Reflecting on 2023 and Looking Forward to 2024

2023 has been an exciting year with lots of key developments for our school community.

Mr. Wayne Buckland stepped aside as Principal after 22 years of dedicated service to Bream Bay College. Mr. Buckland leaves behind a legacy of the modernisation of our entire site most notably the amazing new buildings for our Year 7-8 and our Science Classrooms. He also embedded a focus on Restorative Practice which seeks to constructively address issues that arise at our school. We are also saying farewell to Mrs. Bev Webb who has worked tirelessly for 28 years to help the development of the school as the Principals Personal Assistant and Office Manager. Mrs. Webb is known

for her calm, caring demeanor and commitment to Bream Bay College.

Our Year 7-8 and Science Blocks are now fully in use and inspiring our students and staff to engage in learning and our Science classes are thriving in their new environment. Our next building projects involve the redevelopment of our Maths classrooms and Music area.

In 2023, our students continued to excel across a wide range of activities. Our sports teams consistently exceeded expectations, with multiple athletes representing Northland and securing victories in regional competitions. Our cultural groups set extraordinarily high standards, garnering national recognition for their achievements. The Showquest team and individual talents were celebrated on the national stage, the Panimals took their amazing talents on the road, and Te Tuinga Performing Arts evening showcased the incredible talent within our community.

Collaboration within the Bream Bay Kāhui Ako, which includes One Tree Point, Waipu Primary, Ruakākā Primary, Bream Bay College, and several local Early Childhood Centres, continues to strengthen, ensuring the provision of highly skilled support systems for our young learners across the rohe.

STAFF VS YEAR 13



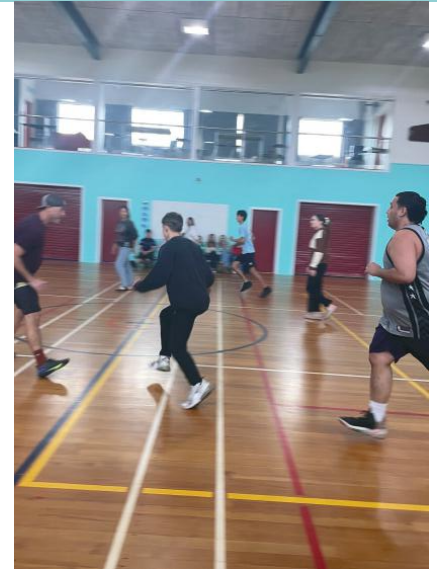
SWIMMING

FAREWELL TO MR BUCKLAND

Mr. Buckland was Principal from 2001 – 2023.

Here is a brief snapshot of Bream Bay College during his time:

In 2002 the Guardian Angels were introduced, and we introduced accelerated learning for Year 7|8. In 2003 student results were in the top quarter overall in Northland and Restorative Practices were introduced. Gateway, M people and a school doctor were introduced in 2004.

Between 2005–2006 we set up student councils, visited Higashi Senior High in Japan, purchased our first school van and introduced My Classes. In 2007|2008 PC School Spider was available to students and caregivers, we were in the top 25% of schools in Northland and 26 students travelled to Europe for 3 weeks. In 2009 the New Performing Arts block opened, we signed up with Rubicon and every classroom had computers and a projector. In 2010 23 students went to Samoa and the Reid-Gardner Student Welfare building was opened. This year Mr. Buckland had his sabbatical to Vancouver for a Restorative Conference.

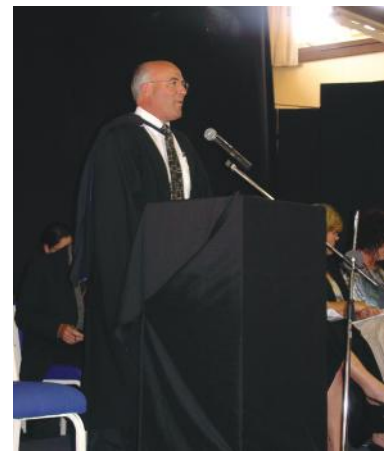
Between 2011–2015 our whānau structure changed to vertical, we had a New Caledonian Trip, a Fiji Trip and a Japan Trip. Callplus fiber was connected, we held our 75 Year School Reunion, we awarded 4 apprenticeship scholarships, Staff were trained in Feurestein Method, Mr. Buckland was sworn in as Justice of the Peace, we purchased a school car and replaced the boiler. In 2016 we had a trip to Samoa and introduced the Harvey Abercrombie Scholarship.

In 2017 we hosted the Tai Tokerau Festival, purchased sound gear for Performing Arts, building started on the new Whare, outdoor equipment was installed, The Panimals went to Cairns and 11 students visited Japan. In 2018–2019 we received 2 Refining NZ Scholarships, won the Adam Blair Trophy, visited Japan, the Panimals went to Brisbane and a grant from the National Gifted and Talented fund was presented to the Panimals.

In 2020 chrome books were issued to all students that did not have a device and Modems were set up for homes that did not have internet. 70"LED TVs placed in every classroom and new projectors in 10 classrooms. 2021 Mr. Buckland was appointed Principal for our Kāhui Ako, we hosted the Matariki Festival and we had a Tsunami evacuation. In 2022 we purchased a new van and car, upgraded the bus bay, the Sanctuary was completed and the new Horticulture Block began.

In 2023 Te Wao Nui a Tane (7|8 block) and Nga Kaitaki o te Moana (Science Block) opened, we purchased a hybrid car and over \$300k of new furniture was delivered.

Thank you Mr Buckland for all you have done for students and staff at Bream Bay College. You have left us with a significant legacy, including pedagogical shifts, building projects and pastoral care.





WELCOME TO MR COSGROVE

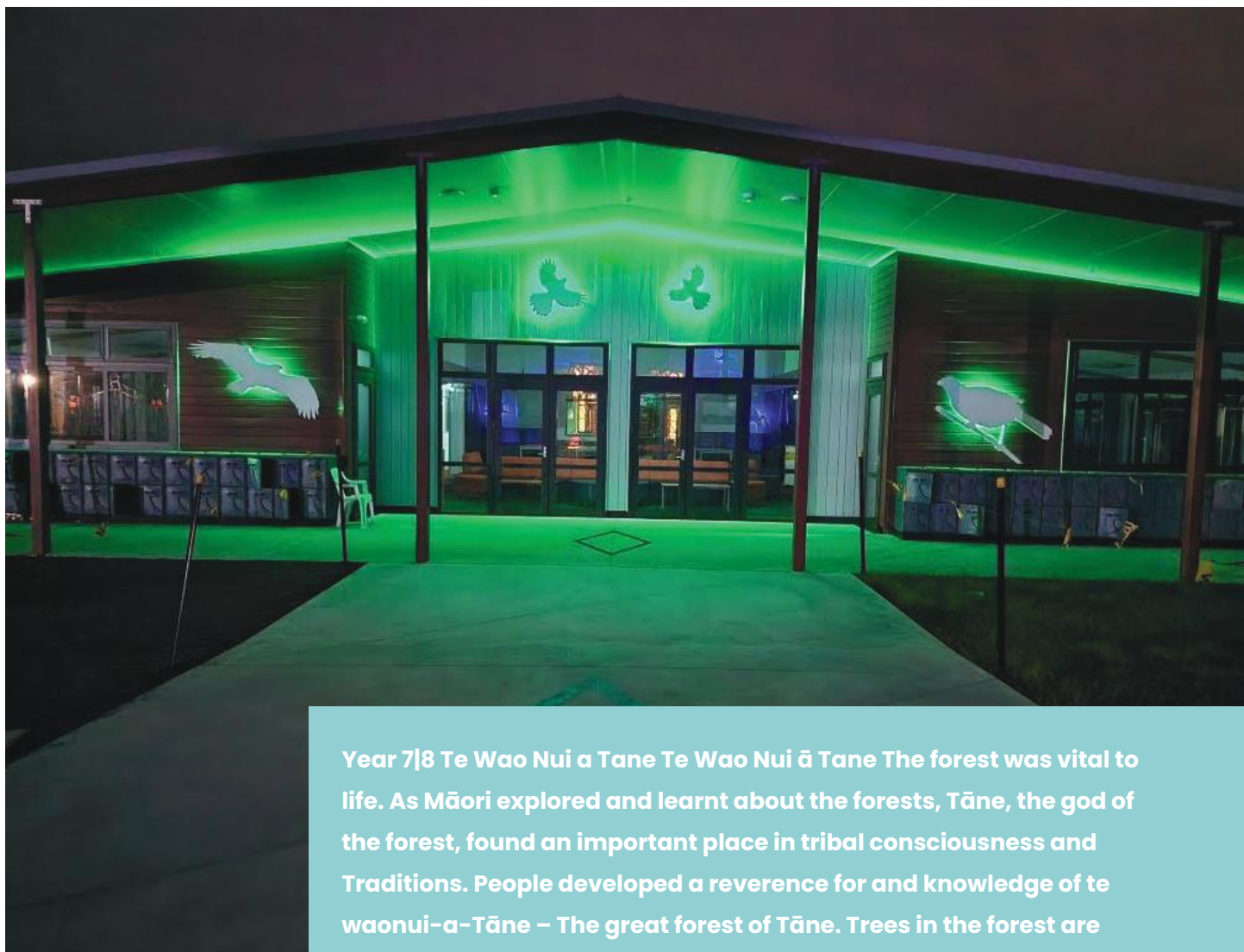

OUR NEW BUILDINGS

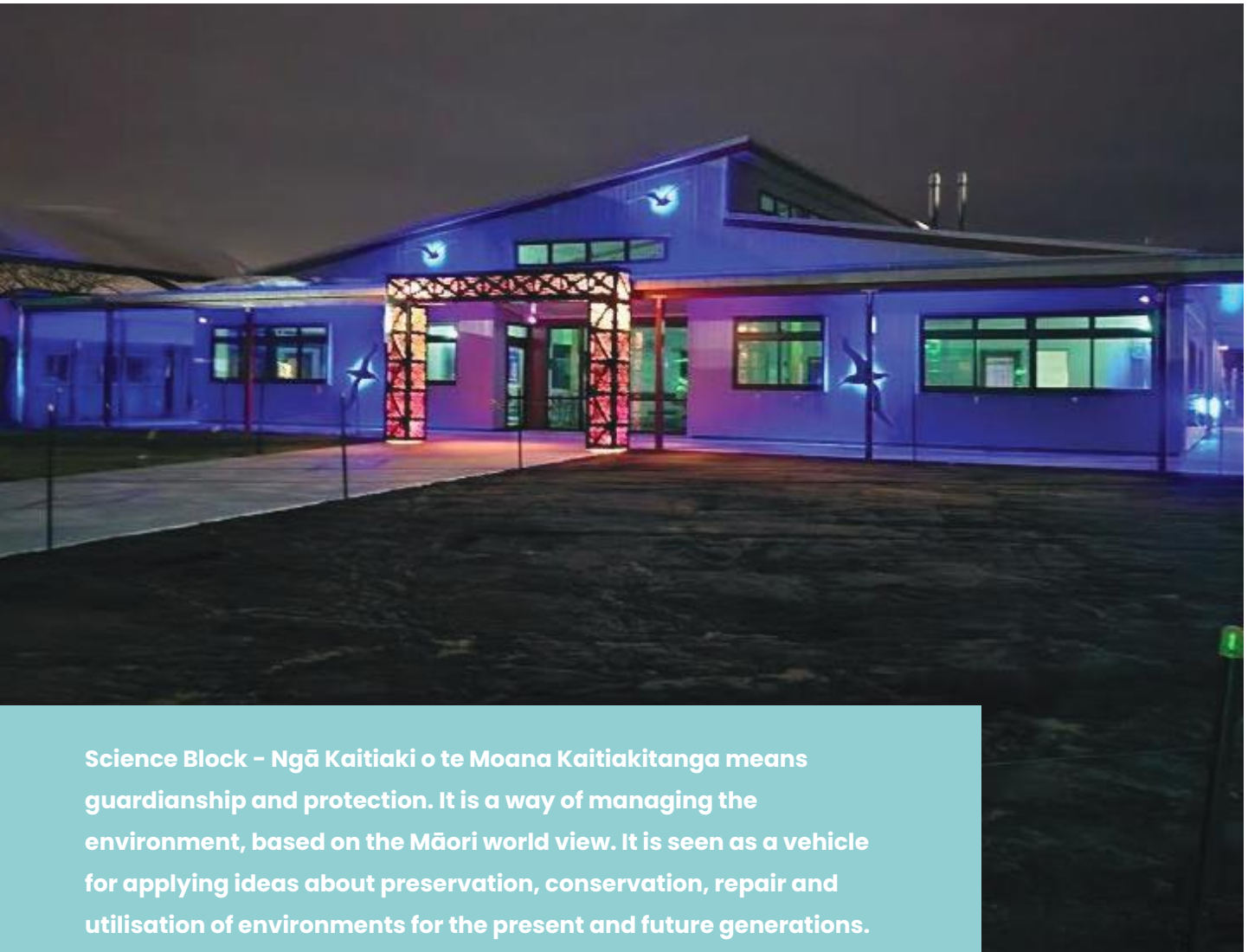
Bream Bay College staff, students and community participated in a pre-dawn service to bless the new buildings Te Wao nui ā Tane (Yr 7&8 block) and Ngā Kaitiaki o te Moana (Science block). The call of the Karanga and pūtātara sounded out over the darkness as the karakia began. Led by our 2 chosen puhi, the large crowd moved around the building before entering the inside touching all facets of the building to add Mauri (life force) into our 2 learning spaces.

Karakia was performed by our Patuharakeke kaumatua Lenny Namana, Pera Mackie and Wi Pirihī



Year 7|8 Te Wao Nui ā Tane
Te Wao Nui ā Tane The forest was vital to life. As Māori explored and learnt about the forests, Tāne, the god of the forest, found an important place in tribal consciousness and Traditions. People developed a reverence for and knowledge of te waonui-ā-Tāne – The great forest of Tāne. Trees in the forest are seen as Tāne-mahuta, rising to separate earth and sky. Tāne, the tree, holds the sky aloft, bringing light into the world. The word 'tika' means erect, upright and correct – as a tree is upright and erect. It informs the concepts of tikanga – correct behavior or action – and whakatika, which means to arise. Correct behaviors arise from within a person, as a tree rises from the ground. The name 'Te Wao Nui ā Tane' exemplifies our Mana Values by promoting a learning space that is 'Tika' in demonstrating the Tikanga of our Kura.

and could be heard throughout the entire experience. It truly was a beautiful occasion; one that will forever be etched in my memory. Why do we Karakia? Newly constructed Whare are made of timber from the forests of the Atua, Tāne-mahuta. The tapu on the house has to be lifted so that the building can be used by everybody. Tohunga recites karakia outside the building and the building is named then we proceed inside the building and karakia continues.



Science Block – Ngā Kaitiaki o te Moana Kaitiakitanga means guardianship and protection. It is a way of managing the environment, based on the Māori world view. It is seen as a vehicle for applying ideas about preservation, conservation, repair and utilisation of environments for the present and future generations. Kaitiakitanga invites people to form and maintain relationships with the environment in which we live. Our people are closely connected to the sea with this amazing resource right at our doorstep. The name Ngā Kaitiaki o te Moana suggests a responsibility to our moana environment by celebrating the sea life that thrive within it. Each of our Science classes have expressed a desire to name classes after sea creatures and have sea life adorn their pathways and walls. Future opportunities to collaborate with local Iwi on Kaitiaki Moana projects have also been made possible adding Mana to the name in an authentic context.

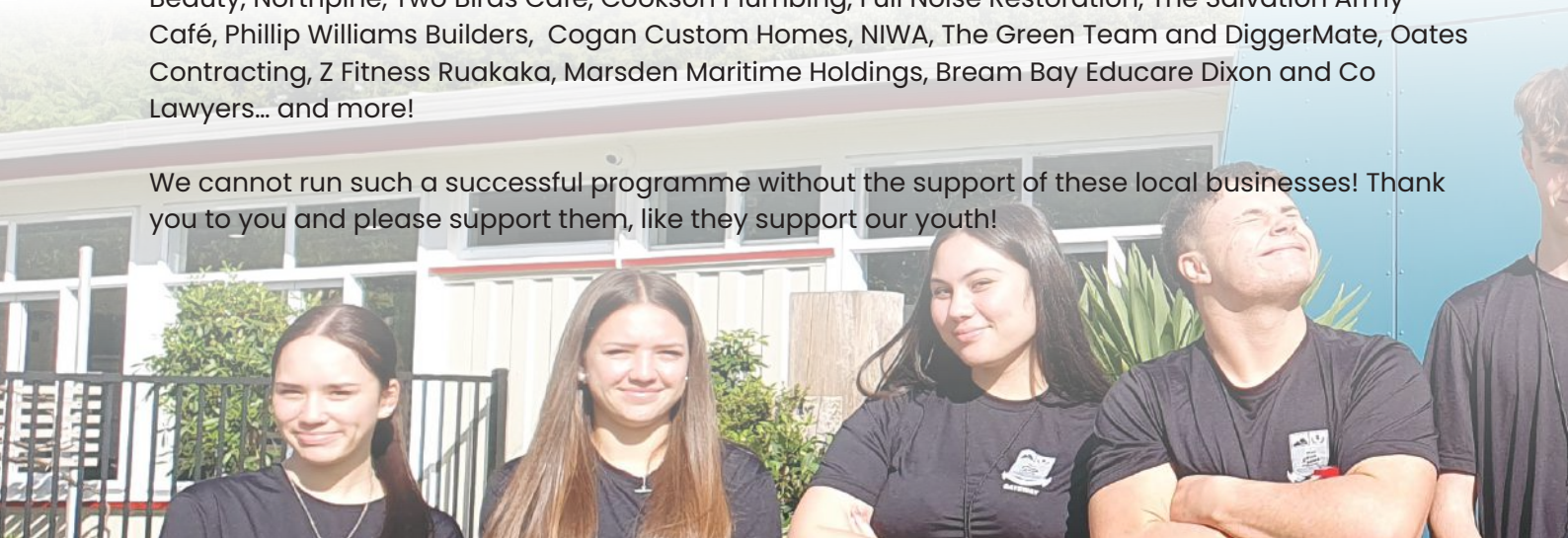
GATEWAY / STAR programme 2023
