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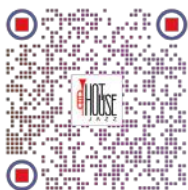
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PUBLISHERS CORNER

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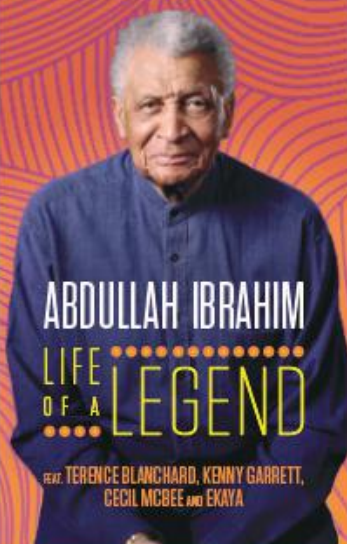
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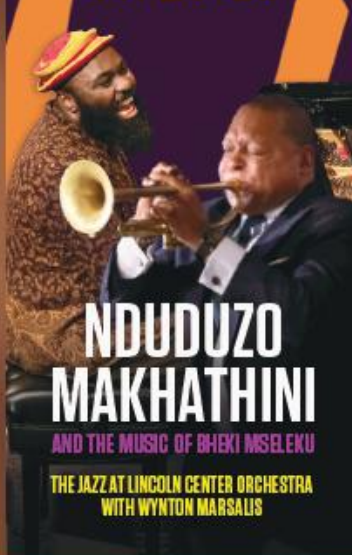

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ANAT COHEN

Virtuoso Clarinetist and Musical Polyglot

WHEN CRITICS AND MUSIC JOURNALISTS consistently bestow honors on a musician, year after year, you can be certain that that musician has honed their talent and creativity to the highest of levels and reached a true pinnacle as a player. For an amazing 18 years in a row, multi-instrumentalist **Anat Cohen** has received the Jazz Journalists award for best clarinet player among her peers. That outstanding record may be unprecedented, and it surely is for good reasons.

Virtuoso clarinetist and tenor saxophone player Anat grew up in a musical family in Israel. Her two brothers are both accomplished jazz musicians. Older brother Yuval plays saxophone and brother Avishai plays trumpet. The three siblings are all highly regarded in the New York music scene and beyond. The siblings each received scholarships to attend the Berklee College of Music. It was while studying jazz there that Anat developed a lifelong fascination with world music, especially Latin and Brazilian Choro. Anat's playing is eclectic and she draws on many influences, melding them into her own unique and creative style. In the music programs Anat attended in Israel, she first studied classical formats, but soon immersed herself studying and playing transcriptions of New Orleans jazz. She also grew up around Klezmer music, and like a polyglot who can easily switch from one tongue to another, she became a musical multi-linguist.

Growing up, Anat's mom played accordion and taught music to kindergarteners. Her dad also had a great love for music, but the grandparents had made it clear that music would not be an acceptable career to pursue. Perhaps because of the obstacles her parents encountered, things worked out differently for Anat and her brothers. Anat

says, "Unlike my grandparents, our parents never put any doubts in our minds that we could make music a major part of our lives. We went to special schools for the arts, and our parents chauffeured us to our music lessons."

Anat and her siblings are all close in age, so they played together quite a bit as teens. At home, they had a recording of a Gerry Mulligan album that they all loved. Anat recalls, "It was a piano-less quartet and of course we were three wind instruments, so learning from that music was really intense and later on, I realized the importance of that album in helping to inspire our vision." Anat attributes a lot of her musical growth to the other students who she met and played with at Berklee. "Berklee is known for having students from all over the world, and many of the international students formed a tight community. At Berklee, I began listening to a lot of Brazilian music, and it influenced my whole rhythmic concept, because it's music that comes from your feet, not from your brain."

Anat had a formative post-conservatory stint playing with the all-female Diva Jazz Orchestra. As she developed as a player and a composer, she began branching out, playing with many other top musicians. Her penchant for world music, particularly Brazilian Choro music, manifested through her group, Choro Aventuroso. But Anat is not one to impose limitations or borders on herself, so she began to initiate multiple other projects that were all close to her heart. Her love for large ensemble jazz became manifested through her group, the Anat Cohen Tentet. Her group Quartetinho is made up of four multi-instrumentalists, each of whom, like her, plays at a virtuosic level. Over the years, she has played and recorded a live duo album with the great jazz pianist Fred Hersch, and of course, she continues to write and record with her siblings, in the group The 3 Cohens. Their most recent album was released this March on Anat's own Anzic record label.

Writing about one of Anat's performances in the early 2000s, NY Times critic Joe Nocera proffered a great compliment upon her, crediting Anat Cohen "in reuniting the clarinet with jazz music." This is not mere hyperbole. In another description, Nocera describes her playing by saying, "On the upper registers she could evoke deep joy. On the lower registers, she could conjure a deep, soulful melancholy. Her improvisations weren't just bebop fast, they had a clarity that is quite rare... and she made it look effortless."

In October, Anat will bring Quartetinho to Columbia University's Miller Theater. Quartetinho, which means "little quartet," consists of Anat on clarinet and bass clarinet, Vitor Goncalves on accordion and piano, Tal Mashiach on bass and seven string guitar and James Shipp on percussion, vibraphone and electronics. The music they perform can be very difficult to classify, but you can be guaranteed that it will be music that is totally unique. It's also music that is pure, ethereal and hits one emotional height after another - in short, everything that music should be!

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MARCUS GILMORE

Inheriting Rhythms, Forging New Paths

MARCUS GILMORE, THE INVENTIVE DRUMMER and composer, represents the third generation of creative artists from the Haynes family. He is the grandson of revered pioneer Roy Haynes, and the nephew of Roy's sons: cornetist and composer Graham Haynes and drummer Craig Holiday Haynes.

"It feels great to be able to gain a significant historical perspective and knowledge of the music from my family, that's pretty cool," says Marcus. "Up until several months ago I had my grandfather still walking the planet, and he was still innovating until the end, so he was an incredible example for me in so many ways."

Marcus knew at age 7 he wanted to be a professional drummer, but it wasn't until his 10th birthday that his grandfather gave him his own set. "I never really felt any pressure from the family," he recalls. "Once I realized I wanted to be a musician, I took it very seriously. Nobody ever had to tell me to practice—especially my grandfather. I did it automatically."

At 16, while attending Manhattan's famed LaGuardia High School for the Arts, Marcus landed his first professional gig: a European tour with Clark Terry. His mother and the school gave permission. "LaGuardia encouraged us to be professional musicians," he says. "The teachers and community were always making sure students were aware of opportunities." He also attended Juilliard's Music Advancement Program and The Manhattan School of Music, and was chosen for the GRAMMY Band, which meant rehearsals in the host city, performances at official events, and attending the awards ceremony.

Raised in the Black church and surrounded by music from Stevie Wonder to Eddie Palmieri, Marcus absorbed a wide spectrum of sounds. "At LaGuardia there were so many kids from different parts of the city that expanded my musical palette," he says. "I was playing with indie rock musicians, popular leading musicians, and all kinds of stuff."

That openness carried into his career. He became an integral part of bands led by Graham, Ravi Coltrane, Pharoah Sanders, Cassandra Wilson, Steve Coleman, and Ambrose Akinmusire, among others. He was a key member of the Vijay Iyer Trio and collaborated with artists from Flying Lotus to Dead Prez. Like his grandfather, he enjoyed long ties with Pat Metheny and Chick Corea, winning a GRAMMY with Chick's band in 2019.

"My first tour with Chick was in 2006; there were so many contexts we explored—chamber group, trios, fusion, electronica, flamenco," Marcus explains. "I learned a lot about composition from him."

In recent years, Marcus has expanded into orchestral writing. His first orchestral piece, commissioned by the American Composers Orchestra, debuted in 2020 with members of the Cape Town



Philharmonic, followed by a 2023 premiere in New York. "It was informative and fun; I have plans to write more," he says.

Still, he resists labels. "I hesitate to say I play jazz, since my grandfather was an architect of this music. I play creative music. I like the openness and freedom—I don't want to predetermine what my music will be in the future."

For over a year, Marcus has led his own band, recently performing at the Gnawa Festival in Morocco. His new album, *Journey to the New: Live at the Village Vanguard* (2025), captures seven tracks of original music, plus a cover of Geri Allen's "In the Morning." Marcus calls Geri—an acclaimed pianist, composer, and educator, and his sister-in-law—"a guiding force whose work continues to inspire me." The title track, clocking in at 14 minutes, showcases Marcus in full command, comping with intensity while pianist David Virelles adds dazzling interplay. The band also features bassist Rashaan Carter, electric bassist Burniss Travis, multi-instrumentalist Morgan Guerin, and guitarist Emmanuel Michael.

This fall, Marcus returns to the Village Vanguard, where his grandfather once lit up the stage. His group plays October 14–19, followed by an October 21–26 run in a trio led by Fred Hersch with Drew Gress.

Expect absorbing performances from Marcus and his generation of innovators. They play fusion, jazz, and everything in between. Shhh! It's time to experience a creative *Journey to the New*.

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ABDULLAH IBRAHIM

Architect of South Africa's Jazz Revolution

FOR AN ASTONISHING 75 YEARS, THE MUSIC of pianist/composer Abdullah Ibrahim, the NEA Jazz Master, paralleled South Africa's struggle against apartheid, and the birth of a new multiracial, multi-ethnic and multicultural nation, with President Nelson Mandela as its leader. Abdullah's sonic stew mirrored all his country's cultural and artistic complexities: a mix of Black jazz, church melodies, African indigenous folk songs, chants and rhythms, played with a soulful synthesis of Duke Ellington and Thelonious Monk's dark and lovely pianisms.

Abdullah is currently on a world tour, and his engagement at Jazz at Lincoln Center entitled *Life of a Legend: a Birthday Celebration* (October 9) befits the kingly nature of Abdullah's legacy and status. Abdullah is backed by his longstanding group, Ekaya, which means "home" in the isiXhosa language, and features tenor saxophonist Lance Bryant; trombonist Michael Pallas; baritone saxophonist Josh Lee; Cleave Guyton on alto saxophone, flute and piccolo, bassist and cellist Noah Jackson and drummer Will Terrell. Special guests are Abdullah's ex-sidemen, including trumpeter Terence Blanchard, alto/soprano saxophonist Kenny Garrett, and bassist Cecil McBee. "We honor the tradition of rites of passage: the concerts at Jazz at Lincoln Center October 3 & 4," Abdullah proudly proclaims. "Our musicians are four generations – elders and current young."

The concert draws from Abdullah's compositions, recorded on over 70 albums, which range from *The Journey* (Chiaroscuro, 1978), *African Marketplace* (Elektra, 1979) and *Water from an Ancient Well* (Tiptoe, 1985), to *African Suite* (Tiptoe, 1998), *African Magic* (Enja, 2001) and *Solitude* (Gearbox, 2020). His latest recording, *3* (Gearbox, 2023), is a double album live recording from London's Barbican featuring Abdullah, Cleave and Noah, rendering Abdullah's classic compositions like, "Mindif," "Water from an Ancient Well," "The Wedding," "Blue Bolero," Duke's "In a Sentimental Mood" and Monk's "Skippy" in an intricate, chamber jazz ambience. On all his compositions, Abdullah's piano sound is concise and weighted with Duke and Monk's rich and dark chords. Abdullah possesses the virtuosity of intent, not technique. As he cryptically says, "The secrets are embedded and hidden in the basics - simplicity profound."

The source of Abdullah's sound is his birthplace, Capetown, where he was born Adolphus Johannes Brand, surrounded by a smorgasbord of sounds:

jazz, African rhythms, ragas, and African Methodist Episcopal hymns. He took up the piano at the age of 6 and was a professional musician by the time he was 15 and acquired the nickname "Dollar." Abdullah traveled to Sophiatown in 1959, where he joined the influential group The Jazz Epistles, which included trumpeter Hugh Masakela. In 1960, they recorded *Jazz Epistle – Verse 1* (Continental, 1960) – the first Black South Africans to do so. But Apartheid was against jazz. Eventually, the Jazz Epistles broke up.

One year after Johannes moved to Europe, Duke heard Abdullah's trio at the Africana Club in Zurich. Duke was so impressed that he released *Duke Ellington Presents The Dollar Brand Trio* (1964) that same year on the Reprise label. "Ellington for us is the wise esteemed elder in the village," Abdullah fondly recalls. "He who knows all the pathways, rivers [and] mountains. We treasure his guidance."

Abdullah and his wife, Sathima Bea Benjamin, moved to New York in 1965, and he debuted at The Newport Jazz Festival. The next year, he toured with Duke and led his orchestra on five occasions. Abdullah briefly enrolled in the Juilliard School of Music in the mid '60s and early '70s, and collaborated with several prominent Black jazz musicians including Max Roach, Don Cherry, John Coltrane, Archie Shepp and Ornette Coleman. Those collaborations occurred during the height of the Black Power era, which inspired Abdullah to add more African elements to his music. It was also in that era that Abdullah became a Muslim after a brief return to South Africa in 1968, and he journeyed to Mecca in 1970.

In June 1974, Abdullah released his best known composition, "Mannenberg," an upbeat, uptempo, infectious number that served as the musical rallying cry of the Anti-Apartheid movement. By this time, Abdullah was an outspoken opponent of that racist system. When Mandela heard the song in his jail cell on Robben Island, he remarked, "Freedom is at hand." Abdullah performed for Mandela's 1994 Presidential Inauguration. Now in his 90s, Abdullah shows no sign of slowing down. He still leads his group, Ekaya, though he often performs in solo, duo and trio settings, conducts world tours, and built the M7 Academy for South African Musicians. It was Abdullah's music that gave all South Africans a new home.

and the Puerto Rican Legacy of the Harlem Hellfighters

IN CELEBRATION OF HISPANIC HERITAGE

Month, I want to share a story that rarely makes it into the history books – the story of Puerto Rican musicians who marched and played with the Harlem Hellfighters in World War I. Among them was a young trombonist from Aguadilla, Rafael Hernández, who would become Puerto Rico's greatest composer.

I first became curious about this when I noticed how absent Puerto Ricans were from official accounts. Ken Burns's Jazz series devoted an entire section to the Harlem Hellfighters but never mentioned the 18 Puerto Rican musicians who played alongside them. One of those was Rafael, barely in his twenties. How could this be ignored? That erasure pushed me to dig deeper, and with my friend and colleague Bobby Sanabria, we began piecing the story together.

Rafael was born in 1891 in Aguadilla, a coastal town on Puerto Rico's northwest shore affectionately called "the place where even the rocks sing." His grandmother, knowing the power of music, encouraged her grandchildren to take it seriously. Victoria became a formidable violinist and pianist, Jesús – "Pocholo" – took up clarinet, and Rafael threw himself into everything: cornet, trombone, violin, piano, guitar and euphonium. Music was the family's lifeblood.

In 1914 a Japanese circus touring Latin America heard of the young prodigy and hired him. That job brought him to San Juan, where he joined the municipal band directed by Manuel Tizol, uncle of Juan Tizol, who would later write "Caravan" for Duke Ellington. Rafael also played violin with the symphony orchestra and began composing seriously. Then, in 1917, came the meeting that changed his life.

James Reese Europe was already a towering figure in Black music. He had founded the Clef Club in Harlem in 1910, an organization that doubled as a union, booking agency, and mutual aid society for Black musicians. His 100-piece orchestra had performed at Carnegie Hall, the first Black group to do so. The city's richest families – the Carnegies, Rockefellers, Vanderbilts – hired him to provide music at their elegant parties. He insisted his musicians maintain dignity and elegance – always in tuxedos, always professional.

When James became musical director for Irene and Vernon Castle, America's most famous dance team, he introduced the nation to tango and the Brazilian maxixe. It was America's first flirtation with Latin rhythms.

With the U.S. entering World War I, James was commissioned as a lieutenant and tasked with forming a regimental band for the 15th Infantry of the New York National Guard, an all-Black unit. He wanted more than the standard 28 pieces. He envisioned a massive brass-and-reed machine that would lift spirits and rival any band in the Army.

He recruited stride pianist Lucky Roberts, drummer Buddy Gilmore, and dancer Bill "Bojangles" Robinson as drum major. But after rehearsals, he realized the clarinet section was weak. He needed disciplined players who could read music fluently – and he needed them fast. So, he went to Puerto Rico.

For decades, Puerto Rico's bandas municipales had trained musicians with military precision. These bands played every Sunday in town plazas, blending European marches with Caribbean flavor. They demanded discipline, sight-reading skills, and versatility. By the early 20th century, Puerto Rico was producing Afro-Puerto Rican musicians who could hold their own in any setting.

James knew about this talent. The Victor Talking Machine Company had just recorded bands in San Juan, including Tizol's ensemble. And with the Jones-Shafroth Act of 1917 granting Puerto Ricans U.S. citizenship, it was easy for James to enlist them. With Tizol's help, he recruited 18 players, among them Rafael and his brother Pocholo.

Imagine these young men leaving tropical Puerto Rico for winter in New York, hardly speaking English, but carrying their instruments and determination. Soon critics were marveling that "the dozen or more Puerto Ricans who made up the reed section cannot be excelled." Rafael, on trombone, stood out immediately.

In 1918 the regiment sailed for France. The men carried rifles and music alike. But racism shadowed them. They were denied the right to march in New York's farewell parade – "Black is not a color of the rainbow," one officer sneered. In France, the Army refused to allow them to fight alongside white Americans. Instead, they were placed under French command, redesignated the 369th U.S. Infantry Regiment, and issued French helmets and rifles.

In combat, the Hellfighters fought with such ferocity that the Germans gave them their nickname. They spent more days under fire than any other American unit and earned the Croix de Guerre, France's highest honor.

Meanwhile, the band electrified audiences. They played ragtime and proto-jazz with swagger – syncopated rhythms, riffs, growls, and blues licks the French had never heard. Noble Sissle recalled how civilians, Allied soldiers, even German prisoners broke into laughter and dance, hit by what he called the "Jazz germ." Colonel Hayward joked that if Germans ever captured one of his Puerto Rican soldiers, dressed in a French uniform and speaking Spanish, the intelligence officers would be baffled. The band didn't just play concerts – they shaped daily life. Noble remembered how every morning

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at dawn, the musicians marched the regiment out of camp with a ragtime tune, and every evening they played them back in. They carried wounded soldiers from trenches as stretcher-bearers, often under fire. Rafael later said he spent more time running to help the injured than playing his trombone. Of the 44 band members, 18 were Puerto Rican – nearly half.

When the war ended, the Hellfighters returned to New York as heroes. On February 17, 1919, they led a parade down Fifth Avenue, the first time Black people were honored in that way. The streets overflowed with cheering crowds as Rafael marched, trombone in hand, behind Drum Major Bojangles.

Just months later, tragedy struck. James was stabbed to death backstage in Boston by one of his drummers. For the Puerto Rican musicians who had followed him from the Caribbean to the trenches of France, the shock must have been immense. The band tried to carry on under Sissle, recording for the Pathé label, but soon disbanded. Some believe Rafael was one of the trombonists on those sessions, perhaps responsible for the fiery solo break in “Memphis Blues.”

Rafael remained in New York, where Puerto Rican music was blossoming. He played with Lucky Roberts, then directed orchestras in Havana, where he wrote “Capullito de alelí” and the guaracha “Cachita.” Back in New York, he formed Trio Borinquen and Cuarteto Victoria, named for his sister.

Together with Victoria, Rafael opened what may have been the first Puerto Rican-owned music store in New York City. The shop became more than a business – it was a classroom and gathering place. Young Tito Puente studied piano there with Victoria for eight years, making the Hernández household a training ground for the next generation of Latin music. It was in that same store that Rafael composed “Lamento borincano,” his most famous song, which captured the hardships of Puerto Rico’s jíbaro farmers during the Depression. By the 1930s he was in Mexico, writing classics like “El cumbanchero” and composing for the golden age of Mexican cinema, sometimes even appearing onscreen with Cantinflas. His bands launched singers like Bobby Capó and Myrta Silva, whose popularity in Cuba was so great that when she left La Sonora Matancera, fans doubted her replacement – until they discovered her name was Celia Cruz.

Eventually, Rafael returned to Puerto Rico, where he lived until his death in 1965. By then he had written over 2,000 songs across nearly every genre: plena, danza, zarzuela, bolero, guaracha, rumba. He stands alongside Agustín Lara of Mexico and Ernesto Lecuona of Cuba as one of Latin America’s three great composers – though he was by far the most prolific and versatile.

Victoria kept the Bronx music shop running until 1969, when she sold it to Mike Amadeo, who renamed it Casa Amadeo. In 2001, it was added to the National Register of Historic Places, the first mainland Puerto Rican site to receive that honor. Across the street once stood the 845 Club, where

jazz legends like Miles Davis, Art Blakey, Herbie Hancock, and Chick Corea played. The echoes of Rafael’s influence stretched across boroughs, nations, and generations.

When Bobby and I first visited the 369th Armory in Harlem, we saw displays honoring the regiment but no mention of the Puerto Ricans. That silence drove us to organize tribute concerts, digitize regimental sheet music, and keep telling the story. In 2013, Bobby’s Multiverse Big Band honored Rafael with a concert at Hostos Community College, joined by the 319th Army Band under Puerto Rican conductor Luis Santiago Sierra.

Today, the 369th Experience in Washington, D.C., recreates the Hellfighters’ concerts with student musicians from Historically Black Colleges – again including Puerto Ricans. In 2016, the regiment celebrated its centennial.

As we celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month, may we remember Rafael and his fellow Puerto Ricans who stood shoulder to shoulder with the Harlem Hellfighters. Their music carried hope through trenches, across oceans, and into history. May their legacy inspire another century of song.

Pioneers of the Modern Organ Trio Sound

THE LEGENDARY JAZZ GROUPS, FROM MILES to Coltrane to the great Bill Evans trios, all had something in common beyond the sheer mastery of their instruments and the mind-boggling musical talent that went along with that. It was an almost preternatural ability to listen to each other and blend their voices in a way in which the musical whole became greater than the sum its parts. The long-standing organ trio of Larry Goldings, Peter Bernstein and Bill Stewart have spent several decades honing and utilizing that same secret sauce in their music.

Each of these players are virtuosos. Larry was the DownBeat Critics Choice for best organist the last

two years in a row. Guitarist Peter is known for his thoughtful solos, often compared to musical storytelling, as well as for his vast knowledge and understanding of harmonic structure. He's consistently a top ten DownBeat Critics and Readers Choice in the guitar category. Drummer Bill is famous for his innovative approach to drumming and for the creative and soulful accompaniment he provides, that puts the focus on musical conversation. Guitar great Pat Methaney once called Bill "a bottomless pit of ideas." Individually they should be considered a "supergroup," but collectively they prove to be much more.

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Interaction, synergy and sophistication of interplay is at the core of this trio's greatness. Together they have culled a unique sound that pays respect to the great organ trios that have come before them, but that takes the organ trio genre to the next level. They may refer to the traditional blues and funk organ trio in some arrangements, while adding a more modern slant to the music, using more complex harmonic structures, that take surprising twists and turns. They often incorporate a more outside or free-jazz approach to their improvisation. Outside playing can sometimes be technical and intellectually focused, but this trio never comes across in that way, always keeping the melodic storytelling component at the forefront of their style of play. To date the trio has released 14 albums, the most recent being 2022's *Perpetual Pendulum* on Smoke Session Records.

The group's beginnings go all the way back to high school in the '80s, where Larry and Peter first met during a summer program at Eastman Music School. They hit it off, and Larry recalls, "We heard there was this new jazz program starting up at the New School, and I enrolled in 1986. Peter got there the following year after a year at Rutgers, and we continued where we left off. I had been strictly a piano player, but the little clubs available in NY, some of them didn't have pianos, and I got the idea to bring the keyboard around to play organ. One of my first calls was subbing for a bass player who asked me to just walk bass lines on the keyboard, and that became a regular gig. Peter knew Bill from the year he spent at Rutgers, and we quickly became a regular trio."

The New School proved to be not only a great networking choice but a great educational choice for Larry, where he studied with piano great Fred Hersch. "As it turns out, Fred is my third cousin, but I didn't know that until just before I left for New York," Larry recalls. "My grandma told me, 'You know you have a cousin who plays jazz in New York.' I learned so much from Fred about touch and playing solo, but I also studied with Jackie Bayard. Fred and Jackie were my main mentors, and they both made a huge impression on me."

Around 1990, Larry and Bill were invited by saxophone great Maceo Parker to join him on recording and tour dates. Maceo was known for his work with James Brown and Prince, among many others. While working with Maceo, they developed an early affinity for grooves with a funky sound. "By the nineties, I had become known as an organ player," Larry recalls. "And Joey DeFrancesco was riding high at that time. I feel like I just fell into that whole organ resurgence. John Scofield invited me to join him as an organ player. It wasn't what I started out to do, but it's what I became known for." Larry eventually switched from a Korg to a Hammond B3, and became highly regarded for his skill in using the drawbars to create unique textures, colors and an orchestral dimension in his playing.

Peter maintains that playing in an organ trio fosters a unique "cooperative thing." He's noted that because the organ player is in a "one mind mode," handling both the bass and the chords, that it

that it forces the guitar player to find space between those two hands. (Larry is often noted for his ability to execute intricate bass lines, but he does that primarily using left hand rather than foot pedals.) One of Peter's early mentors, while studying at the New School, was the legendary jazz guitarist Jim Hall. A hugely important takeaway from his studies with Jim involved a philosophical approach to playing, especially in looking at the bigger picture while soloing. Peter has said that "all the choices Jim made were hip choices, based on what he wanted to hear, not on what the guitar led him to play," Peter's playing has always embodied that same focus on intention and concern for what he's creating, as opposed to just playing through scales and riffs.

While the trio is extremely democratic, with all three members equally contributing songs and musical direction, Bill may be the member who most provides the glue that holds the music together. Noted for his polyrhythms and his love for always keeping the music fresh by finding new and different ways to interact with it, he seems particularly attentive to the chemistry of the group. He speaks about the need to be sensitive and reactive to what's going on around him, and notes, "I'm responsible for the tempo and the timing, but what comes first, is just trying to make the vibe of the tune feel right."

Bill sums things up saying, "Interplay is really the key thing. It's so important. I can't tell you exactly how it works. It's a spontaneous thing. I just listen for the spaces and Pete and Larry are also incredible listeners. And that's what enables us to sound sharp and fresh every time we play together."

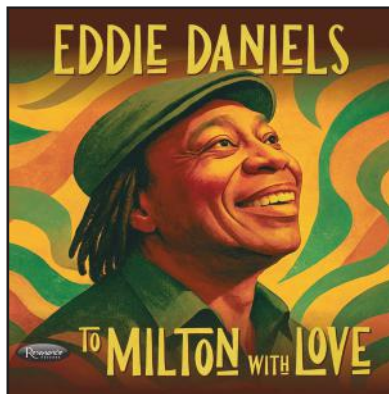
Their trio is performing at Smoke on October 22 through 26. Shortly after this club date, they have plans to get back into the studio to record their 15th album. If you want to catch a jazz performance that will undoubtedly reach great musical heights, then don't miss this one!

WINNING SPINS

SOPHISTICATION AND INTRICACY MEET ON albums of South American music from composers and musicians far from the usual Latin-Jazz centers in the Caribbean and Central America. One is a tribute to a giant of Brazilian music, Milton Nascimento, who did not limit himself to samba and bossa nova, from a group of American West Coast jazz artists. The other is the latest exhilarating chapter in the fascinating discography of a band from Peru that combines and repurposes traditional rhythms and grooves, using uniquely Afro-Peruvian percussion instruments, in combination with jazz that is au courant and frequently cinematic in scope.

To Milton With Love, **Eddie Daniels** (Resonance), is a rare and stellar outing from a stalwart star of 20th Century jazz, the multi-reed and woodwind player Eddie. He's joined by fellow West Coast jazz players Josh Nelson, piano (also the main arranger); Anthony Wilson, guitar; Kevin Axt, bass, and Ray Brinker, drums. There are also contributions from the Lyris Quartet. The program consists of ten songs written or co-written by Brazilian singer-instrumentalist Milton Nascimento. The final track is Josh's homage to the composer, "For Milton," a compelling duet featuring its composer, Josh on piano, with Eddie on clarinet.

Eddie, whose playing often limns melodies once sung by Milton, plays predominantly clarinet, but also chimes in on tenor sax, flute and, on one track, soprano saxophone. The album begins with Eddie's tenor sax on one of Milton's most famous and memorable works, "Travessia," known by the title "Bridges," bestowed on it by Gene Lees when he wrote the English lyrics, notably sung by Sarah Vaughan, Tony Bennett and many others.

Milton's tunes range far and wide from the familiar Brazilian samba/bossa nova familiar to American jazz fans. For instance, "Vera Cruz," featuring Eddie on clarinet, shifts tempos and rhythmic feels between the *ijexd*, heard in candomblé (an African-Brazilian religion related to Haitian voodoo), and *baiao*, a double-time dance rhythm

from Milton's home area in Northeastern Brazil. There are also bouncy, samba-like rhythms like the effervescent "Rio Vermelho," with sparkling clarinet; the dreamy, soundtrack-like ballad "Outubro," featuring lush tenor sax, and the strings-plush "Morro Velho," with lyrical flute from Eddie.

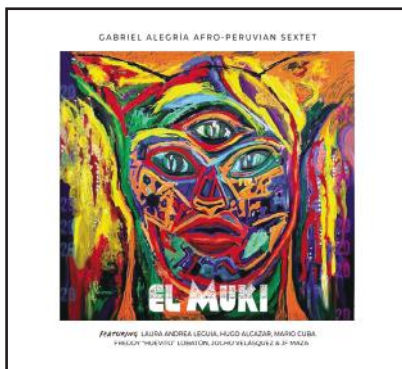
All in all, this is a warm and enthralling tribute to a major songwriter from Brazil as well as a welcome return of Eddie to the jazz limelight.

El Muki, **Gabriel Alegria Afro-Peruvian Sextet** (Saponegro), is the new album from a decades-old band, and one that is frequently larger than the "sextet" appellation. This time out, trumpeter Gabriel and tenor saxophonist Laura Andrea Leguia (between them each responsible for composing eight, four each, of the album's nine tracks), are joined by Freddy "Huevito" Lobatán, percussion; Hugo Alcázar, drums; Mario Cuba, bass; Jocho Velásquez, nylon string and electric guitars; JF Maza, soprano saxophone, and Marco Lucioni, cello.

Gabriel and his Sextet prioritize Afro-Peruvian rhythms as delineated by indigenous Peruvian percussion instruments. So no hand drums with skin heads or Afro-Latin jazz's dominant clavé rhythm groove. Peruvian percussion comes from the cajón and cajita, small and large wooden boxes respectively, slapped and beaten, as well as the quijada, the dried jawbone of an ass (burro). And instead of clavé, the rhythmic grooves are the Afro-Peruvian *festejo* and *landó*. Those grooves and rhythms are the foundation for Gabriel's and Laura's tunes, often cinematic (think early Chuck Mangione, like *Land of Make Believe*) themes expanded with compelling jazz solos from trumpet, tenor sax, guitar and soprano sax.

This is a band that can swing with momentum and open throttle drive, but also craft musical narratives that proceed like intricately well-wrought songs. From jaunty melodies like Laura's "Vista Panorámica," with torrid solos from soprano sax and electric guitar; to Gabriel's tango-like "Despertar (Awakening)," with its rich ensemble sound from muted trumpet and saxes over nylon string guitar; to Gabriel's radical recasting of Sting's "Walking on the Moon" as Afro-Peruvian jazz, this album constantly compels and delights.

FIVE SPOT RETURNS

A Legendary Jazz Club Reimagined in the East Village

THE FIVE SPOT CAFÉ IS BACK. THE LEG-endary bohemian jazz club that drew literary, artistic and musical giants from the 1950s through the '60s has been given new life thanks to restaurateur Shuji Bon Yagi, known simply as Mr. Yagi, and his T.I.C. Restaurant Group. Mr. Yagi owns more than a dozen Japanese restaurants and cafés, many clustered in the East Village.

Five Spot Jazz opened with its first show on Sunday, June 8 with a live performance from saxophonist Eric Alexander, pianist Toru Dodo, bassist Jason Clotter and drummer Tomohiro Mori.

Located on East 9th Street, the Five Spot now exists inside Mr. Yagi's popular Japanese eatery Hi-Collar, transforms into a jazz venue every Sunday evening. "By day, it's Hi-Collar, and by night, it's Five Spot," says Mr. Yagi. "When the night is over, you don't find it."

The original Five Spot opened in 1956 at 5 Cooper Square, launched by Joe and Iggy Termini. Its storied stage hosted Thelonious Monk, Cecil Taylor, Eric Dolphy, Charles Mingus, John Coltrane, and Randy Weston. Writers and painters filled the crowd: Jack Kerouac, James Baldwin, Allen Ginsberg, Grace Hartigan, and Willem de Kooning. In 1962, the club moved to St. Mark's Place before closing in 1976.

Mr. Yagi, born in postwar Japan, grew up listening to jazz in coffeehouses with his brothers. After immigrating to the U.S., he built a career from wholesale produce to diners and then a network of Japanese restaurants, beginning with Hasaki in 1984. Hi-Collar, his kissaten-inspired café, now houses the resurrected Five Spot.

To curate the music, Mr. Yagi turned to saxophonist Vincent Herring, who teaches at William Paterson University and the Tribeca Jazz Institute. Vincent had first connected with Mr. Yagi while producing a Japanese Jazz Festival at Smoke. "I hear some amazing emerging talents, and I know what it's like not to have those opportunities," Vincent says. "If you notice the lineup, there's a lot of Asians, but also a lot of women. Everyone's given a chance."

The revived Five Spot currently hosts performances Sundays from 5 to 9 p.m. with a \$15 cover and one-drink minimum. There are plans to expand to Fridays and Saturdays, with established names anchoring the early slots and younger artists featured on Sundays. Informal jam sessions are already part of the mix.

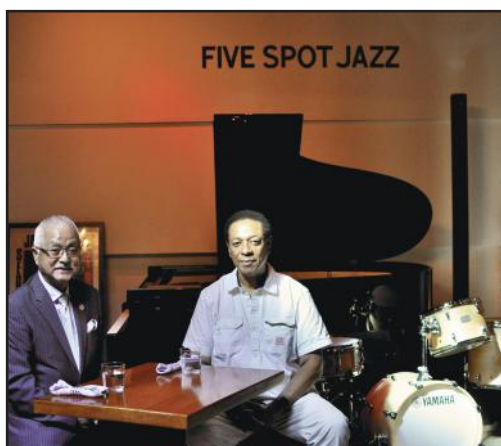
For Mr. Yagi, the goal is to create opportunities and honor history: "It doesn't matter if it's old or new jazz, it's always alive. In New York, it's jazz. I want to contribute to that."

BRIC JAZZFEST 2025

Global Sounds in Downtown Brooklyn



ON OCTOBER 17 AND 18, THE BRIC HOUSE IN Downtown Brooklyn transforms into a hub of global sound with the return of **BRIC JazzFest**. Billed as “a global celebration of sound from Brooklyn to the world,” the two-night festival has quickly become one of the city’s most talked-about music events.

This year’s buzz stems from both its lineup and its vision. More than half the featured groups are led by women, reflecting BRIC’s commitment to equity in jazz programming. Just as significant is the involvement of producer and composer Adrian Younge, who serves as guest curator. Known for his boundary-crossing work with Jazz Is Dead and artists from Kendrick Lamar to Ebo Taylor, Adrian’s curatorial touch ensures the festival bridges continents and traditions.

Friday, October 17 spotlights trumpeter Chief Adjuah (formerly Christian Scott), whose Afro-futurist “Stretch Music” has become a defining sound of his generation. Adrian himself appears in a rare set, and South African vocalist Vuyo Sotashe teams with pianist Chris Pattishall for an intimate duo. Saha Gnawa brings Moroccan spiritual trance to the stage, while Meklit Hadero threads Ethio-jazz storytelling through her performance. Guitarist Dida Pelled rounds out the night with her swinging, lyrical touch.

Saturday, October 18, tilts toward iconic voices. Legendary vocalist Dee Dee Bridgewater brings her timeless artistry to Brooklyn, while London saxophonist Nubya Garcia represents the UK’s cutting-edge scene with a sound steeped in Caribbean roots. Adrian returns for another set, joined by bassist Endea Owens, one of jazz’s most exciting young bandleaders. Multi-instrumentalist Karriem Riggins, equally fluent in hip hop and jazz, adds rhythmic fire, while Afro-Cuban duo OKAN bring

irresistible groove. Rising collective New Jazz Underground anchors the night with youthful energy.

Much of the buzz around this year’s festival celebrates its global scope and boundary-breaking mix. Social media is already highlighting the blend of icons like Dee Dee with innovators like Nubya, alongside the emphasis on diasporic connections—from Morocco to Cuba, London to South Africa. For Brooklyn, the festival is more than a concert series: it’s a gathering of cultures and communities, a space where jazz’s past meets its future.

For audiences, BRIC JazzFest 2025 is not just about two nights of stellar music—it’s about witnessing how jazz continues to reinvent itself, reflecting the voices of the world while rooted in Brooklyn’s creative core.

MUTUAL MENTORSHIP FOR MUSICIANS (M3)

Roulette Intermedium / October 4

AS THE SO-CALLED PRESIDENT CONTINUES to dismantle historical institutions and plot against people of color and the LGBTQ community, the jazz community is fortunate to have an organization like Mutual Mentorship for Musicians (M³), the groundbreaking initiative dedicated to advancing professional and artistic growth for women and gender-expansive musicians. Now celebrating its 5th anniversary, M³ was founded during the COVID pandemic in 2020 by Sara Serpa (jazz vocalist from Lisbon, Portugal) and Jen Shyu (experimental jazz vocalist, composer, multi-instrumentalist, dancer, and producer) as a platform for creative risk-taking, exchange through musical commissions, peer-led mentorship, publication of anthologies, performances, festivals, and awards.

In just 5 years, M3 has commissioned and supported 92 artists, created 46 new co-compositions, and transforming the creative music industry around the world. The concept of M3 blossomed through Sara and Jen’s conversations about elevating women and non-binary musicians, particularly those of color, in their global music community. Both women have experienced inequities in professional opportunities and financial remuneration, limited recognition and media visibility, and isolation in their own careers, and they have recognized firsthand the need for greater opportunity, community and support, as well as the need for women and non-binary mentors in the music industry.

M3’s fourth annual festival on October 4 will feature singer/songwriter Becca Stevens, NEA Jazz Master Kenny Barron, saxophonist and composer Immanuel Wilkins, and pioneering M3 musicians and their projects, including Siren Xypher (Melanie Dyer, Mara Rosenbloom, Kyoto Kitamura), Shoko Nagai and Satoshi Takeishi’s Vortex, Vertical Sounds (Kess Southpaw, Mnisibass, Melanie Dyer), Maia & Zamonda, and Devon Gates’ Ghost Stories (Gates, Victoria Awkward, Matt Greenwood), and

Gili Lopes. The event will also launch the premiere issue of M3 Magazine, featuring writings from most of the artists performing at the festival. There's also a rare NYC performance by the 2025 M³ Luminary Awardee Maia (Colombian singer-songwriter) an active member of the AACM Chicago and Pan Afrikan Peoples Arkestra (LA). In today's political stormy climate, M3 and its festival represent an opportunity to establish positive societal connections, mend communities, and make beautiful, meaningful music. RES

THELONIOUS MONK FESTIVAL

at Smoke Jazz Club: October 8–19

EVERY OCTOBER, NEW YORK HONORS THE legacy of one of jazz's most original voices, pianist and composer **Thelonious Monk**. This year, Smoke Jazz Club presents a two-week festival running from October 8 through October 19, featuring a stellar lineup of artists who carry forward Monk's adventurous spirit while adding their own distinctive voices to his music.

Born in 1917 in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, and raised in Harlem, Monk transformed the language of modern jazz with his angular melodies, dissonant harmonies, and rhythmic inventiveness. Classics like *'Round Midnight*, *Straight, No Chaser*, and *Blue Monk* remain cornerstones of the repertoire, both challenging and inspiring musicians across generations. At Smoke, his music becomes

the heartbeat of autumn in the city, inviting audiences to hear familiar compositions anew while celebrating Monk's boundless creativity.

The festival opens October 8–12 with pianist Orrin Evans, tenor saxophonist Melissa Aldana, bassist Robert Hurst, and drummer Terri Lyne Carrington—a powerhouse quartet certain to interpret Monk's music with vigor and daring. Their combined artistry blends Orrin's fearless harmonic exploration, Melissa's probing improvisations, Robert's rock-solid bass lines, and Terri Lyne's rhythmic command. The second week, October 15–19, features pianist Kevin Hays with a dynamic rhythm team of bassist Rick Rosato and drummer Obed Calvaire. They are joined mid-week by legendary tenor saxophonist Joe Lovano (October 15–18) and close with the brilliant altoist Miguel Zenón (October 19). Kevin's lyrical touch, Rick's supple foundation, and Obed's drive provide the perfect backdrop for Joe's earthy swing and Miguel's sharp lyricism.

Beyond the nightly performances, the festival underscores Monk's cultural impact. Few artists embody the individuality and courage of jazz as vividly as he did. His unmistakable style—whether through his percussive piano touch, his distinctive hats and suits, or his famously enigmatic presence—remains an enduring symbol of artistic authenticity. At Smoke, audiences can feel that legacy alive, not in nostalgia but in vibrant, forward-looking performance.

Whether you are a lifelong devotee or new to Monk's world, the October 8–19 festival at Smoke Jazz Club promises a journey through one of jazz's richest songbooks. It is an invitation to experience the joy, mystery, and swing that made Thelonious Monk a giant of 20th-century music—and to witness how his spirit continues to shape the sound of jazz today.



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CYRUS CHESTNUT
JAZZ AT LINCOLN CENTER / OCTOBER 1-4

Baltimore-born pianist Cyrus Chestnut has long been admired for his blend of gospel roots, classical discipline, and deep jazz swing. A former sideman with Wynton Marsalis, Betty Carter and Freddie Hubbard, Cyrus brings warmth and a grounded sense of history to everything he plays. His trio work in particular has been praised for its balance of lyrical phrasing and high-energy improvisation. At Jazz at Lincoln Center, Cyrus leads a program highlighting his affinity for American songbook classics alongside originals, all touched with his unmistakable rhythmic pulse and soulful touch. Whether in a hymn-like ballad or a driving uptempo piece, Cyrus connects directly with audiences, making each performance feel both personal and immediate. **JZZ**



JESÚS "AGUAJE" RAMOS & BUENA VISTA ORCHESTRA
KUPFERBERG CENTER FOR THE ARTS / OCTOBER 3

Trombonist Jesús "Aguaje" Ramos, a founding member of the Buena Vista Social Club, carries the flame of Cuban traditional music into the present with the Buena Vista Orchestra. The ensemble brings together veterans and younger players to revisit iconic repertoire while introducing new interpretations steeped in Afro-Cuban rhythm. Aguaje, whose trombone anchored the original Buena Vista recordings, leads with elegance and joy. At Kupferberg, audiences can expect classics like "Chan Chan" alongside vibrant new arrangements. For Aguaje, each performance is both tribute and renewal, affirming the music's vitality and central place in world culture. **JZZ**



PHILIP HARPER
JAZZ FORUM / OCTOBER 3-4

Trumpeter and bandleader Philip Harper, part of the Harper family of jazz musicians that includes drummer Winard Harper, is best known for his tenure with Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers (1986-1988). Like Art, Philip has nurtured young talent, giving early opportunities to players such as bassist Jason Maximo Clotter and pianist Maki Nientao. His quartets and quintets have long been fixtures on the New York scene, blending hard-driving swing with occasional vocal turns in his own distinctive style. At Jazz Forum, Philip continues the Messenger tradition: a bandstand where heritage and fresh energy meet. **CKnx**

Pianist Sullivan Fortner appears in duet with George Cables, Kris Davis, Jason Moran and David Virelles. Still in his thirties, Sullivan has already emerged as one of the most probing stylists of his generation, combining deep respect for tradition with a spirit of exploration. These duos invite contrast: George's lyricism, Kris' edge, Jason's restless invention, and David's Cuban lineage all meet Sullivan's incisive touch. Expect exchanges that challenge piano conventions, with rhythmic interplay and harmonic daring. Fortner thrives in dialogue, and this series showcases the art of collaboration at its highest level. **RDG**

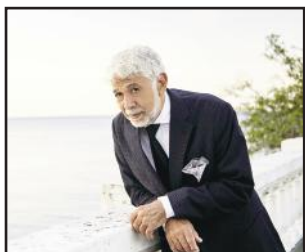


BOBBY SANABRIA
MCCARTER THEATRE, PRINCETON / OCTOBER 4

Percussionist, educator, and bandleader Bobby Sanabria brings his Multiverse Big Band to Princeton with *West Side Story Reimagined*, a Latin jazz reinterpretation of Leonard Bernstein's classic. Sanabria, of Puerto Rican heritage, has been a central figure in Afro-Cuban and Latin jazz for decades. This project fuses mambo, bomba and salsa with Leonard's themes, illuminating the music's Latin heartbeat. At McCarter, Bobby also hosts a post-show conversation with Jamie Bernstein, connecting past and present. VILLAGE VANGUARD / OCTOBER 7-12**

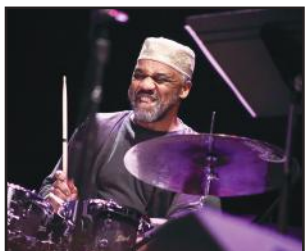

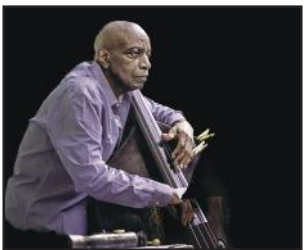
NATE SMITH

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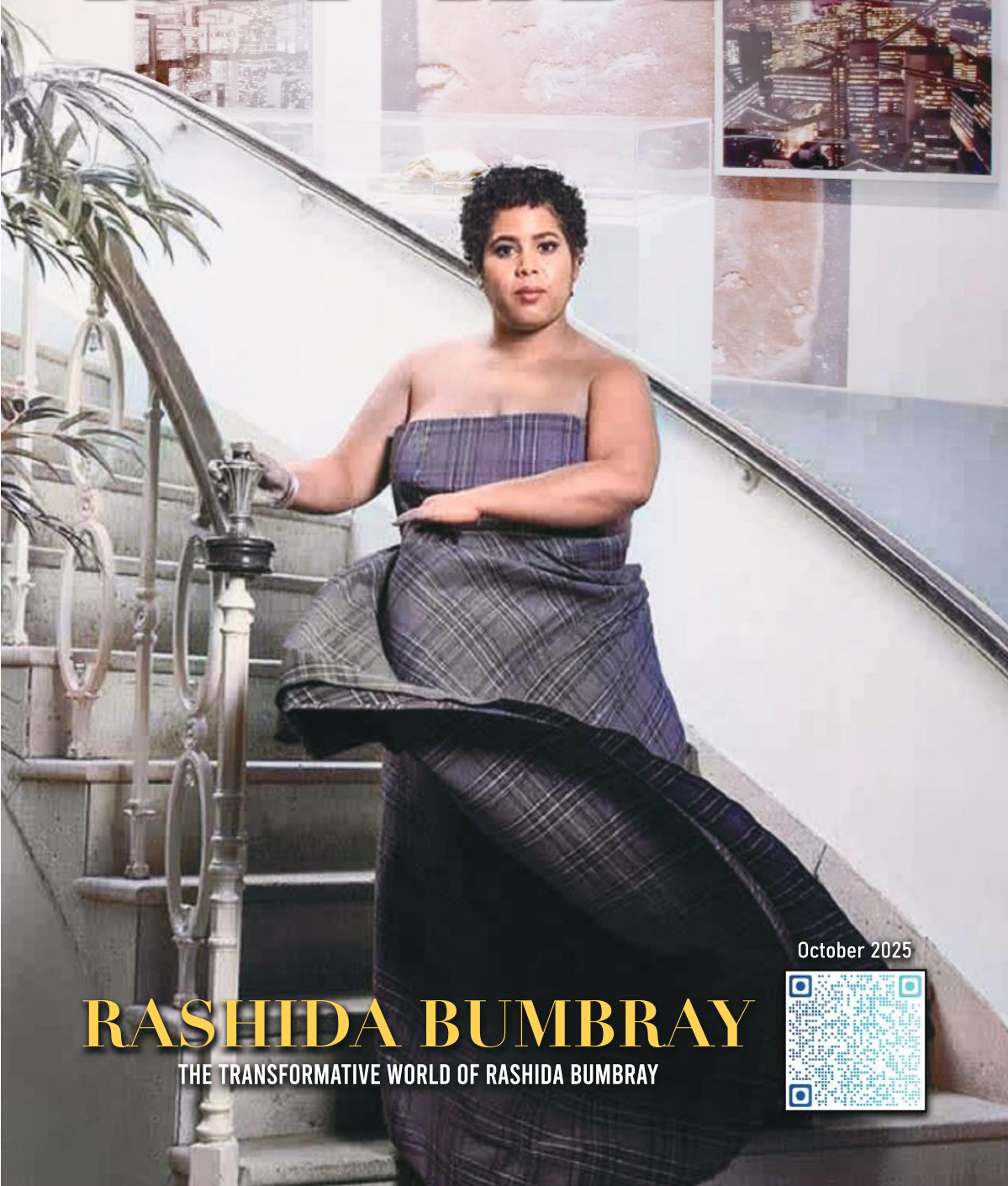

Spirits Alive: The Transformative World of

RASHIDA BUMBRAY

EXCLUSIVE AND ELUSIVE, LIKE THE PROVERBIAL ghost who walks and dances, talks and sings; the notes of whom music leaps like a gazelle in the wild and wonderful atmosphere of your room even though you may never see her. The spirits are dancing in the flesh. This is the worldview of the beautiful Rashida Bumbray, coming to you like a magic carpet ride. In a role so public, Rashida is an artist of a movable feast, a curator not simply of narratives, but a reincarnation of the modern-day Scheherazade.

The appropriation of a legendary metaphor is one that you must grip before it touches then tumbles and leaves clues of its silken grip for you to trace its ephemeral beauty. This is the silken impression from the slender hand of Rashida. Like the proverbial glass slipper, this is the key to a whole new world that Rashida inhabits.

And that world is not only metaphorical. Rashida Bumbray has also built a very public career, most notably as a curator and as an artist-in-residence at The Metropolitan Museum of Art from 2019 to 2021. There, she was described as weaving magical realism, Black healing, and intergenerational knowledge into her practice. Her projects engaged African objects and spaces in The Met's collection, bringing to light the continuation of vital cultural practices in Black and African Diasporic communities.

A Curatorial Voice Emerges

Bumbray's path began at the Studio Museum in Harlem in 2001, where she worked with curator Kellie Jones on *Energy/Experimentation: Black Artists and Abstraction 1964–1984*. The exhibition traced a lineage of Black artists whose contributions to abstraction had long been overlooked, giving Bumbray her first opportunity to bring hidden histories into public view.

Soon after, she joined The Kitchen in New York, one of the city's most adventurous cultural spaces. There she organized the first New York solo exhibitions for artists including Simone Leigh, Leslie Hewitt, Adam Pendleton, Lauren Kelley, Jamal Cyrus, Elodie Pong, and Kyle Abraham. Those shows, modest at the time, now look like the foundation of a generation. Bumbray recognized the urgency of their voices early and gave them the platform they needed to grow.

Her vision carried her back to The Met, where her residency confirmed her role as a conjurer of memory. And in 2022, she took that sensibility global, curating *Loophole of Retreat: Venice* as part of Simone Leigh's *Sovereignty* exhibition at the American Pavilion of the Venice Biennale. The gathering became a celebration of Black women's intellectual labor and creativity, a meeting place that was part scholarly symposium and part spiritual convocation. For Bumbray, curation has always been more than arranging objects—it is about convening people,

always been more than arranging objects—it is about convening people, memory, and possibility.

Choreography as Testimony

If her curatorial work reclaims history, her choreography makes it move. Bumbray is a Bessie-nominated choreographer and a 2019 United States Artists Fellow, and her practice draws deeply on Black vernacular and folk dance traditions. She reshapes those forms for the present while honoring their original force.

Her performance *Run Mary Run*, named one of *The New York Times*' best performances of 2012, is built on gospel quartets and ring shouts. Onstage, the work channels survival and faith, and audiences feel both the rawness and the intricacy of the tradition. She has carried this and other works to Tate Modern in London, the New Museum, The Met, Harlem Stage, SummerStage, Project Row Houses in Houston, and through her own Dancing While Black initiative. Each step, each gesture, carries the weight of intergenerational knowledge. To watch her perform is to glimpse dance as archive and ritual at once.

Expanding the Frame

Bumbray has never been confined to a single medium. In 2024 she presented *Untitled (How High the Moon)* at the BlackStar Film Festival, where it was nominated for Best Experimental Film. The project extended her practice into cinema, another vessel for ancestral memory and imagination. It confirmed what her career has already shown: whether on stage, in galleries, or on film, her work always reaches for ways to connect the tangible to the unseen.

The Heart of Her Work

What distinguishes Bumbray is the way she fuses intellect, spirit, and emotion without losing clarity. She has described her practice as a quest, both personal and public. "Catch me while you can," she once said, as if warning that her work is always in motion, never easily captured.

At a time when art is often measured in market value, Bumbray insists on its sacred role. Her projects invite audiences to confront heritage and power, to see their own place in the continuity of cultural legacy. She transforms objects into living vessels, performances into rituals of healing, and exhibitions into calls for collective reckoning. Always, she holds space for histories and ancestors to return and be felt in the present.

Looking Ahead

To speak of Rashida Bumbray is to speak of resurrection. She resurrects what was thought lost, turns memory into motion, and transforms history into a living force.

She does not simply show us art—she asks us to feel it, honor it, and be changed by it. Hers is an everlasting dance: spiritual, emotional, and cultural. Through her, we are invited to see the world anew, carried forward by rhythms that refuse to be forgotten.

This October, she will appear at Undoing and Redoing on October 25, where she will "speak truth to power with bodies and spirits undone and reborn." The phrase feels like a key to her entire body of work—an endless cycle of creation, transformation, and renewal.

Broadway and Jazz Voices Unite at Kaye Playhouse, October 8

ON OCTOBER 8, THE KAYE PLAYHOUSE AT Hunter College presents a special concert, “Women in Jazz,” bringing together the worlds of Broadway and jazz for one unforgettable evening. The event features Tony Award–nominated Broadway star Lilli Cooper and celebrated stage powerhouse Maya Days, alongside beloved jazz vocalists Hilary Kole and Madeleine Peyroux. Together, they highlight the extraordinary contributions women continue to make to America’s most original art form.

The concert celebrates female artistry across genres, bridging the storytelling traditions of Broadway with the improvisational spirit of jazz. 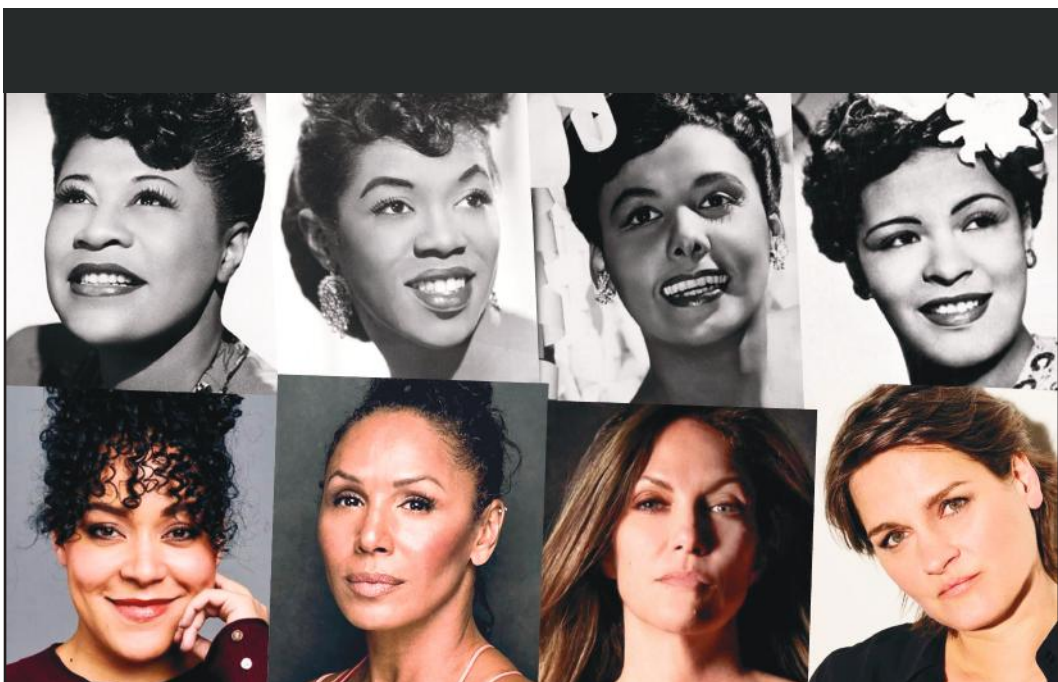

“Women in Jazz” is more than a concert — it is a statement. By placing Broadway leading ladies alongside jazz vocalists, the evening underscores the versatility and strength of women in shaping the sound and story of American music. Each singer brings her own voice, repertoire and perspective, promising a program as diverse as it is powerful. Expect timeless standards, soulful reinterpretations and a few surprises designed to showcase the artistry of each performer.

Presented at the elegant Kaye Playhouse, one of New York’s most welcoming mid-sized concert halls, the event offers an intimate setting to experience these extraordinary artists up close. For audiences, it is both a celebration and an invitation: to honor the legacy of women in jazz while embracing the new stories being written on Broadway and beyond.

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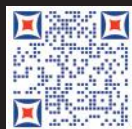

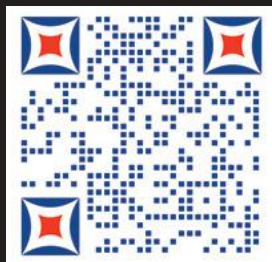
