Excerpt from Sermon delivered at the 157th. Anniversary Service. Sunday 5th. Jan. 2025

On the 5th. of January 2025, the Presbyterian Church celebrated with gratitude 157 years of Christian Mission and witness in Trinidad and Tobago. The occasion was marked by a special service of Thanksgiving, held at the Aramalaya Presbyterian Church in Tunapuna. The theme chosen was, "Persevere in your witness - overcoming the challenges encountered!"

For those who belong to the household of God, it is quite clear to us, that the Ministry and Mission which has been entrusted to the church, by Jesus Christ, continues to flourish in spite of the challenges encountered over the centuries, or since the Church's inception. Believers were persecuted, martyred, imprisoned, beaten, stoned and even crucified. Yet the Church, the Called out and set apart by God, being empowered by God's Spirit, remains steadfast and resolute to her calling.

Reflecting on 2 Timothy 1:5, the sincere and genuine faith of a mother, Eunice and grandmother Lois, was evident within the home. This faith was reflected in a strong devotional life. Values or traits of the Christ-centered life were visible. By the quality of life they lived, this mother and grandmother taught young Timothy how to live as a child of God who was being guided by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. With that being said, the question must be asked, "What has gone wrong with the home today?" "Where have we gone wrong?" "Who is responsible for nurturing the faith of our children, during the impressionable years?" Children spend adequate time with parents, grandparents and caregivers. It is within such a setting, that the Word of God is shared, prayers offered and spiritual songs or hymns taught. Members, the time has come for us to be effective witnesses within the home. The members of our family provide for us, the fertile soil upon which the Word of God is to be planted. It is here that 'faith formation' takes place.

We remain grateful to those who have gone before us. The pioneers of the faith, the Missionaries, local Ministers and all the faithful and committed members of the Church, for what they have done and continue to do. In spite of the challenges which are present with us even today - disunity within the Clergy and among the members of the Church; the rise in Modernism among other factors, with God's help, the church has always been able to navigate itself through the difficult times. I use this column to challenge the members of the Body of Christ and all those who have benefitted and continue to benefit from her mission, to remain in relationship with God, as He leads us into a bright future.

Therefore, the superstructure has been completed, including the foundation, blockwork, and roof. The next phase of the project will include the flooring, electrical, plumbing, and ceiling works. The project has been able to remain within budget and is scheduled to be completed at the beginning of the 2nd half of 2025, not considering any environmental factors that may affect the schedule of activities.

EDITORIAL

LETTING GO OF THE PAST IS A CHOICE

Our past, can at times, feel like shadows from which we cannot escape. They remind us of mistakes, failures, and regrets. These memories can hold us captive, thus making it hard to look ahead or to move forward.

Whether we want to admit it or not, we all have done or had things done to us that have hurt us and still affect us today. We build walls around our heart and our emotions, walls that we put there because we feel we need to protect ourselves from being hurt again. We, therefore, live in fear, fear of being hurt again. Yet fear is not from the Lord. It is from Satan who uses it to control us and keep us from becoming who we were made to be according to God's plan for our lives. We must want to make a choice to set ourselves free from the chains of our past and move into a future filled with hope and purpose.

One of the most reassuring promises in the Bible is that through Christ we are made new. In 2 Corinthians 5:17, it is written, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come." This verse reminds us that when we accept Christ, our past is forgiven, and we are given a fresh start. God doesn't hold our past against us; instead, he invites us to embrace the new identity he has given us. Let us not be prisoners of our past. We must learn to deal with our past if we want to live a life of peace and wholeness.

Easier said than done, 'letting go' is a process, one we must work through little by little. To move forward we must do so with goals in mind - we need to break free from the chains of our past mistakes dropping link by link until we have no regrets. Sometimes, we need to take baby steps - one day at a time. One faith step after another until without realizing it we have walked through that dark tunnel of pain and hurt until one day we step out on the other side into the glorious light of peace and forgiveness, forgiveness for ourselves first and forgiveness for those who have caused us so much pain and hurt.

Some people are prisoners of their past; it is easier to remember a bad past. They keep living in regret of what they did wrong, what they failed to do, or the opportunities they missed. However, we are advised to not remember the former things or consider the things of old. "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth; do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:18-19 NRSVUE).

Let us live like the Apostle Paul, he let go of his past mistakes. What could be worse than persecuting Christians for following the tenets of their faith? After his dramatic conversion, he completely let go of his past, he did an about turn. He writes, "Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead. I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3: 13 - 14). Paul chose not to let his past mistakes and ways define him - he was no longer a persecutor of Christians, instead his focus was now on his future with Christ.

With God's help we can transform our lives. Let us press on toward the future, trusting that God has a good plan for our lives, and refuse to be prisoners of our past. He can take our brokenness, our bitterness towards those whom we feel slighted us in the past, and towards the Church so we can focus on building a stronger PCTT for the benefit of all. Think of service to yourself and others rather than remain in your past. Let us all contribute to build something beautiful especially in reference with human relationships, unity and love.

THE FAMILY CAN

THE PILGRIMAGE OF PARENTING: [PART 11] - WHY (SHOULD WE) PARENT - MEMORY

In this series, we have established that parenting is a relationship between the 'parenter' and the 'parentee'. The focus here is - how and why should we parent memory for a parentee?

For the last two months, our focus considered how do you parent learning and why parent learning? To recall, learning provides the tools to resolve, make appropriate decisions to overcome personal problems, family conflicts, and the development of individual personality with skills to get along with other persons/groups.

Further, learning makes a person more **aware of self** and whomever they relate to in whatever situation. Learning develops perception, skills for behaviours and emotional control, assist with adjustments to situations that daily challenge the individual extending into his/her relationships and societal interactions. Humans are complex individuals in a complex world and **learning with memory** is vital and necessary for *his/her psychological and psychosocial* functioning.

This month, we focus on **MEMORY**. Learning involves committing to memory processes which progress into skillsets for a person's performance and solutions. Learning begins with thinking, then committing to memory, to the reinforcing of an approach that can be recalled to solve life's challenges. Memory is 'proof of learning' and can be defined as 'the present knowledge of a past experience.' There are **four** kinds of memory: to **recognize** - e.g. faces; to **recall** - becoming aware of an experience; to **reproduce** - that previously learned; and to **perform** - as habits done automatically. Put together, this is memory linked to learning. However, learning a habit and committing to memorization can be determined by the challenge to the individual, resulting in his/her responses.

Q. Why parent memory? Learning is connected to memory, with the short and long-term human memory being our internal store house that can be accessed automatically or triggered by our senses and our environment. Are we becoming too heavily dependent on external memory devices? Learning is information that can be anchored to *our memory* for daily living. Parents as 'parenters' have a duty and responsibility to guide positive and realistic practical learning and memory development, not leaving the 'parentee' to his/her own devices. Can this approach improve our parenting relationships and skills and improve intra and inter-family relationships? I hope that this perspective can guide and effect changes and adjustments to the narrative and approach to parenting where the participants interact in a relational exchange that impacts their words and actions, attitudes, behaviours and roles, duties and responsibilities.

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Never let it ever be that the family can NOT adjust and adapt as changes occur.

Encounteringthe Archives of the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago

It is **2025**, a most significant milestone for the Archives of the PCTT (CAPCTT) as this marks the **50th Anniversary** since the establishment of the present physical location in September 1975. At that time, there existed archival materials mainly at the office of the SATC; at Kemp House - the office of the San Fernando Field Missionary; and the library and other facilities of the Naparima Teachers', Training College, closed by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago in July 1975. Each of these has its own history in the development of the PCTT.

The suggestion for an Archives as documented, was made at the then Presbytery meeting during 1957 by a Canadian Lady Missionary, Ms Elma Inman. It was not until 1961 that the first Archives Committee with a Chairman was appointed by Synod, (itself established January 1960). It was called the Archives and Historical Committee. In 1966, a new committee called the Archives and Museum Committee was appointed in preparation for the year-long Centenary celebrations of 1968 of the then Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Grenada (PCTG). This committee mounted a display or exhibition of artefacts and documents at the Naparima Bowl and Morton House for all of Trinidad. Some of these items are today held at the Archives.

However, going into 1968 and looking towards the new century, a major survey to assess the work of the Church and to propose a way forward into the future led to the completion of the Garth Legge Report in 1966 which listed seven underlying features of situation and itemised ten areas for stimulating thought, discussion and action throughout the PCTG. It would be interesting for leaders and members of the PCTT to lift these pages today nearly sixty years later and evaluate any achievements.

To go back to the history of the Presbyterian presence in Trinidad is to research documents: since 1833 – the Church of Scotland; 1843 - the American Mission; and 1868 - the Canadian Mission, beginning with Reverend John Morton, his wife Sarah, his daughter, Agnes and sons.

Here, too, should be noted that at a Synod meeting on August 1962, Mr Enos Sewlal a Presbyterian and the then National Archivist of Trinidad and Tobago presented a proposal for the establishment of the Archives of the PCTT with details for three sections: the Repository, the Museum, and the Archival Library.

To members of the PCTT and all persons interested in satisfying a thirst and hunger for study and research of the PCTT, the CAPCTT is available to your 'Encountering the Archives' and hope, in some way, to lay a table to your satisfaction and satiation. These few references only touch the tip of the proverbial/symbolic iceberg that are contained in the Archives, PCTT.







MRS PATRICIA MANICKCHAND

Mrs Manickchand, a long-standing member of the Waterloo Presbyterian Church was born in Arena, Freeport, on October 26th, 1933, to Hindu parents. Her father came directly from India. She was named Jassodra at birth. She married Edward Manickchand of Waterloo, Carapichaima, and at the time of their marriage he was a teacher at the Freeport Presbyterian Primary School. Just before getting married, she was baptized as a Presbyterian and was named "Patricia". Her husband, Edward Manickchand, passed away in 2001. She is the mother of 5 children. She is family oriented and has 10 grandchildren and 2 great grands. Soon after getting married, Patricia became a devoted member of the Waterloo Presbyterian Church. She and her late husband brought up their children as Presbyterians. Church was a very important part of their lives. Edward Manickchand (deceased) was an Elder and preached in the Waterloo Presbyterian Church. He was instrumental in the construction of the church building.

Patricia was an active member of the PCW's Group soon after her marriage and held the post of PCW's President for a number of years.

She was appointed Elder at Waterloo Presbyterian Church on October 19th, 2003, and was made an Honorary Elder on March 28th, 2021. Patricia celebrated her 90th birthday in 2023 with a beautiful Service of Thanksgiving at the WPC with family and close friends and her church family. She is one of the longest serving member from 1951 to this present time and continues to be a stalwart member of the congregation. Patricia's life revolves around her family, her friends, her church, her garden and service to others and is an exemplary Christian. PATRICK JUGMOHANSINGH

Patrick Jugmohansingh's life began on August 26, 1932, in the humblest of surroundings—an ajoupa, a modest, thatched-roof structure located at Big Bend, on the Quarry Long Stretch.

Patrick began his formal education at Erin Road Presbyterian Primary School located some three kilometres from his home. A walk that Patrick and his childhood companion, Christiana Seepersad, undertook together.

Mr. Jugmohansingh completed Standard 5 at Erin Road Presbyterian School in 1944 at the age of 12. Harry Seepersad, Christiana's elder brother and a senior teacher, provided some direction at this point in his life. He advised Patrick to become a pupil teacher. For about six months, Patrick followed this path, until yet another Seepersad—Frank, the grandfather of the current Justice Frank Seepersad—intervened. Frank saw more in Patrick and urged him to sit the entrance exam for Naparima College.

In 1946, he entered Naparima College, directly into Form 2. Patrick's time at Naparima was transformative. The environment, both academic and social, exposed him to a world beyond that of his childhood. Fate had a way of guiding Patrick at every turn. Offers came in from various directions—a job at the oil company Trinidad Petroleum Development Co. (TPD), another at Apex, and a teaching post at the Icacos Government Primary School. One day a passerby who observed him waiting for public transportation, stopped and informed him that Reverend Swann, his former Geography teacher from Naparima, wanted to see him urgently. Patrick responded immediately. That meeting would set him on the path to a long and fulfilling career in education and church life.



Reverend Swann offered him a teaching position at Siparia Union Presbyterian Primary School, where Patrick began working in February 1st 1952.

Patrick's teaching career spanned decades, at Siparia Union Presbyterian Primary School, he taught from 1952 to 1965. His career was briefly interrupted when he attended Naparima Teachers' Training College from 1957 to 1958, only to return to Siparia Union Presbyterian Primary School afterward.

In 1965, he joined lere High School, Siparia, where he taught Economic History to Form Six students. A year later, the course was discontinued, and Patrick shifted to teaching Geography to lower forms. Ever aware of the needs of students, he often stepped in informally when needed, quietly ensuring that students received the best education possible.

His final position at Iere High School was as Dean of Discipline, a role he fulfilled with the same quiet dignity and respect that had defined his entire life. He retired from teaching in December 1990.

His contributions to the Presbyterian Church were equally significant.

In 1952 when he began teaching at Siparia Union Presbyterian Primary School, he was baptized in the Presbyterian faith by Rev. H. F. Kemp on May 16th 1952. The service was held at the school itself, as the Akashbani Presbyterian Church was still in the planning stages. His baptism into Presbyterianism marked the beginning of his formal association with the Church, over the years, he would become a steadfast figure in its administration. He remains a faithful member of the Akashbani Presbyterian Church for over 72 years.

On August 7, 1960, he married Barbara, who became his life companion and never faltered in her support of him. She also became absorbed and devoted to the Presbyterian fold.

Patrick's involvement with the Presbyterian Church grew deeper. His service started on the Local Board, a position he held with dedication.

Over the years, Patrick's role in the church expanded significantly. He served as the Local Board Chairman on several occasions, Secretary, Elder, and an Honorary Elder. He was an active member of the Men's Fellowship Group of Penal/Siparia Pastoral Region. He was also a member of the Official Board of the Penal /Siparia Pastoral Region. While he served in these many areas of the church, Barbara always gave him her full support in any ventures that he coordinated.

As an Elder, he participated in the Church's pastoral outreach programmes, visiting congregation members at their homes and giving the support needed at times. During his time, the Quinam Mission Station was a part of his work in the church. He would make many trips to Quinan to attend 'Cottage meetings' which were services held at people's homes before the actual Station was built where it is today.

His administrative talents were recognized, and he was eventually appointed in the late 1980s as Secretary of the Southern Presbytery. However, it was his final and most challenging role that left a lasting mark on him. After retiring from his teaching career in 1990, Patrick became General Secretary of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church on February 1st 1991 - a position traditionally held by a working Minister. For three difficult years, from 1991 to 1994, Patrick battled to correct the many administrative aspects of the Church he loved dearly. He even returned to serve as General Secretary in 1996 for approximately 3 more years at the request of the Synod.

In this chapter of his life of service and honour, the President of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago awarded him the Public Service Medal of Merit Silver in 2011.

In many ways, he felt he had been guided by fate, directed toward paths he hadn't initially sought out but embraced wholeheartedly. His life unfolded through a series of opportunities presented to him, each seeming to come at just the right time. He accepted them without hesitation, dedicating himself fully to whatever role he was called upon to fill.

His legacy is one of service, compassion, and tireless dedication to the improvement of his community and church—a legacy that will live on in the countless lives he touched. May God continue to richly bless him!

HEALTHY CORNER: THYROID

January was Thyroid Awareness Month and it's a good time to shine a light on a small but mighty gland that plays a big role in our overall health. For the Presbyterian community, this is an opportunity to reflect on how we care for the bodies God has entrusted to us—our temples.

The thyroid gland is a butterfly-shaped organ located in the front of the neck. It produces chemical messengers called hormones regulate metabolism.

Hypothyroidism ("underactive") occurs when the thyroid gland fails to produce sufficient amounts of hormones. This can result from autoimmune diseases (such as Hashimoto's thyroiditis), iodine deficiency or certain medications. Symptoms of hypothyroidism are often subtle and include:

- · Fatigue and sluggishness
 - · Weight gain
 - · Cold intolerance
 - · Dry skin and hair
- · Depression and mood swings
 - · Muscle weakness
 - · Constipation
 - · Heavy periods

Left untreated, hypothyroidism could lead to severe complications including heart disease, infertility and even "myxedema coma"-a rare, life-threatening condition. It is typically managed with thyroid hormone replacement therapy.

In contrast, hyperthyroidism ("overactive") is characterized by excessive production of thyroid hormones. Common causes include Graves' disease (an autoimmune disorder) thyroid nodules and inflammation from viruses. Symptoms include:

- · Rapid heartbeat and palpitations
- · Weight loss despite increased appetite
- · Nervousness and irritability
- · Heat intolerance and excessive sweating
- · Tremors
- · Frequent bowel movements
- · Irregular or scanty periods.

If left untreated, hyperthyroidism can lead to serious health issues such as an irregular heartbeat and osteoporosis.

Hyperthyroidism can be treated through several approaches including antithyroid medications. radioactive iodine therapy or surgical removal of the thyroid gland. Each treatment option depends on the individual's health status and preferences.


Thyroid nodules are lumps that can form within the gland. While most nodules are benign, 5% can Symptoms may include a cancerous. noticeable lump in the neck, difficulty swallowing Regular monitoring or hoarseness. ultrasound scans, blood tests and, in some cases, a biopsy are necessary to determine the nature of the nodules.

Thyroid cancer, although relatively rare, is highly treatable. Treatment typically involves surgery and radioactive iodine therapy.

Living with thyroid disease requires ongoing management and regular follow-up with a healthcare provider.

A balanced diet rich in fruits, vegetables, lean proteins and whole grains helps maintain overall health. Regular exercise, stress management and sufficient sleep are also essential components of a healthy lifestyle and help to manage symptoms.
