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
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#### **MISSION**

# **KINDNESS** INITIATIVE

When we talk about the culture of a school, especially a Christian school, there are certain characteristics that should stand out. Here at Kalamazoo Christian we are establishing identifiable characteristics that follow our faithlines and school mission statement that we want our students and staff to exemplify.

As we look at being kind, we see in scripture that Ephesians 4:32 states, "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

The Kindness Initiative was introduced at the K-8 building in January 2024 and went through the end of the school year. Each week teachers were encouraged to nominate any student they noticed being kind. At the end of the week, one student from both the middle school and elementary school was randomly chosen out of the bowl of nominees. That student received a \$10 gift card from Erbelli's, who partnered with us in encouraging kindness among students.

The nominees for the middle school grew steadily over the semester. More and more students were being noticed for their kindness towards others. When we started the initiative, we had the middle school students write words of encouragement on cards that were then dispersed into random books in the library. Many elementary students expressed how much they loved seeing the notes when they checked out their book.

One fourth grade student loved it so much that he wanted to orchestrate more notes to be written so that more kids would find a special note inside one of the books.

Spreading a culture of kindness not only fulfills what scripture tells us, but it also aligns with the 2023-2024 school year's Faithline of God Glorifying. When we are kind to others, we glorify God. Teaching our students kindness means we are instructing what kindness is in all areas of school life.

I personally saw this exemplified on a seventh grade field trip when one student went out of his way and offered to help a complete stranger. I happened to be standing near and saw it. I also saw it displayed when a prospective student came to shadow and two students took time to engage in a very welcoming way throughout the day.

Future plans for the Kindness Initiative are to continue the work of kindness and expand into serving. Our desire is to help our students learn to put their kindness into action by not only serving others at school, but also in our community. This past semester Meghan Van Lente, curriculum coordinator and instructional coach, taught a class for seventh graders with this concept in mind. One field trip took the class to two different sites that serve those in need in our community so that the students could see how communities benefit from these services and how they personally could get involved.

# WILDLIFE GO

Michigan's Congressional App Challenge is an annual event that began in 2015 to encourage middle and high school students to learn coding and computer science skills. Students compete against other students in their district to create an original app. This year, Kalamazoo Christian High School Seniors, Sahib Dhillon, Jacob Van Dyk and Jacob Williams created the app "Wildlife GO" which was selected by district representative Bill Huizenga as the winning app for Michigan's 4th Congressional District.

Van Dyk said, "In Michigan, like many other states, we have so many awesome parks and outdoor green spaces. Many people don't realize or enjoy these spaces, so we created this game/app to get people to go out, explore their surroundings and be more involved with their natural environment."

Users submit pictures of animals they find and "Wildlife GO" uses a machine learning model to identify the animals, assigning each a point value which helps the user move up the leader board.

Williams and Van Dyk started working on "Wildlife GO" during May 2023, and invited Dhillon to help them finish it. When it became time to announce the winner, the finalists were invited to Huizenga's office in Kalamazoo. Van Dyk said, "It was great to meet him and hear officially in person from our representative in Congress."

Dhillon, Van Dyk and Williams traveled to Washington D.C. to display their app at the #HouseOfCode Festival in April 2024.

# SCIENCE CAMP

Science camp is part of the 5th grade curriculum here at Kalamazoo Christian and has been happening for almost 30 years. Jonni Hoeksema, 5th grade teacher, said, "The purpose is to experience what they [the students] have learned in science in a new way."

During the first week of May, students, teachers and volunteers stay at Camp Roger in Kent County, MI for three days at science camp to "interact with God's World and each other in a unique

way." Students rotate through seven sessions of learning: art, rock climbing, compass, pond study, fishing and canoeing, an observation hike and archery. In the evenings the students play group games and take a night hike.

"We are showing the students how to see and experience God—taking their knowledge from their head, to their eyes, to their hearts—all through the time we are at camp."

While science camp provides a unique opportunity to interact with nature, it also serves as a place of intentionality in God's presence. The staff and volunteers host small group devotions and a candle light chapel for the students.

Hoeksema said, "We always have an amazing time of worship, feeling God's presence and talking about how we can and should live our lives for Jesus. It is so amazing to have that time with our students!"

Hoeksema notes how this experience wouldn't be possible without volunteers. This year the group was led by 5th grade teacher, Kim Meyer. The pond study is led by 8th grade teacher, Heather VanDyke. STEM teacher Chris Bierenga has previously

led the compass station and led worship this year while Erica VanderKooy volunteered as camp doctor.

"We depend a lot on the parents of the 5th graders," Hoekesma said. "They volunteer to stay in student cabins, lead sessions, prepare and serve all of our food, help with games and so many other things."

Science camp has been running since 1977 with the intention of many more years of this experience.

# GLORY GIRLS

Glory Girls Run Club (GGRC) was established in 2022 with the mission of creating a Christ-centered space where girls in 3rd-5th grade can develop important life skills such as confidence, character, teamwork and leadership. Most importantly, it provides a place for them to learn about who God created them to be.

Each year, a Biblically-based curriculum is designed alongside an eight-week 5k training program. "As a tenured college instructor and first-year Glory Girls coach, I was so impressed with the program and curriculum. Each activity, whether it was a devotion, game or practice run, was all centered on glorifying God. The program not only grew our girls' faith and service in the Lord, but I am sure it also did this for everyone involved," said Carl, one of the coaches.

A typical practice begins with a devotional and scripture that pertains to the theme of the program, discussion within small groups, goal setting for the day and prayer. The workout portion begins with a fun warm up game, and then running begins outdoors. At the end of practice, teams regroup to journal and reflect on the topic of discussion. A highlight for the girls is discovering who won "Glory Girl" for the day. A "Glory Girl" is someone who demonstrates Christ-like character toward their teammates, and is often nominated by another girl who witnesses these actions.

The girls end the season with a 5k race, complete with race bibs, medals, hair dye, glitter, temporary tattoos and a big pink finish line. "It was amazing to see all the girls at the starting line encouraging each other and smiling–ready to go. It was also amazing to see the fellowship between families and friends, even the community support, like the fire department raising their hose up high and spraying the runners with a water mist," said Coach Carl.

The program is so much more than an athletic program. "I love Glory Girls because they include how we can do physical education for God," said participant, Alani. "I love how they don't just have 3rd graders doing this, but also 4th and 5th as well. I love how they don't just have us running, but they have us stretching as well. I also love how they include Bible verses to share the word of God."

Audrey, parent of a participant, said, "The club has been a place where our daughter not only was encouraged to grow in athletic and physical abilities, but also had opportunities to grow socially and spiritually as she met new friends, navigated challenges, and pushed herself outside of her comfort zone."

The program could not exist without our many dedicated volunteers. We extend our deepest gratitude to each and every one of you for your incredible dedication, passion and support for the girls of GGRC.





# HOW THE KALAMAZOO CHRISTIAN SCHOOL FOUNDATION SUPPORT OUR SCHOOLS

The Kalamazoo Christian School Foundation (KCSF) is a volunteer-based support organization that has been benefiting KCS since 1993. Donations are invested, and annual grants are distributed to KCS for the benefit of its students, building up the Kingdom of God through Christian education. Two important funds are the General Endowment Fund that reduces tuition for all and the Covenant Promise Fund, providing need-based financial assistance. In addition, KCSF has special purpose funds.

You can donate to KCSF to benefit students today or in a way that provides future support.

Donations to the KCSF are not like retirement savings because grant payments are made annually. These annual grant payments are made each school year to help support the school and its students in a perpetual method and thus, KCSF involves endowed funds—either unrestricted or with specific purpose.

As we administer endowed funds, we do not make annual grants or take on expenses that reduce our investments below the accumulated dollars contributed. That limit is called the HDA—the accumulated "historic dollar amount" contributed.

With new donations and growth of investments, we try to achieve higher values each year. KCSF's goal is to provide \$1,000,000 of annual support to KCSA. This would take around \$20,000,000

of investments. KCSF growth comes from new donations and bequests (gifts from a will or trust). KCSF has a long way to go to reach those levels. If your heart guides you to donate to endowed funds that support KCSA in perpetuity, please consider donating to KCSF.
