# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

## *In keeping with the developments of recent years, Sacred Heart College commenced its 122nd year in yet another form!*

*“Throughout our rich history we have relocated, restructured, refurbished, rebuilt and renewed practically all there is to renew at some point or other! However, following the formal amalgamation with Marymount College in January this year, we are educating across three campuses.”*  
(Blue & Blue, April 2018)

Well, in our 122nd year, this tradition continues and Sacred Heart College now comprises two campuses: Marcellin (Years 10-12 at Somerton Park) and Champagnat (Years 7 to 9 at Mitchell Park). The extensive building works at Champagnat Campus have been the largest project undertaken at the College, with a final spend of around \$17 Million. The new facilities are stunning, contemporary learning spaces to which our students are adapting and enjoying. We've had literally a few thousand visitors

through, and some works continue and will be completed by the start of Term 3. In case you are wondering, we are looking at an opening and blessing some time in the middle of the year. This completes the amalgamation project for now, with further significant developments planned for 2023/2024.

At Marcellin Campus we have celebrated the fine achievements of our 2018 Laureates with Dux, Jesse Kennedy, achieving the perfect score of 99.95. Tristan Camilleri was in close second with 99.65 and achieving a Governor of South Australia Commendation. More details follow. We have also completed the 'Quad' refurbishment, and, for the first time, the College has equal numbers of girls and boys in the Boarding House - 63 all!

A new Strategic Plan (2019-2021) has been released to coincide with the completion of the Champagnat project

and, in the context of the Sacred Heart College being a dual campus, co-educational Catholic Marist Boarding School from Years 7 to 12. The Strategic Plan is designed to equip the Sacred Heart students with the skills and values to become flourishing learners who will create hope-filled futures for themselves and our community.

So, enjoy the pages which follow and best wishes for another great year ahead!

Congratulations are also extended to the boarding staff for the support and encouragement they give our boarders. Our boarding houses make our College unique amongst other senior secondary schools in South Australia and they are an important part of the fabric of our culture.

## OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO MARIST EDUCATION AWARDS 2018 - MARIST SCHOOLS AUSTRALIA CITATIONS

John's distinguished teaching career was founded in Jesuit Schools in Melbourne, Sydney and Adelaide. Upon settling in Adelaide, John taught in a number of schools before commencing as an English teacher in 2002 at Sacred Heart College Senior. John's students across his teaching areas of English, Religion Studies, Classical Studies and History were often in awe of John's breadth and depth of subject knowledge and his genuine concern for them. His demands of his students were that anything less than their best was not good enough and a wasted opportunity to grow as young women and men.

John's forte is debating. He is in his element when preparing, coaching and coaxing his teams to several South Australian Championships. Sacred Heart now hosts the annual SA Debating Awards ceremony, with the Governor being the Patron, due largely to John's involvement.

John's mutual and pastoral support to his colleagues is also highly regarded. John was a presence across numerous facets of College life beyond his classes and his beloved debating. Whether it was Drama Productions, Liturgies, Musicals, Football or the Annual Exchange with Assumption Kilmore, John was there affirming and encouraging the students and his colleagues.

John allegedly retired at the end of 2017 but continues to be involved across the College by way of proof-reading various publications and the students' reports – not a highly sought after role! John also supervises students' library study after hours each Wednesday evening.

All of the above speaks to John's vocation as a fine Catholic educator whose expertise, considerable acumen and authentic presence to others is outstandingly Marist by nature!

Shana was seconded by Catholic Education South Australia to be Principal of Marymount College for Term 1, 2017, as it transitioned in Term 2 of that year to the Principalship of Sacred Heart College. This was to be a significant component of the amalgamation of the two Colleges. For decades, discussions were had about the optimal structure and governance of what was known as the 'Tri-Schools' (Sacred Heart Middle, Sacred Heart Senior and Marymount). Shana was chosen to lead Marymount into the amalgamation which would finalise the amalgamation of the 'Tri-schools' and form Sacred Heart College.

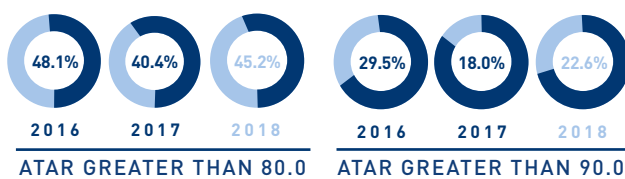
Within a short period of time, Shana had earned the respect of staff at Marymount and had directed their energies into three significant projects: Visible Learning, Positive Education and the Marist ethos. She built the capacity of the team around her, invited and cajoled her principal colleagues from across the region to also adopt Visible Learning and Positive Education, to the point that 10 schools are now engaged in these projects.

At the conclusion of 2017, Shana agreed to continue on secondment, this time at the behest of Sacred Heart, to be the Assistant to the Principal – Champagnat Project. During this year, Shana has led a team, including the Principal, Deputy and Head of Champagnat, in designing by collaboration with the staff and parents the learning, pastoral, spiritual and operational frameworks of the 'new campus' amidst the largest building project undertaken at Mitchell Park!

Talk about a Marian presence and a love of work!

Needless to say, Shana has earned the deep respect of the Sacred Heart and Marymount communities and we are delighted that Shana will commence as Deputy Principal of the College in 2019!

# 2018 YEAR 12 SUCCESS



We are delighted to report that our Year 12 students achieved excellent results, both in the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and with their Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

Learning and achievement continue to be promoted as a top priority in the College. We are confident that our graduating students are well equipped as independent learners and well-rounded young adults to take on the challenges that exist beyond Sacred Heart in the years ahead.

## SACE 2018

For the third consecutive year, 100% of the eligible Year 12 students enrolled at Sacred Heart College (306 students) successfully completed their SACE. This accounts for 1004 successful students in the past 3 years.

## ATAR 2018

The Year 12 students of 2018 have performed at an exceptional level, with 59 students achieving an ATAR over 90 – which places them in the top 10% of students in the State and also situates them in the top 10% of the nation.

5 students secured scores in excess of 99.0 which places them in the top 1% of the SACE group. This is truly outstanding!

Of the 261 students eligible for an ATAR, 22.6% achieved an ATAR over 90. In total, 118 of these students (45.2%) students secured an ATAR in excess of 80, which signifies a commendable level of achievement.

The mix of students continues to be varied, with a number of students studying part-time and/or studying at more than one year level or at University whilst in Year 12. This includes a selection of Year 11 students studying one or more Year 12 20-credit subjects.

- Top of Physics, Specialist Mathematics, Chemistry (Peter Norman prize for Chemistry), Research Project at Sacred Heart for Year 12 and awarded Brother Romulus Award for Academic Excellence for most outstanding/highest academic results for a Year 12 student at Sacred Heart.

- Awarded the Good Samaritan award while at Marymount College in 2012 and 2013 (each class votes for a peer whom they believe best demonstrates the qualities of the Good Samaritan) – demonstrated care and compassion for others, willingness to help others and the respect of my peers.

- In addition, as part of our Stage 2 Physics course, this student completed a Science as a Human Endeavour (SHE) Investigation into “Big Science”. This student decided to look at the interactions between Science and Society at LIGO.

The Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory is a large-scale physics experiment and observatory to detect cosmic gravitational waves and to develop gravitational-wave observations as an astronomical tool. The observatory is based in Louisiana in the USA.

- As part of this student’s research, they organised an hour-long phone interview with Dr Riccardo DeSalvo at California State University. Dr DeSalvo was so impressed by our student that he put her in contact with other academics working with the broader LIGO community around the world.

## GOVERNOR OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA COMMENDATION

I am pleased to announce that Tristan Camilleri has been chosen to receive one of the Governor of South Australia Excellence Awards for 2018.

The Governor of South Australia Excellence Award acknowledges and celebrates overall excellence in the South Australian Certificate of Education. It recognises excellent achievement in Year 12 subjects as well as success in developing the SACE capabilities.

Each school in South Australia was invited to nominate only one student whom they considered would be a most worthy recipient of the award. We nominated Tristan as this student. As well as his outstanding academic results (99.65 ATAR, 3 Merits) he is an elite, nationally ranked racewalker and involved fully with athletics, including the juniors at his club, Coastal.

He also assists with the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Hampers, and is an avid pianist. He was the winner of the Sacred Heart ADF Long Tan Leadership and Teamwork Award this year.

Out of more than 14,500 students who received the SACE in 2018, only a handful have been selected to receive this prestigious award from the Governor of South Australia.

A high-level selection committee consisting of leaders from across the South Australian community, including the Governor of South

Australia, carefully considered all nominations for this award. The selection committee has conveyed to Tristan their recognition of and high regard for his outstanding achievements. In addition, Tristan was personally congratulated by the Chief Executive of the SACE Board, Professor Martin Westwell, in a telephone conversation on the day of the results’ release.

Tristan attended the SACE Merit Ceremony in January where he was presented the award by the Governor.

# JESSE KENNEDY

## DUX OF COLLEGE 2018

Jesse Kennedy reached the pinnacle of academic excellence in her final year of secondary school studies, to be honoured as Dux of Sacred Heart College's graduating group of students from 2018.

Jesse, 18, from Sheidow Park, achieved an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) of 99.95 with exceptional accumulated results from her subjects of Mathematics, Chemistry and Physics along with language studies in Italian. Along the way, she also undertook a Physics study that elevated her onto a global on-line platform.

It followed a succession of distinctions in earlier studies as Jesse progressed through her secondary years at Sacred Heart with a single-minded determination to search for answers to the questions that posed challenges for her studious mind.

Countless hours of study in the relaxing confines of the library, and a powerful commitment to engage with her tutors about the issues with which she sought clarity, delivered Jesse the honour of being the most outstanding graduate in 2018.

In her Physics studies, she also sought direction from the famous Laser Interferometer Gravitational Wave Observatory (LIGO) based in Louisiana in the United States. This led to a long telephone conversation and e-mail engagement with Dr Riccardo DeSalvo, an acclaimed academic in physics and astronomy and a member of LIGO.

"Dr DeSalvo was really keen to help, and he sent me copies of his lectures," Jesse explained. "He also asked me to send him a copy of my assignment about why we need big science projects and how they ultimately benefit humanity."

***"He showed my work to the head of public outreach at LIGO, who decided to publish it on-line, which was quite exciting."***

The 2019 Laureate Assembly celebrated the achievements of Jesse and many other students who had reached their own "personal bests" as Year 12 graduates.

At Marymount College on her progression to Sacred Heart, Jesse was twice chosen by her student peers for the Good Samaritan Award, recognising her passion and willingness to provide care and compassion for others.

And, true to her character, Jesse would not depart from the Laureate Assembly celebration without delivering

inspiring and motivating messages to current and future students of Sacred Heart College and their families.

"If I could share one message to the current students it would be that any one of you could be the one up here delivering a speech like this," she said.

"Year 12 is a trial of perseverance and organisation, which in my opinion naturally flow from motivation. To succeed, you basically need a goal to motivate you.

"This goal can be anything. For example, a particular ATAR, a course you want to get into, or maybe even to deliver this speech. But you must really want to achieve that goal.

"Make the most of all your resources. The two resources I exploited most were the library and my teachers.

"For knowledge-based subjects, make summary notes of everything you have learnt. Weekly revision to reinforce and cement your understanding is crucial. Come test or exam time, you will have everything in the one place, conveniently explained in a way you understand.

***"Be bold and ask big organisations for interviews. It will really help your assignments. You might be surprised by the generosity of people."***

"Follow your passion and the rest will flow through. Do the subjects you love and are genuinely passionate about, not just those that have the greatest scaling effects. Doing the subjects you love at school will also naturally lead to a career you enjoy."

Jesse was awarded two Adelaide University scholarships – a Principal's Scholarship and an Undergraduate Award.

As for tertiary studies, Jesse has selected a Bachelor of Science (Veterinary Bioscience) at the University of Adelaide to pursue her career interest in caring for Australian wildlife.

As she says, a world of opportunity awaits with its challenging twists and turns, but the real destiny for those who recognise their passion and vision is where they belong.

## VINCENT GAUCI COLLEGE CAPTAIN 1961

Born in 1942 as number 13 in a family of 16 children, Vince Gauci may have been considered by some to be destined for an unlucky life.

By his own admission, growing up was tough for the whole family, and at times a battle for survival, with so many dependent on their father's wage as an underground miner in Broken Hill.

But each of the children was afforded a Catholic education, and, while there were no "pennies from heaven" at home, they were happy and contented as a working class family.

Vince was the youngest of nine boys, most of whom became boxing champions of the Marist Brothers College in Broken Hill. He was also an outstanding footballer and cricketer, having to fight for his share of the play against his older brothers.

"Despite our challenging upbringing, we were all encouraged to pursue our individual abilities and potential," he said.

As guest speaker at the Sacred Heart College 2018 Laureate Assembly, Vince reflected on the many challenges he confronted in what has become a life of stellar achievement as one of the nation's leading businessmen and a legend of the mining industry.

The springboard for his success was the opportunity to study at Sacred Heart College, made possible by a scholarship presented by the Marist Brothers in Broken Hill.

***"The Marist Brothers saw something in me that I did not see myself," he admitted.***

Arriving at Sacred Heart in 1960, Vince was immediately recognised for his sporting ability, but also for his work ethic and strength of character – qualities that resulted in him being appointed a prefect in his first year and later becoming school captain.

As captain of the First XVIII football team and the First XI cricket side, playing alongside future Test star David Sincock, Vince honed his leadership skills building confidence to pursue his potential in sport and business.

On his return to the so-called Silver City, Vince became captain-coach of the West Broken Hill Football Club and he was encouraged by several mine managers to study engineering.

"The springboard for all of this was my time at Sacred Heart College," he said. "I feel immensely privileged

to have been educated at this special place and I have wonderful memories of outstanding teachers like Brother Romulus, Brother Columbanus and Brother Austin.

"The Marist Brothers have always been dedicated to a very high level of teaching and the intellectual development of young people.

"I have met some amazing individuals in all walks of life and in many countries around the world. But I say with absolute sincerity that some of the Marist Brothers who taught me at Sacred Heart rank among the most dedicated, generous and amazing people I have met."

Vince's career took him light years ahead of his early days in Broken Hill when it seemed his future most likely was as a tradesman in mining operations.

"I reached a level of education that provided me with admission to tertiary study, thanks to the coaching and mentoring I received at Sacred Heart College," he said.

***"So this place genuinely changed my life."***

From a trainee mining engineer, Vince progressed through a series of management positions in Broken Hill, later forming his own consultancy and becoming Managing Director of Pancontinental Mining Limited.

His steady rise in the corporate sector resulted in his appointment as Managing Director of Mount Isa Mines (MIM), a global mining giant employing thousands of people and contributing billions of dollars to the Australian economy each year.

More recently, Vince has served on a number of public company boards. For the past 18 years, he has been Voluntary Chairman of the Broken Hill Community Foundation and he was honoured in 2008 with the title of Legend of the Mining Industry.

Vince, who has been married to Leonie for 54 years, is the proud father of two daughters and three grandchildren.

And when it comes to Sacred Heart College, where he has been inducted as a Hall of Fame member, his pride has no boundaries. "I am so excited to be able to speak at the Laureate Assembly and to witness the energy, maturity and scholastic ability of the graduating students," he said.

"My advice to you is simple. You, too, have been privileged to be educated here, and I encourage each of you to grasp the opportunities before you with both hands and, like me, you will be repaid a hundred fold."

# THE MARYMOUNT STORY



*As the Marymount journey draws to a close, we share the memories and stories that the last 62 years have brought to the Marymount community.*

2018 was a significant year in the Marymount Story. We said goodbye to our Hove site and an education that has been solely for girls. We remembered, with gratitude the Good Samaritan Sisters who founded Marymount College and guided us on our way. We have been nourished by the charism of their Order for the last 62 years, and inspired to show compassion, hospitality, stewardship and reconciliation. It was in this spirit that the Sisters established Marymount College, which first opened its doors to students from families in the new housing development of Seacombe Gardens and surrounding areas on February 7, 1956.

The first intake saw 7 students enrolled. This later increased to 15, and by the end of 1957 there were 51 pupils. The Sisters worked tirelessly, with great energy and zeal and with limited resources, trusting the providence of God and the generosity of the community. They bought the rich Benedictine heritage to create a welcoming community, a place of belonging, hospitality, compassion and stewardship in the rapidly growing local community.

We welcomed Old Scholars and past Staff members back to reminisce and share stories of their time at Marymount. For many, it was a chance to reconnect

with old friends and teachers, whom they had not seen for quite some time. The evening saw the launch of our 'Marymount Story' video. It took us on a trip down memory lane and captured the essence of Marymount so beautifully. Old Scholars, parents and staff members spoke, with fond memories. They shared memories of a good place that has remained close to their hearts. Time was also spent pursuing the memorabilia from the archives, and, most importantly, sharing in a wine or two with friends from years ago. Laughter filled the room as stories of the good old days were shared, and, let me tell you, there was a cheeky story or two. It was a wonderful celebration of Marymount and a fabulous time was had by all.

As the Marymount journey has now come to an end, we give thanks for our rich history and 62 years of Good Samaritan girls' education. We leave Hove with full hearts and wonderful memories.

For the Sacred Heart First XI side, it was an opportunity to go back to back with Marist Carnival victories for the first time since 2004.

Things started well for the group, with a 10 wicket win against our Semi Final opponent from last year, Traralgon. Well done to the Captain Josh Aulert, who was named Player of the Match for his 37 not out and Tom Rooney, who was named Player of the Day with figures of 6/20.

On Day 2, Sacred Heart faced Alice Springs and were again triumphant, chasing the runs set by the opposition with 8 wickets to spare. Well done once again to Josh Aulert, who was named the SHC Player of the Match.

Day 3 saw our First XI face off against Newcastle and this time we batted first and were able to post an imposing total of 4/203, mostly thanks to Captain Josh Aulert, who again led the way with a classy 105\*, which was not only worthy of the Player of the Day award, but was also the first century of the Carnival. SHC would go on to win by 103 runs.



After the Rest Day, we kicked off our Semi Final fixtures and the undefeated SHC side was fixtured to play the second-ranked side in Pool A, Bunbury.

SHC again won the toss and elected to bat first and, thankfully, the runs continued to flow. Jack Ramage earned himself Player of the Match accolades for SHC with 50 runs not out and bowling figures of 2/8. However, the stand-out performance of the day was from Tyreece Conway, who scored 108 runs to guide SHC to a comfortable 207 run victory as SHC posted 5/313 and dismissed Bunbury for 106. Another great team performance.

The Grand Final fixture was between Sacred Heart and Newcastle on the Main Oval after Newcastle managed to defeat Canberra on the last ball of the match in the Semi-Final. Canberra were undefeated up until this point and had yet to be challenged by an opposition side, so this was a fantastic achievement by Newcastle in only their second year in the competition.

Marcellin’s vision over 200 years ago still inspires our solidarity mission in the Asia-Pacific each year. In 2018, 33 students and 7 staff immersed themselves in Marist communities in Fiji, the Philippines, Sri Lanka and India, to be witness to and support the work of Marist Brothers and lay people in educating the most marginalised. As a College community, we were able to donate over \$37,000 of funds and resources to these communities as well as \$10,000 towards the La Valla School project, the only Cambodian government-approved school providing a full primary education to children with physical disabilities.

While a select group is able to be present in these communities, the fundraising effort is the culmination of our entire community’s outreach. Some of the key fundraising initiatives in 2018 included:

- Stationery drive at Marymount Campus
- Parents and Friends Committee Movie Night
- Sacred Heart College Movie Night

Throughout the year, our team worked extremely hard at various fundraisers including BBQs, food stalls and whole-school events, as well as individually working part-time jobs to help contribute to the pool of money which was distributed between each of the Immersions. Each student collected 10kgs of items including toys, stationery, clothing, books, etc, which were then evenly allocated to each team member, and then given out to families, communities and schools throughout Suva.

We are grateful to be able to provide the children at Champagnat Institute with lunch for an entire year with our donations, as well as funds to upkeep the Brothers residence and Marcellin Primary School. However, no funds or donations will ever have the same impact as giving someone your time and full attention to someone in need.

As a team, we left this experience with a second family, each gaining ten siblings, another two parents, and a huge number of new friends, who we each hold near to our hearts. Being in such close proximity for three whole weeks, we were able to build relationships with fellow students we may otherwise not have. We each took different things out of the trip, depending on our personal experiences, but one thing that will stay with each and every one of us is the saying, "Gratitude changes everything."

After spending 3 weeks in the Philippines, it is safe to say that we left having shared so many incredible memories that have shaped our outlook on life. There were countless highlights on this trip, one of which was spending a couple of days in an indigenous village. It was very secluded and simple, but the people were filled with such happiness and positivity that we could all learn from. We spent the days playing with the children, cooking for the villagers, hiking, farming and playing in the river. The locals generously opened their homes to us, allowing us to sleep overnight and, although they were small, it was such an incredible experience that I'll remember for a long time.

We had only been in the Philippines for a few days and we were about to experience one of our most cherished moments. On our arrival at Magsaysay Memorial College, welcomed with open arms and hearts, the College, students and staff accepted us Australians as their own. The Magsaysay students went first, amazing us with the dances and how perfect and insync their movements were; easy to say, it was embarrassing to go next! The team can all agree that the three weeks we spent together in the Philippines, cut-off from any contact with home, was the most rewarding experience we've had. ## INDIA & SRI LANKA

On the outskirts of the Kalpitiya Community in Sri Lanka, the Marist Brothers have set up a Homework Centre. The 'Outstation' provides a chance for children to receive after-school hour homework care, allowing for tutored help as hundreds of the Kalpitiya community are restricted by minimal resources in their houses to complete their homework. As we visited one of the Outstations in Kalpitiya, there was enormous joy on the faces of the children as we taught them about Australia and as they sang songs about their country and culture. Children in the Outstation didn't take long to welcome us, and we were soon off for a tour of their community, introducing us to their families and extended families, extending their warmest gratitude for our Immersion experience.

We then ventured to Trichy in India's South, where we were fortunate to participate in a solidarity march and shared lunch with families affected by AIDS/HIV on Rainbow Day. We were welcomed warmly, dressed in our Sarees and Lungis, as we performed our dance in front of them and were astounded by the other performers on the day. Sharing lunch with the Rainbow Families allowed each of us to connect and be enlightened. It was followed by a community game of cricket outside the Brothers' residence!

The Marist Brothers of the South Asian Province work in various parts of the communities in both Sri Lanka and India. Within Sri Lanka, Marist Brothers help with the teaching and running of schools, educating the Novices (Brothers in Training) and assisting the communities in any way; particularly by being involved with Marist Solidarity and Marist Mission. In Tamil Nadu, India, they

have established primary, and secondary schools, created an initiative to help support communities affected by HIV/AIDS and promoted the work and religious values of the Marist family.

The funds and donations are impacting on the communities by allowing the brothers to support the kids who have nothing of essentials such as books, pens, pencils and the necessities. They also supports larger capital works, and we were fortunate to see the fruits of three years of Sacred Heart College donations at Marist Primary in PU, Trichy, where our funds paid for the painting and refurbishment of the entire school.

- Ongoing projects where the SHC Foundation can assist the College to prepare for an exciting future.

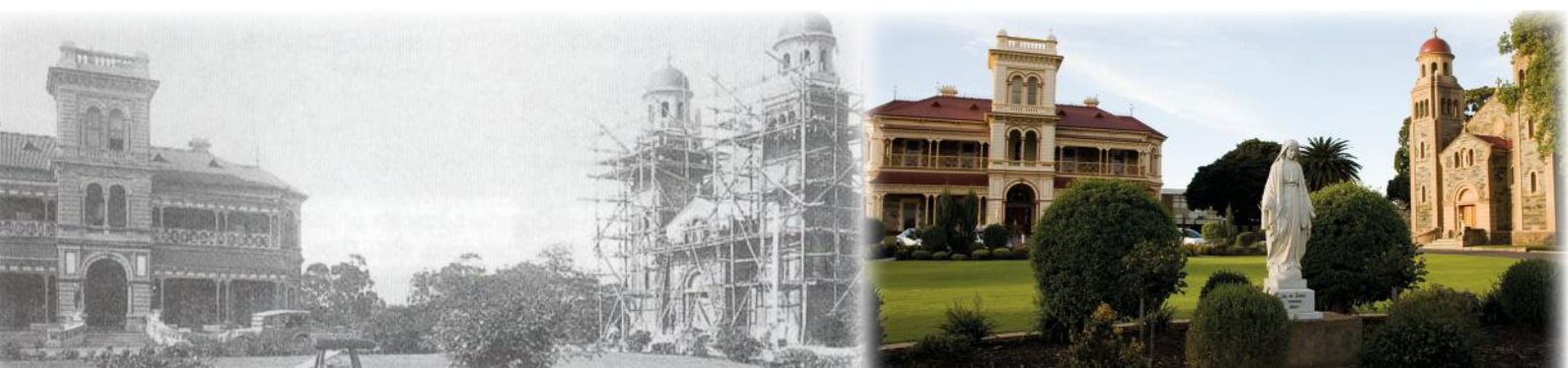
As you can see and appreciate, 2019 promises to be a challenging but incredibly exciting year ahead.

*"It includes a key to the city of Los Angeles!"*

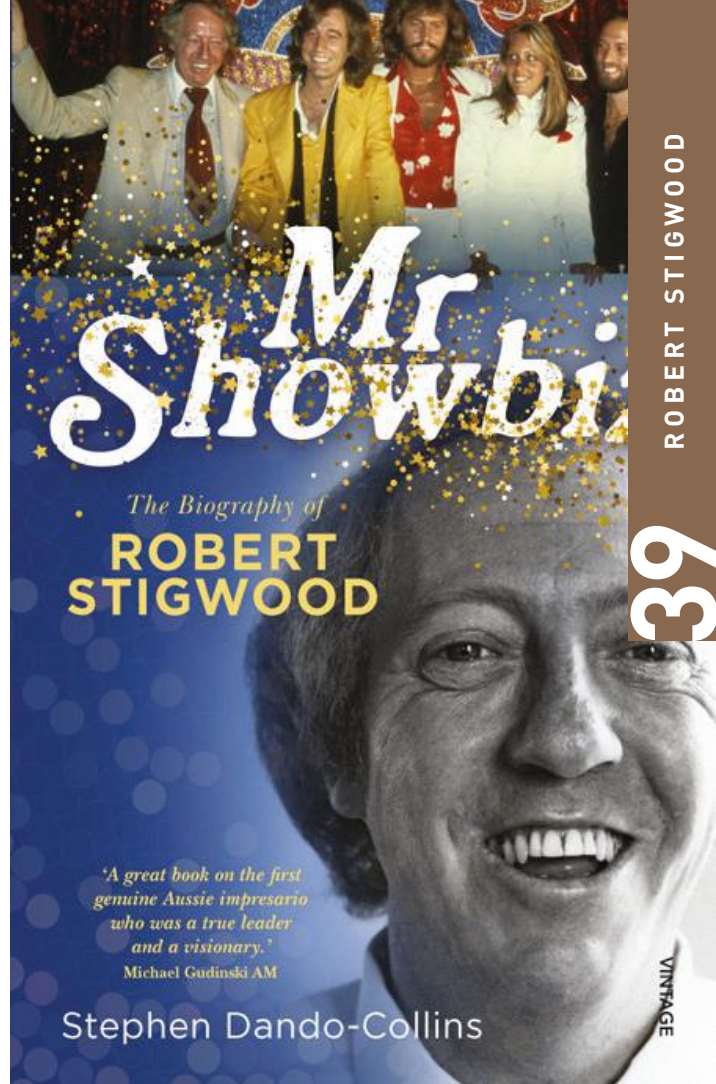

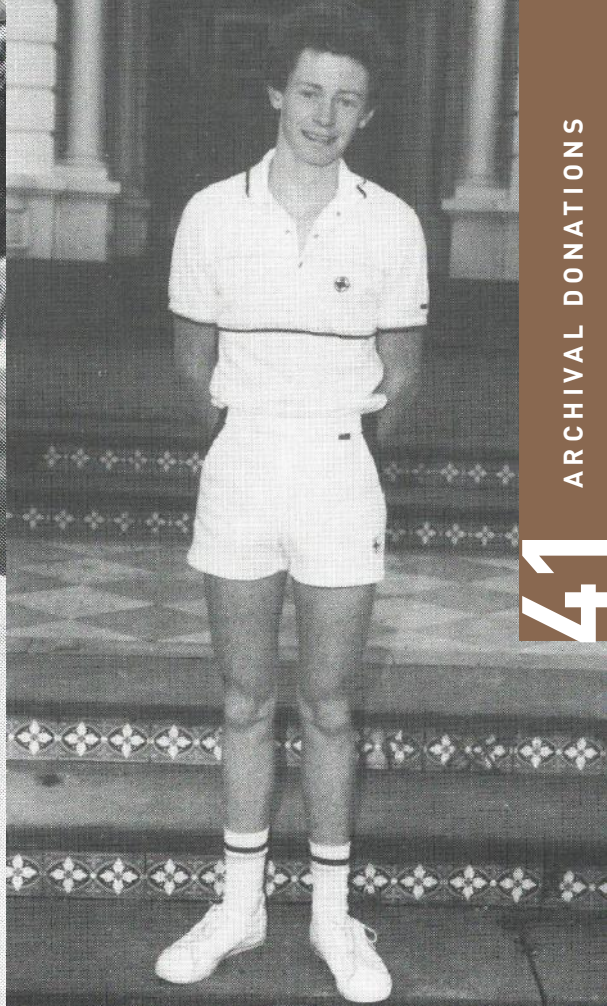

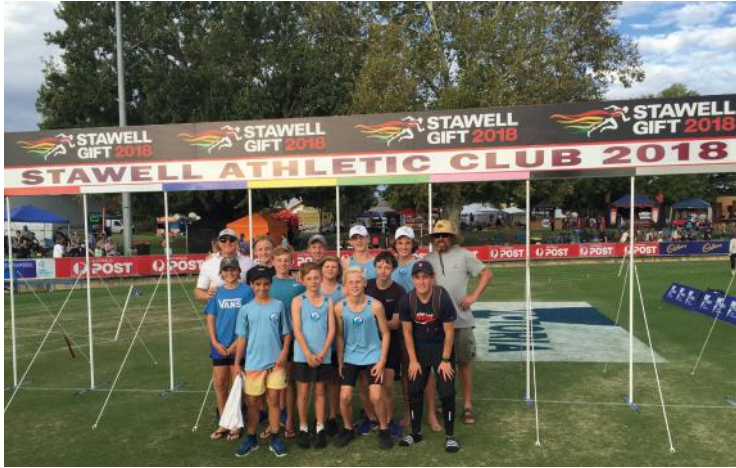

## SHOC IMMERSION

After being inspired by our own Immersion experiences in overseas Marist communities during our time at Sacred Heart College, a group of Old Scholars gathered to create an experience extending beyond the schooling years.

We are proud to officially announce the inaugural Sacred Heart Old Collegians Immersion, travelling to Pailin, Cambodia in January 2020.

Cambodia is a beautiful country, with a rich history, which we will be exploring throughout the Immersion experience.

We will be connecting with an established Marist Brothers Community in Pailin, who are focusing on providing education to students in rural areas.

The Marist Brothers have been working in Pailin for over ten years and have long identified the need to bring educational opportunities to children and youth outside of the provincial capital, Pailin town.

The Pailin Province is a small province in western Cambodia situated on the border with Thailand. Only 5% of Cambodian villages have a secondary school, and nationally, just three out of four children progress to secondary education. These poor transition rates are exacerbated in rural areas as many children cannot afford transport to villages with secondary schools. As a result, they forgo a full education and work for their family at a young age.

Our Immersion experience and fundraising efforts will assist in providing the community with much-needed resources and furniture for their schooling accommodation for rural students.

As old scholars, we believe the global Marist community is a valuable community to connect with. Many students who have been on the Immersion experience in Year 11 would say the same thing. For us, we wanted this experience to be able to extend beyond school and be able to offer this opportunity not only for graduates but parents, friends, anyone connected to the Sacred



Heart Old Scholars community who would want to contribute to this overseas project and continue to learn about the global Marist community.

We are looking for applicants of all ages with a genuine interest in wanting to learn about another culture, the ability to be versatile and are passionate about having an opportunity to give back to a Marist community. Applications for the 2020 SHOC Immersion Team close in April.

## WHERE ARE THEY NOW?



**DR JOSEPH CRAMERI ('79)**

Joe Crameri, a Paediatric Surgeon at Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital, led a team of 18 surgeons, nurses and anaesthetists to separate Bhutanese 15-month-old twin girls, Dawa and Nima Pelden, who were joined at the torso and shared a liver.

The girls went into the operating theatre on November 9, with Dr Crameri predicting their operation was unlikely to be completed by 4pm and could extend into the night.

But by 4pm a press conference was held to discuss the successful operation. "The first thing I'd like to say is through this journey we've learnt that Bhutan is certainly the land of happiness, but I was very pleased to report today it wasn't the land of surprises," Dr Crameri said after the surgery.

"We didn't find any surprises, we knew the liver would be connected, we divided that successfully — the main challenge was getting the abdomen reconstructed."

He congratulated his team, whose hard work "really paid dividends".

"We saw two young girls who were very ready for this surgery, who were able to cope very well with the surgery, and are currently in our recovery doing very well, and we're pleased with that, but that takes a lot of work, and I think they all need to be congratulated," Dr Crameri said.

The twins have made a full recovery and have returned to Bhutan with their mother Bhumchu.



**BRODIE SCAPENS ('17)**

Brodie started his diving career at the age of 12.

Although also a keen footballer, his love extreme sport and 'jetty jumping' led him into diving when the new Aquatic Centre opened at Marion.

Apparently a natural, he moved quickly through the Junior grades to earn himself a spot on the Australian Junior National Squad at 14, where he competed internationally and represented Australia at two Junior World Diving Events competing in Russia and Germany.

The highlight of Brodie's career to date is earning his place on the Senior National Australian Squad and representing Australia at the The Diving World Cup held in China in 2018.

Brodie's talents and dedication have also been rewarded by earning him a four year Sports Scholarship to University of Miami in Florida, where he is studying a Sports Administration degree and hopes to one day run a successful sporting corporation.

### BENSION SIEBERT ('10)

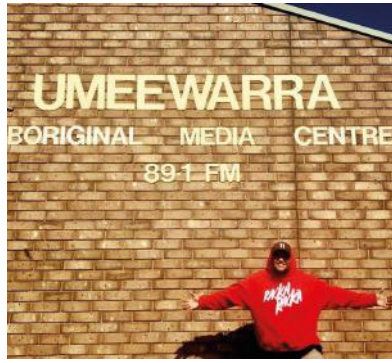

Chris' Videography company, Lifesketch Films placed 3rd in Video Production at the 2018 ABIA SA Awards. It received a 99.66% Rating!

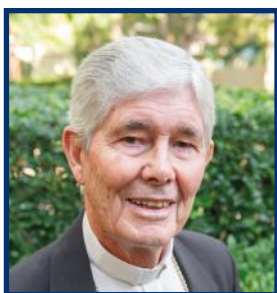
### NATHAN MADELEY ('13)

*MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF AUSTRALIA 2019*

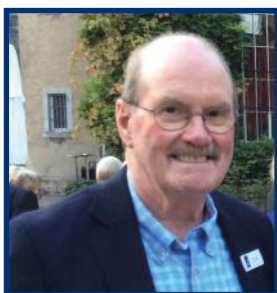

John's outstanding service to the community has included nine years as National Committee member of Caritas Australia and seven years as Caritas diocesan chairman, the St Vincent de Paul Society (chair of the Frederic Ozanam Housing Association since 2012), and parish council member of St Anthony's, Edwardstown. As a member of the Australian Property Institute for 39 years, John's contribution to the institute was invaluable as he was made a Fellow in 1991. His involvement with the Young Christian Workers (YCW) from 1968 - 1971 was a significant aspect of his community service serving as the Brighton Branch President in 1970 and Adelaide Archdiocesan President in 1971.



## CHRISTOPHER PROCTER

1964 - 2018

Christopher collapsed shortly after landing in Sydney after a flight from San Francisco. He suffered a major seizure and never regained consciousness.

Christopher was an outstanding student and athlete in his time at the school. He held more than a dozen school athletics records and numerous state athletics titles.

After leaving Sacred Heart, Christopher was awarded an undergraduate degree in Architecture from the University of South Australia and Masters degree from Harvard.

He specialised in urban design and practiced in Melbourne, Boston and Sydney.

Early in his career, Christopher was a lead urban designer on the Big Dig, the under-grounding of the elevated expressway that cut Boston in two in what was the then-biggest single urban infrastructure project ever undertaken in the USA.

In 1995, Christopher returned home to settle in Sydney. He opened the Sydney office of the Melbourne firm, Bates Smart, and then joined the City of Sydney in 1997. The offer to transform Sydney with the 2000 Olympics looming was irresistible. As Deputy-Director Design, City Projects he worked with an in-house team of 45 people and many young local architectural practices to transform Sydney and set future standards. Good, strong civic design decisions made over 20 years ago are still evident today. Public spaces, buildings, street furniture, paving and street lighting are testament to his clarity of thought and commitment to elevate Sydney's urban conscience.

In late 2000, pondering life post-Olympics, he co-founded Project

an award-winning design practice that won urban-design commissions as far afield as Oman. He also took on important mandates in the reconstruction of Christchurch, following the earthquake that devastated the city.

Christopher is survived by Bridget, his wife of 22 years, and his two sons, Lucien and Sebastien, who are students at Sacred Heart's sister school in Sydney, St Joseph's Hunters Hill. 60 "Joey's boys", classmates of Lucien and Sebastien, formed a choir at a memorial service attended by more than 800.



## MICHAEL NOONAN

*Dad was born in the small village of Batroun, in Lebanon on 25 April. He arrived in Australia on 11 November, and always said that coming to this country was the best thing his parents did for him.*

*He attended Primary School at St. Mary’s, Franklin Street, and then moved onto CBC, Wakefield Street. Dad left school at age 14, to commence working in his father’s Barber Shop, a career he stayed with as a Women’s Hairdresser until the day he retired.*

*Dad was a good sportsman, playing footy, basketball and excelled as a sprinter in Athletics, running long distance races, using the outside lane so he could chat with the girls on the way round.*

*Playing sport ended in his early twenties as he had to work.*

*His involvement in sport did not end there. Dad was a loyal Westies man all of his life, sponsoring the Trabilsie Medal with his brother from 1958 to 1986.*

*His great mate, Tony Welfare, has told you about his involvement with Greyhound Racing. Dad loved a bet on the horses, also, and was pretty good at it.*

*Dad had an incredible empathy for the wider community, especially after he retired, volunteering for Meals on Wheels for 20 years; Minda for 15 years, Hutt Street Centre Kitchen for 20 years; and his dedication to the Mary Potter Hospice for nearly 30 years was unparalleled.*

*One example of his generosity to individuals in need: after Clem, Anne Smith’s husband, had passed away, there was a weekly donation placed*

*in her staff pigeon hole at Sacred Heart College anonymously, but everyone knew it was Connie and Dad. Jim Smith reminded me that it was just one of his many acts towards individuals and charities.*

*Dad had a long-running affiliation with Sacred Heart College, starting from 1964. Some of his closest friends were the Marists, which developed at the annual Christmas Parties for the Brothers at our home in Harrow Road. There he met Br Marius and his great friend, the wonderful Br Conrad, who was a part of our family. Brother Jordan became a close mate also. ‘Connie’ would be at home for every Sunday lunch, Christmas Day and three nights a week to pick a few winners. He even went on Mum and Dad’s annual holidays. At one point, mum said she may as well stay home and he could just take Connie.*

*Until recently, Dad cut the brother’s hair every month.*

*Dad’s devotion to his friends was unwavering. He had a positive effect on everyone he met. Dad’s friendships were far too many to mention but Connie, Des Saint, Les Knight and ‘Apples’ held a special place in his heart.*

*Family was his life: Dad fell in love with Rae and never left her side for nearly 67 years. Their bond was amazing to experience.*

*When Dad left or returned home, he never failed to give Mum a kiss. He always told us the family home was always our home no matter what we did - there was only one exception and that was if we became Port supporters, then we were out! Much to his dismay, Mum became a Power season ticket holder. She was allowed to stay.*
