I am deeply grateful to Dr. Onyeze for his dedicated leadership as Officer in Charge and for ensuring seamless continuity during this transition.

This newsletter highlights WHO Kenya's achievements from September–December 2025, reflecting our continued collaboration with the Government of Kenya and partners in advancing national health priorities.

Key highlights include our support to the Ministry of Health to expand sexual and reproductive health services, reaching over 4,600 women through mobile clinics in Samburu County (page 3), and the launch of a new genomic sequencing laboratory at KEMRI, strengthening disease surveillance and poliovirus detection across the region (page 9).

In November, WHO Kenya delivered medical supplies and equipment valued at US \$2.3 million to the Government during the first official visit of Dr Mohamed Janabi, WHO Regional Director for Africa (page 13). Kenya also launched its first mpox vaccination campaign, reaching over 10,700 people at high risk (page 20).

As we bid farewell to Dr Abdourahmane Diallo, we recognize his outstanding leadership and lasting contributions to public health in Kenya (page 24).

I thank all our partners and donors for your continued commitment and collaboration in improving health for all Kenyans.

Hospital on Wheels: Extending Healthcare Access in Kenya

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"Today I walked over five kilometers to reach this outreach because I wanted to make sure my baby and myself are safe," said Pascaline Kesulum.

Nine months pregnant, Pascaline is one of over 4,600 women who accessed sexual and reproductive health services in Samburu during September 2025 through mobile outreaches conducted by WHO and the Samburu County Health Department, and one of more than 22,550 women reached across six priority counties over the past two years.

Samburu has the highest rate of teenage pregnancy in Kenya, with 50% of adolescent girls aged 15-19 having been pregnant, according to the Kenya Demographic and Health Survey 2022.

"Our health facilities are spread very far apart, sometimes more than 50 kilometres from each other," explains Samson Leerte, Samburu County's reproductive health coordinator. "This distance creates major barriers to healthcare access, particularly for young mothers."

During the September week-long outreach across 10 sites, this hospital on wheels brought women access to family planning, antenatal and postnatal care, cervical and breast cancer screening, and gender-based violence support.

"I brought my daughter for a health check-up and received nutritional supplements," says Namano Lekashira. "I also accessed a cervical cancer screening. Being able to access care for both of us in one visit is very helpful."



The mobile outreach is part of WHO's broader sexual and reproductive health support to Kenya's Ministry of Health, including capacity building and policy development (next page).

For Pascaline, preparing to welcome her first child, and for Namano, caring for her daughter while protecting her own health, the mobile outreach provided access to the care they needed. By bringing services to where women live, the program addresses one of the most fundamental barriers to care: distance.

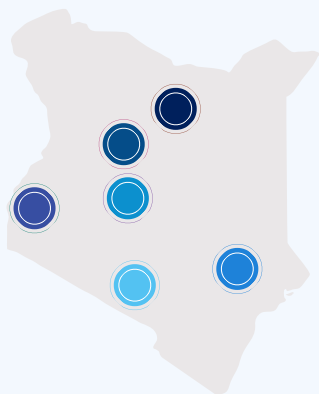

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Beyond mobile outreach services (page 3), WHO has scaled up its support to Kenya's Ministry of Health over the past two years to strengthen its **sexual and reproductive health services** through capacity building, policy development, and health systems strengthening.

The initiative has taken place **across Kenya**, with primary focus on **six priority counties**: Kajiado, Samburu, Laikipia, Siaya, Marsabit, and Tana River.

Polio Eradication Efforts Enhanced with New Genomic Sequencing Laboratory

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“Confirming polio cases more quickly enables the government to act faster when cases are detected, helping to save lives, particularly among children under five,” said Joanna Hassan, laboratory manager at KEMRI.

In 2025, the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) launched an upgraded genomic sequencing laboratory to strengthen detection of poliovirus and other infectious diseases. Supported by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Gates Foundation through the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, the new laboratory integrates genomic sequencing, molecular diagnostics, virus isolation, and expanded sample storage to reduce testing turnaround times from several weeks to less than one week.

The upgraded laboratory serves as a regional diagnostic hub, processing samples from Kenya, Somalia, Ethiopia, Uganda, Djibouti, Eritrea, and Yemen. Results are shared with national ministries of health and WHO to guide immunization activities and outbreak response.

Speaking at the launch, Cabinet Secretary for Health Aden Duale stated; “this laboratory improves our ability to detect threats early and respond based on evidence, protecting children in Kenya and neighbouring countries.”

The expanded capacity also supports surveillance for other pathogens, including measles, rubella, cholera, and yellow fever, ensuring continued public health use beyond polio eradication.

Immunisation **saves lives**

Cervical Cancer Elimination: Kenya transitions to single dose HPV vaccination schedule

"I want to be a teacher when I grow up. My mother says this vaccine will help keep me healthy so I can achieve my dreams,"

Cervical cancer is the second most common cancer among Kenyan women after breast cancer, accounting for approximately 2,300 new cases and 1,600 deaths annually. This disease is almost entirely preventable through vaccination against human papillomavirus (HPV), the virus that causes cervical cancer.

Kenya introduced HPV vaccination in 2019 using a two-dose schedule targeting 10-year-old girls. In November 2025, following WHO recommendations, the country transitioned to a single-dose schedule after global evidence confirmed that one dose provides equally effective protection against cervical cancer. This shift enables Kenya to protect more girls with existing resources while reducing costs for families.

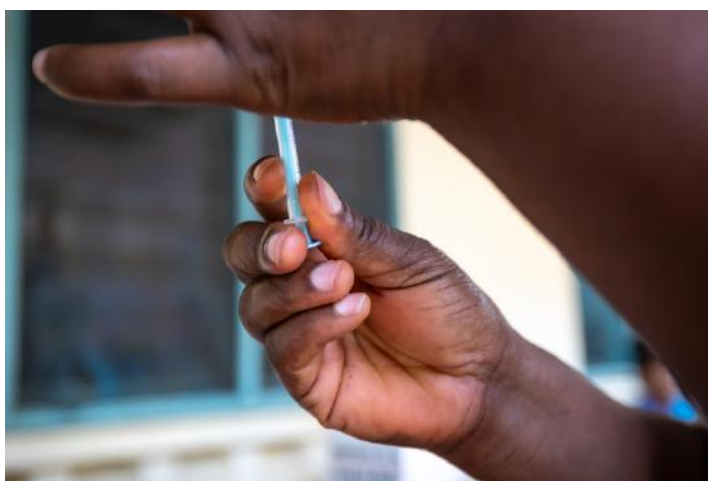
Beyond HPV, WHO also supported other immunization initiatives in November 2025, including the introduction of the second dose of Inactivated Polio Vaccine (IPV) and expansion of the malaria vaccine to additional sub-counties with a transition from RTS,S/AS01 to R21.

Kenya on Track to Eliminate Lymphatic Filariasis by 2027

Kenya is on track to eliminate lymphatic filariasis (LF) by 2027, a remarkable achievement for a disease first recorded in the country in 1910.

Over 4 million people along Kenya's coast were once at risk of this mosquito-borne disease that causes debilitating conditions like elephantiasis. That number has now fallen to just 12,000 through two decades of mass drug administration and sustained partnerships. Recent transmission surveys show disease prevalence below 1% in all areas, meeting WHO elimination criteria and positioning Kenya for validation by 2027.



Kenya's First Mpox Vaccination Campaign

Kenya completed its first mpox vaccination campaign in September 2025. The country deployed 10 700 doses of MVA-BN vaccine across three high-burden counties: Mombasa, Busia and Nakuru. In just 10 days, from 3-12 September, the campaign surpassed the national target achieving 105.2% coverage.

The campaign was led by the Ministry of Health in collaboration with county health departments, WHO and partners with a focus on populations most at risk including truck drivers, sex workers, health workers in isolation facilities.

Kenya Strengthens Medical Product Safety Standards

Kenya is working toward WHO Maturity Level 3 (ML3) standards for regulating medical products and health technologies. At a forum in Nairobi, WHO Kenya outlined a 12-18 month plan focusing on quality control systems, laboratory testing, and product tracking.

With the Health Products and Technologies Regulatory Authority Bill under Senate consideration and Rwanda and Senegal achieving ML3 in December 2024, Kenya aims to ensure its medical products are safe, trusted globally, and competitive in international markets.

Kenya Advances Health Preparedness with New Action Plan

Kenya has completed costing of its second-generation National Action Plan for Health Security (NAPHS II) following a five-day validation workshop convened by the Kenya National Public Health Institute.

Over 50 participants contributed to developing the plan, which will guide the country's preparedness and response to outbreaks from 2026 to 2030. The plan adopts a One Health, all-hazards approach, aligning health, agriculture, and environment sectors to strengthen early warning surveillance systems and implement International Health Regulations core capacities.





Webinar Series: Advancing Healthy Diet Policies in Africa

WHO concluded a four-part regional webinar series on policies to promote healthy diets, bringing together participants from Kenya, Ghana, Zimbabwe, Seychelles, Mauritius, and Cabo Verde. Led by WHO and Ministries of Health, the series enabled countries to share national policy experiences and best practices.

The final session focused on food fortification, food safety, and food system interventions to improve the availability, accessibility, and consumption of nutritious foods across the region.

Using Evidence to Strengthen Kenya's Health Workforce

From 8 to 19 September, WHO, working with Kenya's Ministry of Health, convened a two-week workshop to develop evidence-informed staffing norms for public health facilities using the Workload Indicators of Staffing Need (WISN) methodology. The initiative strengthens equitable health worker distribution, efficient deployment and governance of workforce planning.

"Evidence-based staffing norms protect everyone, patients receive better care and health workers have fair workloads," said Evelyne Chagina from WHO Kenya.

Kenya Hosts Global Trypanosomiasis Research Conference

The 37th General Conference of the International Scientific Council for Trypanosomiasis Research and Control convened in Nairobi in September, bringing together over 300 experts from across Africa and beyond.

Under the theme "Harnessing One Health Technologies & Innovations Towards Eliminating Trypanosomiasis in Africa," participants presented more than 100 scientific papers sharing new insights on combating sleeping sickness and other tsetse-transmitted diseases. The conference highlighted collaborative efforts to advance elimination strategies through innovative approaches and technologies.

Strengthening Community Trust in Health Information

WHO Kenya, the Ministry of Health, and partners convened a national workshop on Infodemic Management Action Planning in September. The workshop built on Kenya's recent health security evaluation, focusing on improving how health authorities communicate with communities during crises.

Participants worked to strengthen public trust and establish systems to counter false information that spreads during disease outbreaks. These efforts aim to enhance Kenya's preparedness and build a more resilient health system for future emergencies.





Mombasa Hosts World Patient Safety Day

Kenya marked World Patient Safety Day in Mombasa with a two-day symposium organized by the Ministry of Health, Kenya National Public Health Institute and WHO.

Presided over by KNPHI's Dr. Irungu Kamau, the event focused on "Safe care for every newborn and every child" under the slogan "Patient safety from the start!" The symposium brought together healthcare workers, policymakers, and community representatives to discuss implementing Kenya's Global Patient Safety Action Plan and strengthening infection prevention and control in healthcare facilities to reduce avoidable harm.

WHO Kenya Bids Farewell to Dr. Abdourahmane Diallo

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Webinar Series: Ebola Virus Disease Case Management

A weekly webinar series on Ebola Virus Disease was launched in October, targeting frontline health workers in high-risk counties and points of entry.

Organized by WHO Kenya, the Ministry of Health, and Kenya National Public Health Institute, the technical series aims to strengthen preparedness and readiness for Ebola and other filoviruses across Kenya. The first session focused on the approach to Ebola clinical management, covering preparedness and response pillars.

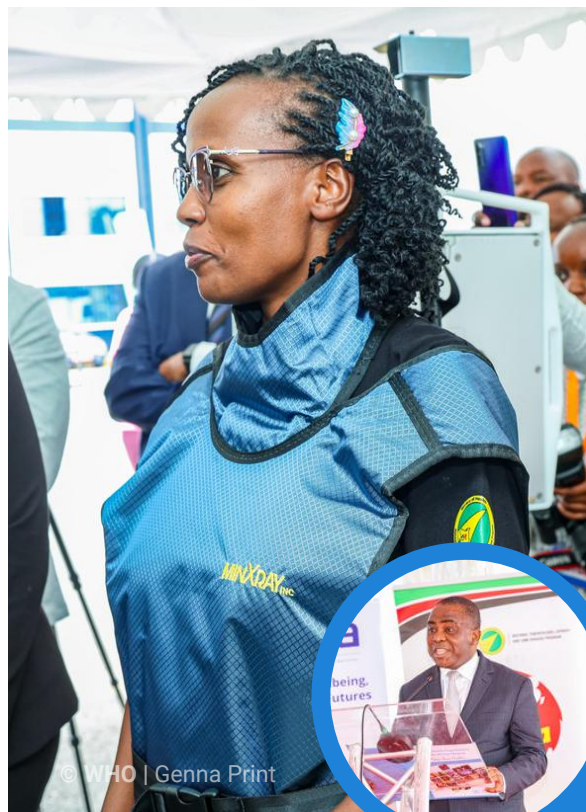
Kenya deployed 80 AI-powered portable X-rays

In October, Kenya deployed 80 AI-powered portable X-ray machines across 43 counties and launched Integrated Lung Health Guidelines to improve TB detection.

"Nearly one third of people with TB remain undetected, a gap that continues to fuel transmission and delay care," said Dr. Onyeze, WHO Kenya Officer in Charge. The initiative prioritizes underserved communities with evidence-based diagnostic standards, addressing critical delays in TB diagnosis that cost lives.

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Kenya Launches Three Landmark Health Reports

On October 28, 2024, Health Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale launched three landmark reports at Serena Hotel, Nairobi: the Quality of Care and Human Resources for Health Assessment, the Service Availability and Readiness Assessment (SARA), and the RMNCAH+N Investment Case. "Quality healthcare is a constitutional right for every Kenyan," Duale emphasized.

The reports provide critical evidence to strengthen health systems, identify gaps, guide policy reforms, and drive equitable access to quality care toward Universal Health Coverage.

Advancing Health Workforce Investment Planning

With technical leadership from WHO AFRO's Health Workforce team and the WHO Kenya Country Office, Kenya has advanced its Health Workforce Investment Plan to translate Health Labour Market Analysis evidence into sustainable financing for the health workforce.

Guided by the Africa Health Workforce Investment Charter, which Kenya was an early adopter of, the process prioritized high-impact investments, aligned workforce planning with fiscal realities, and strengthened multisectoral ownership to accelerate progress toward Universal Health Coverage.

Kenya Hosts African Medicines Regulation Conference

Kenya hosted the 7th Scientific Conference on Medical Products Regulation in Africa in Mombasa from November 11-13, 2025. The conference marked the transition to the fully operational African Medicines Agency, headquartered in Kigali.

Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale noted Africa's dependence on imports for over 90% of its medicines. Over 300 delegates, including regulators, policymakers, and manufacturers, discussed strengthening regulatory systems to unlock local manufacturing capacity and advance health sovereignty across the continent.

Kenya's Ministry of Health met with Development Partners in Health Kenya at the French Embassy in Nairobi, hosted by Ambassador Arnaud Suquet and chaired by Dr. Serawit Bruck-Landais.

The bilateral meeting reviewed Kenya's 2025/26 health priorities toward Universal Health Coverage, including sustainable financing under the Social Health Authority and digitization of services. Participants emphasized strengthening maternal and newborn health interventions, particularly scaling up Neonatal Intensive Care Units, reaffirming commitment to coordinated action for accessible, quality healthcare.
