Baby Boomers, Gen-Xers, and Millennials OH MY: Which Generation Are You?

Social psychologist Jean Twenge is one of the leading scholars of generational differences in America today. Her book *Generations*, the subject of her talk in Bay View on July 5, has been called a "groundbreaking, revelatory portrait of the six generations currently alive in the United States and how they connect, conflict, and compete with one another."

According to Twenge, "when you were born has a substantial influence on your behaviors, attitudes, values, and personality traits. In fact, when you were born has a larger effect on your personality and attitudes than the family who raised you does." The increasingly breakneck speed of cultural change means that growing up today is a completely different experience from growing up in the 1950s or

the 1980s—or even the 2000s.

The six generations currently active in the US today include:

- Silents (born 1925-1945)
- Baby Boomers (born 1946 1964)
- Gen X (born 1965-1979)
- Millennials (born 1980 1994)
- Gen Z (born 1995 2012)
- Polars/Alphas (born 2013 -PRESENT)

Twenge says whenever a new generation rises into dominance as adults, the effect on culture and society is immense.

Businesses, governments, churches, schools, healthcare providers, and multigenerational communities like Bay View should be aware of each generation's unique characteristics and learn to account for them.

Previous theories pointed to major events—such as The Great Depression, or 9/11—as the primary drivers of generational differences. Twenge, in contrast, argues that technological innovations are the major contributing factor. TVs, computers and smartphones are some of the latest innovations, and washing machines, automobiles and the land-based telephone helped define earlier generations.

Jean Twenge's groundbreaking research is fundamental to so much of our current national dialog, especially about kids and screens. Rob Henderson, last summer's Bridges speaker and author of the memoir *Troubled*, is a "huge, HUGE fan"

of Twenge's. Jonathan Haidt, author of the #1 NYT bestselling book



The Anxious Generation, cites her work in his book and has collaborated with her on numerous other publications.


The 21st annual Little Traverse CROP Hunger Walk is open to the public and starts from Evelyn Hall at 9 a.m. on Saturday, June 28. Please arrive early (8:30 a.m. onward) to register. By walking (or rocking on the

By walking (or rocking on the porch), you show your concern for those who struggle to secure sufficient healthy food and shelter. There is a new one-mile accessible walking/wheelchair route and a slightly modified three-mile walking route (see map).

There is no charge to walk or rock, but donations are welcomed. Ours is one of about 500 CROP Hunger Walks held each year around the United States, organized by and supporting Church World Service (CWS), a non-profit organization transforming communities around the world through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster. One quarter of the funds raised by the Little

Traverse CROP Hunger Walk (last year raised \$25,374) are returned to support local hunger-relief projects through the Harbor Springs-based Manna Food Project.

Tax-deductible donations (checks payable to CWS/CROP) may be made at registration on walk day or be given to a walker/fundraiser. Volunteers wearing CROP walk t-shirts will be signing up walker/fundraisers and collecting donations outside Hall Auditorium after this Sunday's (June 22) worship service. The new one-mile accessible route (no stairs or steep slopes) uses the curb cuts added around Bay View last fall, and the three-mile route has been modified from that used in the past so that all walk together for the first one-third mile.

Important Update on Package Delivery and Post Office Hours

Please note that the Bay View Post Office will **not be open on Saturdays this season.**

We've seen an increase in packages being delivered to Bay View, and it's important to know that some are delivered directly to cottages, while others are delivered to the Bay View Post Office. Unfortunately, there is no way to predict where a package will be delivered—either to your porch or to a P.O. Box.

Packages addressed to a cottager without an active P.O. Box at Bay View will be immediately returned to the Petoskey Post Office. From there, packages may be held for up to three days or returned to sender, depending on space and capacity.

To help ensure your deliveries are not delayed or returned, we strongly encourage you to **open a Bay View P.O. Box** if you plan to receive packages this season.

The 2025 Board of Review

In compliance with By-law 27, the Board of Assessors will host the 2025 Board of Review on Friday, June 27 at 10 a.m. for those who have questions or wish to appeal their 2025 Bear Creek market value.

Your 2025 Notice of Assessment was mailed to your winter address in late May.

If you wish to appeal your 2025 valuation, please call the Wade Administration building at (231) 347-6225 to schedule an appeal. Appeals will be scheduled in fifteen-minute increments. For those leaseholders who are not in Bay View on this date, the Board of Assessors also considers appeals in writing. You may mail your appeal to the administration office (to the attention of the Board of Assessors) or email it directly to the assessors at tax@bayviewassociation.org.

While the Board of Assessors is happy to answer tax and assessment questions throughout the year, appeals received after **June 27, 2025**, will be addressed in the following year's Board of Review.

Should you decide to appeal your 2025 assessment, the Board of Assessors urges leaseholders to bring outside evidence in support of their claims. The best evidence is a third-party market appraisal (preferably done within the last twenty-four months). Any comparables used in an appraisal should be drawn from properties in Bay View.

Another type of appeal is an equalization argument. When

making this kind of case, it is best to compare your property to two or three similar properties, as opposed to arguing you are assessed higher than most in your neighborhood. Finally, if you think the "effective age" (i.e., depreciation) of your cottage is inaccurate, you can provide photographs to document your claims.

- · 2024 Final Assessed Value (Total SEV, structure, and lot)
- · 2020-2024 Bay View Sales
- · Assessment Attributes of All Cottages in Bay View (square footage, building class, effective age, number of bathrooms, bedrooms, etc.)
- · The Neighborhoods of Bay View

After the Board of Assessors hears its appeals, it responds to petitioners via letter within 30 days.

Two final reminders. First, remember, you do not appeal your taxes, you appeal your valuation (Please email me if you need a copy of your Notice of Assessment). Your taxes are calculated using the same millage rate for everyone—and based directly on your market valuation. And second, while most cottages witnessed a 1-8% increase in market value in 2024 the actual increase in summer and winter taxes is likely to track close to the rate of inflation (3.1%).
