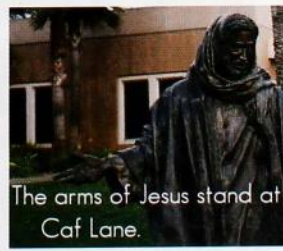

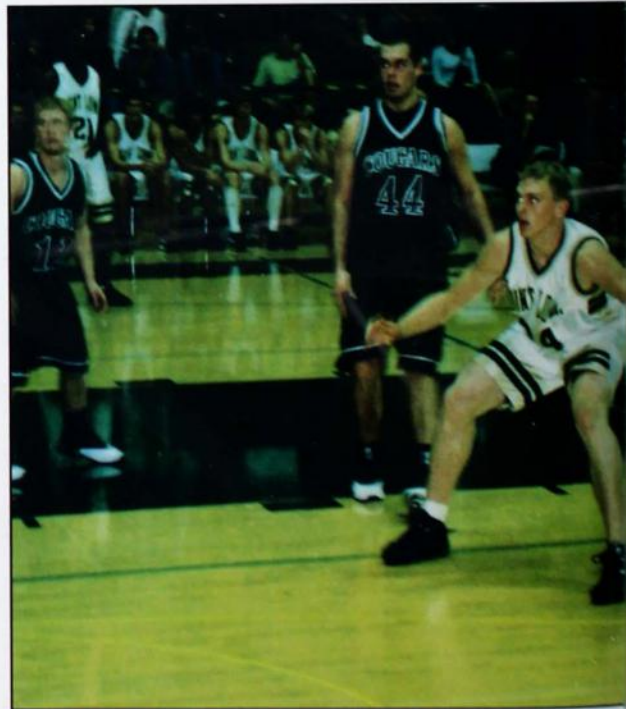

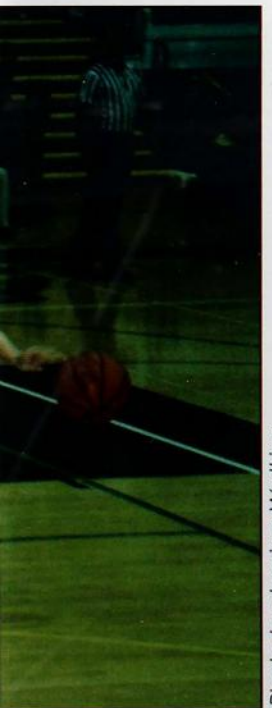

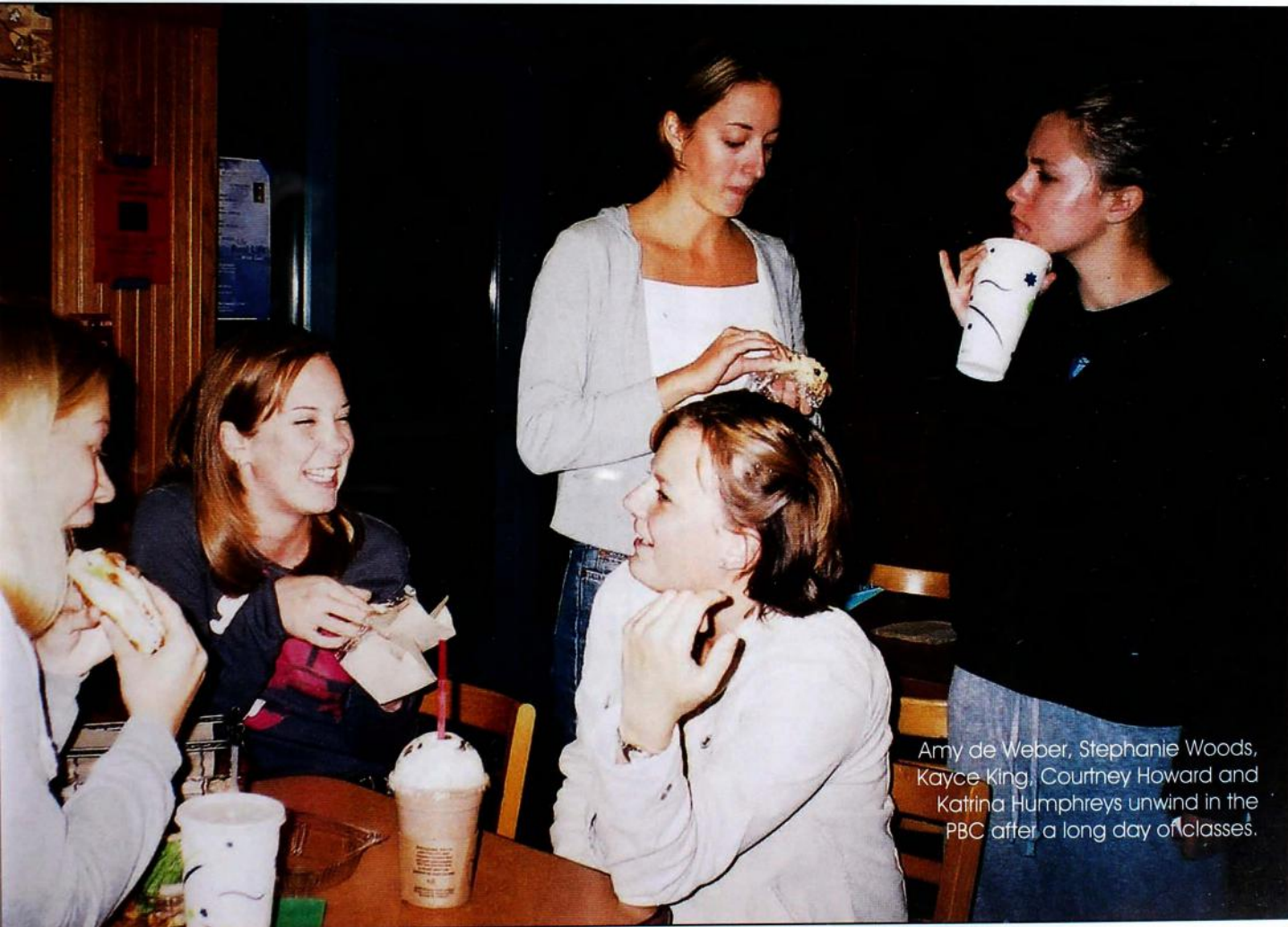

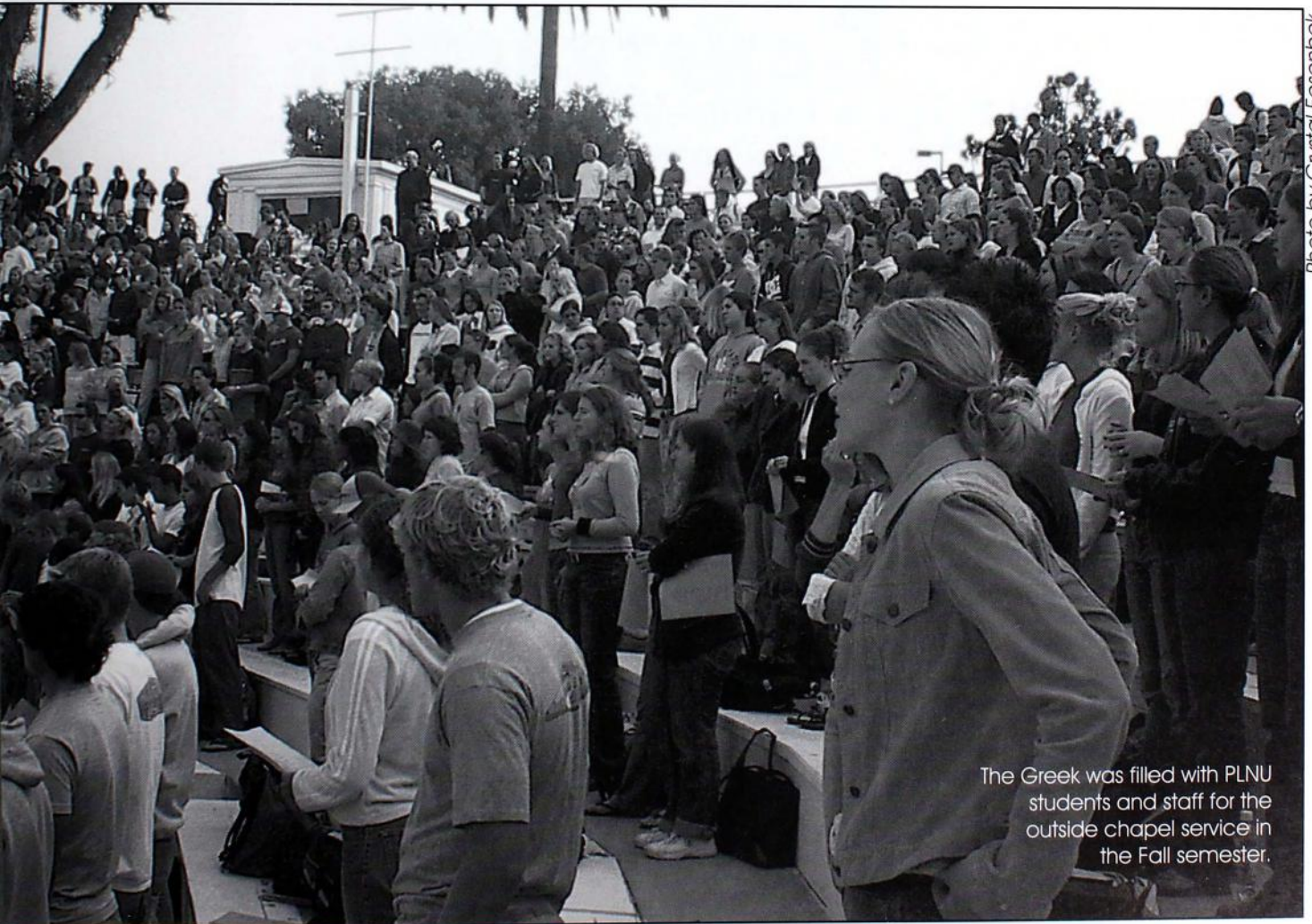

CONSTRUCTION

Nease Hall, Rohr Religion, Administration and Beyond...

Despite the additional spread of parking space near Young Hall, you might have spent more time searching for parking this year than in your classes. The parking on campus has been quite limited due to the construction projects that have been under way.

The heavy equipment is part of construction on plans that will flow into the fall of 2004. The new buildings include: a new 15,000 square-foot building of the department of Accounting and Economics, a new 17,200 square-foot building and a 17,000 square-foot addition to Nease Hall at the north end of campus. The addition to Nease will provide 96 extra beds and promote on-campus living. The goal of the construction is not of expanded enrollment but to increase on-campus living and reduce commuter traffic.

Although the construction goals are to promote on-campus living, the process has disturbed many in flex housing through the year. Senior, Malia Lovell said she never slept in because of the loud construction that took place right outside of her window.

The year has been pretty chaotic with all of the construction taking place, but the university felt that completing all three projects at one time would benefit the university financially. And finishing the projects in a timely manner would benefit the PLNU community by providing more beds and bigger facilities. The freshmen and sophomores have yet a few more additions to look forward to seeing completed on campus. And graduates will have something to look forward to upon returning for Homecoming and class reunions.

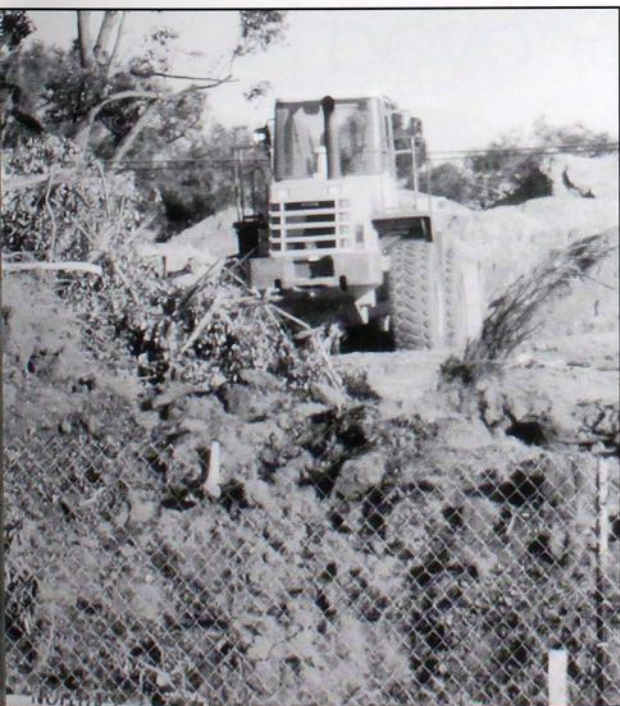

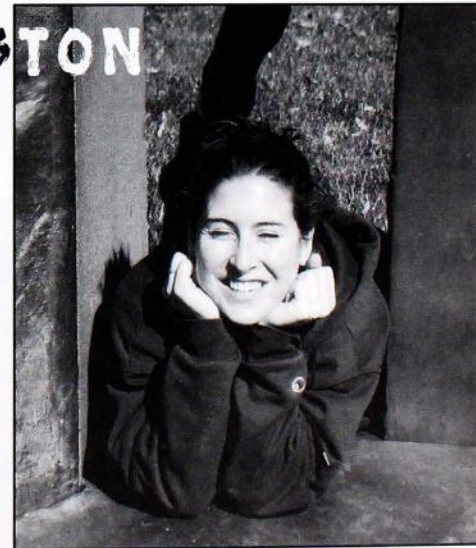
"When something deserves my commitment, it gets all of me without reservation," said Livingston. "I'm all or nothing."

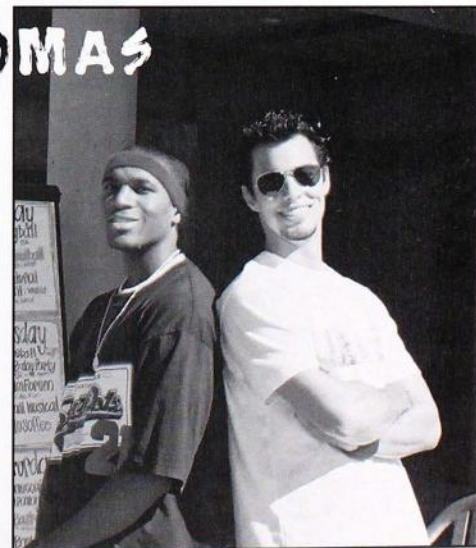
"I've been playing basketball since I was six years old," said Thomas, a point guard for this year's basketball team. "I love playing it because it is fun and challenging."

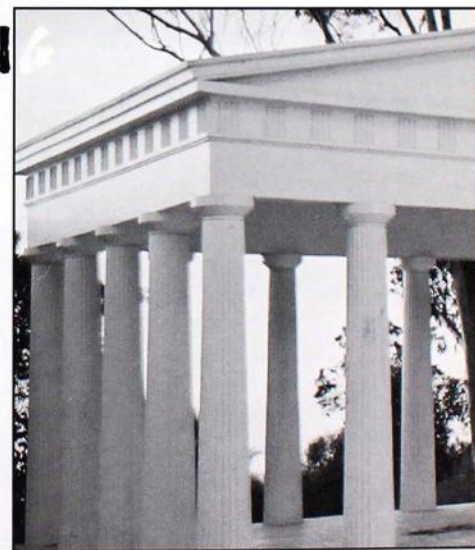
Balancing More Than a Checkbook

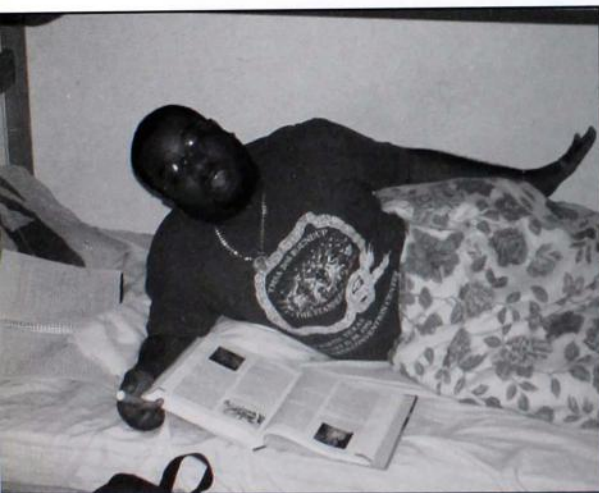

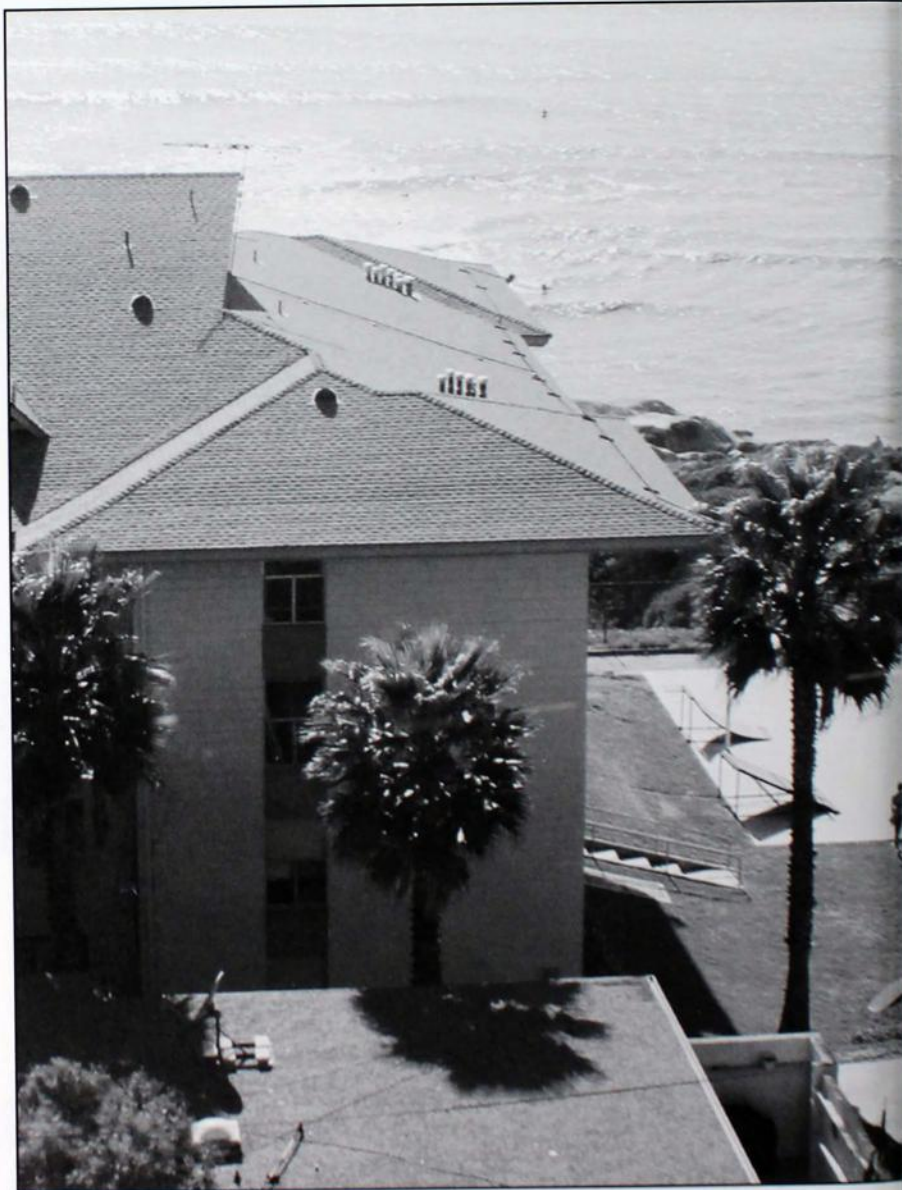

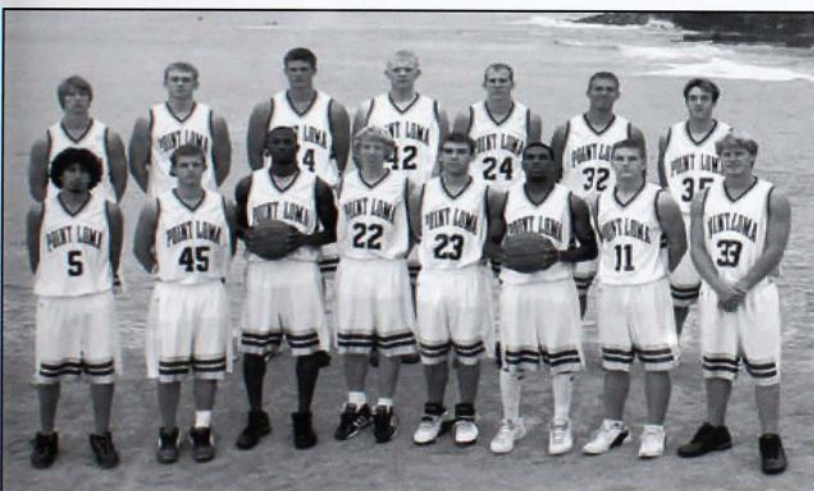

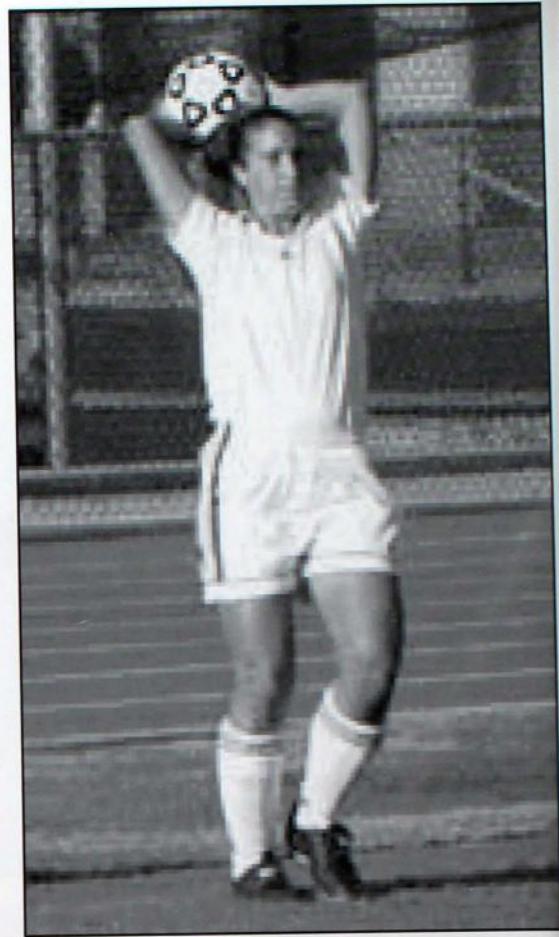

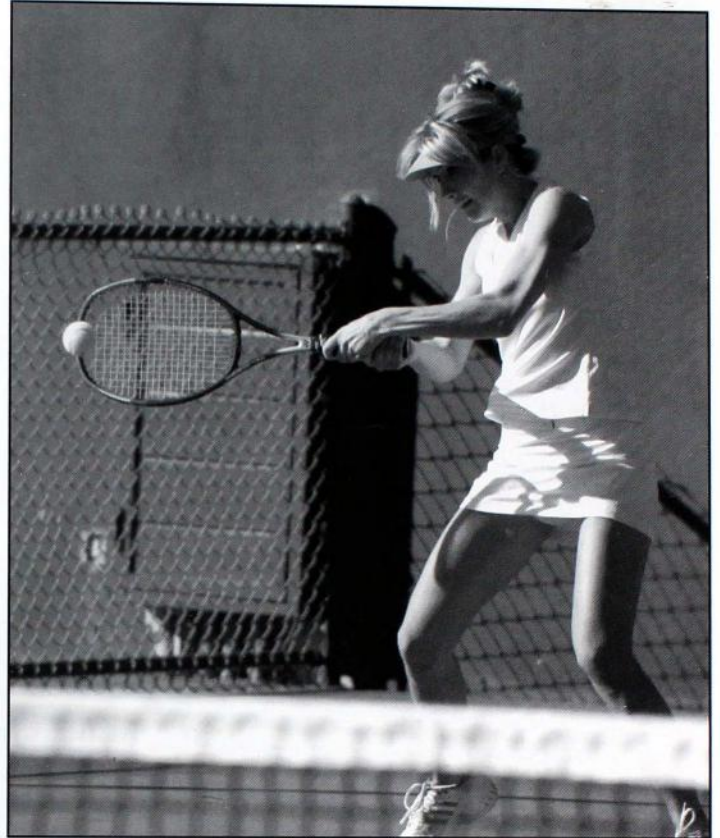

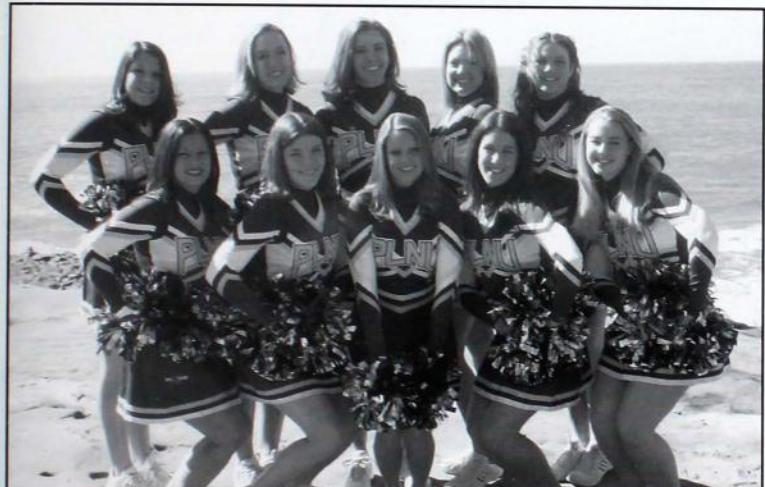

Chapel Bands

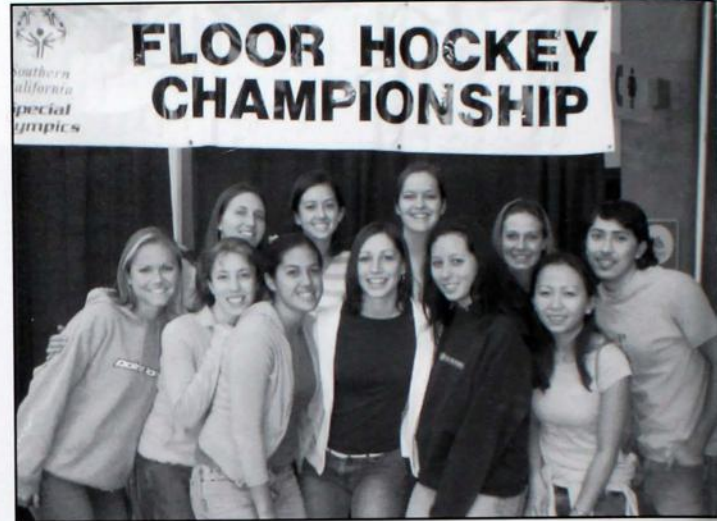
