#### SUMMARY OF LAW RELATED EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

Famed educator Mary McLeod Bethune once said, "Cease to be a drudge, seek to be an artist." Her inspirational words have served as a guiding principle to how I have approached my law related activities throughout my career as a high school law teacher; I have fashioned myself as an artist who has attempted to paint the canvas of the law that depicts its dynamics. I have been teaching law related courses in the South Florida area for nearly twenty years. I started my teaching career at Miami Norland Senior High School (2006-2010), which was a Title I school. I taught Comprehensive Law Studies, Debate and A.P. U.S. Government & Politics. In 2010, I accepted a position at the School for Advanced Studies -South (2010-2015) where I taught law courses like A.P. U.S. Government & Politics and Honors U.S. Constitutional Law. In 2016, I joined the Academy of Law Studies (AOLS) faculty at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School, which is also a Title I school. As an AOLS teacher, I have taught courses like Legal System & Concepts, Law Studies, Comprehensive Law Studies, International Law, Political Science and Legal Research Skills. I am currently teaching courses which include Honors U.S. Constitutional Law, Dual Enrollment Criminology, Dual Enrollment Introduction to Criminal Justice, Court Procedures, Legal Ethics, and Honors Debate Levels 5, 6 and 7.

Serving at a Title I school is often very challenging, as financial and human resources are, at times, scarce. So, when I joined the AOLS faculty at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School, I was determined to make the law studies experience for my students on par with (or even exceeding) the experience that they would receive at a school in a more affluent community. From 2017 to the present, I have worked with my academy leaders in designing the law curriculum for the AOLS program. My goal was not only to cover the theory and history of the law and of the legal system, but to also have my students see the real everyday impact of the legal field on their lives. To that end, I helped to establish a partnership with the National Association for Legal Support Professionals (NALS), where my students take the paralegal examination and potentially become certified while still in high school. I also helped to design summer internship opportunities for my students in local law firms, like the Patino Law Group, and government entities, like the Miami-Dade County State Attorney's Office. In 2020, I established a partnership with the South Florida Chapter of the Federal Bar Association, in conjunction with the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida, which yielded my students involvement in a plethora of law related educational and civics programs, such as the annual Federal Bar Association Law Day program, Constitution Day program, and Civil Discourse and Difficult Decisions ("CD3") programs. These law-related activities afford my students the opportunity to learn about various careers in the court system, (including as a judge, court security officer, attorney, court reporter, and interpreter) and it connects them to a world beyond the textbook. Such was the strength and vitality of our AOLS curriculum and programs that, in 2021, we were recognized by the National Academy Foundation (NAF) as the first NAF law academy in the United States.

During my time at the Hialeah Gardens Senior High School Academy of Law Studies, I was responsible for establishing two curriculum and competition-based programs that have been extremely successful in furthering the tenets of law related education the We the People Congressional Hearing program and the mock trial team program. Established in 1986, the We the People: Citizens and the Constitution Program is a national program whereby students are taught basic civic and legal lessons

as they pertain to the United States Constitution. The We the People program culminates with simulated congressional hearings where students testify before a panel of judges acting as members of Congress. I've been associated with the We the People Program since 2007, when I started my teaching career at Miami Norland Senior High. Later in my career, I was responsible for incorporating the We the People curriculum into my Honors U.S. Constitutional Law class in 2013, at the School for Advanced Studies - South and again, in 2017, when I joined the AOLS faculty at my current school. Through my guidance, my students have developed an appreciation for the U.S. Constitution and the law in general, which is evidenced by the fact that my classes have won We the People district championships in 2013, 2014, 2015, 2021, 2024 and 2025 and they won We the People state championships in 2014, 2024 and 2025. Most recently, my AOLS students have advanced to the We the People National Finals, for the second year in a row.

The second program that I was responsible for establishing at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School was the mock trial program. Since 2006, I've been involved in mock trial as an instructor, a coach, and as a judge. Prior to joining the AOLS program, I established the mock trial program at School for Advanced Studies-South which was very successful as we won the 2013 Miami-Dade County Public Schools High School Mock Trial championship and consistently ranked in the top five mock trial teams in the county from 2011 to 2015. When I joined the AOLS faculty in 2016, I was determined to bring a sense of "championship mock trial pedigree" to our campus. I was responsible for acquiring books, like Winning Objections: A Mock Trial Guidebook, to my students, so they could develop the necessary litigation skills to excel at mock trial competitions. The success of the AOLS program is evidenced by the fact that we won Miami-Dade County Public Schools High School Mock Trial championships in 2020 and 2022, and we consistently ranked among the top four mock trial teams in the county from 2019 to 2024. However, the AOLS mock trial program achievements aren't just limited to competitions. In the fall of 2022, the captain of my mock trial team and I met with representatives from Hialeah Garden Middle School, and we established the Hialeah Gardens Senior High School Varsity Mock Trial Team Mentorship Program. The program entailed members of the high school mock trial team who would go to our local middle school and expose students to basic litigation skills and courtroom etiquette. Under my supervision, my mock trial team mentors helped the middle school students prepare for their competitions. This mentorship program, now in its third year, has not only fostered a successful partnership, but it has also opened a gateway for middle school children to further explore the wonders of the law. In 2024, we have expanded our mentorship program to also include homeschooled students. Moreover, in April of 2024 my mock trial team co-hosted a mock trial tournament for 6th-8th grade homeschooled students.

In 2020, Hialeah Gardens Senior High School created the Shield program, which was specifically designed to identify and provide enrichment educational opportunities to academically talented and highly motivated students. I was approached by my principal to set up a summer program (under the banner of the Shield program) which would be aimed at recruiting in-coming freshmen who might have an interest in the law. I accepted my principal's offer and created the Hialeah Gardens Senior High School Mock Trial Summer Bootcamp. The purpose of the bootcamp is to expose students to the mechanics of litigation as well as to sharpen their critical thinking skills through analysis of modern-day social issues. For example, in 2020, summer bootcamp students analyzed the issue of "law

and order versus police brutality" when they did a simulated trial loosely based on the George Floyd killing. As a result of my summer mock trial bootcamp, freshmen enrollment in the Hialeah Gardens Senior High School Academy of Law Studies has not only grown in the fall of 2023, but student interest in taking law classes as well as law related activities has also increased significantly.

In terms of extra-curricular activities, I have dedicated many hours outside the classroom to law related activities. For example, in 2010, I was responsible for establishing the very first chapter of the Florida Law Honor Society (FLHS) at the School for Advanced Studies - South. The purpose of FLHS is to advance scholarship in law-related fields by providing service opportunities, promoting leadership, civic engagement and education opportunities, as well as instilling a sense of respect for the courts and the judicial branch. After I left the School for Advanced Studies - South, I started another FLHS chapter at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School in 2017, which is still thriving today. As sponsor of the Hialeah Gardens Senior High School chapter of FLHS, I have created law related career opportunities for my students. For example, I have organized field trips to Florida International University College of Law, St. Thomas University School of Law, and the University of Miami School of Law. These field trips provide valuable insight on the steps that are necessary to gain admission into law school as well as the requirements to pursue a career as an attorney. I have also been involved in establishing a high school level moot court program, first at the School for Advanced Studies - South in 2011, then at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School in 2019. My moot court program focuses on exposing students to the appellate process, which occurs after trial, and students also develop their legal writing skills by learning how to write an appellate brief. They also develop their public speaking skills by learning how to make oral arguments. The success of my moot court program is illustrated by the fact that, as a coach and faculty sponsor, my students won two Florida high school moot court state championships (first in 2011 and again in 2013) and a third-place state level ranking in 2019, and district level moot court championships in 2011-2013, 2015, 2019 and 2025.

Over the years, I have received many honors and awards for my law related educational activities and my dedication to civic education. While teaching at Miami Norland Senior High School, I was a finalist for the Rookie Teacher of the Year Award in 2007 and 2009 and the Teacher of the Year Award in 2008. While at School for Advanced Studies – South, I was a finalist for the 2012 Teacher of the Year Award, and the recipient for the 2012 School for Advanced Studies Award for Excellence in Education. At my current school, Hialeah Gardens Senior High School I was a finalist for the 2022 Teacher of the Year Award and I, along with my academy, were recognized by the National Academy Foundation (NAF) as recipients of the Katherine Blasik Distinguished Academy Award for establishing the first NAF high school law studies academy in the nation. At the county level, I was recognized as the 2012 Miami Dade Council for the Social Studies High School Social Science Teacher of the Year for my dedication to law related education and the social sciences, and I was the June 2012 recipient of the CBS Channel 4 Love My Teacher Award. At the state level, I've been recognized as a Florida Supreme Court Justice Institute Teaching Institute Fellow in 2008 and as a recipient of the 2012 Florida Council for the Social Studies High School Social Science Teacher of the Year Award.

#### To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing this letter of recommendation for Dr. Derrick Johnson with respect to the American Lawyers Alliance Teacher of the Year Award. There is no one more deserving of this award recognizing an outstanding teacher who has made significant contributions to law-related education.

I have had the privilege of knowing Dr. Johnson for the last several years. We first met when Dr. Johnson agreed to participate in one of the few civics programs coordinated by the South Florida Chapter of the Federal Bar Association in conjunction with the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida. These civics programs include our annual Law Day program, annual Constitution Day program, and Civil Discourse and Difficult Decisions ("CD3") programs (held throughout the school year). I have led these programs for the South Florida Chapter of the Federal Bar Association since 2017. I knew from the outset that Dr. Johnson was an extremely dedicated and special teacher.

To begin, Dr. Johnson is a Law Academy teacher at the Academy of Law Studies at Hialeah Gardens Senior High School, a Title I high school in Miami-Dade County, Florida. Dr. Johnson also teaches in the areas of law studies, constitutional law honors, dual-enrollment criminal justice, dual-enrollment international law, introduction to political science, and legal systems and concepts. These roles alone show he has been dedicated to law-related education for many years.

But, of course, that merely touches the surface of Dr. Johnson's significant contributions to law-related education. Dr. Johnson has spent approximately eight hours per week outside of the classroom, helping his students learn law-related skills. As part of this effort, Dr. Johnson helps coach the student mock trial and moot court teams, extracurricular activities that go beyond time in the classroom for about ten hours per week. And at least every year (sometimes every semester), Dr. Johnson has collectively spent more than 500 hours helping his students compete in mock trial and moot court tournaments, exposing his students to trial and appellate law practice helping them hone their trial and appellate skills.

As more recent examples of these significant mock-trial/moot court coaching contributions, in February of 2025, Dr. Johnson coached his Varsity Mock Trial Team. His team participated in the 2025 Miami-Dade County Public Schools Mock Trial High School Competition and ranked in the top five teams in the county. In March of 2025, Dr. Johnson coached his Moot Court Team. His team won the Florida Third District Court of Appeal Competition. The team advanced to the 2025 Florida Bar Association High School Moot Court Semi-Finals in Tallahassee last month and ranked in the top five teams in the state.

Additionally, every year, Dr. Johnson leads his students in participating in the We the People program – local, state, and national simulated congressional hearings designed to deepen students' knowledge of the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights. The program is also designed to build upon workplace skills, including working cooperatively as a team, public speaking, and managing conflict. Dr. Johnson's students are the current back-to-back Miami-Dade County and State of Florida We the People Champions (and have been prior recipients of these titles in years prior). Dr. Johnson's students competed in the National We the People last month for the second year in a row. As with the mock trial team, Dr. Johnson has spent approximately five additional hours per week outside of the classroom dedicated to preparing his students for these competitions. These accolades alone are impressive, but what is more impressive is Dr. Johnson's commitment to his students' development.

Also showing Dr. Johnson's steadfast commitment to legal education, Dr. Johnson was critical to steering his school through the National Academy Foundation ("NAF") accreditation process in 2021. The Academy of Law Studies was granted accreditation in 2021, thanks in part to Dr. Johnson's efforts in establishing the legal education and exposure necessary for his school to receive the accreditation.

Dr. Johnson also consistently provides his students with opportunities to visit federal courthouses and meet with federal judges and attorneys, and learn about various careers within the law. Dr. Johnson has consistently exposed his students to our federal court system and civics education through the South Florida Chapter of the Federal Bar Association's many civics programs over the last several years. Dr. Johnson's students have participated in our annual Law Day and Constitutional Day programs and many of our CD3 programs. The most recent programs Dr. Johnson's students participated in were Constitution Day on September 13, 2024, and a CD3 program on December 12, 2024. Almost all of our civics programs are morning programs hosted at one of the federal courthouses in downtown Miami, where students get the opportunity to participate in a program in a federal courtroom and with a federal judge and attorney volunteers. The students learn about various careers in the court system, including as a judge, court reporter, court security officer, attorney, and interpreter.

As for Constitution Day, every year we celebrate this national event at the federal courthouse in September. The program focuses on the United States Constitution and its amendments. While the topics discussed every year vary, each program involves an interactive discussion among the students, a federal judge, and local federal attorney volunteers.

As for Law Day, every year the American Bar Association sets the law-related theme. As an example, this year's theme is "The Constitution's Promise: Out of Many, One," which enshrines our collective responsibility to one another, urging us to take pride in a Constitution that bridges our differences to bring us together as a united nation. Typically, the Law Day program starts with students observing a naturalization ceremony, and additional interactive and educational programming with the judge and attorneys related to the theme follows the ceremony.

As for the CD3 program, the program teaches students the importance of civil discourse during disagreements and arguments. Students also have the opportunity to act as attorneys in front of a federal judge, and make legal and factual arguments about a fictional scenario based on an actual U.S. Supreme Court case. Students then get to act as jurors and render a verdict based on their deliberations with their peers. Finally, the students are tested about real-life scenarios and the potential consequences of those scenarios to help students make more informed choices in the future.

Even the COVID-19 pandemic could not stop Dr. Johnson from participating in such timely and critical programming for his students. During the pandemic, the CD3 and other civics programs were conducted via Zoom. Dr. Johnson's drive to have his students experience a program with the federal court never diminished. Dr. Johnson and his students have consistently participated in these civics programs over the last several years.

Lastly, but certainly not least (I do not know when Dr. Johnson sleeps), in July of 2024, Dr. Johnson served as a mentor for the Civics Empowers All Students (CEAS) program where he helped elementary and middle school teachers learn how to effectively teach and implement the We the People and other civics-based curriculum in their classrooms. In February 2025, Dr. Johnson also worked with CEAS and Miami-Dade College to organize an event where U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor was the keynote speaker. His impact on law-related education has sent ripples across South Florida that no doubt will continue to be felt for years to come.

In sum, Dr. Johnson has shown unwavering dedication to educating his students about our legal system and the many facets of it. I have watched his commitment to exposing his students to as many legal educational opportunities as possible, year after year. He is a one-of-a-kind teacher. For all of these reasons, I proudly recommend Dr. Derrick Johnson as the recipient of the American Lawyers Alliance Teacher of the Year Award.



#### About the Hearings

- Students' opening statements are four minutes long and may include student notes.
- · Judges' follow-up questioning on Saturday and Sunday lasts eight minutes; on Monday (top 10), it extends to 10 minutes. During follow-up questioning, students may not use notes.

#### **About Scoring**

- The scoring team tabulates electronically submitted score sheets from judges, each with five categories. Each category is worth ten points for a maximum score of 50 points per sheet.
- Each unit is assessed by three judges, with the highest possible unit score being 150 points.
- Classes qualify for the top 10 based on combined scores from the first two days, advancing to round 3 on Monday.
- The national winner is determined by doubling the third-day scores and adding them to the total scores for the first two days.



"What did you guys notice about the technique that he used?" said teacher Derrick Johnson to his class, speaking about the defense attorney's strategy.

Johnson is a lawyer, so he showed his class how to dissect the Chauvin trial, from start to finish, as they watched as much of it as they could.

"Definitely they have an idea of the importance, the sheer gravity that's centered around this case,"

Johnson said. "This is one of those teachable moments, I do remember when I was roughly their age,
I had a teachable moment when I witnessed the whole Rodney King situation."

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Johnson contrasted that famous Los Angeles case, in which video showed police beating King, with the Chauvin case. The officers involved in the King case were acquitted while Chauvin was convicted.

"Sad reality is that if this wasn't recorded, the officer probably would've gotten away with what he did," said one of the students, Erik Leon, during the class discussion.

"I really enjoyed the class discussions, we got to see both sides of the argument and discussion it is extremely eye-opening," said Rachel Gonzal

evidence, especially the video evidence.

"I think that this trial has just showed us the importance of videotaping everything you see and if you see anything wrong don't be scared to say anything about it," said Erik, who is a senior.

The video which the whole world saw, the video which provided the key evidence in this case, was shot by a 17-year-old girl and that fact is not lost on the students here.

"I think she's extremely brave," Rachel said, who is also 17. "This lasted for nine minutes and 23 seconds and she had to stand there to take that video and that video was the key evidence, I know I couldn't do it if I was put in her place."

As they discussed the implications of the verdict on police reform, Johnson asked his class, "What if any lessons do you think we can get from the whole Chauvin-Floyd case?"

"I'm not saying defund the police and all this stuff," Erik said, "But I do think reform needs to happen because if not these things are gonna keep happening, we just seen last week, the same things keep occurring."

Some of the students in Johnson's class might go on to become attorneys, some will not, but whatever they become, learning the lessons of the Chauvin trial might make them all better, more involved citizens.

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

# CIVICS PROGRAMS ABOUND IN MIAMI-DADE SCHOOLS

### Civics programs abound in Miami-Dade schools

Suited up like lawyers, students from Asiah Wolfolk's class at Miami Carol City High School traveled to Tallahassee and played the roles of attorneys at the podium and justices on the bench during simulated oral arguments at the Florida Supreme Court.

Derrick Johnson's class at Miami's School for Advanced Students took first-place honors at the 2014 "We the People" state finals and represented Florida at the finals in Washington, D.C.

Middle-school students gathered in front of a computer screen to present their Project Citizen presentation via Skype to a panel of judges in Tallahassee.

At the heart of Miami-Dade County's extensive array of civics and law programs is the Florida Law Related Education Association that has worked with the nation's fourth largest school district for more than three decades.

"The Miami-Dade County Public Schools Department of Social Sciences has created an environment of support and respect for its teachers," said Annette Boyd Pitts, executive director of FLREA, who travels to Miami monthly to participate in the district's civics and law training programs.

"The quality staff in the district office understand and appreciate that investing in teacher training and quality resources will have a positive reciprocal impact on students."

Recently, 100 gifted elementary teachers were trained in the "We the People," the "Citizen," and "Constitution" programs to help fourth- and fifth-graders prepare for the middle school civics course and exam.

"Students need to be exposed to documents, vocabulary, and constitutional principles prior to seventh grade to ensure they acquire the depth of knowledge needed by the time they take the end-of-course exam in middle school," said Jackie Viana, supervisor of the Social Sciences Department, who in 2010 received the American Civic Education Teacher Award from a national consortium of civic organizations, including the Center for Civic Education and the Center on Congress.

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Under the leadership of Viana and Department of Social Sciences Executive Director Robert Brazofsky, the Miami-Dade County School District enjoys a reputation of the most expansive law programs in the state, with courtrooms on school campuses, wideranging elective law courses for middle- and high-school students, quality professional development opportunities for teachers, and many law-related education competitions and showcases that energize students to learn about the U.S. Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the law.


# SCHOOL FOR ADVANCED STUDIES (SAS) WINS 2013 STATE MOOT COURT COMPETITION
