We extend our warm congratulations to our newly elected trustees: Jeb Brown, Walt Byers, and Robert McTaggart.


Our new officers are:

Celebrating a Season of Firsts

As we wind down this extraordinary Jubilee season, we have so much to celebrate.

This summer has been filled with firsts — and each one has helped shape a Bay View that honors its history while stepping boldly into the future.

We were honored to welcome Munson Healthcare as Bay View's first-ever Season Sponsor, a remarkable partnership that reflects our shared commitment to health, well-being, and community enrichment. Their support helped make many of this season's standout moments possible.

And what a season it's been.

On **July 6th**, despite the steady rain, more than **1,000 people** came out to celebrate **Bay View's 150th Jubilee**. The weather didn't dampen our spirits — it just added to the joy and sense of resilience that defines this community. From the music, facepainting, photobooth, and memories to the unveiling of the community time capsule, it was a day we'll never forget.

Our community made a difference in other tangible ways, too. Our children packed more than **15,000 meals for Meals of Hope**, helping to combat food insecurity right here in northern Michigan. Through the **CROP Walk**, we raised \$28,000 to fight

hunger both locally and globally. This summer also saw an expansion of our mission **beyond campus**, with more than a dozen **off-campus programs** — lectures, concerts, and events that brought the spirit of Bay View into the wider Petoskey community and invited new friends into our fold.

In Hall Auditorium, we were thrilled to host three sold-out Pops concerts—unforgettable evenings filled with world-class performances, dancing, and singalongs. Our Jubilee season also brought the first-ever sold-out lecture in Hall, featuring **Temple** Grandin, with more than half the audience made up of educators and families with neurodivergent loved ones. Robin Wall Kimmerer marked another milestone as the first evening worship speaker in Hall Auditorium—another sold-out event.

We launched **NextUp**, our very first gathering for emerging Bay View leaders, and held a **Community Listening Session** — both aimed at opening new channels of dialogue and planning for our future.

Transparency was also a priority this season. We introduced the first-ever **One Bay View Invoice**, making it easier for members to understand the cost and budget their expenses.

And none of this would be possible without our dedicated volunteers, program directors, committee chairs, Board Members, staff, donors, and YOU — the heart of this Chautauqua on the shores of Lake Michigan.

As we reflect on all we've accomplished together, we're also looking ahead with hope and momentum. The Jubilee was

more than a celebration — it was a launchpad. Let's continue building on this legacy of excellence, service, and shared purpose.

From the Worship Director, Rev. Hilary Barrett

The 2025 Worship Program proudly continues Bay View's rich tradition of welcoming preachers, teachers, visionaries, and healers from across the country—each invited to help us reflect on the things that matter most.

This week, we are honored to welcome, for the second time, The Rev. Dr. Luke Powery, who will be delivering the message at our Assembly Worship Service on **Sunday, August 10th at 10:45 a.m.** Please note: Dr. Powery will preach on Sunday only and will not be teaching during the week.

The Rev. Dr. Luke A. Powery is the Dean of Duke University Chapel and Professor of Homiletics and African and African American Studies. His teaching and research interests are at the intersection of preaching, pneumatology, music, and culture, particularly expressions of the African diaspora. He is the author of many books, including Becoming Human: The Holy Spirit and the Rhetoric of Race, which received the 2023 Book of the Year award from the Religious Communication Association and also the Academy of Parish Clergy. Dean Powery has a keen interest in the humanizing practices of restorative justice and reentry. In the Spring of 2023, he taught a course on the Spirituals at a federal men's prison through the Prison Studies program at Duke Divinity School and hopes to continue to teach in this program in the future.

Prior to his appointment at Duke, he served as the Perry and Georgia Engle Assistant Professor of Homiletics at Princeton Theological Seminary. He received his Bachelor of Arts in music with a concentration in vocal performance from Stanford University, his Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary, and his Doctor of Theology from Emmanuel College at the University of Toronto.
