Clinton-Massie Local School district derives its name from the county and township in which it was originally located. Formed in 1959, Clinton-Massie was first located in Harveysburg, Ohio and was created out of the public school consolidation efforts in Ohio post-World War II. Clinton-Massie's consolidation joined four schools: Adams Township, North Kingman, Clarksville, & Kingman. The district boundaries overlap Clinton, Warren, & Greene counties. Clinton-Massie Local School district currently serves approximately 1700 students PK-12 on its 74-acre campus located in the rural village of Clarksville, Ohio.

Growth & Achievement

Our growth and achievement is a testament to the dedication of our educators, the support of families, and the hard work of our students.



The Class of 2024 Awards Night showcased an impressive array of scholarship winners, highlighting the academic achievements of students. This year, a total of 29 scholarships were awarded, amounting to over \$60,000 in financial aid for students pursuing higher education.

Notable scholarships included the Governor's Merit Scholarship, which awarded \$20,000 to seven deserving students, including Leah Binau and Brighton Rodman. Other significant awards were the C-M Business Scholarship for \$4,000, won by four students, and the Clinton County Retired Teachers Scholarship, granting \$2,000 to Olivia Roark.

The night also honored outstanding students with various accolades, including academic excellence and leadership. This celebration not only recognized individual achievements but also underscored the district's commitment to supporting students' educational journeys through scholarship opportunities.



Clinton-Massie High School has seen impressive growth in its Sinclair College Credit Plus (CCP) program, which allows students to earn college credits while still in high school. Enrollment in the program has steadily increased from 122 students in the 2019-2020 school year to 144 in 2023-2024.

The credits earned by students have also risen significantly, totaling 1,585 credits in 2019-2020 and increasing to 1,802 in the most recent academic year. This achievement represents a substantial financial benefit for families, with total savings of \$338,776 in tuition costs, which amounted to \$74,035.

The program serves students across various grade levels, with participation rates as follows: 8.4% in 9th grade, 39.3% in 10th grade, 34% in 11th grade, and 18.3% in 12th grade. The academic performance of participants is commendable, with 54.5% earning an A, 24.9% a B, and 8.8% a C, while 4.6% received a D and 6.8% either failed or withdrew.

Course modalities reflect a diverse approach to learning, with 50.4% of classes conducted online, 44.7% taught at the high school by high school teachers, 1.5% by Sinclair faculty on campus, and 3.4% on the Sinclair campus itself.

Overall, the Sinclair College Credit Plus program at Clinton-Massie High School not only enhances students' academic experiences but also prepares them for future educational pursuits while providing significant cost savings for families.



The students shown above participated in a mentoring program for middle school students. They played a crucial role in enabling mentees to tackle their academic challenges effectively. They were dedicated to equipping mentees with valuable time management skills and providing targeted academic support through effective study techniques. This program encouraged collaboration, allowing mentors and mentees to learn from each other and celebrate their successes together.

Visual & Performing

ARTS

Visual and performing arts are essential components of a well-rounded education.



Clinton-Massie School District continues to offer students a rich and comprehensive educational experience.

In the realm of music, the district engages around 160 students annually across various ensembles. The middle school band boasts 95 members, while the high school band comprises 50. The marching band includes 62 participants, alongside the Winter Guard and Winter Percussion ensembles, which have 15 and 16 members, respectively. This past year, the middle school band achieved significant recognition, with three students earning spots in the OMEA District 13 Honor Band and two participating in the Wright State University Junior High Honor Band. The program has a longstanding tradition of excellence, hosting the OMEA District 13 Junior High Solo and Ensemble competition and concluding with a performance at Kings Island. Clinton-Massie uniquely offers winter percussion and winter guard ensembles, which compete throughout the Dayton and Cincinnati regions, garnering numerous awards, including the MEPA A Concert Percussion District Champions title.



Additionally, Clinton-Massie Local Schools offers daily choir classes for grades 6-12, with about 100 students participating across four different choirs. The high school choirs present quarterly concerts throughout the year and perform at various events, including the homecoming game, district-wide holiday assemblies, graduation, and the OMEA Large Group Contest, where they have earned a Superior Rating nine times. Last year, the high school choirs enjoyed caroling in Cape May and attended a musical at La Comedia. The middle school choirs also present quarterly concerts and conclude the school year with a performance on the outdoor stage at Kings Island. Students in grades 7-12 have opportunities to participate in the OMEA Honor Choir and OMEA Solo and Ensemble events, representing the district admirably. Additionally, students in grades 8-12 can join extra-curricular activities such as the show choir and spring musical. The Falconaires show choir annually presents a themed dinner theater featuring food, group performances, and solo/small group acts.

Students have won several awards in competitions. Most recently, Ohio Governor's Youth Art Competition Top 250: Emma Fouch (2024), Vada Nesbit (2023), Adryanne Cortes (2022), Alaina Bayless (2022).

We have also placed in the Congressional District Competition. Emma Fouch 3rd Place (2024), Addie Gibson 3rd Place (2023), Brian Poston 1st Place (2022), Kayla Wilson-People's Choice Award (2022), Alaina Bayless 1st Place (2020), Aidan Wallace 3rd Place (2020), Sarah Karns 1st Place (2018 & 2019)



At the elementary level, around 800 students from Kindergarten through 5th grade participate in a dynamic arts program on a five-week rotation. The district also hosts an annual Fine Arts Festival, themed "Up Up and Away to 180 Great Days," where 4th graders create paper mache hot air balloons. This year, elementary students excelled in the Clinton County Recycle Poster Contest, with three county winners emerging from Clinton-Massie.



The high school art program enrolls 124 students across nine diverse art classes, cultivating award-winning talent. Students have received accolades in the Ohio Governor's Youth Art Competition and the Congressional District Competition. Graduates have gone on to pursue art, design, and photography at prestigious institutions like the University of Cincinnati and SCAD.



Overall, Clinton-Massie School District's dedication to music and arts programs enriches student experiences, fostering a culture of creativity and achievement throughout the community. The high school band had an outstanding year, with students participating in esteemed Honor Bands and earning high ratings at competitions. The jazz band featured in the Rhodes Tower Concert Series and held its second annual "Night of Jazz" concert. Additionally, the marching band has qualified for the OMEA state competition finals for seven consecutive years, achieving a superior rating in 2024.



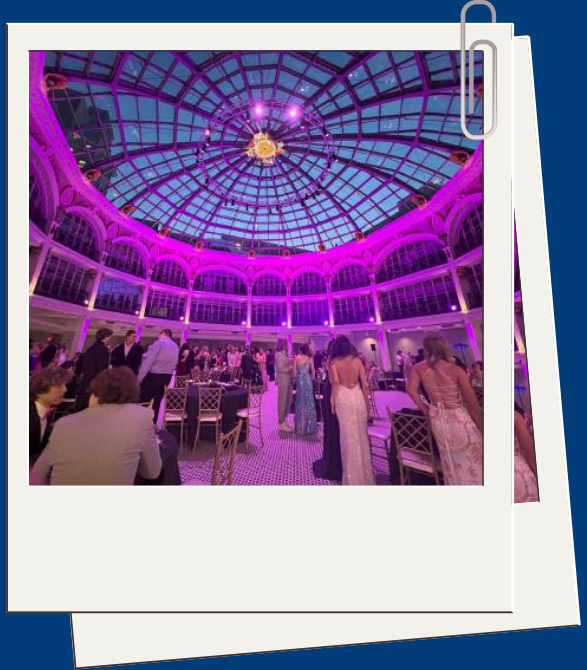

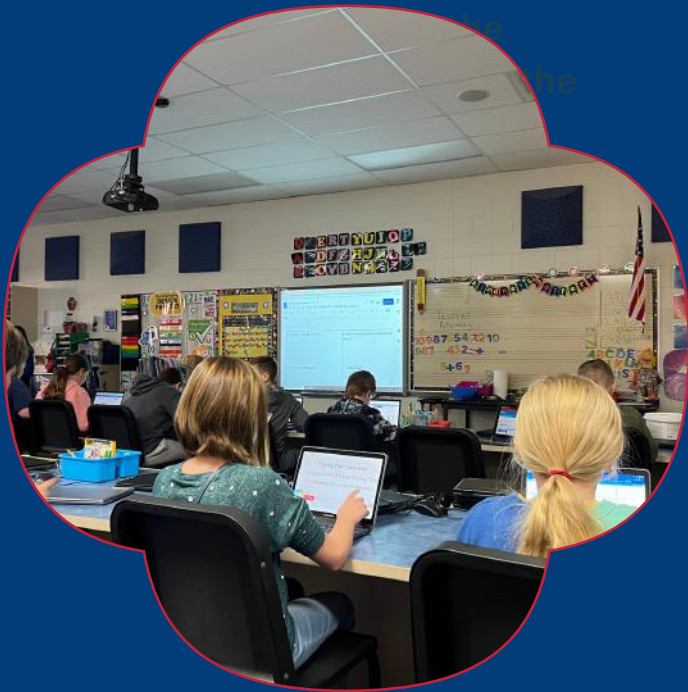

Transportation

We are incredibly grateful for the dedication of our transportation team, who manage 21 routes each week, covering an impressive 11,240 miles. Thanks to their hard work, we transport around 4,430 students inbound weekly. We are especially thankful for the extensive experience of our four drivers, whose combined 114 years of bus driving expertise greatly enhance the reliability and safety of our service.



Technology

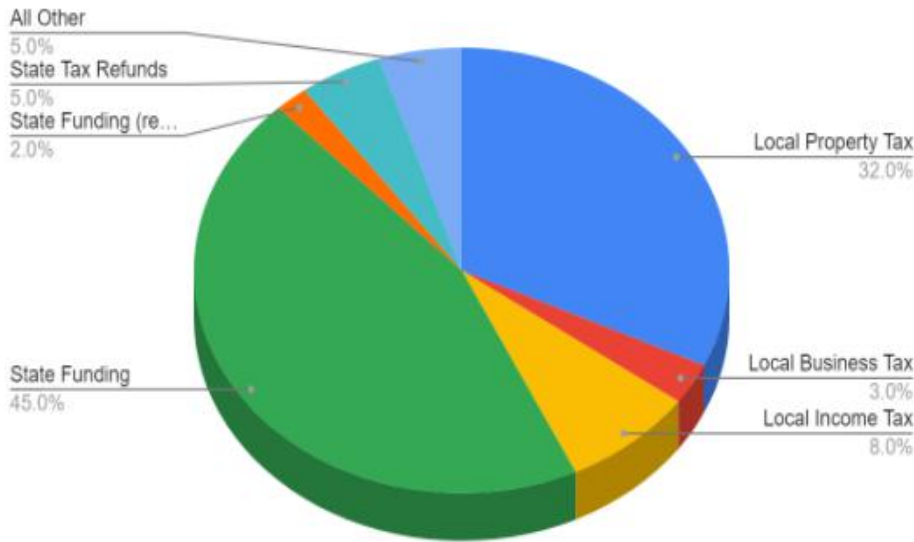
The Technology Department at our school is a dedicated two-man team, supported by interns, committed to ensuring smooth operations across the district. They have closed hundreds of helpdesk tickets while addressing a wide range of technical issues. Since the start of the 2023 school year, they have successfully repaired over 600 Chromebook devices, helping to keep students and staff connected and ready for learning.

Food Services

The Food Service Department at Clinton Massie is made up of a team of food and nutrition professionals that are dedicated to our students' health and well-being. We support learning by promoting healthy habits for lifelong nutrition. We serve over 110,000 lunches and 33,000 breakfast meals each year. We are proud to provide students with access to a variety of affordable and appealing foods that meet the health and nutrition needs of students. School lunch professionals have made huge improvements through the years, with allowing multiple meal choices, depending on the grade levels, and as allowed by the guidelines we follow.

Fiscal Stewardship

Our local property taxes make up 35% of our revenue. Our current 0.5% earned income tax makes up 8% of our revenue. If the 1% earned income tax does not pass in November, we will lose that portion of our revenue. While our two counties have gone through re-appraisal the last two years, we've included those revenue increases in our forecasting due to being at the 20 mill floor for at least a decade.

Our state funding makes up 45% of our revenue. Just 10 years ago, it made up 57% of our revenue. However, even with that difference, the amount we receive has been the same. Although the funding formula changed in 2020-2021, it still does not calculate to more than we've received in the past which is why we say we are "on the guarantee".

We receive some federal funding, but not as much as other Clinton County schools because our free/reduced population is much lower. (Also why we are not eligible for the free lunch program that so many others are.)

We do apply for grants and have fortunately received enough pledged donations to replace our field turf this past summer.



Our expenditures are posted on [Ohio Checkbook](#) each month.

The personnel needed to educate students is our most costly, yet most important, expense! Their salaries and benefits (insurance and required retirement) represent 78% of our expenses. Our average teacher salary and average administrator salary are less than the state average.

Purchased services such as curriculum, insurance (which has increased 25% for our vehicles, 32% for liability, and 43% for our property for this upcoming year), and repairs and maintenance made up 11.5% of our 2023-2024 expenses.

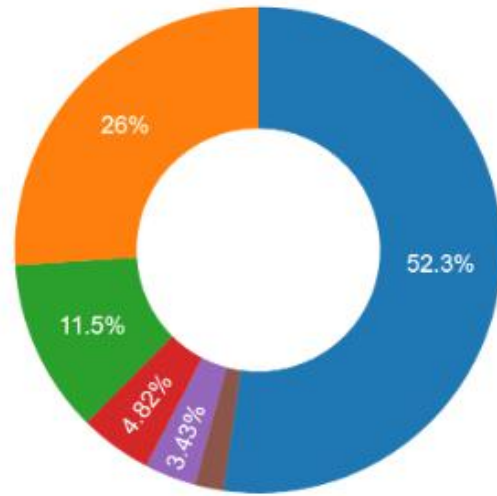
Supplies such as paper, custodial supplies, and made up 4.82% of our expenses.

Capital outlay such as buses and equipment (i.e. HVAC systems) make up 3.43% of our expenses.
