A Letter from the Executive Director

When we look around San Diego in 2025, we see change everywhere – our neighborhoods, schools, families and beyond. For our second annual Voice Out exhibition, Outside The Lens invited youth artists ages 8-19 from across San Diego to contemplate "Change" and interpret what it means through their creative lens.

The changes these young people document are real and specific. Some focus their lens on environmental changes and how their surroundings are evolving for better and for worse. Others turn inward, using media arts to show how they've personally grown over the past year – new friendships, new skills, new ways of seeing themselves. Many capture their changing families – a new pet, a family gathering, a move to a different neighborhood.



I chose the title We Change and Music Too because music changes and us too. I created my artwork using Chrome Canvas and editing tools.







For this image, I wanted to show the time it takes to go through the process of metalwork and smelting scraps into a finished piece. I highlighted the natural glow of the crucible/forge to emphasize the idea of risk and heat. I also decided to use monochrome red colors to further show the idea of heat and transformation. Each figure shows a different stage of the forging process, with the figures being more transparent if they were earlier in the creation process. The final product, the copper bar, was added at the bottom to show the final product of our labor.


People flow in and out of Grand Central Station at rush hour. The people and their purpose are ever-changing, but always filling the station.




