



Bryanston High and one of the highest in the country. All teachers have completed training for the new curriculum and we have made two presentations to parents. There are a few uncertainties - one being the nature and content of the final matric exam, and the other the reaction tertiary institutions will have and how this will affect admissions to these institutions. I am convinced that Bryanston students will be top achievers in the new system and will be considered by these institutions to have been well taught at their school.

Whatever curriculum the education department and the politicians impose on the school I am convinced the future success of the school depends on our ability to implement the "hidden" curriculum, most of which is based on the traditions and ethos of the school. An example is simple courtesy to greet everyone from teachers to visitors. It creates a sense of community and belonging and it shows respect. Invariably a greeting is accompanied by a smile and will receive a positive response. It is amazing how this creates a positive atmosphere in the school.

Another example of the "hidden" curriculum is the importance of commitment. No family or organization can function successfully without commitment. We all have a responsibility to do what we have promised to do - from homework to attending a rugby match on a Saturday, you must be on time and be ready to perform. Too often students do not turn up for a match or a function when they have promised to do so and have given the understanding that they will. The school, teachers and the other team members are embarrassed and it makes a poor impression on the opposition. Would this lack of commitment happen when the individual has a commitment to the family or a partner or friend? Our lives are dominated by meeting commitments and this is the very building block of our integrity and success in all we try to achieve.

I would include sportsmanship, spiritual growth, emotional growth, a healthy life style and leadership skills as just a few examples of other values we constantly strive to instil in our students. Simple manners is also an important example It gives the school a soul, a heart and a purpose.

The challenge of maintaining Bryanston as a top school in Johannesburg is becoming more and more challenging. Costs are rising and the support from the government is dwindling. The school depends on the payment of school fees. If parents want to have smaller classes, a high standard of teaching, quality facilities, a safe environment, computer-centred education and a wide extra-mural



programme, they are accountable financially. School fees are increasing to achieve these demands and parents must please support the Governing Body's efforts to collect the money and support Bryanston High's focus of being achievement-orientated. There are ways within educational legislation for parents to gain a reduction in the payment of fees and if parents choose that road they must be very aware of the negative consequences for the long term wellbeing of the school. As the School Governing Body always says - "we will support the parents who legitimately can't pay, but we will prosecute those parents who deliberately will not pay".

The success of the collection of school fees has a direct impact on the quality of teachers employed at the school. We live in times of a growing teacher shortage and the

I believe that most schools in the Johannesburg What would region did find it difficult to get a quorum. possibly be a better system would be if parents were allowed to vote over a whole day when it is convenient to them and not the current system where voters have to be in the hall at a designated time. I am sure we would then have had well over a 60% turn-out of voters.

Having said the above, we have an able, and skilled elected Governing Body. We say thank you to Mr Moskowitz, Mr Squier and Mr Martin for their hard work over the years. We welcome Mr Kapito, Mr Bell, Mrs Flemmer, Mr Davidson and Mr Esteves onto the newly elected body. I believe the members of our governing body are highly skilled and very able to run all the affairs of the school within the framework of the law and yet maintain the quality of education we are striving to achieve.

The issues facing the governing body are huge. The GDE and the National Department of Education are still challenging the right of governing bodies to supplement the salaries of teachers. Much progress has been made. We are however, still concerned about our ability to retain and attract good teachers in an environment of growing teacher shortages. Our participation in the Governing Body Foundation has been successful and has given governing bodies the leverage to negotiate issues with the Department of Education.

Changes in legislation concerning the appointment of teachers and school fee exemption criteria have also become contentious issues. The Department of Education has the right now to change the appointment of teachers recommended by the Governing Body. The change in exemption criteria is going to add to the financial burden of all schools.

We have spent a considerable sum of money in maintaining the facilities at the school. The school is a government asset and we believe that they should be more supportive in maintaining the grounds and the buildings. The governing body however is paying for the painting, the renovations and upgrading of all our facilities. The big concern we had through 2006 was our rapidly growing water bill and it took extensive research to find the leak. We are grateful to the municipality for not charging the full amount for the wastage of water. All leaks have now been repaired.

Safety and security of our students and staff is a worrying issue. The fence has been a fundamental improvement to our safety at the school. We have also installed thirteen CCTV close circuit surveillance cameras to monitor certain areas of the school and these have already been used as evidence in cases against students. We intend upgrading them even more in 2007.

On behalf of the Governing Body, I would like to extend my sincerest thanks to the staff of Bryanston High School, ably led by Mr Robinson. They work extremely hard, often under challenging circumstances, to achieve outstanding results. The matric results over the past few years are testimony to the high quality of education at Bryanston High. I would also like to thank parents for their support and encourage them to pay school fees in order to assist us in maintaining these high standards.

Lastly, I would like to thank the governing body members for their, dedication, commitment and support during the previous term of office we look forward to a successful term of office over the next couple of years.

unrealistic demands on the profession means that fewer and fewer teachers are making teaching a career. Brvanston High also faces the constant risk of losing teachers to private schools. This is the case in 2006 and will continue to be the case as we develop new teachers who are then offered other jobs because Bryanston High has a reputation of good in-service teacher development, and is a good school. There are also teachers who are moving overseas to earn better salaries. To employ additional teachers and to supplement the salaries of GDE appointed staff, is becoming more and more expensive. In addition, if students and parents do not co-operate with teachers, they will leave and go to schools where their expertise is appreciated. In other words, the success of Bryanston is in the hands of all students and their families, to support the school and not to see the school as the enemy and an unfortunate sacrifice. We offer life skills that are



fundamental to the success of all our students in the future.

We are proud of our achievements this year. Bryanston was rated as one of the top matric performers in Gauteng. Our sports teams excelled in all disciplines and levels of participation were excellent. Numbers participating in the Olympiads and Eisteddfods have grown. Leadership programmes are baring fruit in all levels of the school. We are constantly upgrading the facilities and the fence and security cameras have helped our security. The planning for the two overseas tours next year is going very well and they are tremendous advertisements for the success of the school. Our computer facilities are the best available. I believe that the management of the school is in good hands, and strategies will keep Bryanston at the forefront of education in the country. Governing Body elections were held this year. I would like to thank Mr Martin, Mr Squier and Mr Moskowitz for their many hours of hard work We welcome Mr Kapito, Mr Esteves, Mr Bell, Mr Davidson and Mrs Flemmer to the SGB. We thank Mr Azzie for his wonderful leadership of the school as he has been elected for a third term as Chairman and he has been superbly supported by Mr Brown. The financial success of the school is due to the leadership and the meticulous accounting of Mr Hutton, our Treasurer.

Our admin team are a special group of ladies. It is a happy and productive experience to work with them under the leadership of Mrs De Villiers and Mrs Peacock. There is always a smiling face and willingness to help a teacher, student or parent.

The ground staff, managed by Mr Wessels, is very hardworking. Our men built the fence. They are always willing to a do job, even at very late notice. They are supportive and cooperative of the educational process at the school, for which I am very grateful.

The spirit in the staffroom has always been happy, supportive and very professional. All teachers deserve a long Christmas break because the challenges in 2007 are going to be awesome.

The School Management Team, Mrs Webb, Mr Skelton, Mrs Weir, Mrs Deacon, Mr Crighton, Mrs Fulcher, Mrs Armstrong, Mrs Schumann, Mr Lawrence and Ms Standl have been superb in directing the various strategies and policies of the school. I would also like to give recognition to the Grade Controllers. They are at the "coal face" of school management dealing with problems of discipline, student personal problems and a whole range of academic issues. Theirs is a stressful, but vital job in the running of the school. I would particularly like to thank Mrs Winson and Mr Gillespie on doing a fine job with the matrics.


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Mission: world of Art Tour
