



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
COMPANY PROFILE

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HEADMASTER'S REVIEW



Following the unconditional surrender of the German forces, Churchill, on the 8th May 1945, praised and thanked everyone in Britain who stood for the quest for freedom. In his VE speech to the British on this day, he said "God bless you all, this is your Victory."

As Principal of this school, I can justifiably be very proud of what has been achieved during the year and, like Churchill, I can say to all the parties concerned - staff, parents and pupils - thank you for your contribution that ensured the success of this year.

We have always, and will always, set very high standards at Bryanston High School. To achieve these standards, obviously requires team work. I am indeed fortunate to be blessed with a very committed, loyal and hardworking staff. I would like to express my deepest gratitude to the staff who have served us so well during 1998 - academic, secretarial and grounds staff. I must express my gratitude to the Governing Body for their support and assistance and compliment the P.A. on their valuable contribution. One of the most rewarding aspects of teaching is the pleasure of working closely in a team such as ours. Unfortunately, we had to say farewell to Mr Cuthbertson who was appointed Head of Lowveld High School in Nelspruit. Although we were extremely sorry to see him go, we rejoiced with him on his promotion. It is quite interesting to note that Bryanston has already produced five headmasters: we are obviously a nursery preparing teachers for principalship. In-service training for the staff is a priority and will remain a priority for as long as I am the head of this school. With the assistance of the GDE and with support from outside organisations and individuals, several training sessions were held during the course of 1998.

We have always encouraged a very high level of pupil participation at Bryanston High School. Once again, our pupil body did not disappoint us this year. The vitality and vigour displayed by our pupils has set new standards in all spheres of life at the school. Something that is very pleasing to me is that the cultural side of the school is rapidly developing and growing. I would also like to commend the staff and the pupils who were involved in the major production, for a most professional show. My compliments also go to the pupils who were involved in the house plays. I am sure that the high standard set during the house play festival provided a firm foundation for the success of our major production. The Rhetoric Society has once again produced orators and debaters of a very high calibre. For the many many hours of commitment by the pupils and staff, I thank you.

Bryanston High School was once again one of the venues for the recent Eisteddfod. 61 of our pupils entered and overall we achieved 15 silver medals (over 69%), 37 gold medals (over 79%) and 9 diplomas (over 90%) and won the overall best performance for a high school by 11 points over Saheti.

Our pupils who entered the Olympiads also achieved phenomenal success.

English: 19 wrote this Olympiad - 2 received gold certificates, 2 silver, 10 bronze and 5 merit certificates.

Afrikaans: This year excellent results were achieved. 5892 pupils from

329 schools participated. Lindi Korf came second countrywide with an average of 96%. She received a cash prize from the A.T.K.V. Tracy Fletcher came eighth with an average of 93%. Thirty four Bryanston High pupils participated and achieved a group average of 77%. Mathematics:Two senior pupils were in the top 20% and 6 junior pupils were in the top 100.

Four of our pupils also reached the Mintek Science Quiz finals.

The importance of technology in the education of our children has become a major topic of discussion in recent years. I am proud to announce that a group of staff members, parents and pupils are currently preparing a proposal that will be presented to the Governing Body in the very near future. This proposal will deal with the upgrading of our computer centre as well as the implementation of Computer Science as a full matric sixth subject at Bryanston High School. (With this in mind,) in keeping with the new trends in education, a life skills programme in each subject field was established and implemented during the course of this year.

On the sports fields, there were many notable achievements. Our badminton and tennis teams did admirably. Thanks to a generous sponsorship of R10 000, a development prgramme has been introduced at the school to improve the standard of our squash, and I have no doubt that we will reap the benefits and rewards of this programme in the near future. The boys hockey teams played with commitment and I would like to thank them for their contribution during the year. The girls hockey teams once again produced some good results. The fine performance of our netball girls confirmed that Bryanston High School is one of the strongest netball schools in Gauteng. The standard of rugby produced by our rugby team, was of a very high calibre. We must compliment our first rugby team on their superb season. Our swimming teams continued to perform well, with our A team coming second at the Inter-High. One of the highlights of the sporting season of 1998 was the outstanding performance of our athletics team who came second at the Inter-High.

All in all, 45 provincial colours were attained in the following extramural activities: Girls Hockey, Hockey Umpiring, Boys Hockey, Shooting, Rugby, Cross Country, Swimming, Chess, Squash, Athletics, Cricket, Basketball, Judo. In addition, 10 national colours were attained by Bryanston High pupils in Tumbling, Gymnastics, Fencing, Waterskiing, Judo, Baseball and Swimming.

These highlights of the extra-mural programme simply record the achievements at the highest level of competition. Although they are an indicator of the success of some of our pupils in many spheres, it does not reflect the life blood of our extra-mural programme and the regular participation and involvement of hundreds of our pupils at all levels. The fact that so many different extra-mural tours and excursions took place this year reflects the level of our staff and pupil involvement. The number of tours which took place also indicates something of our range of activities from sports such as netball, hockey, cricket, rugby, athletics and swimming, to leadership camps, wildlife tours, not to mention a host of various short excursions.

Under the leadership of our Head of Department: Guidance, Mr Essex-Clark, and with the financial assistance of MTN, the MTN School Against Crime Campaign was launched, to create and develop an awareness of crime and the role that teenagers can play to combat it. The group of pupils involved have, during the course of the year, visited various schools in the townships and suburbs to make our youth aware of the dangers of crime.

As part of our outreach programme, Bryanston High School, in conjunction with the GDE, has been involved in in-service training with our twin school, which is Alexandra High School. Our Science Department is also involved in tutoring teachers from former DET schools.

I think it is pretty obvious, ladies and gentlemen, that Bryanston High School is indeed alive and well, and more than that, it is actually hyperactive and extremely dynamic. An aspect of the vision of Bryanston High School is to establish itself as one of the finest schools, not only in Gauteng, but in the country. Our inclusion in the Sunday Times listing of the Top 100 schools in the country, confirms that we have realised part of our vision.

In conclusion, I would like to commend and honour my staff, the pupils and the parents for their input and their involvement.

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MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNING BODY CHAIRPERSON



THIRTY YEARS ON

True hope is swift and flies with swallow's wings; Kings it makes gods, and meaner creatures kings. (W. Shakespeare, Richard III: V.ii.23-23)

At the start of the year the Governing Body had developed a difficult challenge for the School community. Our hope was to get the annual expenditure of the School under control again and begin the process of reducing the School's indebtedness. It was clearly a "true hope" and one that has enjoyed enormous support from every sector of the School. As we edge towards the end of 1998 it looks as though we will have begun the necessary process and, if we are able again in the coming year to operate well within our means, we should have achieved this goal.

This swift movement will be achieved by the joint endeavours of: parents meeting their financial obligations (as so many praise-worthily do each year); staff striving to limit expenditure; the Parents Association raising significant sums through their carefully planned events; discovering and tapping further new sources of income; the wise application of funds under the leadership of the Principal.

The thirtieth year of the School's existence brought with it a moment to savour. Our vision for Bryanston High School is declared in the strategic plan which was developed in the latter half of 1997. It is to make "Bryanston High School - the best English medium, co-educational, high school in the northern suburbs." It is a great tribute to the staff and pupils that in September 1998 we were adjudged worthy of inclusion in the National Top 100 Schools list published by the Sunday Times. While there are many aspects of this survey that are open to criticism and one should note that several prominent schools refused to participate in the survey, the assessment nevertheless emphasises the merit of the vision we have adopted for the School.

The School has been loyally served during 1998 by a representative Governing Body. Since I last reported in this publication, we were saddened by the loss through transfer of Mr K. Taylor and Mrs S. Frost (who had also served the School so well as the tuckshop convenor) and through resignation of our treasurer Mr B. Cain. We pay tribute to these volunteer parents for the work that they did for the School. Their places

were taken by three parents co-opted for their financial expertise: Mr S. Dold, Mr M. Bashe and Mr T. Lydall. At the end of 1997 we also bade farewell to Miss S. Summerley and Masters B David and G. Ansell, the first learner representatives on the Governing Body. At the start of 1998 their places were taken by Tessa Blane, Lorien Swemmer and Daniel Cabral. More recently the representative of support and services staff, Mr J. Alkema, left the School. In the statutory election of the office bearers in May, Mrs D. Meikle stepped down as Governing Body secretary and Mrs V. Webb was elected in her stead. Mr Dold was elected treasurer, Mr B. Rodda was appointed deputy chairperson and I was returned as chairperson for a second year. All of the members of the Governing Body deserve special mention for their service and devotion to the School.

As we jointly pursue the many facets of our recently revised and enhanced strategic and development plan, I know that the members of the Governing Body will continue to apply their collective wisdom and insight in guiding the affairs of the School. I pay tribute to them as we strive to enrich the traditions and excellence of Bryanston High School as we near the end of the millennium.


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PARENTS' ASSOCIATION REPORT

I would like to thank the entire Committee for their enthusiasm, dedication and support during my term of office and I wish the School all the continued success of the past and a most successful 1999.




FAREWELL TO STEVE WADDELL

During the first term all English staff were involved in coaching pupils for the Guild of Speech and Drama Teachers' Public Speaking Festival. In addition each staff member "carved" a particular niche depending on expertise and interest.




It is clearly evident that Mrs Fulcher has a dynamic department with their main aim, striving towards excellence. The department has run extremely smoothly and





ACCOUNTING OLYMPIAD

Report:

This year we had five matriculants participating in the Accounting Olympiad. The format of the Olympiad was a first round of 25 multiple choice questions.

The questions are traditionally very difficult and the examiner tries to make the pupils think laterally in order to solve accounting problems which they have not come across before.

This years' results where good. Four pupils achieved between 60% and 65% while Francis Kwei narrowly missed going through to the next round with an average of between 75% and 79%. Eighty percent must be achieved in order to go to the next round.

The English Enrichment programme has two parts to it the reading lab and the tutor programme - although they often cross over.

The reading lab programme is open to anyone who wishes to improve his or her marks - from the student struggling with comprehension or vocabulary to the student who wishes to ensure a distinction. Students complete comprehension tests and mark them themselves thus monitoring and taking responsibility for their own improvement.

The tutors are responsible for supervising the reading lab and for tutoring students who have problems with English. This includes one on one help with exam papers, reading circles and responding to written journals. It may even extend to help with other subjects depending on the expertise of the tutor. Many tutors even began to develop their own ideas for lessons.

This seems to be a worthwhile endeavour which is growing with each year. Certainly the results have shown themselves in the students' marks.

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
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APOLLO

calendar. The senior debating team made it to the finals and achieved a second place.


All in all, it was a year to be remembered with pride and a sense of achievement. Thank you to all those who participated and helped to make this year a resounding success.



BOYS HOCKEY TOUR



In a game that requires a very high level of courage and committment, our players from all



WILDLIFE HIKE


After a long four hour drive, a single dim light half-way up the mountain welcomed us. This was base camp, where we spent an entertaining first evening.







on a page, it returned to the face to start the journey of the eyes.






