












# **Principal**



I have been in the teaching profession over 30 years and have taught under various governments, education departments, ideologies and different curriculums and to complicate the matter, I am a History teacher and an academic. I also believe that professionalism and professional conduct must be a teacher's guiding code of conduct at all times. Given the challenging times in which teachers now operate (our Minister of Education has acknowledged this), it has become increasingly difficult to run effective schools in this constantly changing and challenging environment. One has to just consider the rapid change in technology to understand the ever increasing pace of change. As a teacher and principal, the challenges to education and schools are immense. I believe that at Bryanston we are coping and even moving forward in preparing our students to meet the challenges of the Education Department, the global economy and an increasingly competitive world.

I have used, over the years, a number of benchmarks to guide me in assessing the progress of the school. I have made it an important part of my duty to monitor educational trends in South Africa and to follow trends in the rest of the world and to test myself and the school against these yardsticks. The previous history of the school and its outstanding traditions also help to assess the progress we are trying to make.

Academic standards are my first priority. I understand that children of each generation are different, but I also believe that academics are constantly changing upwards as science and technology drives the world forward at an ever increasingly and rapid rate. If matric results are a barometer I would suggest that the school has kept pace. Our distinction rates are as high as they ever were and we have increased the number of university passes significantly over the past few years. We have been recognised as one of the top maths schools in the country and we have consistently maintained 100% pass rate, or as close as can be, over the years. We have achieved

this in an environment where OBE has made the pursuit of raw academic excellence very difficult to achieve. I also keep an eye on how our students are performing at university because if we can teach them to survive first year university we are doing well. Generally we are succeeding although I am sometimes caught out by students who drop out and I thought they would be high achievers. I did receive a compliment from a past student who went to study in Ireland and is doing very well. On the other side I do see more and more students who have high ambitions of going to university but are not prepared to put the time and effort into studying and building their knowledge base. Modern students do not understand that hard work and lonely hours at a desk is the only way forward. As students compete for fewer and fewer places at university so the challenge to raise the standard becomes more important.

I do not believe the academic standards at the school have anything to do with the new curriculum but everything to do with students' work ethic and the quality of the teachers. I believe the Aristotle academic model stands true today as it did 2000 years ago. Academics is the search for truth and understanding of the universe and so the progress of man and woman in this world will progress at an ever increasing rate, hopefully to raise the quality of life of all and to extend their freedom to become productive human beings.

My second bench mark is the quality of teachers. At Bryanston we have a group of teachers who are superb. They are committed to teaching the relevant academic skills to succeed in the modern world and are prepared to put in the time and effort to make every student a success. Their non participation in the strike is evidence of their commitment. However, I do not believe they have all the support from the parent community. They cannot operate without full parental support. They do make mistakes in a highly stressful profession. They put up with the most disrespectful and atrocious behaviour from parents and students and yet they teach to the best of their ability and mark as accurately as possible. I am also acutely aware that teachers have their shortcomings and need to constantly improve their skills to remain relevant and effective in the classroom. We do not agree with teachers striking but the issues raised by the unions are relevant and the government needs to listen, just as governing bodies need to protect their teachers and to take cognisance of all the issues.

My third benchmark is not always considered important, but I believe that it is crucial to the future of the school and to all our students. Extra-murals are no longer a priority in many schools. If you want your son to be a rugby player, go to a private school and the same applies for all sports. In the 11 years I have been at the school and for the past 43 years of its existence we have excelled at sport and we have a target of maximum participation. We are still doing it and I thank all teachers for their contribution; I am proud we are a public school. Yet students and

parents are often reluctant to encourage participation and to support the coach to allow their children to play. The values and lessons learnt on the sportsfield, or on stage, are as important as those learnt in the classroom. We still have the same number of teams as we have had in the past. We no longer play as many schools as we used to as some of these schools have given up commitment to sport. I am sure these schools do not have the same spirit and sense of belonging as ours does. Extra-murals give our school a soul and a sense of commitment that is so lacking elsewhere these days. Yes, we did beat Fourways at rugby and we are the national cheerleading champions, but I am equally proud of all the B team swimmers and all the B teams for that matter. I get as much enjoyment out of watching the B teams as I do the First teams. They are a very important measure of our success. It is exciting that the rugby staff have got together and are organising a rugby tour to Italy in 2012. I hope we can take 40 boys on the tour.

Discipline is a fundamental issue. Society is changing and so are its values and expectations. Parents appear to be more flexible than in the past and yet they expect the School to rule with an iron fist and then object when the School makes a stand on an issue or student. Through the minefield of school safety and security our students are generally well behaved in the school environment, but I worry about what they are doing in their private lives as we hear of stories of drinking, often drugs and even unprotected sex. It is very difficult to gauge the extent of the problem, but it is worrying and yet the school is powerless to do anything. We do engage parents when we see a problem but parents are reluctant to deal with the real issues which they often cannot deal with themselves. Strong teacher leadership, based on strong values such as morality, justice and fairness, are the secret to ensuring students build lives free from violence, substance abuse and theft. One finds it difficult, however, to deal with broken and dysfunctional families and, at the same time, motivate the student to perform and behave at school.

Our facilities are a concern. We are a modern school in policy and outlook, yet our buildings are old. It is taking more and more of the budget to pay for the upkeep of the infrastructure. We do get a small allocation from the State, but it is not nearly enough to maintain and improve the vast property. The SGB has tiled all the toilets and a big computer upgrade was completed. The fields have been fertilized and we are dealing with the termite problem. We have a new gate for the pavilion area. However, the grass needs to be cut and we have to urgently invest in new mowers that can cope with the size of our fields. The palisade fence must be extended along William Nicol. We would like to pave the staff driveway at the back of the school. I would also like to paste an all weather surface on the netball courts for hockey and netball. There are many projects that need to be done if the finances are available. Each year we try to tackle some of the problems so that we can keep moving forward

to create a positive and secure educational environment for students and teachers. The Governing Body has been fantastic in raising funds and planning development of the school. In addition, we have to deal with the massive rise in the electricity and water tariff.

My final important benchmark, but there are others, is the collection of school fees. The cost of a good public education at Bryanston is fair, but it is a realistic cost, given the expenses we face every year. It is good to report that we are maintaining our levels of collection in spite of the economic downturn. The finance department are doing an amazing job in the collection of the fees. Parents are finding it tough, but the budget report tells me that we are meeting our targets. The Governing Body has also reached the target with exemptions. However, exemptions are still the biggest threat facing the future of our schools. I am happy that we are compliant with legislation and policy and are treating our parents in a sensitive manner.

One can think up many important benchmarks to test the school against, but the simple one I like is a measure of how BUSY the school is on a weekly basis. February, March, May, August and October are incredibly busy months. Generally, there are sporting fixtures every day of the week and three or four nights per week. The April holidays are used as touring months for the winter sports and July holidays are when the cheerleaders compete in the national championships. There is also winter school. I have never tallied up all the weekends that are spent away from home going to Midmar, Leadership camp, Councillors camp, Grade 8 camp etc. The school is a constant hive of activity and I encourage it and I am very grateful to the teachers for their energy and time they spend organizing and managing all these events. We are very BUSY. I also believe that busy students are successful students and are away from the horrible temptations our society has to offer. Generally, the few failures each year are those students who do not fully involve themselves in the school programme.

The education department uses the Whole School Evaluation that identifies nine areas that a school must be judged on and they are:

- \*Basic functionality of the school
- \*Leadership, management and communication
- \*Governance
- \*Quality of teaching
- \*Curriculum resourcing
- \*Learner achievement
- \*School safety, security and discipline
- \*School infrastructure
- \*Parents and the community

Using the above as an indicator, I do worry about the effectiveness of communication with parents. The SMS system did work well during the strike and we are now looking at a much improved emailing system. I do think

the newsletter is very effective and we are using our website more and more.

The safety of the school and the students is a constant concern. We have changed the security company and we have increased the number of guards, but I do worry about a robbery or a hi-jacking in and around the school. The concerns created by the strike highlighted the weaknesses of some of our systems and we are correcting them.

Curriculum resourcing is a massive issue in the country. We do receive a small allocation from the government, but all the copying facilities and computers are paid for by the parents and parents have to foot the bill for textbooks. Our second hand book shop does work well and is an important assistance in the supply and re-cycling of the text books. By 2011 there are further curriculum changes so one wonders how the Education Department are going to implement all the text book changes that go with the revised curriculum.

I am convinced we have a highly functional school and a very effective school given the environment we operate in. My fear is that we can sustain this high standard over the next few years. With the current operating systems in place, I believe we can.

I am very grateful for the governance of the Governing Body. They give their valuable time to prepare budgets, run disciplinary hearings, market the school, and improve the school facilities and countless other functions. Their commitment is invaluable and gratefully received. Mr Esteves completes his period as chairman as his daughter matriculates at the end of the year. He has served on the Body for many years and has been chairman for the last 2 years. I thank him for all his support and time and effort. Mrs Flemmer is also leaving as her daughter is also in matric. She has been fantastic in running disciplinary hearings and all the other support she has given the school over many years. Colin Hutton has acted as advisor to Mrs Peacock, the Bursar, for the past year although his son had left the school. Colin has run the finances of the school for the past eight years and has done a magnificent job ensuring the school is well run and financially viable. We will be eternally grateful to him for his unselfish commitment to the school. He even had time to volunteer his services when he did not have to. He is a friend and was a very important cog in the management of the school over many years. Everything he has done, is gratefully appreciated. Mr Hutton and Mrs Peacock made a formidable team in running the finances of the school. I am also happy to fully report that the school is fortunate to have Mrs Biggs to take over from Mr Hutton who is equally experienced and qualified to manage the finances of the school and to take us to new levels of performance.

Thank you Mrs Haefele, for assisting with collection of school fees, Mr Ferreira for managing the exemptions, Mrs Woolley for the legal support and upgrading of the tuckshop, Mrs Sfanas for the marketing projects, Mr Davidson for his constant support, Mr Maphaka for his assistance with disciplinary hearings, Mr Wood for helping with the computer upgrade and Mr Kennedy for his constant support around the school and advice in dealing with the GDE. He was also instrumental in selling advertising space around the school. Thank- you teacher members, admin. members and the RCL for making a huge and positive contribution to the governance of the school.



#### Governing Body Chairman's Farewell Speech 2010

Education in this country is a basic right, however we at Bryanston High do NOT offer a basic education, we offer a world class education, which has to be paid for. I have no doubt if I am going to be remembered at all it is for repeating this belief: "There are only two kinds of parents those who pay school fees and those who won't"!

I am honoured to have been the Chairman of the Governing at Bryanston High School. I have served on the Governing Body for five years, and as Chairman for the past three years. I have attended many school functions for all these years and have always been impressed by the achievements of pupils and staff, in particular by the confidence and loyalty of the young people who speak at prize giving, and other occasions. They show a sense of what the school has enabled them to achieve and their relationships with the staff. It is a pleasure to be part of this school. The school mission statement says it all:

Bryanston High School strives to provide quality education within a caring environment that balances the pursuit of academic excellence, and the development of essential life skills, so as to empower all of the learners to achieve their potential and meet the challenges of a dynamic society, as responsible citizens.

The inclusive nature of this school means that all pupils at Bryanston High School are enabled to develop and achieve both personally and academically.

My own background is very different to that of education, I was never a teacher, or for that matter was never in any way involved in education. It is my belief that the future lies in the youth, and the education of our children. The short-comings and mediocrity by the Department of Education which is dysfunctional to say the least, has also driven me to make a difference.

My view of what I have been appointed to do: to develop a strong and supportive governing process to enable the head and the SMT to take the school forward; to build on the strengths of the school, the strengths recognized in the last AGM and to use my expertise and experience to bring an educational focus to the work of the governors.

It is very important to build a governing body that has a wide range of skills and expertise, recently recruited new governors bring both specifically educational legal experience and professional child protection experience, creating a strong and varied team and we are very grateful for their willingness to devote their time and energy as governors.

It has been extremely difficult at times dealing with the Department of Education. They seem to think that they can force dysfunctional decisions onto the school; they

force you to take children who are residing outside of our feeder area, which creates all sorts of other problems. The department of Education only pays for approx 45% of our teaching staff, the SGB pay the balance of the teachers.

Education could be on the path to disaster. South Africa, I'm told is one of the least literate countries on the African continent, on the other hand a country such as Zimbabwe with all its challenges, poverty and political turmoil, produces far better school results than we do in this country. What happened to students and teachers, they've been replaced with learners and educators, what a load of garbage! Outcomes-based-education, Teachers' Unions and an attitude of mediocrity, that discourages excellence, has reduced the Department of Education, to the Department of putting out fires. The Department of Education should reward schools and teachers who deliver above average pass rates, and fire the lazy teachers who taint the hard working teachers who are dedicated to education.

Let us concentrate on the positive attributes of this school:

What kind of school do we have? I believe we have an exceptional school. Dave Robinson and the SMT are unreservedly dedicated to the school, and take a "nononsense" approach. I thank you again for not abandoning your posts during the strike.

The matric results at this school will speak for themselves once again, of that I have no doubt!

All of our sports teams have again proved themselves on the fields, both locally, country wide, and abroad. The hockey girls were fortunate to go on a tour of Egypt which was an experience that will never be forgotten. This tour was spearheaded by none other than Pat Deacon, who sadly passed way so suddenly, leaving us all gasping in despair. Pat was the longest serving member at this school, and in some cases she has taught some of the parents at the school. Pat made a huge impression and influenced many of her students, Pat will be always remembered for her dedication as a teacher a mentor and a shining example of what the profession is all about.....you will be missed.

The sports participation at this school on all levels is remarkable. I must make special mention of the various white blazers and academics achieved in this school.

I urge you to continue supporting the school the teachers of this school and to get involved in our activities, you can make a difference, and I once again I thank those who have indeed made a difference.


## Boys Squash


What a team! What a season!
















#### **Netball Tour 2010**
















# Cross Country



















## **Afrikaans**

Amazingly, almost 453 MILLION questions were correctly answered around the world, and Bryanston High School contributed 41209 correct answers.



## Tribute to Mrs Pat Deacon

According to American Physicist, John Archibald Wheeler, "Time is what prevents everything from happening at once."

Time is one of the most commonly used words in the English language and yet it is a force over which we have the least control.

We are saddened and devastated by the sudden and untimely passing of our beloved friend and colleague, Pat Deacon. She was always a strong, independent and generous woman, who lived her life with grace and dignity.

Pat's contribution to this school in so many teaching, sporting and administrative disciplines is well known, but it is in the discipline of hockey coaching that Pat is legendary. Bryanston's standard of hockey continues to go from strength to strength, producing many great hockey players of whom, some have gone on to playing at higher levels or become coaches and administrators at various levels.

While performing her duties as a Maths teacher and hockey coach, she still found the time to be the Chairlady of South Gauteng Girls School Hockey and Treasurer of the S.A. Schools Hockey Association. This very demanding and challenging duty was always performed effectively as we all know that Pat wanted to be successful in whatever it was that she did. Because of this she developed many friendships in every province of the country. She availed herself to select on many selection panels; attended many Inter-Provincial tournaments, chaired many South Gauteng Schools hockey meetings and attended the S.A. Schools Executive meetings. This meant giving up her own personal time on weekends and during school holidays and it was all done willingly without any form of remuneration.

Pat was a member of the U18 girls selection panel just this year in May, selecting South Gauteng U18 team, who went on to win the Inter-Provincial tournament in Potchefstroom. She drove through to watch the progress of these girls whilst preparing for her Bryanston tour to Egypt.

Bryanston High School was well known and envied for their exciting hockey tours, whether local or abroad and Pat's knowledge and wisdom of co-ordinating these tours was to be admired. If you were lucky enough to be a member of the tour group as a player or staff member, it was always in your best interest to conform, especially when it came to dressing appropriately because "Deaks" about your attire.

When entering her office, you would often find her at her table preparing a Maths lesson, computer on - completing a financial transaction or listing something for a player to receive at the annual hockey awards evening. She was good at Time Management. The hockey awards evening

were special because she took time out to remember some specific action, remark or incident that would have taken place during the season and every player would then be given an award for this. One had to have a sense of humour for these awards and she called them her hoopoo awards. One of the most common award for a player who would always go to the bathroom just before the match was about to begin. This player would be awarded the "potty". Believe me it happened every year! It was Deaks' special night and loads of fun.

Time changes many things, but it certainly did not change the manner in which she cared for her hockey players, year after year. Pat's ongoing willingness to innovate, to strive for excellence in her teaching and sporting disciplines, and her service to Bryanston, South Gauteng and South African hockey in going the extra mile, was exemplary. We must count that as one of the many blessings we have been lucky enough to have enjoyed. We have all had many precious moments that we shave shared with her and will cherish these memories.

Every two years the staff put on a production for the students called Funnagalore. Pat Deacon always played a central role in the production. As much as she was passionate about her hockey and loved her Maths teaching, her real love was musicals and being on stage. On that fateful Tuesday night of Funnagalore, Pat got a standing ovation for her rendition of 'New York, New York'. At the time I said to Mrs Webb that I was amazed at where Pat found the energy to still be a central figure in our school at the age of 69. I said goodbye to her as she got into her car - I thought she looked a little tired - but little did I know that would be the last time I saw her! It was a huge shock to the whole Bryanston community when we arrived at school on that Wednesday morning, to be told that Pat never woke up.

Pat taught for 46 years, of which 42 years was at Bryanston High School. She grew up in Cape Town and soon after qualifying as a teacher, she came to Johannesburg and joined Bryanston High in the first year of its inception. Since then, would not hesitate to let you know what she thought Bryanston High and Pat Deacon became synonymous. Her passion for hockey made her a leading figure in the country as she steered school girl hockey continuously for the rest of her life. She started as a PT teacher but volunteered to become a Maths teacher and then proceeded to teach herself to become one of the best Maths teachers in the country. I think that epitomizes the strength of character of Pat and her passion for teaching. One wonders how many

students passed through her hands over 46 years and she left her mark on everyone of them, such was the power of her influence in the classroom.


## Death Is Nothing At All
