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
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
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ou just might find Justin O'Neal braced like Spiderman on the side of a Houston rooftop. When the job calls for it, the owner of FairClaims Roofing Company will not shy from heights or steep pitches on residential or commercial builds. Suspended from ropes, he defies gravity. For clients, O'Neal and his team install or repair shingles, 24-gauge steel, and elegant tile from vertiginous perches. For clients preferring solar, stone, or other materials, O'Neal's company is at the ready. A seven-year winning streak in Living Magazine's Readers' Choice Best Of showcase serves as a glowing community endorsement.

O'Neal doesn't take it for granted. Though incentives run high for fly-by-night roofers, the "BestOf" wins for FairClaims Roofing Company prove that experienced tradesmen outcompete discount roofers at every turn. "There's not a state license for roofing like there is for electricians or even barbers," said O'Neal. That means barbers have more educational requirements than some contractors. For buyers, the research helps distinguish between excellence and the rest. With two decades serving The Woodlands and Montgomery County under their belt, the FCR reputation for higher standards precedes them. We spoke to owner O'Neal about how consumers can save money, avoid pitfalls, and get the most from the roof over their heads.

ROOF SHINGLE VS. PINE NEEDLE

Call it the result of substantial cost increases in construction and the trades, but insurers are treating roofs differently these days. "One of the more common calls we get now is [from customers who tell us] 'My insurance company sent me a letter saying my home is no longer insurable because I have an aging roof on my house," said O'Neal. While deductibles climb, roofs are placed on depreciated schedules. The amount of coverage in case of a claim now often depends on the age of the installation. "That puts the burden back onto the homeowner to maintain the roof so that it will last as long as possible," said the roofer.

Warranties for roofing products may last longer, but "the average shelf life of a roof is about 15 to 20 years," said O'Neal. In Houston, the elements can cut that short. Needles from pine and other trees in the area should be removed two or three times a year to ensure proper drainage. Houston's climate also causes a breakdown and loss of shingle granules, while high winds or hail can knock gravel off and gouge divots. During long Texas droughts, caulking can become dry and lead to leaks, so O'Neal recommended an annual inspection, or at least an assessment of the roof's condition, which he offers for free. Should service be required, free estimates make budget planning possible for homeowners or property managers. Basic service packages include a clean and tune-up either annually or semiannually, a scheduled care package that could prolong the life of your roof into its twilight years. To perform service, a full-time roof repair team works with O'Neal. They're not just any team.

STAYING POWER

With a low barrier to entry, newbie contractors can mint a roofing business in the time it takes to assemble their crew. Those mystery men hammering and nailing into your home may have never done the job before and may not ever again. O'Neal said subcontractors are not uncommon, and though they are not always the telltale sign of less expertise, the signs of highly skilled workers do exist. "My main crew has been with me since 2003," he said. With the years, skill accrues.



Additionally, FRC counts itself among the Roofing Contractors Association of Texas. Association members are vetted and advocate for consumer protection. "[RCAT] offers a license similar to a state license that has testing and ongoing education ... for contractors who want to differentiate themselves and do things the right way," said O'Neal. The respected contractor is even on the executive board of the RCAT's local chapter, the Houston Area Contractors Association. With a consumer advocate's transparency, O'Neal explained roofing types when we spoke.

HEAVY METAL

Asphalt shingles win the roofing popularity contest, but the far more durable – and more expensive – option is metal. Painted metal roofs often come with a 40-year warranty on the finish, and in the Houston climate, metal just performs better. Because it's impactresistant and less likely to be damaged by hail or strong winds, insurance becomes more affordable.

The strength of metal comes from a few important features. Installed over plywood, for starters, and made of 24-gauge striated steel, the slight bend in each pane makes them sturdier. And because metal is reflective, it bounces sunlight back to the atmosphere rather than absorbing it into your home, earning an Energy Star rating.

"I'm a big advocate for [metal]. It feels like the biggest bang for your buck," said O'Neal. Because of the higher cost, he told us that it makes the most sense for homeowners hoping to keep the house for 15 or 20 years.

In the roofer's opinion, tile is a similarly durable product, "but you have to keep [it] clean and keep debris out of [the tiles] so they can properly channel water." Experienced roofers will build the underlayments and battens with longevity in mind, advised O'Neal.

FUTURE ROOFING

That new roof on the block? That's the one with solar shingles that produce energy just as effectively while looking much more physically attractive. Typically, buyers should anticipate an outlook of 10 years in terms of breaking even on the investment into such a roof, with one major caveat. "That doesn't consider inflation," said owner O'Neal. "As energy costs go up, the quicker it pays for itself."

FRC is certified at the highest level with GAF, the nation's largest shingle manufacturer, as a Master's Elite contractor. FRC has also been a president's club contractor for the last 10 years in a row, said O'Neal. As costs rarely fall, maintenance completed by adept tradesmen may be the best hedge moving forward.

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Designing with Natural Materials and Elements

Natural is in, including using natural materials and elements in interior design. Versatile and appealing, they fit with almost any style, from cozy boho and comfortable transitional to minimalist or relaxed opulence. Below are a few ideas to kick-start your creativity and find new ways to enhance your home with wood, stone, and organic fibers.

WOOD: Using rough-cut and reclaimed wood remains popular, but don't shy away from finished wooden pieces. Place a low, polished live edge bench at the end of a bed instead of an upholstered piece by the fireplace, or use it as a coffee table instead of a large, tufted ottoman.

Another way to use finished wood is with a gorgeous hardwood dining table. If you're into sustainability, find one you like at a consignment shop or an estate sale. The wood you select depends on the look you're going for. Mahogany, for example, is luxurious and elegant. Walnut, known for its vibrant, rich color, has tight grains, often with swirls and wave patterns. Maple is light-colored with a smooth, even grain unless you splurge for birds-eye maple, which has swirling eyes within smooth grain lines. Soften it and add color, if you wish, with upholstered chairs.

And remember hardwood flooring. Sure, luxury vinyl that simulates wood is a popular choice for its ease of maintenance and durability, but there's nothing like the eye-catching appeal of real hardwood floors.

STONE: Timeless and often breathtaking, stone is one of the easiest ways to add natural materials to your home décor. The options are almost limitless. Flooring, countertops, backsplashes, vases, wall cladding, fireplace mantels, shower surrounds, lamps, candle holders, coffee tables, sculptures — and the list goes on.

As with wood, the type of stone you select depends on the aesthetic you're going for. It also depends on where you're going to use it. Sedimentary stones such as limestone, sandstone, and travertine tend to be more porous and softer. Metamorphic stones like marble, quartzite, and slate are harder than sedimentary stone. Granite, which is volcanic in origin, is one of the hardest natural materials on earth.

If you have the option, choosing your own stone slabs puts the control in your hands, and you'll know what the finished product should look like.

ORGANIC FIBERS: Natural fiber fabrics and décor accessories complement styles like modern farmhouse and add elegant comfort to virtually any living space, regardless of the style. Fabrics made from cotton, wool, jute, and sisal add warmth, softness, and texture to your home. Linen especially pairs well with minimalist design.

Choose natural fibers for throws and pillows coverings, rugs, upholstered ottomans and benches, and wall art, such as a grouping of sisal trays or shallow baskets. Or make a bold, beautiful statement with a striking mohair velvet sectional sofa. (Mohair velvet is a plush, durable upholstery fabric made from wool shorn from Angora goats.)

DECORATE WITH INDOOR PLANTS AND TREES:

Beautifying your home with plants builds a closer connection with the outdoors, but did you know that research indicates indoor plants may reduce psychological and physiological stress, too?

If you're new to growing plants indoors or have recently moved, consider your home's environment room by room. Is it drafty or dry in the winter months? What kind of natural light is available for how many hours of the day? Lastly, determine how much available space you have for plants. A fiddle leaf fig, for example, usually grows to about 10 feet or more indoors.

When selecting plants, match them with your home's environment to ensure they will grow and thrive with proper care. You can create groupings of smaller plants, go all-out and install a living plant wall, or invest in a couple of large statement plants. I especially love my Ponderosa lemon and kaffir lime trees. They're fairly low maintenance and easy to keep in great condition with plenty of sunshine and brief, daily misting. I move them outside in the summer and watch them grow like crazy.

Before taking on your next home remodeling project, it's a good idea to get your ducks in a row by doing some essential preliminary work.

First, determine whether you'll need a professional or not. If you do, then research the professionals you'll want to hire. Then consider that not all renovations are equal. Many projects make for a better return on investment (ROI) when it's time to sell. Lean on the side of neutrality so that house hunters will clearly visualize their own personalities in the home.

Also, research current trends. Each year, surveys are conducted revealing the ROI of popular home renovations. Contractors nation-wide are polled to calculate what these upgrades cost to complete. The data collected is compared with how much real estate agents estimated these features would boost a home's market price. This year's answers overwhelmingly show that the focus should be on the parts of your home that are the most visible because most buyers will decide whether they want to purchase in the first few minutes of looking. That means a new garage door and front door, new siding, and fresh, updated landscaping should be the first projects you consider.



New garage doors have a huge visual impact on a house you're planning to put on the market and replacing them can recoup over 100% of the cost in resale. Entry door replacement is impactful and one of the first things a buyer will see. And the ROI is a whopping 90.7%.

The exterior of your house can take a beating from the elements, and after a while it shows. New siding could recoup 75.6% of the cost when you sell your house. Replacing part of that siding with manufactured stone veneer, however, will have a bigger impact. Homeowners who install a stone veneer on their house – usually on the bottom third of the exterior – see as much as 94.9% of the cost come back in the sale price.

Fresh landscaping could be just what the home needs to look new and appealing and with an ROI of 100%, every dollar spent here is worth it. It's important to replace dead patches of grass, mow the lawn regularly and add a bit of color with flowers or bushes.

Indoors for kitchens and bathrooms, think minor renovations. A major upscale kitchen renovation will recoup just 50% of the cost when the property sells, and an upscale bathroom remodel only 56%. Instead, consider simply updating the kitchen cabinets and backsplash or installing a double vanity or new lights and showerhead in the bathroom.

Another worthy consideration is replacing the windows, which impacts both the outdoor appearance and the indoor bottom line. Replacement of midrange windows can see an ROI up to \$1.15 for every dollar spent on the project, but that profit decreases with more upscale windows. \blacksquare



s the days grow longer and the weather gets warmer, your backyard pool beckons you toward lazy hours of floating, splashing, diving, dining, and making memories with the ones you love. If your pool's been closed all winter, it's recommended that you begin getting it ready about a week before you hope to use it. Here are a few things for you or a pool professional to consider when preparing for summer fun.

Clean Debris and Give Everything a Once-Over

Take a little time to survey the area around your pool. Trim overhanging trees that might drop leaves in the water. Blow or sweep off your pool decking and look for any damage or wear and tear. Clean, repair, or replace deck furniture and conduct a safety check of pool rails, slides, rescue equipment, ladders, and diving boards. Then inventory your chemicals to ensure you have what you need on hand.

Remove the Cover

Your swimming pool cover accumulated water and debris all winter. Use a pool cover pump to eliminate old, dirty water so it doesn't end up in your pool as you take the cover off. Hose down the cover and give it a good scrub with a pool-cover solution.

Do a Thorough Pool Inspection

Remove drain plugs from surface skimmers and wall-return equipment and restore directional fittings. Inspect your pool's pump and filter and replace anything that's damaged or worn.

If you disconnected your underwater pool lights for the winter, reconnect them. Check all tiles and use a pool scale removal product to remove calcium buildup and stains. Thoroughly inspect the interior of your pool for damage and make any necessary repairs. If you have a fiberglass pool with a gel coating, hairline cracks typically won't affect the integrity of your pool, however, large cracks or holes should be addressed by a pool professional.

Do a Final Debris Removal

An easy way to get rid of that last bit of debris is to fill the pool to the midpoint of the skimmer opening. Then you can easily clean leaves, twigs, and debris from the pool's bottom with a pool brush. Empty the basket as well.

Turn on Filter and Test Water

Before you test the water or add any chemicals, turn on the filter and let it run for 24 hours. Then collect a water sample and take it to a pool professional to analyze and offer instructions for balancing your pool's water. They'll test the water's pH level, alkalinity, calcium hardness, and chlorine levels, advise you on shocking the pool, and recommend stabilizers, phosphate removers, metal treatment products, or algaecides to add a week before that first swim.

Continue to run the filter for the next few days and vacuum debris as it settles. Once you're done, all that work will pay off as you spend summer 2023 enjoying the perfect staycation spot right outside your back door.

HOW TO PLAN A GARDEN THEY WILL LOVE

icture this. It's early morning, and the sky's still pink with the sunrise. There you sit, coffee cup in hand, companionable dog at your feet, watching the butterflies dance in and out of your flower garden. What could be more relaxing? If you've dreamed of just such a scene, it may be easier than you think.

Thanks to our diverse ecoregion and long growing season, Texas plays host to more butterfly species than any other state in the union. And whether you live on a sprawling ranch, a suburban homestead, or an urban condominium, it's easy to attract these winged beauties into your life.

Design an Enticing Space

Butterflies don't ask for much, but they do need six or more hours of sunlight — preferably midmorning to mid-afternoon — and shelter from the elements that can come from trees or plants and chemical-free soil.

Selecting Your Plants

Butterflies require both host plants and nectar plants. A host plant is one onto which butterflies, and moths lay their eggs and whose leaves provide a buffet for emerging caterpillars. Also known as larval host plants or caterpillar host plants, they're usually native plants that have evolved alongside butterflies and moths. Since some butterflies will only lay their eggs on a specific plant, find out what plants it prefers if you hope to attract a specific species of butterflies. A well-known example of this host/butterfly symbiosis is monarch butterflies and milkweed.

A nectar plant provides food for adult butterflies and moths who drink the nectar from their flowers. Because host plants provide food for butterflies in the caterpillar stage while nectar plants feed the creatures once they've metamorphosed into butterflies, your butterfly garden should include both.

Other Attractions


Since a butterfly can't land on open water sources to drink, provide a birdbath or other structure with tiny stones and fresh water. Butterflies can safely land on the stones and drink water to hydrate. You can also provide a receptacle with wet sand from which they'll draw minerals, a habit known as puddling. And lastly, because butterflies need sun for orientation and to warm their wings for flight, you can place some flat stones around your landscape for butterflies to rest and bask in the sun.

Go for Color

Adult butterflies are attracted to red, yellow, orange, pink, and purple blossoms with flat-topped or clustered blooms. Be sure to include flowers in those colors and plan your garden so that when one plant stops blooming, another begins. Or opt for plants such as lantana, vinca, or zinnia that bloom all summer long.

What you do to attract butterflies to your landscape will also attract other beneficial insects, such as native bees, dragonflies, and ladybugs. Together, they pollinate our world and provide food for birds, lizards, frogs, toads, wasps, and bats, contributing to the circle of life. And as English naturalist and author Sir David Attenborough put it, "That simple pleasure of looking at butterflies in the garden is calming to the soul and spirit and good for us all."



Who wants to be stuck in the house all night after a long day at work or school? A spacious deck is a perfect place to get outside, enjoy some family time under the stars, eat, listen to the crickets, and enjoy your backyard. Here are some deck ideas we're excited about this year.

LARGER DECKS

Gone are the days of the 20-by-10-foot deck with a grill and a scattering of patio chairs. Families are now enjoying multilevel decks with different functions on different levels, such as outdoor kitchens, sun decks, or spas. Pergolas and walls add privacy, and built-ins provide the perfect solution for seating, storage, and planters.

VARIED-PLANK DECKING

Instead of an expanse of identical decking, try mixing materials. Consider alternating thinner and thicker boards or different colored materials for a contemporary flair. It's an easy way to achieve any number of looks and can be accomplished with traditional wood or composite decking material.

The Storefront

A garage is usually the best place to hold a sale, offering shelter and requiring little daily set up and tear down. Use a covered porch, patio, or yard if your garage is hard to access or contains valuables. Make sure you have tarps available to protect items from rain and for covering at the end of the day.

All in the Timing

Plan your sale when temperatures are between 60 to 90 degrees outdoors. Typically, the best days to hold sales are Thursdays thru Sundays, with Fridays and Saturdays bringing the most traffic. Mornings get the most significant flow of shoppers, so the earlier you're ready, the better.

Displaying Your Wares

- Don't heap your merchandise on tables or leave it in boxes to be ransacked. While some are okay with digging through messy stacks, most people won't bother.
- Use a clothesline or portable clothes racks to hang as much clothing as possible.
- Plenty of table space is also a must. Folding tables are optimal, but you can make a table by resting a sheet of plywood over sawhorses or prop spare wood planks between chairs.
- Neatly fold and stack clothing that can't be hung on tables, and label stacks according to size. Organize good toys and complete sets where parents and grandparents will easily spot them. Categorize tables and place small articles such as jewelry in divider containers or egg cartons, so they're easy to view.
- One exception to the disorderly rule is for small toys. Stick all these little goodies in boxes on the ground where young children can dig for treasures to take home. Label boxes according to the price per item or allow kids to choose one as a prize.
- Finally, make sure batteries and electricity are available to show shoppers that items are in working condition.

Looks are Everything

Appearance plays a big role in selling used goods and how much they can bring. Wash and dry all clothing and linens, then

fold or hang immediately to prevent wrinkles. Wash dust, dirt, and grime from toys, tools, and household items. Also, repair broken merchandise when feasible.

Priced to Sell

Don't overprice items, or you'll end up packing up nearly as much as you started with. Research online ads or resale websites for average resale prices for oversized items. But remember that this pricing often differs from what people pay at a garage sale.

Advertising

Newspaper classified ads or Craigslist, as well as the more popular online garage sale locator websites, usually bring the best results. In your ad, be sure to include your address and main cross streets, dates, and time of your sale, and what you'll be selling. List big items individually and the categories of things you'll sell, like "tools" or "toddler clothing."

Also, post fliers on the grocery store or laundromat bulletin boards. If there are no regulations against doing so, posting signs on nearby corners is a must. Remember to put a bright sign in front of your house, too. Balloons tied to your mailbox, or a tree can make your sale more visible.


 The bigger the sale, the more traffic you'll get.

BACKYARD OASIS/RESORT-STYLE POOL

INFINITY POOL

Custom-made to highlight a view or a landscape focal point, infinity pools are designed with one or more walls just below the pool's water level. The water flows over the wall, creating the illusion of a vanishing edge. A sloping lot or one with a few feet of drop-off is usually needed for an infinity edge to work well.

COCKTAIL POOL

Do you envision relaxing in a pool bigger than a hot tub but smaller and not as deep as a regular pool? A cocktail pool may be just the ticket, especially if you have a smaller backyard. The design and size can be customized to fit your space and style and integrated into a patio or backyard living area.

PLUNGE POOL

Smaller than a traditional pool, a plunge pool is just deep enough for lounging, cooling off, and low-impact water exercise. The size can vary from around 6.5 to 10 feet wide and 10 to 22 feet long, and 5.5 to 7 feet deep, and the bottom is usually flat.

LAP POOL

These long, narrow, rectangular pools are designed primarily for swimming laps in the privacy of your backyard. A good length for a lap pool is at least 40 feet, and it can serve as a focal point for a narrow lot. Consider including features like a swim current generator.

"SPOOL"

A best-of-both-worlds option for homeowners, a spool is just what you think it might be – a pool and a spa. Often referred to by pool builders as a portmanteau (a blend of two words), spools are typically half the size of a typical in-ground outdoor pool and twice the length of a spa.





More Hot Features for a Cool Pool

Baja Shelf – If you enjoy soaking up the sun but not the summer heat, a Baja shelf is a great solution. Think of it as a wide top step into your pool where you can lounge and play in shallow water.

Lighting Effects – Make your pool come alive at night with programmable colored LED lighting. Whether you're in the mood for a dramatic, illuminated nightscape or dynamic light show, let your pool builder show you all the lighting options to choose from.

Laminars – Like a deck jet but better, laminars emanate from the pool deck or coping and reach greater heights. They produce a larger, sleeker, arced water stream that holds its shape until it hits the pool's surface, creating a serene scene that embodies beauty and relaxing elegance.

Reverse Infinity Pool – With most vanishing-edge pools, the water overflows a pool edge to seemingly blend into the horizon. As implied, the opposite occurs with this pool design. Instead, the water spills into an eye-catching, stylized catchment pool viewed from a spa, outdoor living area, or your patio.

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As you lie in bed at night counting sheep, have you ever thought about the 100 gallons of water that may be sitting above your head? Because various reasons make it nearly impossible for Texas houses to have a basement, many two-story homes have water heaters in an accessible walk-in attic on the second floor.

That's great news for helping keep that water hot during a typical Texas summer, but a leak from a faulty valve or pipe or other major malfunction that goes unnoticed can result in water spilling over a drain pan and flooding the floor. That will result in water dripping from the ceiling on the floor below, and, well, you can imagine the cost of the cleanup and repairs and what happens to your homeowner's insurance premium.



Sure, it makes more sense to have the water heaters in the garage if you have one, although they should be placed on a platform at least 18 inches above the garage floor if the water heater is gas-powered. This protects the heater from potentially combustible gasoline fumes emitted by your car. In any case, a homeowner should not ignore their water heaters. The easiest solution is to get an annual inspection from a plumbing company to ensure the water heaters are functioning properly and efficiently.

However, there are 364 days between inspections, so homeowners should diligently check their water heaters once a week. It is easy to forget about them when they are out of sight and out of mind. Inspect the heaters to determine whether there are any leaking pipes or valves and that no moisture has accumulated in the drain pan, not even a few drops. That could spell trouble is on the way.

If there is water around the pipes, valve, or in the drain pan, turn off the water to the heater at the source and call a professional. If you are not getting any hot water, check the pilot light on the water heater. A flame ignites a gas heater, while an electric heater uses a heating element to start the heater. Double-check that the circuit breaker dedicated to the water heaters hasn't tripped.

Make your water heaters more efficient by insulating the hot water heater pipes. You can also insulate the water heater tank with a relatively inexpensive insulation blanket or even use bubble wrap. Check the thermostat to see the temperature of the water. Most experts recommend keeping water heaters at 140° to prevent bacteria from forming, but others suggest 120° is hot enough and will cut down on scalding. It also will lower your heating costs.

If you are adventurous and want to maintain the water heaters yourself, flush the heater at least once a year. Unplug an electric heater or turn down the thermostat on a gas heater so it isn't going to start making more hot water. Then turn off the cold-water supply valve and attach a garden hose to the drain valve. Using the pressure relief valve or turning on a hot water faucet in the house allows air into the tank. At this point, you turn on the drain valve, and the tank should begin emptying. Water heaters collect sediment, which affects their performance and life expectancy. You can drain the tank into a floor drain, outside your house, or into buckets. Remember, the water will be extremely hot.

With regular maintenance, a water heater will last for 10 years and probably longer. But neglect will shorten its lifespan and may leave you in financial hot water.

TANKS(LESS) For The Memories

There are options for traditional water heaters, and the best may be a tankless heater that provides hot water on demand. It is a small unit that occupies far less space than traditional water heaters, and instead of storing water in a tank, a heat exchanger heats the water spontaneously. So, if someone in your family is prone to long showers, for example, you won't run out of hot water.


There are gas and electric tankless water heaters, with electric heaters considered about 10% more efficient. The most significant negative is the cost, averaging close to \$3,000 and often more if installers must modify or change the direction of gas lines. But there is also a potential IRS tax credit of up to \$1,200. Tankless heaters also require less maintenance and can be installed

just about anywhere, even outdoors.

Heat pump water heaters, solar water heaters, and other variations of the standard water heater are all designed for efficiency and to save money. But if you are concerned about that tank filled with water above your head, a tankless water heater may be the best option.

Instead of using bleach, keep your sheets, shirts, and socks extra white with a special tip by Martha Stewart. Boil water with a few lemon slices in a pot on the stove, then turn off the heat and soak your clothes for an hour. Afterward, wash them and hang them to dry in the sun.

re you and your spouse tired of sharing the bathroom in shifts? Has your family gained a new member? Do the kids need their own rooms? Does your kitchen feel tiny and cramped? Is it finally time for the home office you have talked about since you moved in? The list could go on, but one thing is sure – you are ready for more space, and the time is now. Here is a list that will help get the ball rolling in the right direction.



First, decide on your budget. Unless money is not an issue, you will likely end up making some cuts to your ideal vision, so enter into this process with that in mind. The average cost for an addition is between \$40,000 and \$50,000. This aggregate national number does not take into account size, scope, the slope of land, or geography. An extensive project could cost more than double this figure. If your addition is small and relatively simple, it may be less.

Once you have decided how much money you will need or can spend, you'll need to determine your exact property lines to develop a plot plan, including your home, landscaping, and the location of the utilities. Then check local codes regarding restrictions about how close you can build to your neighbor.

Next, take a close look at your existing structure and floor plan. At this point, you'll likely need help from a residential designer or architect to come up with an addition that will be not only economical but also attractive, useful, and fit with your current home style. As well as interior design, think about how the expansion will architecturally affect the exterior of your home.

Before work begins, make a list detailing the materials and the scope of the work to be done. Regarding materials (such as flooring, hardware, lighting, etc.), include first, second, and third options. Your first choice may turn out to put you over budget. A backup plan from the onset will ensure you do not lose time once your build-out begins. Determine at this stage what you can and cannot live without, where you can compromise, and where you can save money.

Finally, hire professionals. The number and type of people you will need will depend on the scale and scope of your project. Even if you plan a relatively small addition, you will need a designer or draftsperson to prepare one or more working drawings to apply for a building permit, freehand sketches or rough diagrams will not suffice. For large projects, you will likely need an architect to design an efficient layout and merge the addition's design with your existing home. And do not forget to budget for the cost of the architect.

After your blueprints are complete, you will get bids from contractors. If you have plans for your home addition available for contractors to bid from, you will get a better sense of the cost because they will all be bidding from the same information.

Another option is to hire a design-build firm. They provide a complete package of services, including design consultation, construction drawings, and project management.

Though the idea of expanding your home can be daunting, when broken down into a few steps like these, an addition can be a relatively simple and extremely rewarding way to improve your home and lifestyle.



First, here are the facts of life as they pertain to water and Texas. The state averages just over 27 inches of precipitation a year, with half that amount in West Texas and almost double the average in East Texas. North Texas gets about 34 inches of precipitation annually, and Houston gets around 45 inches of rain yearly. So, why is this important? Well, the population of Texas was about 4.8 million in 1921, and today it is 29.5 million and counting. And guess what? Mother Nature hasn't allocated additional rainfall to account for the population explosion.

This makes water conservation imperative, especially when Texas is prone to periodic droughts. There are numerous steps we can take that might not seem like much but, cumulatively, can result in saving and better utilizing hundreds of thousands of gallons of water.

For starters, consider investing in a rain barrel. They can hold from 50 to 100 gallons of water collected from the gutter and downspout, which is cut to a height above the rain barrel. The rain barrel itself has a spigot that enables you to



attach a hose so you can use the rainwater to irrigate the garden and even wash your car.

Speaking of which, how often have you seen a neighbor's sprinklers running the morning after a major rainstorm? Raise your hand if you have also been guilty of this wasteful act. If you want to avoid manually monitoring your irrigation system, purchase rain sensors. These devices are attached to the sprinkler system and detect when there has been enough rain to prevent your sprinkler system controller from starting. There are different types of sensors, and all are excellent ways of saving water and lowering your water bill as well.

Before you get that bucket, soap, and garden hose ready to wash your car, consider going to the car wash. Yes, it is a more expensive way of keeping your car clean, but many car washes use recycled water, which is better than using fresh water. If cost is an issue, you can keep it down by getting only the exterior washed and cleaning the car's interior yourself.

There are dozens of water conservation measures you can do inside the home. For example, purchase low-flow showerheads and low-flow toilets for the bathrooms. Check your toilet and faucets for leaks. And while you are at it, do not pour money down the drain by using water more than you have to. Reduce time spent in the shower, and don't run the tap while brushing your teeth or shaving.

In the kitchen, install an aerator on your faucet to reduce the flow of water. In fact, put aerators on all your faucets. If you have a dishwasher, fill it before you run it. It is estimated that you can save up to 5,000 gallons of water a year compared to washing dishes by hand. Fill a pan with water and wash fruit and vegetables instead of putting them under running water.

Follow the same principle when using the washing machine. Wait until you have a full load and use the "quick wash" cycle whenever possible. Your clothes will still come out clean. And use cold water to wash because it saves water as well.

Acting on even some of these suggestions to conserve water will benefit the environment and slow that water meter spinning in the front of your house.

Five More Water Conservation Tips

With the demand for water in Texas increasing, and the cost rising, here are some additional tips to consider:

- Check your irrigation system to make sure your sprinklers are all working properly and that none of them is watering the sidewalk or driveway instead of the lawn.
- Pools can lose as much as 80 gallons a day in the summer heat because of evaporation. Invest in a pool cover to reduce evaporation.
- Insulate water pipes, which means you won't have to waste gallons of water waiting for the water to get hot.
- 4. Plant drought-resistant plants and trees and surround them with mulch to reduce evaporation and the demand for water. And water your lawn less but more deeply so that moisture reaches the roots also, water in the early morning or evening.
- Reduce the number of times you run the kitchen garbage disposal unit, as it requires as much as five gallons of water each time. And use cold water.

uring spring, your yard is a different place every day as leaves return to trees, the grass renews itself, and local nurseries beckon with a rainbow of flowers to brighten your landscape. If you're as excited as I am about the approach of spring, it's an excellent time for a bit of prep work to get your yard springtime ready.

Start with cleaning up any leaves, twigs, or other debris that accumulated over the winter. Employ your rake and/or leaf blower to eliminate anything that can get stuck in your lawnmower or block fertilizers and other beneficial materials from absorbing into your lawn.

Hit your lawn with a combination of fertilizer to feed your grass and a pre-emergent such as Scotts Turf Builder, to prevent weeds. Follow the directions, but in general, you'll apply it again in six to eight weeks, adding a broadleaf weed killer. It's better to take preemptive action than try to play catch-up with weeds later. Get your mower out and start it up. If it seems sluggish, perform a tune-up, including changing the oil and air filter, replacing the spark plug, draining out and replacing leftover gasoline, and sharpening the mower blade.

It always amazes me what a fresh layer of mulch can do for a flowerbed. Along with replenishing the mulch, trim back dead branches on shrubs and replace anything that didn't survive the winter. If there are shrubs you've been meaning to move, spring is the time to do it. Consider hiring a tree trimmer (about every three years) to prune away dead or dying branches on trees which can cause property damage or personal harm.

Give your garden tools a good cleaning and sterilization since remaining plant sap, dirt, or debris can harbor bacteria or fungal spores which may infect your new plantings. You can do this with a soak for about a half hour in a solution of 10% household cleaner to 90% water. Then give your tools a good coating of oil to prevent rusting.

Have the soil in your flower or veggie beds tested by your local agricultural extension service. They can diagnose your soil's current pH and what amendments you can add to optimize your planting this season. Pull any weeds, trim any winter-killed, brown leaves from last year's perennial flowers and divide the ones that need dividing. Unless you're using a no-till gardening method, turn over the top six to eight inches of soil, looking for caterpillars, cutworms, or other garden pests that may have overwintered there. Raised beds may need to be topped off with more soil.

Visit a local nursery and get an idea of what annuals you might want to add, then draw up a plan of how they'll work into your perennial landscape. Consider incorporating something new and untested with some old, faithful plants that consistently produce for you. With a little prep work this spring, your garden will be ready to provide you with beauty, fragrance, and enjoyment all summer long.



CONSIDER AN ECO-LAWN

If you've been looking for ways to reduce your carbon footprint, remember your lawn. Whether you use a push or riding mower, your weekly summer mowing requires roughly a gallon of gas. Over the usual 32 weeks of summer mowing, that adds about 563 pounds of CO2 into our environment. Then there are the chemicals required to keep your lawn green and weed-free and the gallons of water for irrigation.

By converting to an eco-lawn, you can significantly reduce the water required, eliminate chemicals, and reduce your mowing to three or four times per summer. One way to do this is to replace your traditional grass lawn with nitrogen-producing clover, which doesn't require fertilizer. It's drought tolerant and can thrive and grow in full sun or partial shade. It's also pet tolerant, a nectar source for bees, and clover flowers can be dried for tea.

Talk to your local landscape expert about the suitable clover to use for your area. Then, you can seed right over your existing grass on all or part of your lawn. The best time to seed for clover is after the last frost in spring, then water daily for two weeks and wait for your beautiful, earth-loving lawn to emerge.

If you're serious about converting your lawn and have an HOA, check with them first.





Upgrading your front door is one of the simplest and most cost-effective ways to give your home an instant facelift and improve energy efficiency.

A recent study found that replacing a front door increases the home's perceived value by as much as five times the cost of the new door, which means you get a return on your investment.

If you determine that now is the time for an update, do not think only about swapping one door out for another. Also, consider enlarging the entryway by installing a door with windows to either side or above it. The added natural light adds a sense of grandeur and creates a more open atmosphere. Here are a few options to consider.







Wood Doors: Wood doors are available in an infinite variety of colors and styles with lots, a little, or no glass at all. Select a wood door for its natural beauty and traditional style, but make sure it is in a covered entryway, protected from too much exposure to the elements.

Metal (Steel) Doors: Metal (steel) doors are very affordable and extremely durable, but they cannot be stained, only painted.

Fiberglass Doors: Fiberglass – probably the most popular current choice – offers wood's beauty and versatility and metal's durability. It is least affected by weather and ensures a long-term life span and easy operation. Fiberglass doors come in many styles and can be stained or painted.

If the existing entry door on your house doesn't have any of the problems listed above, you may want to have someone refinish or update it instead.

Embellish it: If every door on your block is brown or gray, a simple coat of bright paint will make your home stand out. You could also hang a wreath, add a dramatic house number, install some long shutters on either side, or add a specialty door knocker. Even a new doormat and some planters placed on either side with beautiful foliage will elevate your entry.

Add lights: Lights at your front door will boost your curb appeal. If you already have lights, consider replacing them as an update. On a front porch, a hanging fixture will cast a welcoming pool of


light. And to add a bit of drama, spotlights at ground level aimed at the door will put your entry at center stage.

Dress up your entry with new trim: Replacing your front door trim with decorative moldings is an easy way to upgrade. In addition to wood, these are also available in PVC trims that look identical to their wooden counterparts.

Go high-tech: While the front door is not the most advanced part of your home, you should consider raising its status with a smart doorbell/video combo. Many options are available that will snap a picture anytime someone rings the doorbell and send it to your phone/computer. You can then select a video download, have a conversation with the visitor, or answer the door in person. Most systems store many images, so you can review, save, and delete them when you are ready.

Keep it tidy: Clean is impressive, which translates to curb appeal. Sweep your entry weekly, then scrub with soap and water intermittently. You will instantly bring your home's appearance back to life.

Your front door is the first thing that welcomes a passerby or visitor and sets the mood of your home. While style and budget are obvious considerations, any improvement you can make to your home's most prominent feature is worth the investment. Your front door sets the first and last impression. Make it a great one.



With spring in full swing in the Lone Star State, it's time to throw open the windows, let the fresh air and sunshine pour in, and participate in the time-honored tradition of spring cleaning. This year, go beyond the usual scrubbing, dusting, and organizing. Include a home detox to improve indoor air quality and the water you drink and address items that could pose a health and safety hazard. Here are a few suggestions to help you get started.

HVAC Filters – Most air filter manufacturers and HVAC companies recommend changing your air filter every three months. These out-of-sight, out-of-mind passive workhorses keep the air in your home cleaner by capturing pollutants and contaminants from the air that passes through them.



Be aware that not all filters are created equal. Generally, the more expensive they are, the more efficient and effective they are at trapping dust, pollen, and pet dander so it doesn't keep circulating through your house. Check the filtering grade assigned by the manufacturer before you buy replacement filters, and don't be tempted to pinch pennies here. Usually, the higher the rating, the better the filter is at trapping specific particle types.

Chimney Inspection and Cleaning – If you have a wood-burning fireplace, creosote – a dangerous byproduct from burning wood – can build up to the point that smoke and toxic gasses like carbon monoxide get trapped inside your home. Furthermore, creosote accumulation can lead to chimney fires. Chimney cleaning removes creosote, soot, and debris.

You won't have creosote build-up with a gas or propane fireplace, but you still need to have your chimney inspected and maintained. Ceramic logs can deteriorate and clog vents, bird nests, and debris may obstruct airflow in your chimney, and your fireplace should be checked to ensure there are no leaks and that it's in good working order.

Air Duct Cleaning – You'd be surprised at what can lurk in your home's air ducts. Pollen, pet dander, mold and mildew, dust mites, fungal spores, and even bacteria and viruses in your air vents can wreak havoc on your family's health and well-being. Look into air duct cleaning services that offer full source removal cleaning, which includes breaking contaminants loose from surfaces and continuously collecting them to prevent any spread during the process. Many companies also offer antimicrobial, EPA-approved products they apply to nonporous surfaces in your HVAC system to address microbial contamination and help control odors.



A global, independent organization, the NSF standards team "facilitates the development of public health standards," and its service teams "test, audit, and certify products and services." •



The Candle Debate

Do you love the scent and flickering flame of a candle burning in your home? I used to have a candle going somewhere in my house several hours a day and especially enjoyed using fresh scents. Then one day, when our HVAC tech was performing a spring check-up on our system, he walked into the room holding the HVAC filter he'd just replaced with a new one, and it was completely black.

The candle debate is controversial. Candle manufacturers claim they aren't hazardous to our health, and some believe soy candles are healthier than paraffin candles. My personal choice was to install a whole-home air purification system that actively removes many odor-causing contaminants from the indoor air. And when I occasionally want a pleasant scent in my home, like when I'm entertaining, I use essential oil blends in a cold air diffusion machine.



We live in the age of "smart" technology. We have smartphones, smart TVs, smart cars, and smart houses. By utilizing the Internet, a person can raise or lower the thermostat, turn lights on and off, talk to someone at the front door, and arm or disarm the home alarm system, all from the workplace, grocery store, or in the car heading home.

Few people know, however, that garage doors have been technologically advanced, if not "smart," for more than 100 years. According to garage door websites, inventor C.G. Johnson created the first overhead garage door in 1921 that could be manually lifted and which ran on rails. Five years later, Johnson invented the first electric garage door opener, which opened and closed garage doors by pressing a button. In 1931, the remote opener made its debut.



This history lesson won't make you feel better if you once owned a house where you had to get out of the car in the pouring rain to lift the garage door. It is also worth noting that many garages were separate buildings, modeled after carriage houses in the horse and buggy days. And back in C.G. Johnson's day, only the wealthy could afford an electrically powered overhead garage door.

Fast-forward to today when garage doors are not just an overlooked appendage to the house but very much a part of the design element and smart house technology. Websites such as OverheadDoor.com and LiftMaster. com display the updated design of garage doors, which can be opened and closed using an app on your smartphone or a key chain fob to avoid having a remote on your car's visor or programed into your car. You can search for a dealer near you on each website.

Garage doors come in wood, fiberglass, vinyl, aluminum, insulated steel, and what LiftMaster calls Thermacore, or insulated steel. There are a variety of colors to match the rest of the house's

exterior, or you can opt for a glass-paneled frameless door that is sleek and modern. Other styles include barn door and carriage house for more rustic or traditional home designs. In addition to remote entry from a phone app or key fob, a keypad can be installed outside the door so a homeowner can program it for additional security. And in the not-too-distant future, garage doors may include solar panels to help generate electricity.

Depending on what kind of door a homeowner chooses and whether it is for a single, double, or three-car garage, the cost for all the bells and whistles can exceed \$5,000. For that reason alone, garage door experts caution against making this a Do-It-Yourself project. Garage doors are heavy, and a person has to be comfortable with the electrical and mechanical components of installation. Garage doors will come with a warranty covering any damage that occurs when it is professionally installed. However, the warranty will be voided if damage is caused by a homeowner trying to install the door. Thus, the safest and "smartest" thing to do is leave it up to the professionals.

Sensing Trouble

Perhaps the most important development in garage-door technology was the infrared sensor. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, faulty design or installation of automatic overhead garage doors has resulted in brain injury or death for at least 85 children from 1974 to 1995. Children ranging from age two years to eight have been trapped under doors that failed to reverse as they were closing. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission thus mandated in 1993 that all garage doors have sensors to identify an obstruction that will keep it from closing.

Nonetheless, garage doors, like all technology, can sometimes malfunction, putting adults as well as children at risk for serious injury. It is important that parents ensure their young children do not play with garage door remotes and that the panel for opening and closing the door is mounted high enough on a wall, out of a child's reach.



As it turns out, dirt is beneficial to kids' long-term health, according to a Northwestern University article by Clare Milliken, "Germs at four, less inflammation at forty." Studies have found that early exposure to certain germs, like those found in dirt, actually helps kids' immune systems learn to regulate inflammation better. In turn, this exposure reduces kids' risk for many diseases throughout their lives.

For that reason, a family garden is a perfect opportunity to build your kids' immune systems. Better still, gardening offers lots of other benefits to kids and families.

Through gardening, kids learn to be responsible by caring for their own plants. It's also a great way to help kids learn about and develop an appreciation for science. Another health benefit is that gardening en-courages healthier eating. Not to mention, it's an excellent activity for family bonding.

So, gather up your kiddos and gardening supplies, head outdoors, and get ready for some dirt-filled fun.

GETTING STARTED

First, decide where to plant your garden. Then allow a small space for your child to have their own gar-den, too. This will help build your child's enthusiasm for the garden and encourage them to take owner-ship and responsibility for it. Having their own garden can be exciting and rewarding for kids because they know that they, alone (or with minimal help), grew those little seeds into marvelous plants.

Next, decide what to plant. For young children, consider fast-growing plants they are familiar with. Little kids also love plants that are colorful or have strong scents.

If your kids are older, let them choose what they want to grow. But keep in mind your child's personality. If he tends to be impatient, suggest plants that are easy to care for and grow quickly.

When you shop for supplies, take your kids along and let them pick out their own seeds and gardening tools. For the safety of young children, look for kids' gardening tools made of durable plastic.

PLANTING YOUR GARDEN

When you begin planting, show your child how to plant the seeds and how to space them apart correctly. Then have your child water as directed.

Put a daily gardening task list on the refrigerator to help your child take responsibility for their garden.

Also, suggest keeping a garden log to help your child maintain enthusiasm. Kids can have fun recording the date of plantings, each day's gardening activities, when each plant sprouts, the amount of growth of the plants, and the harvesting.

Finally, after harvesting, have your child help you prepare the vegetables. Try different ways of preparing or cooking them to help your kid develop a life-long love for fresh, healthy veggies.





Summer, for example, is a dangerous time for dogs, especially those that spend most of the day outdoors. They are more prone to heat stroke than humans because people sweat more readily than our furry friends, whose meager sweating is mostly through their paws. Instead, dogs try to regulate their body temperature by panting. Not leaving a dog in a yard with enough shaded areas, drinking water, or sunscreen on their nose, ears, and belly can lead to heat stroke and death. A word of warning — do not use your human sunscreen on a dog. It has ingredients such as zinc oxide that are harmful to animals. Purchase sunscreen formulated for dogs instead.

You should not leave a child or a pet in a car as they can overheat in minutes. Statistics show that the interior of a vehicle can reach 120 degrees in 10 minutes, even if you leave the window open a little.

Hydration is essential. Dogs, like people, need to drink plenty of water during the summer. Water should be cool, but not necessarily ice cold, which can cause gastric problems.

Puppies and older dogs are more at risk for heat stroke, as are dogs that are overweight, have exceedingly thick fur coats, or are bred for colder climates, such as Siberian Huskies and Malamutes. A dog with a respiratory condition or is on medication should be closely monitored and

have their time outdoors monitored during the summer. Veterinary experts say dogs with short noses (Pugs, Boxers, Bulldogs) are also at a higher risk. And resist the urge to have your dog shaved. Their fur coat is a form of insulation and protects them from sunburn.

Many dog breeds need regular exercise for their wellbeing; thus, summer poses a challenge when the asphalt and concrete heat up. So, avoid taking your dog for a walk in the late morning or afternoon.

Walk dogs in the morning and shorten their walks because heat and humidity can result in dehydration at any time of the day. Walk your dog on the grass, if possible. And invest in a set of booties even if you believe it will be a waste of time. It's worth seeing if your dog will tolerate them because asphalt will burn the pads on your dog's paws.

A pool can be a great place to cool off, but swimming is strenuous exercise, and your dog will still be exposed to the sun and heat. Limit their time in the pool, and rinse them with a hose afterward to eliminate chlorine. Also, dry your dog's ears thoroughly to avoid infections.

Despite taking all precautions, your dog may suffer from heatstroke. Symptoms include vomiting, increased panting, difficulty standing, and difficulty breathing. Try to cool down your dog with a hose and go to your veterinarian or an emergency animal clinic as soon as possible.
