

DEPARTMENTS 2023

GATEWAY

What a fantastic year 2023 has been for Gateway students!

The purpose of Gateway is to enable schools to provide senior students (years 11-13) with opportunities to access structured workplace learning and gain knowledge and skills that they will need for future work like Health and Safety, Leadership Course, Service IQ, First Aid, Working on heights, and Barista courses.

Gateway is designed to support students' transition into the workforce by offering them workplace learning while at secondary school.

In 2023, 50 students were enrolled in the programme with diverse work placements including building, early childhood, electricial, hair and beauty, farming, plumbing, nurseries, mechanical engineering, automotive, and service providers.

A high number of students' Gateway experience lead to apprenticeships and full or part time employment. Some students continued to further their education to prepare for work in their chosen field.

Gateway provides employers a great opportunity to get to know our students' qualities which can also lead to future employment.

I would like to thank all the amazing employers that provide great opportunities to our students.

On a personal note I would like to say that I enjoyed working with students, whānau, and employers, I also learned a lot about the work opportunities available on the Coast.

SOCIAL SCIENCES

2023 has been a challenging year for staff and students. A combination of sickness, especially among staff and ongoing industrial action placed limitations on what the Social Sciences department wanted to achieve. Sadly some significant learning outside the classroom, such as the Year 9 Marae visit and several field trips had to be cancelled or postponed. Nevertheless significant progress has been made towards achieving the Social Sciences goals. These include the ongoing integration of the Social Sciences refresh into our school curriculum and staff preparation for the introduction of new Level 1 NCEA standards in Geography and History in 2024.

During the first two terms, Mrs Anna Bermingham and Mr Bernard Adams shared the HoD role while Mr Robertson was on leave in India. They performed this shared role admirably. The department welcomed Manu Somerville to take on the challenging job of teaching Education for Sustainability to three different NCEA levels in one composite class. Whaea Annie and Te Marunui Toki used their strengths to support the school in a number of initiatives such as Dean's support, the Kindness Project, and Kapa Haka.

Students in the Social Science classes received relevant and up to date learning opportunities. Those that complete the mahi are achieving well in all areas.

Y9 Aotearoa Studies

There were six classes in 2023 with Te Marunui Toki and Whaea Annie teaching three classes each. Students studied a range of topics related to Aotearoa Histories. These included Identity, a study of Aotearoa's settlement by Tangata Whenua and the later migrants. Students examined the partnership Te Tiriti O Waitangi promised but did not always deliver. In term three students focussed on milestones affecting New Zealand in the twentieth century. The course culminated in term four with a local community study emphasising the local economy and the environment.

Y10 Global Studies

We have had Mr Toki, Whaea Annie and Mrs Bermingham taking the Y10 Global Studies classes this year. Highlights have been research into ancient civilisations, looking at the significance of Matariki, decision making and understanding sustainability.





Level 2 and 3 Classics

Yassou!





Classical studies has been another wonderful year with students enjoying ancient literature, sculpture and architecture.

Level 2 studied Homer's Odyssey, and learnt about the ideas and values of the classical world. They also studied in depth the Athenian Parthenon and the lost city of Pompeii, and what the archaeology that was excavated can tell us.

Level 3 began their year studying the art and architecture of the Roman Empire, and the messages communicated to the people who viewed them. They read Virgil's Aeneid and the links with the Emperor Augustus and Jupiter's prophecy for the future of Rome.

I have been impressed with both groups working independently as they share the classroom for the year. Vase designing, and soap sculpture as well as creating the class collage were also highlights!









Levels 1,2,3 History

This year Level 1 History class looked at New Zealand's involvement during WWI and WWII by conducting individual research, unfortunately we were unable to visit Shantytown due to industrial action. Students also studied the bombing of the Greenpeace flagship Rainbow Warrior in 1985 and how our Nuclear Free stance continues to impact New Zealand society. I have been impressed by the students being consistent throughout their work this year.

Levels 2 and 3 were a combined class this year. Students studied events during the Vietnam War, looking at contested events and key individuals involved. Students also conducted individual research on New Zealand historical events such as the 1981 Springbok Tour, the Brunner Mine disaster and Chinese Gold mining, and their significance to Aotearoa New Zealand. I have been really impressed with focus and motivation to succeed in the combined class. Students have brought their knowledge and been keen to learn.



Levels 1,2,3 Geography

This year the Level 1 Geography class looked at topics ranging from the global pattern of earthquakes, to the contemporary issue of 1080 use in New Zealand to the sustainable use of an environment (relating to dairy farming). Students were somewhat hampered by the lack of field trips, but made the most of the year's learning and produced some excellent results and growth. Many students have prepared themselves well for the end of year exams.

The Year 12 & 13 Geography students found themselves together again and, where possible, worked on similar topics. Both started by looking at the global pattern of coral reefs, then branched off to look at the urban pattern of slums in Johannesburg (Year 12) and the contemporary event of Polyfest (Year 13).



Both groups then studied contemporary issues in either Aotearoa/New Zealand at Year 12 or an international issue at Year 13. We completed the year with a spot of potamology as part of their Geographic research into fluvial geomorphology on the New River comparing three sites along the river. The overall aim of the research was to see if there were differences in geomorphology at various locations on the river (analysing gradient, velocity, depth, width and sediment type/size). Overall it has been a real privilege to teach these young people, watch them grow and share in their development into adulthood.

Levels 2,3 Tourism

Many students put in a lot of extra mahi at home to complete assessments early, which I was impressed with. Well done to all those students who put their best foot forward and worked hard in 2023.



Levels 2,3 Psychology

2023 Year 13 Psychology saw the arrival of some new activities to assist students with their executive function, such as building with Lego as a way to understand the processes in conducting experiments and putting the Method of Loci to practise to enhance study skills.





Our Y13 students enjoyed conducting psychological experiments on willing participants across the school for one of their internals. Psychological concepts that our students were analysing in their reports included conformity and inattentional blindness. Students also engaged in other activities to enrich their understanding of the cognitive approach including the Stroop test and the White Bear experiment. Furthermore, they enjoyed making peanut butter and jam sandwiches (with a twist!) which they could apply to the diathesis-stress model.





A lowlight for our students was that this year's field trip to Wellington had to be cancelled due to variables mentioned earlier. However, overall the year was a success for many, who displayed great resilience and perseverance amidst the challenges that the year presented.

Whaea Annie attended the NZ Psychology Teachers Association in November and hopes to return with even more new ideas that can be implemented for our 2024 cohort.

A select group of students enrolled in Level 2 Psychology on Mr Robertson's return from India. They embraced their mahi and produced quality assignments and sites about phobias, school stress, and ethics.

Court Theatre Trip



An awesome backdrop was painted and designed for this performance by Rata Gurney along with some fabulous costuming, make-up and props designed and realised by various CIP students.










Junior Drama Rotations

Film Workshop with Daimon Schwalger
















SUPPORTED LEARNING

Chemistry/Physics trip to the University of Canterbury



The crossing wasn't fun as it was about knee deep freezing cold water. Once we made it across we had a short climb before finding the cataclasite, which is the deformed rock marking the plate boundary.













ESS Y12 trip to Tekapo

The L2 Earth and Space Science class visited Tekapo to learn more about our night sky and the geology of the area. The trip nearly didn't go ahead with the Arthurs Pass initially closed due to heavy snowfall. Fortunately, we did get away, stopping along the way for the occasional snow fight. The first evening we went stargazing being shown the different constellations and features of the night sky. The following day we drove out to the Mt Cook village but were unable to complete the Hooker Valley Walk due to the heavy snow. The information center gave a comprehensive overview of the geology and geography of the area (plus more snow fights). The trip was topped off by some students taking a dip in Lake Tekapo and a visit to the hot springs in the town. A huge thanks to Lyn Rothery for her help driving and managing the students.

ESS Caving trip: Charleston

The Y11 ESS class headed out to Charleston to explore the limestone cave system in the cliffs behind the Nile river. Students were guided down deeper and deeper into the cave system before tubing along the final section, with glow worms lighting the way. Emerging from the cave system, students tubed down river before heading back to the base. Many thanks to Underworld Adventures for taking the class on this trip.

NGĀ HERE KAHIKATEA

This year in Ngā Here Kahikatea we have been visiting Whare Manaaki, some of the kaupapa of our visits have been the unveiling of a pou made by one of our students (Jamaal) and to waiata to kaumatua and perform kapa haka for manuhiri to Te Tai Poutini. We have had many mau rākau wānaka including one at Arahura Marae, one at JPII and two here at our kura. At these wānaka, we joined with other kura to share kai, learn mau rākau and learn haka. It was a great experience.





Some of our students went on a trip to Ōtautahi for the regional Manu Kōrero competition. It was awesome to be in a space where everyone was culturally immersed and speaking reo all day. It was awesome to be at the pōwhiri where the whole school (Kaiapoi High) was doing their haka - including all of the teachers. It has inspired some of our ākonga to try and enter in 2024.

We have also been to Arahura awa to hear pūrākau and look for pounamu as well as a weekly visit to the hospital to waiata. We have also been lucky enough to have Eli Maiava give our class some taonga pūoro and come along to teach us how to use them. Some of our students have been working hard to bake cakes and make kai following recipes in te reo Māori. We have been really enjoying eating the amazing kai that they have made. And have been lucky enough to have some te reo wānaka at Arahura Marae too, these have been great experiences for us.

Recently we have been asked to do some performances at Whare Manaaki and for the opening of the basketball courts at school. It is really hard to perform in front of our peers. We hope in the future that this becomes easier as te reo and tikanga Māori becomes more normalised at our kura. We have had a









day where we taught our school haka to house groups. It went well, but it really needs to be something that happens more often so that everyone at our kura knows the haka.

Kapahaka

This year our kapa haka group was the strongest it has been in a long time. We worked together all year and had weekend workshops and poi noho. We travelled to Reefton to compete against other schools from Te tai Poutini. We did really well and brought back taonga (awards) for being first, first equal or second in all categories. We ended up being second overall. We came away from the competition feeling kotahitanga and determined to improve even more for next year. We have already started working towards next year's bracket.

We were lucky enough to have brand new kapa haka uniforms this year. They looked stunning. Our talented artist - Alec created an amazing flag to represent our kura at the Kapahaka competition.

ENGLISH

2023 has been a busy year!

We welcomed several new staff members into the English Department this year. We are fortunate to have Whaea Ann Zachan, Miss Laura Starling, Ms Susie Gilroy and Miss Sian Utton joining us, bringing their ideas and expertise to Greymouth High School. Ms Gilroy is also teaching Art and is leading Qwest, while Miss Utton is managing the school's social media accounts.

This year, our department was part of the NCEA Pilot Programme, offering the new English standards at Year 11. It was a lot of new learning for both our students and teachers, but we have seen some great writing in the new external standard, and a high pass rate for the Literacy: Reading test. Fewer, bigger standards have allowed teachers to focus on the learning, in themed classes that focused on food, sport, gaming, heroes and villains, and dystopia.

A new module at Year 9 has helped students practice their research skills, under the experienced guidance of Ms Ann Kieran. The Year 9s investigated some serious ethical quandaries, like whether animals belong in zoos, whether we should only buy organic fruit and veg, or whether animal testing should be banned. Cara Bull (9E) investigated sweatshops, and found out that "[m]illions of children between the ages 5 and 14 don't get any choice in working in these conditions and don't get the option to go to school because they get forced to work in sweatshops."

Year 12s and 13s produced some excellent creative writing for their writing portfolios this year:

Marly Shenouda reflected on growing up...

"As I leave the stifling walls of my chrysalis, and enter the driver's seat of my car I see them all again. Every version of my youth sitting in a row on the porch. Some with tears in their eyes terrified to leave childhood, and some giddy at the future to come. Their naivety strikes me, their only worries were wanting to fit in, spiders, heights or having their food touch on a plate ... and yet they wished the time away. So focused on the future that they forgot to live in the present, forgot that one day they will be eighteen, the adult they always wished to be. Only to find the loneliness they never expected, and how I wish I could tell them to just stop, and feel."

...while Ella Mahuika asked questions about the reality we live in...

"In a world where everyday life feels more like a never-ending loading screen, the Simulation Hypothesis emerges as the ultimate 'lag' excuse for our chaotic existence, offering a comically convenient explanation for every glitch in reality's code. Could this 'Simulation Hypothesis' be true? Yes, it could. But, in the overall scheme of things, it is very highly unlikely. Are we really trapped in a game of Sims, or have we simply run out of convincing excuses for forgetting where we put our keys?"

...and Brighid Gallagher unearthed a letter written from Catherine of Aragon to Henry VIII!

"Deep in your heart you must know it to be true as well. There have been many unfortunate outcomes of our children remembering also our daughter Mary who I have seen you so tenderly love, but who in recent years has suffered your recent cruel ways. 


