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How do you host a wedding when your parents DON'T GET ON?

From wording invitations to walking down the aisle, Claire Muir gets expert advice on getting around tricky family situations to ensure the day of your dreams is just that

DOING THE GROUNDWORK

First things first - getting the word out! Historically, wedding invitations came from the bride's parents but it's now pretty normal for them to come from the couple themselves - ideal if the bride's parents are no longer together. Next up, couples with complicated family dynamics can avoid unwelcome plus ones by addressing each and every invitation directly to the person invited. For extra security, look into an electronic RSVP service that'll limit responses to one per submission.

Hitting the bridal boutiques may be anxiety-inducing if you've not got the traditional entourage (step-mum or step-siblings on the scene?) but there are some solutions. Make memories on separate shopping trips or, if time is of the essence and you fancy yourself as a peacemaker, ask for a joint jaunt. "You could ask your mum and step-mum to put their differences aside for a day. You'll know yourself if it's possible," says Mirka Jankowska at Mirka Bridal Couture."

"Otherwise, bring the one whose opinion you trust. Then, to make sure no-one feels excluded, offer to bring the other person to your fittings. Ask beforehand for a longer appointment with some Prosecco to make it extra special."

When it comes to their outfits, you'll want to avoid clashing and upstaging without offending, of course. Shop with your step-mother, suggests Caroline McGlynn, events manager at Macdonald



Houston House Hotel. "Show her your mother's dress and ask her to stick to a specific colour and style," she says. "This can help when it comes to the photos."

But who gets ready with who? You may get on better with your step-mother but feel having your mum for wedding morning prep is the 'right' thing to do, for example. Caroline suggests inviting both if possible. "Alternatively, have one get ready with you and the other take part in a different part of the day. Might she like to be a witness? Consider asking for your dad's advice, too."

TIME TO GET MARRIED

When it comes to ceremony logistics, wedding planners have seen it all and Oskar Gilchrist-Grodnicki of The Wedding Guru - Oskar can vouch for that. His overarching advice? Don't stick to tradition if you don't feel like it's you. "Tve had grooms awaiting their brides to walk in together, brides walking down alone, both parents walking the bride or the couple's children walking with their mum. You want to feel like you're getting the right support for you."

Keep the vows conflict-free by allocating seating and embracing the age-old tradition of having 'sides'. Got three sides altogether? Just add a second



aisle! "My husband and I had our mums walking us down the aisle simultaneously," says Oskar.

Ceremonies can be a time to show appreciation for family members and with so many elements, from readings to the ring handover to setting up drinks from a quaich, you can choose a symbolic role for each person you'd like to be involved.

SAY CHEESE!

Your photographer won't know your family and its politics so it's going to come down to you here. But a little prep work and you'll get a smooth session. Prepare a detailed shoot list in advance and allocate responsible people to help organise it on the day. Consider different locations for each group you want photos with, too.

EAT, DRINK AND BE MERRY

Table plans make to-be-weds groan at the best of times but rest assured, top tables rarely have the traditional set-up anymore, according to Caroline - and sometimes they don't even exist! "How about a sweetheart table just for the newlyweds? You'll get to spend some alone time together, which is super-important."

When it comes to parents and their partners, Oskar suggests having each couple host their own table to the front of the top table. But if one has a partner and the other doesn't, just have a chat. "Ask both sides about their expectations. It's all about compromise. And if you want them all at the top table, keeping them at opposite ends could be a solution."

Arranging the rest of the room to ensure a war-free



zone is possible, says Oskar. "Do you remember Monica's flags table plan from *Friends*? Ask the venue for a sample table plan and use colourcoded tabs to group guests by colours,

then start placing tabs around the tables to see how it flows."

Traditionally, there are three wedding speeches (the father of the bride, the groom and the best man) but, like everything else, why stick with it? "I've had weddings where the couple opted for no speeches, which is fine," says Caroline.

Consider how comfortable people are



with public speaking. Why force your shy dad if he'd be happy walking you down the aisle and letting your mum do the talking? If the parents' situation is just too complicated, Oskar suggests asking a sibling to do the 'family' part.

PARTY TIME

As the sun sets and the booze kicks in, inhibitions will be lowered, especially after a day of being on best behaviour. "If you strongly foresee things easily getting out of hand, consider hiring security to help you handle the situation - but make your family aware of it," says Oskar.

If such serious measures aren't needed, allocate 'conflict mediators' in advance so you're not pulled into uncomfortable situations. "People within the bridal party who know the situation and are happy to step in will help," advises Caroline. "And make sure your event co-ordinator is aware."

Ultimately, though, the more planning, honest conversations and precautionary measures before the wedding, the less stressed you'll feel on the day. And don't be afraid to pre-warn family members. "Remind them this is your special day and that you expect them to treat it with the respect it deserves," adds Caroline.

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Devine Bride on... Dress regret and anxiety post-pandemic

Based in East London for over 10 years but originally from Glasgow, Laura Devine of Devine Bride offers pick and mix wedding planning, helping cool couples to plan their wedding in a more flexible and fun way. With over 180 weddings and events under her belt. Laura knows what's worked, what's not, and what's fun! Here she shares her expert insight into wedding dress shopping and what to do if you've fallen out of love with it.

"Your dress is a strange purchase; and like everything in wedding planning, most couples have never done it before! All the emotions, planning, budgeting, and thoughts you have around your big day are completely new territory from a mental health aspect.

Getting your head in the right mindset for trying your dress on (and actually wearing it on the day) will be a big factor in any anxiety you may feel, too. The last few years have been A LOT. So, it's ok if you have mixed feelings about a dress you fell in love with two years ago, or a dress you had to try on alone, or a dress you thought might be right for summer and now your date has changed. Things change. People change. Your body might have changed. But that's

ok, and it's completely normal.

Firstly, it's ok to keep window shopping. It may help you remember why you fell in love with your dress - or realise that it's not quite right for you now. Secondly, try it on again and again - does it still fit properly? Does it make you feel good? Take it to a trusted alterations service. They

will be able to advise on fits and tucks, lengths and seams, and cuts and sleeves, even if you aren't sure yourself. A small change can make a big difference,



so this can really transform your dress and might be the difference between you loving or loathing it - especially if it doesn't fit properly; whether it's post-pandemic, post-baby, or just that you've changed you mind.

Lastly, is it comfortable enough to



wear for a minimum of 12 hours? Your wedding day is a marathon, not a sprint! It's a long day. Will it withstand your season, venue, ceremony,



dancing? If the answer is no but you still love it, you may want to think about setting extra budget aside for a second dress. A change of dress might just be the energy refresh you need. As quite often, it's the feeling of being trapped or stuck with the dress you bought a while ago that is unsettling rather than the dress itself.

And if you have really grown to hate it... that's ok. Don't suffer. Your wedding day (and 3,000+ photos) will forever be tarnished by the memory that you didn't love it. Don't stress, there are plenty of resale sites where you can reclaim at least some of the expense. There's the obvious Ebay and Vinted, but also some other specialist stores like Cudoni, Still White, Bride 2 Bride and Bridal Reloved. And if you're feeling charitable, I would also highly recommend Brides Do Good, whose profits go towards empowering women and ending child marriage.



Then you can get on with finding your dream dress that you feel amazing in, because that's the only thing that matters. Don't let anything stand in the way of enjoying every bit of fun you've planned (and paid for) on your wedding day."







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Ask the expert

Pachel Scott Conture

unpicks the jargon surrounding just how your wedding dress is made

With endless weird and wonderful new wedding dress terms to learn, it can seem a little daunting but don't worry, our expert columnist Rachel is here to guide you through

"It's always normally my default to encourage brides to abandon the jargon and the rules when it comes to choosing their wedding dress but equally, you still need to be entirely confident in whatever you're signing up to so a little knowledge can go a long way.

Knowing your options on how your dress is made, where it's made, what bespoke design options you have and ensuring the perfect fit are all things you'll need to talk through with whoever you're trusting with your most precious, once-ina-lifetime dress.

So let's get you armed with a brief understanding behind a few key phrases to ensure you feel confident enough to make the right choices and to ask questions!

HOW IS YOUR DRESS GOING TO BE MADE?

Couture - Definitely a term that's always close to our hearts! Stemming from the original French word for 'tailoring' and 'cloth cutting', it essentially means the highest quality of cut, tailoring and fit. It represents something entirely custom made to the highest quality standards, using only the finest fabrics and utterly flawless construction techniques.

Made to order - Your dress will be constructed for you after you have placed your order. This term would still apply whether the 'rack' is right in front of you in the shop or it's in a warehouse or factory storage. You're choosing a dress from styles that have already been made basically. This version of buying is most like high street fashion shopping as you'd know it, (often referred to as 'ready to wear') where stocks of dresses are made ahead of the season so customers can purchase and wear instantly.

HOW WILL WE GET THE RIGHT FIT?

Standard size - Dresses are made using a predetermined set range of sizes. (eg size



This term can technically apply to both construction on a mass industrial scale as well as on an individual artisan basis.

Depending on the level of designer, where and how the dresses are made and their chosen working methods, your dress can be made to order using either a standard size pattern or (in the case of the higher level couture designers we work with) using your own 'made to measure' pattern.

Not to be confused with 'Made to order' - Made to measure is a dress made exactly to your measurements. Made to order simply means your dress is 'made' once you 'order'.

Off the rack - A rail of pre-made dresses you can choose from. Most likely to be a range of standard sizes. 10, 12, 14). Each designer/manufacturer will create their own size chart to work from so remember it may be that a size 12 from one designer will be quite different to a size 12 from another.

This is why it's important to have an expert bridal consultant measure you and listen to their guidance on what size is best. The type of fabric, shape and style of dress can all have an impact on what size is best. Be guided by the measurements, not by the size on the label - the size you choose in a t-shirt, blouse or pair of jeans won't always be the same as a sculpted corseted gown!

Made to measure - A new pattern is created from scratch based exactly on your own measurements. It would of course follow that a made to measure dress can only be made if you're also



having your dress made to order but, to be clear, it is possible to have a made to order dress without having it also made to measure.

I'm a bit of a perfectionist when it comes to fit so we tend to opt for the full made to measure service where at all possible.

Alterations and fittings - When your dress arrives in store (THE most exciting thing EVER!), you'll need final fittings to make sure it fits to total perfection. Due to the inherent pliable nature of fabrics and the natural changes in body shapes, your dress will always need some level of tweaking. That will apply even if you've opted for a made to measure and toile fitting service (Although there is potential with those services that your dress will need fewer adjustments). These final adjustments will ensure your dress fits you in exactly the way you want it to look and feel. It will potentially include things like the hem length being walkable (or danceable) in your chosen shoes, the straps sit neatly, corsetry is as tight or loose as you prefer and the dress flows across the body in exactly the way you want it to (AND any enhancing bust cups are sneaked in, shhh...we'll not tell!)

HOW WILL WE GET THE RIGHT DESIGN?

Design changes - You might want to change something about a style to make it right for you, perhaps adding sleeves, changing the shape of the neckline or shape of the skirt, exchange fabric types, colours or placement of detailing. Although we have the added flexibility of being able to offer design changes right from the pattern stage, it is not standard across all bridal designers and manufacturers. Depending on the type of design changes you're looking for though, even with 'off the rack' dresses, some creative retailers might be able to personalise your gorgeous wedding dress so it's always worth an ask!



Toile - Pronounced more like twa-al, although lots of my clients call it a twirl (probably due to my Scottish accent pronouncing it)! It's sometimes also referred to as Calico due to the fabric most often used. Basically, it's a practice version of your dress made in a cheaper alternative fabric before your actual glorious fabric

is cut and the final dress constructed. It's used as a mock-up to test out the pattern, design choices and fit of measurements.

It is highly likely that, if you opt for a toile as part of your dress construction process, it'll be made to measure too. You'd attend a toile fitting appointment prior to your dress being cut and finished, allowing for any fitting adjustments and/or design changes to be confirmed and tweaked before your dress is completed."

Tender Loving Wedding Style

Top Scottish style blogger Rachel Lawler of *Tender Loving Style* shares all on her recent Maid of Honour duties

'Love is patient' - and just as well with Covid halting so many wedding plans since 2020! I was so delighted for my little sis, Beth, and her new husband, Greig, who finally got their big day after a two-year postponement. I was honoured to be their Maid of Honour, so I thought I'd share 5 things I'd recommend to anyone on MOH duty...



1. Pack a 'Just in case' kit

Maybe it was the former stylist in me sneaking out, but I knew I wanted to put together a 'just in case' kit for the big day for any last minute emergencies. I popped in a mini sewing kit (don't forget safety pins which can totally help pull up a stubborn zip), blister plasters, deodorant, mints, mini scissors, travel size perfume and a box of kirby grips. Luckily no sewing kit was needed, but it felt less stressful knowing we had all bases covered!



2. Stick to PJs and robes everyone can wear again Let's be totally honest: a set of PJs stamped

Let's be totally honest: a set of PJs stamped with 'bridesmaid' isn't going to be your go-to pair post-wedding. Instead, Beth bought us all pink striped silky robes and - by sheer coincidence - the bridesmaids had already decided on the exact matching PJs! We also picked up pink crop tops for the morning so it was easier to get changed after hair and make-up.



3. Write a note


The night before the wedding, we gave Beth a book

filled with plenty of memories and notes. Myself, each of the bridesmaids, my mum and Greig's mum each wrote a note for Beth to read alongside their favourite photos of them with the bride-to-be. I bought a pink scrapbook from Hobbycraft and decorated it with gold letters in Beth's new married name then stuck a pink envelope on each page so the notes could be folded in. Safe to say, Beth loved it and there were plenty of happy tears. 100% better for the night before the wedding, though - no ruined wedding day make up!

4. Take videos

One thing I'm super glad I did was take videos throughout the night before and wedding morning. It's been so lovely looking back on those little moments that sometimes get forgotten, from getting ready in the morning to putting on Beth's fave childhood film on her last night as a Miss (*Parent Trap*, FYI). I put all the videos into a separate folder and shared them with Beth so she has them too.

5. Don't forget a playlist The 6.45am alarm to start hair and makeup was early (especially after a

The 6.45am alarm to start hair and makeup was early (especially after a few proseccos the night before!) so we all made sure we'd created a good playlist for the wedding morning. We had all Beth's favourites and even some throwbacks to our Steps and Spice Girls days with plenty of 90's tunes just before Beth's dress reveal! The venue had a Bluetooth sound system all set up so it's totally worth checking the set-up before you get there, just to make sure you don't need a speaker.

I can hardly believe my little sister is now a married lady - it's made me even more excited for my own big day! The countdown is officially on...

Time to BANISH *those bridal hang-ups!*



As a bride who chose her wedding dress based on the fact it was highnecked and high-backed (in case of spots on those areas - something that rarely happened to me but was a top worry nonetheless) and had a full skirt to hide the inevitable bloat (our wedding breakfast was a burger bar, need I say more?) I really wish there'd been an article like this around when I was getting ready to tie the knot. Don't get me wrong, I adored my dress. It was absolutely 'The One' - the one picked from a very small selection of 'body suitable' options I'd given myself, that is. Had I been able to somehow ease those anxieties and try every style under the sun. I wonder what the end result would have looked like...

As I got talking to Megan Carberry, assistant manager at Kudos Bridal in Dunfermline, she assured me that bridal consultants often meet women armed with a multitude of body hangups. "Everybody has at least one," she points out. "But you should never be scared to try on your dream style because of your insecurities."

Instead, it's all about finding an outfit that wows you so much that you forget about them! Megan suggests trying a little bit of everything until you feel 100% comfortable. "You should be able to envision slipping into your gown on the morning of the wedding and feel like you can completely relax with no worries!"



At Pan Pan Bridal, Huda Abdulgader recommends not thinking too much about the different styles until try-on time. And when faced with concerns she's full of reassurance and understanding whilst encouraging her clients to keep all options firmly open. "For the bride's comfort, I would always support her by recommending dresses that would give her ease of mind," she says. "However, I also assure them there are other ways to deal with skin changes or spots. Don't be afraid to try those 'dream styles.""

What if...

According to Megan, there is no such thing as an embarrassing question in bridal boutiques. "There'll always be someone, from your consultant to your seamstress, who will have an answer for you," she says. So, let's dive in!

What if I don't know what to wear under my dress?


Huda: "Don't be afraid to ask. It can be really difficult to find a bra that doesn't show under the dress so buy a few (keep your receipts) and bring them to your fittings to try on. Knickers can be a pain but you'd be surprised what's out there for fitted dresses. Sometimes we advise brides to not wear knickers because every pair shows some kind of line. And to be honest, no-one is going to know unless you tell them!"

What if I hate my arms?

Megan: "This might sound completely crazy but sometimes sleeves aren't the right thing to go for. Sleeves as part of a wedding gown are designed to be looked at and admired so you may find that instead of covering your problem areas, you find yourself drawn to them a little more. Maybe try an off-the-shoulder style instead? This way you still get cover where you want it but your insecurities aren't being highlighted."

What if I'm prone to spots or redness on my back and chest?

Huda: "There is some fantastic body make-up to give good cover-up and treatments that can help with spots. Treat yourself and help your skin on the lead up to your wedding. If you go a little red, guests won't mind, and photographers can edit areas you feel uncomfortable with."



What if my IBS makes me super-bloated?

Megan: "Think about an A-line style. These gowns are fitted to the waist and either come in a soft, floaty skirt or a ballgown bottom that will disguise a multitude of tummy problems. If you'd like to stick to fitted, go for a style with a stretch lining that will move with you throughout the day without being uncomfortable. All over detail will also help camouflage any bloating, rather than a plainer style."

What if I need the toilet?

Megan: "It sounds bizarre but go backwards - there's no need to invest in any fancy contraptions! Instead of awkwardly trying to hold your train up behind you and risking the dreaded dip in the bowl, walk on to the toilet instead. If you have a fuller dress, chances are you'll be wearing a hoop so use this to your advantage - hold the hoop and your dress will rest inside."



What if my period is due?

Megan: "It's always good practice to have an 'SOS kit' on hand - how about a little box in the bathroom at your venue? Pads, tampons, paracetamol... Even a small sewing kit in case of any wardrobe malfunctions. There's no such thing as being too prepared."

Bothered by BO? Don't be!

"One of the main causes of BO is a build-up of bacteria around hair follicles so get a wax a couple of days before your wedding - and make sure a trusty bridesmaid adds a mini deodorant to your survival kit for the day! If you sweat excessively, ask at the chemist for something stronger to put on the night before your wedding. Just make sure to read the instructions fully as these can cause irritation if not used properly." **Kayleigh Powell, Blushes &**

Bows at LMQ Hair and Beauty

Mamma mia!

Depending on the number of children you have, shopping for your mother of the bride or groom outfit could be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. **Here's how to make the most of it!**

GETTING STARTED

First things first, you'll be starting in a great position if you make sure to do plenty of research before booking appointments. Look at styles and designers on boutique websites to see the latest collections and check out social media. You'll find videos of new arrivals plus photos and testimonials from 'real mums'. "The best recommendation for customer experience is always word of mouth so have a look at some bridal blogs and check out customer reviews," suggests Louise Brown at Catwalk, an award-winning independent ladies' boutique in Dunfermline.

She advises that most boutiques operate by appointment only so it's worth planning ahead and booking in early, especially if you're looking for a weekend visit. "Most boutiques only carry one in a size, so I'd recommend coming in early when the deliveries arrive for the widest choice of styles in your size. The fabulous new collections arrive at Catwalk from early June for the autumn/winter season and spring/summer collections arrive January/February time."

That said, finding your mother of the bride or groom outfit should be a happy experience







so don't rush in. "We recommend you only start this when you are ready to purchase your special outfit," says Georgea Scobie, buyer at Gina Smart Boutique, which boasts one of Scotland's largest collections of special occasionwear. "There's no point trying on lots of dresses when you're not yet in the position to buy as stock changes frequently."

> Christina Sigerson, owner of Mia Bella, a "mum's specialist" in the heart of Glasgow city centre, agrees: "Chat with friends and workmates may be filled with what you may or may not be wearing for the big day, but try not to feel pressured into the shopping experience."

Six weeks pre-wedding is the very latest she'd recommend leaving it to start the search, bearing in mind that your outfit may need to be ordered and you'll have delivery times to factor in, plus potential alterations when you do get your hands on it. Not to mention sourcing headgear and other accessories to match - and potentially visiting a few boutiques across Scotland to make the most of the shopping experience!

"Sometimes mums need to make sure they've seen everything there is to see before committing to their chosen gown," says Christina. "We always encourage our customers to visit other stores if they don't have a gut feeling that the dress they like/love is for them."

HITTING THE SHOPS

First, don't go alone – assemble a trusted shopping squad! "We are always very honest with our customers, but they don't know us and we feel it's important to have the opinion of a good friend or a close family member to give their thoughts on what you try on," explains Christina.

Keep your circle small, though, she says; "We advise against large groups visiting with our clients as this can cause confusion. After all, human nature means we all have different opinions and sometimes this can cause a conflict of opinion and make your choosing experience difficult."





In terms of prepping yourself, keep your

make-up minimal and wear a good fitting nude bra and comfortable underwear. Got a specific shoe or size of heel in mind to team with your outfit? Bring it, or anything else that'll dictate the style of outfit you need for the big day.

"Leaving jewellery at home is a good idea as often you will be asked to remove to avoid snagging outfits," adds Georgea, who urges MOBs and MOGs to bring one more crucial thing with them. "It really is best if you come with an open mind. Often, we find it's what you may not necessarily expect that is "The One!"

WHAT OUTFIT IS RIGHT FOR ME?

With a huge variety of colours, styles and fabrics it can be daunting searching for the perfect outfit, especially if you're wondering about the rules around different styles for different body shapes... But there are no rules according to the team at Mia Bella! "We like to start customers off by reaffirming what shapes suit them and more importantly what they feel most comfortable in."

At The Dressing Rooms in Grangemouth (the destination sale boutique for Catwalk Falkirk) owner Pauline Spiers agrees. "Most ladies know 'The One' when they put it on," she says. "They look good and feel confident and comfortable in it. It's best to come with an open mind and try different shapes and colours on, and we do advise on what we think would flatter their figures."

Trend-led? Beautifully feminine fit-andflare styles with soft chiffon skirts



or hi-low hem lines are sought after this season, as are chic, fitted knee-length designs with Bardot necklines and delicate beading, says Louise. For a more relaxed look, try an elegant trouser suit. And if you want to stand out from the crowd, she suggests incorporating "special features" like the cape shoulder or drape back for a touch of drama.

What about accessories? "We are seeing a trend for smaller quirkier headpieces this season but we do love a big showstopper hat," says Pauline. "It can depend on the venue as many couples are opting for destination weddings this year."

Q: Do I need to run my outfit choice past the other MOB/MOG - or the bride?

A: No one likes to upset the apple cart and often lovely mums are keen to ensure their outfit is on point for everyone, not just them - complementing but not clashing with the other MOB/MOG and toning in with but not matching the bridesmaids, for example. At Mia Bella, Christina recommends talking, talking, and more talking to ensure you're happy with your chosen style on all fronts. "We think it's best to have an open line of communication with the other mum and bridal party," she says. "That way everyone has a fair idea of what colours are involved and a visual picture can build. While searching for your outfit, this will help you make colour choices that complement others within the bridal party."

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



From avoiding acne to nailing this year's key wedding hair trends, we put your most-asked questions to *our beautification experts*



Q: How can I make sure my skin is in the best condition possible?

"Skincare is crucial months ahead. We recommend a good cleanse, tone and moisturise routine. A good serum, plus hydration for under the eyes and lips is recommended also. Always wear an SPF and avoid sunbeds or heavy sunbathing."

Q: How can I cover acne scars?

"There are a range of options to improve scarring, like peels, laser and dermaplaning treatments, if you can afford to treat yourself. But just exfoliating and keeping your skin hydrated will improve its texture."

Caroline Stewart Caroline Stewart Makeup Artistry and Hair Styling

O: What about acne itself?

"Start a face massage routine ASAP - you'll see and feel changes quickly. It helps the skin become healthier without the use of topical products. I also recommend simplifying your skincare routine. Don't add in new products or chop and change as you'll just confuse the skin. You'll possibly also need some lifestyle changes. Look into diet, stress and hormones rather than just products."

Q: My skin is generally good but what if a pesky spot pop ups on the big day? "Spots aren't a problem. Pop some neat lavender on it and keep your skin well-hydrated."

Q: I sweat when I'm nervous. What can I do?

"Whether it's sweat, tears or bubbles gone wild, I always make sure I have the right primer for your skin type. That means your foundation has a good platform to stick to. Waterproofbased products and setting sprays prevent make-up running or smudging, too."

Q: I know nothing about make-up. How can I pick the right MUA?

"Narrow down to the ones that have pictures on their social media of the type of make-up you like. We all have our own style and favourite products. Your MUA should be approachable you want to feel you can express your thoughts and ideas."

Q: I'm a big fan of the natural look but will it still be flawless at the end of the night?

"Of course! The right application of minimal products can make just as much of an impact as a full face of foundation."

Q: Fake tan - how can I avoid looking like I've been Tangoed!?

"Do your research and test before the day! I'd highly recommend a lotion (a professional application will last up to 7-10 days so great if you're going straight on honeymoon) and not a spray tan. Lotions are activated when applied and go down into several layers of your skin so are less likely to rub off on the dress. However, a spray tan is water-based, sits on the first couple of layers of your skin and is more likely to rub off."

Q: I'm prone to blushing and don't want to look like a beetroot at the altar. Help!

"A little extra coverage or colour corrector will help with this."

Q: How long will my bride squad need to get ready in the morning and how can we make sure it goes smoothly?

"We'll keep you right. But generally, allow for 45-60 minutes per person for each service and give the bride an hour for each. We often like to prep the bride's hair first then start her make-up in the middle. There'll always be time at the end for touch ups before you head down the aisle."

"Ensure your bridal party have ideas about what they like and don't like. Have hair washed and dried (but not straightened) either the night before or the morning of the wedding so it's ready to be styled."

Q: I'll have my children getting ready with me. How can I get them involved?

"Some fresh flowers in their hair can look beautiful and a little sparkle on their cheeks and lips will help make them feel and look as special as they are!" *Maureen The Bride to be...*

Q: My mum is mid-menopause. How can I help her look and feel her best on the big day?

"It's crucial she keeps cool to avoid feeling flustered. Keep a window open and how about gifting her a cute little handheld fan? They're lifesavers and discreet - mine looks like a perfume bottle."

"I'd do her hair and make-up last, and recommend she has some face powder with her. That way, she can dab away any flush then softly remove shine with the powder puff."

Q: When should I get beauty treatments before the big day?

"Attend to your nails, tinting and waxing the week leading up to the wedding so everything's fresh but be careful not to introduce anything new to your skin." *Laura*

Q: 2022 wedding beauty trends... Tell me all!

"Skin is everything this season. The gorgeous, natural, sheer application is what everyone wants. Go for gloss lips rather than full lipstick. And hold the winged liner - 2022 is more about soft lashes and brows. Blush draping is worth knowing about. It basically means you contour or create more dimension using blush instead of a darker contour shade. It's youthful, pretty and very effective."

Q: And what's hot in wedding hair?

"Natural hairstyles rather than traditional updos. I've been working on soft, boho waves, half-up looks and bouncy, voluminous blow dries." *Lesley Pamper & Polish*



Q: There are so many gorgeous hair ideas. How do I decide?

"Organise a wedding hair trial. Bring pictures of your dress so we can see the shape, detail and back of the dress. And we'll work out how to style it at the front to suit your face shape." *Caroline*

Q: How can I look after my hair in the lead-up?

"It all starts from the inside so consider nutritional supplements or a well-balanced diet to ensure new hair growth is at its best. To maintain your gorgeous locks, use salonquality products, and enriching shampoos, conditioners and treatments. Keep heat use to a minimum and always use a heat protection spray when drying, straightening or curling. Although you may be trying your best to grow your hair, regular trims will ensure split ends don't travel up your length."

Q: When should I get my hair done before the big day?

"It completely depends on you and the style and colour of your hair. Do you like your hair best two days or two weeks after it's been done? If you're looking for a big change, we recommend a minimum of three to six months depending on the extent of the change."

"Many brides with alopecia or those undergoing chemotherapy opt for a wig - but so do brides without hair loss because it's convenient, easy to style and comes with lots of choices. You get a new, confidenceboosting hairstyle in minutes without any commitment and you'll feel in control as you choose the cut, colour, texture and length. Unlike hair extensions, wigs come off in seconds and don't damage your hair.



Imagine having your hair styled the night before and knowing it'll last all day? You could start with longer hair in the morning and change to a bob in the evening or have a couple of wigs in different colours and styles.

Considering a wig? Figure out how you want your hair to look (Classic or sexy? Long or short? Curly or straight? And what about colour?) and factor in your dress style and wedding theme. The right fit is important so schedule an appointment two to three months before the big day, especially if you want custom-made. A full lace wig takes up to six weeks to make because they're completely hand-tied and we need a few days to colour it."

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

Dressed to impress



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Diamonds are FOREVER

What is it about these precious rocks that captures our hearts, and how do you find your perfect stone? Katie Bletcher asks those in the know

"Diamonds are forever," "diamonds are a girl's best friend" or, to quote Nicole Richie, "true friends are like diamonds - bright, beautiful, valuable, and always in style." We've been lauding the benefits of these beauties for centuries, often imbuing them with certain characteristics, so is it any wonder, they're the go-to precious stone for engagement rings? After all, as Emily Wan of jewellers Laings says, "Diamonds are one of the earth's most precious creations and today are used as symbols of love, commitment and triumph."

Traditionally a groom would prepare to spend three months' salary on an engagement ring. That expectation may have changed but the sentiment still stands. This is the most important piece of jewellery you're ever likely to wear, (apart from your wedding band of course). So just how do you find the perfect sparkler?

One starting point to help is the "4Cs" - cut, colour, clarity and carat weight. "These are the globally accepted standards for assessing the quality of a diamond and have great influence in creating the fire and sparkle that makes us fall in love with these enchanting stones," explains Emily. Price therefore will be largely determined by how a particular diamond is measured by jewellers and diamond graders.

However, remember they act purely as a guide. As Lesley Elder of jeweller John McKay says, "It is important to the client only if they are looking for a specific colour, clarity, carat or cut of diamond." Using them simply as a guide, let's take a quick look at how the 4Cs are determined...



Platinum 0.50ct G SI2 brilliant cut diamond halo ring (£3,200), Laings

Cut

The cut of a diamond has five grades; excellent, very good, good, fair and poor. "When buying diamonds, I always look for excellent or ideal as the cut is the most overlooked of the 4Cs but the one which determines the beauty and lustre," says Lesley. "When you opt for very good you are sacrificing some brilliance." Emily agrees. "The sparkle of a diamond is determined by its proportions, symmetry and polish," she says. "Differences in cut greatly impact the beauty, aesthetic appeal, and value of a diamond."



Colour

18ct white gold 0.47ct cushion cut yellow diamond ring (£2,435), **Laings**

Platinum 0.70ct round brilliant cut diamond ring (£2,800), John McKay

Colour actually refers to the absence of colour in a diamond. "The perfect diamond will have no hue and will resemble a drop of clear water," says Emily. "The colour grade measures the degree of colourlessness in a diamond, beginning at D (colourless) and ending at Z (light colour). The most desirable diamond colour is D, with no yellowish hue present, and complementing the brilliance of a well-cut diamond." Laings typically work with diamonds that are near colourless to colourless.

However, Lesley warns that diamond grading is not a science. "In a typical diamond lab the stone can be passed to as many as 20 graders before it's certified," she says. "There is a scale and most jewellers like us will have a set of master stones which is used for determining the colour the same as a diamond lab." "Inclusions are natural birthmarks in a diamond that occur during its formation."

Clarity

Clarity is a qualitative metric that grades the visual appearance of each diamond," says Lesley. "The fewer inclusions and blemishes a diamond has internally, the better its clarity grade will be." Clarity is measured on a scale beginning at 'flawless', referring to stones that have no visible inclusions under a 10x magnification, according to Emily, and the scale ends at 'included' where inclusions - "natural birthmarks" - are clearly visible under the same magnification.



Carat indicates the weight of a diamond, not to be mistaken with the size. Lesley says if a client requires a larger stone, John McKay will call upon several diamond dealers to obtain a selection that suits the budget they wish to work with.

Laings can also deliver an array of different carat weights, ranging from 0.30ct to 3 carat and above. But Emily says weight isn't everything. "The overall appearance and beauty of a diamond should carry more importance, favouring a well-cut and colourless diamond to determine the desired sparkle," she says.



Follow your HEART

Now you have a basic understanding of the 4Cs it should help you decipher some of the labelling when shopping for that all important rock, but remember this is purely a guide. It may help explain the differences in price but ultimately you have to go with the ring you want to see sparkling on your finger for the rest of your life.

"A couple should be led solely by their heart," says Lesley. "A diamond certificate will give you every detailing regarding a diamond except the most important one which is the sparkle and brilliance, and beauty is in the eye of the beholder." Emily agrees. "No two diamonds are the same and it is still important to choose a diamond you feel drawn to and fall in love with," she says. "The 4Cs guide you to the characteristics of your diamond, and determine the fire and brilliance of the stone, but ultimately, each unique personality of the stone will allow you to follow your heart in deciding."

Hot topic lab-grown diamonds

Would you opt for a created rock?

Thinking back 10 years to when my then fiancé took me engagement ring shopping the subject of lab-grown stones came up. A decade ago I think it's fair to say there was a certain stigma around rocks that hadn't been mined and ultimately I was swayed by the sales assistant at the time. My own ring is a sapphire encircled by 12 little diamonds (à la Lady Di). I was shown an array of different rings and stones, both mined and created, but mined won out in the end.

Given the same choice today though, I wonder would I have decided the same. Lab-grown gems are definitely gaining popularity, and Lesley at John McKay has seen a strong shift in people's buying. "Within the industry there was a lack of education at first," she says. "There was a degree of snobbery but it's swinging the other way. We are dealing now with a generation that's more socially responsible," she says. "It takes 250 tonnes of soil to be mined to get 1 carat of diamond. Lab-grown diamonds are kinder to the environment." And Dundee-based jeweller and designer Lorraine Law agrees. "People are starting to research the ethics," she says. "The new generation are more aware. We're getting into about 30% lab-grown."

But will a lab-grown stone still have the same lustre and appeal? "If you're testing it with a thermal laser there's no way to tell if there's a difference between lab-grown and mined," Lorraine assures. And Lesley says they are "chemically and optically identical" and will still stand up to all the 4Cs measurements.

New life

If you want to go down the environmentally-friendly route it's worth bearing recycled diamonds in mind too. "A lot of the diamonds we use are recycled and haven't been recently mined," says Lorraine. "There's nothing wrong with them. People may have traded up and gone back to the diamond dealer with a half carat wanting a carat. Once it's been mined it's there and available, so recycling is another way of being ethical." And remember, you can imbue your ring with great personal sentiment if you take the stones from a family heirloom and have them redesigned.

Life in colour

Diamonds may be the go-to stone of choice but they're not everyone's thing. So, what are the popular coloured gemstones right now? "Sapphire and ruby are always a popular choice, radiating a distinct and mesmerising charm that lends them perfectly to those looking for a unique engagement ring," says Emily. "These desirable gemstones sit directly under diamond on the Mohs scale of hardness at number 9, making them durable enough to wear as an engagement ring."

Blue tanzanite and orange or pink morganite are also on trend according to Lesley. "But we still see a far greater percentage of diamonds to coloured gemstones."

And remember, not every diamond looks like a classic white diamond. "Salt and pepper diamonds are popular according to Lorraine. These natural stones would previously have been cast aside when the raw diamond was being cut. "In the past a lot of them would have been classified as inferior because they were so included," says Lorraine. "Now people are looking at them in a different way. They've got character and it's making the best of everything that comes from the natural diamond."

Food is so often at the very heart of life's great celebrations. Imagine Christmas without a proper spread or Easter without the eggs. But in the immediate aftermath of the initial lockdown the first couples to wed weren't able to share a meal with friends, and even when guestlist numbers crept up, Covid restrictions put paid to the popular family style feasts and sharing platters.

Now that the measures have all but disappeared, you're free to treat your guests to the proper slap-up wedding breakfast you've always dreamed of. So just what should be on the menu to ensure your well-fed guests are talking about your food and drink for years to come?

Eat your heart out

"Maximalism" is a term we're hearing a lot of this year and when it comes to wedding food it's become something of a byword for being a bit more extravagant with your menu. Couples, whether they had to postpone their wedding or not, are taking the opportunity to enjoy that extra course or to upgrade to Champagne instead of Prosecco. "I get a lot of couples asking for a palate cleanser or choosing from our Premium Selection so I do think, especially with postponed weddings, couples are really pushing the boat out!" says Kate Dobson, wedding planner for Saltire Hospitality.

A swing towards providing your wedding guests with the very best is a trend Rachel Rowley of destination events catering and The Cook School by Ballintaggart is also seeing, even if it means sticking to smaller numbers. The company prides itself on providing restaurant quality fare to real food lovers and instead of doing set menus offers different options, ranging from a three-course wedding breakfast all the way up to an elevated tasting menu of six or seven courses, though those indulgent feasts tend to be reserved for weddings of 10 - 15 people. "We are definitely seeing a trend where people's budget hasn't changed that drastically but their thoughts on numbers have," explains Rachel. "Instead of 120 they are having 60 or 70 so they are then having lobster instead of prawns."

Treating a smaller more exclusive guest list to really superb food is also the ethos behind the new Wine and Dine Weddings concept espoused by Edinburgh's McLarens on the Corner. These intimate weddings are for couples who want to enjoy quality time with family and friends over delicious food. Siobhan Leith of McLarens says, "It's now ok for food to sit front and centre."

Season's eating

Seasonality and provenance have become of paramount importance for couples and caterers alike in recent years with more and more to-be-weds concerned with the wider impact of their wedding menu. "Using local suppliers and seasonality of the food is always a huge thing couples mention to me when they are looking at our brochure," says Kate. "Provenance is so importance to us here at Saltire Hospitality. We work really closely with all our suppliers. We are lucky that in Scotland we have access to

so many incredible food suppliers. Our culinary director Bran Jankovic personally hand-picks our suppliers and our wedding couples love to hear about this."

Ballintaggart has recently teamed up with the Blair Atholl estate to create Clachan by Ballintaggart. The new three-night wedding package for more intimate weddings, will revolve around an old 18th-century farmhouse barn with a strong emphasis on high quality food which takes full advantage of the Perthshire and wider Scottish larder. "People who go to Clachan by Ballintaggart want a beautiful venue and they can have beautiful wild venison, they can have salmon cured with local whisky and they get beautiful Perthshire berries," says Rachel. Not that you'll find a strawberry on the Clachan by Ballintaggart menu in September when they simply "don't taste good!"

And while seasonality and provenance have been growing in importance in recent years, Rachel reckons lockdown encouraged more people to think locally and shop locally.

Family style

I remember in December 2020 while preparing for the government-stipulated Christmas dinner with only one other household, listening to debates on the radio about the most Covidsecure ways of serving the festive feast. People were encouraged to bring their own cutlery and portion everything individually. 




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



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How to choose YOUR perfect wedding music

Claire Muir quizzes the experts on how couples can best decide which musical acts they need throughout the day - and how you can keep these choices personal to the two of you

With a husband-to-be who was uber-into music, I knew we'd have no problems sorting out our wedding tunes. The only potential issue would be having far too many fave songs to squeeze into one day, especially as we'd asked guests to share requests on their RSVPs, too.

Thankfully, hiring an exclusive-use venue for two nights made space for extra musical accompaniments. On Friday night the bridal party mingled to a selection of chilled but cheesy songs and those who stayed over on Saturday were treated to a 90s Britpop-filled afterparty playlist.

Not everyone has had their wedding

music in mind for years or endless inspiration at their fingertips, though - and that's OK says Gerad McArthur, director at GeO Gospel Choir, which performs modern songs with a gospel twist. "It's your wedding so that means it's all about you and that should be reflected in your music choices," he says. "The importance of music on the day depends on what role it plays in your life. The attachments we make to music and how a song can literally take you back to the moment you met someone."

Where to start

There's no doubt about it, music is a critical part of any big day - "Music sets the whole atmosphere for a wedding," says Siobhán Rodger, director and musician with Amarone Music - and it deserves some careful consideration.

At Hireaband, Del Cotton is no stranger to supporting couples with wedding music. "You could copy Her Majesty the Queen and be wakened on your wedding day by a piper! The same piper could pipe you and your guests into the ceremony. Prior to and post-ceremony is perfect for classical music, from a string quartet or harpist - or uplifting music from a choir. At your reception, your piper is back on duty to welcome you, and while you're being photographed you could entertain your guests musically while they await your return."

Top tip from Del? Check if your evening band would offer an acoustic daytime set too to save on double the travel costs. Meanwhile, if you want your reception to go on into the wee hours (1am is the latest Del recommends), hire a DJ for after the band. "You get all the banging tunes that it's hard for a live band to recreate," he explains.

While some may go all out with music, others may be budget-conscious or just not that into it. Here, Gerad says

your bare minimum or "stand-out moments" will be your ceremony and first dance. "These are key moments for people when reminiscing and both revolve around music. There is nothing more sentimental and exciting for newlyweds than these lasting memories and they can be very much enhanced by live music. Lyric content is so important too."

Finding your vibe

At Splendid Gentleman, a Scottish wedding band with a twist, Dee McLaren says to start by looking around. "There's plenty of agencies and bands so don't just book one at the first showcase you go to. Ask friends for recommendations too."

Siobhán suggests looking at the options available and seeing which suppliers offer the kind of music you think will suit the feel of the day. "Have a look through their song lists, picture your venue, imagine yourselves in your wedding outfits and listen to some demos. You'll find the perfect music that will give you memories to last a lifetime."

When you've found the one (or ones!), Dee advises taking a look through the band's repertoire and picking out a few favourites that you definitely want played. "This helps to give us an indication of what your musical taste is like and a starting idea on how to build a set," he explains.

Keeping costs down? Tell your story through music and create your own playlists, suggests Roni Hyslop at All Wrapped Up Events Management. "Many couples ask their guests for their

favourite tracks and add them in. That's one way to guarantee a full dancefloor!" If you go for this option, help your wedding planner or event co-ordinator out by remembering to clearly label which part of the day each playlist is for.

So, is it a case of picking a theme and sticking to it all day? Or would a little mix and match work? "I don't think you need to restrict yourself to one style," says Gerad. "If the couple are very opposite individuals, having different styles only complements their day in the same way they complement each other."

What's hot right now?

According to Del, trends come and go but he has noticed a big increase in ceilidh bands and those that feature a live saxophone. "Sax players with a DJ or backing tracks performing an Ibiza-style set is very much in demand. But one thing that never changes is interest in bands with very strong vocals."

Looking to do something different? "We've had everything from singing waiters to spontaneous singsongs at dinner," says Roni. "One groom even delivered his speech in song form. At another wedding, the couple hired a band and while they were on their break, the bride's father's band took to the stage and did a set." She also recalls a couple of weddings where the festival-loving newlyweds had different bands take to the stage throughout the day, T in the Parkstyle.

That said, Del warns that being too quirky could leave out many of your guests. "There is such a wide variety in any wedding reception audience that it's wise to try and cater for everyone."



GeO Gospel Choir's **top five tips** for ceremony music

- At the time, it may feel like it takes a lifetime to walk down the aisle but realistically most bridal marches last about two minutes maximum. So, make sure you choose your favourite part of the song.
- 2. We advise couples to choose two songs for the signing of the register. You need to get settled, have pictures taken, deal with the legalities, pose again, then move back into position, and the last thing you want is an awkward silence after your song finishes.
- 3. The couple's exit should be a moment of celebration so pick something upbeat to walk out to.
- 4. Consider a special moment during your ceremony to make it unique. We've performed a 'pre-bridal' march song for the bridesmaids then a different song for the bride. Another couple requested gospel hymns and a favourite of ours is for 'secret singers' to pose as guests then burst out in song mid-ceremony.
- 5. It's your wedding day so make it personal and do YOU!

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
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

The family influence on their wedding didn't stop there. The couple chose to marry at St Salvator's Chapel in St Andrews, where Linnie's parents were married. "We are both from Catholic families, so it was always going to be a Catholic Church ceremony," she says. And having their ceremony in St Andrews, nearby Cambo Estate was the perfect find, with many guests commenting on its *Downton Abbey* vibe - "It was just so unique and full of character, so grand yet also so informal and welcoming."

Keeping with Cambo's style, they opted for a timeless theme with lots of botanical elements and nods to their heritage. "In an incredible stroke of good fortune, he received clearance to attend a mere 72 hours before the wedding," remembers Linnie. The rest of Zahaan's 10 groomsmen came from destinations including Canada, Germany, and Singapore. While he admits 10 seemed like a "ridiculous" number, each person was important to him. "He maintains 11 men in matching tuxedos make for great photos!" adds Linnie. While the men looked incredibly suave in their tuxedos, Linnie opted for a custommade A-line gown in ivory Chantilly lace from Rowanjoy. On the day, she accessorised with pearl and diamond earrings and a diamond bracelet and bangles from her mother-in-law, while her stepmother placed a Turkish nazar - evileye talisman- inside her dress for good luck. And to finish the good omens, her mum and maid of honour presented her with a sixpence to hide in her shoe, along with her late grandmother's brooch for her bouquet - "so she could be with me on the day."

MARRIED AT LAST

Linnie used to sing in choirs for weddings, so the couple knew they wanted one for their own and the University of St Andrews Chapel Choir obliged with a rendition of Hubert Parry's *I Was Glad* as she walked down the aisle. "It felt surreal that it was finally happening after nearly three years of planning and not knowing if it was ever going to happen," says Linnie. "I was so happy seeing everyone there together and seeing Zahaan grinning at me at the end of the aisle."

Saying their Catholic rite of marriage vows felt natural to Linnie - "There was a certain weight in those words, knowing they had been said for generations before."

CELEBRATE GOOD TIMES!

Back at Cambo, a string quartet entertained everyone with a mix of classical music and modern pieces like Maroon 5's *Girls Like You* in the *Bridgerton* style Linnie loves. Then it was time for their unexpected highlight, following their bagpiper Fergus down the grand staircase and into the candlelit wedding breakfast in the courtyard with friends and family thunderously clapping along. "It was magical" says Linnie.

Edinburgh School of Food and Wine served up a fantastic personalised three course menu before everyone moved into the main reception room for speeches. "Having them in this way created a lovely informal atmosphere," remembers Linnie.

When the party returned to the courtyard, the atmosphere was "easygoing and fun" with everyone dancing away to the Saltire Street Band followed by DJ Justin McEwan. The couple had filled the bar with drink and after the staff and DJ left it turned into a bit of a free for all. "Friends got behind the bar themselves which was really fun," says Linnie.

Looking back, she says being married "feels right" and advises other couples to not sweat the small stuff when planning. "Guests don't remember all the smaller details so those are just for you to have fun with." "Having a dependable wedding planner on the day was a huge support. Roni and Cait from All Wrapped Up were worth their weight in gold."

The night before her wedding, Nina was too excited to sleep and quite rightly so...!

"Since meeting up to finalise our new home in May 2019, I hadn't seen Vishal in person, only through Facetime. Words can't express how excited I was feeling to finally see him," remembers Nina. "I followed tutorials for advice and did a practice run the night before. It was the perfect romantic glow."

THE FIRST LOOK - IN A LONG TIME!

With just ten guests including the bride and groom - "Not just because of the pandemic but because we wanted an intimate wedding" - their civil ceremony took place at 23 Montrose Street. Exhilarated, animated and energised, Nina walked down the aisle to *At Last* by Etta James. "Vishal was waiting for me in full Scottish attire. Seeing him for the first time in months, I was smiling from ear to ear."



After the "short, sweet and intimate" ceremony it was on to The Ivy where more guests joined for a celebratory lunch. Then with happy bellies, the couple went their separate ways to do some final Indian wedding prep.

BEAUTIFUL TRADITIONS

The following day, fifty guests joined the couple at the bright, vibrant Om Hindu Mandir as they were blessed and married in the traditional Indian way. Vishal arrived wearing a Sehra, a headdress that wards off the 'evil eye' and prevents the groom seeing his bride pre-ceremony. Nina's mum marked Vishal's head with kumkum, a red powder, and he broke the sampan (a small clay pot), symbolising a willingness to overcome any obstacles they may face.

Once Nina arrived, the happy couple



exchanged beautiful rose garlands - a ritual known as 'Jaimala' that shows their acceptance of one another and the meaningful Hindu traditions continued. The priest began the 'Angi Puja', igniting the fire and welcoming the fire God, before they began the 'Mangalfhera' (circling the sacred fire) in prep for their vows.

Then, as husband and wife, it was time for the 'Sapta Pada'. "This is the most important ritual of the whole ceremony," explains Nina. "Hindu philosophy says if two people walk seven steps together they become lifelong friends. Each of our steps signified a different aspect of marriage we hope to uphold together."

Afterwards, it was on to The Regent Brasserie for a delicious array of starters, mains and desserts. "This venue was chosen by Rishi, Vishal's brother who has personally catered for many events. He was the perfect man to decide on the menu and chose a fantastic banquet to suit every palate."

The couple opted for a tower of individual sponge cakes, which meant Nina and Vishal could pick a selection of their favourite flavours - and ensure some were gluten-free and vegan.

Covid restrictions meant there was no DJ, dance floor or outside entertainment. But for Nina that didn't matter as they had each other. "Both families enjoyed eating, talking and drinking without face masks on. It was magical, electric and loud!"

The highlight of her night, however, was Vishal's speech. "He's very reserved and avoiding public speaking is his forte. But not that evening. He surprised all of our guests and really rose to the occasion," she smiles.

You can't beat a rustic tipi celebration with stunning, statement florals, and we promise Louise and Frankie's walled garden wedding won't disappoint... also got to choose our own suppliers without any restrictions," says Louise.

Known for loving a nautical theme, the bride found mussel shell place cards on Etsy and let her creative juices flow from there. She picked up napkin rings online, scoured local antique shops for vintage bottles and inherited glassware from friends. A trip to Hobbycraft had her sorted for easels and light-up letters, whilst her sister whipped up the tablet favours and a friend poured the candles.

More decorative details were added by the tipi company, then lots of beautiful blooms provided the perfect finishing touch to Louise's handiwork. "Flowers were so important given the plain nature of the tipi and Narcissus really made it all come together. Everything looked amazing without me having to specify exactly what went where. They knocked it out of the park!"

On the big day Louise woke at 6am, plagued with panic that she'd forgotten something! "That's the problem with a DIY wedding," she laughs. Fortunately, a big coffee sorted her out and everything ran smoothly from there. Bridal prep took place at her parents' house with The Gibsons capturing special moments. "It was great having the two of them as it allows you to capture things happening in different places. They were so good natured too, dealing with 12 small children and the notoriously late Kelly family!"







Order of service

For the uninitiated, a one or two-year engagement may seem like loads of time, but Oskar and George warn you need to secure some elements as soon as you can. "Venues and caterers definitely get booked fastest and honestly, it's hard to book the rest without a venue and a date," says George. "One-man businesses such as video/photo suppliers, celebrants and entertainment will likely be able to offer one slot per day," he adds, so again, secure them quickly.

Interestingly, a recent shortage of supply with hair and make-up specialists, means this is another category to book quickly. And don't be fooled into thinking getting married is the same whatever time of year you say "I do". "Floristry is the one to look out for as seasonality and increases in flower costing pushes the demand for bespoke and luxury suppliers," Oskar adds.

Avoid the pitfalls

Want to know the one drawback to marrying in Edinburgh? Everyone wants to be here and apart from the fabulous tourist attractions, it also plays host to events of national and global significance. "Accommodation can be tricky during peak seasons in terms of availability and cost," warns Oskar. "Major festivals during the summer months and around Christmas fill the city centre, often three to four times its population which has impact on its infrastructure, services and connectivity."

But don't be put off. "There is always an opportunity, from photography, to accommodation and eateries, so organising a wedding during these times (as long as it's not city centre) shouldn't be "too problematic," says George. "Just be relaxed and flexible."







Broomhall Pastle

The one with a rich history

History buffs will love the tales of Broomhall Castle near Stirling, built in 1874 and architecturally influenced by Balmoral Castle, the Queen's official Scottish residence. When the Johnstone brothers (whose business was ship building and wool mills) fell out, the younger of the two built the castle with a tower from which to look down upon his elder brother. Unfortunately, their business fell into decline, and they sold up to an Italian riding school. Four years later, the castle became Clifford Park School for Boys.

During the Second World War, while the schoolmaster and boarders feasted outside, the castle went up in flames - a strategy that meant German planes bombing the Clyde shipyards could fly out over the Ochil Hills, guided by light of the burning building. Extensively damaged, the ruin was finally rebuilt in the 80s and used as a nursing home. The last part of its journey came in 2003 when the current family refurbished it with hosting in mind.


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


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Boho vibes

Head of editorial Katie Bletcher explores all the delights of Dalmahoy Hotel & Country Club



I've a real sense of familiarity as I arrive at Dalmahoy Hotel & Country Club. Although this is the first time I've actually visited, over the years I've written about countless couples who've chosen to say "I do" here. And it's so easy to see why.




Whatever the weather

After two postponed wedding dates not even the effects of Storm Arwen and a power cut could stop this couple from finally getting hitched

It was a case of perfect timing when Scott and Mairi first got together. They met through a mutual friend in the Beer Kitchen in Dundee, but only after their original plans had fallen through. She was meant to be out the night before and he had planned to be in Edinburgh.

Skip forward two years and the couple were midway through a USA road trip when Scott proposed at the Grand Canyon, with a ring he'd designed himself - with help from Dundee jeweller Lorraine Law. "I picked it up about a week before we left for the USA and had it in a pouch, stuffed in a pair of socks!" he remembers. Once Mairi had said "yes" it was only fitting for the couple to return to Lorraine Law for their bespoke wedding rings.

Scott and Mairi planned to try for a baby before they tied the knot and before little Josh was born the only aspect of their wedding they had booked was their venue, The Rhynd. "It seemed to make sense to figure out where it would be and then we could hope that everything else fell into place with a small child around taking up our energy and attention!" remembers Mairi.

The couple wanted a blank canvas venue they could do whatever they wanted with and admit The Rhynd's free corkage was a big selling point. "We wanted to be able to treat our guests to a free bar for as long as possible and drink what we knew they'd like," says Scott. "The best weddings are always the ones where the drink is flowing!" They fell in love with the venue's rustic vibe and decorated with wooden "treeish" features and lots of candles.

A HITCH OR TWO BEFORE I DO

Like so many couples, Scott and Mairi were forced to postpone their wedding

not once, but twice, because of the pandemic. Despite the ever-changing situation and one groomsman Dean testing positive on the morning of the big day, they handled it like pros.

But even with their final wedding date in touching distance it still wasn't plain sailing. The day before their wedding, Storm Arwen hit the UK causing all sorts of travel disruption for guests. One friend managed to squeeze onto the last flight before they were cancelled, another couple had their boat from Belfast cancelled so had to switch to a Liverpool crossing, while one of the bridesmaids Sarah had a long and dangerous drive up from England. And far from having a relaxing night herself, Mairi, along with her bridesmaids, was layered up trying to keep warm thanks to a power cut in the farmhouse which meant the temperature dropped to just 4 degrees.





When the morning of the wedding arrived, Mairi's farmhouse was still without power so she and her girls popped to one of the bridesmaid's auntie's house in St Andrews for hot showers and then were moved to another house on The Rhynd's farm for all their wedding prep. Hair and make-up was two hours late in getting started but luckily the hair and make-up artists were completely chilled and took it all in their stride.

Walking down the aisle to Fleetwood Mac's *Songbird* in her stunning Finlandia dress by Pronovias - only the fifth one she tried! - you would never have known what a stressful morning Mairi had had. "I was calm and happy," she says. "It was so good to see Scott and Josh and everyone's smiling faces!"

The couple married in a personal humanist ceremony with their celebrant

Sarah Morrison ensuring plenty of audience participation. They wrote their own vows and admit there were a few wobbles getting their words out.

The speeches were equally sentimental. After Mairi's dad took everyone on a journey "talking about the environment, wars, spoons and forks" - Scott raised the bar for any groom-to-be in the room, revealing a book he'd written for his bride. Earlier in the year Mairi had released her first children's book; Mairi Moo is Starting School about a highland cow that was worried about starting school. "I'd often joked to Mairi - the human, not the cow! - that Scotty Moo should be a feature and it inspired me to write Mairi Moo Gets Married which traced our story up to the wedding day," he says.
