International Women's Day: A celebration of Women

International Women's Day (IWD) is internationally celebrated on March 8, 2023, globally. This day is often celebrated by highlighting the achievements of women, promotion of gender parity and by raising awareness about the discrimination against women.

Proudly, in Trinidad and Tobago and many other countries women now have equal opportunity rights and legislation that has been passed for gender equality and other basic protection for the rights of women. Unfortunately, in several other countries, this is not the case as women remain oppressed and do not have access to the same rights, opportunities and treatment as men do.

Here are highlights of some of the greatest opportunities and achievements of women in Trinidad & Tobago:

- The Equal Opportunity Act, 2000 of T&T which prohibits discrimination based on sex, race, ethnicity, origin, religion, marital status, or disability in employment, training, education, and other fields. It has also led to the formation of the Equal Opportunity Commission (EOC) & Equal Opportunity Tribunal.
- The great work of the ILO and their advocacy for equal opportunity and women rights.
- Our first female Prime Minister, The Honourable Kamla Persad-Bissessar who was appointed to office in 2010.
- Our first female President, Her Excellency Paula-Mae Weekes who was appointed to office in 2018.
- Our first female Commissioner of Police, Erla Harewood-Christopher who was appointed to office in 2023.
- In 2020, the Gender-Based Violence Unit (GBVU) was launched to support against domestic issues.

Amongst these and arising from the opportunities of the non-exhaustive list above, we can attest that many organisations are now led by females, many Board rooms are now female-dominated and commendably, some of our very own Presbyterian churches are led by females, our local Boards, teachers, choir leaders and other positions are held by women. It is evident that the Presbyterian churches are also contributing to the upliftment and promotion of women.

While there is much more work to be done for the protection of women against abuse, violence and even death in T&T, it is evident that many opportunities present themselves for women. The celebration and protection of women begins at home, parents must instill these values of respect for women and girls from a very young age, fathers must respect their mothers and wives as an example. Women too must respect themselves.

KNOW YOUR FAITH

"NEW BIBLE TRANSLATION"

REVEREND ADRIAN SIEUNARINE, PRINCIPAL, ST ANDREW'S THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

The Reformed tradition emphasizes accessible, accurate translations of the Bible available to everyone, so the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) has an updated edition (the "NRSVue"). Over 20,000 total changes including about 12,000 substantial edits to the NRSV came from decades of prayerful dedication which inspired continuous meticulous research and review of extant manuscripts, and exhaustive analysis of the contexts, philology and cultural changes in linguistics over the ages.

A better understanding of the original languages as well as determination to have the most meaningful and relevant translation possible in contemporary English has led to the NRSVue.

English versions of the Bible have been inspired by their predecessors. Even the King James Version of 1611 proclaims in its preface "We never thought from the beginning that we should need to make a new translation . . . but to make a good one better." Using the most ancient sources in exquisite harmony with modern resources and discoveries over the ages, the NRSVue offers us the most accurate and readable English-language Bible today.

Some of the changes would surprise us. For instance, Matthew 28:17 in the NRSVue is "When they saw him, they worshipped him, but they doubted" which would be a sharp change from the NRSV "When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted." The NRSVue translators recognized that English translations needed to escape from the bondage to the mistranslation in the Vulgate ("quidam autem dubitaverunt" = but some doubted) and return to the original Greek manuscripts which state "hoi de edistasan" which is the definite article followed by the conjunction "de" followed by a word meaning something like "hesitated" or "were in two minds or states of being."

Because English is so different from the original languages of Scripture, translations will continue as the search for profound precision journeys onward. For now, no matter how many Bibles or translations you have, it is time to get an NRSVue!



THE FAMILY CAN CRISIS IN THE FAMILY: PART 1: THE BREAKDOWN IN FAMILY LIFE A MONTHLY THOUGHT TO HELP IMPROVE THE FAMILY - HILTON R SIBOO: CONTACT: 788-2685)

Has the crisis in the family led or resulted to the breakdown in family life or has the breakdown in family life resulted or led to the crises of the family?

Sounds confusing but either could be the genesis or trigger of the other yet it remains a fact that both co-exist and are fuelling the problems of stability and instability in the family, manifesting in the negatives of neglect and abandonment, abuse and violence, addictions and mental health issues that occurs across and emanates from within intra-family relationships.

Should our start point for analysis, assessment or research be that the breakdown [or collapse] in family life leads to crises, then time should be taken to carefully consider what are the factors and causes from which the breakdown occurs. **Is it the people** the psychology of the individuals and the relationships between the persons or is it the sociology - the external sociological impacts or social psychology driven by socio-economic factors – e.g., wealth and poverty, employment and education, entertainment and travel, religion and culture, etc.; the sociopolitical factors – ideology, leadership, power and control, etc.; socio-media – print and electronic, global media and evolving technologies? And what about the factors of even the numbness and indifference to social disorder, marches and protest, crime and violence, civil war and global warfare, natural and man-made disasters?

Myopically we focus on and lay blame only on the family and family life, often not considering ALL and more of the above that impacts and results in the breakdown of family life, these which continues to undermine and erode the foundations of family structure and functioning which were previously based on history, traditions, culture, religion, and civil society behaviours which increasingly with the crisis of modernization can never take us or go back to the past or the 'good old-time days'.

With the breakdown of family in both structure and function, can the family resolve crises and challenges? The changes and evolution in the structure and function of the family and its roles of members certainly results in crises. If we cannot identify and deliberate on the triggering factors and understand its causes, would we be able to adjust to the evolving chaos and challenges?

Remember, the family is not just a group or gathering without a common purpose. Never let it ever be that the family can NOT adjust and adapt as changes occur.

Don't lose faith. Hold strong. Believe, The Family Can.

This was followed by items: a song, expressions of gratitude and greetings and spoken word poem from each member of the group. Lunch was served and everyone enjoyed this time of fellowship.

We will begin an in-depth look into Laurance Hull Stookey's "Components of a renewed Eucharistic Theology."

1. The Eucharist/Lord's Supper is to be seen above all as a Sacrament -God's gift to the church.

The word 'Sacrament' is derived from the Latin sacramentum which in turn translates the Greek Mysterion, "mystery." Sacraments are holy practices of the Church based on scriptural authority and empowered by the Spirit of God as "means of grace" to affirm the presence and promise of Christ to the believer. Augustine defines a Sacrament as a "visible sign of an invisible grace."[1] John Calvin, the Reformer, describes a Sacrament as a "Sign and Seal"[2] of God's covenant of salvation. The Church's understanding of Sacraments is based on instructions and stories worth imitating that has to do with water. bread and wine and several different ambiguous and specific theological thoughts about Baptism and the Lord's Supper.[3]

In the Gospels and in the Letters, Paul's particular instructions are given regarding the celebrating of the Lord's Supper. The main references are:

Mark 14:22-25

While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God.[4]

Luke 22:14-23

When the hour came, he took his place at the table, and the apostles with him. He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer; for I tell you, I will not eat it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he said, "Take this and divide it among vourselves: for I tell vou that from now on I will not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. But see, the one who betrays me is with me, and his hand is on the table. For the Son of Man is going as it has been determined, but woe to that one by whom he is betrayed!" Then they began to ask one another which one of them it could be who would do this.[5]

Matthew 26:26-29

While they were eating, Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to the disciples, and said, "Take, eat; this is my body." Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you, I will never again drink of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." [6]

1Corinthians 11: 23- 26

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.[7]



These scriptural references are the words that the Church believe are the Words of Institution by Jesus for the celebration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion especially, "Do this in remembrance of me." In these scriptural references, we also discover the gift nature of the Eucharist; "This is my body, which is given for you", "This cup that is poured out for you." Christ willingly gave Himself for us. The meal Jesus initiated for us is a gift. The Lord's Supper symbolizes the gift of life and the gift of new life we receive from Christ's suffering and death. The only fitting response we can make as recipients of this gift is one of praise and thanksgiving.

In the New Testament, there are many other stories of Jesus at table. These, however, are considered fellowship meals: for example, in Matthew 9:10-13, Jesus is at table in the home of Matthew, the tax collector. In Luke 15:1-2, Jesus is eating with tax collectors and other outcasts. John 2:1-12, depicts the wedding in Cana. We must not forget Jesus' feeding of the five thousand in John 6:1-14 and the feeding of the four thousand in Mark 8 1-9. There are also records of Jesus sharing meals with the disciples after the resurrection. These stories were recorded to help believers recognize the risen Christ. Luke 24:13-50, in The Walk to Emmaus, we are told that their eyes were opened. In John 21:14, Jesus invites His disciple to have breakfast with Him. Acts of the Apostles also records the early church meeting for the breaking of bread and praver. (Acts 2:42). In Acts 20:7, the practice of meeting to break bread on the first day of the week is developing. The early church was a meal keeping community and the practice of celebrating the Lord's Supper was developing.

In our next issue we will unravel "A necessary corollary is that the Eucharist/Lord's Supper is a reliable means of Grace, yet is not grace itself."

HE WILL LEAD ME THROUGH TROUBLED WATERS-NAVIGATING THE S.E.A.

Isaiah 43: 2 tells us, "When you go through deep waters, I'll be with you."

When we approach this verse from the perspective of our lives, the deep waters represent the difficulties we face. For many within our congregations, March signals the culmination of their primary school journey and the fear that comes with it. The Secondary Entrance Assessment (S.E.A.) looms in the not so distant future and there is a level of anxiety linked to it. While a small dose of anxiety can be helpful in keeping us focused, if our symptoms take over so much so that we cannot function or when our anxiety makes us physically sick, we might not be able to do our best.

Although performance anxiety is normal, there are some factors that can make it worse. Lack of sleep and not being prepared for the test are two elements that not only set us up for failure but also compound test anxiety. Your level of preparedness would help to alleviate a significant amount of the 'test day' anxiety, but this does not mean working yourself to the point of exhaustion. A key aspect for success would be that of balance - finding a way to manage all facets of yourself - academically, socially, emotionally and spiritually.

How can this be done? A schedule would ensure that all components get a dedicated time frame for us to perform optimally. When establishing your schedule it is imperative to keep the following in mind:

Keep on working on past papers and practice booklets.

- Familiarize yourself with the layout of the papers.
- Create a time management system so that you can complete the papers with enough time to check over.
- Work with what works for you, you do not have to start at the beginning of the paper.
- Work on your weaker areas. Tighten up your strengths.
- DO NOT CRAM!

Hydration, sleep and nutrition are critical.

- Set a daily bedtime routine and stick to it.
- Wind down before bed by listening to some soothing music or reading a non-academic book.
- Eat balanced meals and try to stay away from processed snacks and sugary drinks.
- DRINK YOUR WATER!

Spend time outdoors.

- Schedule time outdoors in nature. Use the time to bask in the sun, enjoy the greenery and natural sounds. Here, in Trinidad and Tobago, we are blessed with ready access to a variety of flora and fauna, get outside and enjoy! These experiences will also aid in improving your Creative Writing skills. Have conversations and journal about the time when you get indoors.
- GET SOME PLAYTIME IN!

Breathing and Visualization Exercises.

- If you cannot go outside (e.g. while at school), visualize and take imagination breaks-but not while the teacher is teaching and especially not when doing practice tests.
- Deep breathing calms us by slowing us down, especially our racing hearts. Some examples of breathing exercises are: "Volcano Breaths, Star Breaths, Rainbow Breaths, Mountain Breathing.

PRAY, PRAY, PRAY! Finally, but certainly not the least of all of the dynamics, one must ensure that a close connection is maintained with our Triune Father.

- Memorize a verse or two that gives you a sense of peace and calm. Here are some suggestions;
- Psalm 56:3 "I am afraid, I put my trust in you."
- Luke 12:7 "Indeed, the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Don't be afraid, you are worth more than many sparrows."

"CARNIVAL, CULTURE, & CHRISTIANITY" SUBMITTED BY JUDY KOWLESSAR

University of the Southern Caribbean invites St Andrew's Theological College to; the 10th annual Harold Baptiste Memorial Lecture:

On Thursday 2nd February, 2023, ten (10) persons from SATC joined the crowd in the Social Sciences auditorium at the University of the Southern Caribbean (USC): School of Theology and Religion, to attend the 10th Annual Harold Baptiste Lectureship. The theme selected this year was "Carnival, Culture, & Christianity". This annual event was organized by the University, which falls under the purview of the Seventh-Day Adventist Church.

The Conference began with a vibrant welcome by the Associated Student Body, comprising Caribbean representation from different islands. The proceedings of the Conference was chaired by two moderators, Reverend Dr. Faz Hosein, Dean of the Faculty of Theology, and Reverend Sanya Beharry, Presbyterian Minister and Lecturer at SATC. She is the first female moderator to chair the conference, as well as the first non-Seventh-Day Adventist. This was guite an achievement for our Presbyterian church in the Seventh -day Adventist Church and the University of the Southern Caribbean academic community. In the spirit of fellowship, it reflected collaboration, gender inclusion and creation of friendly communities. Reverend Cynara Dube-Khan greeted the participants on behalf of the Presbyterian community. Both ministerial women graciously carried out their duties in an exemplary manner.

Mr. Thomas Edward Isaac, adjunct lecturer of Western Philosophy, delivered the Harold Baptiste lecture on the selected theme, which provided rich documentation for the nation's history and gave balanced insights on different perspectives. The respondent, Reverend Pat Glasgow, former President of the West Indies School of Theology, delivered a brilliant commentary on the ongoing debate. The conference theme was summarized by the presenter who took a religious position from the perspective of the Seventh - Day Adventist Church. He offered powerful comments on the social ills of Carnival, and gave economic and historical accounts of the historical event. Some of the issues raised were: Carnival as a time of productivity for the creative sector; its role in political protest; and the escapism from socioeconomic and political realities.

The questioning of Carnival as part of our culture in terms of who participates (the haves or have nots); the percentage of the population that engages; and the seasonality of Carnival activities and behaviours.

Christianity: response to be salt and light in the light of the commercialism affecting quality and ethos, promiscuity and the objectification of women; and how to avoid all parts of Carnival but instead engage and influence with our moral standpoints, for example in the messages of calypso and pan; the creativity, beauty and representation of the everyman in mas; and the anti-colonialism/antiempire 'sans humanitie.'

The Carnival, Culture & Christianity narrative has contemporary relevance and the documentation provides building blocks for our social and religious development. Through theological education and other related cultural educational seminars, we can use this type of information to build communities that are safe and respectful. Collaboration, cooperation, inclusion, and virtual networking are necessary best-practices to reach a wider

> audience. Also, a collective approach from our stakeholders, including legislators and educators, is what is required to move forward.

The Presbyterian contingent was grateful for the delicious lunch and transportation to and from the University provided by them. We are all delighted that St Andrew's Theological College continues to share annually in this educational conference.

A BIBLICAL BASIS FOR FASTING

Fasting is mentioned extensively in the Bible as an important practice, often associated with prayer. In the PCTT, many of our members especially associate fasting with the season of Lent. In this article, we will explore Bible passages which identify three of the motivations for fasting: Respect for God, Preparation for Action and Sorrow. It also discusses biblical instructions on our attitudes to fasting and ends with a word of caution pertaining to the prolonged fasts.

Fasting is a sign of our respect for God. In Joel 2:12, after a plague of locusts, the Lord tells the people that they should repent and return with fasting and weeping and mourning. Similarly, in Luke 2:36-38, the prophet Anna lived in the temple for decades, worshiping God, fasting and praying. In these passages, repentance alone was not enough to show respect to God, nor was prolonged life in the temple. In both cases, these actions were supplemented by fasting. As Christians, we believe that God is ever-present among us, a privilege for which we should always be thankful. Fasting is one way that we can demonstrate our thanks for that privilege and our respect for the Lord. In this we would be emulating the early church (Acts 14:23), for when those churches appointed Elders they commended them to the Lord with prayers and fasting.

The Bible also shows fasting as a preparation for action. When Ezra was preparing to lead some Jewish exiles back to Jerusalem, he ordered that all should fast, humble themselves before God and ask God to lead them and protect them on their journey (Ezra 8:21). The people fasted and prayed, and God answered their prayers.

Similarly, when Esther was preparing to go before the king to plead for the Jewish people, she asked Mordecai to get all the Jews in Susa to fast and pray for her for three days; and she herself joined in this fast and prayer (Esther 4:16).

The Bible tells us that Esther was successful in her plea to the king. Then in the New Testament (Acts 13:3), when the Holy Spirit selected Barnabas and Saul to go out on a mission, their group fasted, prayed and placed hands upon them before sending them out. Following these examples, we too should fast and pray as we prepare to do important tasks.

A third motivation for fasting is sorrow. The prophet Samuel grieved, mourned and fasted over the death of Saul and Jonathan (2 Samuel 1:12), and again he refused food when his son by Bathsheba was terminally ill (2 Samuel 12:15-17). When another prophet, Daniel, was mourning for three weeks, he did not eat any rich food or any meat, nor did he drink any wine (Daniel 10:2); and when Nehemiah learned that the walls of Jerusalem had not been rebuilt he wept, mourned and did not eat for several days (Nehemiah 1:1-4).

Even in our time, we are aware of people who have refused food when they are deeply sorrowful, so the practice continues.

What does the Bible tell us about our attitude and behaviour when fasting? It says that we must not fast as a show to society, but in a way that only God knows (Matthew 6:16-18). Also, when we are fasting we must give up our wicked behaviour and evil actions and pray earnestly (Jonah 3:4). Our behaviour should be pleasing to God because God will not listen to our prayers if our fasting makes us quarrelsome and violent (Isaiah 58:4). Godcentered fasting, then should be part of a wholesome Christian life, combined with prayer and worship.

Finally, a word of caution concerning prolonged fasts. Two of the best-known fasts in the Bible lasted for 40 days: Moses stayed on the mountain with the Lord for 40 days and nights, eating and drinking nothing (Exodus 34:28), and Jesus was led into the desert for 40 days to be tempted by the devil, and in that time he ate nothing (Luke 4:2). While both these fasts are very impressive, they are not intended to be imitated by the rest of us.

Prolonged fasting can be injurious to our health, so lengthy fasts should not be undertaken without proper medical advice.

CAREER OF EXCELLENCE AWARD

Dr. George Krishna Sammy, Presiding Elder of the PCTT, has received a Career of Excellence in Engineering Award from the Association of Professional Engineers of Trinidad and Tobago (APETT). This award is conferred on members in recognition of exceptional contribution to the engineering profession.

George's engineering career began in 1974, when he graduated from the University of the West Indies with a bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering. He subsequently earned a master's degree (1976) and a doctorate (1982) from the University of Oklahoma, both in Environmental Engineering. Dr. Sammy's doctoral research was on the topic Environmental Impact Assessment in Developing Countries. He is internationally recognized as an expert in that subject.

As a Civil Engineer, George worked on several water supply projects, including the Caroni-Arena Water Supply, the North Oropouche Interim Water Supply, the Northern Range Valleys Water Supply and the Point Fortin Water Supply Pipeline. Since 1989, as founder and Managing Director of Eco-engineering Consultants Limited, Dr. Sammy has specialized in Environmental Engineering; working on projects of various types throughout the Caribbean. He has also lectured extensively on the topic of Environmental Impact Assessment, and in 2021 he published the e-book entitled; "Handbook for EIA Practitioners in the OECS".

Dr. Sammy was elected to receive the APETT Career of Excellence in Engineering Award in September 2020, but it could not be conferred at that time due to Covid restrictions. As a result, the award was conferred at a virtual ceremony on February 4, 2023.
