Bay View Operations Committee seeks public comments on proposed 3-way stop at Knapp and Water Streets

Due to increased pedestrian traffic on Water Street near the tennis and pickleball courts and with concern for vehicle speed and overall safety, the Operations Committee has proposed adding stop signs to the intersection of Knapp Avenue and Water Street. This would result in a 3-way (all-way) stop at that intersection. The Board of Trustees has asked the committee to solicit public comments from Bay View members.

The Operations Committee will accept public comments at its next meeting on Wednesday, June 18 in Wade Hall at 10 a.m. The meeting will also be available on Zoom -- Meeting ID: 889 5552 0303; Passcode: 048922 . Board of Assessors Updates

By now, you should have received your 2025 Notice of Assessment, as it was mailed to your full-time address in May. If you already are in Bay View, you can email me directly and I'll send you a copy.

Please be sure to review your Notice closely. As a reminder, your Notice of Assessment contains the tentative assessed or taxable value of your leasehold. It is one-half the market value of your parcel (also known as true cash value). To get a sense as to the market value of your cottage, multiply the amount on your Notice by a factor of two.

Assessment Advisor Ed VanderVries has recently been in a serious automobile accident. While he is expected to recover fully, he's got a challenging path ahead of him. As a result, we are asking that if you have questions about your Notice of Assessment in advance of the Board of Review on June 27. please reach out to our Board of Assessor chair, Keith Hearit at keithhearit@ **amail.com**. The time before the June Board of Review actually is a great opportunity to informally address questions. If you do not get your concerns addressed informally, the Board of Assessors will host its annual Board of Review on Friday, June 27 to hear appeals. Once the Board of Review is complete, the Board of Assessors will use these assessment values to bill the Summer 2025 taxes (which will be due in September).

Peril on the Sweetwater Seas

The Great Lakes, also known as the "Sweetwater Seas," have brought both peril and opportunity to people through the ages. Human beings have succumbed to the dangers, and have developed ingenious ways to master these immense maritime challenges.

The Vermilion Point Life-Saving Station

Ten miles west of Whitefish Point on the southern shore of Lake Superior, Vermilion Point is one of the Little Traverse Conservancy's most-visited properties. 100 years ago, it was the home of heroic rescue mariners and their hardscrabble families—people who dedicated their lives to rescuing shipwreck victims in an area known as the "Graveyard of the Lakes."

Ned Canfield will share the history of those shipwrecks and heroes, and Anne Fleming will talk about the current uses and conservation efforts at this beautiful, rugged outpost. Thursday, June 26; 1 – 2 p.m.; Voorhies. \$10 registration for members.



Coast Guard Sector, Northern Great Lakes

As America's premier maritime law enforcement agency for more than 234 years, the US Coast Guard has helped ensure our nation's economic prosperity and national security. Sector Northern Great Lakes in Sault Ste. Marie is responsible for all missions on Lake Superior, northern Lakes Michigan and Huron, and surrounding navigable waterways. Captain James Bendle is Sector Commander, responsible for Search and Rescue, Marine Safety, and Oil Spill Response across an area spanning three states and 1,850 miles of shoreline, with a 560-mile international border.

Shipwreck: the Edmund Fitzgerald and the Carl D. Bradley

50 years ago, the Edmund
Fitzgerald vanished in a
November storm on Lake
Superior and became immortalized in a Gordon Lightfoot song.
20 years earlier, the freighter Carl
D. Bradley met her fate in Lake
Michigan. Today these behemoths are the largest shipwrecks
in the Great Lakes. Maritime Historian Ric Mixter was media coordinator and SCUBA cameraman
for dives to these wrecks. He'll
reveal some of the secrets he
discovered lying hundreds of feet

below the water's surface.

Little Free Libraries


There are several "Little Free Libraries" (LFL) in and around Bay View this year offering great book selections, and they are or will soon be stocked and ready for your perusal.

From the Membership Committee

We welcome all applicants for membership in Bay View! The application process is managed by the Membership Committee with support from Bay View staff. The approval process usually requires up to nine weeks but can take as little as four weeks, depending on the timing of the various steps. The elements of the process are:

- 1. Obtain an application from the Wade Office or online. There is an application fee of \$300.
- 2. Once the application is re-

turned, Bay View staff will contact the applicant's references to request letters. Note that four letters of reference are required. Two must be from Bay View members and one of those must be from a lease holding member.

- 3. Once the fee and all reference letters have been received, the applicant is notified of their receipt by the Bay View staff. The applicant will request an interview with the Membership Committee for a date when the applicant plans to be on campus. Please allow a two week notice to schedule the interview.
- 4. After the interview has been completed, the Membership Committee meets and reviews the applicant's file and then makes a recommendation to the Board
- 5. The Board meets and votes whether to approve the applicant as a member.
- 6. The applicant will be contacted by the Bay View staff informing them of their membership approval.

Finally, please note that for the 2025 season, interviews will be conducted through **September 2** for Associate Memberships. After this date, we are only able to review applications for Leaseholding Memberships with a signed purchase agreement for a cottage.

Thank you for considering membership and for encouraging your friends and family to apply. We look forward to assisting you through the process!

The Manna Food Project

Food insecurity in Northern Michigan reached a record high for the second year in a row in 2024. By the numbers, Manna and its food relief partners served nearly 43,000 people each month, up 23% from 2023, the previous record year. That equated to over 1.5 million pounds of food. Yet, the need was far greater. And, the ice storm of 2025 presented a significant need over and above Manna's normal operational requirements.

For those in our Bay View community who are not familiar with The Manna Food Project, it's a non-profit food bank that serves Antrim, Charlevoix, and Emmet Counties. Its principal operations include a food bank (distribution center), a food rescue program, a weekly food pantry, and the Food 4 Kids backpack program. It is a partner organization of the national Feeding America Food Bank Network, and it teams with local food pantries and other services that get food to those in need.

Campus Club has been supporting Manna for many years. Its total donations exceed \$100,000 with an average of over \$14,000 being donated in each of the most recent years. Bay View's annual Crop Walk also raises funds for Manna.

On June 17th at 7:30 p.m. in Voorhies Hall, Carrie Klingelsmith, Executive Director of Manna, will provide an update on food insecurity in our community and the innovations they and their partners are undertaking to meet the ever increasing need of our neighbors.

This Campus Club speaker program event is open to the public. We encourage you to attend to learn more about the problem of food insecurity in this beautiful area we call Bay View, and how you might be able to help these neighbors in need.


Library News

Campfires

Bay View allows two types of outdoor fires under By-Law 56. Outdoor barbecues may be used for cooking at your cottage. All other fires, including recreational campfires, are restricted to four designated waterfront locations and require advance permits.

Campfires are permitted only at these waterfront fire rings: the Breakwater/ Recreation Club area on the west side where the breakwater meets shore, West Bluff near the wooden beach stairs, East Bluff near the second set of wooden beach stairs, and Memorial Garden Beach north of the Memorial Garden.

Leaseholding members must obtain fire permit forms from Russell Hall and secure approval from the Superintendent of Buildings & Grounds before using any campfire location. For weekend campfires, permits must be approved by 4:00 p.m. on the preceding Friday. Fires in ceramic stoves, metal stoves, or in-ground pits at cottage locations are not permitted.
