

Voting is compulsory – that is, you must return your ballot paper according to the instructions given in your postal pack.

The then Deputy Mayor of Surf Coast Shire, Cr Mike Bodsworth, visited Winchelsea recently and met with the social group at Hesse Rural Health. He spoke about the work of Council, his interest in Winchelsea and the Barwon River.

He said the \$8million refurbishment of the swimming pool is on track. It has been filled and tested and there were no leaks! It will be open for summer. 300 residents took part in the consultation on the project. "We love strong community engagement", he said. An adventure playground will be built in early 2025 between the pool and the old mud hut.

Mike then posed three questions for discussion with those present:

- What kind of place would you like Winchelsea to be for future generations?
- What special things about Winchelsea would you show to visitors?
- What things do you see that needs to be done?


Respondees loved the country vibe of our town and wanted to retain that, like green spaces between new housing developments. Some expressed concern that new residents don't say hello or respond to smiles.

Question 3 got the most discussion. Hopkins St could use a footpath with more young families in the area; footpaths from the town to the football ground; allowing room in new streets (Redgum Court named) to allow for the community buses to pick up people; not enough parking in the shopping centre at peak times; need for a new school and bigger supermarket; better facilities for youth services.

And the noisy, smelly corellas!

Cr Bodsworth said the Shire has a \$40,000 grant from the State Government to look for non-lethal options to deal with these protected native birds in the town area. Horsham City Council, for example, are looking at using drones to scare them away. Don't forget to do your civic duty and vote in our Local Government election – held every four years.

A big surprise Thank You to the Men's Shed



Let's celebrate Victorian history

Victorian State Government

The State Government is supporting community groups to preserve Victoria's rich history by showcasing historical records and collections.

Applications are open for the Stater Government's Local History Grants Program.

The Local History Grants Program has been running for 23 years, recognising the importance of collecting and preserving the state's history.

Projects supported through previous grants include newspaper and photograph digitisation works, memorial websites, anniversary projects, digital histories, oral histories, archiving projects, community signage, exhibitions and walking tours.

Community groups such as historical societies, museums and schools are all encouraged to apply for grants to assist with

funding for their historical projects, with up to \$15,000 available per grant.

More than 40 organisations received a grant through last year's funding round. Deafblind Victoria was awarded \$13,465 for its interview project capturing the stories of the Deafblind community since 1988, and the Taungurung Land and Waters Council received \$13,545 to catalogue its Aboriginal heritage artefacts.

Glen Eira Historical Society was given \$8,000 to capture oral history from residents and workers around Caulfield Racecourse, and the Ethnic Community Broadcasting Association of Victoria was awarded \$14,950 to record oral histories of long-standing volunteers.


Moriac Community Network History Group celebrates 'Positive Aging Month'

Rappelling program for Victorian firefighters

This summer, Forest Fire Management Victoria's helicopter rappel program is celebrating 40 years' delivering forest firefighters to fight some of the state's most remote and inaccessible bushfires to control them before they impact communities and the environment.

Rappelling uses specialist equipment to transport firefighters from a hovering helicopter to the ground. It means fire crews can be deployed quickly to remote and mountainous locations where there may not be road access or space to land a helicopter.

This allows them to bring small fires under control quickly using 'dry firefighting' techniques to slow spread until other resources can reach the fires, or clear areas to allow helicopters to land. Dry fire techniques include using rakehoes to establish mineral earth breaks and using chainsaws to create fire breaks or improve access to other firefighting resources.



Since its establishment in 1985, more than 350 firefighters have taken part in the program. Crews are based at Heyfield and Ovens and can be deployed across the state. When they are not deployed to fires, rappel teams help deliver FFMVic's land and fire management works, including assessing and treating hazardous trees and clearing tracks.

Each year, crews undertake several weeks of training in readiness for the fire season. That training begins this month for both returning and new members across Victoria, including in Melbourne, Ovens, Heyfield and Howqua. To be eligible for the program, new members must have had firefighting experience and a good level of fitness, but abseiling experience is not required.

Training starts at the rappel tower at the Fire Equipment Development Centre at Altona, which includes a helicopter mock-up. Once students have demonstrated their competency in rappelling, they progress to a helicopter. Initial rappels take place at about 120 feet, gradually increasing to 300 feet.

The training is led by Bryan Rees, DEECA senior aviation operations officer, who has been a part of the rappel program since its start.

Can you be 'June Friendly'?

About Fronto-Temporal Dementia

Hesse Rural Health cares for many consumers with dementia, either living at home or in one of the three wings of our residential aged care facility: Chelsea Lodge, Hesse Lodge and the Werruna memory support unit. Dementia is a broad term used to describe the symptoms of a large group of illnesses that affect the brain and cause a progressive decline in a person's functioning.

Dementia symptoms include memory loss, confusion, and personality and behavioural changes. These symptoms interfere with the person's social and working life. There are many different types of dementia including Alzheimers disease, Vascular dementia, Lewy body disease and Frontotemporal Dementia.

Our staff work closely with the resident and their families to ensure person-centred care is delivered and their needs and preferences are met. People with dementia can sometimes exhibit mood and behavioural changes that are challenging. Caring for residents with dementia includes developing a comprehensive care plan which includes interventions to manage challenging behaviours, reduce stress and anxiety, and meet any unmet needs.

The fundamental rights of people with dementia are recognised and protected. The goal for managing symptoms of dementia is to always maximise quality of life and safety within the least restrictive environment for each individual. As members of our community, our aged care residents are able to leave our facility and participate in local activities of their own choice and interest, unless their capability is considered a risk and consent is provided otherwise.

Hesse is aware of recent issues regarding one of our residents "June" accessing recyclable bottles and cans. We do apologise for any inconvenience caused and would like to work with the community to reduce the incidence of this occurring and also support June to live her best life. Hesse takes the responsibility of confidentiality very seriously and we are sharing this information about one of our residents with the consent of June and her family.

June was admitted to Hesse in February 2021. June grew up in Winchelsea and has family in the area. June is very knowledgeable about the history of Winchelsea and knows members of the community. June has a diagnosis of Behavioural Variant Fronto-temporal Dementia.

In Fronto-temporal Dementia, there is progressive damage to the frontal and/or temporal lobes of the brain affecting personality and behaviour. These parts of the brain are also involved with mood, attention, judgement, planning and self-control.

Common symptoms can include fixed mood and behaviour, appearing selfish and difficulty reasoning with the person. There may be loss of empathy, emotional warmth and emotional responses. There may be disinhibition, talking to strangers or exhibiting embarrassing behaviour. Distractibility, impulsiveness and lack of insight are also signs.

June may appear rude and abrupt, it's important to recognize it's the illness "talking" and accept rather than challenge her. Arguing or reasoning with the person with this type of Dementia will not help; they cannot control their



behaviours or even see that they are unusual or upsetting to others.

June does not experience the typical memory loss associated with most Dementia syndromes but has trouble controlling behaviours and demonstrates loss of empathy with others. She can become pre-occupied with a hobby such as colour by numbers, painting, jewellery making and more recently, collecting recyclable bottles and cans. As a passion of June's, this hobby has been supported by Hesse and also with the advice from Dementia Australia. Through the recycling program, June raises spending money and this creates a sense of independence. June's safety is very important and she wears a navigation watch where we can see where she is located and staff can also contact her to check on her welfare.

Management meets regularly with June and her family to negotiate the rules around this hobby to keep her safe and minimise disruption to the community. Unfortunately, one of the symptoms of her condition is to disobey rules and ignore the guidelines. Hesse does not support June accessing bins by trespassing on property and we have had discussions with Police and Council to clearly outline inappropriate behaviour. We will continue to discourage June from accessing private bins, especially where they are on private property, and should trespassing occur the community are encouraged to contact the Police.

Community members who are willing to support June with her recycling program can choose to identify their bins by adding a "June friendly" sticker to their bin. These are available at Reception at Hesse. Displaying this sticker provides consent to June for access to the bin only when they are on the nature strip, and not on private property. June has decided to donate some of the money raised to two local charities: The Winchelsea Historical Society and the Winchelsea Girl Guides.

Gnarwarre Bridge fears

To the Editor

The Pollocksford Bridge in Gnarwarre was closed some six months ago, meaning that people can no longer drive along Pollocksford Road from the Hamilton Highway to Barrabool Road.

The closure took place due to safety concerns. Engineers were engaged to examine the state of the bridge and how to best repair it. The residents haven't had any update in months on the timeline on repairs to the bridge, if they are, indeed, going to happen. Councillors and staff remain silent on this matter.

The surface of the bridge had deteriorated to the point of some metal struts being visible. The Council has sprayed the broken bitumen on the bridge as a warning to bike riders who can still cross the bridge. School students have to walk across the bridge to access the school bus to Geelong, but the bridge's state is very hazardous and is an accident in the making. Let's hope it doesn't deteriorate to the point of not being able to be repaired.

Another of the concerns is that if Gnarwarre residents need an ambulance (the nearest station is in Bannockburn), the ambulance has to head back towards Geelong and then cut across country to Gnarwarre. This extra time could be vital in an emergency.

As we approach fire season, which is predicted to be a dangerous one in our region, we are very aware and concerned that access for emergency vehicles is impeded by the closure of the bridge. One of the two escape routes from a Gnarwarre fire - the Hamilton Highwaycan no longer be reached directly, but rather via Ceres. If the fire is in the Barra boo I Road area, then that route may also be out. Would residents have to drive to the closed bridge, walk themselves, their family members, pets and belongings across the bridge and hope someone is on the other side of the bridge to transport them out of danger?

Gnarwarre residents who used to shop in Bannockburn or use that town's services (as it's the largest nearby town) think twice about the extra 20 minutes to travel there, making the choice to go into Geelong rather than visiting the regional town more likely. That's a loss to Bannockburn.

Whilst the closure of the bridge has made for a quieter, less littered road, the fact of the matter is that Pollocksford Road, a road that was well-used by residents and other travellers, has been cut in two and the bridge allowed to fall into further disrepair. It would seem that this important piece of infrastructure has been forgotten.

We would appreciate some focus on this local issue from the Winchelsea Star.




Edmund was a very public minded man who gave freely of his time and money to many public bodies and his church.

He is remembered mainly for his untiring devotion to football, and the Winchelsea football club of which his 52 years service to it as a player, committee man, and president for 24 years, until his death in 1941 at the age of 72 years.

He was born at Winchelsea on 18/10/1868 the third child of Thomas and Mary Hole (née Gladman). There were 12 children in the family.

His father worked for Mr Austin at Barwon Park as head groom. Thomas lived and raised his family in a stone cottage near the river in Barkley Street.

Edmund and Cathrine (née Loughlan) lived in a shingle roofed cottage on the banks of the Barwon River in Armytage Street and later built a house on the corner of Armytage and Hesse Street.



New financial scheme to make it easier for victims of crime

Victorian State Government

The State Government is better supporting victims of crime – making it easier to access financial assistance and have their trauma recognised outside of court through the new online Financial Assistance Scheme (FAS).

Minister for Victim Support Enver Erdogan joined FAS Chief Executive Officer Marnie Williams to announce the new scheme will commence on 18 November

For the first time, the new online scheme can be accessed in the privacy of your own home and will replace the courts-based Victims of Crime Assistance Tribunal (VOCAT) – helping to minimise further trauma for victims, as they no longer having to attend court or face perpetrators.

Victims of crime will now be able to receive up to \$60,000, with some eligible for up to an additional \$25,000 in certain circumstances.

Victims of crime will also be able to choose to receive a recognition statement from the state – acknowledging the effects of the crime and expressing condolences.

Application timeframes have also been extended from two years to three years, or for sexual offences or family violence cases to 10 years – giving victims more time to assess their needs.

Until the new scheme opens, victims can continue to make applications for financial assistance and queries through VOCAT. Further information on the new scheme can be found at victimsofcrime.vic.gov.au. More Funding Needed to Keep Community Health Healthy.'

Community health reaches over 608,000 Victorians amid growing demand

Community Health First

Community Health First, Victoria's 24 registered independent community health services, has just launched the 2023-24 Impact Report on the state of the sector. The report shows skyrocketing demand for health services in Victoria, with community health organisations expanding by more than 20% in two years, now serving over 608,000 Victorians each year and reaching 87% of regional and rural Victoria.

The report highlights the pivotal role of community health in tackling pressing community challenges, including rising rates of chronic disease, mental health issues and social isolation. 91.2% of clients agreed that support from community health service keeps them healthy and well, and 84.9% said that community health makes it easier for them to access the support they need.

Innovative collaborations are being developed to address health and wellbeing challenges. Organisations have expanded free dental services for public school children, helped regional communities recover following floods and fires, developed culturally appropriate services to address women's pain in multicultural communities, and provided specialised services for kids with development delays.

Community health has also been a key partner in rolling out Urgent Care Centres, with 92% of patients rating the quality of care as good or very good, and community health led centres are reducing demand on hospitals and ambulance services.

More investment is needed to ensure affordable and accessible healthcare remains available.

Victorian trailblazing women inducted into the Honour Roll of Women

An internationally renowned folk musician turned Federal Court judge, a professor transforming the understanding of genetic diseases and a broadcasting trailblazer are among the 21 women inducted into the 2024 Victorian Honour Roll of Women, supported by the State Government.

Minister for Women Natalie Hutchins congratulated the 21 new inductees at a ceremony at the Arts Centre Melbourne. The Victorian Honour Roll of Women recognises the achievements and contributions of some of Victoria's most remarkable women of all ages, experiences, background and fields.

Retired Federal Court judge Judy Small is being recognised for her contribution to the arts, as an outstanding singer songwriter in the traditionally male-populated field of folk music, writing about social justice, equality, feminism, peace and LGBTIQA+ lives – her songs are for and about women.

Women making waves in healthcare are well represented among the 2024 inductees.

Professor Jane Gunn is honoured for her transformative impact on women's health, alongside Associate Professor Kudzai Kanhutu who established a first-of-its kind telehealth service breaking down barriers for rural and culturally and linguistically diverse Victorians to access healthcare.

Libbi Gorr, a trailblazer in the arts and

in media, has been recognised for her work across television, radio, journalism, teaching and live performance – and her efforts in forging a path for women in the arts and broadcast mediums.

Community heroes have been recognised for their championing of their local communities, including Lyndie Freestone, who is renowned in Geelong for her work with high risk and homeless young people, and Dalal Smiley, who works tirelessly to support women of migrant and refugee backgrounds in Melbourne's south-east.

Councillor and former Maribyrnong mayor Sarah Carter, who passed away earlier this year, is also among the new inductees. She was the first woman to serve as mayor of Maribyrnong three times.

Since 2001 more than 750 women from across the state have been inducted into the Honour Roll for their contributions to fields including science, art, environment, law, social justice, research, health, media and education.

By celebrating women's achievements and recognising their contributions, the Labor Government is playing a vital role in increasing the representation of women in the public eye and building towards a more gender equal society.

The late Hon Joan Kirner AC, Victoria's first female Premier, created the Honour Roll to formally acknowledge women for their achievements and to encourage others to follow in their footsteps.

Rejection of drug a blow for Australians living with Alzheimer's disease

Dementia Australia

Dementia Australia is disappointed by the initial decision of the Therapeutic Goods Administration to reject Lecanemab for use in Australia. Lecanemab is a disease modifying treatment for people living with the early stages of Alzheimer's disease or mild cognitive impairment.

Lecanemab works by removing amyloid plaques from the brain and slows cognitive decline associated with the disease. It is currently approved for use in the UK, USA, Japan, China, South Korea, Hong Kong, United Arab Emirates and Israel.

Dementia Australia CEO Professor Tanya Buchanan said the decision would deprive Australians of the choice to access the potential benefits of the new treatment. "Lecanemab is not a cure and is not for all people with a diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease. Like many medicines it also comes with significant risks. It is however, an historic first step towards reducing the huge impact of Alzheimer's disease and for people living with the condition it signified hope.

"While this is a disappointment, we are encouraged by the investment in research from prevention through to treatment of dementia. There are currently more than 100 clinical trials of medicines to manage dementia happening globally.







Victoria's peak body for community housing is urging residents voting in this month's council elections to back candidates who support building more affordable housing in their communities. Community Housing Industry Association Victoria encourages residents to vote for candidates who:

Champion social housing and are willing to confront community opposition to new social and affordable housing initiatives

Will discount or waive council rates for community housing which costs the sector an estimated \$20-25 million every year across the state.

Support community housing organisations to build homes on surplus council land at peppercorn rent.


