

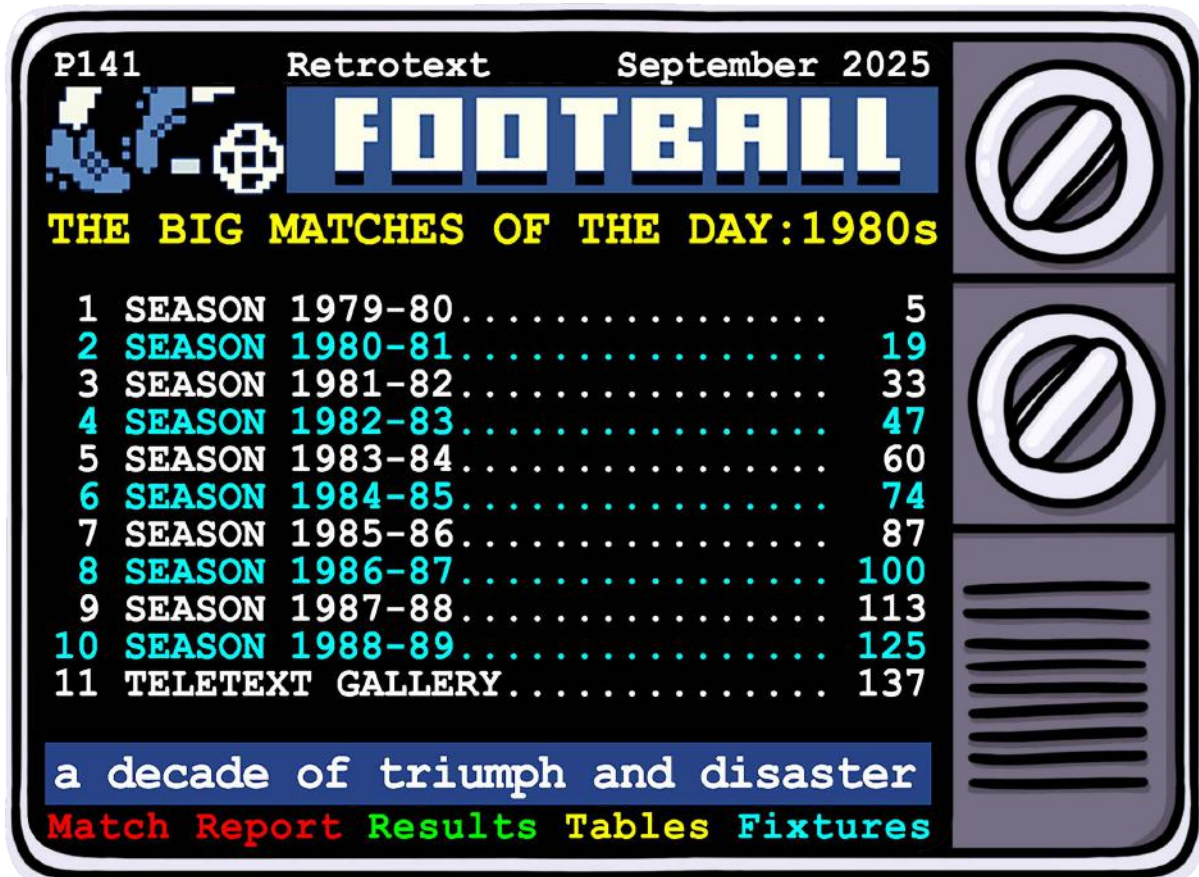

Introduction



The BBC's teletext service Ceefax and its commercial equivalent, Oracle, first appeared on TV screens in the 1970s and they became the primary source of information for millions of people from the early 1980s onwards. Some of you may not remember Oracle and be more familiar with its successor as, in 1992, the franchise to provide ITV's service was awarded to Teletext Limited and Oracle became, confusingly, Teletext, the same name as the medium itself.

Both services gave viewers free and immediate access to the very latest information in a pre-internet era where the only alternative was to wait for the next television or radio bulletin or buy a newspaper. For those unfamiliar with the technology, the services worked by pressing in three numbers on your TV remote corresponding to the page you wanted to bring onto the screen, as illustrated in the armchair guide above which was originally published in 1987.

As teletext pages were updated almost continuously each day, the content wasn't saved so few examples of them exist, but there are enthusiasts able to retrieve some from the videotape used to record TV programmes in the 1980s and 1990s so that people can now view them. All the original teletext pages in this book were recovered in this way and you may see corruptions to words or images on them caused by the retrieval process.

The beauty of teletext was that while you were reading a match report about Aston Villa beating Bayern Munich to win the European Cup in 1982 or the dramatic conclusion to the 1988-89 season between Liverpool and Arsenal, you could still hear the programme being broadcast on BBC or ITV - whether it was Only Fools And Horses or Coronation Street - and could switch back to whatever you had been watching immediately at the push of a button.

During the 1980s, football fans relied on Ceefax and Oracle for the latest football scores and breaking news, with many a transfer rumour quashed with the words, "Well, there's nothing about it on teletext." Though the ones about Clive Allen moving from QPR to Arsenal, then Crystal Palace, then back to QPR and on to Tottenham, and finally to Manchester City, during the decade proved to be right!

As this century dawned, changes in broadcast technology made it increasingly difficult for viewers to access teletext services quickly and easily and they gradually disappeared. ITV's Teletext, the successor to Oracle, ceased broadcasting in 2009 and BBC's Ceefax in 2012, though in Europe there are still a few active teletext services even in 2025. The Retrotex designs in this book are my tribute to this once hugely popular and much-loved information medium.

A life-long Gillingham supporter, Brian Moore began his broadcasting career with BBC Radio, covering the 1966 World Cup tournament as well as Celtic's historic European Cup triumph the following year.

In 1968, he was invited by Jimmy Hill, then Head of Sport at London Weekend Television, to become the host and commentator of *The Big Match*, a Sunday afternoon highlights show. He continued in this role until 1983 when regional football coverage on ITV ended but he continued to be the network's voice of football.

Brian presented ITV's World Cup coverage from 1970 to 1986 and continued to commentate on the tournament until 1998, as well as on every FA Cup Final from 1969 to 1988.

His distinctive voice and memorable phrases resonate with many football fans but, perhaps, most particularly with supporters of Aston Villa (see page 39) and Arsenal (see page 133).

In the late 1960s, under manager Joe Mercer and his flamboyant assistant Malcolm Allison, Manchester City enjoyed a glorious era which saw the club crowned First Division champions at the end of the 1967-68 campaign, lift the FA Cup in 1969 and win the League Cup and European Cup-Winners' Cup in 1970.

When Peter Swales took over as chairman in 1971, Mercer was made general manager at Maine Road with Allison becoming team manager but results were modest and in March 1973 he resigned, becoming boss at Crystal Palace later in the month.

Having had spells since Palace in America, Turkey and at Plymouth, Swales persuaded Allison to return to City in January 1979 to work alongside club legend, Tony Book. A spending spree followed which saw the signings, amongst others, of Steve Daley from Wolves for a then British transfer record of £1.5 million, as well as the departures of fan favourites Gary Owen and Peter Barnes to West Brom.

But the team struggled and coming into this FA Cup clash with Fourth Division Halifax Town they were just above the relegation places in division one. The Yorkshire side were deserved winners on the day, causing one of the biggest shocks in FA Cup history, with the only goal scored by Paul Hendrie, father of ex-Aston Villa midfielder, Lee Hendrie. Allison and Book were both sacked in October 1980 with Swales recruiting Norwich City's John Bond as manager.

Football Legends

West Ham and England captain Bobby Moore made an outstanding contribution to his country's World Cup victory in 1966 and was just as effective in Mexico four years later, in particular with 'that tackle' on Pelé during the match against Brazil in the group stages.

Both players had huge respect for each other and their paths crossed several times during the late 1970s in the North American Soccer League. In 1980, the legendary pair were reunited again, this time in unusual circumstances, on the set of the iconic film *Escape To Victory*, which starred Michael Caine and Sylvester Stallone. Moore was cast as Terry Brady and Pelé as Corporal Luis Fernandez in the Allied football team which played against the Nazis.

Almost on a par with Halifax's heroics was the performance of Isthmian League side Harlow Town, who drew 1-1 with Second Division promotion chasers Leicester City at Filbert Street thanks to an injury time equaliser from Neil Prosser whose main job was as a shop manager.

Far from being overjoyed at forcing a replay, Prosser was disappointed that Harlow didn't play better on the day and promised their opponents a tough game in the return. Manager Ian Wolstenholme was a teacher by profession and after a celebratory drink on Saturday, he had his players in for training on the Sunday.

Accountant John MacKenzie scored the only goal of the match in front of a full-house in Essex, sweeping the ball home three minutes before half-time to earn the part-timers a fourth-round tie at Watford.

Harlow produced another superb display in that encounter, the club's tenth FA Cup match of the season, only losing by the odd goal in seven, with Prosser and MacKenzie (twice) again the scorers. A local bookmaker had sponsored the team at £500 for each goal scored so the players had a £1500 bonus to show for the glorious run to the last thirty-two of the competition.

Halifax also bowed out in the fourth round, losing 2-0 to First Division Bolton Wanderers, a team featuring Sam Allardyce and Peter Reid.

A week before this match, Manchester United had drawn level on points with Liverpool at the top of the table after a 3-1 win at the Baseball Ground over Derby County, taking advantage of Liverpool's game at home to Leeds United having been postponed due to a frozen Anfield pitch.

Norwich got off to the perfect start when England World Cup hero and Canaries' captain Martin Peters headed home in the first minute.

But the visitors soon hit back when David Fairclough, starting his first senior game in four months after striker David Johnson had been injured on England duty during the week, fired home a well-placed shot.

The same player put the visitors ahead before Kevin Reeves levelled up the scores before half-time. Fairclough notched his first senior hat-trick fifteen minutes from the end only for Justin Fashanu to make it 3-3 with a wonder goal which was later voted Match of the Day's Goal of the Season.

Controlling the ball superbly with his back to goal, Fashanu flicked it up in the air and on the turn vollied an unstoppable shot past Ray Clemence.

But Bob Paisley's side, who were also missing Graeme Souness due to a one-match suspension, refused to be denied and with time running out Kenny Dalglish put them ahead before Jimmy Case completed the scoring.

While Liverpool were involved in the eight-goal thriller at Carrow Road, Manchester United slipped to a shock 1-0 home defeat to Wolves.

It was the first defeat at Old Trafford this season for Dave Sexton's men, with transfer-listed Mel Eves causing the damage for the visitors who faced a crucial League Cup semi-final in the coming week.

Elsewhere in the division, Lawrie McMenemy's high-flying Southampton hammered Allan Mullery's Brighton 5-1, while Bobby Robson's Ipswich Town piled the pressure on Everton boss Gordon Lee following an emphatic 4-0 success at Goodison Park.

At Highbury, Alan Sunderland scored twice as Arsenal defeated Aston Villa 3-1 to maintain their position in the group of clubs chasing Liverpool, albeit at a respectful distance and having played more games than the reigning champions.

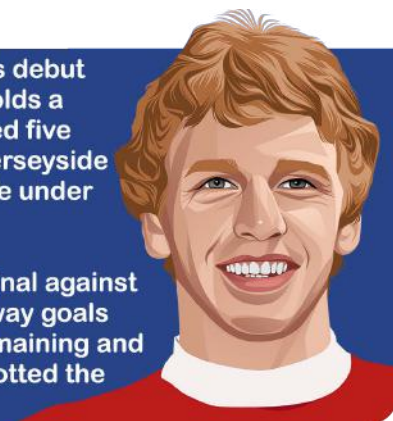
Other news this weekend was that former Manchester United star George Best, then aged thirty-three, had been suspended by Scottish side Hibernian after he failed to turn up for their League game against Morton.

The club's chairman Tom Hart had reportedly been paying Best £2,000 a game from his own pocket but the wayward player's future was once again uncertain, much to the annoyance of his wife, Angie, who said she had tried everything to get him to fulfil his obligations at Easter Road.

Football Legends

Though he only made 154 appearances for the club, scoring 55 goals, from his debut in November 1975 to his departure in April 1983, local lad David Fairclough holds a special place in the hearts of Liverpool fans. During his first season, he scored five goals from the substitute's bench, including a superb solo strike to win the Merseyside derby at Anfield, which contributed to the team securing their first League title under Bob Paisley and earning him the nickname 'Super Sub'.

But he is most famous for his crucial goal in the 1977 European Cup quarter-final against Saint-Etienne when the Reds faced elimination from the competition on the away goals rule. After coming on as a substitute for John Toshack with fifteen minutes remaining and with time ticking away, Fairclough held off the French club's defenders and slotted the ball home to spark deafening pandemonium amongst the home supporters.

Forest into the Final

Since Nottingham Forest gained promotion back to the First Division in 1977, Brian Clough's side undoubtedly enjoyed the best of it in clashes between these two sides, including beating Bob Paisley's men in the 1978 final of this competition.

As in many of the previous encounters, in the first leg of this semi-final Liverpool largely outplayed Forest but, somehow, ended up losing.

Goalkeeper Peter Shilton kept out all the visitors could throw at him and, in the dying seconds, his opposite number Ray Clemence fouled Gary Birtles and referee Ron Challis gave the penalty.

Four days after that game, the two teams met again at the City Ground in a fourth round FA Cup tie and, ironically, it was a mistake by Shilton which set Liverpool on the way to victory. He dropped a routine cross and Kenny Dalglish scored, with Terry McDermott making it 2-0 from the penalty spot.

Whereas Paisley's men had dominated these two games, the decisive second leg of the semi-final was a much more even affair. Forest were happy to soak up the home side's pressure and hit on the break, as they did for their goal which resulted in Clemence bringing down Martin O'Neill and Robertson scoring.

Though David Fairclough equalised in injury time, it was Forest who made it through to Wembley for the third successive season.

Wolves into the Final

Wolves had been the dominant force in English football in the 1950s, securing the division one title three times, and winning the FA Cup in 1960 at the end of a season when they were denied a League and Cup double by a single point.

The club had won this competition in 1974 under manager Bill McGarry and the shrewd acquisition of former Liverpool and England captain Emlyn Hughes by current boss John Barnwell had led the team to the brink of another Final.

The journey began with a 3-1 aggregate victory over Burnley, followed by a come-from-behind win over Terry Venables' Crystal Palace. Tommy Docherty's QPR were knocked out in the fourth round after a replay which set up an epic quarter-final tie with Third Division Grimsby Town, only settled after two replays.

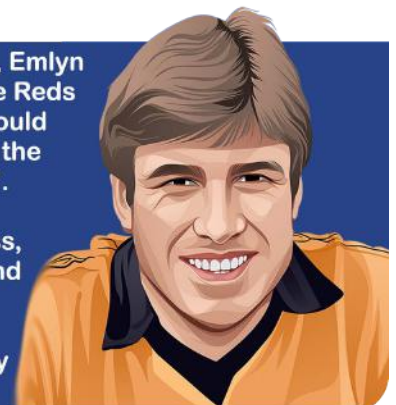
Swindon Town were also a division three side and they led 2-1 after the first leg at the County Ground to leave their fans dreaming of a repeat of the club's famous League Cup Final victory over Arsenal in 1969.

Hughes missed the first leg but he was back in the side for this tense encounter which was settled by striker John Richards on his 350th appearance in the first team. Derek Parkin, in his testimonial season, fired in a terrific shot which the keeper could only parry, allowing Richards to sweep the ball home.

Football Legends

Signed by Bill Shankly from Blackpool for £65,000 at the end of February 1967, Emlyn Hughes made his debut for Liverpool a few days later, playing in midfield as the Reds beat Stoke City 2-1 to return to the top of the division one table, though they would ultimately finish second to Manchester United. His whole-hearted approach to the game and exuberant goal celebrations earned him the nickname 'Crazy Horse'.

In the 1970s, then playing as a centre-back, Hughes enjoyed unrivalled success, winning four League titles, one FA Cup, two European Cups, two UEFA Cups and the European Super Cup. He also took over the team captaincy from Tommy Smith which created so much animosity that the two players barely spoke to each other off the pitch. Emlyn moved to Wolves in 1979 where he won the only domestic trophy to have eluded him at Anfield, the League Cup in 1980.

Death of "Dixie" Dean

With Liverpool in pursuit of the club's twelfth title and Everton battling against relegation, the stakes were high for the 122nd Merseyside derby and this was reflected in a bruising clash in which Blues' midfielder Geoff Nulty was carried off the pitch with a season-ending injury.

Despite David Fairclough having scored seven goals in the team's last six games, he was dropped to the bench in favour of fit-again David Johnson and it was the former Evertonian who opened the scoring. Phil Neal made it 2-0 from the penalty spot and though Peter Eastoe pulled one back for the home side in the second half, it was Liverpool's day, again, at Goodison.

But the entire occasion was overshadowed by the news following the game that William Ralph 'Dixie' Dean had died after being taken ill in the stands just before it ended. Fans of both teams were shocked at the passing of one of the sport's all-time greats, most famous for scoring sixty goals in season 1927-28.

Former Liverpool manager Bill Shankly said: "The hardest thing to do in football is score and he was a past master." Current Reds' boss Bob Paisley added: "I cringe when I think what anybody would have to pay for him at today's prices."

Almost 2,000 people attended his funeral in Birkenhead, where he had been born in 1907, with Everton players Mike Lyons, Bob Latchford, Brian Labone and Gordon West acting as pallbearers.

Football Legends

William Ralph 'Dixie' Dean joined Everton from Tranmere Rovers in March 1925 and in his first full season at the club he scored 33 goals in 40 appearances. During the summer of 1926, he fractured his skull in a motorcycling accident and didn't play his first game of the 1926-27 season until October but ended the campaign with 24 goals.

In the title-winning season of 1927-28, he notched 60 League goals and 3 in the FA Cup. A slump in the club's fortunes saw the Blues relegated in 1929-30 but in division two he scored 48 goals in total as the team earned immediate promotion as champions. Everton won the division one title again in 1931-32 when Dixie struck 46 times and he was on target 29 times during the FA Cup winning campaign of 1932-33, including in the Final. In total, he scored 383 goals in 433 appearances for the club.

United 'keeper saves three pens

After a distinguished playing career at Fulham and West Brom which earned him twenty England caps, Bobby Robson's managerial journey began at Fulham in January 1968 where he was unable to stop them being relegated from division one. A poor start to the following campaign saw him sacked but in January 1969 he was appointed boss at Ipswich Town following the departure of Bill McGarry to Wolves.

Between 1973 and his departure to become England manager in 1982, the Suffolk side only once finished outside the top six in division one - and that was the season they won the FA Cup.

In his final three seasons at Portman Road, the Tractor Boys came close to emulating Sir Alf Ramsey's team who were crowned champions in 1961-62, finishing third and second twice.

This game was one of the highpoints of Robson's reign as the team he had assembled took title-chasing Manchester United apart. Alan Brazil opened the scoring and two quick strikes from Paul Mariner made it 3-0 inside thirty minutes.

Before half-time, United's goalkeeper Gary Bailey, ironically, the son of Roy Bailey, Town's 'keeper when they won the League, had saved three penalties; one from Arnold Muhren and two from Kevin Beattie (one a re-take). Mariner completed his hat-trick in a one-sided second half as Ipswich equalled a club record of sixteen unbeaten games in a row.

Having beaten Liverpool 1-0 in 1978 and Southampton 3-2 in 1979, Nottingham Forest were hot favourites to win the League Cup for the third season in a row, while Wolves' skipper Emlyn Hughes was keen to add the trophy to his collection having surprisingly never won it during his glorious career at Anfield.

As the teams came onto the pitch, Forest were led out by trainer Jimmy Gordon who was retiring at the end of the season, as Brian Clough and Peter Taylor stayed out of the limelight.

A game of few chances was settled midway through the second half after a mix-up between goalkeeper Peter Shilton and centre-back Dave Needham, deputising for the suspended Larry Lloyd.

Peter Daniel aimed a long pass towards Andy Gray and in an attempt to deal with it, the two Forest players collided leaving the Scot with the simple task of slipping the ball into an empty net. Afterwards, Shilton accepted the blame for the incident and Clough also exonerated the defender.

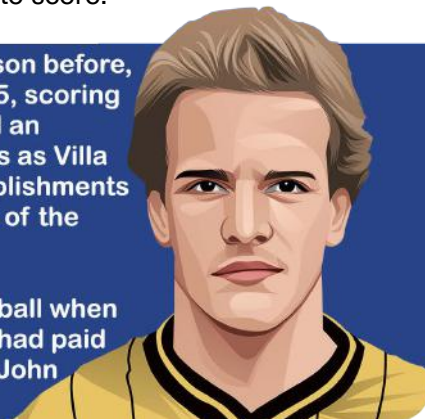
After collecting the trophy, Hughes said: "I was the worst player on the park, but it was like going home climbing up the steps to collect another Cup. Now I've got the lot."

It was also a great day for Wolves' boss John Barnwell who had been seriously injured in a car crash the previous year.

Football Legends

Having scored twenty-six League and Cup goals for Dundee United the season before, Andy Gray was signed by Aston Villa boss Ron Saunders in September, 1975, scoring twelve goals in his first season at the club. Aged just twenty-one, he enjoyed an astonishing second campaign, scoring twenty-nine goals in all competitions as Villa finished fourth in the First Division and won the League Cup. Andy's accomplishments during 1976-77 saw him voted PFA Young Player of the Year and PFA Player of the Year, the first person to win both awards in the same season.

In September 1979, Andy became the most expensive player in English football when he joined Wolves for £1.5 million, representing a healthy profit for Villa who had paid just £110,000 for his services four years before. He scored fifteen goals for John Barnwell's side that season, including the winner in the League Cup Final.

Having missed three penalties two weeks previously against Manchester United, on the Friday evening before this round of matches Ipswich Town missed two more against Leeds United. On this occasion, John Wark was the culprit, as his first penalty was saved by John Lukic but ordered to be re-taken by the referee and his second effort struck the bar.

Thankfully for Wark, centre-forward Paul Mariner sealed both points for Bobby Robson's side with a last-minute header to consolidate their position near the top of the table in their pursuit of a UEFA Cup place.

Leaders Liverpool had beaten Bristol City 4-0 at Anfield earlier in the season and Bob Paisley's men inflicted an eighth home defeat of the campaign on their opponents in doing the 'double' over them. Ray Kennedy blasted the visitors ahead after just five minutes and Kenny Dalglish scored two more in the second-half.

By contrast, on the south coast, Manchester United's title challenge was dealt another blow when they could only draw 0-0 with lowly Brighton. It was United's first-ever visit to the Goldstone Ground and just under 30,000 fans crammed into the stadium to watch the match.

In a game of few chances, it was the home side's promising midfielder Mark Lawrenson, who United boss Dave Sexton rated as one of the best young players in the country, who took the eye, creating but missing his team's best chances to score.

On the Saturday before this replay, the two teams played out a cautious 0-0 draw at Hillsborough, with Arsenal's Brian Talbot coming closest to scoring with a lob which hit the bar four minutes from time.

The run-up to that game had been hectic for the Gunners as, on Easter Monday, a weakened side had beaten Tottenham 2-1 at White Hart Lane and just forty-eight hours later they drew 1-1 with Juventus in the first-leg of their European Cup-Winners' Cup semi-final at Highbury.

The home side fell behind to Juve, a team featuring two-thirds of Italy's national side, from a penalty after nine minutes and just two minutes later had David O'Leary carried off following a foul by Roberto Bettega which boss Terry Neill described as 'vicious'.

Marco Tardelli was sent off on the half-hour mark for a foul on Liam Brady and justice was done when Bettega scored an own goal five minutes from time.

Jimmy Case had been injured at Hillsborough and left the ground with his arm in a sling after damaging his collar bone. He was ruled out of this encounter at Villa Park with David Fairclough taking his place and Kenny Dalglish dropping into midfield.

Fairclough gave the Anfield side the lead but Alan Sunderland ensured another stalemate when he equalised after beating the offside trap.

West Ham had last won the FA Cup in 1975 but had made early exits from the competition every season since then.

The road to Wembley this time around began with a 2-1 replay success over West Brom after a 1-1 draw at The Hawthorns, followed by a 3-2 win at Leyton Orient and a 2-0 victory over Swansea City. In the quarter-final, the Hammers beat Aston Villa 1-0 thanks to a Ray Stewart penalty two minutes from time.

Everton had not won the Cup since 1966 and had lost three semi-finals during that time - 1-0 to eventual winners Manchester City in 1969 and twice to Liverpool in 1971 and 1977. The Blues had seen off the challenges of Aldershot (4-1), Wigan (3-0), Wrexham 5-2 and Ipswich Town (2-1) to reach this stage.

In the first game at Villa Park, Brian Kidd put Gordon Lee's side in front from the penalty spot shortly before half-time but the course of the match changed when he was sent off around the hour mark and Stuart Pearson equalised to force this replay.

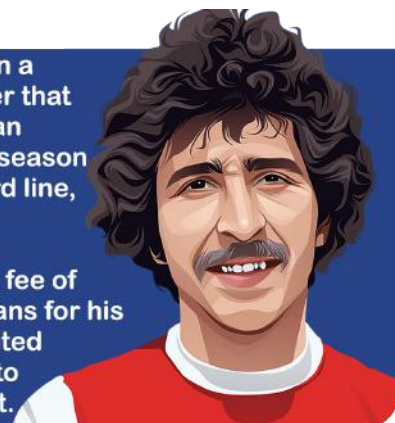
Following a goalless ninety minutes, Alan Devonshire put John Lyall's men ahead only for Bob Latchford to level things up.

Just when it looked that another replay would be required, full-back Frank Lampard popped up in the penalty box to head the ball into the corner of the net.

Football Legends

Alan Sunderland began his career at Wolverhampton Wanderers where he won a League Cup winners medal in 1974. His career suffered a setback in November that year when he broke his leg in training and, after recovering, he was played in an unfamiliar role at right-back. Wolves were relegated at the end of the 1975-76 season with Sammy Chung replacing Bill McGarry as manager. Restored to the forward line, Sunderland scored sixteen goals as the club earned immediate promotion.

Arsenal boss Terry Neill lured Sunderland to Highbury in November 1977 for a fee of £240,000, a record transfer for Wolves. He is most remembered by Gunners' fans for his winning goal in the 1979 FA Cup Final, when, after trailing 2-0, Manchester United scored twice in the last few minutes to equalise and seemingly take the game to extra-time, only for Sunderland to almost immediately put Arsenal back in front.

This long-drawn out saga had exacerbated the end-of-season fixture congestion for both sides. Forty-eight hours before this second replay, Liverpool had drawn 0-0 away at Crystal Palace having beaten Stoke City at the Victoria Ground during the week.

After producing a magnificent performance at the Stadio Comunale in Turin to beat Juventus 1-0, substitute Paul Vassen scoring late on, to advance to the European Cup-Winners' Cup Final in midweek, Arsenal boss Terry Neill rested several players for the 1-1 draw with West Brom on the Saturday but they all returned for this tie.

It was a magnificent match from start to finish, with the Gunners ahead after just fifteen seconds through Alan Sunderland. This gave them the perfect platform to sit back and see whether Bob Paisley's side could break down their defence whilst seeking to grab a second.

With just two minutes left, David Johnson and substitute David Fairclough collided in the penalty area, Johnson coming off worse and having to be carried from the field. Three minutes into injury time, Kenny Dalglish seized on a loose header six yards out and poked the ball into the net.

Also on this day, it was finally confirmed that 18-year-old Ian Rush had signed for Liverpool from Chester for a fee of £300,000, a world record for someone of his age.

Having had five stitches around his badly swollen right eye, David Johnson had bravely returned to the field in extra-time at Villa Park on Monday and he was passed fit for this third replay. However, Alan Kennedy was ruled out and his place at left-back was taken by Israeli international Avi Cohen.

This was now the longest-running FA Cup semi-final since March 1899, when Liverpool were knocked out in the second replay 1-0 by Sheffield United after drawing 2-2 and 4-4, with another game abandoned when the Reds were winning 1-0 as the 30,000-strong crowd kept encroaching on the Fallowfield pitch.

With the Cup Final itself only nine days away, the Football Association had mooted the idea of a penalty shootout if the teams still could not be separated after this replay, but Liverpool rejected the plan. So, if there was another stalemate, the fourth replay was scheduled for the following Monday at Bramall Lane.

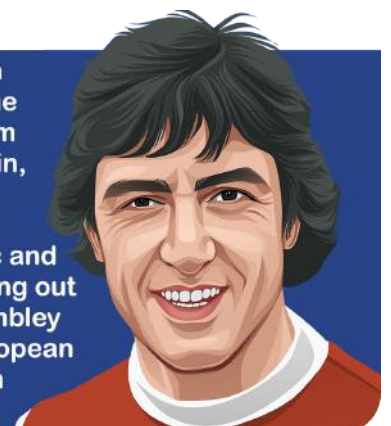
Arsenal midfielder Brian Talbot was chasing a unique hat-trick of FA Cup Final successes after picking up a winners medal with Ipswich in 1978 and the Gunners in 1979. He headed the ball home early in the first-half to put Terry Neill's side ahead and, on this occasion, there was no way back for Bob Paisley's men.

Liverpool had once again missed out on the chance to become only the third team in the 20th Century to win the League and Cup double.

Football Legends

Under manager Bobby Robson, Brian Talbot was a stalwart of the Ipswich Town midfield in the 1970s, helping his hometown club to shock Arsenal by winning the FA Cup in 1978. The Gunners were so impressed with Talbot that they signed him for £450,000 in January, 1979, and, in May, he appeared in the FA Cup Final again, scoring one of the goals which enabled Terry Neill's side to win the trophy.

The 1979-80 campaign was a gruelling one for Arsenal as they chased domestic and European honours. Talbot played in all seventy games the Gunners faced, missing out on a unique treble of FA Cup successes when the team lost to West Ham at Wembley and scoring a penalty in the dramatic penalty-shoot against Valencia in the European Cup-Winners's Cup Final which also ended in heartache. He left Highbury to join Graham Taylor's Watford in the summer of 1985.

While Arsenal's Brian Talbot was seeking to secure a record hat-trick of FA Cup Final wins, West Ham's Paul Allen set a new mark as the youngest-ever Wembley finalist. At 17 years and 256 days, he was 89 days younger than Howard Kendall who played for Preston North End in the 1964 final, ironically against West Ham.

Though John Lyall's side played in division two and had failed to win promotion, many people regarded them as a top flight team in the making and it was they who took the lead early on, England international Trevor Brooking heading home.

The Gunners dominated possession after the goal but rarely troubled goalkeeper Phil Parkes and, on a very warm day in the capital, as the second half wore on they began to run out of steam in the energy-sapping conditions, possibly also feeling the mental and physical strain of the recent marathon FA Cup semi-final matches against Liverpool and the European ties with Juventus.

Indeed, it was the youngster Allen who could have made the game safe for West Ham in the dying minutes but after bursting through on goal he was fouled by Willie Young, the big Scot earning a booking from referee George Courtney.

So, it was inspirational skipper Billy Bonds who led his side up the famous steps to collect the trophy, just as he had done in 1975 when the Hammers beat a Fulham side with Upton Park and England World Cup legend, Bobby Moore, in their ranks.

Arsenal began their European campaign with a 2-0 aggregate success over Fenerbahce of Turkey, followed by a 4-3 victory over two-legs against East German side Magdeburg. In the first leg of the quarter-final tie against IFK Gothenburg, managed by future England boss Sven-Goran Eriksson, the Gunners swept aside the Swedish team, winning 5-1 before drawing the return game 0-0.

Including the superb success in the brutal semi-final against Juventus, Terry Neill's side had played fourteen matches since the beginning of April, a punishing schedule, and the players had to also shrug off the disappointment of the FA Cup Final loss to West Ham just a few days before.

But, to a man, the Arsenal players performed heroically, with Liam Brady, playing his last major game for the Gunners before moving to Italy, and David O'Leary particularly outstanding.

However, after 120 minutes, the teams could not be separated and in the penalty shootout which followed it was Graham Rix who had the misfortune to miss the decisive spot kick, his shot being saved by goalkeeper Carlos Pereira.

So, Arsenal's gruelling seventy-match campaign ended in heartache and a 5-0 loss at Middlesbrough in the final League game meant there would be no consolation of European football next season either.

Football Legends

Sir Trevor Brooking spent his entire career at West Ham United, playing 643 games for the Hammers and scoring 102 goals, including a rare header in the 1980 FA Cup Final which gave John Lyall's side victory over top flight Arsenal. He made his debut on the first day of the 1967-68 season against Burnley, scoring his first goal on Boxing Day in a 4-2 victory over Leicester City, and retired in May, 1984.

He won forty-seven England caps and scored five goals, making his debut in 1974 when Sir Alf Ramsey was in charge and playing his last game against Spain in the 1982 World Cup under former West Ham manager, Ron Greenwood. Sir Trevor became a football analyst for the BBC in 1984, appearing regularly on Match of the Day and the channel's coverage of international tournaments.

Battling Irish secure a point

Former West Ham boss Ron Greenwood had taken over as England manager when Don Revie quit in 1977 to take up a lucrative tax-free job in the Middle East.

As he prepared his side for the European Championship finals in the summer, a few days before the start of the Home Internationals, England beat world champions Argentina, including a young Diego Maradona, in a high-profile friendly at Wembley.

Liverpool's David Johnson scored twice in that one, before Daniel Passarella pulled one back from the penalty spot and Kevin Keegan made it 3-1.

Then came the hammering against Wales, only the third defeat for Greenwood in his twenty-six matches in charge, prompting him to say: "The defeat won't do us any harm. It's better to have it now than in Italy. A good hiding like that will probably do us some good."

Several fringe players were given the opportunity to shine against the Irish, including Alan Devonshire who made his debut. But it was a lacklustre performance with no-one enhancing their claims for a place in the Euros squad.

After Johnson put the home side ahead, Terry Cochrane soon levelled things up to put Billy Bingham's side on the brink of their first outright Home International title, having shared the honour three times between 1955 and 1959 and again in 1964.

Football Legends

Belfast-born Billy Bingham began his playing career with Glentoran before moving to Sunderland, spending eight years at Roker Park, then switching to Luton Town for the 1958-59 season in which the club reached the FA Cup Final. He joined Everton in 1960, where he won the First Division title in 1962-63, and then Port Vale, where a broken leg in 1964 forced his retirement. He earned 56 caps for Northern Ireland and was a member of the side which reached the 1958 World Cup quarter-finals.

He began his managerial career at Southport in 1965 before moving on to Plymouth Argyle after a couple of seasons, where he shared his time as boss of Northern Ireland. He had a spell in charge of the Greek national side, then AEK Athens, followed in 1973 by two seasons back at Everton. He was re-appointed to the role of Northern Ireland manager in 1980, where he stayed for thirteen years.

The first match of the traditional end-of-season tournament saw Billy Bingham's Northern Ireland side beat Jock Stein's Scotland thanks to a goal from Billy Hamilton to earn their first win in the competition since 1975.

The next game saw England hammered 4-1 by Wales at the Racecourse Ground, despite going a goal behind. Inspired by a man-of-the-match performance from Leighton James, it was their first victory over England on home soil for twenty-five years and a dream start for new boss, Mike England.

After England and Northern Ireland shared the spoils at Wembley, Scotland bounced back from their Belfast loss to bring Wales crashing back down to earth. Willie Miller, who had recently captained Aberdeen to the Scottish title, scoring his first goal for his country.

In the penultimate match, Northern Ireland became British champions when a goal from Blackburn Rovers' Noel Brotherston earned them victory in Cardiff. The title had last gone to Ireland in 1914, before the country was divided.

In the final game, England gained a morale-boosting win ahead of the European Championships with a 2-0 success over the Scots, Trevor Brooking and Steve Coppell the scorers, which meant Stein's side finished bottom of the table.

Manchester United pushed Liverpool all the way during this campaign and hit top spot themselves in December following a 2-1 victory over Tottenham at White Hart Lane, Steve Coppell with a late winner.

After the 6-0 hammering by Ipswich Town, Dave Sexton's side drew their next two games to slip four points behind Liverpool having played a game more.

But they then responded superbly to win eight out of the next nine games, including 2-1 at Old Trafford against Bob Paisley's men, which put them level on points as the season neared its conclusion.

However, a 2-0 loss at Elland Road in United's final match of the campaign, coupled with Liverpool's 4-1 win at Anfield against Aston Villa, saw them crowned division one champions for the fourth time in five seasons.

Though the race for the title was over, Arsenal's season was still very much alive at this stage, with two Cup Finals to play and a European place in their sights.

After agonisingly losing to both West Ham and Valencia, the Gunners bravely bounced back with a 2-0 win at Molineux and needed victory over Middlesbrough in the division's final game to pip Ipswich for a UEFA Cup place. But it proved a match too far for the tired minds and bodies of the players and they crashed to a 5-0 defeat.

Football Legends

As a player, Brian Clough was one of the most prolific strikers in English football, scoring an incredible 267 goals in just 296 matches for Middlesbrough and Sunderland. His career came to an end on an icy Roker Park pitch on Boxing Day in 1962, after a collision with Bury goalkeeper, Chris Harker, which damaged the cruciate ligament in his knee. He missed the whole of the 1963-64 season and though he attempted a comeback during the following campaign, he lasted only three games.

Together with his assistant, Peter Taylor, Clough's time as a manager began at Hartlepool United in 1965 and two years later he was appointed boss at Derby County, where he won the First Division title in 1971-72. After brief spells at Brighton and, without Taylor, at Leeds, he joined Nottingham Forest in January, 1975, winning another League title, two European Cups, the European Super Cup and four League Cups.

Nottingham Forest's success in winning the European Cup at the end of the 1978-79 season earned them a two-legged Super Cup clash with Cup-Winners' Cup victors Barcelona. Arsenal legend Charlie George, at this time in his career on loan from Southampton, gave Forest a one-goal lead at the City Ground.

At Camp Nou a week later, though Barca equalised the aggregate score from the penalty spot, Kenny Burns headed Brian Clough's side back in front just before half-time.

The visitors had the opportunity to stretch the lead just after the interval after Stan Bowles was brought down, but John Robertson wasted the resulting penalty kick. The miss did not prove costly, though, as Clough claimed yet another trophy.

To reach a second successive European Cup Final, Forest had to overcome Ajax in the semis. Goals from Trevor Francis and John Robertson, with a spot kick, enabled them to travel to Amsterdam two goals to the good and though Soren Lerby halved the deficit for the Dutch side, the visitors held on.

John Robertson scored the only goal of the game in Madrid with defenders Larry Lloyd and Kenny Burns, together with goalkeeper Peter Shilton, repelling all that a Kevin Keegan-inspired Hamburg could throw at them. Though Forest had missed out on a hat-trick of League Cup wins, this was another glorious chapter in the Brian Clough-Peter Taylor storybook.

This was England's first appearance in this tournament since 1968 when only four nations competed in the final stages.

On that occasion, England lost their semi-final against Yugoslavia 1-0 before securing third spot by beating the Soviet Union 2-0, with goals from Bobby Charlton and Geoff Hurst. Hosts Italy beat Yugoslavia in the final, 2-0.

In 1980, the competition, again staged in Italy, had been expanded to eight teams in two groups of four.

Sadly, England's first match was marred by hooliganism in the stadium which began midway through the first half after Belgium had equalised an earlier goal from Ray Wilkins. Tear gas used by the riot police to restore order drifted across the pitch causing the referee to halt the match for several minutes.

The second and crucial game, also at the Stadio Comunale in Turin, was against Italy and Ron Greenwood's side had chances to win it, including Ray Kennedy hitting a post. But it was the home side who claimed the victory eleven minutes from time, Marco Tardelli scoring following a mistake by Phil Neal.

Trevor Brooking gave England the lead in the final match against Spain who levelled from the penalty spot just after half-time. Ray Clemence then saved another penalty before Tony Woodcock made it 2-1.

The four teams involved in Group 1 were West Germany, Czechoslovakia (the winners in 1976), the Netherlands and Greece, with the Germans and the Dutch both enjoying 1-0 victories in the first round of games against the Czech and Greek sides.

A few days later, Klaus Allofs scored a hat-trick as Germany beat the Netherlands 3-2 and the Czechs defeated Greece 3-1.

In the final group games, Czechoslovakia and the Netherlands drew 1-1, with the Czechs qualifying for the third place playoff due to a superior goal difference. West Germany topped the table despite being held 0-0 by Greece.

The day before the final, the Czechs clinched third place by beating Italy 9-8 on penalties, with Antonin Penenka, whose audacious and now famous spot-kick won the tournament for his country four years earlier, again converting one of them.

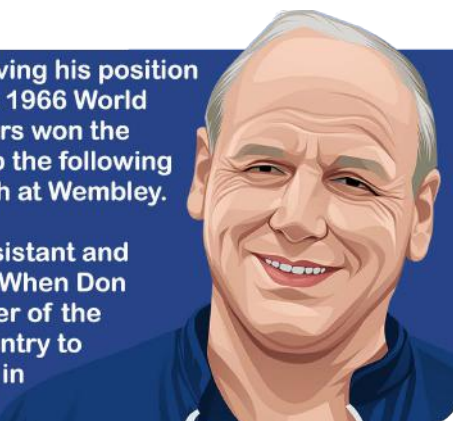
The final was dominated by Jupp Derwall's West German side after Horst Hrubesch gave them an early lead. A controversial penalty fifteen minutes from the end restored parity, with Rene Vandereycken converting it though the foul on Francois van der Elst seemed outside the area.

With the clock ticking down to extra-time, justice was done as Hrubesch headed home Karl-Heinz Rummenigge's corner.

Football Legends

Ron Greenwood became manager of West Ham United in April, 1961, leaving his position as chief coach at Arsenal. He helped to develop the careers of England's 1966 World Cup winners Bobby Moore, Geoff Hurst and Martin Peters, as the Hammers won the FA Cup in 1964, beating Preston 3-2, and the European Cup-Winners' Cup the following season, Alan Sealey scoring both goals in a 2-0 win over TSV 1860 Munich at Wembley.

In 1974, Greenwood became general manager at Upton Park, with his assistant and former West Ham player, John Lyall, taking over control of team matters. When Don Revie quit as England boss in 1977, Ron was appointed caretaker manager of the national team, with the position then made permanent. He guided his country to qualification for the European Championships in 1980 and the World Cup in 1982, the first time England had appeared in the competition since 1970.

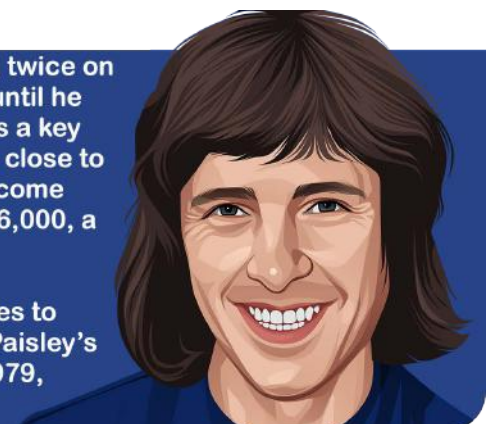

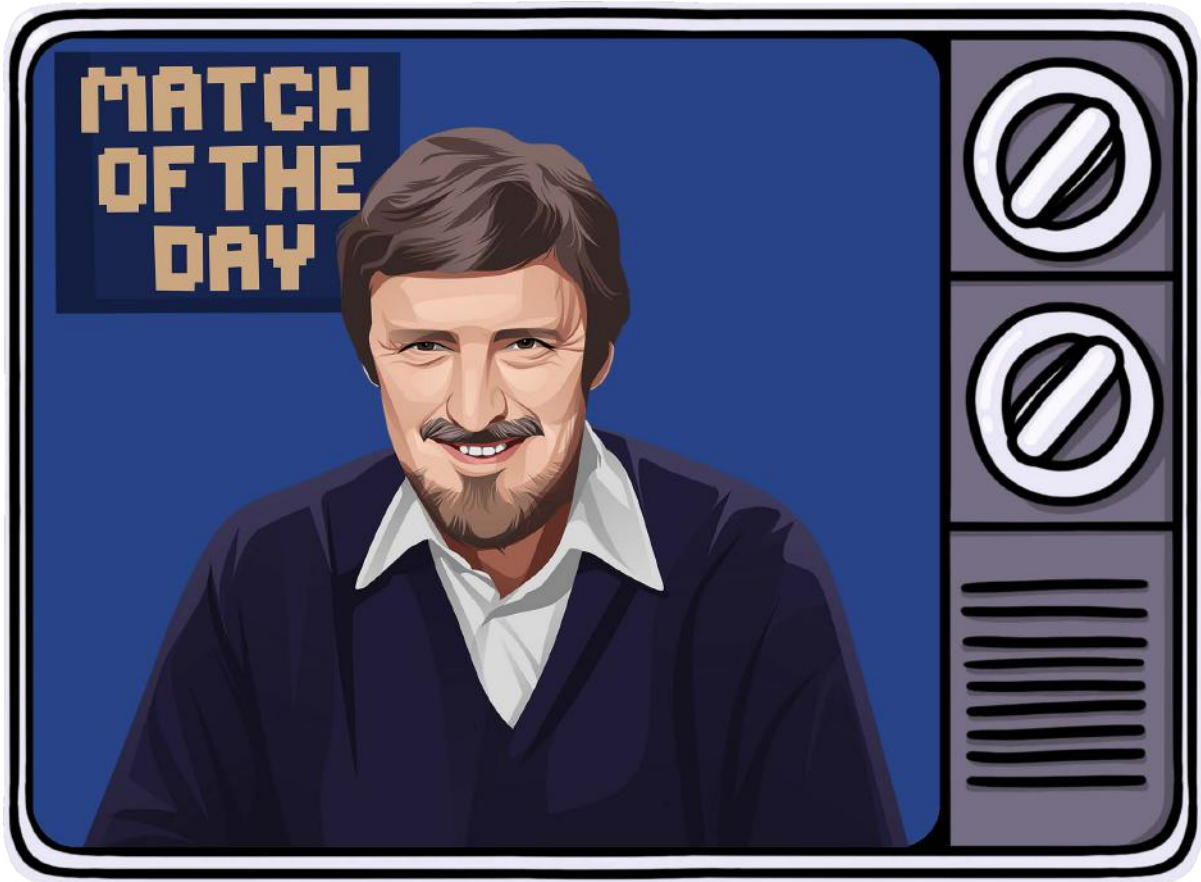
Football Legends

Manchester-born Stan Bowles began his career at Maine Road, scoring twice on his debut for Joe Mercer's City side in September, 1967, but it was not until he signed for Queens Park Rangers in 1972 that his career took off. He was a key member of the exciting team developed by Dave Sexton which came so close to winning the division one title in 1975-76. Bowles had backed QPR to become champions at the start of the season at odds of 16/1 and stood to win £6,000, a sizeable sum in the mid-1970s, if they could do so.

The Loftus Road side needed Liverpool to lose their final match at Wolves to claim the crown, but three goals in the last fifteen minutes sealed Bob Paisley's first title as manager. Bowles joined Nottingham Forest in December, 1979, but left just six months later after clashes with manager, Brian Clough.

Match of the Day was first broadcast to a very limited audience on BBC2 at 6.30pm on August 22nd, 1964, introduced by and with commentary from the great Kenneth Wolstenholme, famous for his 'they think it's all over' quote towards the end of the 1966 World Cup Final.

Liverpool were the defending division one champions and Bill Shankly's side opened their campaign with a thrilling 3-2 victory over Arsenal, Roger Hunt scoring the first-ever goal on the programme. The Reds were also featured in the first match broadcast in colour on November 15th 1969, a 2-0 win at Anfield over West Ham, Chris Lawler and Bobby Graham on target.

Former footballer (Brentford and Fulham) and manager (Coventry City), as well as chairman of the Professional Footballers' Association when the £20 maximum wage was abolished in 1961, Jimmy Hill was the host of the show for most of the 1980s, with Des Lynam taking over the role in 1988.

This was Liverpool's fifth appearance in seven seasons in the traditional season-opener and they had still to taste defeat.

The difference between the First Division champions and the FA Cup holders was a mistake by West Ham goalkeeper Phil Parkes, who mishandled a shot from Alan Kennedy and Footballer of the Year Terry McDermott accepted the gift.

The biggest transfer news over the summer had been the return to English football of the great Kevin Keegan, England captain and twice European Footballer of the Year, who had spent three seasons at Hamburg since leaving Liverpool following the club's European Cup Final victory in 1977. He joined Lawrie McMenemy's Southampton for £400,000.

But there was more huge transfer news on the run-up to the opening games of the season when it emerged that 19-year-old Clive Allen, who had only signed for Arsenal from QPR in June for a fee of £1 million and had not yet played a game for the Gunners, was moving to Crystal Palace with left-back Kenny Sansom going the other way.

The same week, QPR boss Tommy Docherty also sold Allen's ex-strike partner 20-year-old Paul Goddard to West Ham for £800,000. Allen had scored thirty goals for Docherty's side the previous season, while Goddard had contributed sixteen.

As well as scoring the Match of the Day Goal of the Season, Justin Fashanu notched another ten during his first full season in the Norwich City first team. His 1980-81 campaign began in spectacular fashion with this hat-trick against Stoke City.

Manager John Bond left the club in October to replace Malcolm Allison at Manchester City, being succeeded by Ken Brown. But though Fashanu did his bit by scoring nineteen League goals for City, they were relegated the following May.

Elsewhere on the opening day, two of Brighton boss Alan Mullery's summer signings Gordon Smith and Michael Robinson performed well, with Robinson setting up Smith to score the first as well as full-back John Gregory to notch the second in a 2-0 win over League Cup Winners, Wolves.

Another new strikeforce, Tottenham's Steve Archibald and Garth Crooks, also shone, as Spurs beat the European champions Nottingham Forest 2-0.

First Division champions Liverpool were again impressive by defeating the team dubbed by the press as the Team Of The 80s for their youthful potential, Crystal Palace, managed by Terry Venables, 3-0.

At The Dell, Kevin Keegan's debut for Southampton saw the Saints beat Manchester City 2-0, both goals coming from Mick Channon.

Football Legends

Geoff Hurst and Martin Peters, together with Bobby Moore, were not only World Cup-winners with England, they were also team-mates in the successful West Ham side of the Swinging Sixties and both had brief spells in management in the early 1980s.

Hurst became Chelsea boss in September, 1979, but was sacked 18 months later and took on a job in insurance as well as punditry work for Anglia Television. Peters had joined Sheffield United as a player-coach in August, 1980, becoming caretaker manager the following January, but was unable to save the Blades from relegation. In December, 1981, there was speculation the duo would be reunited in management at Norwich City, but the board stuck with Ken Brown.

Cup-holders Forest bow out

Liverpool's record victory at Anfield was the 11-0 hammering of Norwegian side Stromsgodset in the first round of the European Cup-Winners' Cup in September 1974. There were no less than nine different scorers in that match with only midfielder Brian Hall and goalkeeper Ray Clemence missing out.

Another huge haul came in the first round Inter-Cities Fairs Cup tie in September 1969 when Bill Shankly's side beat Irish team Dundalk 10-0. There were seven different scorers that evening and one of the spectators on the Kop was future Liverpool manager Gerard Houllier who was a teacher in the city at the time.

Having won the European Cup in 1977 and 1978, the Reds had been knocked out at the first round stage in the past two seasons; by Nottingham Forest in the autumn of 1978 and by Dinamo Tbilisi in 1979.

There was no indication of the rout that was to come when Oulu and Liverpool met in the first leg in Finland, Terry McDermott scoring in a 1-1 draw.

Bob Paisley stressed to his players the need to avoid complacency in the return leg and they certainly took that on board with a totally dominant display against the amateurs. Kenny Dalglish missed the chance to equal the eleven goal tally of six years before when he ballooned the ball over the bar from three yards out near the end.

The experience gained in two consecutive successful campaigns in the European Cup had stood Brian Clough's side in good stead two weeks before this game at the City Ground. Forest's rear guard had silenced the 70,000 strong Bulgarian crowd and goalkeeper Peter Shilton had few saves to make.

Just after half-time, John Robertson hit the post and had that gone in perhaps the whole tie would have been different. As it was, with twenty minutes left, it was CSKA who scored the only goal.

This second leg was a crushing disappointment for Forest fans, with the visitors deservedly winning on the night and 2-0 on aggregate. Manager Brian Clough said afterwards: "I am still trying to work out who played well for us. We had nothing up front, nothing in the middle and nothing at the back."

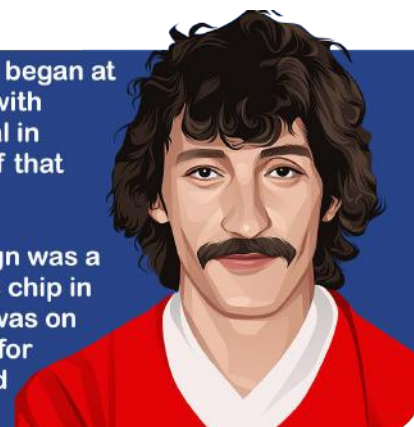
Elsewhere, West Ham produced a stirring comeback in the Cup-Winners' Cup at an empty Upton Park, closed due to crowd trouble in Spain during the first leg. Trailling 3-1 to Castilla, the Hammers won 5-1 after extra-time.

In the UEFA Cup, with a 5-1 lead over Aris Salonika, Ipswich Town were expecting an easy second leg in Greece but at one stage were 3-0 down and rocking. Eric Gates scored to steady the ship and Bobby Robson's side went through 6-4 on aggregate, but both Manchester United and Wolves were knocked out.

Football Legends

Though Kirkby born-and-bred and a Liverpool fan, Terry McDermott's career began at Bury from where he moved to Newcastle United in February 1973. Together with another future Anfield hero, Alan Kennedy, he played in the 1974 FA Cup Final in which the Magpies were hammered 3-0 by Bill Shankly's side. In November of that year, though, he was signed by new boss Bob Paisley for a fee of £175,000.

After a couple of seasons on the periphery of the team, the 1976-77 campaign was a pivotal one for McDermott as the club battled for honours on three fronts. His chip in the FA Cup semi-final against Everton was voted Goal of the Season and he was on target in the European Cup Final win in Rome. In total, Terry scored 81 goals for the club, 58 of which came in his last three seasons and, in 1982, he re-joined Newcastle and teamed up again with Kevin Keegan.

Bobby Robson's Ipswich Town had made an impressive start to the season, winning nine of their first twelve games in all competitions.

The only defeat came at Ayresome Park in the first leg of a second round League Cup tie against Middlesbrough, but they turned that 3-1 deficit around in the return game, winning 3-0 with two goals from Paul Mariner and one from Russell Osman.

In the third round, a late Justin Fashanu equaliser for fierce East Anglian rivals Norwich City forced a replay at Carrow Road, where another brace from Mariner in a 3-1 win saw the Tractor Boys through.

The Suffolk side topped the Division One table outright until the middle of October when a 1-1 draw at Portman Road coupled with a 3-0 win over Tottenham by Aston Villa saw Ron Saunders' men move level on points, though Town had played one game less.

A few days later, while Ipswich were beating Bohemians of Prague 3-0 in a UEFA Cup second round, first leg tie, Villa beat Brighton 4-1 to establish a two-point lead at the top, though now having played two games more than their closest rivals.

A home draw with West Brom while Villa were beating Leicester left Robson's team three points adrift of the leaders and that gap remained after this first League defeat of the season.

After winning their first three games of the season, in early September Aston Villa suffered back-to-back defeats; 1-0 to Ipswich Town at Portman Road and 2-0 to Everton at Villa Park.

After that, though, the team embarked on a twelve-match unbeaten run in the League which took them to the top of the table. The only setback during that time was a shock 2-1 loss at the Abbey Stadium to Second Division side Cambridge United in the League Cup.

Villa's title credentials were thoroughly tested in this clash at Carrow Road, with the home side dominating the first-half and deservedly leading 1-0 at the break. The visitors turned the game on its head in the second period, scoring three goals without reply, prompting manager Ron Saunders to say:

"Sticking at it is one of the qualities of success. We had three or four players below par, but they all gave 100 percent. As far as I am concerned we have just finished the sixth round of a fifteen-round fight and have the comfort of being ahead on points."

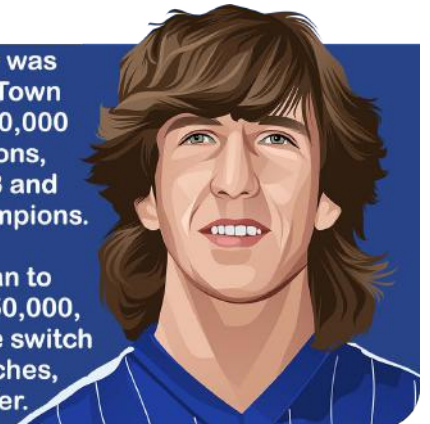
Man-of-the-match for the visitors was youngster Gary Shaw, the only Birmingham-born player in the team, who scored two goals and laid on the third for Allan Evans to head home.

On the same evening, Liverpool jumped above Ipswich Town in the table after a 2-1 victory at Anfield over Coventry City, David Johnson scoring both goals.

Football Legends

After scoring 61 goals in 155 appearances for Plymouth Argyle, Paul Mariner was attracting the attention of both West Ham and West Brom but it was Ipswich Town who won the race for his signature in October, 1976. Bobby Robson paid £220,000 for the services of the Bolton-born striker who, over the following eight seasons, hit 136 goals in 337 games for the Suffolk side, which won the FA Cup in 1978 and the UEFA Cup in 1981, as well as twice going close to becoming League champions.

After Robson left to become England manager, his great team gradually began to break-up and in January, 1984, aged thirty, Mariner moved to Arsenal for £150,000, following Frans Thijssen, Mick Mills and Alan Brazil out of Portman Road. The switch to the Gunners was not a great success and after scoring 17 goals in 70 matches, in 1986 he was allowed to leave the club and join Portsmouth on a free transfer.

Forest take slender lead to Spain

This had been an incredibly inconsistent season for Brian Clough's Nottingham Forest with solid form in Division One, including 5-0 wins over Stoke City and Leicester City, but disappointing early exits from both the European Cup and the League Cup, the latter a 4-1 hammering at second tier Watford.

There were also rumours of unhappiness amongst the squad, with John Robertson one of those supposedly seeking to quit the club, while centre-half Larry Lloyd was reportedly wanted as player-manager by Millwall.

Having won the Super Cup by defeating Barcelona during the last campaign, Forest were seeking to get their season back on track after three successive League defeats.

They went down to two Frank Worthington goals at Birmingham before back-to-back home losses, 3-0 to Tottenham and 2-1 to Ipswich, which dropped them to eighth in the table.

Though Forest had the better of the first half against Valencia, it was the current Spanish League leaders who went in front just eighty seconds into the second period.

The home side deservedly equalised before the hour mark through Ian Bowyer and it was he who ensured the two-time European Cup holders took a lead to Spain by latching on to a Kenny Burns knockdown near the end.

Football Legends

Nottingham-born Viv Anderson had already broken into the Forest team, aged 18, when Brian Clough was appointed manager at the City Ground in January, 1975, after his unhappy spell at Leeds United. He played a crucial role as Clough took the club on an incredible journey from the Second Division to two-time European champions in just five years, as well as winning the League title and two League Cups.

Viv earned a call-up to the England squad in 1978, becoming the country's first black senior international. He later wrote: "A lot has been said over the years about the climate in football for black players at that time, when me, Cyrille (Regis), Laurie (Cunningham) and Brendan (Batson) were coming through and it was very tough. But I recall Cloughie saying to me 'if you're going to let people like that dictate to you, you're no good to me and you're no good to yourself'."

Forest were so depleted that they could only name three substitutes instead of the usual five.

Neither side created many chances over the ninety minutes and it was Uruguay's Fernando Morena who settled the tie, his strike making the final score 2-2 with the Spanish side securing the trophy on the away goals rule.

Clough was pleased with his team's performance if not the result, praising young Scot Colin Walsh for his contribution, and expressing delight that Trevor Francis came through the game without any ill-effects.

Liverpool had also been beaten by Leicester 2-0 at Filbert Street back in August, marking the first time in six seasons they had lost home and away to one of their top flight opponents.

They slipped four points off the top two, after Ipswich beat Stoke City 4-0 and Aston Villa defeated Manchester City 1-0.

That gap widened to six on this day after the Reds lost 2-0 at The Hawthorns to goals from Bryan Robson and Cyrille Regis, while Villa produced a scintillating performance at Goodison Park.

Tony Morley scored a wonderful solo goal early on, latching on to a superb ball from Gary Shaw and running at the Everton defenders before unleashing an unstoppable right foot shot into the roof of the net.

With two-thirds of the season completed, Ipswich Town had only been beaten twice, 1-0 by Brighton in November and 5-3 by Tottenham Hotspur a week before Christmas. Bobby Robson's side were drawing 3-3 at White Hart Lane in that one before Eric Gates was sent off for retaliation after which the visitors conceded two late goals.

In this match, the home side were behind at half-time but produced a tremendous display after the break to turn the match on its head before the hour mark, inspired by Paul Mariner.

The centre-forward levelled the game up when side-footing an Eric Gates cross into the net and it was soon 2-1 as he was upended in the box by the Palace 'keeper and John Wark converted the penalty. The striker also claimed the third goal but it was later attributed as an own goal by defender Billy Gilbert. Mariner did get on the scoresheet again, though, when he inadvertently headed a corner beyond Paul Cooper.

The victories for Ipswich and Villa coupled with Liverpool's loss meant the destination of the League title was looking increasingly between that pair, with both on 42 points, though the East Anglian side had a game in hand.

Robson's team had also reached the quarter-finals of the UEFA Cup and the FA Cup in what was shaping up to be a memorable campaign.

Football Legends

Kevin Beattie is considered by many Ipswich Town fans as the club's greatest-ever player. Born and raised in Carlisle, he joined the Tractor Boys' youth academy aged fifteen and made his full debut three years later, on the first day of the 1972-73 season, a 2-1 win over Manchester United at Old Trafford. Injuries restricted his appearances over the years and his final game was the FA Cup semi-final loss to Manchester City in April 1981, when he left the field early due to a broken arm, though he had played a big part in helping the club reach the UEFA Cup final.

Bobby Robson described Kevin as "the best defensive player that this country has produced", while Ipswich and England captain Terry Butcher said he was "my hero and my inspiration". Three statues grace the area around Portman Road, those of Sir Alf Ramsey, Sir Bobby Robson and, fittingly, Kevin Beattie.

Liverpool's road to Wembley and the club's second appearance in a League Cup Final, having lost out to Nottingham Forest in 1978, began with a shock 1-0 defeat at Fourth Division Bradford City.

Bob Paisley's side rectified that loss by winning the second leg 4-0 before securing victories over Swindon (5-0), Portsmouth (4-1) and Birmingham City (3-1) to set up a semi-final against Manchester City. In the first-leg at Maine Road, the home side started the stronger but it was Liverpool who won it through Ray Kennedy.

In the return leg at Anfield, Kenny Dalglish put the Reds 2-0 up on aggregate before a mistake by Ray Clemence allowed Reeves to equalise on the night setting up a tense finish but the Reds held on.

West Ham's route to north London started with a 6-0 aggregate success over Burnley then a 2-1 win over Charlton at The Valley followed by a come-from-behind 2-1 victory against Barnsley at Upton Park.

Still a Division Two side at this stage, the Hammers claimed the scalp of top-flight Tottenham in round five, David Cross scoring the only goal. After leading 2-0 in the first-leg of the semi-final, John Lyall's side conceded three times to Division One Coventry.

In the return, Paul Goddard levelled the tie on the hour mark and in the dying seconds Jimmy Neighbour booked another trip to Wembley.

The first match at Wembley only really exploded into life at the end of extra-time when Alan Kennedy's goal was allowed to stand despite Sammy Lee appearing to be in an offside position. Not to be denied, with just seconds left, West Ham were awarded a penalty after Terry McDermott handled on the line and Ray Stewart converted the spot kick to force this replay.

Both David Johnson and David Fairclough were unfit, so Bob Paisley opted to bring in the inexperienced Ian Rush. It was only the nineteen-year-old's second start for the club, having featured in a 1-1 draw with Ipswich back in December.

In a pulsating match, the Hammers took the lead when winger Jimmy Neighbour crossed for Paul Goddard to head home. Liverpool stepped up the pressure and equalised through Kenny Dalglish, the Scot latching on to a chipped pass from Terry McDermott to scoop the ball home.

The decisive goal came just four minutes later, when Alan Hansen's header from a corner hit Billy Bonds on the knee and flew beyond goalkeeper Phil Parkes.

Afterwards, as he celebrated his ninth trophy as Liverpool boss and the first-ever League Cup success for the club, Paisley was full of praise for the youngster Rush, saying: "Ian's performance was possibly the bonus of the night even if we hadn't won. It was pleasing to see him do so well."

Football Legends

In May 1977, with Liverpool closing in on the division one title and preparing for the FA Cup and European Cup Finals, Bob Paisley signed 21-year-old Alan Hansen from Partick Thistle for £100,000, the first of three Scottish players who would join the club over the following months - Kenny Dalglish in August and Graeme Souness in January - and ensure the Reds' continuing dominance for seasons to come.

From his first game for the club in September 1977, a 1-0 win over Derby County, to his final match in April 1990, a 2-1 victory over QPR which confirmed Liverpool as First Division champions for the final time, Hansen played 620 games for the club, scoring 14 goals. He was made club captain shortly after Kenny Dalglish took over as manager in 1985 and was a favourite to succeed Dalglish when he quit as boss in 1991 but he had no interest in doing so, preferring a media career instead.

Having seen off the challenges of QPR (3-1 after a replay), Hull City (2-0), Coventry City (3-1) and Exeter City (2-0), in the semi-final Tottenham were drawn against Wolves who were seeking a return trip to Wembley after lifting the League Cup in 1980.

After Steve Archibald gave Spurs an early lead at Hillsborough, Kenny Hibbitt latched on to an Andy Gray knockdown to level things up. Glenn Hoddle restored the advantage for Keith Burkinshaw's men before half-time and they had one foot in the Final with just seconds of the match left.

But then Kenny Hibbitt was adjudged to have been fouled by Hoddle in the penalty area and headline-seeking referee Clive Thomas pointed to the spot. Willie Carr was given the responsibility of scoring and he made no mistake, sending the match into a goalless period of extra time and then a replay at Highbury which Spurs won comfortably, 3-0.

Manchester City had a troubled start to the season and were without a win in their first ten matches with Malcolm Allison as manager. John Bond replaced Allison as boss in mid-October and results improved dramatically, with City reaching the League Cup semi-final and, after wins against Crystal Palace (4-0), Bond's previous club Norwich City (6-0), Peterborough (1-0) and Everton (3-1 after a 2-2 draw at Goodison), the same stage of the FA Cup, where they beat high-flying Ipswich 1-0 after extra-time.

Football Legends

Argentina won the World Cup in 1978 and just a few weeks after the triumph, two players from their squad joined Tottenham Hotspur, Osvaldo 'Ossie' Ardiles and Ricardo 'Ricky' Villa, for a total fee of £750,000.

The famous 1981 FA Cup Final between Tottenham and Manchester City, the 100th in the history of the competition, is most remembered for Villa's winning wonder goal in the replay - and perhaps the song 'Ossie's Dream (Spurs Are On Their Way To Wembley)' with Ardiles vowing to win the Cup for 'Tottingham'.

Tommy Hutchison was signed by John Bond from Coventry City for £47,000 shortly after being appointed manager at Maine Road and he played a key role as the club's form and fortunes improved.

On Saturday, with goalkeeper Joe Corrigan saving everything Spurs could throw at him, it appeared that Hutchison's early header from Ray Ranson's cross would be enough for City to lift the Cup. But with the clock running down, Glenn Hoddle's shot took a wicked deflection off the oldest player on the pitch, leaving Corrigan helpless.

Though the 100th FA Cup Final was by no means a classic, the replay a few days later certainly was. Ossie Ardiles started the move which led to the opening goal and it was his Argentinian compatriot Ricky Villa who scored it. A few minutes later, though, and City were back on terms thanks to a unstoppable volley from the edge of the area by 19-year-old Steve Mackenzie.

Bond's side went ahead just after half-time when Paul Miller fouled David Bennett and Kevin Reeves made no mistake with the penalty. Garth Crooks latched onto Hoddle's scooped pass over the City defence to make it 2-2 and then Villa scored one of the greatest goals ever seen at the famous old stadium. Receiving the ball outside the box, he drove forward into the area, twisting and turning three City defenders, before sliding it under Corrigan and into the net.

Three days after Ipswich Town were beaten in the FA Cup semi-final at Villa Park 1-0 by Manchester City, Paul Power scoring the goal in extra-time, the dejected side faced title rivals Aston Villa at the same venue.

Though Bobby Robson's team still had a game in hand and a superior goal difference, they were three points adrift of leaders Villa and, with just a handful of matches left, it was imperative that they left the Midlands with both points.

A defensive mix-up between 'keeper Jimmy Rimmer and centre-half Ken McNaught allowed Alan Brazil to put the visitors ahead and ten minutes from time another error, this time a poor back-pass by Des Bremner, resulted in Eric Gates making it 2-0. Though Gary Shaw pulled a goal back, the gap at the top was now down to just a single point.

Afterwards, TV commentator Barry Davies asked Villa boss Ron Saunders if, after the loss, he felt everything was still to play for and he replied, defiantly and famously: "I think so. Do you want to bet against us?"

The manager's belief was well-placed as the following Saturday, Ipswich lost 2-0 at home to Arsenal while Villa beat Nottingham Forest by the same scoreline, re-establishing their three point lead. Two days later, the Tractor Boys lost the East Anglian derby 1-0, while Villa drew with Stoke, and this victory over Middlesbrough in their last home game effectively sealed the title.

While Villa were beating Middlesbrough, Ipswich Town gained a degree of revenge for their FA Cup semi-final loss when they beat Manchester City 1-0 at Portman Road to keep alive their hopes of winning the title.

With similar goal differences, Bobby Robson's side trailed Villa by four points with two games to play, away at Middlesbrough and home to Southampton, while Ron Saunders' team had a tough final match at in-form Arsenal.

A week later, with Villa 2-0 down at half-time to the Gunners and the Tractor Boys leading at Ayresome Park through a Paul Mariner goal, Robson's dream of emulating Sir Alf Ramsey and bringing the division one trophy to Suffolk was alive and kicking.

While there was to be no second-half comeback at Highbury, Yugoslav striker Bosco Jankovic equalised for Boro ten minutes after the interval and struck again two minutes from time to confirm Villa as League champions for the first time since 1910.

Town's final League game of an exhausting campaign was played in between the first and second legs of the UEFA Cup Final, the club's last chance to win silverware after a season which had promised so much. Lawrie McMenemy's Saints stormed into a three-goal lead after twenty minutes and though the home side pulled it back to 3-2 before half-time, they could not find an equaliser.

The route to the final began with an impressive first-leg 5-1 defeat of Greek side Aris Salonika but the return game was harder than expected with Bobby Robson's side at one stage 3-0 down before an Eric Gates goal calmed their nerves.

There was a similar scenario in the next round, when a 3-0 lead established at Portman Road against Bohemians was almost thrown away as the team lost 2-0 in Prague.

Against Polish team Widzew Lodz in the third round, a brilliant 5-0 victory at home rendered the 1-0 defeat in the away leg of no consequence and, in the quarter-final, the players were on fire, beating Saint-Etienne, a team including Michel Platini, 7-2 on aggregate. Town made it through to their first European final with 1-0 wins home and away against Cologne.

In the first leg, John Wark set them on the road to glory when he converted a penalty to register his 35th goal of the campaign and 13th in this competition. FWA Footballer of the Year Frans Thijssen added the second and Paul Mariner gave the Suffolk side a commanding first leg lead.

As in earlier rounds, Robson's men wobbled in Holland but the insurance of two first-half away goals meant AZ required six goals to win and they fell just short. Wark's strike in Amsterdam saw him equal the record for goals scored in this competition.

Football Legends

In the summer of 1980, Ipswich Town manager Bobby Robson gave his players permission to appear in a feature film being shot in Hungary, set in the Second World War, about allied prisoners playing a football match against a German team.

Russell Osman and Paul Cooper (right) signed up for the movie along with team-mates including John Wark and Kevin Beattie. Osman and Wark had speaking parts, while Cooper was the action double for Sylvester Stallone and Beattie for Michael Caine. When the film was released, there was much hilarity amongst the Ipswich players at the premiere as Wark's voice had been dubbed due to his strong Glaswegian accent.

In early May, the death of IRA prisoner Bobby Sands in Belfast's Maze prison following his sixty-six day hunger strike sparked renewed protests in the province. But it was against government advice that, just three days before the proposed match between Northern Ireland and England, the Football Association called it off.

The Minister for Sport, Hector Munro, said the decision was "a sad day for British sport" whilst Billy Bingham, boss of the Home International champions, declared: "It is a stunning blow. The championship is now a nonsense."

The day before the opening game of the tournament, Wales against Scotland, the Welsh FA announced that their match in Belfast was also cancelled after several players expressed misgivings about the fixture.

At the Vetch Field, two goals from Crystal Palace forward Ian Walsh gave the home side victory and the Scots also had Joe Jordan sent off for elbowing an opponent.

In midweek, the Scots bounced back from the loss in Wales to record a 2-0 win over Northern Ireland, with West Ham's Ray Stewart and Tottenham's Steve Archibald the men on target.

The following evening, England and Wales played out a poor 0-0 draw at Wembley in front of just 34,280 fans to make it four games without a win at the iconic venue for Ron Greenwood's side.

Due to trouble at previous England against Scotland internationals at Wembley, the sale of match tickets north of the border had been banned and there were strict curbs on the sale of alcohol in London, while bus and train services to the ground were suspended.

Though the attendance was given officially at 90,000, journalists at the match estimated it to be closer to 60,000. But after the FA had indicated that any trouble could lead to the fixture being cancelled for good, thankfully, there were no major incidents of violence.

Players from Liverpool and Ipswich Town, who were both involved in end-of-season European finals were not involved in the tournament and there was a strong case to say this affected Scotland more than England, with Alan Hansen, Graeme Souness, Kenny Dalglish, John Wark and Alan Brazil all unavailable.

With vital World Cup qualifying games coming up against Switzerland and Hungary, England needed a convincing performance and although they created enough chances to win, it was Scotland who triumphed through a John Robertson penalty.

The defeat piled the pressure on Ron Greenwood and it was beginning to show on the manager as he stormed out of a post-match press conference. The chance of qualifying for Spain in 1982 looked bleak after a 2-1 loss against the Swiss but a terrific 3-1 win in Budapest a week later got England back on track.

Dee-dum, dee-dum, dee-dum, dee-dum, dee diddley dum dee-daaah!

From 1974 until 2013, just after 5pm, James Alexander Gordon would read out the classified football results in his distinctive style, which sounded like he was happy for the winning team and sad for the losing one. James died in 2014 but, with his family's permission, his voice lives on thanks to artificial intelligence-based voice cloning and by visiting www.thefootballresults.com you can hear his dulcet tones once more.

While Nottingham Forest's two-year grip on the European Cup was being loosened by CSKA Sofia in the first round of this season's competition, Liverpool hammered Finnish minnows Oulu 11-2 on aggregate to set up a clash with Alex Ferguson's Aberdeen.

The first game at Pittodrie was dominated by the visitors but they only had an early Terry McDermott goal to show for it. The pattern of play was repeated at Anfield where Ray Clemence had only one save to make all evening, with Liverpool hitting four goals without reply.

Forest's conquerors' CSKA were the opponents in the quarter-final, but they were brushed aside 6-1 on aggregate to set up this clash with Bayern Munich. The Germans were delighted to have gained a draw in the first leg but, crucially, they had not scored an away goal.

Bob Paisley had injury problems ahead of the return game with Alan Kennedy and Phil Thompson both out, so the comparatively inexperienced Richard Money and Colin Irwin deputised. Kenny Dalglish added to Paisley's woes when he limped off after just five minutes to be replaced by youngster Howard Gayle.

But the players performed superbly and seven minutes from time Ray Kennedy put the English side ahead. Though Bayern equalised, it was too late and Liverpool made it through to their third European Cup Final.

With the injury problems which had hindered the club's League campaign resolved, Bob Paisley was able to select his first-choice team for only the second time since Liverpool beat Aberdeen 4-0 in this competition back in November.

On the bench in Paris were Steve Ogrizovic, Jimmy Case, Colin Irwin, Richard Money and Howard Gayle, who the manager had praised for his role in knocking out Bayern Munich, believing the German's had been surprised by his pace.

Madrid perhaps shaded the first-half and just minutes into the second period had a glorious chance to take the lead when Jose Antonio Camacho beat the offside trap and, with only Ray Clemence to beat, chipped the ball over the advancing 'keeper but also over the bar.

With nine minutes to go and extra-time seemingly inevitable, Ray Kennedy's throw-in was chested down in the penalty area by his namesake Alan, who blasted the ball into the back of the net to win Liverpool's third European Cup in five seasons.

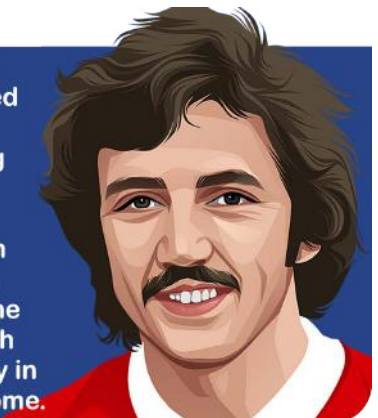
So, Kirkby's own Phil Thompson followed in the footsteps of Manchester United's Bobby Charlton, Liverpool's Emlyn Hughes and Nottingham Forest's John McGovern in lifting the most sought-after silverware in European football.

For the manager, it was his tenth major trophy - and he wasn't finished yet.

Football Legends

Signed by fellow North Easterner Bob Paisley in August 1978 for £330,000 from Newcastle United, Kennedy had been a member of the Magpies' team outclassed in the 1974 FA Cup Final by the Reds. He made his debut in the club's final pre-season warm-up match, a testimonial game for Celtic legend Jock Stein, scoring in a 3-2 victory in front of over 62,000 spectators at Parkhead.

The adventurous left-back was a key member of the team which won the division one title in his first two seasons at Anfield and he also contributed crucial goals, including in the 1981 League Cup Final against West Ham and, most famously, the winning strike in the European Cup Final later that year against Real Madrid. With Joe Fagan having replaced Paisley as boss, Alan also struck the decisive penalty in the 1984 European Cup Final shootout against Roma in the Olympic Stadium, Rome.

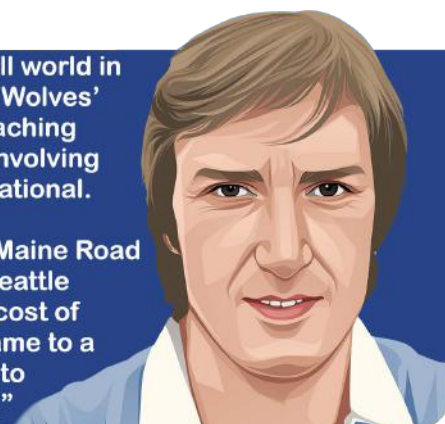

Football Legends

Flamboyant Manchester City manager Malcolm Allison shocked the football world in September, 1979, when he persuaded his chairman, Peter Swales, to sign Wolves' central midfielder Steve Daley for a then British record transfer fee approaching £1.5 million. City had reportedly initially offered a players-plus-cash deal involving Mick Channon, Colin Viljoen and/or Paul Futcher for the England 'B' international.

Daley struggled to justify his hefty price-tag and his disappointing time at Maine Road came to an end in February, 1981, when the Barnsley-born player joined Seattle Sounders for £300,000, having made fifty-three appearances for City at a cost of £24,000 per game. As he prepared to leave for the States, Daley said: "I came to a club where the players were confused about the way Allison wanted them to play. I'm not even sure Malcolm knew and he failed to get his ideas across."

3: Season 1981-82



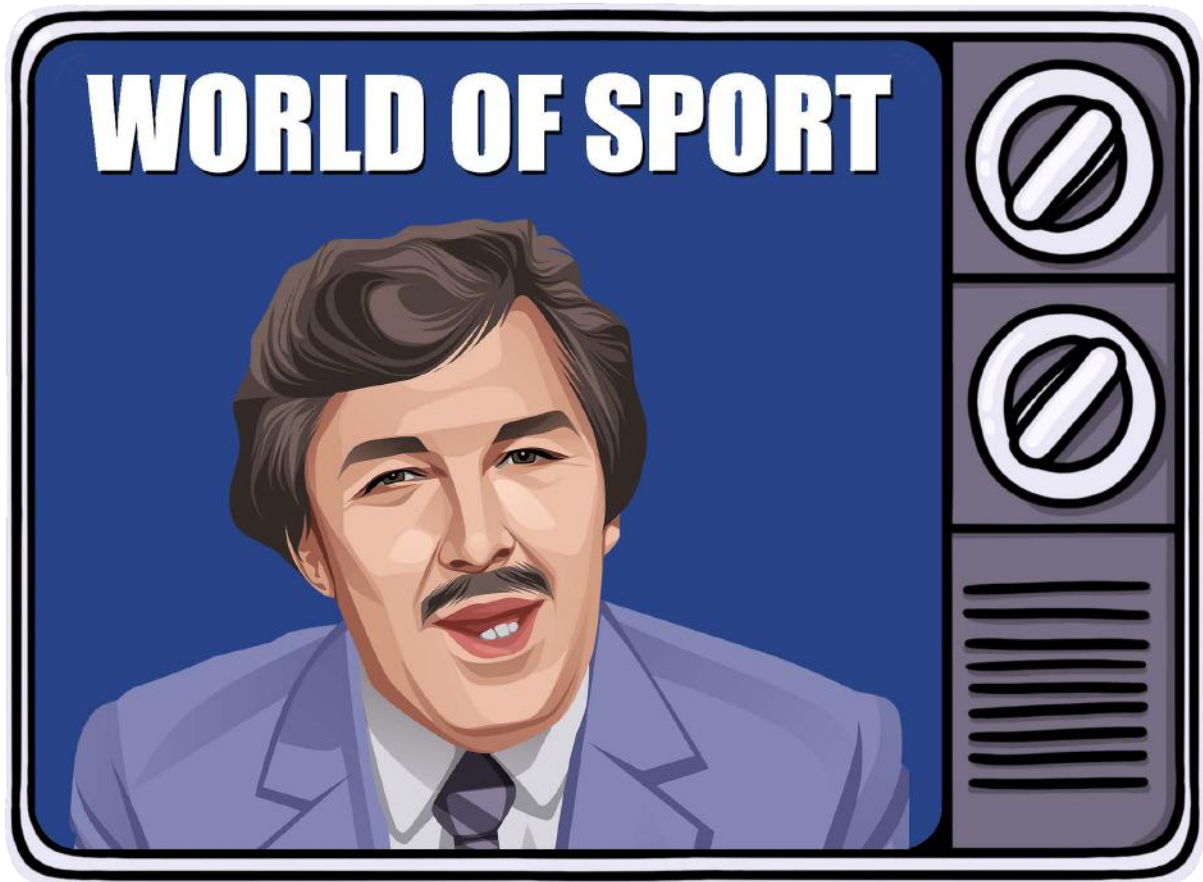
Grandstand first appeared on television screens in October, 1958, presented briefly by Peter Dimmock and then by David Coleman. It soon established itself as the BBC's flagship Saturday afternoon sports programme, featuring football previews, live horse racing and much more. Frank Bough took over the anchor role in 1968, handing it on to Des Lynam in 1983.

A key element of the show since its inception was Final Score during which the day's football results would appear on-screen via the teleprinter. By the 1980s, these were displayed on the much more hi-tech vidiprinter.

When most of the matches had ended, it was then time for a reading of the classified football results, which was undertaken from 1958 to 1995 by Len Martin, followed by the pools news and then a look at the League tables.

On April 1st, 1989, while Des was presenting the show, a 'fight' broke out in the background between members of the production staff but it was later announced that it had been staged as an April Fools Day prank.

4: Season 1982-83

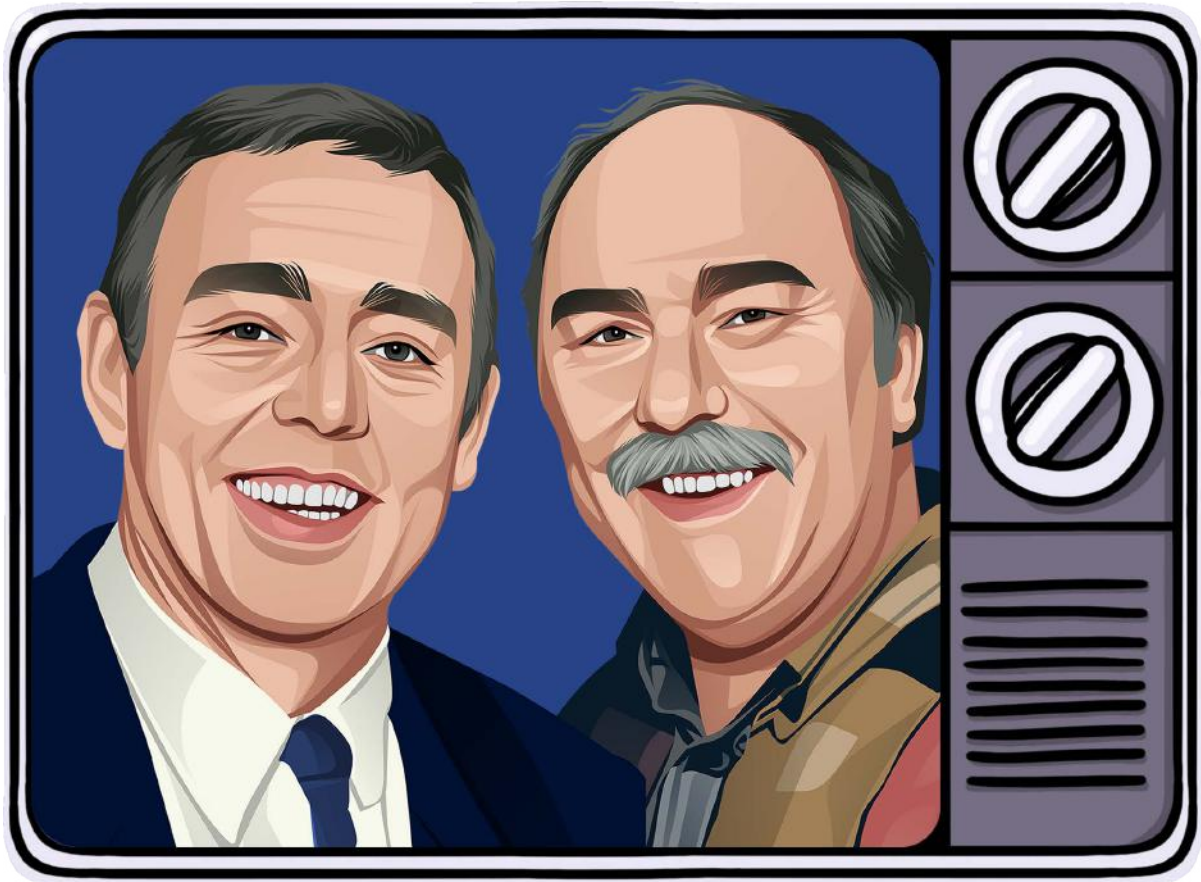


In response to the success of the BBC's *Grandstand*, in 1965 ITV launched its own sports magazine *World of Sport*, initially presented by Eamon Andrews then, from 1968, by Dickie Davies.

The most popular segments of the show were the football preview *On The Ball*, hosted by Brian Moore then later by Ian St John with Jimmy Greaves, horse racing, featuring the ITV Seven in which punters had to pick the winners of seven televised races, and wrestling, with commentary by Kent Walton on household names such as Big Daddy and Giant Haystacks.

Other *World of Sport* presenters until its demise in October, 1985, were Fred Dineage, Steve Rider and Jim Rosenthal. The horse racing results were read by John Tyrrel and the football results by Bob Colston.

5: Season 1983-84



In 1969, as his football career with Liverpool was coming to an end, Ian St John began working with Radio Merseyside and, to further his blossoming media career, he entered a competition run by the *Sportsnight with Coleman* programme to find a new football commentator whose prize was to be part of the BBC team for the following year's World Cup.

The 10,000 entrants were narrowed down to six finalists and St John tied for first place but missed out as the chairman of the panel judging the event, England manager Sir Alf Ramsey, gave his casting vote to Idwal Robling, who went on to enjoy a long career with BBC Wales. Gerry Harrison finished third and became the voice of Anglia Television's coverage of football, while radio DJ Ed 'Stewpot' Stewart, came fifth.

Originally hosted by Brian Moore as part of *World of Sport*, St John took over the Saturday afternoon football preview show in 1983, later joined by Jimmy Greaves. When *World of Sport* was axed in 1985, the duo presented their own hugely popular programme, Saint and Greavsie.

6: Season 1984-85



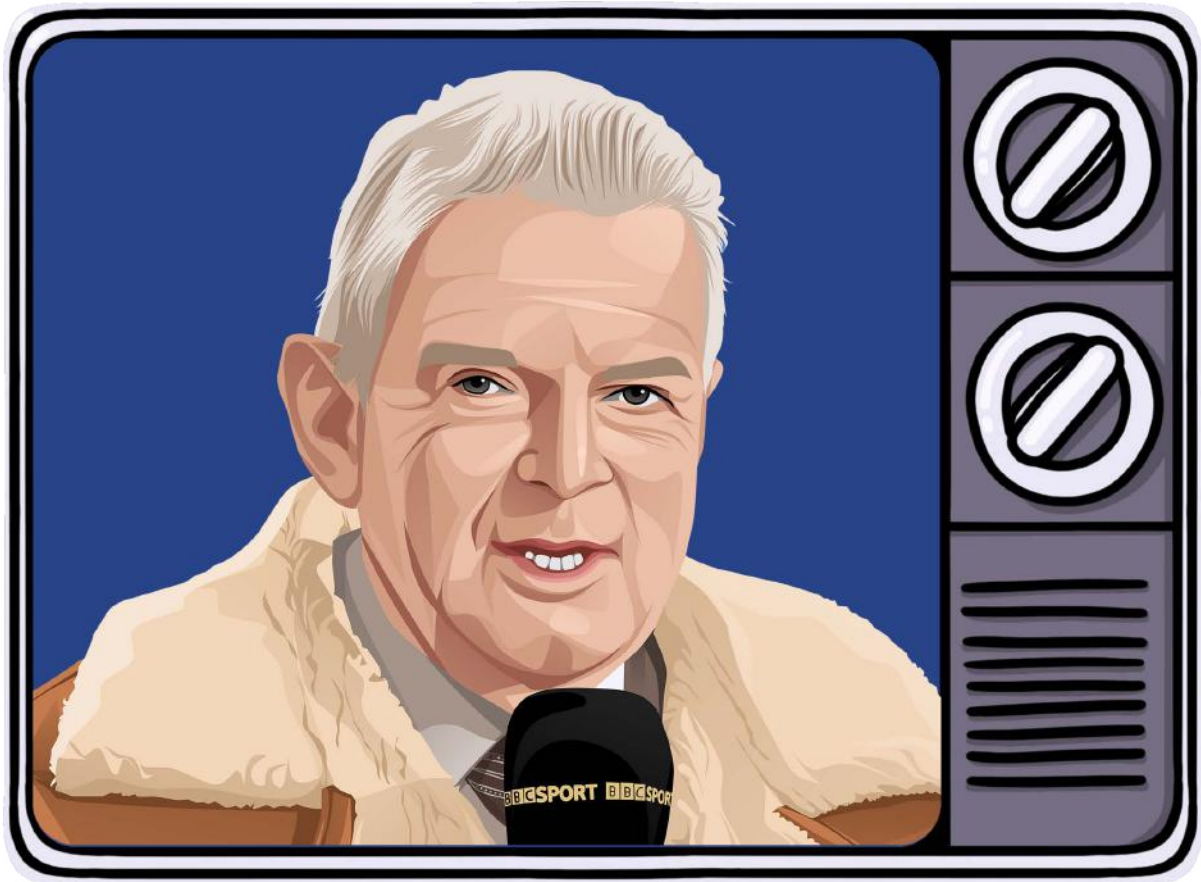
Barry Davies began his broadcasting career with ITV and was in the running to be the host and commentator for London Weekend Television's new football show *The Big Match* in 1968, but ultimately Jimmy Hill chose Brian Moore.

He joined the BBC in 1969 and became synonymous with *Match of the Day* for the next thirty-five years, covering numerous domestic matches. One of his most famous commentaries on the programme was in 1974 when Derby County's Francis Lee scored a sensational goal against his former club, Manchester City, when Davies said: "Interesting, very interesting! Look at his face, just look at his face!"

As well as twelve European Cup Finals, including the tragic one at the Heysel Stadium in 1985, Barry covered seven European Championships and ten World Cup tournaments. After the infamous 'Hand of God' goal, he described Diego Maradona's second strike in the 1986 quarter-final against England by saying: "He has Burruchaga to his left and Valdano to his left, he doesn't need any of them... oh, you have to say that's magnificent."

But his skills were not limited to football and he also commentated on several sports in the Olympics, together with the annual Oxford-Cambridge Boat Race.

7: Season 1985-86



After joining the BBC as a radio commentator in 1969, John Motson switched to *Match of the Day* in October, 1971, and, just a few months later, enjoyed the good fortune to cover one of the biggest shocks in FA Cup history.

After a 2-2 draw at St James' Park, the third round replay between Southern League minnows Hereford United and First Division Newcastle United was held on the day allocated for the fourth round of the competition having been postponed no less than three times.

At Edgar Street, Malcolm Macdonald put the visitors ahead before, with time running out, the home side equalised, with Motson describing the action as follows. "Oh what a goal! Radford the scorer. Ronnie Radford! And the crowd are invading the pitch. What a tremendous shot by Ronnie Radford." In extra-time, substitute Ricky George hit the winner for the underdogs.

John was the commentator when Wimbledon caused another massive FA Cup upset when they beat Liverpool in the final (see page 118) and was at Hillsborough a year later when he reported on the tragedy which unfolded rather than the abandoned semi-final.

Motson continued to provide commentary until his retirement in 2017, having covered ten World Cups, ten European Championships and twenty-nine FA Cup Finals.

8: Season 1986-87

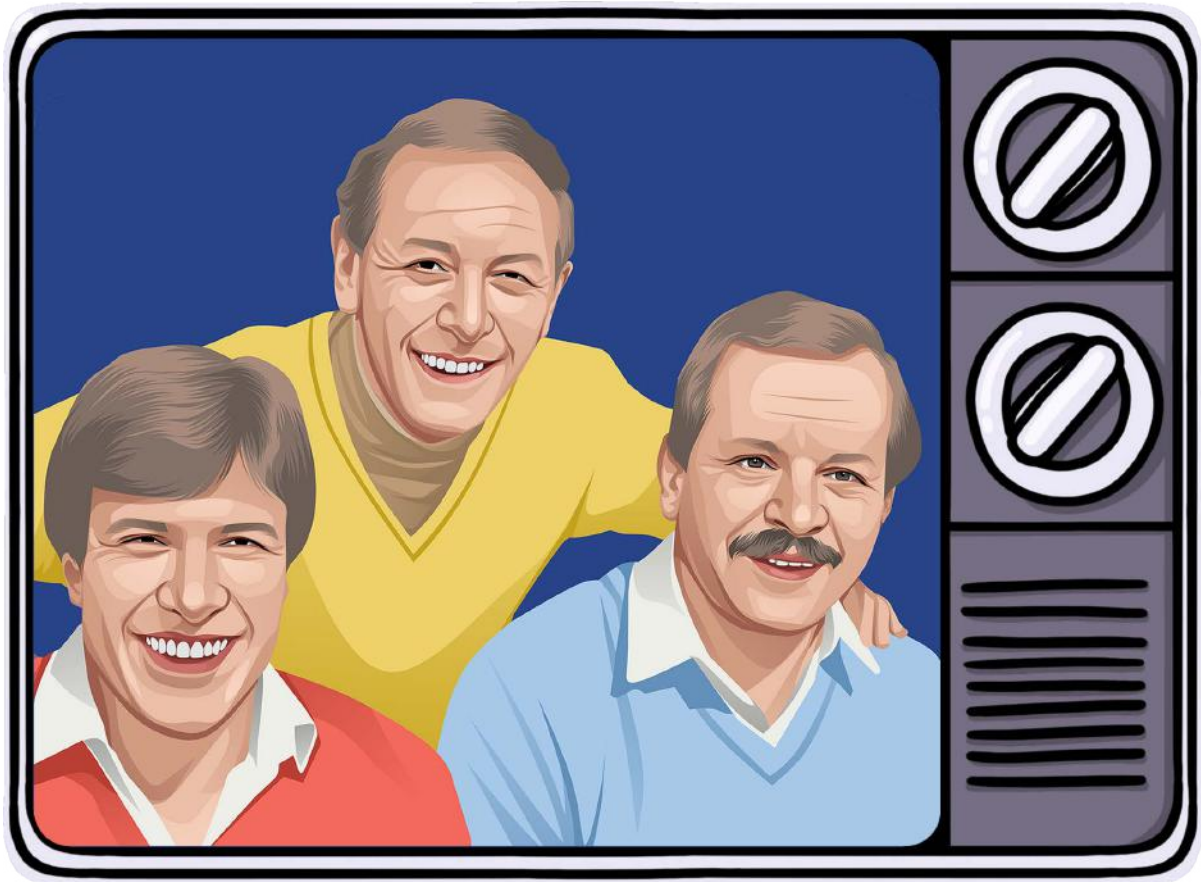


In his eleven seasons at Arsenal, goalkeeper Bob Wilson made 308 appearances and was an ever-present during Arsenal's double-winning campaign of 1970-71, when they famously clinched the League title at White Hart Lane, the home of their north London rivals, Tottenham, five days before beating Liverpool in the FA Cup Final.

The BBC's Saturday afternoon sports programme *Grandstand* had a slot called *Football Preview*, presented by its sports editor Sam Leitch, but this was re-launched as *Football Focus* in 1974 and, after retiring as a player in May, Bob was the first host, making his debut on Saturday 17th August.

Bob's media career had grown during the decade after he had been one of the BBC's expert pundits during the 1970 World Cup in Mexico. He continued to be the anchor of *Football Focus* throughout the 1980s, whilst also presenting *Sunday Grandstand* and, occasionally, the flagship Saturday programme itself, being in the studio on the fateful day of the Hillsborough tragedy in April, 1989.

9: Season 1987-88



A Question of Sport was first broadcast on BBC1 in January, 1970, when David Vine was the host and the captains were ex-boxer Henry Cooper and former rugby union player and commentator, Cliff Morgan.

In the 1980s, the host was veteran broadcaster David Coleman (centre), the channel's voice of athletics and football coverage, with various captains, though perhaps the most notable pairing being Liverpool and England footballer Emlyn Hughes (left) and Bill Beaumont (right), captain of England's rugby union side.

One of the most famous episodes was in 1987 when, in the Picture Round of the quiz, Hughes failed to identify HRH Princess Anne and gave his answer as the male jockey, John Reid. Mortified by his mistake, Hughes said: "Don't put that out. They'll hang me." A couple of weeks later, Princess Anne herself appeared as a member on Emlyn's team to celebrate the programme's 200th episode with an astonishing nineteen million viewers tuning in to watch it.

When Emlyn left the show in 1988, he was replaced by England cricket legend Ian Botham.

10: Season 1988-89

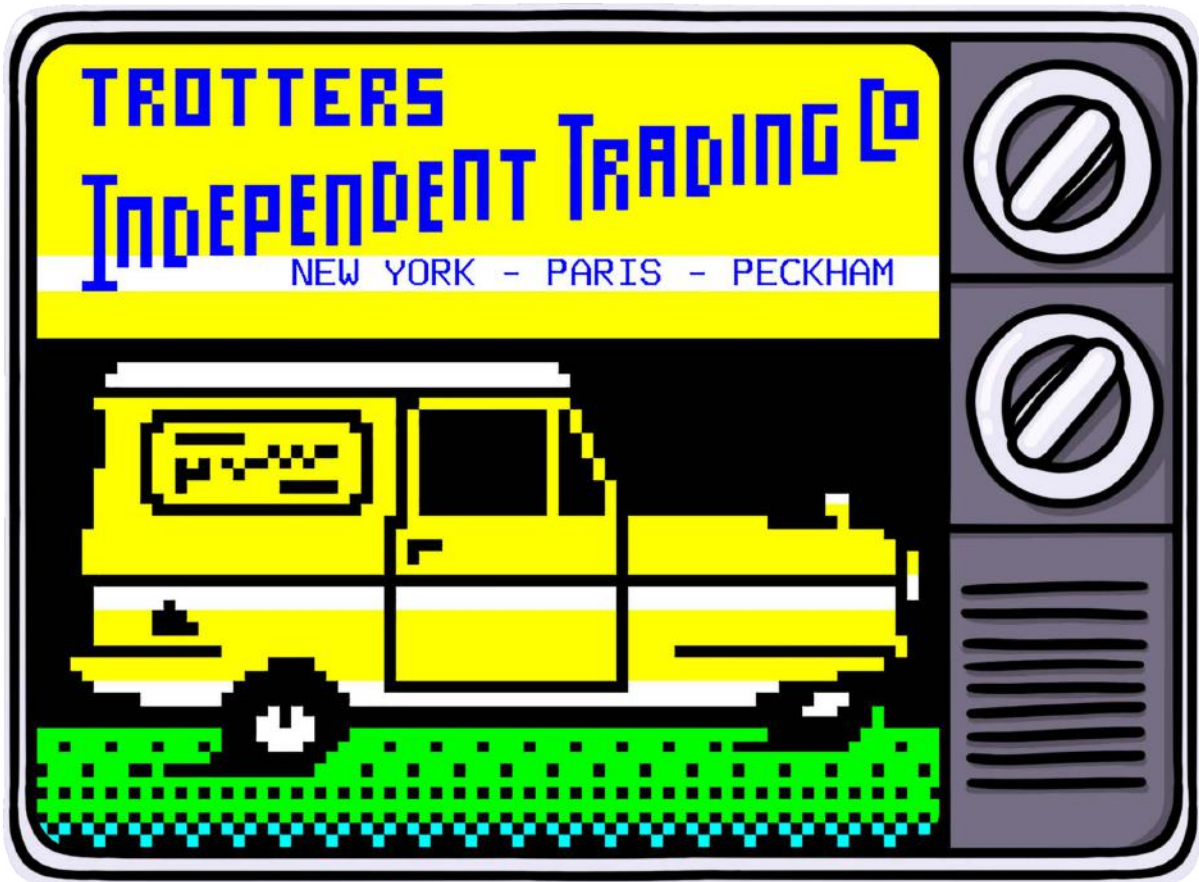


Elton Welsby began his broadcasting career in the 1970s, working on Granada television's *Kick Off* programme, with commentator Gerald Sinstadt, which focused on football teams in the north-west, primarily the two Manchester sides, Liverpool and Everton, his boyhood club, but the smaller clubs in the region, too.

Throughout the 1980s, he played a prominent role in ITV's football output, as well as, in 1988, hosting the overnight coverage of the Seoul Olympics for the channel.

It was also in 1988 that ITV negotiated exclusive rights with the Football League to show live games from division one and Elton was chosen as the presenter of the new show to cover them, imaginatively called *The Match*. The following year, Granada brought *Kick Off* back on Friday evenings, with Elton once again the host of the show.

11: Teletext Gallery



A teletext page consists of 24 rows down, each with 40 characters across. Row 0 is used to display the page number, the name of the service and the date/time, with row 24 set aside for the fasttext links, leaving rows 1 to 23 for information and graphics.

The content on a page is created using a keyboard and consists of alpha numeric and/or graphical characters which can be displayed (along with the background) in eight different colours: red, green, yellow, blue, magenta, cyan, white and black. The editor inputting the content would be mindful that certain colour combinations couldn't be used as they would not provide enough contrast to make a page readable.

In graphics mode, each character is made up of six cells which can be turned on or off individually, with an image formed by using a group of these graphic characters together. It can be a laborious process but the end results are often stunning and there are still many active teletext artists across Europe producing wonderful images.

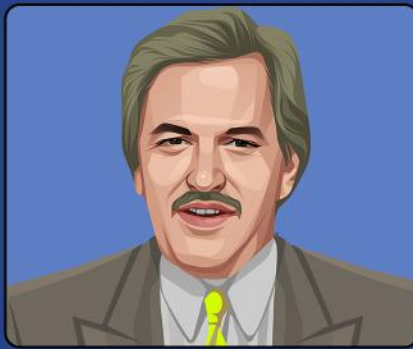
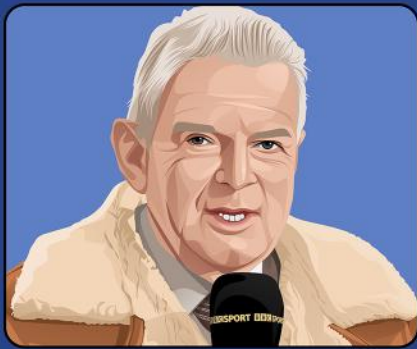

Triumph and disaster were common themes for football during the 1980s. The decade began with success for English clubs in the European Cup before the scourge of soccer for many years, hooliganism, resulted in the Heysel tragedy and a long ban from UEFA competitions, with the events in Brussels occurring in the same month as the horrific Bradford fire.

Liverpool carried on where they left off in the 1970s by winning trophy after trophy, but Nottingham Forest, Aston Villa, Tottenham, Manchester United and Everton supporters all had plenty to cheer, too, while in Scotland, the astute management of Alex Ferguson at Aberdeen and Jim McLean at Dundee United shook up the domination of the Old Firm.

On the international front, the final British Home Championship took place, while Paolo Rossi, Michel Platini, and Marco van Basten lit up the major tournaments, as did Diego Maradona, though he also displayed the darker side of his game.

The last year of the decade witnessed the return of 'those two imposters', with the devastating disaster at Hillsborough followed by Arsenal's triumph at Anfield in one of the most dramatic conclusions to a football season ever.
