Students and faculty of Harrison-Chilhowee Baptist Academy are anticipating the opening of a new facility the first of the year. It is the Hason Student Activities Building, and it will meet several needs for which we have not had adequate room in the past.

On the lower floor will be an up-to-date Home Economics Department with modern equipment. In one section are three kitchens where the students will learn to prepare and serve meals. In another area is the sewing section with sewing machines, tote trays, and a dressing room. Also on this floor are a large storage room, newspaper room, and yearbook room.

The main floor provides a student center with post-office, refreshment and school supply counter, and a large lounge.

The upper floor will contain the counselor's office, a prayer room, and library facilities adequate for our student body.

All of us are grateful to Tennessee Baptists for providing us with this new building, and we pledge to use it to the best advantage.

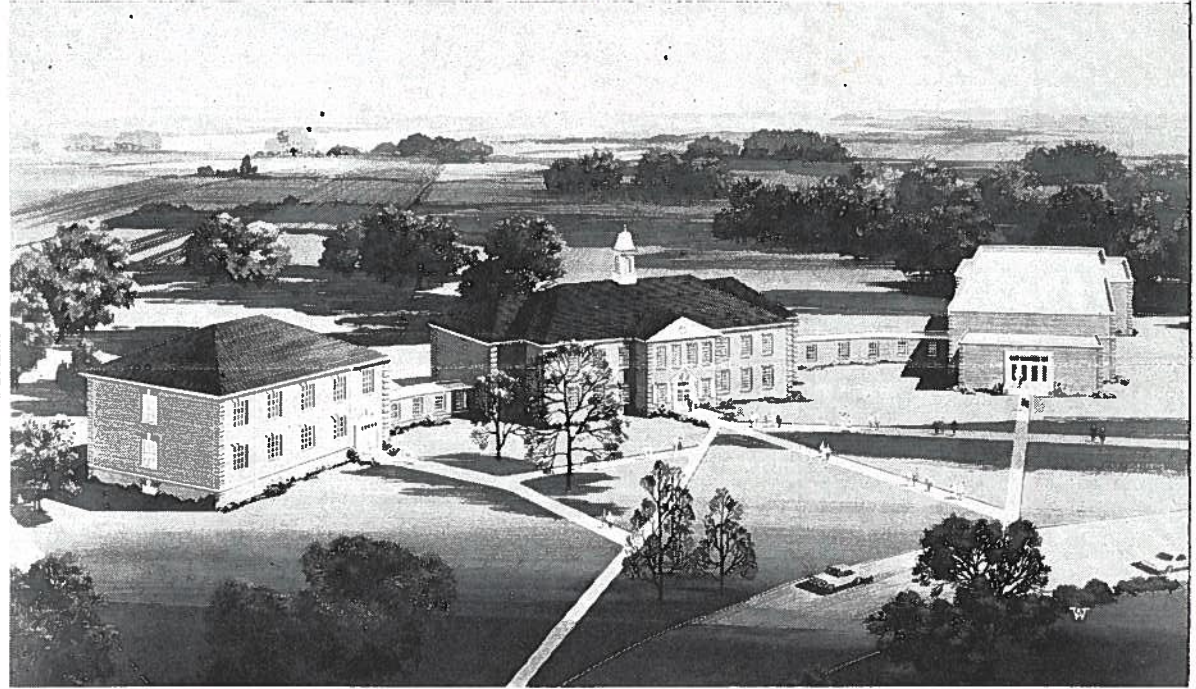

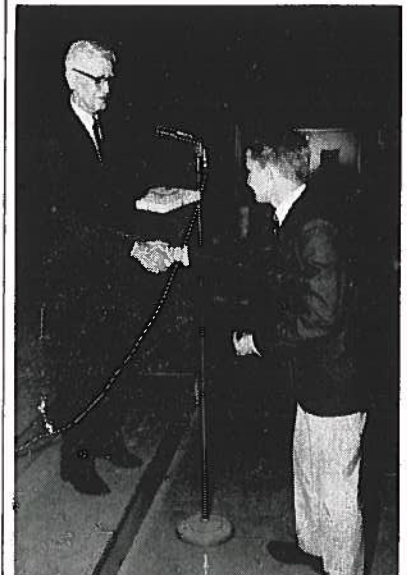

STUDY AND TRAVEL

Some of the teachers at Harrison-Chilhowee had an unusually busy summer. Three spent their time in summer school working toward higher degrees while two others enjoyed a few weeks of travel.

Mr. James H. Stokes completed his master's degree in physics-chemistry at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, North Carolina. His three courses completed four summers of work there. Astronomy, including two afternoons each week in the planetarium, involved a thorough study of the universe. Organic chemistry completed his study of Chemistry. Psychological Foundations of Education, for a minor in education, was taken the later part of the summer.

Mrs. Stokes took two courses the first term at the University of North Carolina. One course was the American novel in which she studied novelists from James Fenimore Cooper to William Faulkner. Her other course was the History of Secondary Education in the United States.

In order to complete the work for his master's degree Mr. Eldon Smith worked on his thesis during the summer. The title of his thesis is "Spelling Reforms from Nineteen Hundred to the Present". It is an historical survey of what has been done to make our spelling conform to our pronunciation. For example, if we spelled as we pronounce, the word **circus** would be spelled **psoloquoizez** (I'm glad this is a survey and not an attempt to make words conform).

Mr. and Mrs. Hall made a hurried 3000 mile trip between the closing of school and the opening of the summer term. They left Chilhowee May 22 and drove to New York City. After spending a night and day there, they went on out to Long Island (Hauppauge) and spent two days with their son Bill. From there they drove on through Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Vermont to Canada. At this time of year they found the scenery beautiful. They spent one day at Expo 67. From Montreal, where they had a little trouble ordering food off French written menus, they drove down the northern side of the St. Lawrence River to Niagara Falls. From here they returned through Pennsylvania and Virginia to Tennessee and home.

A trip to Korea with her mother consumed four weeks of Miss Ann Lambert's summer. They visited Miss Becky Lambert, Ann's sister who is a medical missionary in Pusan, Korea. Before reaching their destination they did some sight-seeing in Honolulu, Japan and Hong Kong. They were in Korea for two weeks, spending one of these weeks on the beach of the Yellow Sea. (A note-worthy observation about the trip—they took no camera with them).

1968 SENIORS IN WASHINGTON

On Sunday afternoon, September 24, the senior class of Harrison-Chilhowee boarded a chartered bus bound for Washington, D. C. Following in the footsteps of thirty previous senior classes, we were destined for a week of cultural enrichment as well as fun. Chaperoned by Mr. and Mrs. C. Y. Stewart and the Rev. and Mrs. Ray F. Williams, we gained a first hand knowledge of our American Heritage. It proved to be a learning experience worthy of every effort put forth to make it possible.

By schedule adjustment we managed to take in all major points of interest needed to form the complete picture of "a more perfect union." Monday morning we toured Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. The majority found this reproduced colony capitol quaint but of definite historical significance. The House of Burgesses, which served as the first representative legislature of the New World, probably held more interest for the serious student of history than did any other particular phase of the trip.

Tuesday morning we began our sightseeing of Washington. Our first stop was the Washington Monument, built in honor of our first President and "the father of our country." The top of the four hundred and fifty-five foot structure enabled us to view the vast city in all directions. Later in the week we had the opportunity to

visit the memorials of two other great presidents. The Lincoln Memorial, which enshrines a colossal statue of "gentle Abe", was, without a doubt, the most inspirational feature of the entire week. The Jefferson Memorial, although not as elegant, was built in recognition of the true genius of American history.

The most spectacular aspect of the trip was viewing the many architectural designs used in constructing the buildings of which our nation's capitol is composed. I found myself eyeing such beautiful buildings as the White House, the Capitol, the Custis Lee Mansion, and the headquarters for the Pan American Union with a comparative attitude.

It is agreed that the interior of the Library of Congress is the most gorgeous building in Washington; the exterior of the Supreme Court Building is the most elegant.

I believe everyone enjoyed the Federal Bureau of Printing and Engraving. It is the location for printing all paper money issued in the United States. Needless to say, it was most fascinating to see money stacked on top of money. Probably the only other stop which equalled the Bureau in popularity was the Smithsonian Institution. Regretfully our time was limited, and we did not have the opportunity to soak up even a reasonable percentage of the knowledge which the Institution houses. But the Smithsonian, in its own right, created determination on the part of many of us to return to our Nation's Capitol.
