By Ruth Minsky Sender



A Little Life

If the sobbing, grown man featured on the cover of this book isn't indication enough, let me be abundantly clear: A *Little Life* is utterly depressing. I admit that I enjoy indulging in the occasional tearjerker, if not for the reason that I appreciate realistic, undeniably human stories, then for the reason that I am a woman in her mid-20s who just needs a good cry every now and then. Sue me. The difference between A *Little Life* and other works of fiction that have recently tugged on my heartstrings (*American Dirt* by Jeanine Cummins, *The Light Between Oceans* by ML Stedman) is that A *Little Life* hammers its shocking and morose vignettes into the reader's conscience repeatedly to the point of, frankly, annoyance. After over 800 pages, I was relieved to put the book down a final time due to sheer exasperation. Overall, the book is beautifully written and that alone should be reason enough to read it, but I'm disappointed that I was left feeling more irked than touched upon finishing it.
