of coral reefs.



DANCE





2024 has been another creative and performance based year. Students have explored many different topics and created amazing pieces of thoughtful choreography. Senior students set the bar high this year with performances based on the theme of whales, turangawaewae, NZ Artists, kowhaiwhai patterns and of course ABBA.

Students continue to excel and push the boundaries of their capabilities. We were also fortunate to have Atamira Dance Company come and run a workshop too. Dance continues to have magical powers and seeing students come to life when they are on the stage will always bring a smile to my face and fill my heart with joy.

This year, Physical Education at Bream Bay College has focused on fostering lifelong skills through a range of dynamic and engaging programs. From Junior to Senior levels, students have participated in activities that promote teamwork, resilience, and personal development.

In the Junior classes, students have excelled in both traditional sports and innovative games designed to enhance their social and physical skills. A special highlight has been the student-led games, where creativity and collaboration have taken centre stage. The Year 7 and 8 students have embraced units on softball and basketball, where they learned not only technical skills but also the values of fair play and perseverance.

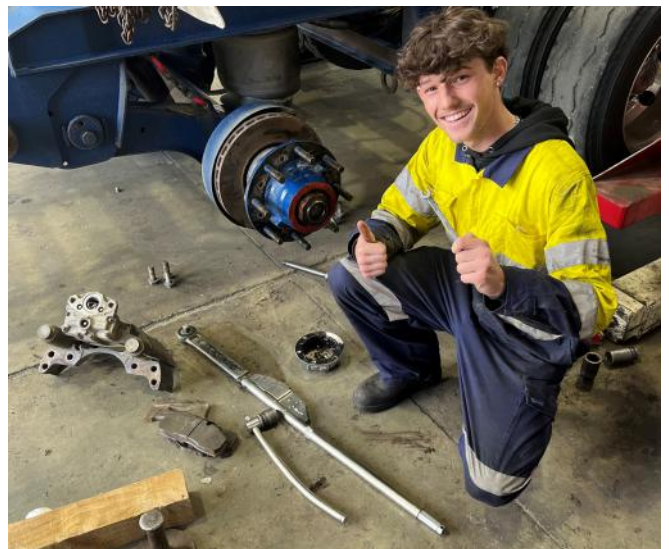

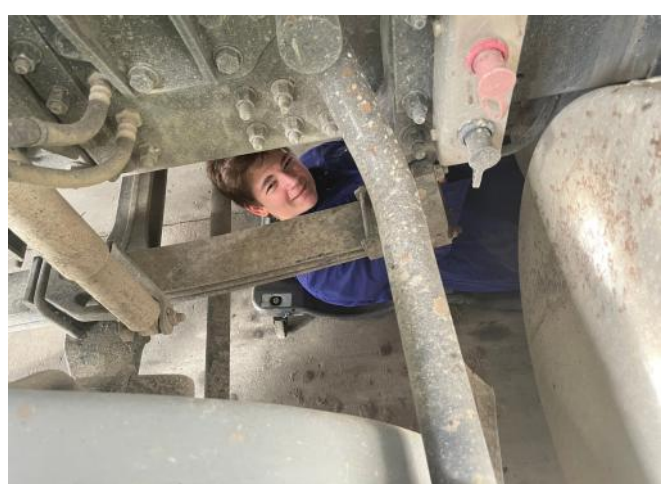

Over 60 senior students have participated in work experience placements in a variety of industries, and completed courses and units linked to their work experience. Students have done placements in building, electrical, plumbing, animal care, surveying, civil infrastructure, heavy machinery, café/restaurant hospitality, sawmills, diesel mechanics, laboratory work, aquaculture, early childcare, sports coaching and more!

We have had students gain apprenticeships, and part time work, OR work out that the career is NOT what they really want to do- all of these outcomes are awesome!

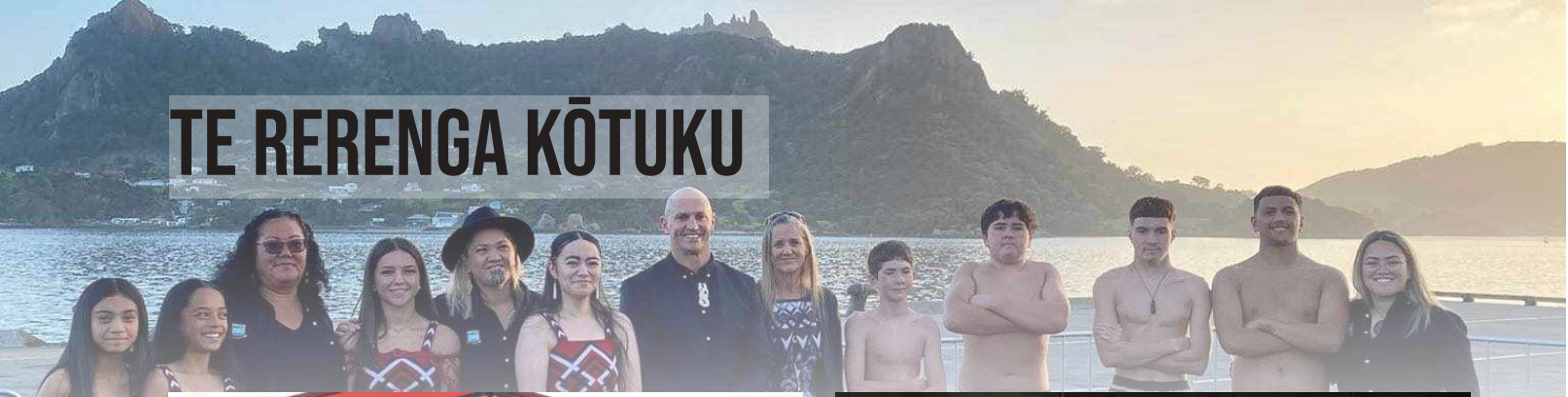

To our future Year 13s, good luck and you've got this!











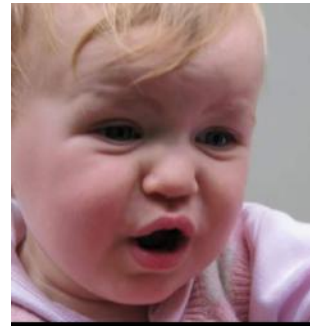
