COVID and LFS: No Way Home Yet?

ARA sought to strive to serve, and now looks forward to the new normal

ARA Regional Secretary/TNT ARA Correspondent Dr. Al R. Dizon appraises how the Administrative Region of Asia managed to go through the pandemic and is perhaps now on the way home.



I CHOSE THIS TITLE not just because it is the title of the latest Spider-Man movie, which is in my opinion one of the best superhero movies ever but also because, in many ways, Peter Parker's journey mirrors the trials and tribulations of all APO brethren across the Administrative Region of Asia (ARA).

Peter is trying to return to some sense of normalcy after his identity is discovered. He longs to return 'home' to a reality that no longer exists. And when he finally finds a way to do so, it comes with great sacrifices.

We too are striving (I refuse to use the word "struggle") to return to some sense of normalcy, longing to return to our usual dose of leadership, friendship and service that we inject into our respective communities and as our usual way of life.

NOT EASY BUT NOTEWORTHY

"The process of going home is not easy," says Bro RD Paolo Ugale. "But we are striving." Indeed, the far-flung BOUs of ARA are trying to carry on being true-blooded APO brethren in a region on strict pandemic protocols of varying degrees of severity, especially with the onset of the Delta variant in summer and the Omicron variant

during the holiday season. Jobs and livelihoods of Apo brethren, and the future of their families back home, are at stake.

There were tragedies. Some of our members lost their parents and close relatives to Covid. Unable to pay their final respects due to travel restrictions, they grieved valiantly while all we could offer were our sympathies, prayers and condolences.

But through the pain we still managed to deliver noteworthy performances across many fronts from October to December 2021 in the name of our fraternity.

Membership data has always been dependent on the arrival of APO brethren in the respective host countries. With pandemic restrictions in place, we expected membership growth to be stunted. But we grew by 1.4%, thanks largely to growth in Thailand, Hongkong and Singapore.

In fact the most difficult challenge for BOUs is maintaining its membership roll. This means the already thin membership roll will become even thinner if there are departures from the host country. And departures could be due to better job offers elsewhere (which was the case of several brothers who left for Canada, New Zealand and the US), retrenchments, or nonrenewal of contracts. It is the membership roll that generates income for the BOUs.





ACTIVITIES

We mustered a total of 12 regional activities, including the ceremonial induction of a new set of officers for four BOUs (Taiwan AA, Singapore AA, Nihon-Nagoya AA, and Brunei Darussalam AA).

Organized as a region but working individually as BOUs, we mustered our resources, time and energy to extend help to the victims of Typhoons Maring and Odette; some BOUs were resourceful enough to link directly with affected communities to complement their relief operations.

Then there was the fitness challenge which was held to celebrate APO International's 96th anniversary; it required participants to cycle, walk or run.

Still striving to be better members, ARA also conducted webinars on leadership, communication skills, Robert's Rules of Order, cybersecurity awareness, APO Internet Code of Conduct and APO Brand Guide. These were in addition to webinars conducted by individual BOUs; an example is the cybersecurity webinar conducted by Singapore AA.

Including bloodletting campaigns, coastal cleanup campaigns, helping at soup kitchens and attending to the needs of various sections of Pinoy communities in their host countries, the BOUs carried out 78 certifiable activities between October and December 2021 alone.

This could only be interpreted as a testament to the resilience, commitment and desire of every member to fulfill our LFS aspirations. After all, we're entering almost the third year living with this pandemic, and we are all yearning for a return to our 'normal'.

SACRIFICES

Like Peter Parker, the way home lies before us but it will take sacrifices: -- of being an APO in thought, word and deed in whatever we do and in whatever circumstance, not when it is convenient for us; the sacrifice of not having sleep-overs and beer parties at brothers' flats; the sacrifice of getting rostered for service while observing very strict protocols that could get our brothers deported back to the Philippines; the sacrifice of minimum contact; the sacrifice of answering any call for help or query from ARA or BOU officers as a matter of fraternal courtesy and respect, of squeezing that last dollar for pass the hat incidents, and long zoom meetings within the BOUs and committees.

Section 2 Chair Sis Joan Paula Cuya attests to this. "Planning activities or service is always for a limited number of brothers/sisters," she says. "The restrictions could cause resentment among members which we must manage."


APOAAS, currently led by Bro Pres. Malvin Jariel (whose mum was claimed by the pandemic), found a way to satisfy the service appetite of members. It partnered with Singapore-based NGOs that allowed more members to participate so long as the wearing of masks, social distancing and no intermingling are strictly observed. Examples are soup kitchen Willing Hearts (up to 25 volunteers), sustainability NGO Litter Club (up to 20 volunteers), and blood bank Health and Science Authority.

"Through these 3 NGOs, we were able to increase the number of Brothers and Sisters joining the services." adds Sis Joan.

As an alumni group, APOAAS managed to carve a niche as a member of the sizable Filipino community in Singapore by participating in the BNG Healthy Run. The activity allowed the rest of the community to know more about APOAAS, its activities and members, thus giving it more latitude.

However, fellowships in APO during a pandemic is still a work in progress across ARA, pending host country protocols. Sis Joan says: "Singapore is still planning fellowship and fundraising activities like virtual poker games and bingo." She adds that Section 2 is also planning a physical Amazing Race across Singapore. "It will be broadcast via Zoom or Facebook Live."





THE WAY HOME

So far signs are pointing towards the end of the pandemic, to the relief of AA presidents and BOU section chairs across ARA. But I can assure you that the relief felt by everyone is not the result of any one factor, but because of many elements, including vigilance, fear, luck and vaccines – and in addition to APO brothers' conscientious and conscious compliance – which came together to subdue a terrifying pandemic.

But Bro RD Paolo, who is a trained nurse, advises caution. "The coming end of the emergency doesn't mean we are 100% free. We are sending a clear message to all our BOUs that we can only relax gradually," the ARA RD says.

"The pandemic taught us that we do not need to live in fear," Sis Joan says. "We need to be resilient and more adaptable. We adjust to the NEW NORMAL. If there's another pandemic, we will also be ready."

Plans are afoot for regionally-unified bloodletting, coastal clean up and other service activities, including some ambitious webinars and other innovative programmes.

Perhaps Bro RD Paolo and the entire collective leadership of ARA are right. Perhaps it is not about waiting for things to go back to a previous reality. It is about making the best out of the one we've got.



ORA ET LABORA: A Life of Service with Prayer and Work

THIS IS THE STORY of an Aphio servant of almost four decades, my fellow Ormocanon, SPC's Editor-In-Chief (St. Peter's College of Ormoc), former Public Relations at the House of Representatives, former President of APO General Santos City Alumni Association (GAAM), former Regional Director of Southern Mindanao Administrative Region (SMAR), founder of APO Chefs AA, CEO of Gerardo's School of Culinary Arts (GSCA), former Chairman of the Board of Trustees, incumbent Vice Chair of the International Council of APO, Benedictine Awardee, servant, and one of my mentors in Alpha Phi Omega – Bro Gerardo "Gerry" Evangelista Arbis.

In the year 1991, one of the deadliest typhoons, Uring, struck Ormoc City. Brod Gerry was one of the Ormoc flash flood survivors, already serving APO for 5 years. I was a little 5-year-old kid who almost lost her life from the flashes of water

GENERAL SANTOS CITY – In December 2021, as an aborigine of the frequently struck Eastern Visayas, knowing that the 15th storm to hit the country was extremely strong, Brod Gerry's memories of the 1991 Uring and 2013 Yolanda prompted him to anticipate and prepare as early as the eve of December 16, APO's Founding Anniversary. Before Odette hit Surigao, together with his wife Sis Faith Arbis, APO Chefs AA, and the GSCA students, he raised funds, without any identification of which region it would go.

When word came that Typhoon Odette violently and drastically hit Surigao City and the whole CARAGA Region, hastily, he called up RD Tatay Amor for assessment and details. In a



snap of time, NVPA Sis Nancy Go assisted on the communications wherein APO Singapore AA, thru President Malvin Jariel, was the first responder in terms of finances. Funds penetrated APO Chefs' Urgent Relief Operations. Among those who primed and interceded was the Committee on National Service for Health headed by Dr. Edna Corpuz-Navallo and NTA Dr. Edward Flores; APO ng DABAW AA; APO SCAA (Surigao City Alumni Association); Eta Chi AA; APO TIKAAS AA; APO PSI; APO Beta Rho: APO POLAAS AA: APO Trekkers: and individual donors. Day and night, APO Chefs AA and GSCA students labored for the purchasing and repacking of goods.

On Christmas Day at 6 pm, the first operations took place. Priority goods were food and water. The team, led by Bro Gerry, braved the roads off from General Santos City to Surigao for 12 to 15 hours and successfully

handed the truck of goods to RD Tatay Amor and Sis Dorizza. Recipients were APO brods and sis in the region, as well as those situated in the severely damaged Siargao Island. The first wave was productive; however, there was a necessity to provide more, and kind-hearted individuals kept flooding their love through donations for the victims. Thus, another wave of operations was imperative.

Come wave 2 operations with the same solidarity and routine. It was January 6, a day after his birthday when the team left again at 6 in the evening for another 12 to 14hour trip. This time, there was a convoy of two pick-up vehicles and one large truck that carried goods and water. On their entry

to Butuan City, Brgy. De Oro, its first barangay, on a scheme of hump with boulders in the surroundings, at dusk before the sun rose, with only too little light at 70 kilometers per hour (kph), with a curve downward asphalted area that was unpleasant, turned the pick-up upside down on a major collision. It was an extreme rollover vehicular accident. It was only a few 15 minutes to Butuan City and the border of the Municipality of Prosperedad, Agusan del Sur, but history happened. The team found themselves on the side of the boulders, with severe intrusion, on their severely dilapidated vehicle. Sis Faith and the other chefs were unrestrained. Despite the severity, Brod Gerry came to realize that everyone was safe and unhurt. Two vehicles that arrived were good Samaritans who checked on them. Sis Mary Ann Otome then received a call from Bro Gerry that they needed to go back on the road to help. APO Butuan rapidly responded and sent a rescue team. Despite the incident, the five of them were able to extricate themselves, without any bruise, without any laceration, and without any scars, only the scar of faith and service.







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My eyes had seen Bro Gerru's works from the farthest mountain slopes in Mindanao, to the nearest inlands of our hometown Ormoc, and to wherever APO may need service, in him, my forefather, my mentor, and APO's legend, is a fount of selfless love and service to humanity.

The team continued their journey and mission of delivering the relief goods. The provisions did not only mean food and water to the brods and sis in the CARAGA region, it also meant unconditional brotherly love and unbounded service.



The most recent, given the 70mph high collision rollover, was in fact, a miracle leaving him with no scar. An Anniversary Service Project Like No Other

LAST DECEMBER 16, 2021 as the Alpha Phi Omega Philippines marks its 96th anniversary, an early morning Coastal Cleanup at the Las Pinas-Paranaque Wetland Park (LPPWP) also known to the conservation world as the Las Pinas-Paranaque Critical Habitat becomes the unusual but very important service project to start off this meaningful event.

As early as 6 am on this cold and windy December morning, APO brothers and sisters from various chapters of the NCAR, led by the APO National President Sis Norma Singson-De Leon, converge to help clean-up part of the coastline of this 175



hectare protected area, whose mudflats have become a source of food for 5,000 birds every day. These include migratory birds that come to escape the harsh Siberian Winter at this time of the year until around February. Some of these migratory birds include the Whiskered Tern, Common Sandpiper, Whimbrel, Black-Winged Stilt and the Great-Tailed Tatler among many, many others.

A MOA signing between the National President and DENR NCR Executive Director Sis Jacqueline Caancan (Theta Chapter) on the care of the trees planted at the La Mesa Dam last November 21, 2021 took place at the open-air function area of the LPPWP, where social distancing was observed, after the coastal clean-up activity. Lectures from DENR field officers also caught the interest of the APO volunteers who eagerly listened and learned so much new information on the season of migration and the migratory birds. APO TELEMEDICINE: HEALTHCARE INSTITUTION WITHSTANDING VARIANTS OF COVID-19 IN ITS EXCELLENT VIRTUAL HOMECARE MANAGEMENTS AND MEDICAL INTERVENTIONS

COLLABORATIVE PROCESSES AND SUSTAINABILITY

Our fraternity's provision of accessible and more convenient healthcare at this time of the pandemic saved many not only by cost and time but also from the risk of acquiring diseases or more complicated ones. APO TeleMedicine's birth and the brilliant invention of processes are attributed to the leadership of our National President (NP) Sis Norma Singson-De Leon, Board of Directors, Operations, and all of the volunteers. From the healthcare professionals of APO to the business sectors, to the technical experts, to any professional brother or sister who volunteered, its operations became as huge as a healthcare institution that was virtual but effective and significant in combating the earliest COVID-19, to the Delta variant, and now on the deadly Omicron. Tools and care management interventions were created and executed through a collaborative process and communication by the medical and nonmedical teams, and these were highly maintained. The positive impacts of TeleMed as improving patient management had expanded and served more brothers and sisters, as well as their families. For almost a year now, the board of directors, doctors, nurses, admin-ITs, finance team, supplies team, the COVID monitoring team, and all volunteers had served the project that made homecare management possible.

STATISTICS

In January 2022, the highly transmissible Omicron variant surged and has peaked in Metro Manila. The alarming new infections in NCAR and its neighboring regions had reached the highest number of cases in APO TeleMed. On its January 31, 2022 statistics, a total of 1,235 patients were served. A bulk of 144 cases of virtual consultations hiked up from January 10th to January 16th, the highest in TeleMed history. It was assumed that the new and sudden spike in cases was being driven by the fast-spreading variant, something that was confirmed by health officials on January 15th. TeleMed cases started to decrease in late January.

TELEMED IN COMBATING OMICRON

The surge greatly affected the turn-around-time of the project's operations but service at its best was still evident. Indeed, it was the climax of the "other-fishes-needed-to-be-fried" roles of volunteers. TeleMed operations' team meddled and snooped on the toxic schedules of doctors. They had to gatecrash at any available time there was. Daily consults of Dr. Mon and Dr. Gerald were approximately up to 15 patients. Dr. Dodee and Dr. Roselle's in between clinic and hospital hours, as well as the rest of the volunteer doctors, were at times, interfered. Some of them did consults on their break time and even after clinic/hospital hours, up to as late as 9 pm, just to accommodate patients.

Multitasking evolved among the different teams. NVPA Sis Nancy Go from the Nurses' Team had to learn new tasks and exerted beyond expertise to host zoom consults due to the intensity of cases that

needed to be processed. Admin team Sis Gina Gimenez. Sis Joio Espino, and Sis Maryam Khadem had also over-timed excessively during Omicron's peak. Google forms reflect on the system even during wee hours and nurses had to process these as soon as whoever was available. Sis Jojo, doing both admin task on hosting, processing forms, and calling patients, was struck by flu; however, managed to multi-task and still help with the operations. Sis Maryam, despite her diverse time zone, adapted to the Philippines' surge and need. EVAR RD Sis Gina's family was hit by COVID-19 during the peak days but still gave her best hands to uphold operations. Alpha Phi Omega's virtual clinic hours took history as early as 8 am to as late as 9 pm, admins and nurses were behind these cases 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.





COVID KITS, SUPPLIES, DONORS

According to APO TeleMed Treasurer, Sis Joy, the last time prior to Omicron that the financial report was posted on Nov. 16, 2021, no transactions were done as COVID cases went down; however, during the surge, TeleMed spent more than a hundred thousand pesos to purchase supplies and spent more on delivery fees. The team behind the most essential and valuable COVID kit were Sis Chelle Baldonado, Sis Geraldyn Usog, Sis Margarette Remolin, Sis Gina Gimenez, Sis Nancy Go, and Sis Nica Velasco. Sis Nica, after being monitored and managed well as one of the patients, saw the need to urgently help on the deliveries. She promptly volunteered the time she was discharged from care. The demand for kits increased which included surgical masks, paracetamol, vitamin C with Zinc, azithromycin/levofloxacin, dexamethasone, oximeters, and thermometers. Supplies were depleting and the demands required the team to exert extra miles, even go under the heat of Divisoria for purchases. NP Sis Norma and Dr. Edna had to acquire sources of other medicines due to their scarcity, particularly, paracetamol and azithromycin. There was non-stop sending of kits to different locations.

The call for donations and funds from different regions, AAs, and chapters, as well as the urgent call for more volunteers, were emphasized by NP Sis Norma, Chairman Bro Archie Bugarin, Dr. Edna Navallo, as well as the rest of the TeleMed Family. Many had donated supplies, most especially medicines, others reached out thru funding. Donations are reflected in TeleMed's monthly financial report. The National Office thru Sis NED Evelyn Evangelio acknowledges these thru receipts and transfers the fund to APO TeleMed. The Finance team issues an electronic certificate to each donor as a sign of gratitude.

LONG-TERM INTERVENTIONS FOR APO

TeleMed in its manpower of healthcare professionals was also able to unite and gather volunteers in the recent tuli missions and services among regions which include massive vaccinations. Its doctors, nurses, and other volunteers are with the Committee on National Service for Health who also implemented a few medical services for APO. The collaborative interventions, processes, management tools, resources, and healthcare team behind this virtual APO institution had always been feasible in the homecare management of COVID. APO members and their families were grateful to TeleMed and all its donors. Thus, as one great circle in serving humanity, any Greek variant of any deadly disease could be fought by the unity and genuine "kindness" of every member, kindness thru time, talent, and treasure – the three things that made APO TeleMed operational for almost one year now, and in any test of diseases.

Home is Where the Heart is: The Unveiling of the APO Building Project

To their credit, fund raising activities have been organized and much has also been done to produce collaterals and plans. The task today grows even bigger and the dream -closer and bolder- to make this building come to life. NP sis Norma said in her speech that she is just "an instrument to help make this happen



and it will become real because of our brothers and sisters whom we will work hand in hand with." The aim is not just to build a big and beautiful APO building fit for the stature of an Alpha Phi Omega member, but to build a home where its members will continue to make APO grow and serve others, the best that they can.

Video speeches of past National Presidents and members, to inspire and welcome the dawn of this project, were also presented.



APO Building: Towards APO Centennial Celebration

PROJECT BRIEF

This project aims to construct the APO Building in preparation for our organization's 100th anniversary in 2025. The APO Building Committee will spearhead the said project in light of the approval of our current APO National President, Sis Atty. Norma S. De Leon. Alpha Phi Omega will be creating a common ground for every member of this organization to create a haven where everyone is welcome.



The proposed project shall be self-sustaining, meaning that the inclusion of commercial spaces will be introduced once the building design is finalized. This will serve as an income-generating solution for the organization, and more specifically the building to have its funds. Other than commercial areas, the idea of multi-purpose halls is included to serve different functions for the organization. Lastly, are the transient rooms for the members of APO from different provinces. These are low-cost spaces that would cater to those parts of the organization that are in need of a place, not only are we able to accommodate our brothers and sisters but also, again, generate income for the sustenance of the building.

THE CONCEPT

As discussed with our national president, Atty. Norma S. De Leon, there are three possible ways where the organization can make the project possible. This was made to see both sides of different situations from which APO can benefit. The capital generated from these solutions will be the foundation of how the finalized form of the building will be done.

First, every alumni member of the organization shall be asked to donate an amount of 2,000 pesos to the organization. In cases where the individual is not



able to do so, alumni associations would be tasked to shoulder that member- this is aside from the donations that would be given by the association alone.

Second, alumni associations that are more capable of donating more than the required monetary assistance will be welcomed to do so as they please. This is to higher the chances of the building having a more appealing outcome as more capital funds it is.

And finally, fundraising projects would be done accordingly also to support the needed capital for the building to make its progress. These proposed projects are made entirely for the building's monetary budget, making collected profits go straight to the dedicated APO Building bank account.

OBJECTIVE

The Alpha Phi Omega organization aims to create a mark in its timeline where it can make its presence known to the public, that it is more than just a fraternity, it is a society that sustains its brother and sisterhood for life- having connections that help strengthen this institution as one. This

building will serve as a unison area for the APO society to come together and create moments that would help improve not only the circle within us but also reach out to those that are in need outside our borders.

CONSIDERATIONS AND STRATEGIES

As per discussion by the Building Committee, along with the APO national president- Atty. Norma S. De Leon, there are two ways in which the department is considering how the project could commence. These are some of the ways the department have planned to create the Alpha Phi Omega building by 2025:

First, the APO Building Committee will seek out foreclosed property from the banks. These are buildings that are existing but have yet to be occupied again. Buildings of this type are usually those that have been already occupied but are still in their best condition. The amount of work needed for this option is very minimal since the building is already present and needs no more construction to be done. What would only be needed are face-lifting and renovations from inside-out, to correct what's been left and improve what is already existing. This is a more economic

way where our organization can somehow spend a little less than the usual ground-up construction.

Second, the APO Building Committee would plan the construction of the APO Building from the ground up. The committee would be in charge from the initial planning up to its last phase for construction. This would take a little more time to revise the design to its final form and plan to be able to maximize the use of the structure to the extent for the designated users. In this idea, the building could be more specific in terms of its interior planning and space allocation. The form of the building could also be shaped into something that is timely and is up to present trends in building design.

DEMOGRAPHICS

The purpose of the construction of the APO Building is to cater to the alumni members and create a space where every brother and sister can be welcomed. APO Building's target occupants would be all the people that comprise Alpha Phi Omega as a whole. This will be a peoplecentered structure that would be the start of other humanitarian projects that the organization would have in the future.

The goal is to empower awareness within our members regarding our grassroots and honoured traditions; and also to have this breakthrough be accredited by the National Historical Commission of the Philippines.



Alpha Phi Omega Connects the World



The outcome of the Online Scouting Forum via Zoom generated realizations about the importance of Technology in the BSP Training and online training is the only substitute for F2F training.

The said Forum was concluded by ANCOS Chairman, Brother John Tenchavez as he reiterated Three (3) important virtues: Humility, Unity and Equality and he emphasized that "lisa ang mithiin ng APO. Magkaisa tayong lahat. Balik Scouting lahat for humility, unity, and equality. We are not serving man, we are serving the Lord." The Forum was ended by Scouter Brother Amado Victor Saguincin, ANCOS Committee Member with Scout Benediction.

The "Gorgeous" part of the change is the continuous conduct of Online ROVIC with a peace of mind that it is legit and recognized by the BSP. Building Connections and Uniting Medical Professionals for the Healthcare Services in Alpha Phi Omega

NSH HISTORY, MISSION, AND BEYOND

The APO Committee on National Service for Health is a new addition to the APO Philippines Inc. standing committees. Its mission vision is to help in the delivery of health care through direct and indirect services by organizing the various health sectors of Alpha Phi Omega.

In the virtue of compassion to serve in Alpha Phi Omega, the provision for healthcare through assistance in the medical needs in this brotherhood is essential. The Committee on National Service for Health was formerly known as, "Committee on National Service for Medical" and "Committee on National Service for Dental." The committee was established in DY 2019-2021 during the time of our Past National President (NP) Marcelino "Tatang" Ferry. It was a national service program whose purpose was to reach out to our fellow Filipinos by conducting a quarterly Medical/Surgical/Dental Mission in line with the NEC/BOT meeting, which was usually conducted a day before the meeting. When the pandemonium started, the mobilization of the said committee was abruptly stopped; hence, the prohibition of these healthcare services.

This DY 2021-2023, NP Sis Norma Singson-De Leon concluded to continue the program that would deliver again healthcare to our fellowmen. The limitations of the services that the previous committees could provide were now given a more heightened intervention that would fuse both the medical and dental services, and also acquire more allied health professionals. The integration of brothers and sisters from different specializations in healthcare led to its new name, The Committee on National Service for Health (APO NSH).





Appointed to the committee are Bro Dr. Edward Allan Flores, NSH Project Trustee, and Sis Dr. Edna Corpuz-Navallo, NSH Chairman. Committee and sub-committee members were mostly from the noble APO TeleMedicine Project, namely Bro Dr. Ramon Reyes; Sis Madel Camposano-Kho, MPA; Sis Nadia Espanol, RN; and Sis Maryam Padayao. Other comm and subcomm members are Bro Dr. Ferdinand Abon; Bro John Paul de Leon, MD; Sis Janina Javier, DMD; Bro Darryl Martinez, DMD; and Sis Abegail Cruz.

APO HEALTHCARE ON WHEELS

On December 15, 2021, as its prime service and anniversary project, NSH emanated the APO Healthcare on Wheels in partnership with Mayon Laboratories and APO NCAR thru Regional Director Kevin Dy. The project was organized and facilitated by NSH Chairman Dr. Edna Navallo and Sis Madel Camposano-Kho, together with the assistance of APO TeleMedicine volunteers, National Executive Director Sis Evelyn Evangelio, and the rest of the National Administrative Office (NAO) staff. The mobile laboratory was set up at the NAO perimeters. The mobile lab offered less affordable blood chemistry services and other diagnostic work-ups. A total of 62 patients were served. The project benefited many brothers and sisters, as well as their families. It was only the start of such service. NSH and NCAR plan to redo another one in March 2022.

NSH'S PROMPT RESPONSE ON TYPHOON ODETTE

In NCR, when Sis Nadia Espanol received communication that the scarcity of water in Cebu was alarming, NSH Chair Dr. Edna Navallo, together with the whole committee, promptly devised efforts for water relief operations despite the distance. NSH was able to raise funds and it was heaven-sent that APO Iligan offered to man the operations, given the fact that they were the nearest and had feasible access for water transport to Cebu City during the peak of Odette. APO Iligan service initiators were Bro OBrien Cris Navalta and Bro Albert Eric Orquieza. The operations, day and night, were led by Sis Joy Bramida and its logistics

was worked out by Bro JMson Calalang with the assistance of Bro Lee Roy Beley in the Iligan port. It was a puzzle on how to build the Iligan-Cebu-NSH-NCAR team due to Cebu's dead communication lines. APO Iligan religiously gathered, cleaned, sanitized, and refilled the containers in Iligan City day and night. Drinking water was transported via roro from Iligan City to Cebu City and many APO brethren received help. APO Central Visayas Administrative Regional Director Bro Eduard Zenarosa Jr. and Sis Ericka Abello, despite the challenges of communication, facilitated logistics on the receipt of the water up to its distribution to brods and Sis Hence, the supply was also able to reach out to non-APO who sought help. APO friends with babies who needed potable drinking water were also supplied. The operations were not limited once but consecutive waves of water transport from Iligan to Cebu were wielded until then that CVAR had regained its supply when the electricity was slowly fixed. It was a successful bridging of three different regions for an emergency relief operation that helped Cebu brothers and sisters.

NSH PROJECTS AND SERVICES

Expansion of the mobile laboratory. Through this service, all the members, not only in NCAR but also members around the country especially the elder brods and sis, would benefit by getting their laboratories/blood works done to be evaluated.

APO Blood Bank. Through this project, APO members would be assured that whenever there is a need for blood, there is availability, either for personal or for family use.

Medical, Surgical, and Dental Services (for new normal). This program will help not only non-APO members but also brods/sis in remote areas needing medical, surgical, and dental assistance, as well as their family members. RDs, as well as the other officers of the respective regions, could help thru information dissemination of the upcoming projects. More participants would benefit from the said activity and at the same time, there is more exposure of APO to the community.


APO NGAR SUPPORTS APO FUTURE LAWYERS

AFTER **SERIES POSTPONEMENTS** and a couple of suspensions, the 2020/2021 Bar Examination was finally held last February 4 & 6, 2022. Unlike the previous exams that were centralized and were only conducted in the University of Sto. Tomas, Manila, this year's Bar, dubbed the "best ever" because it is so far the largest in history with more than 11,000 registered examinees for the combined 2020 and 2021 batches, was held in 31 local testing centers around the country to respond to the Covid-19 pandemic and to undertake measures to curb the spread of the coronavirus.

The Supreme Court of the Philippines through this year's Bar Committee Chairperson Associate Justice Marvic M.V.F. Leonen also mandated numerous restrictions. Examinees will have to undergo self-quarantine and should be tested negative from covid at least 72 hours before they will be allowed to take the examination.

2,000 LUMAD FAMILIES IN BUKIDNON RECEIVED MEDIA NOCHE PACKAGE & GIFTS FROM APO LIPA AA 156

LUMAD IS A BISAYAN TERM meaning "native" or "indigenous". They were the non-Muslim indigenous people in Mindanao. The collective term is used to describe the about 13 ethnic groups of Mindanao, including the Blaan, Bukidnon, Higaonon, Mamanwa, Mandaya, Manobo, Mansaka, Sangir, Subanen, Tagabawa, Tagakaulo, Tasaday, and T'boli. They are slash-and-burn farmers who also fish, hunt, gather, and practice little trade.

On December 28, 2021, we, the APO Lipa Alumni Association 156, headed by its

Alumni Association 156, headed by its President Bro Wilbert "Weng" Borres, started the series of Gift Giving and Feeding for the Lumads of Bukidnon so that they may have something to partake in welcoming 2022.

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Together with the Philippine Army with two army trucks, we traversed mountains, hills, rivers and forested areas bringing gifts for the community in remote rural areas.

First stop was the remote barangay of Imbayao in Malaybalay City Bukidnon in the morning of December 28. We brought food packs, apples and large lechon for the residents. Upon arrival. Barangay Officials headed by Punong Barangay Jean T. Maputi and the residents welcomed us with smiles and excitement. One hundred households received spaghetti packages and large Del Monte Juice drinks. Distribution was held in their barangay covered court, surrounded with mountains and beautiful scenery. Almost 150 residents, mostly children, had their lechon rice for meals with apples. We, the soldiers, volunteers and the whole community ate lunch together.

Then we went down and traveled uphill again to our afternoon site at Barangay Capitan Angel, Malaybalay City. More





than 100 households received spaghetti packages and Del Monte Juice drinks. Around 150 children were enthusiastic and happy to have their lechon rice for meals with apples.

Alaska Milk products from Luzon also arrived in Bukidnon through partnerships with the Philippine Coast Guard, Philippine Air Force, and Philippine Army. This cooperation with the military was crucial in transporting gift items from Luzon to Mindanao.

On December 29, media noche packages were distributed in the morning to 150 households of BarangayCan-AyaninMalaybalay City. Residents gathered in the barangay covered court to receive ingredients for making spaghetti, Del Monte juice and Alaska Milk products.

The Philippine Army, who are very familiar with the area, recommended that we push forward to Sitio Miaray in Barangay Mandahican, a far-flung area in Cabanglasan, Bukidnon. We were teary-eyed, and emotional upon our arrival when the Lumad tribe leader welcomed us with a solemn prayer and a program of sorts. We also played games, danced, and handed out Alaska Milk products media noche meal packs to 150 families. Seeing the families smile and hearing the words, "Daghang salamat," were priceless rewards for this small gesture of compassion and service.

On December 30 we found ourselves in yet another obscure area called Purok 17, Barangay Casisang, Malaybalay City where we apportioned the gift items and Alaska Milk products to more than 100 children.

January 2, 2022, unwavering Bro Weng Borres, together with his family, and the rest of APO Lipa AA pressed forward even farther to Purok 1, Sitio Patpat, Alanib, Lantapan for our 6th community recipients of Alaska Milk products. Each family received 4 cans of Ube Macapuno Alaska Milk. Estimated thousand one individual beneficiaries. 300 more

Around 300 children ranging from 10 years old and above benefitted from the free circumcision led by APO Lipa AA 156 with its main partner APO Alpha Chapter AA.

This free circumcision is a yearly endeavor of APO Lipa AA 156 under the leadership of President Brother Wilbert "Weng" Borres.





Children with their parents and guardians arrived at the covered court of the school as early as 6 in the morning. The registration started at seven in the morning where the young boys will be about to face manhood.

Before starting the operation, APO Brothers and Sisters asked for guidance and blessings from our Lord, especially that we are still in a pandemic stage. The safety of everyone is our first concern.

Everyone is required to sign a consent waiver, wear a facemask, observe social distancing and always follow other safety protocols. Parents or guardians are not allowed inside the operation rooms.



Children underwent circumcision via laser operation and some via conventional surgery. Laser operation was associated with a shorter operative time, less wound irritation and better cosmetic appearance compared with standard surgical techniques for circumcision.

As part of growing up and the dictates of Christian faith, young boys must undergo the practice or custom called "circumcision" as their trademark to manhood.


Apart from the operation, the importance of circumcision was realized by the young boys as well as the proper hygiene after the circumcision.

APO EVAR Bringing Safe Water For All One Bucket at a Time

THE IMPORTANCE OF WATER cannot be overstated enough. We use water for drinking and maintaining our body functions, for washing, cleaning, cooking, and growing food. Ironically, when a typhoon strikes, this most precious resource becomes even more scarce, especially in remote areas. When typhoon Odette struck the Visayas and northern Mindanao, it left in its wake hundreds dead, missing or injured with thousands and thousands more rendered homeless. Millions were affected due to limited access to basic necessities such as power, water and communications.

True to our nature, Alpha Phi Omega swiftly responded by bringing food packs, hygiene kits and basic household goods such as pots, pans and tabo so that families can start rebuilding their lives sooner. In most cases, our relief volunteers were one of the firsts, if not the first to arrive with aid to severely affected families in far-flung areas. Our brothers and sisters risked life and limb and travelled for hours – even days – over damaged roads and bridges so they could bring truckloads of bottled clean water to the stricken communities.



The APO EVAR Service Committee conducted training and live demonstration on the proper installation, use, maintenance and backwashing of the filter system before the turn over.



Alas, while the APO relief package assuaged hunger and quenched thirst, these efforts cannot provide the impacted communities with clean water continuously, especially as it would take months before the water supply would be back to normal. The lack of potable water inadvertently caused an increase in the cases of waterborne and foodborne illnesses, influenza-like illnesses, leptospirosis, and dengue (W.I.L.D.) diseases. Thus it is important to have access to water, sanitation, hygiene or WASH facilities and to maintain sanitation inside the evacuation centers.

Hence APO EVAR launched Project Water By The Bucket. It aims to prevent and control water-borne disease in communities affected by Typhoon Odette in Southern Leyte by providing access to clean, safe water through distribution of cost-efficient portable water filter systems.

In partnership with APO Theta Zeta AA, APO La Salle AA, APO Bahrain AA and Waves for Water Philippines, APO EVAR would distribute 30 units of bucket-type systems. This initial contribution is estimated to provide 3000 people from the towns of Pintuyan, St. Bernard and Limasawa Island in Southern Leyte. With clean water every day for the next 5 years. Depending on available resources, we hope to bring the system to other communities as well.

AAs and chapters interested to bring this safe water initiative to their respective areas may coordinate with the author.



Ever in Service: EVAR Heads Relief Operations to Odette-hit Communities

ON THE **AFTERNOON** OF DECEMBER 15. 2021. super typhoon Odette made a landfall in the southeastern part of the Philippines. With a maximum wind speed of 195 kilometers per hour and heavy rainfall, its ninetime landfall has replaced the holiday excitement with dread and destruction. An unwelcome visitor to what should have been a time for cheer and joyous Yule preparation.

Odette's devastation has been widely documented, reaching far and wide as Palawan in the Luzon, and has also badly hit provinces in Mindanao and Visayas including Surigao del Norte, Cebu, and Southern Leyte. The extent of economic loss has pegged billions worth of damage, with the agricultural sector alone reporting 8 billion Pesos worth of damages. While past experiences have allowed

projected landfall areas to brace for a category 5 typhoon like Odette, the conditions made after the typhoon had not made it any easier for affected communities to thrive in the initial days following its landfall.

Despite preparation, locals have found themselves in a desperate search of food, water, and basic survival necessities. Those who had remaining parts of their houses were lucky to have a shelter for the days to come, while some were not very fortunate to have a recognizable feature of what used to be their home.

Painting a scenario of the realities the locals had to endure in the wake of typhoon Odette is a necessary primer to the stories of Bayanihan, recovery, and service to our fellowmen that rose above loss and tragedy.

Keeping the Fire of Service Ablaze: APO – EVAR in Action

Among the many volunteer and service organizations in the region, it goes to say that understanding narratives of both loss and hope occurs naturally to the brothers and sisters of Alpha Phi Omega – EVAR. Situated in one of the highly-indexed hazard-prone regions in the Philippines, its locals cope with disasters with an almost bitter-sweet familiarity. Typhoon Odette, thus, is no exception.

Calls for service initiatives and partnerships with alumni, collegiate, and foreign based BOUs have set the motion for relief operations that were conducted in the succeeding days after Odette's landfall. The administrative region was able to amass cash donations that were allocated to food and relief packs distribution to affected communities. For instance, total count of donations amount to Php 630, 611.110 as of January 30, 2022 with a total number of 2,344 relief packs distributed to areas Bontoc, Hinundayan, Liloan, Malitbog, Maasin, Pintuyan, San Juan, San Ricardo, and Sogod.

Moreover, BOU assessments were conducted by the administrative region to ensure no brother or sister will be left behind. Over 200 APO members were able receive relief packs and cash assistance along with the 2,454 locals who have received inkind support while recovery is in process. Through road obstructions and debris that hindered previously traversable passage, APO-EVAR delivers our program of service where it is called.

Teams mobilized by BOUs or volunteer brothers and sisters continue to extend help, seeking areas and communities that could benefit from the humble assistance amassed through collaboration and Bayanihan.

TRASH FREE COASTLINES: APO HELP KEEP OUR BEACH CLEAN



When we arrived at Villa Guerrero in Brgy. Buhangin, we were welcomed by our host Brod Marco and brothers and sisters from Mu Rho, Mount Carmel College (PC 094), APO Baler AA and APO MarAu AA. I immediately felt their warm hospitality. They also offered us food, snacks, and drinks. I just met them for the first time, but I feel very at home around them.

Around dinner time, the delegates from other sections/provinces also arrived. We kicked off the activities with Collegiate Talk led by Joselito Atlas Lopez, CLAR Regional Director for Collegiate We gathered the collegiate members, and we set

up a bonfire. Section 3 Collegiate Chairman Erika Verayo and I (as COME member) helped facilitate the discussion. They actively participated and we learned about their challenges such as recruitment, school recognition, rover and other requirements for ID application. We were able to come up with possible solutions to their concerns.

Other participants from different sections are expected to arrive, but the checkpoint will not allow access after 10:00 p.m. They'll have to wait until 5:00 a.m. to get in.

We soon called it a night, and our group chose to spend the night near Sabang beach at Brod Jayson's kubo in preparation for an early morning coastal cleanup. Unfortunately, it began to rain heavily at 2:00 am and stopped just in time for daybreak.





I was bursting with enthusiasm when I woke up. I was quite ecstatic. I went to the beach only to discover that due to the high tide, it was impossible to perform a cleanup drive.

We went back to Villa Guerrero for breakfast and briefing with all the participants. After a short prayer, we went to our respective destinations. We have 2 separate venues for the activities. I was tasked to join the team of Brigada Pagbasa/Gift Giving in R. Zubia Elementary School. The second group went to Sitio Clemente to assist with the optical and medical mission.

The Xi Alumni Association collaborates with DRS Save Eye Care Center optometrists to provide optical services to people of Sitio Cemento, Brgy. Zabali, Baler. A total of 148 patients have taken advantage of the free optical checkup and consultation. 24 people are scheduled for cataract surgery and pterygium removal. If they have Philhealth, the operation will be free of charge. Their transportation to DRS Cabanatuan will be arranged in conjunction with the barangay captain. Patients were also given free reading glasses as part of the optical mission. Medical treatment and operation tuli were provided by the Delta Kappa chapter medical team.

It started raining again on our trip to R.Zubia Elementary School. We were a little stranded. The children and their parents are already waiting in the venue. The mobile signal is likewise sporadic. There was a power outage in the area when we finally arrived. Through one of the teachers, Sis Nikki Ann Bihasa, the school provided us with UPS.

Sis Donna and I were finally able to proceed with the program. We had a short game after a prayer and song, and Sis Donna continued with storytelling and an introduction to Scouting. We also distributed school supplies and food packages to the children and their parents, along with the rest of the volunteers.

We returned to Villa Guerrero shortly after for a postservice evaluation. We talked about our key takeaways and exchanged ideas and suggestions. "This is our simple way of giving back to the community. We plan to do this on a bimonthly or quarterly basis, so stay tuned for more services in the coming months.", RD Jerry stated.

Although we were faced with obstacles along the way, I will still look back on this experience with a smile. Being able to spend a productive weekend with wonderful people from all walks of life. It dawned on me, too, the importance of passion and teamwork in situations that are less than ideal. It was challenging, but at the end of the day, very fulfilling. After all, service is a commitment, not a responsibility.

Sinsuat and MSSD-BARMM, hygiene kits, food packs, slippers mats and malongs.

Recipients were mixed ages, but somehow we gave priorities to the Senior Citizens, pregnant and children. of having its little sorority that could get recognition last January 17, 2021, Kappa Omega Chapter is at it again, this time, aiming for the recognition of its chapter-based alumni association.

Kappa Omega Chapter was officially founded in 1998 by Bro Dennis L. Balagbis (Delta Alpha, 1991), but the alumni association was only officially formed in January 2021. The chapter switched gears to focus on its bid for recognition, and within one year, has been able to render more than the minimum number of services required of a petitioning group.

It hasn't been an easy journey. But the challenges of organizing an alumni association in this time of pandemic has been met not just with mere attempts at compliance, but with the drive to thrive.

Most members of the chapter are abroad, or living in provinces or cities far away from the school location. But through the efficient use of technology and task delegation, services and activities were planned and executed starting last year.

Two recent services are the gift-giving activity in Quezon in December 2021, and the outreach program in Batangas City just last January 2022.

The gift-giving activity for the residents of Sorok Uni Village in San Antonio, Quezon was an initiative of this writer's family. Sorok Uni Village is a community for people who have been cured of leprosy and have no more homes to go to. Mrs. Maria Corazon Maulion, this writer's mother, has a classmate (Ms. Miriam Quizon) in Mocha Farm School (in the Quezon province), who lives near the village and asked if she (Mrs. Maulion) can give toys for children there for Christmas. Mrs. Maulion agreed, being used to giving gifts during Christmas to family,



friends, and neighbors in their community in Concordia, Alitagtag, Batangas.

Kappa Omega Alumni Association-Petitioning collaborated with the Maulion family by adding Noche Buena food packs for the 15 families in the village. The petitioning alumni association also tapped the help of the nearest local chartered alumni association there, APO Tiaong Alumni Association (APO TALAS, Charter No. 227), headed by Sis Josapet Perion-Butingan (Zeta Xi, 1987).

This writer, Sis Donna Mae Cacela (Kappa Omega, 2005), and Sis Madielyn Yuzon (Kappa Omega, 2008) left at 7:30 am for Quezon on December 12, 2021 with Mrs. Maulion driving for about two hours. APO TALAS members were there to assist them, and the village residents cheerfully welcomed them.

The event was not just about gift-giving, Sis Donna Mae also prepared games for the kids who energetically participated in Stop Dance, Trip to Jerusalem, and Bring Me. Sorok Uni Village administrator, Ms. Marie Billones, said that there have been many outreach programs in their village but this one was the most memorable and enjoyable because of the engagement of the visitors with their residents.

Gifts for 70 children were given by calling each of their names. Then there was a second round of gifts: pre-loved stuffed toys of Mrs. Maulion's three daughters. In her speech that day, Mrs. Maulion encouraged the children to be inspired by these stuffed toys, which used to be owned by her daughters who are now professionals. That they should never stop reaching for their dreams, despite the challenges they face in life.

Sis Donna Mae, one of the organizers of the alumni association, recalls the ease of the coordination with APO TALAS. "Wala naman meeting with them as prep with what to expect and delegation ng tasks duon. It went well and nag-jive din tayo with them and our beneficiaries." This quote from Laila Gifty Akita comes to her mind every time there are services and activities for the organization, "Together, we can serve humanity with our unique passions, gifts and abilities".

Thus, in going home, fatigue didn't even have a chance to take over. Altruism is truly the best high.

About a month later, the petitioning alumni association also answered the call for donations for the victims of a fire that broke out in the Badjao community in Brgy. Wawa, Batangas City. It was a service that needed immediate response, and despite the lack of funds which were depleted from last year's anniversary service and activities, the petitioning alumni association, with the chapter fraternity and sorority, raised in a few hours enough money to purchase three boxes of sardines (100 cans each). This writer, with the acting Grand Chancellor Bro Rey Nelson Amparo (Kappa Omega, 2014) and acting Keeper of the Treasury Bro Mark Anthony Watson (Kappa Omega, 2013), brought the goods to the evacuation site, Wawa Elementary School on January 18, 2022, just hours after the fire.

Interviewing some of the rescued residents, the three Kappa Omegans found out that they were not able to save anything as the fire was very sudden. They weren't able to save their boats, and while they are being fed in the evacuation site, they are worried about their livelihood, and they are hoping they get assistance in finding new homes.

There was scarcity of water in the evacuation site. Bro Rey Nelson, who owns a water sourcing company based at the Batangas Pier, went back the next day with a truck filled with containers of water for the rescued residents to use

for bathing, among other things. When asked why he chose to use his company's resources for this service, he said, "There is nothing more satisfying than helping others without expecting anything in return. Seeing the plight of the Badjaos in Wawa made my heart sink and an APO do (sic) not just sit and watch. All of us, we act, we do, we help, we make people happy, we put a smile on their faces, and we dry the tears in their eyes".

Despite having successful 41 services and activities in just a span of one year, the fight is far from over. The alumni association will be filing its petition with the national office by March 2022.

Sis Joan Paula Caritativo (Kappa Omega, 2000), is based in Singapore and currently the Section Chair there under the Administrative Region of Asia. As an organizer and as the secretary of the alumni association, she believes what Theodore Roosevelt said, that we should, "Do what you can, with what you have, where you are".

Sis Joan Paula perfected remote organizing. Scheduling zoom meetings, blasting messages

Facebook on messenger, and sometimes even calling internationally just so a service or activity can be successfully implemented. She hopes for the recognition to be granted so that the chapter can have a voice in future general assemblies where elections are held. There are bumps in the road to recognition, and Sis Joan Paula cites differences in opinions on what is best for the chapter, the physical distance of the members during this pandemic [with having only a few members on the ground during actual services and activities], and the restrictions by the government hampering the planning of services and activities as the main ones.

The petitioning alumni association overcomes challenges, and will overcome other challenges to come, with plain grit. There is nothing more motivating than wanting to make a difference. Kappa Omega Alumni Association-Petitioning fervently hopes to be able to spread its message across, that Alpha Phi Omega should be about fearless leadership, inclusive friendship, and selfless service.





"Do a Good Turn Daily" Means Being Ready All The Time!

ROXAS, ORIENTAL MINDORO- As the saying goes, we will not go wrong with readiness.

Our fraternal organization is oriented on Scout Motto "Being Prepared" that has been translated in the Philippines context as "Always Prepared" or "Laging Handa!" We are also here to serve and in doing so, we may be in different capacities, in private or public service, individually or with others. Give these; it is fitting for us to have initiatives along this line.

Here in APO COAST MIMAROPA, we are fortunate to have Brother Larry Q. Gabayno. He serves as the head of the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (MDRRMO) of Roxas, Oriental Mindoro. Given this, he was appointed Chair of the Special Committee on Disaster Risk Reduction and Management of the Region.

Hazards have been around. These are in the forms of dangerous phenomena, substance, human activities or conditions that may cause loss of lives, injuries or other health impacts, property damages, loss of livelihood and services, social and economic disruptions, or environmental damages. When these hazards impact lives and properties, they are referred to as disasters. We are familiar with natural hazards such as monsoons, typhoons, storm surges, droughts, sea level rise occurrences, floods, landslides, earthquakes, and tsunamis. Aside from these, we are also aware of human-induced hazards such as fire, vehicular accidents and sea mishaps.



In 1990, we were warned of adverse episodes of natural hazards as effects of our abuse of the environment and natural The likelihood resources or risk of being affected by these hazards that turn into disasters has been high for areas that have not done any precautionary measures. Those areas lack disaster mitigation, disaster preparedness, disaster prevention, disaster reduction, disaster resilience, and disaster response undertakings. Hence, they have a higher frequency of disasters. In Roxas alone, eleven (11) barangays experienced waterrelated disasters. They posed vulnerability to landslides as well.

Where do we come in? Matching our Brother's presence in the MDRRMO, we have started to participate in Disaster Risk Reduction Management. The Gamma Lambda Alumni Association, APO-ROMAA and APO-Xi Psi Chapter created RESCUE 1925 and came up with an initial arrangement with LGU-Roxas. Oriental Mindoro. The MDRRM Office allocated seven hundred thousand pesos (PHP700,000.00) to cover the cost of training, rescue uniforms and personal accident insurance. To be of service is good but we can be the best by being Always Ready to serve and with competence.



We are on our way to equip ourselves with the basic knowledge and skills on DRRM. To start with, we are familiarizing ourselves with the Standard Operating Procedures on Search, Rescue and Retrieval Operations. On 17 November 2021, we conducted the Basic Orientation on Rescue, Equipment, and Basic Exercises with members of Xi Psi Chapter as participants. They will undergo post evaluation through actual demonstrations or simulation exercise. Their respective strengths and weaknesses will be identified for future retooling until they meet the necessary level of competence. It is our goal to complement the MDRRMO of Roxas, Oriental Mindoro and eventually be fully organized to perform as a team. As a regional approach, we will replicate this modality in other Sections.

To be of service is good but we can be the best by being Always Ready to serve and with competence.

APO COAST MIMAROPA: A Timeline in December

DECEMBER IS A JOYOUS OCCASION for the Alpha Phi Omega community around the world. We celebrate the Founding Day by services and festivities. The anniversary celebrations and preparations extend all through the first two weeks of the month up until December 16, the day of the anniversary – sometimes even after.

On 16 December 2021, we marked Alpha Phi Omega's 96th year of founding. How did APO COAST MIMAROPA observe the glory of our beloved organization? Let us turn a little around time and reminisce about the milestones of our humble region's December past.

In support of the National COVID-19 Vaccination Days carried out by the national government from November 30 to December 3, 2021, it was a humbling opportunity for APO COAST MIMAROPA to serve our fellow citizens. In Odiongan, Romblon, Iota Nu Chapter and APO Romblon Marble Alumni Association (APO ROMAA) distributed 250 surgical masks, 200 packs of snacks and 500 bottles of water at the town plaza. Traveling for about 157.9 km through the Strong Republic Nautical Highway from Odiongan, is the Municipality of Roxas, Oriental Mindoro. Alpha Phi Omega members in Roxas also served the nation and the community at Oriental Mindoro Southern District Hospital during the mass vaccination period. Xi Psi Chapter, together with Xi Psi Petitioning Alumni Association (AA) and APO COAST MIMAROPA Rescue 1925, served breakfast for three (3) straight days and provided assistance to about 1100 townspeople.

Cheryl A. Esplin, a church leader and a missionary, once said "Often children teach the rest of us that showing love and service doesn't have to be big and grandiose to be meaningful and make a difference." On 04 December 2021, APO Pinamalayan Association (AA) conducted two (2) clean-up drives in Brgy. Marfransisco, Pinamalayan, Oriental Mindoro. First, they took care of the area of the symbolic rainbow of Pinamalayan at the triangle place. It was followed by a service to the school by cleaning the front of Abada College. Such cheerful services to the community and school! You can feel the spirit of service in their photos!

On 7 December at the Roxas Gvmnasium. Roxas Oriental Mindoro, the Philippine Statistics Authority had a registration for Philippine Identification System for issuance of National IDs. Xi Psi Chapter, APO Roxas Oriental Mindoro Alumni Association (APO ROMAA), and APO Gamma Lambda Alumni Association (AA) found resources to share Snacks to the registrants. This activity reminded us that with Alpha Phi Omega, we exist to serve.

The Province of Palawan (Section 4) carried out two activities on the 11th of December, a giftgiving and sharing of food. Through the initiative of APO City Hall Alumni Association, 71 households of the Indigenous Cultural Community located at Purok Pagbabago Iratag, Bgy. Irawan, Puerto Princesa City received gifts. They handed our basic items like water containers, pails with lid, grocery goods, and vitamins for kids. They also served bowls of healthy Arroz caldo! Simultaneously, APO Quezon Alumni Association in Quezon, Palawan shared food to 120 people in a public terminal in Poblacion Quezon by serving rice stew with pandesal.



On the 12th day of December, APO Bansud Alumni Association in Oriental Mindoro (Section 3) visited the inmates at Bansud District Jail. Their generosity through sharing of food and gift-giving humbled the lives of 90 souls. In Coron, Palawan, APO Coron Alumni Association also gave food to at least 100 people in Bancuang Baba, Bgy. 5, Coron, Palawan. Members of Theta Gamma Chapter focused on environment protection and The Balik-Eskwela program. They held a coastal cleanup activity at Sto. Nińo, San Vicente, Palawan with the local youth group there. The Malipayon Child Care Development Center in San Vicente, Palawan was the recipient of work books, toys and puzzle mats for 60 kids.



The APO Calapan Alumni Association had their hands dirty on the 15th of December, dug planting holes to plant 100 tree seedlings in one of the tree planting sites in the Municipality of Calapan, In Puerto Princesa City, APO Salipawpao Alumni Association held a Mangrove Planting Activity in Sitio Barimbing, Brgy. San Manuel, Puerto Princesa City, in coordination with the Brgy. Council. They also donated 1000 poly bags to the nursery section of the mangrove protected area.

On anniversary day, merriments were held simultaneously in all five provinces of APO COAST MIMAROPA – Mindoro Occidental, Mindoro Oriental, Marinduque, Romblon, and Palawan. APO Roxas Palawan took some service time and distributed hygiene kits containing surgical facemasks and alcohol spray bottles in numerous barangays in Poblacion Roxas, Palawan. Iota Nu Chapter and APO ROMAA in Odiongan, Romblon held a series of activities, namely: Libreng Lugaw Para Sa Bayan, Free Trike Rides for the townsfolk, and visitation of brothers and sisters.

Residents of Nu Nu Chapter dispersed on December 25 and shared blessings of fried noodles, juice cans, and buns to about 120 Mangyan Indigenous Peoples and street dwellers in Bongabong, Oriental Mindoro.

From December 12-22, Typhoon Odette hit the Philippines. Lives and properties were lost. Immediately, we came together and conducted various emergency relief operations to assist our brothers and sisters in affected regions, including Palawan. Theta Gamma Chapter joined the Local Government of Puerto Princesa City on December 26 and packed around 1000 relief goods for Typhoon Odette victims. Our young leaders and friends in Xi



Psi Chapter went out of their way and came up with the Project Tabang initiative by gathering cash donations. They were able to collect Php12,800.00 from 32 donors and divided the donation equally for Palawan, Surigao, Caraga, and Southern Leyte.

APO COAST MIMAROPA had recorded a little more than 30 projects and services for the month of December alone. These activities were focused on Health (Sharing of Food with Adults, and Feeding Sessions for Children), Environment (APO COAST/APO PREN - Tree Planting and Coastal Clean-up), Education (Balik-Eskwela), and Member Management.

Way to go APO COAST MIMAROPA! To all our collegiate chapters and alumni associations, and friends as well, who in one way or another took part in the celebration of APO COAST MIMAROPA's December 2021 installment, named and unnamed, thank you for providing topnotch services. BALANCING TRAINING FOR PLEDGE AND THOSE SEEKING FULL FLEDGED MEMBERSHIP

RA 11053, Enhanced APP and APO Pandemic Response

JANUARY 2022, APO COAST MIMAROPA held two (2) sessions via Zoom Meeting. We discussed the Enhanced APO Pledge Program (EAPP) and the APO Pandemic Response (APR). The main speaker in said sessions was Brother DRDC Charles Soquilon.

The first Zoom Meeting was on 19 January 2022 with the League of Chancellors. It was attended by Brothers and Sisters from seven (7) recognized Fraternity Collegiate Chapters (FCCs), four (4) recognized Sorority Collegiate Chapters (SCCs), 2 Fraternity Petitioning groups, and 1 Sorority Petitioning group. The second was on 20 January 2022 with heads of Basic Organizational Units, both Alumni Associations (AAs) and Collegiate Chapters (CCs). Representatives from Eleven (11) AAs, 10 recognized Collegiate Chapters, and one (1) Petitioning group joined the session.

On 30 January 2022, RA 11053 was discussed by Brother Atty. Raymund Acosta, Regional Chair on Grievance and Adjudicatory Authority. For the benefit of those who missed the first two (2) Zoom meetings, the EAPP and APR were likewise taken up. Seventeen (17) Chapters were represented, both AAs and CCs. There were representatives from

six (6) Petitioning groups as well.

The materials used in the above Zoom Meetings came from the national office. The attendees were informed that the Region is still waiting for the formal directive to implement the EAPP and APR.

Even before the RAs 8049 and 11053, there were acts not institutionally sanctioned by organizations, not necessarily fraternal in nature. Ours, unfortunately, has become one of those organizations who had victims of hazing. Hence, these laws did not come as a surprise to us. However, the devil is in the details.

Chapters, within the context of who we are, and respective academic/university situations, have come up with ways on how best to conduct acceptance of applicants, recruitment of pledge, and eventual completion of the full membership process and rites. These are not in the form of any hazing as identified by the current law; these however are carried out more than three (3) days while the law mandates that rites shall not be more than three (3) days.

There are also chapters that remain unrecognized by their

universities. The law requires the schools to promulgate their guidelines in the registration of fraternities, sororities, and organizations within their jurisdiction not later than sixty (60) days from the approval of the Act. Corollary to this, there shall be mandatory registration for fraternities, sororities, and organizations, with University students as members, before they conduct activities whether on or off-campus, including recruitment of members. What if the schools have not issued their quidelines? Should our FCCs and SCCs submit documents for recognition to demand the implementation of the law?

We are challenged not only by the COVID-19 pandemic but by the very fabric of our fraternal beginnings and laws. We definitely want quality processes and rites that are compliant with the law. It is easier than done but the law is not the end and be all. We can plan for short term, medium term and long term approaches that should include our engagement with the lawmaking process of the country, us being directly affected. Quo vadis?

GLORIETTA PARK. TALA. **CALOOCAN CITY-** On December 16, 2021, at the border between the villages of Barangay 187 and Barangay 188 (Zone 16, District I) in the former Tala Estate in North Caloocan, APO NCAR (National Capital Administrative Region) thru the leadership of Regional Director (RD) Kevin Dy, had unified chapters and Alumni Associations coming from the 17 local units of the whole NCR for APO's 96th International Founding Anniversary.

NCAR, holding the largest number of chapters and AAs amongst the 23 administrative regions in APO, was always optimistic to hold Mega Services since then. RD Kevin Dy directed the five sections of the region, the AA presidents, and all chapters to participate and work together as one in the name of service. NCAR was permitted to utilize the children's park in Tala which was conducive, spacious, and adherent to IATF protocols in holding a massive number of beneficiaries.

The groups for the said Mega Service were the Tuli Team, Optical Team, Ayuda or Gift Giving Team, Mobile Food Cart, Dental Kits Team, Barbers' Team, and the Anti-Rabies Team.



The whole Tuli Team was manned by National Trustee for Alumni Affairs/Project Trustee for the Committee on National Service for Health, Dr. Edward Allan Flores with the collaborative expertise of tuli-trained men from the Philippine Navy. Men from the Rescue Recon 1 Philippines and 27th Naval Affiliated Reserve Group (27th NARG) thru Commanding Officer Bro Peter Negrido; Bro Chief Petty Officer (CPO) Jayson Galimba, NCAR Deputy Regional Director; and Civil Military Operation 2 (CMO 2) Sis Reyna Mil Tiu rendered services for the Tuli Team together with other members from the APO National Service for Health, APO TeleMedicine volunteers, SRB-Alpha Epsilon Chapter, and our very own medical intern bros and Sis The committee that led the Tuli Team was Kappa Beta Chapter. The team was able to circumcise a total of 262 kids, which exceeded the expected list of children. Tiu stated that the men in uniform also manned as marshals. in the area from as early as 600H and had facilitated adherence and crowd control together with some other local units from Tala.



Other health teams were the Dental Kits Team. Optical. and Anti-Rabies. Due to the pandemic, APO did not render dental missions, we rather did an alternate service which was dispensing dental kits. The Dental Team was organized by Nu AA and they dispensed 150 kits to both young and old. The Optical Team was from Psi Chapter/AA, they assisted and dispensed 176 free glasses, mostly to senior citizens and middle-aged adults. The Anti-Rabies Team was organized by Lambda Chapter's veterinary brothers and sisters who catered to 45 pets.

The Legal Team was facilitated by Sis Atty. Honcel Destajo with the assistance of NCAR RD for Collegiate Bro William Sherwin Ay-ay. They gave counsel to 15 people. The Barbers Team from Alpha Epsilon served 120 people, both members, and Tala residents.

The full length of the Mega Service, NCAR Section 3 led by Sec. Chair Bro Jansen Lim provided food for all brothers and sisters who volunteered; the non-APO volunteers; the local marshals, as well as the Tala beneficiaries who came. As early as 300H, the mobile food cart was set up. Replenishing of food all day was abundant. It was backed up by the many chapters and AAs who also donated food for everyone. Brewed coffee was overflowing. There were stations for coffee; one of which caught the sense of coffee lovers was the Kape Sina Una booth of Bro Neil. NCAR also painted smiles on kids all day through the ice cream stations. Section 3, who primarily manned the food provision, noted it was a challenge to provide such a big crowd; however, there was no room for scarcity as many other chapters and AAs were so prompt to back up.



The Ayuda and Gift Giving Team was the largest team amongst all which was led by RD Kevin Dy and was partnered by most AAs and chapters, which is a multitude to mention, who shared goods and supplies. The labor was led by Alpha, Beta, Tau, and DENCAA. RD had properly organized the purchasing, packing, and distribution. Behind were many hands of brods and sis who spared time for the massive work that benefited 800 families for the Ayuda and 2,500 individuals for the gifts. Contents of the Ayuda were groceries, vegetables fresh from Baguio, and many other edible goods. Children also benefited from tons of new toys. Transportation of goods was through the efforts and army trucks of APO Armed Forces of the Philippines Department of National Defense Alumni Association (AFP-DND AA). Men from their units also served all day in the area.

Enlisting and registration were manned by NCAR Committee on Services Chairman Sis Suzanne Ombid, who assisted the RD in multiple ways, and Sis Chelle Baldonado who was also helped by many other volunteers to have all the team beneficiaries organized and documented.

APO TeleMed nurse Sis Noraliyah of Eta Gamma (Dapitan), a COVID ICU nurse who recently relocated to NCR stated, "It was my first time to serve with NCAR. I volunteered with the tuli and I was shocked by the big service that covered different scopes in just one day! The service was properly organized by the RD and all officers despite their big region; they were able to come up as one family helping everybody to make it successful. The hospitality that everyone had shown me as a visiting sis and even to the non-APOs around, I salute them! And I am happy to be part of such a great region."

Being the previous RD of NCAR, incumbent Chairman of the BOT Bro Archie Bugarin graced the whole day service for hours and also helped out on the distribution of goods. The Chairman also went around the different teams with the RD. RD Kevin Dy was interviewed by personalities from TV networks (TV5 and UNTV). He had expressed gratitude for the success of the project despite the compressed time and lack of funds and despite the threats of the pandemic. The Mega Service was able to gather approximately 500 fraternity brothers and sorority sisters from as early as dawn to as late as the evening in Tala; hence, the singing of the toast song was historical, as NCAR was able to form a beautiful circle chanting love and service for humanity on APO's anniversary.

More Than Care Packages and Balikbayan Boxes: ARME holds Gift Giving for OFWs

ALUMNI ASSOCIATIONS OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE REGION OF MIDDLE EAST orchestrated a Gift Giving program to distressed OFWs in line with the International Anniversary last December 2021. Set annually, the activity aims to provide the joy of the yuletide season to Filipino migrants displaced by unethical work practices.

As a service organization, Alpha Phi Omega renders service to our fellowmen wherever and whenever it is needed. The silent struggle of service abroad resonates in the hearts of brothers and sisters of ARME. It couldn't be more familiar to an administrative region composed of individuals whose skills and labor make up a percentage of the Middle East's workforce. The call for service, thus, is as natural as responding to one's name.

Bringing hope and painting smiles on faces miles from home

Funding initiatives by Alumni Associations in the Middle East mobilized months of preparation. Monetary donations from each member covered the purchase of materials including living necessities such as toiletries and blankets, children's essentials, and calling cards to help OFWs connect with their families at home.

Unlike in the previous years, some of the activities only included a turnover of presents to sheltered OFWs at selected Philippine Embassies in the Middle East. Christmas programs and festivities that usually accompany the Gift Giving activity were canceled due to the rising cases of COVID-19 in December of 2021- a dejecting blow to the already disheartening situation of distressed OFWs in the region. Hence, there were other areas that were allowed to hold the usual programs following all COVID -19 protocols that made the celebration a little less exciting than usual.

The Gift-Giving highlights the struggles of Overseas Filipino Workers. For many years, the beneficiaries of the program have consistently been overseas domestic helpers that experienced violence, sexual harassment, and unfair labor conditions from their employers. As the embassy looks after numerous cases of Filipino migrants, beneficiaries also include undocumented workers and children of OFWs who are refused parental authority. While some are fortunate enough that their return applications are making development, others won't have it easy. For these OFWs, going back entails more difficulty than getting there. Government assistance can only be stretched to an extent and cannot completely shoulder the requisites of their return to the Philippines. Moreover, concerns of financial and social reintegration plague their minds before they're even home.

The grave economic and social implications of the COVID-19 crisis are also not helping the case of our OFWs. Two years into the pandemic have significantly changed our way of life and pushed the world to rethink how to align our activities with the global effort in reducing virus transmission. However, meant employment becoming inevitable collateral. Prompting an exodus of OFWs abroad in search of better working opportunities.

As Filipinos, we have grown into the glamorization of the lives of our migrant workers. That more often than not, we are distracted by the guise of comfort and wealth that the media and the balikbayan culture have placed on the backs of our OFWs. And while hopes of reversing the trends of high-scale migration of Filipino workers have lain on the table, it would also pay to acknowledge the realities that accompany the gamble of working overseas that is crucial to a program of service that cares and uplifts the people.
