

I didn't get the pleasure to watch season 1 live, I returned to MCSR right as it was finishing and frankly had no idea this whole Ranked Playoffs thing even existed until Couriway did his (scuffed) Season 2 quals, But when I sat down and watched the earliest stage of playoffs, when it was rough and wrinkled, fumbling to find its footing, its own voice and character, I found beauty in it. Sure, it's nowhere near the polished product we've seen in the past year- almost flawless gameplay from competitors, wonderfully edited between-match segments, and countless volunteers who keep the show going, but while I watched season 1 bored out of my mind in the summer between Playoffs, it was beautiful in its own right. It was a passion proliect that didn't know how to be quite yet, with its postmatch interviews that faded out and back in, the previous rounds' analysis before someone else played that never came back.

Part of its beauty was in its unpolished aspect and how much of a passion project it was, and how those things showed. I think especially of watching fincoboy vs Doogile during my historical journey: laughing as the commentators smoothly talked about finco's forfeit in the previous round, the breath-stealing neck-and-neck first seed, and all




all the tragedy and joy of a reverse sweep that I already knew the outcome for. The past was doomed to be as it was and no cheering or hoping or praying could change it and it was tragic and heartbreaking and soulsinking.

Wind whispers through tall grass, bees bumble along a scattering of flowers on the outskirts of a quaint village in the middle of the plains. Suddenly, in two different, yet identical universes, a player appears.

They get to work without a second thought, locating the village's blacksmith and taking what they need, wood, cobblestone, iron and obsidian, hands flying across crafting tables and through inventories to create the necessary tools and items to advance. Further, faster, the gap between the two becomes obvious as Silverr enters the Nether, spotting the bastion instantly. Doogile knows. He sees Silverr's effort begin to pay off as he sprints to catch up, having to light his portal with wood instead of flint, the fire catching his pant legs from a misstep.

The two speedrunners grit their teeth, each surging forward at breakneck pace to complete the milestones, get what they need, finish the game. Doogile enters the bastion with Silverr trading already. The heat of the Nether stings his eyes as he mines gold blocks, cringing away from a stray crossbow arrow fired by an angry Piglin. Within minutes, Silverr is out as Doogile struggles, Silverr's white hair a stark contrast against dark soul sand and nether brick. Blaze after blaze falls to his axe, blade slicing with efficiency as he racks up five blaze rods, builds a portal, and blinds to the Overworld.

Cool air at last. Silverr doesn't have time to relish in it, crafting Eyes of Ender and throwing one, calculating where the stronghold will be. Doogile is far behind, just now entering the fortress, scrambling for any timesave possible as his opponent crawls further and further ahead. Silverr stumbles for a moment, progressing the wrong direction towards incorrect portal coordinates at first, allowing Doogile a few seconds to catch up. His brow furrows. He can't lose his grip now. Doogile blinds early, seeing how far off the stronghold is and falters for liust a moment in surprise. Silverr makes it to the coordinates he needs, creating and lighting a portal in seconds and teleporting into a cave above the stronghold, digging down through the ceiling and earning the Eye Spy achievement as Doogile struggles to collect his blaze rods.

"It's all eyes on Silverr, now," Feinberg comments as he and Nerdi watch. The commentators see everything, they already know where this is going.

The stronghold isn't very consistent, breaks and holes everywhere as it intersects with a mineshaft, causing Silverr to struggle slightly making his way around water and non-stronghold passages until he eventually follows a spike to the portal room. Without hesitation, he fills in the eyes

and a boom rings out across his world as the End Portal opens. Silverr, already standing in the middle, dissolves into void and is transported into the third and final dimension that Minecraft has to offer. Silverr pearls to one of the back towers in an attempt to zero cycle but falls, flinging out a water bucket to catch himself as he hits the ground. Doogile is in the stronghold as Silverr loads up his crossbow, beginning to shoot the crystals off the rest of the towers. The commentators cry that the end is zeroable, Doogile has a chance to clutch and win this, but that chance never comes.

Doogile is out of blocks. He is unable to tower and create a structure to perch explosives on and is forced to settle for a one-cycle, setting up on the ground, kicking up end stone dust with every tired footstep as both speedrunners impatiently wait for their dragon to perch.

Silverr's, true to form, perches first and his well—timed explosions finish it off before it even has a chance to settle on the end fountain.

September 2023. Season 2 was the first MCSR Ranked Playoffs I watched live. I was still very new to speedrunning; I hadn't recognized most of the names on the roster, or understood the technical terms on the main broadcast.

But what I did understand was this: Ranked is, in its entirety, a *race*. A race of speedrunners against the clock, against themselves and each other; a race of production to be bigger, better, brighter every season. This tournament, which on paper is contained to insular 1-v-1s, Best of 3s and 5s and 7s - is made up of so much more.

Season 1 left in its wake both a reigning champion in Silverrruns, as well as a new standard to live up to. MCSR Ranked Season 2 was forged in the fire of eager expectations. How would the story continue?

While Silverr prepared to defend his title on the running front, the Ranked team geared up to outdo their own work. Hours of dedication sunk into debugging and seed finding and graphic designing, spent in parallel to practice sessions in bastion maps and zero cycle drills that stretched long into days and nights, all leading up to a breath-held, heart-in-throat, stand-up-and-pace kind of anticipation.

For someone who isn't a technical viewer, I focus more on the player's story and vibe, and I think fincoboy is a player with chaotic nature. He can either perform spectacularly or forfeit on the zero tower, and it wouldn't affect my amusement towards his character. The fincoboy experience is always a roller coaster of emotions. I can not tell you where my excitement comes from - it's just a fianked-specific thing that you catch from talking to other fianked enjoyers.

Maybe I was seeking for contrast, for a new runner with a different vibe, and that was when I stumbled upon Ancobou in his match in Season 2 Quarterfinals against flutomatt, I was rooting for him with the mindset of a gambler because I mainly watched Feinberg back then, and watching Feinberg feels really safe when you know he almost always wins. From Ancoboy, I found this spark with: .iust the right excitement amount of nervousness that made me anticipate and once again brave enough to invest my emotion in a match. - something notoriously unpredictable. In the end, I was not disappointed. Ancoboy won with a beautiful 3-й.

Before writing this, I came to check the VOD for this match and found it to be the only Season 2 match that I have rewatched some time ago. Maybe this is the universe' signal for me to rewatch all of fincoboy's matches.

"It means a hell of a lot to both of these players," is the first thing viewers hear on the final match of the Minecraft Speedrunning Ranked Season 2 Playoffs.

Lowkey, his second playoffs appearance, making it further than ever. Down 3–2 going into seed 6 and winning, now he just needs to win twice in a row. As pointed out by Nerdi, Lowkey is visibly nervous. "Doesn't look quite to what we were seeing earlier." Despite this, Lowkey still takes a lead throughout the match, making it to the end first but bails out of the zero cycle.


Then there's Silver, the winner of the last playoffs who has been in this same position before. Consistently taking a lead throughout every seed, only losing to very minor endgame mistakes. While Lowkey is pulling ahead, the casters are losing hope for Silver. "It might be too little too late," says Feinberg. As all hope is being lost, Silver knows he must hit a zero cycle to win. He enters the end and instantly starts pearling, going to the back towers. Then he sees the tower, with a height of 100. Silver must hit this to win. He's done it hundreds of times in practice, so why couldn't he now?

He throws a great pearl and instantly makes it

to the top of the tower. As he builds up, the dragon comes closer and hits Silver off. He was too slow. Silver opens his inventory for a boat clutch, but fails. "The World if I hit that," he types. Lowkey knows at this point that all he has to do is finish off the dragon, and with that, wins the second season of Minecraft Speedrunning Ranked Playoffs.

This season felt sandy— not just the hot sand under runner's feet whenever they spawned into a shipwreck, buried treasure, or a desert temple, but also how the season stuck in your skin, between the cracks of your memories. How its participants stayed around for many seasons after, the way the first matches had felt soft and smooth: quick 2-0's form the higher seed, one after another knocking out each new participant.

Nevertheless, despite the quick-forming pattern, it couldn't stop the bloodshed and the pain of Beefsalad vs. Anco. A playoffs veteran vs. the new kid. The names of competitors rang through the morning air, each one confidently stepping up to the stage as their seed was called. Familiar faces took their places: Oxidiot, Doogile, Priffie; fierce runners who've been here since the beginning. They knew how to play the game, knew this competition inside and out.

But when seed six was announced, I felt a shift in the air.

An unknown figure stepped into the morning light: a snowman in a striped scarf, eyes full of youth and hunger.

His name was Hackingnoises. A name that doesn't quite roll off the tongue— yet.

And that was the sign:

New blood had entered the scene.

Unfamiliar names echoed one by one through the stadium. Some stepped out with nerves, others with excitement, but their eyes burned with passion and ambition.

Crimson eyes and tie. Seafoam onesie. Pale pink toque. Blue ninja suit. Piglin with a theatre mask. High-tech visor. Blue and pink dog.

BeefSalad. Vstrid. Paplerr. Anjouu. Waluyoshi. Loodlow. Bloonskiller.

Seven more fresh challengers, who clawed through LCQ to stand here, side by side with seasoned veterans.

And when the sixteen runners stood together, it only took one glance to see the shift: half of them were new.

I've seen newcomers rise and fall in an instant. But this wasn't that. This wasn't just a few lucky outliers joining Playoffs for a brief moment.

This was a wave of new blood, here to stay.

They weren't just here to compete. They were here to challenge. To claim the crown. To topple the monopoly that veterans have built over two dominant seasons.

But the crown doesn't fall easily.

As the round of 16 started, the newcomers fell, one by one. Their raw talent wasn't enough against three seasons of experience— just yet. Their blood was still learning to warm up to the cold, to the brutal conditions that defined Playoffs.

And just like that, the wave of new blood fizzled into nothing.

But two drops remained:

Hackingnoises. Eliminated fellow newcomer Vstrid in two matches. The only new autoqualifier in a sea of veterans.

BeefSalad. Knocked out last season's third place winner Ancoboy in a tense back and forth. It wasn't a perfect battle, but he won. The only one from LCQ to make it to the second round.

They were the lifeline, the last hope of new blood in Playoffs. The only ones who could prove that newcomers could not only survive, but thrive.

Season 3 brought the most new competitors to Ranked Playoffs.

For me, this marked the start of something biggera shift in the players and how the game was played. The beginning of a new era.



Defeat. Defeat the golem, the blazes, a skeleton in the stronghold and finally the Dragon itself. Defeat your opponent as Priffin did, perch versus perch ultimately coming down in his favor.

Priffin, the 2 time weeklies winner, being no stranger to the tournament setting. Versus Hackingnoises, the undefeated new arrival to playoffs, winning every seed to make it to Grand finals. Both runners want to take the crown, but only one will prevail.

On the first seed the viewers' hearts are already pumping. Did Priffin really leave the bastion with only 14 ender pearls? As Hackingnoises inches towards Priffin's massive lead, it's very apparent that the new arrival will lose his first seed of his playoffs career, and the 14 pearl play pays off for Priffin.

As seed two is underway, Hackingnoises, desperately running from pigs, digs into "a single naturally generating lava block," as Fulham states in his analysis. This instantly ends all hope, as viewers can only watch in pity as Priffin easily pulls ahead in dominating fashion to take his lead 2–0.

Despite the frustrating death, Hackingnoises does not let this go to his head. This is the Hackingnoises we have seen all tournament. But then, he does the unthinkable. Without realizing, he leaves the fortress with only eleven eyes of ender. What if the portal is a zero eye? We can




only watch, anxiously, as hackingnoises builds his second portal. If this is a zero eye, this can very well be the end of his tourney run. His portal puts him directly into the portal room, and we see the portal has one eye. He ends the seed with a sub 8 minute time and begins a comeback.

Right as we have seen the best of Hackingnoises, he dies again on his way to the bastion, losing everything, including all hope he gained from the previous seed. Priffin uses this to his advantage and easily wins this seed, and only needs one more to be the playoffs season 3 champion.

Watching this final seed was incredibly depressing for everyone. We know that a 3–1 lead is almost impossible to return from. Hackingnoises plays visibly sloppy all seed and Priffin keeps the same pace he has all game. Hackingnoises and viewers can only watch as hope leaves everyone for more seeds, as Priffin wins the final seed and becomes the Minecraft Speedrunning Ranked Season 3 Champion.

BeefSalad vs 7rowl

Third Place Matches always makes me nervous.

The stress I get from watching runners vying for first place doesn't even compare to a FRACTION of the nervousness that stems from watching runners fight tooth and nail for third place. At the end of the day, one runner goes home with prize money. And the other? After Round of 16, Semifinals, Quarterfinals, match after match, giving everything that you got, and now has the taste of the reward – just for it to barely slip through your fingers at the last hurdle. (In my very professional opinion you get money for first or second anyways sooo...)

The stakes are high, tension bubbles and broils beneath the surface. Bursting into fast-paced action and mechanics as the Matches begin.

Some notable "interesting" (<- I jumped out of my chair) moments from the 4 Matches:

 Seed 1: Rowl routes the Stronghold much neater, but dies in the end while Beefsalad has spent the entire time wandering through the hallways of the Stronghold (Rowl 0-1 Beef)



- Seed 2: Rowl dies a horrendous death at fort
 (fall damage via knockback from a blaze), and
 frantically searches for obby from the items
 sprayed all over the floor. Just to find it at
 the edge of a glowstone vein hanging over a
 gigantic lava lake. (Rowl 1–1 Beef)
- Seed 3: Surprise! Your treasure bastion hole has a lava column flowing straight through it— (Rowl 1–2 Beef)
- Seed 4: Very, VERY close endfight. Rowl zero'd while Beef's dragon perched at the SAME TIME. (Rowl 1–3 Beef)

My poor heart can't handle this, man.

March 2024. Season 4's Midseason Showdown was the first of its kind. As the one year anniversary of Playoffs peeked over the horizon, Midseason kept the hype up. With the introduction of the new phase points system for end-of-season placements, consistency became more important than ever.

April 2024. Last Chance Qualifiers rounded out the bracket, and Season 4 Playoffs were scheduled to start the following week with Hinart and Cube1337x as the only first-time players, who entered the bracket via regular season placement and LCQ respectively. The Season 4 lineup set the record for the lowest number of new player debuts in Playoffs history at just two, with 87.5% of the bracket already having at least one prior appearance.

Ranked Playoffs had seen Silverrruns, Lowkey, and Priffin each in the top spot so far — three winners in three seasons. There was no telling who would claim the fourth title.

May 2024. The Round of 16 brought muchanticipated matchups. Hackingnoises beat Silverr out 2–1 and moved on to face the defending champion Priffin. Bigbigmongey bested Doogile in a nail-biting 2–1 bracket upset – another unfortunate start for the player who ended the season ranked first in elo.

July 2024. Season 5's Midseason Showdown saw an incredibly dominant showing from Hackingnoises. Already a familiar face around the Top 12 in regular season, as well as the Top 3 in Playoffs, Hax put on a spectacular performance and ended the day in first place with 171 out of the 200 total possible points. The gap between him and runner-up Doogile was 35 points — over two times the difference between 2nd and 4th place.

flugust 2024. Season 5 Playoffs saw a slight deviation from the typical Round of 16 routine, with the top 8 qualifying players receiving bye rounds while the lowest seeds started the tournament as usual. In keeping with previous format changes like the introduction of phase points in Season 4, these preliminary rounds were increased from Best of 3 to Best of 5, in an effort to reduce the impacts of RNO and to reward consistency early on in the bracket.

Seeds 9–12 faced off against the four LCQ winners for Round 1, with the victors heading to Round 2 against Seeds 5–8. Oxidiot and Dandannyboy had their second early Playoffs throwdown in a row, this time with Oxi coming out on



top with a 3-0. Silverrruns was the only player to emerge from Rounds 1 and 2 with a perfect record, winning 3-0 against both Pulsar32 and Bigbigmongey.

Making it past Round 1 & 2, these 8 runners proved why they deserve a spot in Playoffs – but that's still too many people for a podium.

When people ask about my favourite runners, I would say: Hax and Beef. Which is as Match 1 started I was already dreading this match - one of them would not be trying for a podium at the end of this. That being said, both runners were incredibly fast, their completion times much shorter than during 53 (which I did another piece on), the improvements in raw pace and mechanics slowly pulls the top runners away from people who play Minecraft casually or semi-regularly. To illustrate this better, while watching 53 I sometimes think "Oh I can do that" (my ego...) but definitely not now.

The other thing I do want to mention is the interval videos by speedrunners, from Doog and flutomatt's Guess Who? (with, quite frankly, the best introduction screen of the whole playoffs event) or Silverr and Hax's word game. For the people who don't quite understand how playoffs work, it's a nice and relaxing break, and they can join in on the fun. This entertaining section isn't only for one part of the audience though, many of us in the audience get to see how runners think and act on information, and gives the viewers a fun way of learning about who the runners are without them having to talk to the audience.

Semis are actually kinda chill.

You know, even if you lose the match you're on, you still have a chance for a podium finish, even if it means having to ultra lock in for that third place. But if the runner you're supporting makes it to Semis, you can sit back and relax, truly enjoy the gameplay instead of being nervous about losing. At least, that's how I see it. The true stress only sets in after the runner you're supporting has to play the third place match and you realise, "oh *vulgar word* my runner might end up being the only 1 out of the 4 to not get on the podium"...

That being said, these 2 Semifinal matches are nothing short of breathtaking. The roster is incredibly highly skilled and the proven cream-of-the-crop (la crème de la crème if you're fancy). In the Hax vs finco match, both of them were very close to each other, trading splits like it's the stock market on seed 2, 3, and 4. find in the second Semifinals match, Doog and Rowl, Rowl, who has a RSG PB 30 seconds slower than Doog's, still managed to outpace Doog in seed 1. (Though the relevance and usefulness of the RSG PB time in relation to ranked is not very solid and can be debated. Might also be why they removed it in later seasons).

I was simply left in awe, just by how flawlessly they all performed. Every decision was made in the span of a second, each and every movement matching the pace they played at.


But I knew the excitement wouldn't stop there.

The two of you have made history in an instant.





My whole body wrestled to tamp down the barely





Round of 16

One of the most exciting parts of the Season 7 Ranked Playoffs was the Round of 16. The Round of 16 was exciting because it is made of players who have relentlessly fought for the top spots, whether throughout the season or through the Last Chance Qualifier, allowing for many unique matches.

The first match to take place was Ancoboyy vs. Oxidiot. With both runners having competed in multiple previous Playoffs, it could easily go either way. However, Ancoboyy was able to pull ahead and beat Oxidiot 3–0.

The second match was also between two returning players: 7rowl and Silverrruns. Despite each player participating in all or all but one Playoffs respectively, the two had never played each other. In an exciting four seeds, Silverrruns took the win, beating 7rowl 3-1.

Introducing the first new runner, the third match was between Beefsalad and BadGamer (Jay12310). As both are highly skilled runners, the difference in their Ranked vs RSG playing styles was the main focus. After some very close rounds, BadGamer won 3-1, creating the first upset of the Playoffs.

Having previously played each other in Season 3, this match showed how much each of the runners had improved both personally and against one another. After three very fast runs, Doogile claimed the victory 3–0 without Priffe getting to the End once.



Match 1. The world is a kaleidoscope of colour, lime-dark-bright green and monochrome graphics painting across your vision with light as you watch the Playoffs stream jolt to life on Feinberg's channel. It's a rapid start, and it throws you into the Playoffs spirit without hesitation. You settle down satisfiedly as Doogile's stronghold tutorial begins to play.

Match 2. 7rowl vs silverrruns. It's close. You can't help biting the corner of your mouth as they build their second portals almost precisely simultaneously – one seed runs into the next, and the next into a third, and by the fourth it's still heartwrenchingly tantalizing all the way to the stronghold where Silverr finds the portal room first and hits the zero cycle successfully. 3–1, silverrruns. Hax gives his sleepy fortress tutorial and you can't help but giggle.

Match 3. Jay is a newcomer, Beefsalad has played multiple seasons before. Everyone's predicting that the latter will win – the first seed goes that way, certainly, and after a quick fix of Beefsalad's OBS playing up and the second seed



being replayed you start to realize — the tables are turning. Jay claims his first seed cleanly and safely ahead, barely takes the second one as the two of them both kill the dragon — he wins the match just like that in an instant, making for a spectacular end to the first day as you blink in amazed shock. How.

Match 4. It is a new day now, and you are ready and rearing to watch Infume play Retro. You've barely sat down when you're out of your seat again, heart pounding, veins thrumming with energy. Retro takes the first seed. You can't believe your eyes as Feinberg exclaims into your ears about Infume dying in the second – Retro wins that, too, and as the third seed starts distantly you swear you can hear a snowman yelling as the two of them run. Infume pulls it 2–2. You're stunned into silence when Retro claims the whole match. Playoffs is incredible.

Match 5. You're excited. There have been so many upsets — you wonder if there will be another as Doogile and Priffie load into a beach beside the summer sea. The two of them are at the blaze spawner when it happens — Priffie dies to a blaze, and you're absolutely sure you can hear the snowman screaming as it happens. She dies in lava during the next seed, and falls during the third, and you watch as Doogile takes the sweep. It's walright. Oxi gives her Nether portals tutorial, and Playoffs goes on.



Match 6. Lowkey and Aquacorde. You aren't exactly surprised when Lowkey takes the first seed. He's won Playoffs thrice now, and that seems to prove it — though, when he misplaces obby during his second portal and lengthens Aquacorde's lead during the second seed, they draw even again as 1–1. From there it becomes 2–1 — then 2–2 when Lowkey dies to wither skeletons in the fortress. Eventually, though, he takes the final seed to win the match and progress onwards. It's not unexpected, but you're in awe at how Aquacorde put up a pretty awesome fight. Automatt gives his End fight tutorial. Spectacular.

Match 7. Watching has become a ritual to you by now. Crimson wins the first seed, Mongey the second and third – Crimson pulls it to 2–2 by winning a perch race, and then when Mongey dies having just entered the bastion he has the opportunity to take the match for once and for all. It's another surprise, and it amazes you like any other.

Match 8. Feinberg vs hackingnoises. Hax is just ahead on the first seed, jamming to NewJeans' Cookie as he finishes it in satisfaction — he has a comfortable lead on the second, and as he sits in the End fountain waiting for it to open that's when it happens. You're prepared to see the familiar lettering on your screen spelling out his victory and he —

Places down a respawn anchor and blows



himself up.

You don't think you've ever jolted out of your chair so fast in your life. You and Rekrap both experience something akin to a heart attack. You barely even register the whole experience but sigh in relief when Hax still wins. He loses the next seed to nav, but during the fourth seed he's waiting for perch and Feinberg's hitting the zero and they're neck-on-neck and waiting waiting waiting —

Hax steals the match by hardly any time at all. Your jaw drops as the Season 7 Round of 16 comes to an end, unable to believe what you've just witnessed. Through the fog of seven hours of streamwatching, you just about manage to think —

Playoffs is here, and it's everything.

Lowk3y_ and Hackingnoises. Two of the quickest and most skilled runners, known for their good decision making and incredible movement. Both players have competed in multiple previous Ranked Playoffs, Lowk3y_ winning Seasons 2, 4, and 6, and Hackingnoises placing in second or third in the four he played in There's no question that both players deserve to be in the Season 7 Semifinals competing for the remaining spot in the Grand Finals.

Throughout the pre-match introductions, all their statistics are incredibly impressive and very close in range. From the moment the first seed begins, it is a constant comparison of the smallest details, from taking an extra tick of damage to choosing to return to the first spawner to kill two extra blazes. Multiple times through the first seed the commentators say that watching the two play side by side is like looking at the same screen. In a very close match, the first seed ends with Hackingnoises failing the Zero Cycle, which Lowk3y_completes seconds later.

The second seed follows a similar pattern, with the two runners being so evenly paced that the differences in the smallest decisions stand out. Most notably, Lowk3y_ ate his Enchanted Golden apple in the bastion, allowing Hackingnoises to have



a slight food advantage. In the end, Hackingnoises takes the second seed by doing a tiny bit more damage to the dragon and killing it slightly quicker than Lowk3y_, reminiscent of his match against Feinberg.

In the third seed, Lowk3y_ gained around sixteen second lead due to Hackingnoises messing up his portal, which he was able to maintain and grow through the entire match. Despite beginning on two hearts, Lowk3y_ successfully completed the Zero Cycle before Hackingnoises could begin his.

Just like the third seed, the fourth beings with Lowk3y_ gains a lead when Hackingnoises decides to check the blacksmith's house in the village, which he is able to keep until the End. In an unusual situation, the dragon flies for both runners, and Hackingnoises wins by getting a faster perch.

The fifth and final seed Hackingnoises begins the seed with a slight lead gained from Lowk3y_spending a few extra seconds looking around. However, Lowk3y_ quickly takes it back during the portal build. He is able to keep the lead due to Hackingnoises missing a blaze cycle and struggling to get the last two rods. However, the End yet again proved to be a challenge, the dragon flying for Lowk3y_ and Hackingnoises getting knocked off. The match ends with both players killing the dragon seconds from each other. In five incredible matches, Lowk3y_ takes the win 3-2.



The effort put in by the admins to develop the event to what it is today, truly needs more recognition and support from everyone who plays or watches Playoffs.

Recently, Ranked has gotten a lot more popular. First reaching Rekrap (he brought more attention to the client) and Tubbo, who offered to partly host the Season 7 Playoffs and (finally) a sponsor! Who helped fund the prize pool, alleviating



the burden on Feinberg's bank account. Then Midoffs happened, which added even more fuel to the fire by recruiting a bunch of large content creators and teaching them how to speedrun. The Minecraft Speedrunning Ranked (MCSR) name has blazed across the whole Minecraft space, and I believe this is only the start, and we have just begun to scratch the surface of the true potential of MCSR.

Dear admins and developers - the constructors and cornerstones of Playoffs and this Community:


