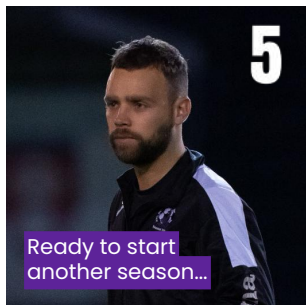

The History Book

The club was founded in 1919 as the Royal Engineers (Ordnance Survey Office) FC by soldiers returning from the First World War, although there is a record of matches being played by Ordnance Survey Royal Engineers vs The Gentlemen of Tenby in 1888.

The club joined the Southampton Junior League in 1919, and won the Junior B division in 1920/21 and were admitted to the Hampshire League Divisional Section, which was a junior league with no automatic right to promotion. The divisional section was split into East and West the following year, with the club finishing mid-table in the East Division. Nicknamed 'The Mapmakers', it's believed the club merged with the Post Office team, when they moved to the Civil Service Ground and formed a new club, Southampton Civil Service in 1923/24. That year, the newly formed club finished fourth in the West Division.

The Royal Engineers (OSO) split from the Civil Service side the following year, but the Engineers picked up where they left off, finishing as runners-up in the West Division in 1924/25, 1 point behind Totton. Again, there was no automatic entry to the Hampshire County Division to the frustration of both clubs. In 1929, the club simplified it's name to Ordnance Survey, but struggled in the bottom 3 or 4 places in the league, reaching rock bottom of Division Two in 1930/31, but 6th out of 14 the following season. After finishing third from bottom in 1933/34, the club slipped out of county football, returning to the Southampton Senior League. This exile from county football would go on to last 64 years.

Success became hard to come by, apart from the reserves winning the Junior B Cup in 1937. The club switch to Sunday League football from 1960 to 1966, then returned to Saturday Football, re-joining Southampton Junior Division 8. The club swiftly worked it's way through he ranks, and achieved promotion to the Premier Division for a short spell in 1973. The club won the Senior Division One title twice in 1982/83 and 1992/93, alongside the reserves once again winning the Junior Cup in 1993.

The club grew in size from that point onwards, forming a 3rd XI and a Veteran's XI. The veterans side had much success winning Junior Division 6 in 1996 and gained successive promotions before becoming founding members of the now very popular Veterans League. The first team won the Senior Premier Division in 1996/97, which finally took them back to county football. The club missed out on a unique treble – each time they have joined the league in their own right, they have finished runners-up in their first season. In both 1921/22 and 1924/25, this feat was accomplished, but were 2 points short of a repeat in 1997/98. This was quickly put right the following season as they finished runners up to Clanfield and gained promotion to the newly formed Hampshire Premier League Division One. By now, the club realised that a stable future lay in the hands of young players and set up a youth section, starting with an U16 side, moving into U18 in their 2nd year. This proved a great success, with the U18's winning Southampton Youth Division 3 at the first attempt. The same year, the veterans gained promotion to Division 2, as well as winning the Veterans Cup.

Even though 1998/99 was a great season for the club on the pitch, an era ended as the Civil Service Ground was closed at the end of the season. Fortunately, with help with the local council, 'Survey' were relocated to Lordshill Recreation Ground. This was only to be a temporary home, as the club moved to their new home at Stoneham Park in 2002.

The First Division of the Hampshire League proved to be too strong, with the club relegated in their first season at the higher level in 1999/00. Positions of 11th, 8th, 4th and 6th were reached before the formation of the Wessex League Division Three in 2004/05. The team finished 13th and 12th, before opening a new chapter in the clubs history – changing its name to Stoneham in 2006.

After finishing 14th in the Wessex League Division Two in 2006/07, the club became founding members, alongside 16 others, of the Hampshire Premier League which was set up following the dissolution of the Wessex League bottom division. During the 2007 close season the club decided to enhance it's new identity by adding 'AFC' to Stoneham. This had an immediate effect, with AFC Stoneham winning the Hampshire Premier League in the 2007/08 season, whilst also reaching the Senior League Cup final, just missing out on an impressive double. 2009/10 saw the Senior League Cup added to the honours list while the U16 team won Southampton Youth Division 3. Further success followed in 2011/12, having moved once again to Jubilee Park the previous season, with the reserves completing a league and cup double and the U16's once again winning the league – a 3rd year in a row! This was the same year the first team made their first trip to St. Mary's for the Southampton Senior Cup final, beating Bush Hill to achieve their highest honour to date.

The club merged with Granley Rovers FC, incorporating a complete youth setup which would now provide football from minnows through to veterans. The success the previous season was continued in 2012/13 when the club joined an elite list of clubs to retain the Southampton Senior Cup, beating Brockenhurst on penalties in the final. The U18's won the Southampton Youth Division 2 and many of the clubs now 17 teams reached finals and semi-finals, whilst also finishing in high league positions. In 2015, the club earned promotion to the Wessex League, as well as winning the Hampshire Premier League Cup for a second time. AFC Stoneham finished 8th in their first season in the Wessex League Division One and our youth teams won the Testway League Cup at both U15 and U16 level, while the U18 Hampshire League team won the Hampshire Youth League Cup. We also saw our first Women's team compete in the Hampshire Women's Division One.

More progress off the pitch in 2016/17, as the club turned on their new floodlights on October 6th 2016. The first team ventured into the FA Vase for the first time in our history, claiming wins against Malmesbury Victoria (Wiltshire) and Longlevens (Gloucestershire) both from the Hellenic League, before losing to Shaftesbury.

In the same season, Stoneham beat Aldershot Town 5-0 in the Russell Cotes Cup, before losing to Southern League Premier side Gosport Borough 3-2 in the quarter final and went out at the same stage in the Hampshire Senior Cup, losing 2-0 at Basingstoke Town. Our reserves, with the emphasis now very much on developing young talent from the clubs youth system, reached the final of the Wyvern Combination League Cup, losing 2-1 to Southern League Petersfield Town. The first team finished 8th once again in the Wessex League Division One.

2017/18 saw AFC Stoneham improve their league position to 5th and reaching the final of the Russell Cotes Cup, losing to Wessex League Premier Division champions Andover Town 1-0, at their Portway Stadium in front of a 500+ crowd. The club enjoyed memorable nights on the way to the final, winning 4-3 at AFC Portchester in the quarter final and 3-1 at AFC Totton in the semi-final. During the 2018/19 season the first team recorded a run of 20 league games without defeat, only one of 3 teams at our level in the country to do so, as we pushed for promotion to the Wessex League Premier Division.

For the first time in our 100 year history, we entered the FA Cup as one of the lowest ranked teams in the competition and had tremendous wins, 3-0 at AFC Porchester after a replay and 2-0 at home to Evo-Stik South side, Westfield. Sadly our adventure ended in the hands of Cirencester Town in the next round at home, in front of a 350+ strong crowd. Prior to the Cirencester Town game, as the lowest ranked team left in the competition, we had a visit from the FA Cup with many junior and senior players present for photos for a cup run that will live long in the memory. The club finished the 2018/19 season with another trip to St. Mary's in the Southampton Senior Cup final, losing 3-0 to Alresford Town. This ended a memorable cup run, which included a 4-3 win against Winchester City, thanks to a 94th minute winner from Ben Clarke.

The club sealed the Wessex League Division One title on another memorable night, away to Totton & Eling, drawing 3-3 after playing 3 games in 5 days! The club were subsequently promoted to the Wessex League Premier Division for the first time in our history.

The club's first ever season in the Wessex League Premier Division was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but there were plenty of positives to take away as the club sat in 2nd as the season was deemed null and void. In January 2020, the club moved to our new £10m home at Stoneham Lane, still using the old Chestnut Avenue ground for pre-season friendlies before its sad closure in October 2020. It will always hold fantastic memories with huge affection, as the place that allowed the club to write its most recent history and grow.

Season 2020/21 was also impacted by the pandemic, with upward movement based on performance over the last 2 seasons. Stoneham lost out on a place in the Southern League to Lymington Town. Our first full season in the Wessex League Premier Division saw the club finish 5th, followed by missing out on promotion in 2022/23 on goal difference. In 2023/24, the club finished in 2nd, losing the play-off final to Shaftesbury.

The 2024/25 had a strong sense of déjà vu as far as the league season was concerned – we finished 2nd again, finishing on 90+ points for the third successive season, this time losing in the play-off semi final to Andover New Street. However, this will always be a season remembered for our cup exploits. The dream of reaching Wembley was very much alive in the FA Vase, reaching the furthest stage in our club's history, eventually losing out to Andover New Street on penalties in the quarter finals after leading for the majority of the game. The 1st team also reached 3 other cup finals, winning the Hampshire Senior Cup for the very first time in our history, convincingly vs Wessex Premier Division champions AFC Porchester, 3-0. Another trophy was added to the cabinet a month later, as we lifted the Southampton Senior Cup for a third time, with another 3-0 victory, this time against Millbrook at St. Mary's.

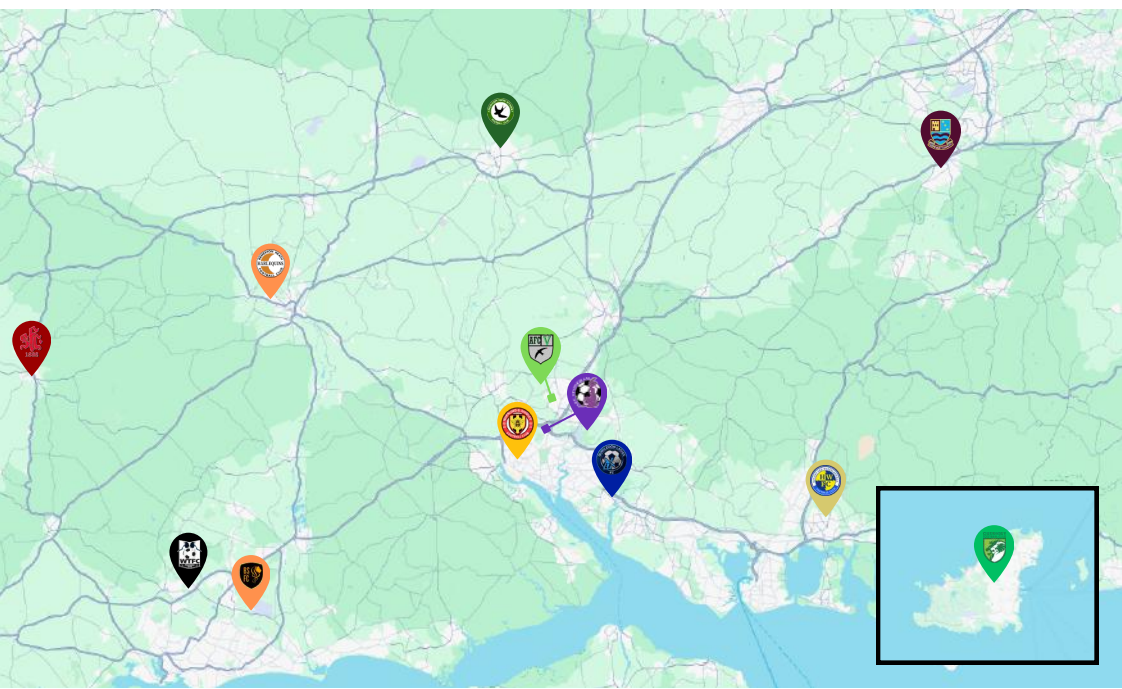

HEADING TO STONEHAM LANE...

Bournemouth Sports FC comprises both Youth and Adult Sections, each with distinct origins that merged to form a unified football club. The Youth Section began in 1992 as Cannon Colts YFC, founded by Bill Laxton to provide football opportunities for boys in Colehill, Wimborne. Named after Cannon Hill Plantation, the club started with a single Under-10 team and expanded rapidly, especially after the FA introduced mini-soccer in the 1990s. This growth positioned Cannon Colts as one of Dorset's largest youth football clubs.

The Adult Section originated from Mercury FC, which played at the Civil Service Ground in Kinson until 2005, when the ROKO Leisure Centre acquired the site. The team played under the name ROKO until 2008, then

moved to Chapel Gate and reverted to Mercury FC. In 2009, they formally aligned with Bournemouth Sports Club, adopting the name Bournemouth Sports FC. The club's first team transitioned from the Bournemouth Hayward Leagues to the Hampshire Premier League's Senior Division in 2011, while the Reserves continued local Sunday league play.

In the 2009/10 season, Cannon Colts YFC and Bournemouth Sports FC merged, combining youth development with senior-level competition. The merger created a comprehensive football pathway from mini-soccer to adult leagues, positioning Bournemouth Sports FC as a leading destination for football on the South Coast.

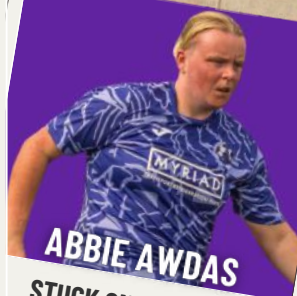

BUILDING A COMMUNITY TO LAST

AFC Stoneham helps to create a united football environment that tackles inequalities, delivers inspirational opportunities and improves the health and wellbeing for all within our community. We are at the heart of our community, generating a defined social, health and economic benefit. This has been defined by the Football Association as follows:

SOCIAL VALUE

Every £1 invested in AFC Stoneham, £7.20 is generated in social value! That is a healthier and happier community through football.

This represents an impressive annual benefit of £6,529,900!

VOLUNTEERS

Our 450 volunteer's time could be worth just over £1,125 per person annually, totalling £506,412!

We count this as a cost to volunteers who give up their time for FREE, that the club would otherwise need to pay for the services they provide.

COMMUNITY

Grassroots football at AFC Stoneham has a more inclusive and diverse participation base than is seen in the local population.

The proportion of AFC Stoneham's population represented by the BAME community is 18%, whereas in Eastleigh it is only 5.4%.

This is just one area we are able to highlight the fantastic opportunities available to our local community, to help build and grow a welcoming, inclusive and diverse community through football!

INVESTMENT

SOCIAL INVESTMENT (£910,900)

The annual cost of our club, including not only our own expenditure, but also members expenditure and estimated value of unpaid volunteer time.
