


Your impact on polar bear conservation

Science, research, safe coexistence, global inspiration, policy, education...that's just some of the expertise we use every day at Polar Bears International to weave a brighter future for polar bears. And you, our supporters, play a vital role.

In this Annual Impact Report, we're proud to share highlights of the progress we made together on behalf of polar bears in 2024 — all thanks to your generous support and passion.

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MATERNAL DEN STUDY

We placed five remote cameras at den sites in Svalbard, Norway. What we witnessed was profound, tender moments between mothers and cubs, as well as the guiet strength of survival in harsh conditions. This footage wasn't just heartwarming; it led to a groundbreaking paper with fresh insights into polar bears' behavior. Watch our video.

GROUNDBREAKING RESEARCH

Think about the headlines you've seen about climate change. At Polar Bears International, we're not just reading them; we're rewriting the story. Your support has enabled our scientists to publish five peer-reviewed papers, including one that sounded the alarm on the future of Hudson Bay bears if we fail to meet the Paris Agreement goals. We're also uncovering genetic insights that reveal which populations are most at risk. Learn more.

FOUNDATIONAL SCIENCE

To protect polar bears, we must understand them deeply. Thanks to you, we funded six studies that explore everything from polar bear genetics to their energy use and long-term population trends. Together with partners across the Arctic, we're assembling a clearer picture of what it truly means to be a polar bear in a rapidly changing world and using that knowledge to guide conservation.

TECH INNOVATIONS

We're not afraid to think outside the box. Your generosity enabled three tech research projects this year. These include finalizing field research on the use of "Bear-dar" to detect approaching bears and working with partners to fine-tune the Al component of this radar system. We also published a paper on our "Burr on Fur" tracking tags, a valuable new tool to monitor polar bears, including two groups that so far have been unable to be tracked until now: adult males and young polar bears. NEXT GENERATION RESEARCHERS

Securing the future of conservation requires investing in the next generation of leaders. Your support helped us fund three postdoctoral researchers and mentor early-career scientists, equipping them with the tools to lead, communicate, and inspire. Whether serving as ambassadors in our interpretive centers, contributing articles to our website, or joining outreach efforts, these rising scientists are helping bring polar bear conservation to new audiences around the globe.

Today, Polar Bears International is made up of a passionate team of conservationists, scientists, and volunteers-working to secure a future for polar bears across the Arctic.



TUNDRA CONNECTIONS® **WEBCASTS**

Imagine classrooms all around the world connecting directly with our scientists. This is more than education. It's planting seeds of understanding and action in the hearts of the next generation. INTERPRETIVE CENTERS

For the second consecutive year, our **Polar** Bears International Ice House welcomed visitors to the bustling community of Longyearbyen, Svalbard, during the summer Arctic cruise season. This project builds on the success of our flagship interpretive center, which has been open for five seasons in Churchill, Manitoba, Canada—a town famous for its polar bears and a base for many of our research and outreach efforts. These interpretive spaces are more than physical places—they are where stories are shared, curiosity is sparked, and life-changing connections to the Arctic are made.

SUMMER CAMPS

Imagine kids exploring Churchill, learning about Indigenous Knowledge, making traditional Indigenous treats like fireweed lemonade and bannock, and riding on a Tundra Buggy. You made two week-long summer camps for kids possible, creating memories and fostering a love for this special landscape.

STRONG PARTNERS

Our educational partners help amplify our message and worldwide impact. Our biggest partners included Discovery Education, TakingITGlobal, Connected North, SubjectToClimate, and explore.org. Together, we developed innovative new curriculum and delivered educator training across three distinct networks, emphasizing polar bear conservation and Polar Bears International's educational materials. With your support, we are reaching learners across the globe.

ARCTIC AMBASSADOR CENTERS

We celebrated the **20th anniversary** of this network of zoo and aquarium partners across the United States, Canada, and Europe. This powerful network reaches 49 million visitors and 360 million through social media. Together, we share the story of polar bears and climate change with audiences of all ages, inspiring action for a better future.

Our website welcomed more than 666,000 visitors from nearly every country in 2024. From updated polar bear subpopulation pages to new advocacy toolkits, we are not just educating—we're building a global movement of informed, empowered advocates for climate.

CHURCHILL BEAR SMART GROUP

We continue to support Churchill in becoming the world's first Polar Bear Smart Community, building on the town's already robust efforts. Thanks to your generosity, we provided six bear-resistant waste bins, enhanced protections around the landfill, and initiated work on designing a more effective electric fence system adapted for Arctic conditions.

SAFER DETERRENTS

Your support powered the first phase of testing for various non-lethal polar bear deterrents. Our findings will help identify the safest, most effective tools for use in Arctic communities, reducing conflict and helping bears stay wild.





EARLY WARNING SYSTEMS

"Bear-dar" is ready for deployment, thanks to your support. We successfully completed the on-site testing of the bear-detecting radar with the assistance of partners at SpotterGlobal, the Assiniboine Park Zoo, and Frontiers North Adventures. This groundbreaking system will provide communities with real-time alerts about approaching bears, keeping both wildlife and people safe.

SVALBARD, NORWAY

You helped us collaborate on safety measures, distribute flares and safer deterrent options, and develop educational materials. With your support, we sent three local representatives from Svalbard to our Polar Bear Safe Community Exchange workshop in Churchill.

SOUTHERN HUDSON BAY

We partnered with four Cree communities, supporting knowledge sharing, training, and providing one new bear trap for relocations. Together, we are building respectful, community-driven solutions grounded in both science and Indigenous Knowledge.

INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION

We hosted the first-ever <u>Polar Bear Safe Community Exchange</u> in Churchill, Manitoba, bringing together residents from Manitoba, Ontario, and Svalbard. The result? A vibrant exchange of ideas and experiences on living safely with polar bears. Participants are already applying what they learned, inspiring safer practices and stronger community connections.

POLICY MEETINGS


You made it possible for us to be in the room where key decisions affecting the future of polar bears are determined. Your support allowed us to be present at two pivotal international policy spaces: the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Polar Bear Specialist Group meeting, where scientists from all five polar bear nations convened, and the International Association for Bear Research and Management conference, where we shared groundbreaking research. You also enabled us to share six accreditation badges for the U.N. Climate Talks with Indigenous and youth leaders, and sponsor a young Inuit leader's attendance, ensuring these essential voices were represented on the global stage.

EXPERT COMMENTARY

Policymakers and the media rely on our scientific expertise. Your support allowed us to provide in-depth expert commentary, grounded in the latest scientific data, on a range of topics—from implementing an international polar bear conservation plan to advocating for stronger protections in the United States and vital coexistence measures in Canada. Together, we're ensuring polar bears stay at the forefront of conservation conversations.

FOSTERING CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

We believe everyone has the power to make a difference in climate action. This year, we launched our "Take Action Center," a hub filled with tools to help people speak up, engage with policymakers, and lead change. Two new video series guide supporters in having effective conversations about climate and becoming active participants in shaping a more sustainable future. You're not just a supporter; you're part of a movement.

GLOBAL MEDIA REACH

Because of you, science-based stories about polar bears, sea ice, and climate change reached a global audience. We were featured in 3,085 media stories, including the New York Times, BBC News, National Geographic, and The Associated Press. Your support ensures polar bears stay in the headlines.

POLAR BEAR HANDBOOK FOR GUIDES

Imagine a network of Arctic guides, sharing the latest polar bear research with visitors from around the world. You helped us lay the foundation for just that. Our new Polar Bear Handbook for Arctic Guides is a vital resource for guides from Svalbard to Churchill, ensuring accurate information is shared with everyone who visits the Arctic.

CLIMATE COMMUNICATION COURSE

You helped us collaborate with NNOCCI (National Network of Ocean and Climate Change Interpretation) to create and deliver a customized seven-week climate communication course, specifically designed for informal educators living and working in Canada. Thirty-five participants gained valuable skills to discuss climate change in their communities.



VIDEOS AND PHOTOS

You helped us produce two impactful educational video series in 2024: "Talking About Climate Change" and "Get Out the Vote." Additionally, we produced a new "About Polar Bears International" video, as well as videos on the role of zoos in conservation, our peer-reviewed research, and many other educational and outreach films. We had over 165,000 video views on YouTube alone! You also helped us grow our photo library, with stunning images donated by generous wildlife photographers. Visit our YouTube channel.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Your support allowed us to reach a global audience of over 503,000 people through our social media networks in 2024. We

shared field updates, expert Q&As, conservation videos, and action toolkits. Your support powered every post, every live chat, and every meaningful digital interaction.



You helped bring our supporters even closer to the mission through two live Conservation Happy Hours for our Polar Bear Patron community, major donors, and partners. These special events provided firsthand access to the latest stories and developments in polar bear conservation.

ARCTIC INSPIRATION

Through our live **Polar Bear**, **Northern Lights**, and **Beluga Cams**, in partnership with explore.org, you brought the Arctic into living rooms around the world. In 2024, these windows into the Arctic received over 1.7 million views, inspiring people to care about this fragile ecosystem.


