# Kooyong's John Peers Wins Australian Open **Doubles Title**

Kooyong's John Peers has won his first Grand Slam title after capturing the Australian Open Doubles crown with his partner Henri Kontinen in late January.



n an unbelievable fortnight for Kooyong Foundation Scholarship holders, Peers put the cream on top with a virtuoso performance in a classic final against the legendary Bryan brothers.

Having come through some tough matches, especially their third round win against Colombians Juan Sebastian Cabal and Robert Farah where they won 6/7 7/6 7/6 before facing off with Sam Groth and Chris Guccione in the quarterfinals.

Peers and Kontinen didn't put a step wrong to defeat the big serving Australians 7/5 6/3 to setup a semi final against fellow Kooyong Foundation Scholarship holders Andrew Whittington and Marc Polmans, who had been on a giant killing run of their own including wins over the 11th, 8th and top seeds.

Polmans and Whittington had defeated the number 8 seeds, Daniel Nestor and Edouard Roger-Vasselin, in the second round after losing the first set 6/0 before defeating the 11th seeded pair of Jean-Julien Rojer and Horia Tecau in two tiebreaks.

The match against the top seeds was another fantastic

performance by the young pair who defeated two of the best doubles players in the world 7/6 2/6 6/4.

In a great match between three of Kooyong's finest products Peers and Kontinen continued their run with some clutch serving and solid all round play to defeat the young Kooyong duo 6/4 6/4.

The final was another brilliant match with the Bryan brothers hoping to break the record for the most doubles Grand Slam wins but the Australian and Finnish combination got the crucial break late in the first set to edge closer to their maiden Grand Slam title.

The second set was more of the same as both pairs tried valiantly to get the crucial break but it took a sublime lob on match point from Peers to secure the Australian Open title and what an exciting moment it was as the crowd including many family and friends erupted as they won 7/5 7/5 over the famous Bryan brothers.

Congratulations must go to everyone involved with John over the years and it was an absolute treat to see him win his first Grand Slam title in front of his home town crowd!

The Davis Cup came straight after the Australian Open and again Kooyong was delighted to host the event. The Australian team included Kooyong's John Peers playing in the doubles and this time Australia won, much to the delight of the crowd.

Our Club championships have come and gone and we have two new Club tennis champions in Daniel Byrnes, who won his second title, and Binasa Beslagic, who won the women's title. The squash titles were taken out by Cameron White and Christine Nunn and we congratulate all Club members who competed.

## **Kooyong Master Plan**

Kooyong enters its 125th year with a reputation for development and innovation, providing world class facilities for its members while remaining the spiritual home of Australian tennis. In recent years there have been substantial improvements to the courts and gardens, and of course the

But, despite the excellent opportunities provided for members today, there are challenges that we need to overcome, and further improvements to services and facilities that must be made to ensure the club continues to maintain its reputation as one of the great clubs of the world.

To this end, the Board has been reviewing the Club's master plan in conjunction with architect Bruce Henderson who worked with us on the successful 2009 clubhouse redevelopment.

Based on feedback and practical considerations, the two priority issues that must be addressed are increasing car parking and improving internal traffic flow. There is also desire to make further improvements to amenities and services within the clubhouse.

Kooyong is often busy and parking is regularly close to capacity. In addition, the club's southern boundary crosses land occupied via a leasehold arrangement and it is possible that this land may be reclaimed in future years for railway developments or crossing works. So, we need to ensure the club increases parking on the site, while ensuring alternative arrangements are in place to future proof the property for access and egress.

The layout of the site both constrains and dictates the way forward.

A number of options have been explored including construction of car parking below the grass courts, a major development along the southern roadway, and alternatively, construction of multitiered car parking north of the stadium, close to the freeway. These have all been found to be prohibitive in terms of cost, and amenity and access.

The most logical and practical solution which improves parking capacity, traffic flow around the site and opportunities for required additions and improvements to clubhouse facilities, lies with the stadium. Specifically the removal of some upper level sections on the southern and western sides.

The original lower level stands in the stadium were built in 1926, and in 1934 the four upper level sections were added to the north. These sections reflect the integrity of the traditional structure and heritage of the stadium and are considered important to retain. However the other upper level sections added in the late 1950's and early 1960's are not of similar significance and removal of those sections and supporting concrete pillars would free up much needed space. Although these changes would reduce seating, there would still be sufficient capacity to accommodate the needs of events, including the annual Kooyong Classic, and potential Davis Cup ties.

From an ongoing maintenance perspective, this approach also has merit. Members will be aware from previous reports that remedial and protective work has been undertaken to deal with concrete cancer. This treatment is expensive and has a finite life span, and so it is not ideal (financially or otherwise) to maintain all sections of the stadium in the long term.

Freeing up spaces around the stadium would enable our priority requirements and other improvements to be achieved (without impacting the courts) including:

- O construction of a two-way road between the clubhouse and stadium to improve access and egress,
- O creation of three level car parking west of the stadium increasing capacity by almost 50%,
- O extensions of the clubhouse to provide additional squash courts and change rooms,
- O expanded health club facilities,
- O additional rooms for member groups' activities,
- O a new crèche for members' children, and
- **O** new workshop areas for property maintenance.

## **Next steps**

While the masterplan is progressing, several issues need to be dealt with before detailed plans can be developed and presented to members for consideration.

The club has had preliminary discussions with Stonnington Council. Council has advised that any changes to the stadium structure would require a Planning Permit under the heritage overlay that currently exists. Council has recommended that we lodge a Planning Application to allow formal consideration of the proposal under the permit application process. This is preferable to seeking an amendment to the heritage overlay itself, which would require a separate planning scheme amendment process that would be very difficult particularly insofar as it applies to the original part of the stadium.

We have also had discussions with Melbourne Water regarding proposed works, and because the site is considered a retarding basin, the flood management plan for the site is currently being updated. These discussions have raised concerns about development over a sewer line that runs east west under the property, including sections proposed for construction of the car park. The condition of the structure built in 1907 is currently being investigated and we are seeking to gain in-principle support for the proposed works to enable a Planning Application to progress.

"Kooyong has a history of which we are all proud, and we need to balance in any redevelopment a commitment to recognising that history, while continuing to evolve and meet the needs of members."

Therefore, we have engaged a panel of expert advisors and consultants headed up by Sally Macindoe of Norton Rose Fulbright to prepare the Planning Application and ensure that a responsible and rigorous approach is undertaken to progress the application to lodgement. Sally is widely acknowledged for her expertise in all aspects of planning law with a particular focus on major project development work. As heritage is a major issue, our consultants also include conservation and heritage architect, Bryce Raworth, who is well regarded by Stonnington and has extensive experience in dealing with similar applications.

The Planning Application (including detailed reports from each of our consultants) is intended to be lodged with Council by mid 2017. From that time Stonnington Council will follow a process to review and seek information relevant to the application, prior to advising the club of a decision.

If the Council decides not to grant a Permit or decides to impose conditions that would be problematic the Board considers the club should exercise its rights to seek a review of that decision in the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal. Whilst this could be a lengthy process, it is considered crucial for the future of the club.

We are, however, hopeful that the application process will achieve a positive outcome. From there we'll be in a position to develop detailed plans to present to members for due consideration. It is important to note that members will ultimately decide if the club is to proceed with any development and member approval would need to be obtained before we commit to any works.

# **Destanee Aiava Named in** First Fed Cup Team

Australia's Fed Cup captain Alicia Molik named Kooyong Foundation star Destanee Aiava alongside fellow Kooyong member Ash Barty as well as Daria Gavrilova and Casey Dellacqua for the Fed Cup World Group II Play-off against Serbia in late April.

ixteen-year-old Aiava announced her presence on the world stage after qualifying at the Brisbane International in January before featuring at the Priceline Pharmacy Kooyong Classic. Awarded a wildcard into the Australian Open after winning December's 18's National title, Aiava became the first player born this century to compete in a Grand Slam.

"I'm delighted to name Destanee alongside Dasha, Ash and Casey for this must-win tie against Serbia," Fed Cup captain Alicia Molik said.

"We all saw Destanee's talent and determination during the Aussie summer and I'm really looking forward to seeing her blossom and develop as she matures into a professional tennis player. I'm also very pleased to include another of our young standout players, 17-year-old Jaimee Fourlis, in the squad as orange girl. Jaimee too had a breakthrough summer, winning her first-round match at the Australian Open, and this will be a terrific experience for her.

"Destance and Jaimee will see first-hand what a fantastic team this is. Dasha, Ash and Casey are a truly professional unit, with a great work ethic and a willingness to put the team first to get the job done. I'm looking forward to a week of hard work, great team spirit, and of course a big win," Molik said.

The team, with the exception of Gavrilova who was already in Europe, had been preparing for the tie at a training camp at Melbourne Park, before heading to Serbia on Easter Sunday.

This was the first time Australia and Serbia had met. Australia went on to win the tie to retain their place in World Group II, the top 16 Fed Cup nations, and the loss for Serbia committed them back to the Europe-Africa Zone.

The tie was played in Zrenjanin, Serbia from 22-23 April with Barty and Gavrilova proving dominant to help Australia get over the line.

# **Davis Cup Returns To** Kooyong For Second Straight Year

Kooyong has again hosted a Davis Cup first round tie, this time against the Czech Republic on hardcourt after last year seeing the Americans win on a drop in grass court.



fter a ten year hiatus Kooyong has hosted two ties in two years with this year's first round match being played directly after the Australian Open to give the Australian team a distinct advantage especially without the prospect of having to face the Czech Republic's number one player in Tomas Berdych.

Australia was also without Bernard Tomic which saw Jordan Thompson come into the team to make his Davis Cup debut while Kooyong's John Peers would again feature in the doubles with Sam Groth while Nick Kyrgios again headlined the team.

The Czech Republic team was made up of Jiri Vesely, Jan Satral, Radek Stepanek and newcomer Zdenek Kolar with Australia's Jordan Thompson drawn to get proceedings underway against Vesely on day one.

The first match would set the tone for the tie as Thompson made the most of his debut with a straight sets win 6/3 6/4 over the 54th ranked Vesely to give Australia the perfect start.

"Unbelievably satisfying," said Thompson, of his first Davis Cup success. "That was the best feeling in my life, I reckon."

Nick Kyrgios was up next against the inexperienced Jan Satral and he immediately stamped himself on the match to ensure the Australians took control of the tie. Kyrgios' solid serving was a key to his straight-set win 62 63 62. He served up 21 aces and a 76 percent record on first serve points won.

"It was a really professional job by Nick today to go out there and get the job done, and to walk away putting us 2-0 up," said Australian captain Lleyton Hewitt.

With Radek Stepanek unable to compete in the doubles, the Czech Republic changed their doubles pairing to feature the two singles players from the first day to hopefully keep the tie alive but Kooyong's John Peers and Sam Groth had other thoughts.

The doubles rubber was another straight forward affair for the Australians despite one early break of serve to neatly wrap up the tie 6/3 6/2 6/2.



"It's never easy to back up what I went through at the Australian Open," Peers said. "I was on an amazing high afterwards and was very drained for a few days. Wednesday I said to Grothy that I have some mental energy and feeling almost fresh again on court."

On the final day with two dead rubbers to be played, Groth went down to Vesely 3/6 7/5 6/3 in a tight three set encounter after serving for the match in the second set while Thompson completed the 4 rubbers to 1 rout with a 7/6 6/2 win over Satral to setup a quarterfinal showdown with America in Brisbane in early April.

"We really want to make a good run this year and we've given ourselves an opportunity to do that now," said Lleyton Hewitt, the Australian captain. "We know it's going to get a lot

tougher along the way. We have a good team going forward and we're going to look forward to this next quarterfinal."

In a deal brokered all the way back to 1999, the Australians have hosting privileges against America despite the fact the Americans travelled to Kooyong in last year's first round tie between the two long-time Davis Cup foes.

In 1999, which happened to be the Centenary year for Davis Cup, America wanted to host the July dated tie that year at the Longwood Cricket Club in Boston, Massachusetts as it was the very site where the first Davis Cup tie took place.

The problem was that it wasn't the USA's time to host, as they had hosted the previous tie. The Australians agreed to giving up the home ground on that occasion for the right to have the next two outings against the USA in Australia.

It was a terrific hit out for the 23 year old Whittington despite going down to Coric 6/3 6/4.

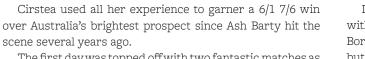

The first day was topped off with two fantastic matches as big Ivo Karlovic edged out Gilles Simon in a match tiebreak 6/4 6/7 10/7 and Jerzy Janowicz proved to be too good for Tommy Haas in another match tiebreaker 5/7 6/4 10/4.

Day two started in unfortunate circumstances with Andrew Whittington having to withdraw from his match with Mikhail Youzhny after rolling his ankle early in the first set.

With the Australian Open so close there were no risks being taken and the young star had to make sure he was right to go for the first round in five days time.

The second match saw David Goffin come up against Bernard Tomic for a spot in the Priceline Pharmacy Classic final and it was all Goffin in the first set as he took the

The second set was much tighter as Tomic attempted to wrest back the momentum but Goffin again proved to be too good as he moved through to another final 6/2 6/4.

Jerzy Janowicz returned on day two to play young Japanese star Yoshihito Nishioka and it was two tight sets in perfect conditions but Janowicz worked his way through Nishioka to win a hotly contested match 7/6 7/6.

The last match was between eventual winner of the women's event Yanina Wickmayer and China's Qiang Wang and the former world number 12 used all of experience to get the upper hand against Wang and book herself a spot in the final with a 6/3 6/4 win.

Day three began with a bang as the crowd was treated with the addition of Jo-Wilfried Tsonga in a match against Borna Coric. The young Croat threw everything at Tsonga but the big Frenchman proved to be too good as he went on to win a close encounter 6/3 7/6.

Destanee Aiava was next on court against China's Qiang Wang and it was an extremely competitive battle as both women tried to gain the ascendency.

Wang seemed to settle into the match a little bit better in the first set and took it 6/4 before Aiava stormed back into the match and looked likely to take the second set before Wang again used her experience to get the vital break late in the set to secure the straight sets win 6/47/5.

The third match saw Russia's Karen Khachanov get a win over Japan's Yoshihito Nishioka in a match tiebreaker 6/4 2/6 10/3 before Marc Polmans came back from a set down in his Kooyong Classic debut against Mikhail Youzhny to upset the Russian star 2/6 6/2 10/7 in an impressive display to finish the day.

The final day was unfortunately cut short due to the inclement weather that continued to sweep across the club but both final were shortened to one set to allow a winner to be crowned.

In the playoff for third and fourth it was Gilles Simon who edged out Bernard Tomic 6/3.

The final saw David Goffin and Ivo Karlovic play out a competitive set in tough conditions in which the Belgian star found a way to win in a tiebreaker to take out back to back titles here at Kooyong.

"So it was tough to get into the rhythm and get into the match but I tried to do as good as I could and I tried to get my legs moving because that was pretty much the hardest part. I think we both did well going out there trying our best."

its first senior Grand Slam success with the victory by John Peers and his partner Henri Kontinen in the Men's Doubles at the Australian Open.

This was a triumph to be savoured as John was one of the first boys to be awarded a Kooyong Foundation Scholarship soon after it was established 15 years ago. The Peers name has long been a byword at Kooyong with John's mother, Liz, the winner of a record 14 Club singles titles and sister Sally also a Club singles champion and Wimbledon Junior Doubles winner.

Late last year John and Henri clinched the prestigious ATP World Tour Finals Doubles Championship in London, capping off a superb year in which they emerged as two of the finest doubles players on the circuit.

John followed up his Australian Open success by teaming with Sam Groth early this month to clinch the Davis Cup doubles rubber against the Czech Republic on Kooyong's Centre Court.

The Australian Open saw several Foundation players in action, some of them making their first appearance at that level. The debutants included the highly-promising 16-yearold Destanee Aiava, who gained a wildcard entry into the main draw by winning the 18s National Singles title.

Destance became the first player born this century to play in the main draw of a Grand Slam and looked very comfortable against Mona Barthel, the former world number 23, going down 6/3, 7/6.

Andrew Whittington was given a discretionary wildcard into the Open and won his first round match against Adam Pavlasek, currently ranked 86, in four sets.

Andrew next came up against the giant-serving Ivo Karlovic, ranked 21 in the world. The Kooyong youngster

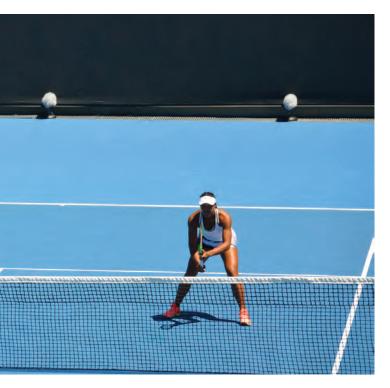

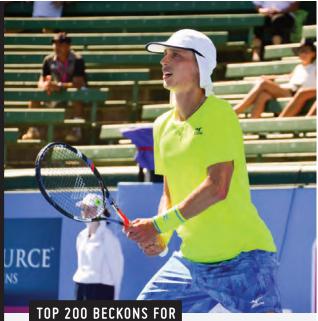
