Baker & Bliss: Glowing and Growing, a dynamic, immersive and interactive glow-in-the-dark installation

Glowing and Growing is a site-responsive, glow-in-the-dark, participatory installation, facilitated by artists Lou Baker and Oly Bliss. It was commissioned by Severn Arts for Worcester's Light Night, February 9th – 15th 2024.



Glowing and Growing visitor numbers:



Glowing and Growing focuses on community engagement and developing strategies for wellbeing and improving mental health.


Research shows that making is good for you; making art with others, working side by side, often enables unexpectedly deep conversation and connection. This in turn helps build communities.



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









Glowing and Growing also highlights issues surrounding textile waste. Most of the materials are second hand and will be reused again and again.



Baker & Bliss are both committed to working towards more sustainable art practices. They're conscious that this art project will, sadly, not make a big difference to the shocking statistics of the disposal of textiles in the UK but hope that it will at least raise awareness of some of the issues.




Baker & Bliss transformed an empty shop in the Crowngate Shopping Centre, Worcester, into a magical, psychedelic, walkthrough space using large neon painted panels made with used domestic textiles, netting, a selection of knitted and stitched sculptures and blacklights.

They were very grateful for all the wonderful support from the Severn Arts team and volunteers.














There was a separate 'making space' with tables and chairs and lots of interesting materials.

Lou and Oly, plus several volunteers, were there to chat and to support and facilitate making.
















Participants made quirky sculptures using unsaleable second-hand clothing and items donated by local charity shops, glow-in-the-dark yarn and threads and lots of imagination!











On the first day, several community and educational groups were invited for bespoke sessions:

A number of these visitors came back again with friends and families.














The space was then open to the public for drop-in making and conversation from Saturday 10^{th -} Tuesday 13th Feb from 10am - 4pm.

Many came back another day, or several times, bringing friends and family.
































And with the addition of each quirky and idiosyncratic sculpture, the installation kept growing!














And some people made pompoms with glow-in-the-dark yarn!





Visitors were also invited to add to the installation by drawing round their hand, using glow-in-the dark pens, on a large wall of cloth.













They could also write their thoughts on a white luggage label, with glow-in-the-dark pens, and tie that to the installation too.




It was as if it became a virtual conversation; visitors read what others before them had written and often responded.





Every addition changed the space in some way; the weight of some of the sculptures changed it physically and everything changed it aesthetically.








It truly was an astonishing glowing and growing community project!

Both artists were also challenging themselves about sustainability in their art practices and were keen to highlight the shocking statistics of textile waste.


In the UK alone, last year, 360,000 tonnes of textile waste was dumped or incinerated. More was exported elsewhere in the world.

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

Too lare in 50 As a result of this trial, in May 2022, they were invited to facilitate a version of *permission to play* for a queer, celebratory Museum at Night event at Bristol Museum, which ran alongside *Grayson Perry's Art Club* exhibition.

They adapted the concept successfully for one night only, taking into account the installation in a listed building and to suit a range of very different audiences. Maybe unsurprisingly, it was a fabulous, buzzing and exuberant evening!







They were also asked to adapt the concept further and delivered a *permission to play* workshop for a day at Strode College, in Somerset, working with about 50 Post-16 art students working at Level 2 & Level 3.





This was very well-received by the students (and staff!) with high levels of enthusiasm and engagement.

Baker & Bliss first devised *Glowing and Growing* for Severn Arts' Light Night. They consider it to be part of the ongoing research and development of the ideas behind *permission to play.*

They are confident that the idea will continue to grow and change - sometimes glowing, and sometimes, maybe not.
