

A Place to Study

We love to welcome students to study courses they're passionate about. We value the fresh insights and enthusiasm that our students bring, and are excited for you to join our dynamic and ambitious community.

Expert Guidance

Studying with us will allow you to share ideas, learn from and debate with some of the world's best contemporary thinkers. Tutorials offer personalised teaching and close contact with expert tutors: you'll have in-depth conversations in a small group about your ideas and opinions relating to the week's reading or problems, and will be encouraged and challenged to think in new ways.

Our tutors are committed to developing the full potential of every student in every subject, while actively engaged in their own cutting-edge research. Pembroke academics specialise in subjects as varied as the impact of civil rights movements to the use of Artificial Intelligence in healthcare.

Cross-disciplinary Focus

All our students belong to a collective academic community where cross-disciplinary links are made. We offer opportunities to attend lectures, seminars and other academic events within and beyond your area of study, and often involving high-profile speakers. Our own academics and postgraduates also share their findings at lectures and seminars in College.

We hope that having access to such a variety of talks will help you to learn about the real-world impact of your studies, and bring your subject to life.

Pembroke is also home to several research groups: the Changing Character of War Centre, the Quill Project and the Religion and Frontier Challenges Group. They often host conferences within the College, and some of our students have gone on to work in these groups after finishing their degree.

Study Skills and Other Support

The McGowin Library

Open 24/7, our onsite College library is a reliable resource for Pembroke students. Our librarian will ensure we have as much as possible from your first-year reading list, and after that we're happy to take requests for books that you need, saving you the time and expense of buying your own. Our book grants for humanities and social sciences students also offer £100 in your first year and £100 in your final year towards the cost of books.


Our friendly library staff can help you find your way around, as well as offering support with research and referencing. They run sessions throughout the year on doing research, taking notes, finding unusual books and formatting references, as well as letting students get close to and handle pieces from our rare books collections.

Alongside key textbooks and further reading for all courses, the library has an array of films in multiple languages, a reference collection, and a selection of recreational reading. Our students also have access to a wide range of specialist University libraries located nearby.

A Place to Thrive: Student Support

We want the academic and personal journey of each of our students to be successful and fulfilling, and recognise that every individual will have different needs and experiences while here.

Our Welfare and Wellbeing Team are committed to helping you access College, University and NHS resources aimed at supporting your emotional, physical and mental wellbeing. We offer a range of welfare and wellbeing support and activities, academic advice and guidance, and financial help.

We are committed to supporting students with diverse needs and from various backgrounds, including care experienced students, estranged students, and students with disabilities. We want to ensure that Pembroke is an inclusive environment for all.

We encourage you to get in touch if you are thinking about applying for Pembroke or have an offer and would like to know more about how we can support you.

Welfare and Wellbeing

Students and staff strive to create a positive, supportive environment where individuals feel valued and heard and can flourish personally and academically.

We actively support positive wellbeing within our community. Our Welfare and Wellbeing Team run events and activities aimed at helping students achieve balance and build connections. We encourage students to engage with College welfare and wellbeing support and seek to show that it is positive and normal to ask for help when needed.

Day and Night Support

One of the great things about living in College is that there's always someone to talk to, day or night.

The Porters at the Lodge (the College entrance) are available 24/7 to answer questions and help you find your way around, to contact someone who can help, or just to have a chat!

Our community is also supported by three Junior Deans. These are graduate students who live in College and are often the first point of contact for welfare concerns.

Academic Support

Our friendly Academic Office team are on hand to help make your academic journey as smooth as possible, and your tutors will be happy to help with any questions about your course. We have students who act as Subject and Academic Reps who are ready to listen and offer advice — and may well have experienced what you're going through!

Students also benefit from our two Study Skills tutors (who help with revision planning, exam technique, time management, note-taking and writing skills, and more) and our student Mentoring Scheme which pairs undergraduate students with graduate mentors.







Anyone can talk with one of a team of trained Student Peer Supporters, including the four JCR Welfare Reps. They help to voice students' views on anything related to student wellbeing and run regular events and activities for the JCR community, including the termly Welfare Week. This involves events such as charity bake sales, open mic nights, oil painting sessions, welfare dog visits, massages and more. The Welfare Reps can also reimburse prescriptions and provide free toiletries.

Pembroke Freshers are matched with College "parents" from older years, meaning you'll have someone looking out for you from Day One!

Disability Support

If you have a disability or other pre-existing condition that might affect your wellbeing and studies, we encourage you to get in touch before arriving. We'll work with you to put in place appropriate support and smooth the transition to University, and point you to College and University resources that may prove useful.

We can help you to access specialist equipment from the Disability Advisory Service, or support you in making examination arrangements with the University. We endeavour to adapt our accommodation to suit students with physical disabilities.

Financial Support

We recognise that financial matters can be a real concern for students and their families when considering university. We support students with advice and practical assistance, including offering grants, scholarships and prizes - see page 16 for more on opportunities.

First Generation Students

We encourage all pupils with academic aptitude and dedication to their studies to consider an application to Oxford and Pembroke, regardless of their background or circumstances.

First Generation applicants who are the first in their family to apply to University may appreciate particular support through the process. We aim to provide this through Open Day sessions and subsequent tailored events and support.

We work hard to ensure that successful applicants from underrepresented backgrounds have the support they need to thrive once they arrive as students.

BlackPembroke

As part of our commitment to promoting diversity and equality at Pembroke, a group called BlackPembroke works to consider and address the particular needs and experiences of Black applicants, students and staff.

The group runs and supports events in College and elsewhere with the aim of improving the experiences of Black students at Pembroke and in Oxford and widening participation in the admissions process.

Thinking Black, a social enterprise founded by a Pembroke alumna which supports Black British students to develop key academic, communication, and leadership skills.

Students with Diverse Needs

Making Pembroke home for everyone involves getting to know all our students as individuals, and responding to particular needs for support.

We are committed to supporting students with disabilities, including "hidden" disabilities, as well as estranged students and care experienced students. We will seek to support you in the best way possible, whatever your background or needs, to help you to flourish here. For more about our disability support, see page 7.

International Students

International students make up a vital part of the Pembroke community. We welcome students from all around the world and seek to create an inclusive and integrated community, as well as build support systems that will help you to thrive here.

The College community benefits socially and intellectually from our international students, who bring unique and diverse perspectives as much as to their tutorials as to College life.

Student Representatives

The JCR (Junior Common Room; the undergraduate student body) committee includes four reps who work to make the undergraduate community as inclusive as possible. Our LGBTQ+, Access and Social Backgrounds, Racial and Ethnic Minorities and Disabilities Reps support and represent students, as well as organising events to mark special days in the calendar. These include book club sessions for LGBTQ+ History Month, special Art Collection exhibitions for Black History Month and free snacks and food vouchers for festivals such as Chinese New Year and Diwali.

Our Access Reps also help to organise outreach events and support programmes like OxNet which encourage students from diverse backgrounds to apply to Oxbridge. We also hold an annual Diversity Formal, inviting inspiring Pembroke alumni to come and speak.

A Place to Live: Accommodation

Pembroke is centrally located and almost 400 years old. Over the years the site has been adapted to provide safe, accessible spaces to suit our students' diverse needs, blending the traditional with the modern. If you want a campus feel in the heart of the city, we're for you.

Central Location

Just minutes away from the city centre on foot, Pembroke is one of Oxford's most central colleges, helping you to make the most of all the city has to offer.

All first-year students live in accommodation on Pembroke's historic main site, but for subsequent years we offer the choice of living on main site (catered) or in our nearby Geoffrey Arthur Building (GAB) which is self-catered and a ten-minute walk from the main site, right by the river.

3 Years Guaranteed

Unlike many other colleges, we can guarantee accommodation for at least three years of your undergraduate degree and often students on four-year courses can be accommodated for their final year.

This allows you the freedom to stay close to friends and College life without worrying about finding accommodation yourself. You always have the option of living out if you'd prefer – it's up to you.

If you need to stay in Oxford for academic or personal reasons over the holidays we will try to make sure you have a room and you can apply for a vacation grant. We also offer longer contracts, particularly in the GAB, which suit those wanting to stay during the vacations.

First Year

All first-year students live on main site in fully furnished bedrooms. We have a range of rooms with different facilities and at different prices, from our competitively-priced standard basin rooms, to our ensuite rooms of various sizes, so you'll find one to suit your budget and preferences. If you'd like an en-suite room, you can express a preference before you arrive – we always try our best to make sure everyone is happy.

All first-year students are on catered contracts and are in residence during term time only, but if you need to stay during the vacations we will try to make arrangements (though you may have to move rooms).

We want all students to flourish at Pembroke, and we understand how important your accommodation is. We will always strive to meet individuals' requirements and to provide appropriate financial assistance where needed. If you have any queries or concerns, please get in touch with our Accommodation Team via the contact details on our website.

Subsequent Years

For later years of your course you can request to stay on main site or to move to the GAB, where you will self-cater and won't have to vacate during the Christmas or Easter breaks.

Our Accommodation Team go to great lengths to make sure you can request rooms near your friends, giving you the best of both worlds: the convenience of College living with a choice of housemates!

A Place to Live: Food & Drink

Our fantastic Catering Team provide a variety of meals and events for all members of the community, with meals cooked in-house by Pembroke's own talented chefs. Eating together is an important part of College life; an opportunity to meet new people and share ideas!

Lunch and dinner are served throughout term in our historic dining Hall, while our modern café provides a popular spot all day for brunch, snacks and an informal workspace.

What is Available?

There is always a choice of nutritious, reasonably-priced and delicious food – and probably only a few hundred metres from your room! We are a diverse College and the Team are committed to catering for every dietary need, providing daily vegetarian, vegan, halal and kosher options and displaying allergen information for all dishes. We prioritise sustainability when sourcing our food.

First year undergraduates automatically take out a standard meal plan which provides a daily token redeemable for lunch or dinner in Hall.

Undergraduates in later years who live onsite can choose between the standard meal plan or a flexible meal plan, which allows you to use tokens in Hall or in Farthings Café.

Students living offsite can still eat in College using a pay-as-you-go system.

Our Hall

As well as a venue for special events, our historic dining Hall is host to lunch and dinner every day during term for all students who want it. In the evenings there is often a choice between 'Informal' and 'Formal' sittings – the only difference being that in Formal Hall you wear a black gown. Meals in Hall are a great way to get to know other students.

Farthings Café

We're one of only a handful of colleges to have our own on-site café. Farthings is a favourite spot among students – it's a space for the whole community to relax, work or socialise, perfect for a break from the library or to grab a coffee between tutorials.

A variety of meals, snacks and drinks are available, as well as hot breakfasts, all offered at a subsidised rate. The Team enjoy sourcing new sustainable and healthy options.

The Hall Bar

The Hall Bar is regularly open to students, playing host to student events and offering a range of soft drinks and local ales – favourites include Boat Race lager and our very own Pembroke Ale.

Our bar is partnered with Chadlington brewery, a local supplier who are already at net zero emissions and produce all gluten free ales and beers.

Sustainability

We are committed to reducing our carbon footprint and our Catering Team work tirelessly to cut down our food waste.

Any waste we do produce is taken to an anaerobic digestion plant near Cassington, Oxfordshire. Here it is used to generate electricity which powers up to 4000 local homes and to make fertiliser which helps to grow local crops!

We are continually seeking to cut down on single-use plastics, already using over 1,000 fewer plastic bottles than previous years due to plumbed-in water coolers around College. Farthings Café uses plastic free tea bags, paper straws and wooden teaspoons.

The Team enjoy finding local suppliers for our food and drink. The water for our water coolers comes from Blenheim (12 miles away), and the bar stocks Pembroke Ale from Chadlington Brewery (22 miles away) – and they in turn use Oxfordshire spring water to produce their ale! We are part of the Food Buy Group which reduces the number of suppliers we use and therefore the carbon footprint of our deliveries.

Something for Everyone

When you come to Pembroke, you'll be welcomed into an active and supportive student community.

All students are members of the JCR (Junior Common Room), which is a tight-knit and inclusive undergraduate community. The JCR makes key decisions together and organises social events and welfare support.

We're home to a wide range of clubs and societies which you can get involved with alongside your academic work. From student journalism to rowing, our lively music scene to the JCR's very own art collection, there is something for everyone to enjoy and excel in. Besides having some fun, these activities can help you explore career paths and develop skills that complement your studies!

Performing Arts and Music

We have a thriving drama scene in College, with students transforming our very own Pichette Auditorium to put on high-standard musicals and operas. The outdoor garden play is a highlight of the summer term!

We have a strong reputation for music, with an active programme of public lunchtime recitals organised by the JCR. Singers can get involved with the College Choir, Master's Recitals, or Pembroke College Music Society. We also offer instrumental and singing scholarships and are part of the University's choral and organ award scheme – find out more on page 17.

Art

In 1947 Pembroke became the first Oxford College to have an art collection owned by its students. Today students continue to grow the collection and put on exhibitions in our public art gallery. As a member of the JCR, you'll have the opportunity to enjoy exhibitions, take part in our yearly art competition, or borrow items from the collection to display in your room.

Our students also manage the Art Fund, which is used to provide hardship and travel grants.

Sports

We have a huge range of sports clubs you can get involved with at Pembroke, in addition to University sports teams. Alongside our football and netball teams that have seen consistent success in Cuppers, you might choose to join College water polo, badminton, rugby, hockey, lacrosse, cross country, tennis, cricket and more! If we don't have a team that you're interested in, you can start your own with funding from the JCR Sports Reps. We pride ourselves on a friendly atmosphere that welcomes newcomers and more experienced players alike.

Our own sports ground, with various pitches, courts and a pavilion, is located just a 5-minute cycle from College. The Boat House is 10 minutes down the road, and Pembroke has two very competitive rowing crews on the river!

Opportunities & Funding

We encourage all students to enrich their studies and university experience outside of term-time teaching, and provide various opportunities to facilitate this.

Our students have completed internships in our own academics' labs in Oxford; taken part in placements and study abroad schemes around the world; won funding for self-directed thesis research to interview influencers in Nigeria and prominent historians in Singapore; and much more!

Oxford's long vacations make it even easier to engage with exciting opportunities like these outside and around your studies.

Support for internships, travel and research projects

Tutorials Plus – The Pembroke College Tutorials Plus grant provides access to funds that enrich students' learning and support activities such as subject talks or visits to subject-specific learning opportunities.

Rokos Awards – Pembroke STEM Students have the chance to take part in our Rokos Awards, which are fully-funded academic internships (including accommodation, academic and living expenses) that allow you to gain hands-on experience in a relevant area of research.

Scholarships, awards and prizes

- Scholarships and Exhibitions These generous annual awards recognise academic excellence (on the basis of performance in exams and throughout the year). As well as a financial reward—including an academic allowance—Scholars and Exhibitioners receive a Scholar's gown, a prestigious dinner to celebrate their achievements and a plaque listing in College.
- Master's Prizes These are given by the Master to recognise excellent leadership, with winners nominated by their tutors and peers from across the College community.
- Collection Prizes Awarded for performance in Collections (termly informal College exams).
- Choral Awards We offer a number of scholarships through the University's choral award scheme for those who wish to sing in the College choir.

- Generous book grants to cover the cost of buying your own copies of books

The year abroad

Our tutors will give advice on planning the year away (usually the third year of your course) and we have links with other institutions and exchange programmes that you can take part in. Our students spend this time in a wide variety of settings and clearly benefit great from these experiences, returning to their final year in College more confident in their area of study.




Philosophy is a lively subject community, with:




