


2025 ISKN YEAR END GATHERINGS

# about ISKN

The Indigenous Seed Keepers Network (ISKN) supports Indigenous communities in protecting, rematriating, and cultivating our seed relatives. We build power across a national network of growers, seed keepers, and advocates working to revitalize Indigenous seed systems and foodways.

The mission of the Indigenous Seed Keepers Network (ISKN) is to nourish and assist the growing Seed Sovereignty Movement across Turtle Island (North America). In the Upper Midwest, ISKN brings together Native seed growers and land stewards for virtual quarterly regional meetings and regular talking circles. ISKN provides regular technical assistance, community outreach, site visits, event support, seedkeeping resources, workshops, and accessible granting programs.



In our teachings, being a good relative is about how we show up for our community. Our community includes our seed relatives, and the land. It's about responsibility, reciprocity, and right relationship.

This campaign honors that teaching.

We look to the butterfly, who pollinates as it travels, transforms, and persists. We honor the hummingbird, whose small body carries messages of blessing, and movement between plants and lifeways. We follow the dragonfly, who reminds us of adaptability, clarity, and the balance between water and air.

Being a Good Relative is to tend, share, protect, and return.

It means honoring seeds not as commodities, but as relatives with memory, purpose, and future. Through this campaign, we're inviting our network and supporters into this teaching. Not as a slogan, but as a commitment.



# our gatherings

Indigenous Seed Keepers Network is working with partners in the region to host an in-person gathering this fall for relationship building, skill sharing, and visioning the future of ISKN. Seedkeeping is generations-long work that requires intention, reciprocity, and intertribal trade and knowledge sharing.

With the current funding environment, including deep cuts to federal support for tribal food sovereignty work, ISKN is working creatively to exercise our culturally-based values and gather in person with the Upper Midwest and the Soutwest ISKN networks. Our goal is to leverage our network of resources and remove barriers for ISKN members to attend our gatherings as well, even amidst unprecedented challenges.
