# HEADMASTER'S REVIEW 

## You never see the old austerity

That was the essence of civility;
Young people hereabouts, unbridled, now Just want.
Moliére (1622-1673)
Over three hundred years later, Moliére, the French dramatist's, observation about the youth of his era has a present relevance. The Youth in its expression of the innate adolescent thrust for independence has historically, age succeeding age, attracted the criticism of its exasperated elders. A natural social phenomenon.

Once the phenomenon is accepted as natural and inevitable, one is tempted to accept it as such. A stoical acceptance that adolescents can be difficult and demanding and thus allow them to be unbridled would be a major mistake on behalf of parents and educators in the present South African context. Amidst the turmoil of change a bewildered Youth need the security of clear adult control and direction more than at any time in the twentyeight years I have been in education.

Jean Coclèau stated that, 'The joy of the young is to disobey - but the trouble is that there are no longer any orders'. Herein lies the greatest threat to the standards of education we have come to cherish. The necessary and commendable focus on human rights, including children's rights, has at this incipient stage of our new society created an illusion amongst pupils that they can virtually do as they want without real consequences. Disciplinary measures, available to assist teachers in ensuring that those pupils who wish to learn (the majority at this stage) can do so in an orderly environment, have been restricted by legislation. Pupils, denied an adult perspective by their lack of worldly experience, cannot grasp the real consequence of their being granted virtual freedom to do what they want - a rapid deterioration of our schools to the level of American inner city schools or some of the British comprehensives.

One may be forgiven for believing that I am presenting a prophecy of educational doom for South Africa and Bryanston High. Actually I am not. I seek rather to focus attention on what I see as a major challenge for educationalists, parents and pupils. My thinking is inspired by an exhortation by Ben Lidsay: 'I do beseech you to direct your efforts more to preparing youth for the path and less to preparing the path for the youth'.

My belief is that we must accept that in the context of national education inequality, injustice and abuse of pupils existed and continues to exist. Measures must be taken to address these defects. Such measures will have ramifications for the entire educational system. At schools such as Bryanston, historically privileged and secure in their high standards, pupils need to be made aware that greater freedom is accompanied by an attendant responsibility to act wisely and with self-restraint. That a deterioration in attitude, conduct or work ethic will seriously diminish the equality of education and school life. That much of what they take for granted is fragile and must be treated with care and respect. That few of the millions of their peers have similar advantages.

Parents need, perhaps, to take time to reflect on their own lives and careers. A common error of parents is to strive to give their children the things that they never had in their youth without stopping to consider the value of what they did have for their children - the values, the work ethic, the sense of achievement in earning something rather than being given it. Bryanston High serves a successful, innovative, hard-working community. The adult community can assist its children to prepare themselves for the path to a meaningful, productive life in the new South African by nurturing in them the attitudes and life skills which brought their parents to our community. What is needed in this time of change is a reaffirmation of what traditionally has proved beneficial - the solid values of home and school rather than the
single-minded pursuit of pleasure that preoccupies so many of today's youth.

1996 has been a turbulent year in education. Despite the anxieties of transformation which have shaken the confidence of the general public in the future of education, Bryanston High has had a remarkable year as evidenced by the contents of this magazine. A pragmatic approach has enabled the school to make the adjustments to transformation calmly, without disturbing the routine and focus of our activities. Indeed the school goes from strength to strength, its solidity recognized by an increasing enrolment. The current flight to private education has had no impact on the school which can only be regarded as a gratifying vote of confidence in our ability to sustain our standards.

I wish to record my gratitude to my staff for their unflagging support in what has been the most stressful year for me since I assumed the headmaster's post. While I have grappled with the tasks and crises of the new educational dispensation, the staff have devoted themselves to their daily responsibilities with enthusiasm and dedication. Their positive approach is deeply appreciated in a time when the teaching profession is disillusioned and unsettled. Far from slumping into apathy, they have inspired the pupils to new heights of achievement and have been uncompromising in their desire to enhance the standing of Bryanston High. I am particularly blessed with the calibre of my executive. Few outside the inner circles of the school will be able to comprehend the invaluable services performed on a daily basis by Mr Visser, Mr Cuthbertson, Mrs Webb and Mrs Weir. Without their sheer professional competence to assist me I would have been submerged.

The school and I also have had the benefit of the sage advice and constant support of Jacques Sellschop and his Governing Body in a period of sensitive issues. They, too, have been crucial in ensuring stability and a sense of perspective amidst confusion. Their dedication to the welfare of the school is sincerely valued. Steve Waddell and his merry band of P.A. members have worked hard throughout the year in organising a series of successful fund-raising events in which the primary aim was to get parents involved in the school. Working with them is a real pleasure, their enthusiasm is so uplifting. Thank you all. And let us not neglect to thank the ladies of that Bryanston institution, the Mothers Committee. Jenny Barrow and her Committee have been indefatigible in catering for the ceaseless activities at the school. Theirs is virtually a full-time job and the high standards they maintain are part of the Bryanston legend. So, too, are our thanks due to the tuckshop mothers in providing an essential service for all our pupils.

While I wish to record my gratitude to my colleagues on the Governing Body for contributing so selflessly of their time and professional expertise to the common good, I would also, on their behalf, thank the Parents Association, under the leadership of Steve Waddell, for their outstanding contributions to our school throughout the year.

Let us approach 1997 in the spirit of Carpe Diem, despite the fact that the future simply isn't what it used to be.

## ENGLISH ENRICHMENT

The English Department offers extensive extra-curricular assistance to pupils of Bryanston High School. There are staff on duty each afternoon to supervise the Reading Laboratory which caters for both the weaker and the top pupils who wish to improve their performance levels. The Reading Laboratory develops the pupils' reading ability and speed, while testing and correcting possible grammar weaknesses. The pupils work at their own levels and at their own pace, thus striving to improve their own results, rather than being in a competitive peer-pressure environment. In many cases pupils have improved their results in class by $10 \%$ or more. In addition, there is a remedial programme organised by trained remedial teachers.

The influence of this single product of someone's imagination now benefits almost every country in the world, pouring out a continuous stream of gold to all who touch it.

Whoever you are, wherever you may live, whatever your interest, just remember in the future, every time you see the words CocaCola, that its vast empire of wealth and influence grew out of a single idea, born in the imagination of one man.

Stop and think of that, for just a moment.
An idea you may create in your imagination, has the potential of duplicating the record of this world-wide thirst-quencher and of living on long after you have departed this world!

Ladies and Gentlemen,
my speech today is entitled, "Imagination is Everything", and I hope to persuade you that every success in life, whether temporal or spiritual, first needs imagination before it can become reality.

Imagination is the creation of ideas, and ideas are intangible forces which posses more power than the physical brains which gave them birth. Imagination is the workshop of the mind, wherein was first fashioned all that is on Earth created by man.

It has been said that "That which man can conceive and believe, he can achieve." We read in Mark 9:23 "If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Indeed, nothing has been achieved in history, no wars have been won, no bridges
built, and no inventions manufactured, before they were first conceived and believed in the imagination of man.

Through the aid of their imaginative faculty, mankind have discovered and harnessed more of natures forces during our parents' lifetimes, than during the entire history of the human race to date. Man has conquered the air so completely that the birds are a poor match for his flying abilities.

He has increased the speed of locomotion on land to fifty times that of the fastest of nature's creatures. He has learned to communicate instantly and with greater clarity than the fish eagle's penetrating cry or the lion's thunderous roar across tens of thousand of miles of land, sea and space. And yet, the only thing that distinguishes man from the rest of the animal kingdom is his faculty of imagination. Everything else that a man has, can be found in a pig. - as most woman would testify.

Through the faculty of creative imagination, Ladies and gentlemen, the finite mind of man, has direct communication with infinite intelligence. It is this faculty through which inspiration is received and mighty nations built.

The great statesmen and leaders of business, the great artists, musicians and poets, became great because they developed their faculty of creative imagination. This faculty becomes more alert with use, just as any muscle or organ of the body develops through exercise. The famed Roman Emperor, Marcus Aurelius said: "A Man's life is what his thoughts make it."

If one's imagination has become weak through inaction, it can be revived and made alert again through regular use, and then ideas can be transformed into tangible realities through the application of plans. Again, these plans must first be formed and re-formed with the aid of imagination. Implementing them is what leads to the astonishing realities of life

Millions of people go through life hoping for lucky breaks. But the safest plan is not to depend on luck. It is better to depend on imagination and the power that we all have within us, to turn imagination into reality through plans, persistence and determination.

Yes, Ladies and Gentlemen, the ideas of the imagination may at first be intangible forces but they have more power than all of the armies of the world put together, and for better or for worse they have the power to live on, long after the brain that created them, has returned to dust.

I end now with the Anonymous authors poem entitled :-

## An Imaginative Life

I saw them tearing a building down,
A gang of men in my home town.
With a heave and a ho and a hearty yell,
They swung a beam and a side wall fell.
And I asked the foreman, "Are thes mer s'med
As the ones you would need if you were going to build?"
He laughed and he said "Why no, indeed,
Common labourers are all ' need,
'Cos I can destroy in a day "two
What it takes a builder with gination and a plan years to do!
So I said to myself as I went $1^{-1}$ way,
"Which of these roles am I going to play?
Will I be one who is tearing things down

# I.T.C. REGIONAL BEST SPEECH 

## South Africa - A World in One Country

My Grandfather, whose word I never doubt, told me that when he was a boy he had fifty cents, and he went out and bought a house, and a car, and he put seventeen cents in the bank.

He also told me that in those days black people in this country feared to walk on the pavements, that they had to stand in long separate queues in post offices and banks and that they were prevented by law from undertaking skilled work in the mines and factories.

Things may be a little more expensive now than in my Grandfathers day, but it seems to me that South Africa is a much nicer place to live in today than ever it was then.

Of course the crime rate is intolerably high. Of course too many people are without proper housing, jobs, hospital care and electricity. With restless labour, blood-letting in Zulu villages and hijacking in the suburbs, investor confidence is low and the Rand is undervalued.

But... Matthew tells us in Chapter 8 , verse 26 that when the disciples were crossing the Sea of Galiee in a boat and the wind came up and the waves got a little big, they panicked and called out to Jesus saying, "Master, Master save us for we shall all perish!" Jesus rebuked them saying, "Why are you so fearful, O yea of little faith!"

Isn't that much like South Africans today? As we make our transition in the fragile vessel of a new democracy, there is a prophet of doom on every peak and in every valley!

Might it be that we are focusing our attention too much on the negative and failing to see our remarkable new rainbow of blessings'?

The panorama is there, if we will but care to see it.
Political stability is the first in our spectrum of blessings and one which is coveted by most of the countries of Europe, the Middle East and Asia. South Africa is today a dynamic, youthful new nation with a bright new flag and a universally revered President.

We have returned to the world community not as a country devastated by a disastrous revolution, but as a proud, newly united and determined young nation.

Our second great blessing is that we are today considered world leaders in the peaceful resolution of conflict. The latest example of which has been the adoption of a new and most modern of democratic constitutions.

Third in the spectrum is the return of humanism to our attitude towards such things as corporal punishment, the death penalty, and the health needs of nursing mothers.

We are also witnessing an extraordinary capacity on the part of those previously discriminated against to forgive and on the part of the others, a genuine wish to make up for the past. Will this ever be the case in Lebanon, Bosnia or even Ireland?

Ladies and Gentlemen, the stage for development has been set by events such as these but there are, of course, other great gateways of opportunity before us.

To begin with, South Africa is a Persian Gulf of precious metals and minerals. Name it, and we have it. Apart from gold and diamonds, we posses $44 \%$ of the world's reserves of Vanadium, $72 \%$ of its Chromium and a massive $88 \%$ of it's Platinum. Can Britain, Australia, or even America make such claims?

South Africa possesses the infrastructure of the best in the first world. Our world class airports, roads, telecommunications, electricity supply, banking and project financing infrastructure are the envy of more than two thirds of the world. These things are vital for the development of any country. Is there better infrastructure in Italy, India or even Canada?

Apart from manufacturing countless hi-tech products, South Africa has more than enough meat, maize and other agricultural products to feed our own nation. We also produce and export to the world vast quantities of fruit, vegetables, dairy products and fine wines. Neither Greece, Malaysia nor Japan can make such claims of self sufficiency.

Also, the world within South Africa has yet to be discovered by the world Without. Our land abounds with wildlife, golden beaches, natural wetlands and panoramic mountain ranges. Add to these fine hotels, an ability to cater to almost every culture and at nearly 5 Rand to the dollar, what Country is better poised for a boom in tourism'?

But, of all our assets, the most significant is our human resources. Yes, Ladies and Gentlemen, the task of developing this country will fall to our youth, so full of verve and enthusiasm. A task we can and will fulfil. South Africa already has a higher literacy rate than all of Africa, China and even of Israel! We have more doctors per capita than Malaysia, Mexico and Turkey. Our theatre, art, music and literature compare with the best in the world, and need I mention our world class sporting abilities'?

Speaking of the intoxicating loveliness of our country and its wide range of cultures, I once met a wizened old coloured man in the Paarl Valley, who told me:
"As ek so op ' $n$ naweek sit met my bottel branderwyn, en ek kyk oor die lande, berge en meisies so fyn, dan word ek dronk, time and again."

Yes, Ladies and Gentlemen, right here in South Africa, envied political stability, a return to humanism and forgiveness by a nation now expert at conflict resolutions, abundant natural resources, breathtaking vistas, superb infrastructure, technology and a youthful, virile people who want nothing but peace and progress for the Rainbow Nation.
"Where else more?
Where else better prospects?
Where else a world in one country?
A world crying out for acknowledgement and for the realisation of that anonymous author's words etched in the stone of Durham College:

How near is nature to our dust,
How dear is God to man.
When duty whispers soft, "Thou Must".
The youth replies "I Can!"

Bryanston High School prides itself for stimulating a unique cultural creativity through the development and application of dramatic skills, technical skills and creative writing abilities. Through constant development and maintenance of high standards over many hours of hard work the pupils involved in Drama and associated cultural activities develop strong individual identities, convincing language skills as well as creative and astute writing techniques.

This year saw the emergence of the first drama committee, comprising pupils who have developed strong skills in the various elements of drama. Chaired by Amy Evans, they were responsible for organising and running all the cultural events.

During the course work sessions, drama pupils displayed an integration of dramatic elements and creativity developing exciting high energy team spirit. Through the nurturing and stimulation of an appreciation for culture Michael Malakoane and Sekwanele Tshabalala, together with past drama students Stefano Marani and Claire Houghton, staged a complex one-act play Murder at Muckleby Manor for the Cultural Evening.

The eight house plays were staged entirely by pupils and both evenings were successfully managed and co-ordinated by pupils. The winning Senior House play was entered into the RAPS festival with a small percentage of re-casting necessary. The techniques and abilities developed over five years in the drama department together with time and effort spent refining the students' abilities by Mrs Ludik won the school many awards.

The Eaton Trophy is awarded to the playwright(s) who most closely formats his or her creative ideas to the essential elements and structures of a conventional play. The best playwright was selected on clear and concise format together with an honest and creative perspective of a curiously novel event - a class reunion.

Strong acting qualities, adaptable characterisation, flexible use of accents and voice production, together with good self-discipline and stage presence, selected the best dramatic performers who were entered into the Randburg Eisteddfod where many diplomas and gold placings were received.

Musical skills are nurtured in a variety of styles ranging from classical to contemporary voice and instrumental genres which are displayed in the musicals and talent shows. Performers mastering this medium were entered into the Eisteddfod and won gold and silver awards. The De Agrela Trophy is awarded to pupils who have mastered mature presentation and performance skills together with a uniquely strong development of self confidence.

Students displaying strong technical and problem solving abilities in the fields of lighting and sound and who are reliable and hardworking are considered for the Kruuse Trophy.

The skills required for co-ordination of activities, logistic problem solving skills and advanced planning techniques backstage behind the scenes have caused the drama department to initiate a trophy for Backstage Management.

Traditional dance, creative movement, choreography and synchronisation to music are some of the criteria which select dancers for the various dramatic events that support dance. The Acutt Trophy is awarded to the best dancer who meets these expectations.

Thoughtful imagination and vivid creativity in poster, programme and ticket design that meets conventional publicity regulations are criteria for yet another trophy initiated for publicity skills. Marianne Kuehnast provided the original poster for our Major Production, Hollywood comes to Bryanston, which was donated to the school.

The merits and abilities of our Bryanston pupils, together with their genuine and honest friendliness have attracted the organisers of the Randburg Eisteddfod and their professional adjudicators to recognise our potential and capabilities in the South African Cultural Society and they asked us to host the first Sandton Eisteddfod. This is truly a feather in our cap!

We would like to thank Miss Joan Brickhill for her interest in and support of our drama students' talents and in so doing motivating them to achieve even higher standards.

It was with much pleasure and acknowledgement for the efforts of all the drama pupils and associated "culture vultures" that the drama society was able to host its first cultural dinner in association with the Rhetoric Society to crown the year's activities. A big thank you is extended to Mrs Annamarie Mostert, secretary of the Randburg Eisteddfod and Mrs Eunice Strydom from the Gifted Child Centre for their addresses and support of our pupils' efforts.
