South Carolina's annexation laws create our zigzagging boundaries. You might cross Town limits several times during your daily commute.

This guide clarifies what services the Town and other government agencies provide.



Bluffton's History

First settled in the 1820s on a high bluff overlooking the May River, Bluffton began as a one-square-mile village. Landowners, including plantation owners, built homes here to escape inland heat and illnesses during the summer months. Originally called "May River," it was officially renamed "Bluffton" in April 1842.

The South Carolina General Assembly incorporated Bluffton in 1852 (though the Act was repealed in 1860). By 1853, a wharf at the foot of Calhoun Street offered steamboat access to Savannah, Charleston and nearby communities.

On June 4, 1863, Union troops attacked then-abandoned village, which had become a hub for Confederate spies. The "Burning of Bluffton" destroyed nearly two-thirds of the Town, leaving just two churches and 13 residences standing.

Bluffton recovered during Reconstruction. The Gullah Geechee people — descendants of Africans who had been enslaved — influenced the region as they cultivated a distinct culture, creole

language and deep ties to the land. Their traditions, craftsmanship, cuisine and communities shaped Bluffton's identity and continue to define the Lowcountry's cultural fabric today.

Reincorporated in 1903, Bluffton emerged as a regional commercial center. With the 1926 opening of U.S. Highway 17, steamboat service ended and commerce shifted away from the river. Bluffton's population remained small until 1998, when the annexation of parcels of land began expanding the Town's footprint. Today, Bluffton covers more than 54 square miles and blends rich history with planned growth.

For nearly 150 years, Bluffton stayed one square mile in size. The surrounding land tells a different story:





The area was first called May River, then Kirk's Bluff, before becoming Bluffton in 1842 as a compromise between the Kirk and Pope families.

HOW TIMBER SHAPED BLUFFTON'S GROWTH

1937-1941 Large areas around Bluffton became timber farms for paper making.

1993 Del Webb bought 5,100 acres of former timber land to build Sun City.

1994-1995 Sun City opened and brought new growth to the surrounding area.

1998 Bluffton began annexing or adding land to help control development.

1999 International Paper sold 29,264 acres, including the Buckwalter and Palmetto Bluff tracts.

2000-Present Bluffton grew from one to more than 54 square miles.

How Bluffton Grew: From 1 to 54 Square Miles

Our Town's Growth Story

For more than 150 years, Bluffton was just one square mile in size. Today, our Town covers 54 square miles. How did we grow so quickly? The answer starts in the 1990s.

The Turning Point: 1994

In 1994, Del Webb announced plans to build Sun City, a large community that would bring thousands of new homes to our area.

BLUFFTON'S TOWN COUNCIL FACED AN IMPORTANT CHOICE:

Watch growth happen around them

OR

Take an active role in shaping how our area would develop

Council members chose to get involved.

They decided to accept requests from property owners to join the Town (called "annexation"). This allowed Bluffton to guide growth with local rules that protect our natural resources and quality of life.

Understanding Development Agreements

When large areas of undeveloped land join the Town, Bluffton creates a legal contract with the property owner/developer called a "development agreement."

These agreements:

- Spell out exactly how the land will be developed
- Include rules for protecting trees and natural resources
- Plan for parks, roads, neighborhoods and businesses
- Set limits on how many homes and buildings can be built
- Do NOT have specific start or end dates

GROWTH MINDSET



Bluffton is the fifthlargest town in South Carolina by land area. Our Town covers 54 square miles, making it one of the biggest in the state.

Understanding Annexation

What is Annexation?

Annexation is the legal process of adding land to a town or city. The process extends the town's borders to include more property and provide town services to residents in return.

How It Works in Bluffton

- 1. The property owner must submit a petition asking to join Bluffton.
- 2. The property must touch current Town limits by land or water (i.e., contiguous).
- 3. Town Council must vote to approve the request.
- **4.** Once approved, the property becomes part of Bluffton and receives Town services.



By South Carolina law, the Town of Bluffton is prohibited from initiating discussions with property owners about annexation. **The property owners themselves must start the process.**

AMIIN BLUFFTON?

Have you ever wondered why some neighborhoods are not part of the Town of Bluffton?

Bluffton's growth from 1 square mile to 54 square miles happened through annexation, creating a patchwork of Town boundaries.

What the Town Can and Cannot Control

The Town can control:

- Development rules within Town limits
- Standards for protecting trees and natural resources
- Requirements for parks and open spaces
- Design standards for buildings

The Town <u>cannot</u> control:

- When developers choose to build (even after agreements are signed)
- Land outside Town limits
- Market forces that drive growth
- Responsibilities of other agencies (schools, county roads, water service)





Government Structure & Elections

Bluffton uses a "Town Council-Manager" form of government. Here's how it works:

- Town council sets policies and project priorities
- The town manager and staff implement these priorities
- The town manager works together with town staff to manage daily operations

Town Council

Bluffton's Town Council includes the mayor and four council members. All serve four-year terms that overlap. This means not all seats are up for election at the same time.

Town council members are non-partisan and represent all residents. Representation is not divided by wards or districts. Residents vote for each seat on the council, not just for representatives from their neighborhood.

Tip: Think of the town council as the board of directors, and the town manager as the CEO.

Election Calendar

Elections happen every two years in oddnumbered years. They don't happen during national election years.

Town elections follow a regular schedule:

- Elections happen every two years
- Elections take place in odd-numbered years
- Elections are held in November

Council Compensation

Council members receive a salary for their service but do not work "full-time" for the town. The town manager is the full-time employee who oversees daily operations. Salaries help to cover their time and expenses for attending meetings and serving the community.

VOTER REGISTRATION

County Oversight

Beaufort County runs all elections in the county, even for the Town of Bluffton. The Beaufort County Board of Voter Registration and Elections manages voter registration, polling locations and the voting process.

How to Register

Voter enrollment is not automatic. You must register with the County Board of Elections to vote in local, state or federal elections.

Reminder

Polling precincts (voting locations) change based on population changes in the area. It's always a good idea to check your registration and polling location at least two months before an election to ensure your information is up to date.

DID YOU KNOW?

South Carolina is an open primary state. This means you do not declare a political party when you register to vote. During primary elections (the process of selecting candidates), you choose in which party's primary to vote.



Who is Responsible for What? Understanding Local Government Roles







Living in Bluffton means several government agencies work together to provide essential services. Here's a guide to help you know who handles what for residents within Town limits.

Town of Bluffton

- Maintains Town-owned roads, parks, public buildings and public stormwater systems (outside of private neighborhoods)
- Provides police services through Bluffton Police Department
- Controls land use, zoning and development within Town limits
- Contracts with Waste Management for Town resident trash and recycling collection
- Issues building permits, business licenses and enforces Town ordinances
- Hosts Town Council meetings and community events

Bluffton Township Fire District

- Provides fire protection and emergency medical response
- Operates independently from Town and County governments
- Funded through property taxes paid by all district residents

Beaufort County

- Maintains County-owned roads and facilities
- Provides law enforcement outside Town limits through the Sheriff's Office
- Collects property taxes and maintains property records
- Operates public libraries and animal services
- Manages voter registration
- Runs recreation programs and youth sports leagues

Beaufort-Jasper Water and Sewer Authority

- Provides water and sewer services
- Operates water treatment facilities and maintains infrastructure
- Governed by an 11-member board appointed by the Governor

State of South Carolina

- Builds and maintains state roads (SC-46) and highways (US-278)
- Issues drivers' licenses and handles vehicle registrations
- Establishes education standards
- Enforces state laws through SC Highway Patrol

Who Maintains Your Neighborhood?

Understanding POAs in Bluffton

Most Bluffton residents (92%) live in planned communities that are governed by Property or Home Owners Associations (POAs or HOAs). After developers complete construction and transfer control, these associations maintain everything inside neighborhood boundaries.

Large Developments, Multiple Neighborhoods

Major development agreements like Buckwalter and New Riverside function as umbrellas covering multiple neighborhoods. While these communities share the same development agreement, each typically has its own POA with distinct rules and fees.

Responsibilities

POA

- Private roads within neighborhood boundaries
- Sidewalks, streetlights, signage
- Stormwater systems and lagoons
- Parks, trails, pools and clubhouses
- Community landscaping

Town of Bluffton

- Town-owned roads outside planned communities
- Town parks and municipal buildings
- Town-owned stormwater infrastructure
- Police services and public safety programs
- Trash and recycling services

Residents

- Keep storm drains clear of debris
- Never dump yard waste in waterways
- Pick up pet waste to prevent pollution
- Obtain permits before removing trees
- Follow your POA's guidelines

Contacts

Contact your POA first — not the Town — for issues inside your neighborhood (potholes, landscaping, drainage). For broader questions, contact the Town's Growth Management Department.



Bluffton's oldest neighborhoods — the Historic District, Buck Island-Simmonsville and Goethe-Shults communities — were developed before more recent community planning. The Town implements infrastructure projects in these areas, such as sidewalks, sewer connections, drainage and lighting, because there was no planned infrastructure. The other 92% of the Town's neighborhoods benefit from planned infrastructure and POA management.





Street Smarts Who Maintains Bluffton's Roads?

Different agencies maintain roads in and around Town limits. Knowing who's responsible helps direct your concerns to the right place.

Other Road Authorities

Beaufort County:

Roads in unincorporated county areas like Bluffton and Buckwalter Parkways.

South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT):

Major roads like U.S. 278, S.C. 46 (May River Road), Burnt Church Road



A Town road must start, finish and be fully contained within Town limits.

IMPORTANT: GOLF CART LAWS



- Must be registered and insured with SCDMV
- Stay within 4 miles of your home
- Only drive on roads with speed limits of 35 mph or less
- Cannot drive on leisure paths or sidewalks
- Operate only during daylight hours (additional state laws apply for nighttime use)
- Drivers must be at least 16 years old with a valid driver's license

Bluffton Parks

YOU KNOW?



Not every park in Bluffton is owned and operated by the Town. Beaufort County plays an important role in our regional park system, complementing Town parks with additional recreational spaces. The Buckwalter Rec Center, the sports fields at Oscar Frazier Park, the Bluffton pool, the M.C. Riley Sports Complex and the athletic league programs are all managed by Beaufort County Government.

The Bluffton Explorer is a useful interactive map designed for current and potential property owners.

Search any Bluffton address to find out if it's within Town limits, check zoning, view property information, see flood zones and even view your closest park and trash pickup day. Type any Bluffton address into the search box at townofbluffton.us/map.

Building Codes, Permits and Business Licenses

Building Codes & Safety

Bluffton follows strict building rules to keep everyone safe. All construction projects must meet current 2021 International Building Code standards. Before starting any project, residential or commercial, you need proper permits from the Town's Growth Management Department.

Permits

Always assume you need a Town permit for construction and renovation projects. Some examples of projects that typically require permits are:

- Removing or cutting trees larger than 4 inches in diameter
- Building fences, decks, pools or sheds
- · Home renovations
- Re-roofing
- Electrical and plumbing system work
- Installing business identification signs

Permit applications are available online and at Town Hall. The Growth Management Department can help you with requirements — call Town Hall at 843-706-4500.

Business Licenses

- Every business operating within Bluffton must have a valid business license, including rental property owners (short or long term), home-based businesses and mobile vendors.
- Licenses must be renewed yearly by April 30 through the Business License Customer Portal.

DID YOU KNOW? A **municipal building code inspector** works for a local government and ensures construction projects comply with building codes, zoning laws and safety regulations. Their inspections are required for permitting and occupancy approval.



A **private home inspector** is typically hired by a buyer or seller during a real estate transaction to evaluate a home's condition (roof, HVAC, plumbing, etc.) and identify potential issues, but they do not enforce codes or laws.

A municipal building inspector ensures construction meets local codes and safety regulations, while a private home inspector evaluates a home's condition for buyers or sellers but does not enforce building codes.





Bluffton State of Mind

Our community thrives when we all follow these guidelines that protect our natural beauty and respect our neighbors.

Quiet Nights

Help everyone rest easy by keeping noise down between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. Save the lawn mowing, construction work and outdoor gatherings for daylight hours.

Clean Waters Start at Home

Never place yard debris near ditches or storm drains. Proper disposal prevents flooding and protects our waterways.

Trash Tip

Town residents receive Waste Management service as part of Town services. If your neighbor pays for a separate bill for trash/recycling collection, that is an indicator that the property is outside of Town limits.

Waste Management (WM) has a regional office that handles trash and recycling for Bluffton residents. If you need a new cart, you have two easy options:

Property Projects

Before posting signs, removing trees, or making exterior changes (especially in the Historic District), check with Town Hall. Most projects require permits to ensure they align with Bluffton's local ordinances.

Rental Responsibilities

All rental properties must be registered with the Town, whether they're short-term vacation stays or long-term homes.

Safe Cart Travel

Golf carts need proper SCDMV registration, licensed drivers (16+) and operate within 4 miles of home.

Business in Bluffton

Running any business that physically operates in Bluffton — even from home — requires a town business license.

DID YOU KNOW?



Lagoons work hard for us! They are not just neighborhood décor. They are a part of the regional stormwater system that captures rainwater, prevents flooding and filters pollutants before water reaches our rivers. Even the fountains serve a purpose by improving water quality.





Working Together During Storms



The Town of Bluffton works closely with local, county, state and federal agencies to plan for, prepare for and recover from storms. While we coordinate these efforts to protect our community, some aspects of storm response — like evacuation orders, major road closures and utility repairs — are outside the Town's direct control.

Chain of Command During Storms

By understanding this chain of command and knowing what you can control as a resident, we can work together for a safer Bluffton during storm events.

- Governor: Orders mandatory evacuations, which counties and municipalities (towns) follow
- SC Emergency Management Division (SCEMD): Leads and supports local authorities
- Beaufort County Emergency Management Division: Coordinates countywide response
- Bluffton Mayor & Town Council: Issues orders to protect health and property
- Town of Bluffton Emergency Management: Coordinates year-round with other agencies
- Beaufort County School District: Cancels or modifies school schedules

DID YOU KNOW?



Ever wonder why some residents come home right after a mandatory evacuation, while others have to wait? The Beaufort County Sheriff's Office follows a strict protocol called the *Incident Emergency Response and Re-Entry Pass System*. Learn more: bsco.net/re-entry-passes

Stormwater Management: Know Who's Responsible

- About 92% of Bluffton residents live in neighborhoods with Property Owners Associations (POAs)
- POAs are responsible for maintaining stormwater systems within their communities, which includes lagoons, lakes, drainage pipes and storm drains on private property
- The Town can only maintain stormwater systems on Town property or in public rights-of-way

What You Can Do:

- Contact your POA first about neighborhood drainage problems
- Clear leaves and debris from storm drains, and never put vard debris in them
- Make sure gutters and downspouts are clean
- Report flooding in public areas to the Town via SeeClickFix or call 843-706-4500
- Never drive through flooded areas turn around, don't drown

YOU KNOW?



Did you know: Climate models suggest more frequent and heavier future rain events. The Town works to improve public stormwater systems, offers advice to POAs dealing with flooding issues and coordinates with regional partners on watershed solutions.




Trees & Wildlife

Trees in Bluffton

Trees are an important part of Bluffton's beauty. Many areas, like Buckwalter, were once tree farms where paper companies planted rows of pine trees to harvest later.

Bluffton has been a "Tree City USA" community since 2012 — we care about our trees! The Town never removes or cuts trees without careful thought and approval from trained tree experts.



We work to:

- Protect existing trees
- Keep citizens safe
- Strategically plant native species

Native vs. Invasive Trees

Plant These:

- Live oak
- Bald cypress
- Dogwood
- Red maple

Avoid These:

- Bradford pear
- Mimosa
- Chinaberry
- Bamboo



Clemson's Bradford Pear Bounty Program lets you trade invasive trees for native ones. Learn more: clemson.edu/ extension/bradford-pear.



Alligators are most active from April through October, and when temperatures are between 82 and 92 degrees.



Important: You need a Town permit to remove most trees that are 4 inches or wider.

Wildlife Safety

The Lowcountry is home to many wild animals, including alligators. Alligator attacks have been increasing in our area. Be mindful, keep your distance and stay safe.

Stay Safe Around Wildlife

- Never feed wildlife
- Keep pets away from lagoons
- Stay at least 10 feet from the water's edge
- Be extra careful at dawn and dusk

Remember: 92% of Bluffton residents live in planned communities where POAs (Property Owners Associations) manage trees and wildlife in common areas. Always check with them first for issues on shared property.



Hands Off Wildlife!

Never touch injured or orphaned animals. Call the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (S.C. DNR) at 803-734-3886 (weekdays) or 803-955-4000 (after hours).

Bluffton Means Business



Bringing Services Closer to Home

Did you know that about half of Bluffton residents live west of Buckwalter Parkway? Yet, in 2023, this area had less than 20% of the Town's professional services. The Town of Bluffton is working to fix this imbalance with smart planning and financial incentives.

Economic Development Incentive Program (EDIP)

The Town offers grants to businesses that move to Bluffton's fastest-growing areas. This program helps bring services you need — like healthcare, childcare and shopping — closer to where you live. As a bonus, this reduces traffic on busy roads by cutting down on long drives across Town.

The Town of Bluffton offers financial incentives to encourage businesses to locate in its fastest-growing areas, particularly west of Buckwalter Parkway. Eligible businesses must invest at least \$500,000 and operate within target industries such as healthcare, childcare, affordable housing, mixed-use commercial spaces or corporate headquarters.

The program offers significant savings in permit fees, business license fees and other incentives. Call the Don Ryan Center for Innovation, the Town's economic development department, for more information.

THE GOAL? More local jobs, less traffic congestion and better services near your neighborhood.

Don Ryan Center for Innovation

Helping Local Businesses Thrive

The Don Ryan Center provides resources for entrepreneurs, innovators and small business owners. Located in Buckwalter Place, this center helps Bluffton businesses grow through:

- Business advice from experts
- · Co-working space and offices
- Networking events

Coming Soon: New Business Hub

In 2025, Bluffton will open one of three new buildings near the Police Department in Buckwalter Place. The Town's facility includes:

- Commercial space for Bluffton businesses
- A childcare center to support working families
- Flexible spaces tailored to startups and growing enterprises

DID YOU KNOW?



As of 2025, residential build-out is nearing 80% and non-residential build-out is nearing 40%. These percentages compare what is contractually allowed via development agreements and what has been built.





Bluffton doesn't solve big problems alone. From flooding to housing, the Town works with neighbors to tackle shared challenges that cross Town lines. Here's how these partnerships make Bluffton better:

Regional Decision-Making

Southern Lowcountry Regional Board (SoLoCo) This collaborative board brings County and Town leaders together to solve regional puzzles like zoning, housing and job growth. Catch their monthly meetings on the last Tuesday of every month at 10 a.m., alternating between Bluffton and Hardeeville.

Smart Transportation

Lowcountry Area Transportation Study (LATS) This planning organization maps out the future of our roads, transit and walkways. Their decisions shape which projects move forward and when construction begins — helping you get where you need to go.

REMEMBER

The Town of Bluffton only maintains roads that it owns and cannot fix or work on county, state, private or neighborhood roads. If you're unsure who maintains your road, call the Town's Public Services Department.

Cleaner Waterways

Stoney Creek Sewer Project A \$6 million partnership with Beaufort County and Beaufort Jasper Water Sewer Authority is bringing public sewer to the Stoney Creek area, which is outside of Town limits but greatly affects the May River. The payoff? Less pollution flowing into our treasured May River — a win for everyone who enjoys our waterways.

Business Growth

Beaufort County Economic Development Corporation This partnership rolls out the welcome mat for businesses looking to call Bluffton home, offering incentives that create local jobs and strengthen our economy.

Buckwalter Place Commerce Park

A joint venture is creating 50,000 square feet of business space near Bluffton Police Headquarters, with the Don Ryan Center for Innovation anchoring 14,000 square feet as a launchpad for local entrepreneurs.

Housing Solutions

"The May" on May River Road

Town-owned property at 1095 May River Road will soon transform into 12 affordable homes through a publicprivate partnership.

Beaufort Jasper Housing Trust

Eight local governments created this nonprofit to tackle our housing crunch. The Trust builds new affordable homes, revitalizes existing ones and helps qualified residents find housing they can afford. Learn more: bjht.org

Safety Excellence

Bluffton earned the #1 Safest South Carolina City ranking from Safewise.com and Home Security Advisor in 2024.

The Bluffton Police Department (BPD)

BPD became the first law enforcement agency in South Carolina to employ a full-time Community Mental Health Advocate in 2021. This position bridges the gap between policing and mental health services, ensuring residents in crisis receive proper care.

This approach to mental health earned BPD the Municipal Association of South Carolina (MASC) Achievement Award for public safety innovation.

Community Development

Bluffton's investments continue to garner statewide recognition:

- The Neighborhood Assistance Program earned a 2023 MASC Achievement Award for its approach to housing stability. The program provides "safe & dry" repairs for income-qualified residents.
- Wright Family Park earned accolades in 2021, celebrating the Town's vision in creating public waterfront access while preserving a historic structure.
- The restoration of the Garvin-Garvey House in 2018 preserved the only freedman's cottage on the May River, earning five preservation awards.
- The Wharf Street Redevelopment Project demonstrated that affordable housing can be beautiful and centrally located. Southern Living Magazine named it "Best Community Revitalization" project.

Financial Strength

Moody's Investors Service upgraded the Town of Bluffton's bond rating to "Aaa," elevating the Town's credit rating to the highest rating for a municipality. The Town of Bluffton is the fifth municipality in South Carolina to achieve this status — joining Hilton Head Island, Charleston, Mt. Pleasant and Greenville.


Environmental Leadership

As development pressures increase, the Town of Bluffton has established itself as a regional leader in environmental stewardship:

- The Post & Courier highlighted Bluffton as "one of South Carolina's first local governments to adopt wetland regulations."
- The Island Packet recognized Bluffton's "first-of-its-kind local ordinance" to protect wetlands when state and federal regulations do not.

Understanding Bluffton's Boundaries

Have you ever noticed how Bluffton's Town limits create a patchwork pattern? Some neighborhoods are part of Bluffton, while others nearby are not. These unincorporated areas surrounded by Town limits are called "doughnut holes."

Examples include Woodbridge and Sandy Pointe neighborhoods off Buckwalter Parkway.

According to South Carolina law, the Town cannot initiate annexation of a property. Property owners interested in joining Bluffton must start the process by contacting the Town. This annexation law helps to explain why our boundaries zigzag throughout the region.

Remember: If you live in a planned neighborhood, your POA handles road maintenance, storm drainage and common areas within your community. The Town does not maintain these private areas.


