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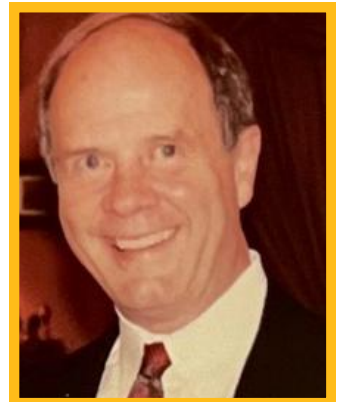

Thank you for being a meaningful part of this story—and for helping ensure it continues to thrive for generations to come.

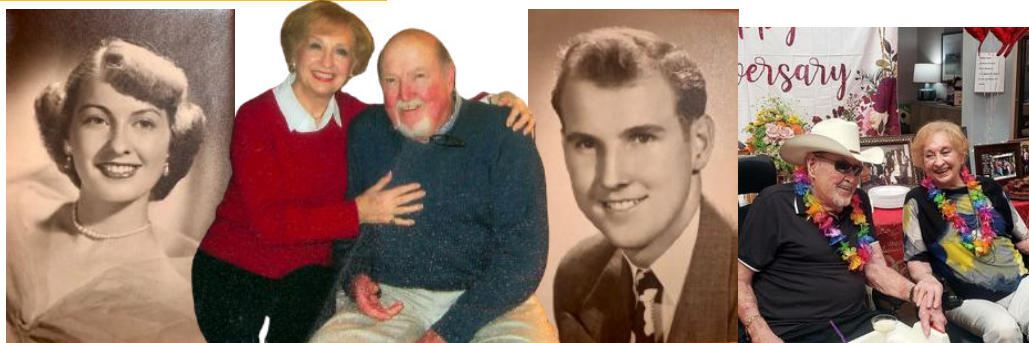

Catherine Baker, daughter of **Robert Baker '77**, married Mason Russell in April 2024 in Dallas.

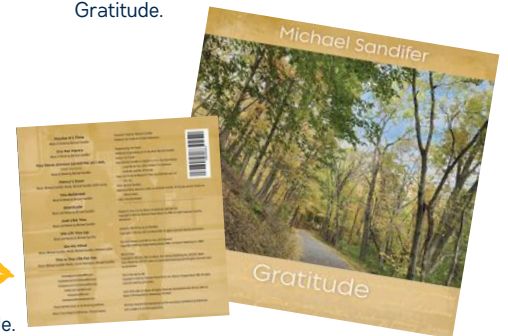

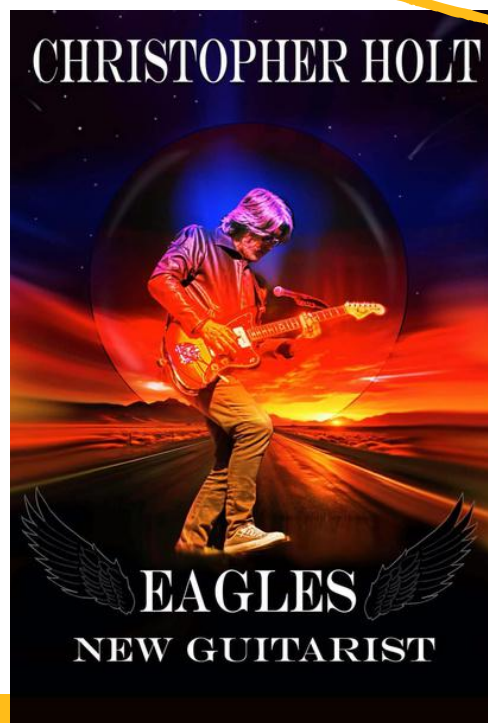


Tommy Keene '98 was recently named Professor of New Testament and Academic Dean of RTS (Reformed Theological Seminary) in Washington and New York City.

Ellen Melson Kershaw '06 served on the Mad for Plaid committee as campus rep for Hyer Elementary.

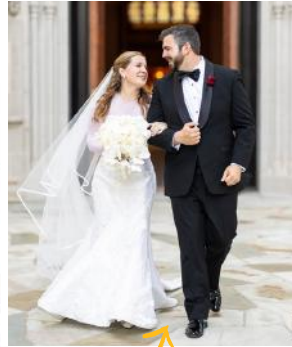

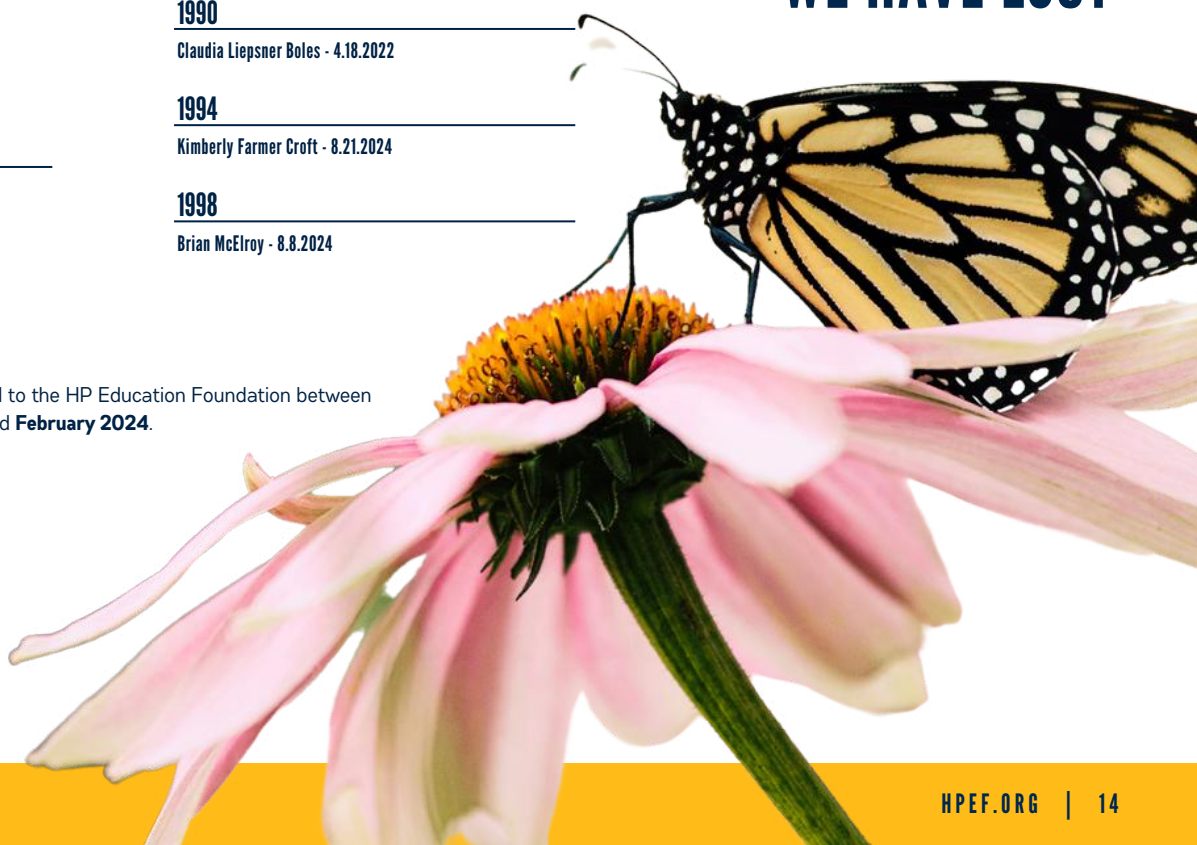

TEACHERS FEEL IMPACT OF GIVING

SALARIES MOVE HIGHER AMONG PEER DISTRICTS

The previous five years have marked a distinct shift in HPISD teacher salaries compared to other districts. HPISD uses publicly available information to track teacher salaries among a peer group of 25 districts in North Texas. The tables here illustrate salaries for teachers with either a master's or bachelor's degree. The columns illustrating years of experience reflect only years working in HPISD.

Going back five years to the 2020-21 school year, nearly every category of teachers, from new hires to 20-year veterans, ranked at the bottom of the peer group. The 2024-25 year ranked nearly opposite, with each group moving toward the top tier. "We are so proud of our teachers," said HPISD Superintendent, Dr. Mike Rockwood. "We have always believed we have the best teachers anywhere, and their compensation should reflect this."

HPISD leaders employed a range of financial tools to make this shift possible, according to

Scott Drillette, the District's chief financial officer. These include a successful 2024 bond election, a Golden Penny election in 2021, and increasing donor support through Mad for Plaid, which directly aids teacher salaries. "Without the support of donors to Mad for Plaid, the most we could have hoped for was to reach the mid-point with our peer districts," said Drillette. "This community doesn't accept average when it comes to education, and we're grateful for the support to elevate teacher salaries into the upper tiers. Now, we need to keep them there."

That feat will be aided significantly by a stronger Tartan Endowment, thanks to the *Lead for Tomorrow* campaign. Publicly launched in August 2023, this campaign aims to add \$40 million to the Tartan Endowment by 2026. The effort is on schedule, with more than \$27 million raised through nearly 188 new endowed funds established by alumni, parents, grandparents, and Park Cities residents who believe in the importance of public education. Most of these

permanent funds are designated by donors to meet the District's greatest needs from year to year.

The endowment is managed by the Highland Park Education Foundation and was started in the 1990s. When *Lead for Tomorrow* was conceived in 2021, the endowment's market value was \$35 million. This is an impressive sum for any public school district, but not enough to meet HPISD's needs, especially with teacher salaries. "Every year, Mad for Plaid felt like an exercise just to keep up," said Michael Denton, Jr. '89, HPEF's board president at the time. "We decided it was time to stop playing defense and start playing offense."

The game plan developed by HPEF's leadership included continuing annual fundraising through Mad for Plaid and conducting a multi-year endowment campaign. "This model works for colleges, universities, and private schools," Denton said. "We believed this community would continue

supporting Mad for Plaid, while also getting behind a long-term solution for HPISD's needs. The community has definitely responded, and you can see the impact on our teachers."

While HPEF manages the endowment and the campaign to strengthen it, an army of volunteers have been the real heroes according to Meg Jones Boyd '96, HPEF's executive director, "Our success would not be possible without the Leadership Committee members, chairs, and honorary chairs." Beyond this formal volunteer group, countless others are helping as well: "So many volunteers have hosted small events for us to help spread the word," she added. "And all the parent-teacher groups for the schools and the Dads Club are supporting this too. It's been incredible to see so many people come forward in support of our schools."

For Superintendent Rockwood, there's relief knowing that the Tartan Endowment will keep growing in the years to come as donors fulfill their pledge commitments. But stronger finances are just one part of the bigger picture: "The donors to the Tartan Endowment have not just helped us address a current priority," he said. "These funds will live on forever and help HPISD achieve in ways we may not even imagine today. That is the greatest accomplishment of this campaign."

CAMPAIGN LEADERS RETURN TO SERVE AGAIN

For the second time, Judy and Jim '53 Gibbs are helping lead an endowment campaign for Highland Park Schools. They are honorary co-chairs of the current *Lead for Tomorrow* campaign, sharing the title with fellow honorary co-chairs Marla and Mike '59 Boone and chairs, Cindy '71 and Guy '71 Kerr.

Their first role came over a quarter-century ago when they were asked to lead the effort as chairs. At the time, what is now known as the Tartan Endowment didn't exist. And compared to the current campaign, it wasn't quite the same experience. "It was difficult," Judy said. "There just wasn't a lot of interest among potential donors in getting an endowment started."

Jim agreed, recalling a conversation with a prominent Highland Park resident whose grandkids were enrolled at the time, "He said he wanted to support HPISD while they were all in school. He didn't see the point of giving to something that would help the schools after his grandkids were gone."

Undeterred by the slow start, they applied their leadership skills gained through decades of service in the community. Judy was the Middle School PTA president in 1984 when she was asked to join the board of the newly-formed Highland Park ISD Education Foundation (HPEF). She was also elected to the HPISD Board of Trustees in 1986 and served nine years before returning to the HPEF board. Jim also actively served, first on the Dads Club for Hyer Elementary and later on the HPEF board. Their sons are also HPHS graduates, Ford '88 and John '90.

The campaign picked up momentum when the Texas legislature implemented a new funding model in 1993. Commonly known as "Robin Hood," this requires a percentage of property



taxes collected by districts with highly-appraised property to be redistributed to those across the state with less. According to Jim, the repercussions were swift when HPISD gave up their first allocation subject to recapture, "I recall they had to cut several programs and fire 30 people. About 20 were teachers and the others were staff and administrators."

That was the catalyst to get the endowment campaign moving, according to Judy, "This community values teachers and education. If people here think their schools are not getting the support they deserve, they come together to do something about it." The campaign continued into the early 2000s, with the endowment growing modestly but not at the pace initially envisioned.

In addition to the Tartan Endowment, Judy & Jim Gibbs support Mad for Plaid, HPEF's annual campaign.

By 2011, the Tartan Endowment comprised nearly 40 funds and reached the original campaign's goal of \$10 million. When *Lead for Tomorrow* quietly began in 2021, there were 50 funds with a market value of \$35 million. In just over four years, campaign donors have added nearly 185 more funds, including one established by Judy and Jim. These new funds have pushed the Tartan Endowment's value to \$58 million (as of March 2025). Plus, there's an additional \$12.2 million coming in documented pledges.

This second go-around as campaign leaders has been especially rewarding to the Gibbs, as more supporters now understand the need for a strong endowment. "The importance of teachers and the long-term solution to offering top pay is the goal of *Lead for Tomorrow*," said Judy. "The Tartan Endowment positively affects the quality of education across all our schools. I can think of nothing more important for the future of our district."

On a recent day, Brittany Cristofoli donned a fake gold crown and a regal cloak, and handed out cups of dried beans to each student in her fifth-grade social studies class at McCulloch Intermediate School (MIS).

"I told them at the end of class that the student with the most beans wins," explained Cristofoli. "Then I started making up arbitrary reasons for a student tax collector to take their beans. At the end, I had two full cups of beans and said, 'I'm King George and I win.'"

And with that, a central theme of the American Revolution, the concept of taxation without representation, crystallized for students.

"I like bringing history to life, making it fun and real to them," Cristofoli said. "I want them to understand that what happened in the past still affects them."

Cristofoli's path to becoming a teacher started with some bumps. As a child, her elementary school, not her home, offered her stability.

"It was my constant, my foundation, my equalizer. No matter the circumstances at home, or school, I could always count on my teachers to be there for me. They poured into me, poured into my education, and most importantly, they believed in me. Their belief gave me hope for a better future, and because of this, I was determined to be a teacher when I grew up."

Cristofoli put herself through undergraduate school and then spent several years teaching at private and public schools before settling into HPISD.

Her life has inspired many who know her story. After Cristofoli shared more about her upbringing and career with a group of hundreds at the Highland Park Education Foundation (HPEF) launch of the *Lead for Tomorrow* endowment campaign, Garry Weber, HPHS Class of '54, was so impressed that he announced an additional \$2 million gift to the campaign, in addition to the \$5 million lead gift he had already generously made, said HPEF Executive Director Meg Jones Boyd.

"During this year at MIS, Cristofoli helped students conquer new areas of learning.

"I encourage civil discourse because a lot of these topics are new to students," said Cristofoli. "So even if we take notes, which is old school, we'll also do partner work and have discussions."

It's important to provide lots of different opportunities for kids with different strengths to shine."

Students dove into exploring the history behind the 13 colonies by creating advertising posters for each colony. Working together, the students researched, planned, and created projects that they shared with the class.

"Teaching is my passion and my classroom is my happy place," Cristofoli said. "Just like my teachers who poured into me, I strive to pour into my students every day. I am living out my childhood dream by building relationships with my students, providing stability when they need it, and being an advocate for all children who enter to learn and go forth to serve."

The winningest active high school football coach in Texas – and second of all time – now coaches on a field named in his honor. Coach Randy Allen has led the Scots to 23 district titles, four state championships, and almost 300 wins.

At an HPISD board meeting last August, Highland Park Education Foundation Board Member Noble Nash '81 announced the naming, to the surprise of Allen and his family. A group of former players, parents, and friends collectively established a new fund in the Tartan Endowment to honor Allen. "I am humbled to have my name on the field where so many great Scots have played," said Coach Allen. "I appreciate everyone who made this possible and allowed me to do what I love. We live in a community of givers, and the *Lead for Tomorrow* endowment campaign is an opportunity for all Scots to give back."

Stephen Jones, an HP parent and chief operating officer and co-owner of the Dallas Cowboys, noted Allen's legacy is about more than football. "We believe that finding these special coaches and teachers, who are the makers of men and women, is unique and special," said Jones.

"Coach Allen's program is much more important than winning a football game or what happens on the field; it is his mentorship. He's involved in making these kids translate their success on the field and into the men they become off the field with his guidance and tutelage." Allen coached Karen and Stephen Jones' son, John Stephen '18.

"We also wanted someone who could teach our players the proper values for both sports and life," remembers Bill Duvall, an HP parent and grandparent, and committee member who hired Allen. "Coach is the utmost gentleman I have ever met," Duvall said. "He's taught these players what they need to win football games, like perseverance and work ethic, but he's also taught them to be honorable, to communicate, to work well with others, and to go on to be leaders in college and their professional lives."

UNIQUE GIFTS HONOR AND REMEMBER LEGACY OF OTHERS

Two groups of HP alumni recently took the initiative to endow new funds in the Tartan Endowment as part of the *Lead for Tomorrow* campaign. The Class of 1984, on the occasion of their 40th reunion, established the Class of 1984 Legacy Fund, making them the first HPHS class to establish an endowed fund. Nearly \$20,000 was raised from more than a dozen '84 alumni.

More than 20 former cross country and track and field athletes donated nearly \$50,000 to establish the Coach Jim Mouser Legacy Fund. Mouser was honored in 2024 with the Distinguished Service Award during the annual Distinguished Alumni Awards. He joined Highland Park in 1967 and served 27 years, leading the boys' and girls' cross country and track and field teams.

Both endowments will generate annual income to be used across HPISD in perpetuity. And both groups selflessly wanted their funds to honor others. The Class of 1984 dedicated theirs to the memory of their 19 classmates who have passed, according to Tommy McBride '84. "We always recognize at our class reunions the classmates who we've lost," McBride said. "Leading up to our 40th, we thought it would be a thoughtful act for our class to create a permanent endowment in their honor."

McBride worked with classmate Emily Christian Lewis '84 on the idea and approached the HP Education Foundation to set up the fund. "Going to Highland Park is more than just four years of high school," McBride said.

"Nearly all of us grew up together and bonded, starting in elementary school through our senior year. Our classmates who have passed left their legacy, and this fund will always be there to honor them."

The idea to honor Coach Mouser with a fund came from his former athletes who attended last year's award ceremony. LuAnne Staley Hobbs '85 was one of them: "He is so deserving of this. He literally shaped our character for a lifetime," Hobbs said. "Now it's fitting that this fund will live on in his name for the benefit of future generations."

Hobbs, who ran cross country and track, said Mouser's coaching philosophy carried over to life after high school for many student-athletes, "He always said running is 99% mental. Whoever wants it is going to win. That turned out to be true for a lot of things in life." She said his commitment to their success always inspired them to do their best. "He treated us like pro athletes. At track meets, we were the only team with a tent in the middle of the field so we could stay out of the sun." He also knew how to motivate. "We didn't practice on Fridays since track meets were on Saturdays. If we practiced hard during the week, he'd reward us on Friday with a gallon of Blue Bell ice cream," Hobbs said. "He knew all our favorite flavors!"

Additional gifts can be made to these Legacy Funds. Other classes and groups are encouraged to create new funds to honor others similar to these examples.

MIS FIFTH AND SIXTH GRADE ROBOTICS

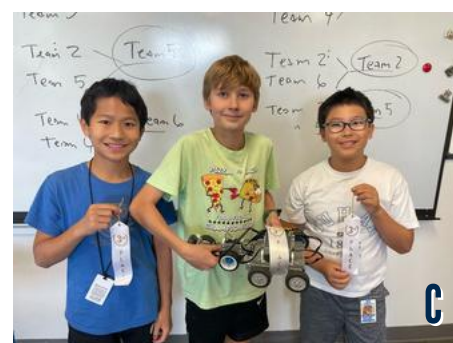

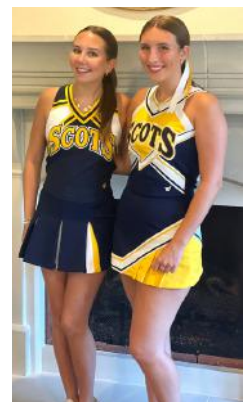
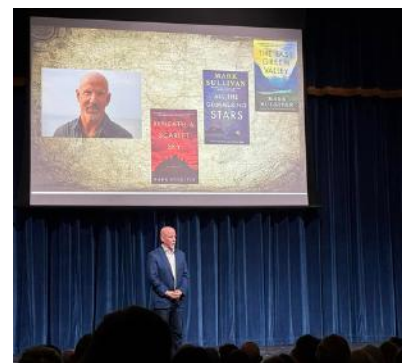


100 YEARS OF HP CHEER

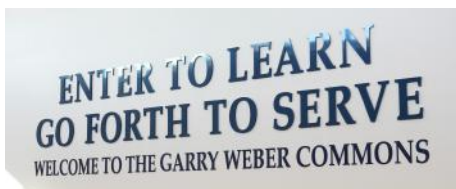
HPISD SUPERINTENDENT CELEBRATES TEACHER & STAFF BIRTHDAYS

PLANNED GIVING EVENT INFORMS AND EXPLORES ALTERNATIVE WAYS TO GIVE

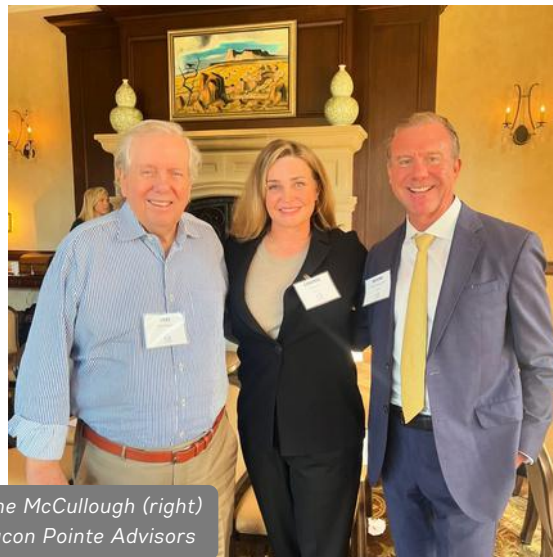

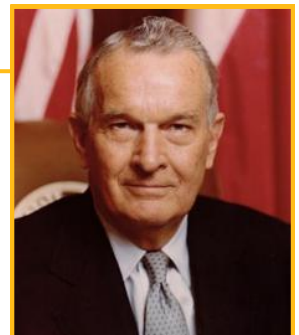
HPEF AND CLEMENTS FUND CELEBRATE TEACHER & STAFF WITH HOLIDAY STIPEND

Legacy Funds are established with gifts totaling **\$15,000 or greater**, paid in either single or multiple payments over a mutually agreed upon time frame. A gift agreement is signed between the donor and Highland Park Education Foundation (HPEF).

LEGACY FUNDS CAN BE:

- gifts of cash
- stock
- other appreciated assets
- and may be pledged over a period of up to three years

THEY MAY ALSO BE:

- donor advised fund
- estate bequest
- charitable gift annuity
- beneficiary designation of a retirement account
- IRA required minimum distributions

HOW ARE LEGACY FUNDS MANAGED AND USED?

Legacy Fund gifts are invested and only a percentage of the annual earnings are expended, allowing the principal to grow and generate larger distributions over time. Donors receive an **annual report** of their fund noting the growth in its market value, amount distributed, and how distributions were utilized.

All grants are reviewed by the executive and planning committees of the HPEF board of directors for approval.

Currently, funds have been established with gifts ranging from \$15,000 to \$7 million.
