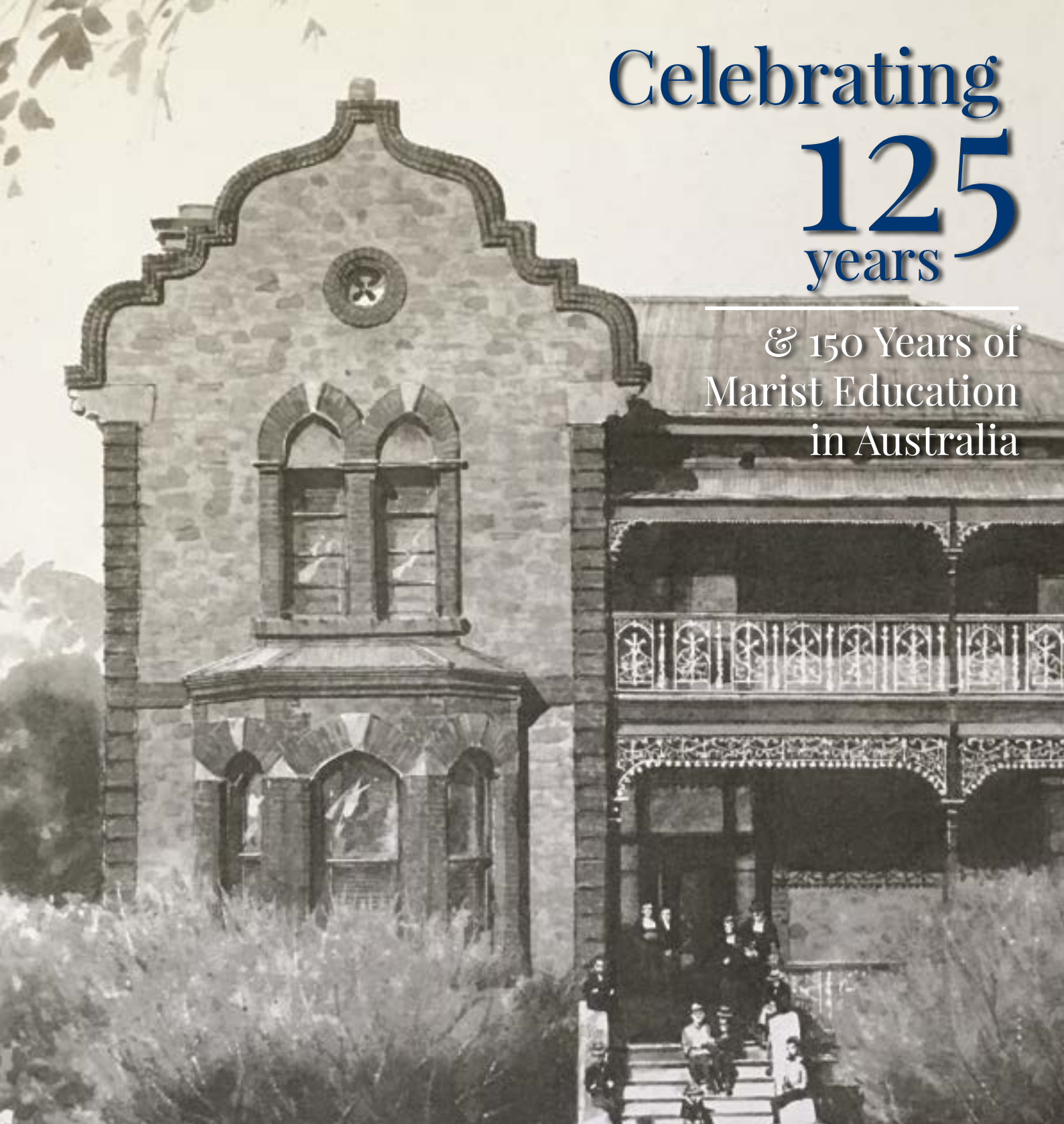

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

This year marks the Sesquicentenary (150) of the Marist Brothers in Australia in 1872 and the Quasiquicentenary (125) of the Founding of Sacred Heart College in Port Adelaide in 1897. It is also the Centenary of the College Chapel...

Dear Sacred Heart Old Collegians and members of the Sacred Heart extended family,

2022 is a very significant year in the Australian Marist Community - including at Sacred Heart. This year marks the Sesquicentenary (150 years) of the Marist Brothers in Australia from 1872 and the Quasiquicentenary (125 years) of the Founding of Sacred Heart College in Port Adelaide in 1897. It is also the Centenary of the College Chapel, opened on 24 September 1922 in dedication to all Australian Marist students who served in the First World War.

The establishment of the first Marist Brothers school at St Patrick's in 'The Rocks', Sydney was no easy task. Br Peter Carroll FMS (Provincial) described the context in regard to the children such that 'They preferred to roam the streets, fish in the harbour and play with their mates!' He also suggests that this anniversary is '... a time to look back in admiration and gratitude, and to look forward with hope and expectation.'

Twenty five years later Brother Stephen Debourg opened Sacred Heart High School and primary school on Commercial Road, Port Adelaide on 16 November 1897. The Parish Priest, Father Enright, was most eager to have the school opened as 'One day is too long to leave our Catholic Children in those State Schools!' Although the new school was intended for Catholic boys, it would nevertheless be open to all classes and creeds and its establishment would ensure that a good education was no longer a luxury to be enjoyed only by the rich. Archbishop O'Reily expressed the hope that Sacred

Heart would prove to be the source of intellectual and moral blessings to many generations! I think we have lived up to his expectations.

So, picture this, as told by one of the first Sacred Heart students, Lawrence Molloy (later Brother William): "Fifty of us marched up from the Nuns' School conducted by the Sisters of St Joseph in Dale Street. Sister Mel was the Head Teacher and I surmise Sister Edith was the Superioress. Eighteen other boys arrived from the local public school and from the Christian Brothers College, Adelaide."

Humble beginnings to be sure as the Brothers successfully immersed themselves in the local community. Brother Stephen was of French origin and his three colleagues were of Irish descent. Within two years there were 240 boys in the primary school and 40 in the secondary. It would be fair to observe that the College has never looked back!

As we peruse the pages that follow we do so with the knowledge that we are where we are today thanks to the founding Brothers, led by Br Stephen after whom the 'Debourg' performing Arts Centre at Marcellin is named.

We hope you enjoy this special edition of the Blue and Blue!

CELEBRATING 125 YEARS

Founded in 1897, Sacred Heart College has a rich and proud history. In 2022 we celebrate Sacred Heart's Quasiquicentennial - 125 years of education and fittingly, share this year with the Marist Brothers, who celebrate their 150th year of Marist education in Australia - their Sesquicentenary! Sacred Heart also celebrates the Centenary of the College Chapel this year, which was blessed in 1922.

THE BEGINNING

On 8 November 1897, South Australia's first Marist Brothers, Brothers Stephen Debourg, Daniel Flaherty, Hyacinth Donohue and Evangelist Hannon arrived at Port Adelaide on the SS Australien from Sydney to establish the first Marist school in the colony – Sacred Heart College. This was also the very beginning of the Catholic education system in South Australia.

As the first Marist school in South Australia, Sacred Heart College grew from humble beginnings, starting as two all-boys schools in Port Adelaide in 1897 - Sacred Heart High School and Catholic Boys' Primary School.

Brother Stephen Debourg was the first Principal and selected the name for the College through "the devotion to the humanity of Jesus Christ, as symbolised by his physical heart, the 'Sacred Heart', as the source of God's redemptive love", which was one of the principal Catholic

devotions of the late 19th century.

Before the opening ceremony began, a procession of about 150 students marched from the local Dale Street school in Port Adelaide to the new building. Two years after its inception, there were 40 students in the secondary school and 240 students in the primary school.

During its first 10 years, Sacred Heart changed its location twice to Semaphore and then Largs Bay to provide room for the increasing number of enrolling students before moving to its present location in Paringa Hall in Somerton Park in 1914.

FINALLY AT PARINGA HALL

The College was relocated to Largs Bay in 1905 and the Marist Brothers had begun to take in boarding students. However, as enrolments continued to grow, the Brothers sought an alternative site which would allow the College to expand further. Paringa Hall at Glenelg (now Somerton Park), which was built in 1882 for pastoralist, James Francis Cudmore, was acquired by the Brothers in 1914 and became the location for Sacred Heart College, where it still stands today.

By September 1920, there were 65 Boarders and 27 day boys and by September 1922, this had increased to 80 boarders and almost 40 day boys. The 25th anniversary of

the move to Somerton Park was the same year that WWII broke out with a total of 381 students setting off joining the Air Force, Army and Navy. Sadly, 32 would not return.

During the August 1922 holidays, Principal at the time, Brother Joseph McAteer took 30 boys to Victoria for a combined cultural and sporting holiday where they played football against Xavier College, Kew and St Patrick's College, Sale. Sacred Heart hosted a return visit by St Patrick's College in August 1926 in a game of football – the very beginnings of a strong tradition that first officially began in 1957 and continues today – the Assumption College Kilmore Exchange.

Over his years as Principal and to accommodate the increasing numbers of students, Brother McAteer transformed the College with up-to-date teaching and sporting facilities, recreation grounds and improvements across the school, including the Memorial Chapel, which celebrates its centenary this year. The Sacred Heart College Memorial Chapel was built in honour of former Marist students in South Australia who were killed in WWI and to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of the Brothers' arrival in Australia.

Brother McAteer converted the circular lawn at the front of Paringa Hall into the "Heart lawn" and replaced the Cudmore coat of arms with the College crest, but keeping the Cudmore motto, "Virtus ubique vincit" (Moral courage conquers everywhere), which is retained today.

By 1946 enrolments had reached 228, almost evenly divided between boarders and day students and by 1950, the College was almost filled to capacity.

Br Damian Willis (John Willis SHC '26) returned to Sacred Heart as Principal in 1952. He was the first Old Scholar to return to Sacred Heart College as Principal. In 1958, with 694 students, Sacred Heart was the largest Catholic school in South Australia. Students were winning scholarships to undertake tertiary education and the success of many of the Old Scholars focused public attention on the College, seeing its enrolment grow.

With student numbers steadily increasing, the College's demand for additional facilities continued throughout the 1950's – 70's. The 1960's and 70's also saw a significant increase in the number of lay teachers employed at the College, marking a significant change towards Catholic education. This was also the era in which female teachers were inducted into Sacred Heart, along with a number of male Old Scholars who returned to the College to teach.

MARYMOUNT COLLEGE

In 1956, the Sisters of the Good Samaritan established an all-girls school, Marymount College, which would eventually become a part of the South West Region's plan to officially operate as a Middle School for girls (Years 6-9). As early as 1971, the first two Leaving students from Marymount attended Chemistry and Physics classes at Sacred Heart with one continuing into Leaving Honours.

ST JOSEPH'S COLLEGE

On 7 February 1967, St Joseph's School at Mitchell Park opened. The new school took boys from grade V to Intermediate, and they would often continue their studies at Sacred Heart College. In its first year, enrolments totalled 153 students. The success of the school and completion of additional classrooms saw enrolments increase to 309 in its third year of operation. Sacred Heart College Middle School, an all-boys school (Years 6-9) was later established at the former St Joseph's College site and in 2015, Sacred Heart Middle School amalgamated with Sacred Heart College Senior at Somerton Park.

INTRODUCTION TO CO-EDUCATION

In 1977, a major change to the College and Catholic Education across the region took place with Sacred Heart College becoming part of the South West Region of Catholic Schools and moved to become a co-educational Senior College catering for Years 10-12 at Somerton Park. This marked a new beginning for Sacred Heart with the College celebrating its 80th year and becoming co-educational with 600 boys and 24 girls enrolled that year.

THE 'MODERN' HEARTS COMMUNITY

In 2018, the new 'Hearts Community' was born when Marymount College amalgamated with Sacred Heart College. Under the leadership of current Principal, Steve Byrne, Sacred Heart College became one co-educational school across two campuses – Champagnat (7-9) and Marcellin (10-12). In 2019, the amalgamation was complete with Marymount Campus staff and students relocating to Champagnat Campus at Mitchell Park, to operate as a co-educational Years 7-9 campus.

When the College first opened in Somerton Park in 1914, there were 25 Boarders and 25 day boys. Today, more than 1900 boarding and day students are educated across two campuses. Despite facing numerous challenges including three location changes, financial concerns, unpredictable enrolment numbers, and the introduction of co-education, to name but a few, Sacred Heart has always continued to adapt to keep up with the demands of a changing society.

Today Sacred Heart is a leading co-educational day and boarding school for Years 7-12 across two campuses.

Founded in the Marist charism, Sacred Heart continues to maintain the vision of the Saint Marcellin Champagnat, founder of the Marist Brothers and continues to promote Family Spirit and a love of learning whilst fostering Courageous Hearts.

Sacred Heart College empowers young people to remain true to their Marist values as they bravely and compassionately respond to the world around them.

We look back in admiration and gratitude, and we look forward in hope and expectation.

CENTENARY OF THE CHAPEL

Celebrating the Centenary of its foundation this year, the Sacred Heart College Memorial Chapel foundation stone was laid on Sunday 24 September 1922 by Archbishop Spence O.P. of Adelaide.

The Chapel was built in honour of former Marist students and Old Scholars in South Australia who had died in WWI. The year of laying the foundation stone also served as a reminder of the Centenary of the Foundation of the Marist Brothers in France, 1817; the Golden Jubilee of the Marist Brothers' apostolate in Australia in Sydney, 1872; and the Silver Jubilee of the Marist Brothers' arrival in South Australia, Port Adelaide 1897, which in turn became a commemoration of the first school run by the Marist Brothers in South Australia - Sacred Heart College.

The idea for a Chapel on Sacred Heart's grounds was initiated by Principal at the time, Brother Joseph McAteer (1916-1924). He had decided the College needed a chapel to sit alongside Paringa Hall.

The old Darlington quarry, from which the Tapley's Hill bluestone

was sourced to construct Paringa Hall, was re-opened to ensure the chapel matched Paringa Hall.

Messrs. Garlick and Jackman were the architects who worked on the chapel and the building contractor was M.A. Dwyer.

When the foundation stone was laid and the ground on which the Chapel would stand was blessed in 1922, construction of the Chapel was well underway.

The completed Chapel was officially blessed and opened on Sunday 30 March 1924, by Archbishop Spence, a date which also signified 10 years since the Brothers' purchased Paringa Hall.

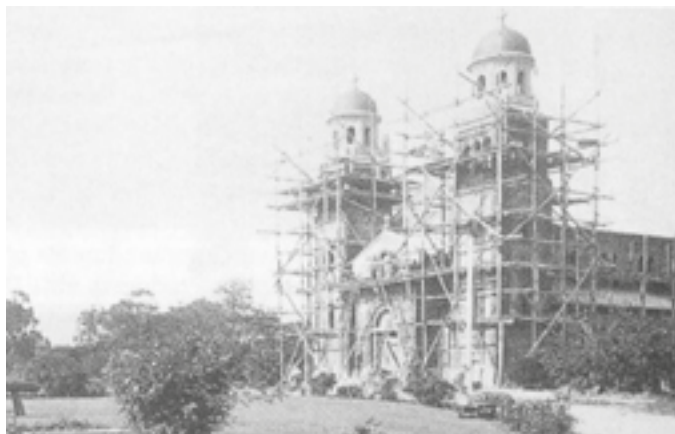
In the early days, the chapel had a near-full-time chaplain and daily mass was celebrated for the Brothers and boarders, along with some parishioners who lived close by. It was also used as one of the Brighton Parish centres for Sunday morning Mass and Rosary and Benediction in the evenings. Today, the chapel is used for Wednesday morning parish Mass, Boarders

Mass, Staff and House Masses and Liturgies. Many weddings have, and continue, to take place within the beautiful walls of the chapel, the very first being Dr John O'Donnell (past President of the Old Scholar's Association) and Alice Meegan on 1 July 1926 by Rev. Father Murphy.

For many years the Brothers would say their morning and evening prayers in the chapel and at times, it would be used for annual retreats for Brothers attending from around the country.

Over the years many generous parents, friends and supporters have donated stained glass windows, statues, pews, the altar, sacred vessels, etc. In the late 1960's the sanctuary was enlarged and in 1975 the sanctuary was remodelled, which drew some controversy. However, in 1991 extensive improvements were made.

The Chapel has been an integral part of College life throughout its history and today, it continues to stand as a sacred space for members of the Sacred Heart College community.

YEAR 12 2021 SUCCESS

We are delighted to report that our Year 12 students achieved excellent results, both in the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and with their Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

We are confident that our graduating students are well equipped as independent learners and well-rounded young adults to take on the challenges that exist beyond Sacred Heart in the years ahead.

2021 SACE RESULTS

99.7% of the eligible Year 12 students enrolled at Sacred Heart College (318 students) successfully completed their SACE in 2021. This accounts for nearly 2000 successful students in the past six years.

GRADES

In 2021, 542 A grades were achieved. All Year 12 students studied Stage 2 subjects in both 2020 and 2021 with 31 students scoring a total of three A's and 32 students achieving a total of four A's.

ATAR 2021

The Year 12 students of 2021 have performed at an exceptional level with 49 students achieving an ATAR over 90! This places them in the top 10% of students in the State and also situates them in the top 10% of the nation. Three students secured scores in excess of 99.0, which places them in the top 1% of the SACE group. This is truly outstanding!

Of the 260 students eligible for an ATAR, 18.8% achieved an ATAR over 90. In total, 101 of these students secured an ATAR in excess of 80, which demonstrates a significant level of achievement. The mix of students continues to be varied with a number of students studying part-time and/or studying at more than one year level or at University whilst in Year 12. This includes a selection of Year 11 students studying one or more Year 12 20-credit subjects.

2021 MERITS

This year 72 students achieved 85 A+ grades. Of these, 32 were A+ merits achieved by 29 students in 10 subjects.

Particular commendation is extended

to James Ganley, Mollie Jamieson, Ellie Morrissy and Sophie Smith, who achieved Merit Certificates in a Stage 2 subject while enrolled in Year 11. Ryan Clifford (Year 10) and Clancy Luscombe (Year 10) achieved a Merit Certificate in Stage 2 Workplace Practices (Swimming) which they studied externally through Marden Senior College.

GOVERNOR OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA COMMENDATION

One of Sacred Heart College's resident Brothers, Br Joe Hughes FMS, turned 80 on 31 January this year, a significant milestone for him and "a blessing."

Br Joe's large family in Western Australia, along with his five remaining siblings, planned a big celebration for the birthday. Unfortunately, due to continuing COVID-19 restrictions, Br Joe and one sister in Alice Springs could not attend the event – which went ahead anyway! Instead, he celebrated the milestone with the Marist Community at Sacred Heart with a nice meal at the Morphett Arms.

Once COVID-19 settles in the West, Br Joe will be returning to Perth and will become a member of the Churchlands Community, which is attached to Newman College. In due course, he will gather with his sisters and many of his 98 nieces and nephews to celebrate his 80th birthday, which promises to be a grand occasion.

Turning 80 was a momentous milestone for Br Joe with his father dying at 78 and his brother at 79.

"I've been clinging somewhat desperately to the perch for the last couple of years, so it's a relief to have made the grade," he said.

John Michael Hughes was born in Northam, Western Australia in 1942. He is one of eight children (six girls and two boys), and family has always been very important to him.

In 1955, a few days before his 13th birthday, Br Joe embarked on his quest to become a Marist Brother.

"I had great admiration for the Brothers and wanted to be like them. When my grandfather asked me, when I was 10 or 11, what I was going to be when I grew up, I told him I was going to become a Marist Brother. He very much approved of my decision," he said.

After completing his secondary education at Champagnat College, a boarding school for boys at Wangaratta in Victoria, Br Joe trained at the Marist Novitiate at Macedon, Victoria and was received into the Order on 2nd July, 1960. One year later he made his First Vows and then took up his first appointment at Assumption College, Kilmore, teaching Grade 6.

During his 44 years in schools, Br Joe worked as a teacher, Headmaster and Deputy Principal in Marist schools mainly in Victoria and WA, and also seven years in the Missions in Papua New Guinea and in the Solomon Islands.

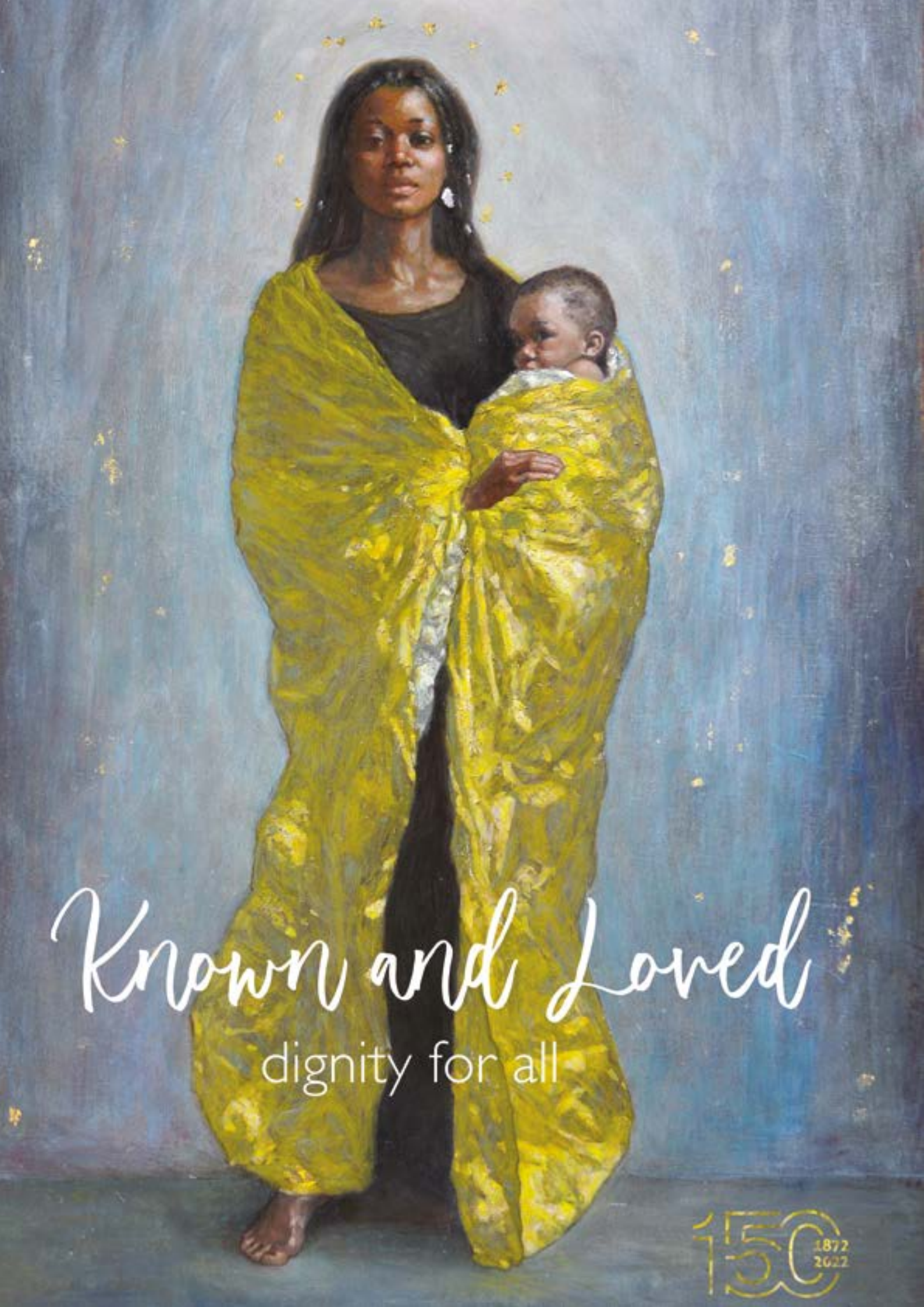
"I absolutely loved teaching. It was my great passion," he said.

For someone who loved teaching so much, the joys of retirement came as quite a surprise for Br Joe. He is now free to walk three hours a day, read lots of books, attend Book Club once a month to watch international (mostly French) films, and complete the Daily Sudoku "just to keep the brain ticking over."

He really enjoys his contact with the Sacred Heart Staff and has also found it most rewarding to be associated with the boarders, whether it's in preparing their Sunday liturgies, or just meeting them informally when he is out and about.

Brother Joe has undoubtedly enjoyed his seven years at Sacred Heart.

"It's been the icing on the cake for me," he said.

MARIST REFLECTION

Br Michael Green fms, Marist historian and Rector of Aquinas College in North Adelaide reflects through a Marist perspective.

During my time as National Director of Marist Schools Australia we were in the process of planning a new Marist school and the question came up as to what the College's motto could be. The person who had been appointed as Principal suggested 'Known and Loved'. We didn't go with that in the end and opted for something more traditional in Latin. But we could have. For a Marist school, we most certainly could have.

The wheel turns and in 2022, Sacred Heart College, along with all other Marist schools across the country, are drawing on 'Known and Loved' as a thematic anchor for the year, with the subline: 'Dignity for all'. It is indeed a very Marist expression. In the Constitutions of the Marist Brothers, their primary aim is captured succinctly as: 'To make Jesus Christ known and loved among the young'.

The 'and loved' bit comes directly from our Founder, Saint Marcellin. For him, this was fundamental. He had no interest in educating young people in religious faith if this meant nothing more than the imparting of knowledge. Worse still, if it meant drumming that into them against their will, or scaring them into duty. He told the first Brothers anything like that would be counter-productive to why he started Marist schools. For Marcellin it was, rather, about winning hearts and inspiring. It was about people – their

possibilities and their dignity.

So where to begin this quest? Marcellin intuited that step one was that the students themselves needed to feel known and loved. That's where and how education began. Schools such as Sacred Heart have built their cultures and priorities on this foundation stone.

For this year's Marist theme, a striking visual image has been selected, a painting by Italian artist Margherita Gallucci. At first glance, a religiously-minded person may be inclined to think that this is a standard Marian/Madonna image – Mary with Jesus – with Mary draped royally in a gilded cloak. Well, yes, it is. But the woman in the image is in fact a refugee, and her 'cloak' is an emergency heat blanket. Her feet are bare.

'Our Lady of Loreto with the Refugee's Cloak' – as Gallucci has called it – is as disarming as it is striking. There is an inherent dignity in the woman's bearing, yet we can only imagine the horrors and indignities that she has experienced in her journey as a refugee. Refugees are some of the most unknown and unloved people in our human family. People go to such lengths to keep them nameless and distant. They objectify them, and make them prove their worth.

As in any year, during 2022 much effort will be invested by staff at Sacred Heart to ensure that



students across the College are well known and genuinely loved. Their purposes in doing so, importantly, are neither insular nor inwardly directed. It's not about developing students to live snugly or self-assuredly in some kind of figurative gated-community. Their goal, rather, is to nurture 'good Christians and good citizens' – to use Marcellin's phrase – that is, people who will be ready and able in their turn to reach out to know and to love others, especially those who feel least known and least loved.

The measure of any Marist education is its capacity to nurture young people to be 'knowers and lovers', to be people who are agents of inclusion, of justice and of hospitality. Their families, their towns, their workplaces, indeed their world, will be more welcoming and open because of them. They will be people who seek to understand, to empathise: to get to know people so that they can get to love them.

Thirty-one years later on 14 April 2009, Australian servicemen were led to the wreckage site and the remains of Michael and Robert were brought back onto Australia soil, marking them as the last servicemen 'Missing In Action' in Vietnam. This Bursary also remembers the service of the 64 Old Scholars who served in Vietnam.

Late last year, the Sacred Heart College Community came together in a grand display of love, solidarity and support in honour of Charlotte Agostino (SHC '20) and Max McKeough (Year 10), to raise money for essential research into cancer.

On 31 October 2021, the wider Hearts community gathered for "Run for Charlotte," an event which saw more than 300 friends, family, Old Scholars, students, staff and supporters attend, with 261 individuals and teams running 25kms around the Main Oval at Marcellin Campus.

On 5 April 2021, Charlotte tragically lost her battle with Osteosarcoma, a rare type of bone cancer most commonly found in people under 25.

A BBQ, coffee van, cake stalls and music across the day set out to emulate Charlotte's fun loving and kind-hearted spirit. The event raised more than \$11,700, which was donated directly to The Sarcoma and Bone Cancer Research Foundation Association.



Old Scholar and friend, James Dimech (SHC '20) organised the event after reflecting on his time spent with Charlotte and remembering how passionate she was about Sarcoma research.

"One of the special qualities of the SHOC Community is our ability to rally together to support one another. The day turned out to be so much better than I could have imagined with everyone coming together in their bright yellow shirts remembering Charlotte's amazing spirit," James said.

"I would like to thank Genevieve Garrett, the bands who played on the day, Hamish Dunkin (Founder of Dunkachino Clothing) for making the shirts, Charlotte's girlfriends for the cake stall and for ensuring it would have been what Charlotte would have wanted, Rival Brothers for the coffee van – and most importantly, the Agostino family for their support and love."



Following this event, the Year 11 Leaders organised the "2 Mile March" for their cohort as they walked from Marcellin Campus to Somerton Park Beach and back, raising funds and awareness for The Sarcoma and Bone Cancer Research Foundation Association. Students gathered in Walter Park afterwards for a BBQ and Live Music, a fantastic initiative from our Year 11 Leaders!

On Thursday 4 November, Champagnat Campus' Montagne House organised a fundraiser for the Childhood Cancer Association in solidarity with fellow classmate, Max McKeough (now Year 10), who is also battling osteosarcoma.

Across Champagnat, students and staff donned gold ribbons and laces, which sold out by the end of day! At lunchtime, Max's peers gathered on Champagnat Oval where they ran over 200kms collectively, a fantastic achievement by our young people!

GENERATIONS OF HEARTS

THE SMART FAMILY (1938 – PRESENT)

Since the late 1930's, three generations of the Smart family have been educated at Sacred Heart College with three members of the third generation continuing to attend the College today!

George Smart (SHC '41) was the first of the Smart family to attend Sacred Heart, completing his education in 1941. As College Captain, Good Conduct Medal recipient, Rhodes Scholar Qualification Trophy winner and Captain of the First XI Cricket, First IX Baseball and First XVIII Football teams in 1941, he set a high standard for his younger brother, **Lawrence 'Lawrie' Smart (SHC '45)**. Lawrie did go on to follow his brother's example to become Head Prefect, School Captain, and Captain of the First XI Cricket, First IX Baseball and First XVIII Football teams in 1945.

The Smart family, Maxwell Otto Smart and Annie Elizabeth (nee Head) were originally from Redhill, SA and moved to Narridy where their four children, George, Lawrie, Beth and Maxine, attended primary school. George and Lawrie later attended Sacred Heart College as boarders and Maxine and Beth went to St Aloysius College.

Both boys developed strong leadership and academic skills and

were exceptional sportsmen. George won the W.J. Miller Cup (Baseball First IX) and SA Baseball League Cup in 1941. Lawrie went on to represent South Australia in baseball and cricket and was awarded Best All-Round Sportsman, Best Cricketer and Best Tennis Player in his final year. He had a powerful swing that once led to his smashing a ball through the picket fence of Adelaide Oval! He was also known for a hole in one at Crystal Brook Golf Club and had at least three holes in one at Kooyonga, as well as his ability to drive Kooyonga's old 18th hole!

Growing up, Lawrie's children remember being surrounded by numerous aunties, uncles and friends who were Sacred Heart connections.

Lawrie was a devout Catholic and his beliefs guided his whole life. He was a huge supporter of Sacred Heart and surrounded himself with Sacred Heart friends and connections.

"He remembers sleeping on the veranda of Paringa Hall as a boarder and thought it was much better than sleeping at his farm home! He also once told the story of getting up early from the boarding house on a Saturday and hand mowing the pitch and catcher area to make sure he

could make the most runs in cricket," his daughter **Jacinta Smart (SHC '83)** said.

Lawrie married Joy Schapel in 1956 and they had nine children. They now have 38 grandchildren and numerous great grandchildren! Their son's, **Kerin 'Kerry' Smart (SHC '66)**, **Philip Smart (SHC '71)**, **William (Bill) Smart (SHC '74)**, **Patrick Smart (SHC '79)**, and **Otto Smart (SHC '87)** attended Sacred Heart and their daughters; Jenny, Colleen, Gabriella, Deirdre and Jacinta went to St Aloysius.

In the 1960's, a teacher at Titjikala, NT contacted the Smart family to arrange for them to foster a bright young Aboriginal boy, Lincoln 'Brother' Boko to provide him with "the best educational opportunities." They did this wholeheartedly. Brother Boko went on to work as an assistant teacher and became a respected elder in his community.

Sadly, Brother passed away in October 2014, but the Smart family's strong connection with the Boko clan and Titjikala community lives on.

When Sacred Heart became co-educational in 1977, **Jacinta Smart (SHC '83)** moved to Sacred Heart, which she enjoyed.

"When I attended Sacred Heart in 1988, there was no boarding for girls, so I lived with Gert Noonan in Glenelg and rode my bike to school with **Martin Gallagher (SHC '83)**," she said.

"I remember being told off for kicking the footy at lunch - girls were not allowed to at that time! I was lucky that my cousin, **Damian Kitschke (SHC '83)**, was a boarder so I got to know them all well too. I loved my education, the teachers were awesome, especially the Marist Brothers," Jacinta recalls.

Lawrie's son, William (Bill) (SHC '74) recalls his time in the boarding house during the 1970's.

"I used to love the run to the beach during summer, then back for dinner being starving. We used to divide the butter sachet into six! The Marist Brothers were amazing people, really admirable and life changing," Bill said.

As an Aquinas Alumni Lawrie became a long-serving council member and chairman. Among his greatest achievements in his professional career in Dentistry was his significant service to clinical orthodontics, in particular, cleft lip and palate treatment, and craniofacial surgery. For this, he received an Order of

Australia Medal (OAM) in 2015 and in 2018, was inducted into the Sacred Heart College Hall of Honour.

"We were all very proud when Dad was inducted into the SHC Hall of Honour. We all love seeing the tradition at his beloved Sacred Heart continue with the grandchildren. It has been an ambition of all the SHC South Australian siblings to send their children back to Sacred Heart," Jacinta said.

Following a short illness at 87 years of age Lawrie died peacefully, surrounded by his family on Monday 12 October, 2015.

Jacinta believes George and Lawrie's legacies continue in what Sacred Heart College instilled - a strong sense of faith, humility and belonging within a community of like-minded people whose priorities are family, friends, values, and history.

"All the siblings have developed strong lifelong friendships. It was such a treat to sit with the Reddens and O'Louglin's at my nephews wedding recently. I find there is an Old Scholar popping up regularly!" Jacinta said.

2022 SA RURAL WOMEN OF THE YEAR: ROBYN VERRALL ('82)



Congratulations to Old Scholar, **Robyn Verrall (SHC '82)** who was named winner of the 2022 AgriFutures Rural Women of the Year Award for South Australia on 5 April 2022.

Robyn has been a leader in the agriculture industry where she is helping to reduce food insecurity and increase food affordability in rural, regional and First Nations communities in Australia by founding 'Kere to Country' - a food supply company that works to bring high quality and affordable meat into First Nations communities in SA and NT.

Following her marriage to Old Scholar **Christopher Bullen (SHC '82)** in 2007, Robyn moved to Christopher's farm at Keith and into the world of agriculture, which she has continued to champion as EO of Farming Enterprises, an Australian owned and operated business that provides meat products to Australian's and international markets under the brand, Bully's Meats.

"Bully's Meats has been working to reduce food insecurity in Adelaide, regional and remote communities by delivering meat to any family that has been nominated or nominates themselves for over 8 years," Robyn said.

"In 2017, I met Jessica Wishart and we became friends in 2018. She needed food on country in Alice Springs and



called me to ask me to get them some food as the price of meat for community was so high it was unaffordable - prices like \$70 for 500gram of mince meat!"

It was from here that 'Kere to Country' was created. Robyn is a director, founder and business advisor to the Aboriginal owned and operated company, 'Kere to Country' - with "kere" meaning food from animals in Arrernte.

As the SA 2022 AgriFutures Rural Women's Award winner, Robyn was awarded a \$15,000 grant from Westpac to progress her initiative that benefits rural industries and communities. The AgriFutures Rural Women's Award is Australia's leading award empowering and celebrating the inclusive and courageous leadership of women involved in Australia's rural and emerging industries, businesses and communities.

Robyn was selected as a finalist with fellow Sacred Heart Old Scholar, **Stephanie Lunn (SHC '10)** of Jamestown who is a director of TrialSafe.

Robyn now looks forward to representing South Australia in the National Awards in Canberra in September where the prize of \$20,000 which could help advance the cause of reducing food insecurity in SA and NT.

AFL LIFE MEMBERSHIP HONOUR: PHILIP GALLAGHER ('72)

Congratulations to Old Scholar, **Philip Gallagher (SHC '72)** who received the honour of an AFL Life Membership on 3 February 2022.

The long-serving SA Football Commissioner and Norwood premiership great has been involved with football in South Australia for five decades. Philip played 300 games of football - 292 games with the Norwood Redlegs from 1973 to 1986 and 8 state games for SA - before serving on the South Australian Football Commission since 2000.

The 4-time Norwood Football Club Premiership Player and 1981-82 Norwood Captain had an outstanding football career which saw him kick 216 goals and play in 33 Finals games, which on retirement, is the highest

in the club's history. Philip was an Inaugural Member of Norwood FC Hall of Fame (2006) and went on to receive SANFL Life Membership and was inducted into the South Australian Football Hall of Fame in 2014.

A chartered accountant, Philip has become the longest-serving non-executive SA Football Commissioner whilst acting as Chairman of the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee for the past 21 years. He begun his post-playing career in football administration, initially with the Norwood Football Club.

Appointed Deputy Chairman of the SA Football Commission in 2016, Philip was also an inaugural board member of the Adelaide Oval Stadium Management Authority (AOSMA) in 2009.

MADELINE FORDE (SHC '13)

Madeline (Maddy) Forde (SHC '13) has continued to have a strong connection to Sacred Heart and the Marist community since graduating in 2013. She is currently a delegate for the Plenary Council, and the Oceania Representative for the International Youth Advisory Body, working with the Vatican. She also sits on the board for the Marist Association, overseeing some of the Marist organisations within Australia.

"I have been so fortunate to be involved in a variety of opportunities which have been possible due to the connections I made with the Marist Brothers, and the Marist world during school," Maddy said.

Maddy worked at Sacred Heart College as the Youth Minister, advocating for social justice issues alongside students who were passionate about making a difference in our community. She has also volunteered in local, national, and global communities

and was one of four Old Scholars to establish the SHOC Immersion Experience to Cambodia in 2020.

"We were fortunate to have our first trip in January 2020. We remain in contact with the communities who have unfortunately been significantly disadvantaged through the pandemic. In the future, we hope to re-engage this program and continue to support our Cambodian Marist Community."

Maddy is currently living on Bidjigal and Gadigal Country (NSW), working to pastorally support young adults at ACU, and casually supporting NDIS service users whilst studying a Masters of Social Work.

According to Maddy, her greatest achievement so far is being fortunate to be involved in roles, which have given her the opportunity to see and listen to young people grow personally on their journeys.

"Being able to witness their growth into young, confident leaders striving for the betterment of our world is what I am most proud of."

Maddy attended Marymount College from 2007-2010 and then attended Sacred Heart from 2011-2013.

"What I particularly loved about Sacred Heart was the care and support for each student, and my experience as an individual especially, as a whole person. The teaching staff, the leadership team, and the non-teaching staff all embody the trait of going above and beyond for students and families."

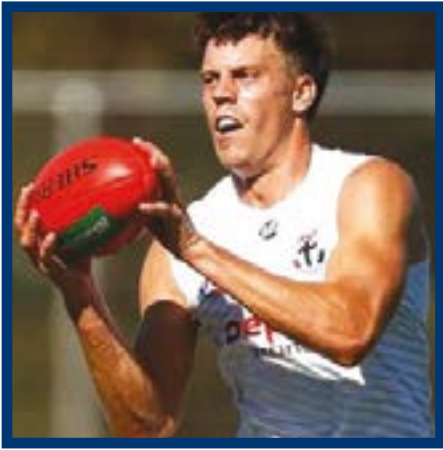
Maddy specified two non-teaching staff (amongst many staff at SHC) who had a particular impact on her:

"Paul Morgan, who took the time to sit and listen, making me feel valued and heard and Craig Kelly, who noticed I was upset after doing poorly in an exam, and quietly checked in on me for weeks afterwards making sure I was okay."

"The impact of all the staff at SHC made in their acts of kindness were foundational for me, and now how I try to live/work through showing kindness every single day," Maddy said.

Maddy's experience at Sacred Heart "modelled how important it is to have a role in creating a space for people to feel heard, worthy, and safe, knowing they have so much value to give to this world."

"The importance of the small actions, which add up to making a big difference."

CAMERON LOCKWOOD (SHC '19)

Congratulations to Old Scholar, **Cameron Lockwood (SHC '19)**, who recently recorded, mixed, and mastered Wolfmother's 6th album, 'Rock Out'.

After attending his first ever live music concert (Foo Fighters) in late 2011 and being a fan of playing 'Guitar Hero', Cameron decided he wanted to learn to play guitar and he signed up for guitar lessons while in Year 6 at Sacred Heart Middle School. Cameron joined the school's Rock Band and from here, his passion for playing and performing began.

In Year 8 Cameron joined the Drum Corps and as part of that and the Rock Band was able to experience playing live at Music Nights, Band Sandwich, School Assemblies and at primary school fêtes as well as many events outside of school hours including the SANFL Grand Final at the Adelaide Oval, Adelaide Festival of Choir, Glenelg Christmas Pageant and more.

Cameron commenced Year 10 at Sacred Heart College in 2017 where his passion for studying and performing began to thrive. He welcomed the opportunity to play in several School Bands, travelled to Mt Gambier for the Generations in Jazz Festival and Melbourne for the Kilmore Exchange and performed a Solo performance at the Adelaide Festival Theatre in Year 12.

Cameron knew he wanted to pursue a career in the Music Industry and was accepted for an SAE Destination Australia Scholarship studying a Bachelor of Audio in Byron Bay in 2020 where he is currently living and studying.

In 2020, Cameron attended an intimate live performance meet and greet with lead singer of Wolfmother, Andrew Stockdale at a local record store, Reasonater Music where he got the opportunity to play guitar with one of his inspirations of the industry.

After approaching Andrew at a cafe in Byron, who mentioned he is looking to record some new music, Cameron mentioned he was an audio engineer, and was willing to volunteer and work with him, but Andrew said he would pay him for his work.

"I'm really grateful for the opportunity Andrew gave me. A lot of other people my age can only dream of working with a band of the calibre of Wolfmother," Cameron said.

Cameron would later meet Andrew at a recording studio at his house where they would begin re-recording existing demos for their new album, 'Rock Out', which was released in November 2021.

Wolfmother's front man, Andrew Stockdale revealed why he was interested in getting Cameron to work on the album - "The younger generation now are a lot quicker to get things done. With Cameron, he was able to mix and master the album in a short period of time, which was really beneficial for us so we could get the album out there."

Cameron catches up with Wolfmother at their weekly rehearsals and was front of house Sound Engineer for their headlining performance at the flood benefit festival 'Secret Sounds - Flood Aid' on 26 March 2022. Cameron continues to work with Wolfmother at live events all around Australia with sold out shows in Cairns and Rockhampton, as well as the recent Uncaged Music Festival in Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne this year. He is also currently joining them on their 2022 European World Tour as their Sound Engineer.

When not studying or working with Wolfmother Cameron still enjoys playing live gigs with Adelaide Band, 'Hardstone' and Byron Band, 'Loose Ends'.



STEPHANIE LUNN (SHC '10)

Old Scholar, **Stephanie Lunn (SHC '10)** has faced adversity to create a thriving business that gives others the opportunity for a safe space in the agricultural industry.

This year, Stephanie was named Young Citizen of the Year for the Northern Areas Council for her involvement in the community. She was also a finalist for the 2022 AgriFutures Rural Women's Award alongside fellow Sacred Heart Old Scholar, **Robyn Verrall (SHC '82)** for her active involvement in TrialSafe.

Stephanie's greatest, yet bittersweet, achievement is her involvement in establishing the not-for-profit organisation, TrialSafe for the Agricultural industry. In 2017, Stephanie was involved in a major workplace accident where she was crushed by machinery. She was hospitalised with serious injuries and is lucky to be here today.

Following her recovery, Stephanie and her Managing Director wanted to create something positive from the negative situation and TrialSafe was born. Trialsafe runs safety seminars and podcasts across Australia, creating a safe and collaborative space for people in the industry to share stories and learn from each other, to then implement safe and practical change and advocate best practice for the industry. The aim is to compliment safety protocols and procedures with in-field best practice derived from experience and consciousness that is learned from people on the ground doing the job.

Stephanie believes Sacred Heart was a great stepping stone into

further study and employment.

"Learning how to manage your time, study and extra-curricular was really important. More importantly though was learning to interact with many different people and practice morals that you take through life," Stephanie said.

"My fondest memories were with our Remar group, led by Tracy Dorian, George Chyer and Shane Hennessy. We were Sacred Hearts' the first "caravel" to go through the program and we formed special bonds as a group of friends on the many backyard blitzes, interstate trips and volunteering experiences."

After graduating in 2010, Stephanie went to University and studied Agricultural Sciences. Initially interested in the sheep and wool industry, she found herself in the applied broadacre research sector working with companies to develop new products and technologies in the field for future commercial release.

In between stints of overseas travel, Stephanie has worked all over the state and in Wagga Wagga for a year, and is now settled in Jamestown where she works for AgXtra's managing one of their regional offices. AgXtra supports the commercialisation of innovation by taking developments in crop production and crop protection through innovative trial research work.

"I am heavily involved in the community here from head coach at the recreational gymnastics club, to running Active Farmers group fitness sessions, to organising events for Ladies on the Land and the Jamestown Show - but I love being involved and know the importance of contributing to your community to keep opportunities available for regional areas and the next generation."

Stephanie's sister and Old Scholar, **Kelly Lunn (SHC '13)** works in AgXtra's Adelaide-office. Originally not interested in agriculture, Kelly found her click in the company by working in a computer-based role, initiating trials, projects and reports and managing data.

"We're often said to be chalk and cheese but compliment each other well in our working roles."



DRE "MoZzi" NGATOKORUA (SHC '15 & 2015 COLLEGE CAPTAIN)

Drawing on his Wangkangurru, Adnyamathanha, Kuyani, Luritja, Deiri, Yankunytjatjara, Cook Island and Maori heritage, Old Scholar, **Dre "MoZzi" Ngatokorua (SHC '15)** is a trailblazer and huge supporter of young people.

Dre, whose nickname 'MoZzi' (originally MoZziriginal) is designed to capture most of his cultural background in one name, works as a DJ at Umeewarra Media where his daily show targets youth.

"The Straight out Show has definitely given young people a voice to speak about the problems they face as young people," Dre said.

"I am passionate about youth issues and giving a voice to young Aboriginal people."

In support of his passion, Dre runs workshops and mentoring programs for Aboriginal youth on how to create and project their own voice independently. This includes filmmaking, interviewing, radio presenting and music making.

"The film workshops were a huge impact; seeing the different story ideas, the shots, and their creativity come out. They even surprised themselves," Dre said.

"In 10 years, I would love to do the

workshops in other regional towns reaching interstate and possibly the world. I want to help to create more opportunities for all communities to develop their own ideas.”

Through his work as a Broadcaster, Radio Host, DJ and Aboriginal Youth Leader, Dre has featured on Triple J and in the Adelaide Fringe where he recently performed the second iteration of his multimedia production, 'Mozzi x Inkatja: A New Moon' to The Lab in Light Square during the 2022 Fringe. The show journeys through Inkatja's life; reflecting on the life of a young girl on the mission, rising to become a community leader. Dre tells the story through narration, music, traditional art projection and historical imagery.

Dre, who lives in Port Augusta, came to Sacred Heart as a boarder in 2013. While on school holidays back at home in 2014, Dre asked his uncle Vince Coulthard if he could come into the radio station and do some voluntary work.

“Starting off just doing the breakfast show, I was so nervous my voice was shaking as I only announced one song and the weather. Luckily I stuck with it as when I finished school in 2015 they offered me a traineeship. After I completed the traineeship, they offered me a full time job and that's where I am now,” Dre said.

Moving from behind the mixing desk to behind and in front of the camera, Dre utilises his broadcast, digital content and editorial skills to produce regular shows for Umeewarra Aboriginal Media Association.

Dre is on the board of First Nations Media Australia and the Community Media Training Organisation. He is also a valued member of Carclew's Grant Assessment panel and Country Arts SA's RAP Advisory Committee.

Dre continues to build on his storytelling skills through the development of audio and digital content for his own projects as well as others in the Davenport community.

JESSE MOORE (SHC '20)

Congratulations to Old Scholar, **Jesse Moore (SHC '20)** who was selected into Tier 3 of the 2022 Sport Australia Hall of Fame Scholarship and Mentoring Program in October 2021.

Jesse is one of 16 athletes nationally and one of three South Australian athletes to be awarded a scholarship.

Jesse will receive financial assistance, advice and mentoring support from the Sport Australia Hall of Fame community, which he hopes will take his career further.

In 2020, Jesse was the Kinderym Ambassador and has since excelled at a state and national level in multiple apparatus since making the finals on the high bar at the Junior World Championships in Hungary in 2019.

He hopes to qualify for the next Olympics after missing out on competing in Tokyo due to age restrictions.



MAX STEVENS (SHC '12)

Congratulations to **Max Stevens (SHC '12)** who came second in the 3000m Steeplechase in the 2022 Chemist Warehouse Australian Track and Field Championships at Sydney Olympic Park on 31 March.

Max worked with SA teammate and 3000m steeplechase winner, Matt Clarke to secure the top two spots in the race which doubled as the trial for the Commonwealth Games and World Championships.

In the 2022 Chemist Warehouse Melbourne Track Classic in Victoria on 19 March 2022, Max ran less than nine seconds off the World Athletics Championships qualifying time of 8:22.00 in the Open Men's 3000m Steeplechase, finishing second.

In January 2019, the Hills Districts' athlete won the 3000m Steeplechase during the 2019 Hunter Track Classic at Hunter Sports Centre in Newcastle, NSW.

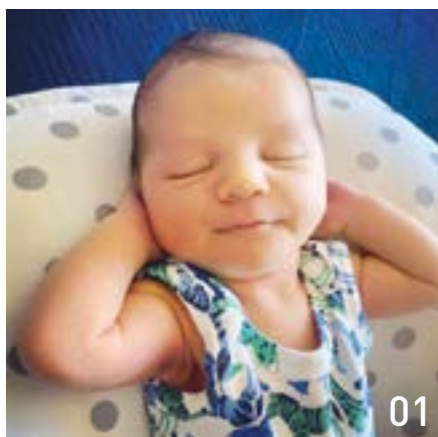

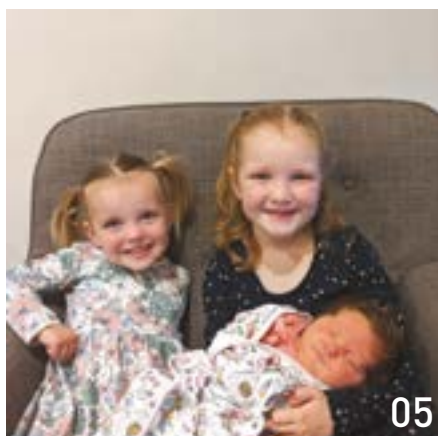

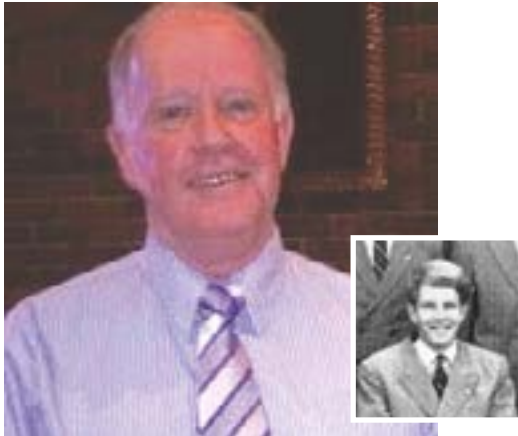

HARVEY JOHN CHARLESWORTH (SHC '63)
13.01.1947 – 11.02.2022

Harvey John Charlesworth (SHC '63) was born to Irene and Vin Charlesworth on 13 January 1947 at the Calvary Hospital, Adelaide. He had one sister, Trish and was very close to his family throughout his life.

He grew up in Gray Street, Plympton in the family home, eventually moving to Clarence Gardens, Pasadena in his married life and, finally, Flagstaff Hill where he raised his family and spent treasured time with his grandchildren until 11 February 2022.

Harvey attended St Joseph's School, Kurralt Park, eventually moving to Sacred Heart College in 1960. It was here that Harvey made many of his most beloved memories on the athletics track, football field, and with his schoolmates. He told many stories starring his good friend, **Trevor Mahney (SHC '63)** and a host of others, including **Peter O'Sullivan (SHC '65)** and **Harley Hooper (SHC '64)**. One of Harvey's proudest achievements was being in Sacred Heart's First XVIII football team that defeated Assumption College for the first time in 1962.

Along with Sacred Heart College, Dad's long association with the West Adelaide Football Club was a focal point for his early life. Initially playing in the U13s, Harvey played in the junior colts (now the U17s) at 14 years of age.

By his own admission, Harvey's enjoyment of all the trimmings of life may have dimmed the fire to progress his football career but he had a damn good time doing it! Stories of adventures with his mate, Trevor Mahney and co. were always entertaining. This, combined with his renowned fiery temper culminated in Harvey missing two U17 State games due to two separate suspensions.

Harvey landed at Commercial Union in his late teens, where he started as a mail boy and quickly moved up the ranks. He was seconded to Murray Bridge and Naracoorte before moving back to Adelaide to work until 1993 when he began his own Insurance business, Charlesworth Insurance Agency on Jetty Road, Brighton, with his good friend, Peter Ryan. It was during his time

in Murray Bridge where he met Marie Nolan, and they were married in the Sacred Heart College Chapel in 1972. Harvey and Marie had one son, Leigh and sent him to Stella Maris Parish School in the 1980s. Other than receiving a catholic education, Leigh and the family received something far more special- lifelong friends. The Stella Maris families were a massive part of Harvey's life and were continually present in it.

Harvey retired in 2009 and filled his time with racing, movies, sport and everything involved with his grandchildren. In fact, Harvey rarely missed any of his grandson's sporting events. Unfortunately for Harvey, the changing of on-field spectator restrictions became the bane of his life. His grandson's, Ollie and Noah will clearly remember Harvey's head popping up in the half-time huddle unannounced and, frankly, unwanted. Ground Marshall's must have dreaded Harvey's attendance at junior sport. Rules were not meant to be applied to Harvey.

Throughout his childhood and later in married life, Harvey loved being on holiday. Whether it was trips to Blanchetown, Surfers Paradise or Melbourne, Harvey was like an excitable child leading up to the holiday and began packing weeks in advance.

One thing that comes from the passing of a loved one is trying to find the "positives." Harvey's family believe this lies in the qualities that made him who he was.

Harvey listened to people. He engaged with those he loved along with those he just met. His gift was to make others feel valued. He held loyalty as one of the most important traits a person could have. On a smaller scale, sticking with West Adelaide and the Adelaide Crows throughout his life was a testament to that. On a larger scale, his son, Leigh cannot remember a time in his life when his Dad was not on his side.

As many could attest to, Harvey had the potential to say exactly what he thought. Fortunately for him, his amazing ability to laugh at himself allowed him to get away with things no other mortal could. He was the epitome of taking what he dished out.

In contradiction to some of his other traits, Harvey was an extremely sentimental man who possessed the easy ability to tell you how much you meant to him.

Harvey made situations fun and memorable - even if he was not actively trying to. That is why people gravitated towards him. He was fun, politically incorrect and thoroughly entertaining.

Look for the fun at every opportunity. Life is full of fun - we just need to see it. Harvey had fun. Harvey was fun. Harvey made others have fun. He didn't take offense easily and definitely didn't let the fact others might take offense get in the way of a laugh.

JOHN MCKENZIE STEARNE (SHC '54)

03.06.1937 – 31.03.2022

Emeritus Professor John McKenzie Stearne (SHC '54) was born in Grassmere (now Kurralt Park) to parents Kitty and Keith.

John grew up in Hayhurst (now Plympton) with his sister, Elizabeth (Bette) during the Great Depression and his first family home was shared with his mother's sister and her husband. After the birth of Bette, the family moved to Marion Road, Hayhurst to have more space. At about age 4, John started school at St John's, Mornington (now known as St John the Baptist School) where he stayed until starting at Sacred Heart College in 1946.

John was a very hard working student who enjoyed sports. The Stearne family would go to matches where he was a player often "in the thick of it" and coming off the field occasionally with a black eye. Rostrevor was a tough competitor in those days and usually the source of injury.

John enjoyed daily bike rides to and from Sacred Heart, often with another student joining him at the family house. The 7km to and from school kept him in top shape for both cricket and football. His diligence as a student was recognised annually on Prize Giving Night, which the Stearne family attended along with the Shinnicks, Dawsons, Combes and Floreanis, among many others.

During his time at Sacred Heart, John blossomed and he was in the top bracket as a scholar. In his final year (1954), John was Head Prefect, House Captain, Captain of the First XVIII Football team and opened the batting with his long-time friend, **Roger Shinnick (SHC '54)** for the First XI Cricket team. With regards to his First XVIII captaincy, The Paringa Hall Collegian (1954) reads: "*The fine spirit of J. Stearne was always an example for the players to follow.*" John was also heavily active in the College Army Cadet program and in 1954 was promoted to the rank of U/O 2 I.C. He graduated Sacred Heart with Leaving Honours and won a Commonwealth Scholarship to attend university.

After leaving Sacred Heart, John studied at Adelaide University from 1955 until 1963 where he completed his Bachelor of Science degree and his PhD. He then spent two years at the New York State College of Forestry in Syracuse undertaking post-doctoral research, before joining ICI Australia on the same day fellow Old Scholar, **Bart Cummings (SHC '42)** won his first Melbourne Cup in 1965.

John met his wife Jan on the SS Orsova on his return voyage to Australia. They married with Old Scholar and friend, **Tony Dawson (SHC '54)** as best man. On arrival back in Australia, John and Jan settled in the Melbourne suburb of Kew and had two children, Elizabeth and Richard.

After leaving ICI in 1972, John entered the University sphere where he rose to become Head of the Chemistry Department at the then Footscray Institute of Technology, which later became Victoria University in 1990. He was later appointed as Dean of the Faculty of Science in 1992 and then Head of the Campus in St. Albans before retiring in 1996 as Emeritus Professor.

After his retirement John established a consultancy business, Mason Stearne Pty Ltd. and continued consulting in this field, specialising in Confined Space Entry and toxic gas detection until 2009.

Both John and his wife kept active and were keen golfers at the Kew Golf Course. Family was always an important part of John's life, which revolved around Jan; his two children, Elizabeth and Richard; their spouses, Aimee and Emil; and he was a proud Pa to Lottie, Roisin, Arlen, Leo and Jack McKenzie.

Sadly, John passed away in Melbourne on 31 March 2022. He was 84.

Tributes to John flow in the Melbourne Age, painting him as the family man, a great neighbour and friend that he was.

A true gentleman who will be sorely missed.
