Since Feb. 12, our team has been busy moving in our new Westlake residents. The building is coming to life as we have one move-in per day, six days a week. We are pleased to welcome each person to their new home and the JKV community.

As of the date of this *Gazette ACE* publication, 80 apartments in Westlake's 15-story Vue and 11-story Terrace are now occupied. The new residents' feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, from moving in to settling in.

The common amenities on the first floor are also opening one by one. A couple of weeks ago, BV's French Press and Wine Bar (named in honor of JKV resident and benefactor Bruce Voelkel) opened to a crowd of more than 150 attendees. Adjacent to BV's, the Westlake Eatery, featuring a casual dining experience, will open later this year.

Tech classes have started in the new Technology Center under the direction of Jason Cook, Technology Engagement Coordinator. From the neophyte to the tech-savvy, classes and one-to-one sessions will keep residents updated on all the newest technologies, hardware, software,

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


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Allan Harris Riifs at JKV

Legendary Jazz Guitarist and Vocalist in Concert




Allan Harris, Jay White and Irwin Hall perform a jazz riff during the Cultural Arts Center concert.

A near-capacity audience arrived at the John Knox Village Cultural Arts Center for an exceptional concert of jazz and blues by legendary artist Allan Harris and his band.

The multi-talented Harris, now in his late 60s, is a jazz vocalist, guitarist, and songwriter from Harlem, NY. With 16 albums to his credit, Harris is well-known in jazz circles and has performed his musical magic around the world.

He was joined on stage at JKV with pianist John Di Martino, saxophonist Irwin Hall, bass player Jay White and drummer Sylvia Cuenca. They performed a tight repertoire of many songs associated with Allan, including: "Can't Live My Life Without You," "So What," and "Jeannine." With a stylistic approach to the jazz and blues roots in each song, the group still had the freedom to improvise as each musician had his or her turn on a featured solo.

The entire performance was comfortable and was wound between tunes by Harris's artful

soliloquies, whether extended quotes from Shakespeare, or thoughts from his own musical history. And as Harris recalled, that musical history included performing 25 years ago at the now closed O'Hara's Jazz and Blues Club on Las Olas Boulevard in Ft. Lauderdale. Harris

was enthused to see his old friend Kitty O'Hara, owner of O'Hara's, in the audience.

For those in attendance, whose musical appreciation has roots in jazz and blues, the opportunity to enjoy the legendary musician and vocalist Allan Harris, offered a night to remember.



For the third year in a row, members of the Tir Na Greine School of Irish Dance enthralled John Knox Village residents with their powerful traditional dances during a St. Patrick's Day-themed happy hour.

Resident enthusiasm for the dancers has grown so much since their inaugural 2022 performance that the event has outgrown its intimate Poolside Pub setting and been shifted to JKV's 350-seat Cultural Arts Center. This event, and many others, are generously funded by residents who donate to the Village's philanthropic arm—the JKV Foundation.

"We are watching these dancers growing up before our very eyes," JKV Life Enrichment Manager Jody Leshinsky told the *Gazette ACE*. "To have seen these lovely girls when they first performed at JKV three years ago and now they are blossoming into lovely and talented ladies. It's very heartwarming for me, and I know our residents love them."

The name Tir Na Greine (pronounced 'tear' 'na' 'gran-ya') is Gaelic for "Land of Sunshine." According to the school's website, "[the name is] appropriate, we think, for a dance school in the 'Sunshine State.'"

This school, which has locations in Boca Raton, West Palm Beach, Jupiter and Stuart, grooms regional, national and world-level qualifying dancers every year.

In fact, several dancers from the troupe were leaving JKV shortly thereafter to participate in the World Irish Dance Championships in Glasgow, Scotland.

According to Wikipedia: "Solo Irish dance includes the most well-known form of Irish dance, Irish Stepdance, which was popularized from 1994 onwards by shows such as "Riverdance," and which is practiced competitively across not only the Irish diaspora, but by many people of disparate cultural backgrounds."

Characterized by a rigid upper body and intricate footwork, Stepdance is comparable to the Irish Jig.

The youngsters not only performed solos, but danced in groups including several popular folk numbers, in which Ceili dances included movements called side steps or sevens and threes where the dancers traveled sideways to the direction they are facing, Wikipedia said.

JKV Rotary Club Steps Up to the Plate

Residents, Staff Rise to Occasion When Asked to Help

Talk about rising to the occasion: More than 150

members of the John Knox Village Rotary Club, Residents and Employees converged in the Village Centre Auditorium last month on an ambitious and altruistic mission to assemble, pack and seal 15,000 bags of fortified rice and soy meal.

The JKV Rotary Club sponsored Rise Against Hunger—a four-star rated Charity Navigator organization. And rise the group did—significantly exceeding their lofty goal by packing a whopping total of 16,632 meals.

"When we decided to do 15,000 meals, the company said that we needed from 80 to 100 volunteers," Cassels Tower resident, Rotary Club member and event organizer Norma Jenkins told the *Gazette ACE*. "I was sure we would get 100 [participants]. JKV residents usually step up

to make a difference when they know the need. I never mind working hard for a worthwhile project and this certainly is one."

Rise Against Hunger aligns itself with the United Nations' Sustainable Goal #2 of Zero Hunger, by distributing nutritious meals to people facing hunger across the globe. The nearly 17,000 meals are destined for impoverished areas in the Philippines.

With sanitary gloves and hairnets in place, everyone enjoyed themselves as they diligently measured the rice and soy meal, sealed the bags, and watched as boxes were loaded into the Rise Against Hunger truck for distribution.

Under the direction of the JKV Rotary Club, and with the enthusiastic response from JKV Residents and Staff, the Rise Against Hunger effort was an unqualified success. This was just one example of the JKV community's charitable response to a call for action.

Carnival Of Venice

Tom Regan explained to the *Gazette ACE* that the Carnival in Venice has many dimensions.

"There are extravagant balls held in ancient palazzos along the Grand Canal that begin with a party extending into a midnight supper followed by dancing until dawn – or so I am told," Tom said.

"In Venice the public celebration is mostly maskers, as individuals or in groups, walking around and posing for photos."

The video below showcases dozens of costumed Carnival revelers. The elaborately designed and crafted accourrements reflect a fantasy look as the Venetians have one last huge celebration before the sacrifices of Lent begin.

As you can imagine, many of the elaborate costumes are passed down through the generations from family member to family member. People from all over the world travel to Venice to join in the festivities and camaraderie of Carnival.

Parades of Viareggio

Viareggio is a coastal town in Tuscany just north of Pisa. Most of the year it is "just" a beautiful seaside resort town, but right before the season of Lent it is transformed into the host town for the Carnevale di Viareggio.


For five days, parades wind through and around the riviera area adjacent to the beach. The parades are held sometime in the day and sometime at night. These massive paper mache floats are fully animated and created by artistic masters, depicting entertaining scenarios that include current politics and humor.

Artists and performers parade with each float, all playing their own music and dancing in costume to enhance the theme of the float. These floats – often measuring more than 30 feet in height – are produced and funded by individual "clubs," who hire a designer and compete for prizes each year.


By night, Bologna glows with many cafes and restaurants. The entire downtown area is lined with colonnaded walking spaces with marble or terrazzo sidewalks.

After leaving Viareggio, Tom visited Cinque Terre, a collection of five fishing villages with seaside homes clinging to cliffs. Due to their colorful beauty, these villages have become iconic tourist spots to avoid in July and August because of the crowds. Fortunately for Tom, in early March, he had an uncrowded area to enjoy.

From Cinque Terre, Tom was off to Florence to catch his flight back to JKV.

'We Are the World:' India in June Colors, Celebrations And Beauty

Today's India is a land with an advanced technology that made the country the first in the world to land their spacecraft, Chandrayaan-3, near the Moon's south pole on Aug. 23, 2023. Adding to this extraordinary achievement, is the fact that India is one of the world's oldest civilizations with more than 5,000 years of documented history.

India is an ancient land of magical beauty, with historical and cultural heritages that are diverse, unique, and offer a rich history. Several examples of monumental achievements in architecture and city planning have been named as UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) World Heritage Sites.

The Taj Mahal

Celebrated for its beauty and graceful design, the white marble Taj Mahal in Agra is regarded as the finest example of Mughal architecture. The Taj Mahal was built by Emperor Shah Jahan to honor his wife and confidant, Mumtaz Mahal.

It took about 22 years to build the complex, which includes an extensive garden with a reflecting pool. It has become the favorite backdrop for photos of visitng royalty: From American Jacqueline Kennedy to Princess Diana of Great Britain.

Hampi Capital of the Vijayanagara Empire

Hampi was the capital of the Vijayanagara Empire from 1336 until 1565 AD. Numerous writings and chronicles left by Persian and European travelers say that Hampi was a prosperous and impressive city with a strategic setting on the banks of the Tungabhadra River. The city was filled with numerous temples, palaces, and trading markets.

By 1500 AD, Hampi-Vijayanagara was the world's second largest, grandest city and probably India's richest, attracting traders from Persia and Portugal.

The Vijayanagara Empire was defeated by a coalition of Muslim sultanates, but many of the architectural wonders and intricately carved buildings have been preserved.

Festival of Colors

Let's not forget the fun life in India. There are colorful festivals with music, dancing and celebrations of every kind throughout the year.

Holi, often referred to as the "Festival of Colors," is one of the best-known Hindu festivals. It celebrates the end of winter and the start of spring. The religious part commemorates the victory of good over evil, with the burning of a demoness named Holika made possible through the help of the god Lord Vishnu. The fun part involves people throwing powders of bright colors all over each other, then using water guns. This is based on Lord Krishna, who liked to play pranks


their way. For Hindu families, Diwali is the most anticipated festival of the year.

Additionally, he has been a volunteer usher at the Broward Center of the Performing Arts in Ft. Lauderdale, since its 1991 opening of "Phantom of the Opera." Mr. Voelkel is also a long-time volunteer at Holy Cross Hospital.

"He is one of the most compassionate individuals I have ever met," said Clark Rechkemmer, Chair of the JKV Foundation. "We are deeply grateful to Bruce for his very generous gift to the entire community."

As he cut the ceremonial ribbon using the obligatory oversized gold-painted scissors, Mr. Voelkel said, "let them eat croissants," and the rest is delicious history in the making.

New Resident Shares Her Creative Vision

With the opening of Westlake at JKV, new residents are moving into their apartments bringing, not only their furnishings and personal mementos, but also their knowledge and life experiences. Many are eager to meet their new neighbors and to share their talents to enrich the JKV community.

Dorothy Simpson Krause and her husband Dick will be making the move to JKV in June. Already ingratiating herself into the community, Dorothy is showcasing her art in an exhibition named: "Transitions," now on display in the JKV Cultural Arts Center Gallery.

In an interview with the Gazette ACE, Dorothy said, "I am a painter by training and collage-maker by nature who began my experimental printmaking with reprographic machines. Since being introduced to computers in the late 1960's, when working on my doctorate at Penn State, I have combined traditional and digital media.

"My work includes large-scale mixed media pieces, artist books and book-like objects that bridge between these two forms. It embeds archetypal symbols and fragments of image and text in



multiple layers of texture and meaning. It combines the humblest of materials, plaster, tar, wax and pigment, with the latest in technology to evoke the past and herald the future. My art-making is an integrated mode of inquiry that links concept and media in an ongoing dialogue – a visible means of exploring meaning.

"I went from Penn State to Virginia Commonwealth University then to Massachusetts College of Art in Boston where I taught and was in administration for 35 years. I followed the development of computers, offered some of the first computer arts classes in the country and computerized the college records. Because technology was so rapidly changing and so expensive, I upgraded my computers every two years and drove the same car forever.

"With a background in traditional art materials, I printed on top of drawings, paintings and collaged

materials, and worked back into printed pieces with oils, pastels, encaustic and whatever ephemera came to hand. I even cut up prints and embedded the pieces into newly couched handmade paper."

After her move to the Village, Dot (as she prefers to be called) intends to share her knowledge and experience in art and publishing with other aspiring residents.

"I really love the sense of community I have found at John Knox Village: Plus, the fact that Dick and I will be aging in place with all the health care facilities located right on campus."

And a bonus is the well-located new art studio on the ground floor of Westlake at JKV. "I think I will be spending much of my time there," Dot said.

Now, as an Artist in Residence at BaCA, Oscar is a teacher and practitioner of his artistic style.

"As time goes on, I am planning to continue my studies and explore new way to express the world in front of me."

Spotlight on Executive Chef Frederic Delaire:

His Journey from Michelin-Starred Restaurants to Senior Living

The long hours and seven-days-a-week schedule running busy kitchens began to take their toll on Chef, his wife and daughter, who is now 12 years old.
