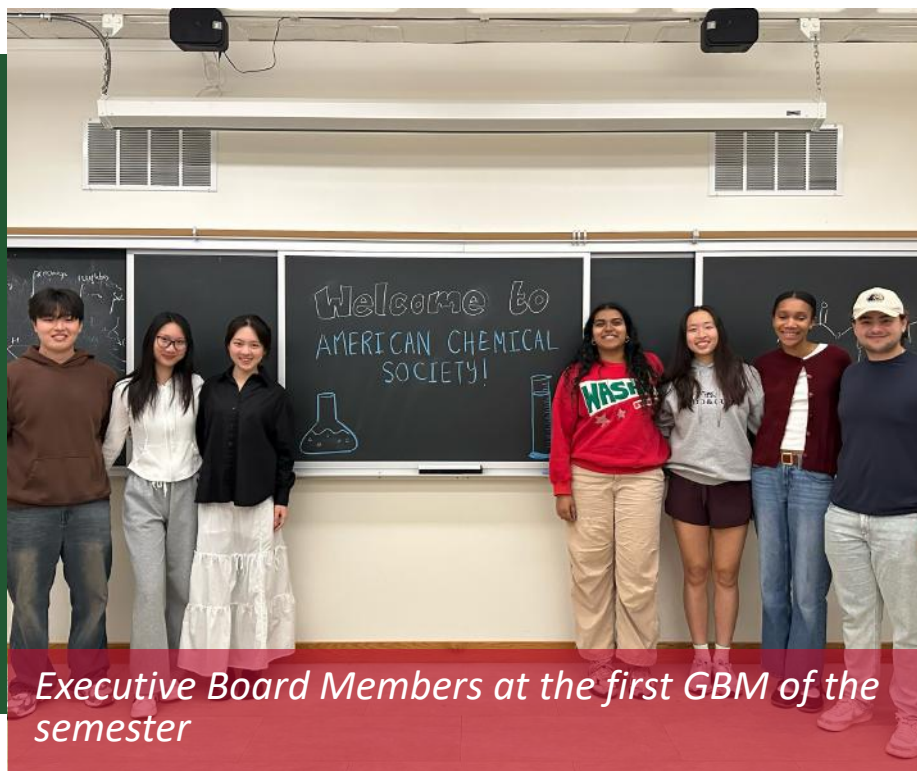

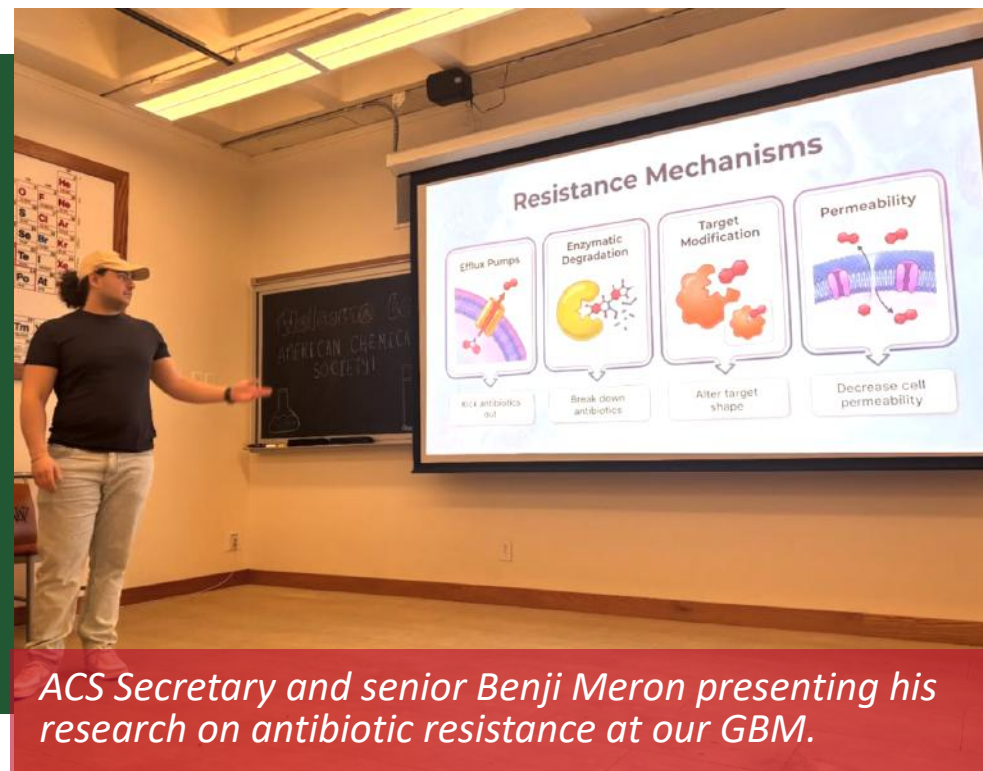

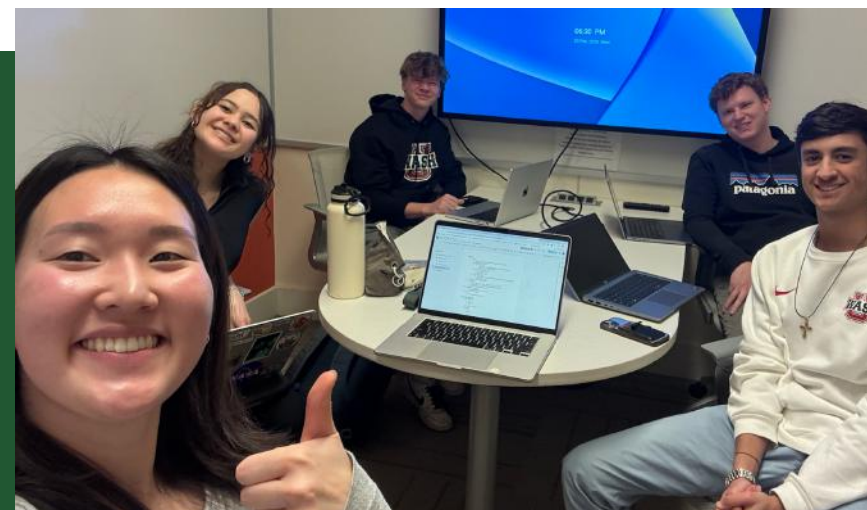

About Us

WashU Satellite is Washington University in St. Louis's only student-led space mission engineering team. Our mission is to train future engineers, inspire interdisciplinary research, and provide consistent space access to advance WashU research. Since its founding in January 2024, the team has grown from five students operating out of a dorm to over 60 members across engineering, physics, business, and design. Current projects include AIRIS, a gamma-ray imaging system that will fly on a weather balloon over Antarctica, SCALAR, our first CubeSat designed to orient itself in space using custom-built magnetorquers, and GS-2, our high-gain helical antenna designed to communicate with future satellites and space-borne missions.

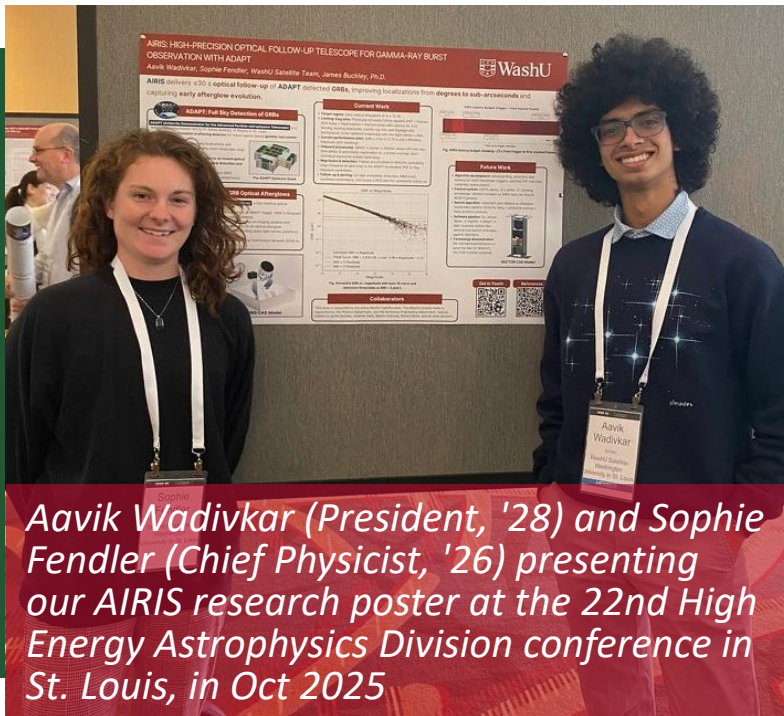

We're all people who get excited about building cool things. From caveman-themed parties to listening to the ISS with our own hardware, we merge engineering experience and industry exposure with real research outcomes. We've also had the chance to present our work at aerospace and astrophysics conferences!

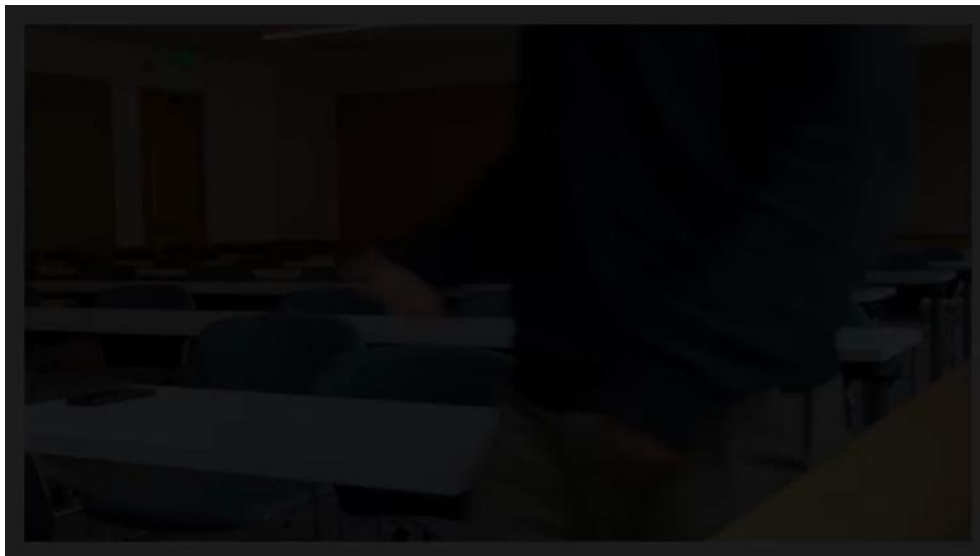
One thing that really defines our culture is the need to teach each other, since you don't learn satellite design in any class. At the start of Fall 2025, we ran a three-week satellite bootcamp led by members of our team, during which students worked in small groups to design mission concepts and present satellite objectives of their choice. That bootcamp was created by members who had gone through a similar experience during the previous summer through the University Nanosatellite Program (UNP) Mission Concept course. Through a proposal we submitted to UNP, three of our students were selected to further develop our CubeSat concept and spent the summer at the Space Dynamics Laboratory, where they advanced our mission idea while working alongside and learning directly from DoD and NASA engineers.



WashU Satellite



At the start of the Fall 2025 semester, members of WashU Satellite participated in a three-week satellite bootcamp, led by chief physicist Sophie Fendler and chief mechanical engineer Jack Galloway. During the previous summer, the students received similar mission design lessons after being selected for the University Nanosatellite Program. They then interned at the Space Dynamics Laboratory to advance the design of VECTOR, our CubeSat proposal, and received project funding from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research for the satellite. Jack and Sophie then brought back their UNP experience and shared it with the team. Members collaborated in small groups to prepare a presentation on a satellite objective of their choice. 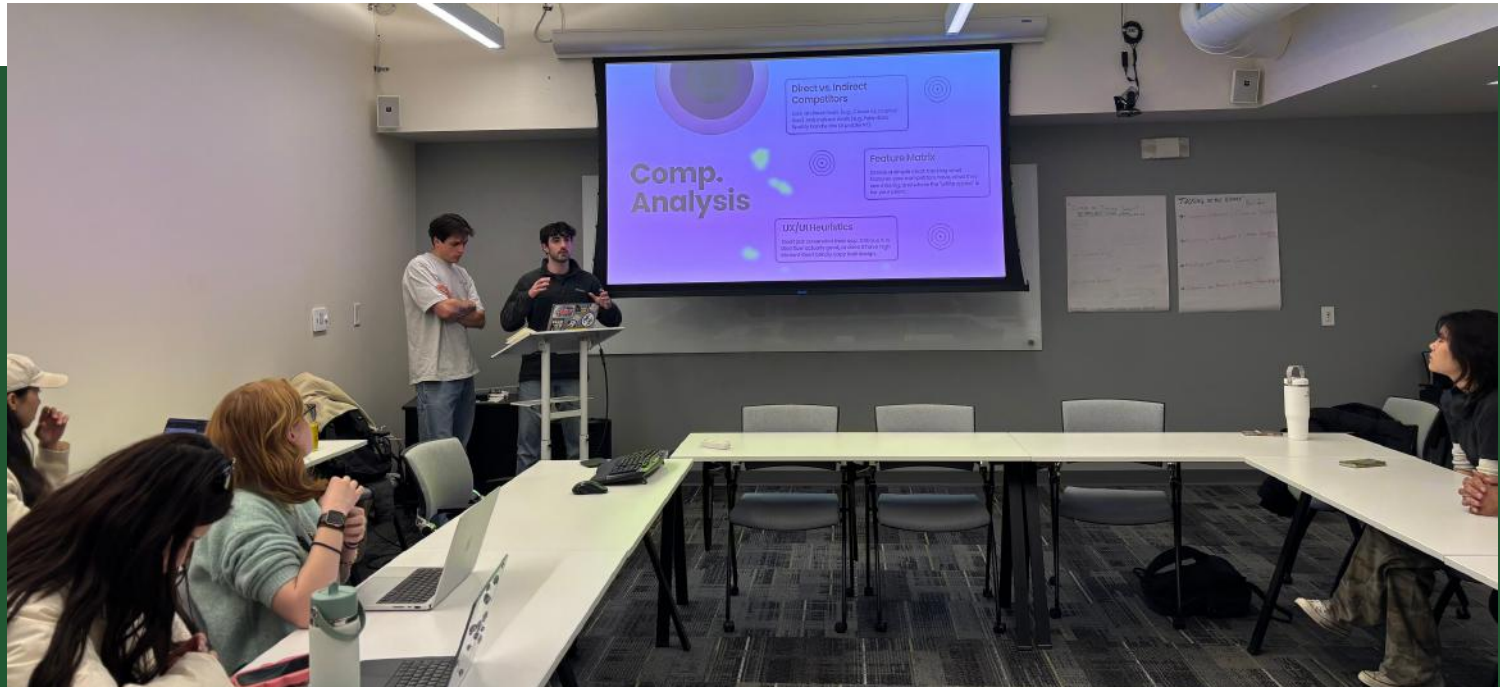
About Us:

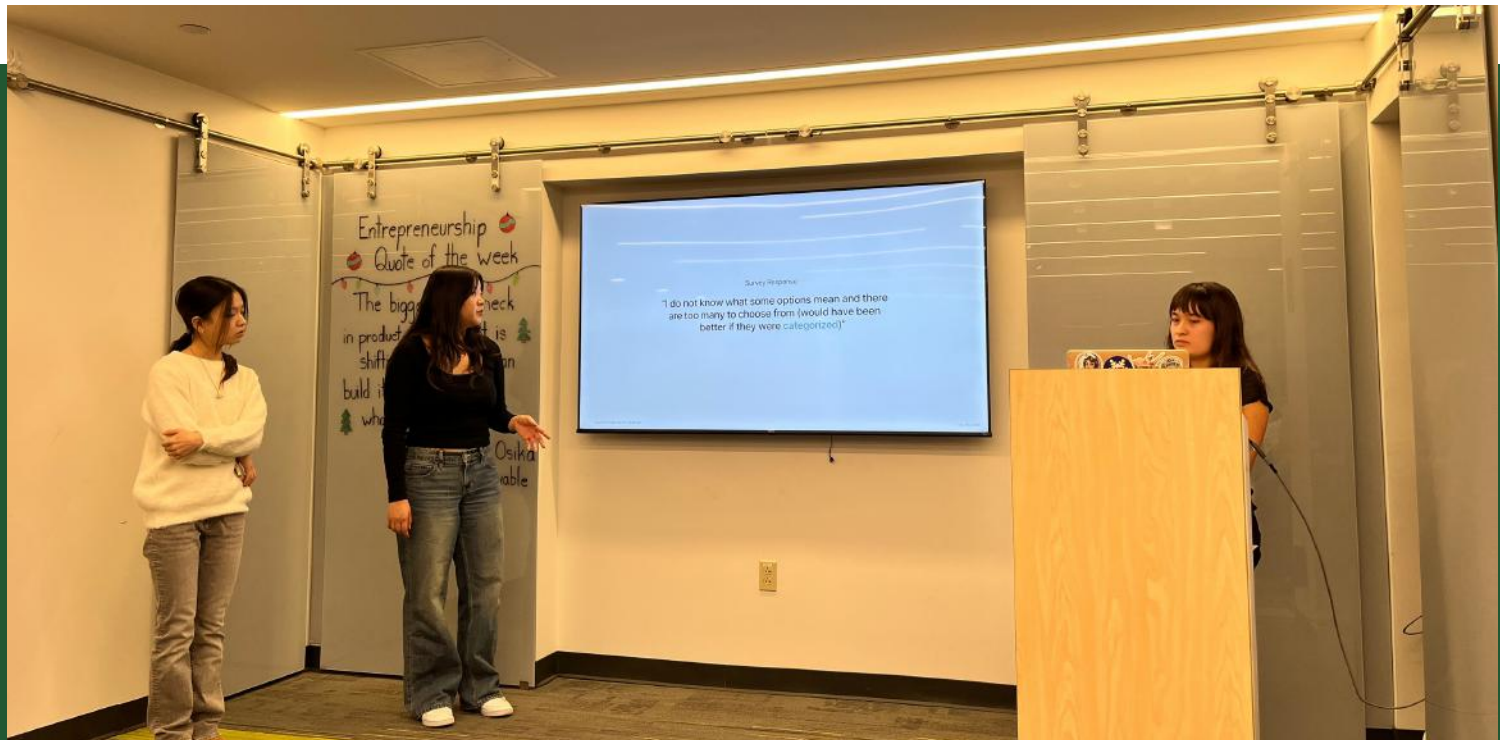

About Us:

WU Design-Build-Fly (WUDBF) is a radio-controlled (RC) aircraft engineering design team that gives students hands-on experience in aerospace design through participation in the annual international American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) Design-Build-Fly competition. Each year features a new mission, requiring the team to design and build an entirely new aircraft. Past designs have included a package-dropping plane, a glider-releasing aircraft, and a medical mission aircraft. This year's mission challenges teams to build an RC aircraft capable of towing and releasing a banner in flight while carrying payloads of rubber duck "passengers" and a hockey puck. In 2024 WUDBF placed 19th out of 107 teams, and in 2025 they placed 35th out of 112 teams internationally. WUDBF's mission is threefold: to teach practical engineering skills beyond the classroom, provide students the opportunity to design and construct a complete aircraft, and cultivate a strong aerospace community by fostering connections between students and professionals in the field.

Founded in 2016, WUDBF brings together students from diverse majors and backgrounds who share an interest in aerospace and engineering design. By working on a multidisciplinary team, members develop strong communication and collaboration skills while gaining hands-on experience in designing, building, and testing aircraft. The team is open to students of all majors, and no prior experience is required to join. There is no application process, everyone is welcome. The organization consists of seven sub-teams, each led by a team lead: Aerodynamics and Payload, Admin, Avionics, Propulsion, Structures, Manufacturing, and Simulation and Development.

The production provides its participants with not only experience in performing arts, but also a place to hone skills in research, program planning, implementation, set design, and many more as it is student-led and run. Black Anthology functions as a platform for students to showcase their talents while also exploring issues that affect the Black community and prominent historical eras. Over the past 36 years, Black Anthology has reflected on Black people and their interactions; pondered over movements pushing for Black independence and liberation, explored the relationships between Africans and African-Americans; reminded us of the impact of musical eras like Motown; revisited the creation of Black Studies departments; recreated the Black student experience; and deconstructed the complexities of the Black experience in St. Louis, in America, and worldwide.

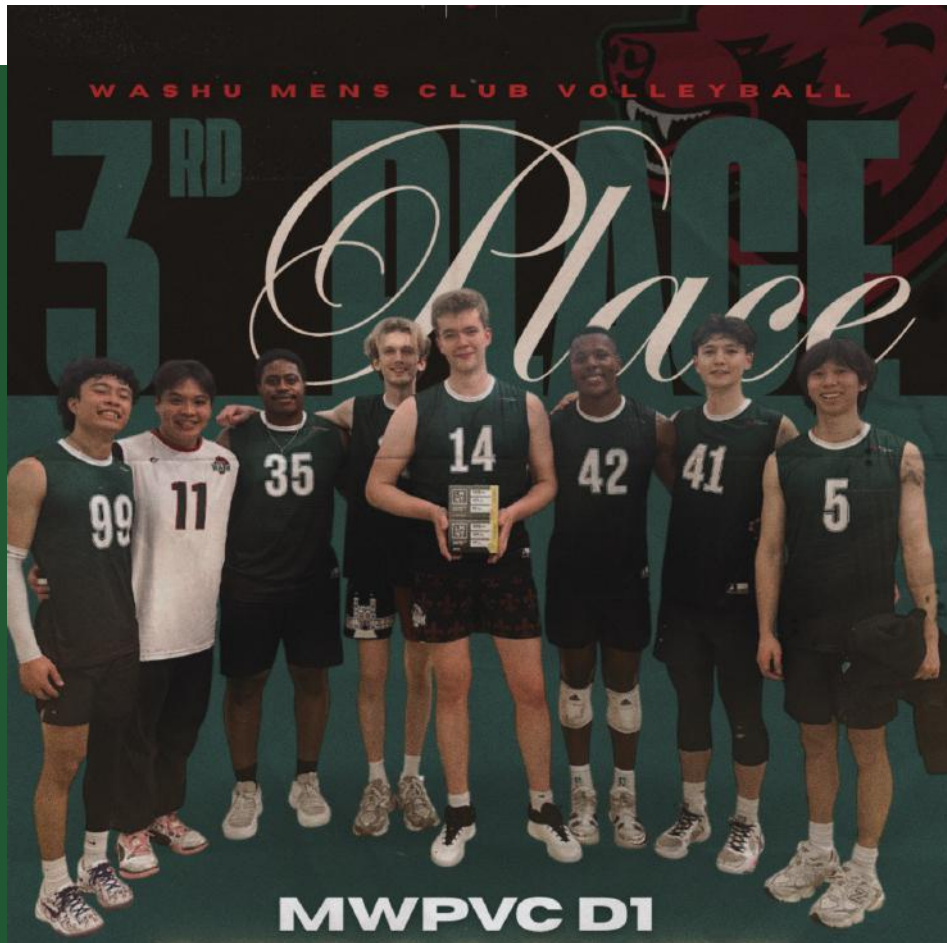
About Us:
