There was a real sense of excitement and anticipation as the audience patiently waited for the play to begin. Shouts and roars suddenly filled the hall while the crowd watched in awe as the actors depicted the opening fight scene of this famous play. Clearly, a great deal of thought had gone into the props, music and staging, and we were both really impressed by how the three actors could change the simple set-up so quickly to represent different scenes from the play. Never before had we seen a battle presented so effectively with so few actors or props on stage. It was impressive to watch and really set the tone for the excitement to come from the rest of the play.

As the play progressed, the actors encouraged audience participation, which was really fun, and it was hilarious to watch students reciting famous quotes from the play. One girl's line, 'What he hath lost, noble Macbeth hath won' did generate a laugh from the audience as she was called up on stage and sat on a plastic throne to play King Duncan. They also drew audience members from the crowd to take on the roles of other key characters, including Banquo and Macduff, which was really engaging and enhanced the experience for us all.

Shakespeare Essay by Hope Sladden 10C



In Shakespeare's eponymous tragedy 'Macbeth' Shakespeare presents Macbeth and Lady Macbeth as a complex portrait of love. In the beginning of the play, the couple's definitive love for each other is unnaturally strong which invites the presence of chaos and power into their relationship. Their love is imminent and their devotion is made clear, however Shakespeare contrasts this with resentment felt towards one another during the power struggle of their marriage.

In the exposition of the play, Macbeth shares a sincere equality with Lady Macbeth, 'dearest partner of greatness'. To a Jacobean audience this equality would have served a great sense of unease and confusion. The vulnerability and femininity that Macbeth presents displays the submissive attitudes he felt naturally at the beginning of the play, prior to his emotional turmoil. Macbeth appears reliant on his wife's support and exposes the contemporary audience to his passive temperament. The emotive superlative adjective, 'dearest', illustrates the compassion that Macbeth feels towards Lady Macbeth and reassures the audience of his emotions and moral compass, supporting his likeability as a character at the beginning of the play. In addition, the lexical choice 'greatness' provides the impression that he and Lady Macbeth are a strong, reliable couple possessing great power. However, the overwhelming love highlights an unsteady vulnerability within their marriage. Their suffocating love serves as a warning that it could become their hamartia.

Furthermore, in Act One Scene 7 of the play, this weakness begins to surface as a desperate power struggle in the subsequent scenes. 'We will proceed no further in this business.' Macbeth is conveyed as taking control and accepts the normalised gender roles in this era, as Macbeth exudes a strong masculinity and the negative 'no' demonstrates his alleged definitive attitude. This serves as a facade to Macbeth's true temptation and ambition. The noun, 'business', implies that Macbeth himself refuses to detail the heinous act of regicide, despite his temptation to do so.Lady Macbeth potentially notices this facade and seizes the opportunity to emasculate him, 'when you durst do it, then you were a man'. This harsh speech belittles Macbeth and preys on his insecurity, just as the witches had. Her speech exposes the cracks and distancing entering the relationship. Shakespeare attempts to paint Lady Macbeth as the villain. This would have satisfied Jacobean audiences as many possess a pre-determined fear of the female sex which is a common theme in Shakespeare's plays. The majority of the audience would feel increasingly uncomfortable in the presence of Lady Macbeth's unapologetic display of power.

In this scene, the conflict begins to expose itself clearly within the marriage and the power struggle simply worsens throughout the play, eventually ending in the complete breakdown of their relationship. Some members of the audience may argue that Lady Macbeth acts only out of self-interest, however, others may argue that Lady Macbeth feels so passionately towards the throne as it may serve as a substitute for the child or children that Shakespeare hints that they have lost. Lady Macbeth potentially hopes that the crown will provide Macbeth with the same happiness, as she feels insufficient as a woman unable to provide children.

Towards the end of the play, Shakespeare creates more and more distance between the characters, portraying the breakdown of the relationship as gradual within the play, but rapid in the overall sense of time on stage. For example, Lady Macbeth requests a servant, 'say to the king (Lady Macbeth) would attend his leisure for a few words'. Here she is reduced in status which contradicts the strong equality which Macbeth shared with her at the beginning of the play. She is forced to request the presence of her own husband. To a Jacobean audience this dynamic would have seemed more common and natural. It could be interpreted that now Macbeth is king, he values himself above all else and relates to the divine right of kings. He becomes obsessive over his title and this reflects the severe paranoia he begins to feel, demonstrating the insecurities Macbeth is victim to. Additionally, Shakespeare juxtaposes the two characters to illustrate the lack of closeness they experience in their marriage. This becomes increasingly clear as the pair develop. The contrast in their emotions is displayed through their reactions in the aftermath of King Duncan's death. For instance, Macbeth appears to be trapped in a permanent day, 'Macbeth does murder sleep.' This exudes the constant fear that Macbeth feels. However, Lady Macbeth is portrayed to be imprisoned in a permanent night, 'to bed, to bed,' she feels trapped in her nightmare. This demonstrates the oppositional paths and effects they experienced during the aftermath of regicide. The reactions of the characters serves as a warning to the audience of the consequences of treason.

In conclusion, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth begin the play almost too comfortably which potentially invites the presence of chaos and tragedy into their relationship. Their moral composition opposes one another, which leads to the distancing and total breakdown of their once strong, successful marriage and demonstrates what the deadly sin of greed can do to a person and their relationship. Their marriage is an illustration of damaging gender roles and ambition. Finally, the chaos and emotional turmoil of their relationship mirrors the disasters and murders within Shakespeare's 'Macbeth'.

Summary

The Hole in the Noise (chapter I) in the book 'The knife of never letting go' is a science fiction novel based on an alien planet that has recently been inhabited by humans. The book is based around a plant called 'New World' where the character lives in a place called Prentisstown. The Spackle (the native inhabitants of the New World) are to blame for the germ which has killed off all women and nearly all the men as well as the Spackle during a war. As a result of the virus, men can hear each other and their animals' thoughts. The story's main character, Todd Hewitt and his dog Manchee discover a 'hole in the noise' at a local swamp during the beginning of the book. 
Tick Tock

The drawings on the walls damage the property which means we have to cover up the drawings. This costs money which we could spend on more useful things to make the school a better place and more fun than it already is.


How do we stop this illegal activity of ruining our learning environment and equipment in the Cottesloe school community?


Tymon's Terrific Talent
