GENERAL INFORMATION

ABSENTEES

If your child will be absent from school, please fill in the Absentee form on SEQTA Engage or email studentwellbeingcentre@sthildas.wa.edu.au before the commencement of school. If you do not notify the School, we will contact the parent/ guardian to confirm the absence.

APPOINTMENTS OR LATENESS

Please notify us as above if your child will be late or absent for part of the day due to medical or dental appointments or other special circumstances. Your child must also sign in/out at the Student Wellbeing Centre upon arrival and prior to departure, so we have parental permission for these absences.

ILLNESS

If your child is unwell, please do not send them to school; this will aid their recovery and limit the spread of illness. If your child presents to school unwell, parents will be called to collect them as soon as possible.

PERMISSION FOR EXTENDED LEAVE FROM SCHOOL

Please keep holidays and related absences to the allocated school holidays. Permission must be sought for planned absences of three days or more. This must be submitted via an extended leave application form, which can be found on the School App.

ASSEMBLIES

Assemblies are held during Period 1 on most Fridays. Important assemblies are livestreamed for parents unable to attend, and links for the livestream events are sent out via the School App.

HEALTH CENTRE

Our Health Centre is staffed by a registered nurse every day and is available to support students who become unwell while at school or have a minor accident. Parents will be called to collect their child if they are to go home due to illness. Please ensure that your Consent2Go health records are regularly updated, particularly if your medical conditions change, so that our nurses have all the necessary information on hand to attend to your daughter's health needs. You will receive a link to Consent2Go each year to update your child's health record and ensure that all information we hold is accurate.

STUDENT MEDICATION

Please update any new medical information via Consent2Go or to the Registered Nurse. Health-related policies are available on the School App.

Over-the-counter medications (supply available in the Health Centre) are only administered if parental permission has been provided.

CURRICULUM AND ACADEMIC HANDBOOKS

Academic handbooks are available for each year group, which include information on the curriculum, courses, and homework expectations. Please refer to the School App to download the relevant handbooks.

EXAMS AND ASSESSMENTS

Exams and assessments are conducted at different times throughout the year, depending on the year group. Please refer to the School calendar for formal exam dates.

If your daughter is unable to attend an exam or assessment, then a parent or guardian must phone the Student Wellbeing Centre so teachers can be notified. Year 11s and 12s must follow the guidelines outlined in the Assessment Policy. St Hilda's conditions for special consideration of academic results due to sickness/misadventure are consistent with those of the School Curriculum and Standards Authority.

SCHOOL CALENDAR

The School Calendar can be accessed via the School App and should be checked regularly, as dates, venues, and times are subject to change.

CHAPEL

Chapel takes place in Year groups as well as House groups throughout the year. Full senior school services are also conducted in the PAC on a regular basis.

COCURRICULAR OFFERINGS

The cocurricular programs at St Hilda's are designed to ignite, enhance, and spark a thirst for knowledge, and to provide opportunities for our students to engage with the world beyond the classroom. Cocurricular opportunities are available in Sport, Music, Dance, Drama and Outdoor Education. There are also a number of cocurricular clubs and committees that students can participate in. CHANGE OF CONTACT DETAILS

COMMUNICATION AND SCHOOL PLATFORMS

We utilise a range of channels to communicate with our community. Some of these include:

SCHOOL APP

This is St Hilda's main form of communication. The App is used to access year group, cocurricular and sport notices as well as links to newsletters, My Student Account (MSA), term dates, transport options and the School calendar. If you already have this, please ensure you adjust your 'subscriptions' to select your child's current year level (s) and cocurricular activities.

You can access the App via Google Play and the Apple App Store. Simply search for St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls and click on the App with our logo to download it to your personal device. Once you have downloaded the App, you will need to enter your St Hilda's issued username and password (i.e. 1234@sthildas.wa.edu.au).

You will then need to subscribe to your child's year level and cocurricular activities via 'settings' to receive only the relevant notices.

SEQTA ENGAGE

Is our learning management platform which displays your child's timetable, upcoming assessments and online marks.

Absentees should also be recorded on SEQTA Engage.

You can also access the opt-in Friendship list on the Contacts tab.

Update your contact details and your child's photo permissions on the My Details tab.

Access your fee statements, invoices and credit card details on the Finance tab for your school fee payments.

EMAIL

You may receive direct communications from teaching and operational staff.

NEWSLETTERS

This includes the Principal's update, important announcements and events, as well as Junior School and Senior School updates and notices. This can also be downloaded via the School App.

SMS NOTIFICATIONS

These will be used for time-sensitive and urgent information.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Facebook, LinkedIn and Instagram are used to promote student and staff achievements, school events and strategic updates.

MY STUDENT ACCOUNT (MSA) allows families to add credit to student cards for the café.

CONSENT2GO is a digital solution that easily enables you to keep your child's health records accurate and provides consent for school events, excursions, and camps in a secure and timely manner. Please access and download the App [here](#).

BAY CAFÉ

The Bay Café is located in the Great Court and is open Monday through Friday. It provides nutritious food for breakfast, recess, lunch, and after-school snacks.

Orders can be placed online using My Student Account (MSA) or at the Café window prior to 8.20am. Alternatively, students can purchase directly from the café using their student card, cash or EFTPOS card. Mobile phones can not be used to purchase products from the café.

COMPLAINTS

If any member of the school community has a complaint, they are encouraged to lodge it verbally by phone, in person, by letter, email, or via the complaints form on the school's website. Please refer to the Complaints Policy available on the School App for further information.

GETTING ASSISTANCE

There are many people at the school who can help your daughter or you solve a problem.

- Your daughter's Homeroom Teacher will be able to help her with organisational issues and logistical problems. They are the first point of call for questions and support.
- Your daughter's Head of Year works with the eight Homeroom Teachers to oversee the social and academic wellbeing of students in their cohort. They develop relevant and current wellbeing programs, provide student leadership opportunities, review students' academic reports, monitor absences and plan major events for their students.
- The Dean of Student Wellbeing manages and supports each Head of Year and School Psychologists to ensure a team approach to wellbeing issues. They will oversee attendance matters and assist with peer relationships.
- The Head of Careers will help her with any queries about tertiary courses or future career options.
- The Dean of School Operations and Cocurricular will assist with cocurricular queries and questions.
- The Director of Teaching and Learning will help with any queries about subject choices, tertiary education requirements, or the academic program.
- The Director of Senior School can assist with more complex issues.

If your daughter has a problem, the most important thing for her to do is to speak to one of her teachers or any of the people listed previously. If the teacher cannot answer her question, she will be directed to someone who can assist her.

As a general rule:

- You or your daughter should approach her classroom teacher for academic matters
- For any other matters, you or your daughter should approach her Homeroom Teacher.

LIBRARY

LOCKERS

Each student is issued a locker at the commencement of each year. All items are to be secured within the locker throughout the day. Students can access items outside of lesson times.

LOST PROPERTY

All belongings should be clearly marked with the student's name. Lost property is handed over to the Student Wellbeing Centre, where students can go to search for their lost items.

If the property is named, the Student Wellbeing Centre will email the student to collect it. At the end of each term, any unclaimed or unnamed items are disposed of or given to charity.

MOBILE PHONES AND SMARTWATCHES

If Year 8 – 12 students bring their mobile phones to school, they must be stored in their locked lockers. Students are not to access them from once they arrive at school through to when they leave the school campus. Phones will be confiscated if these rules are not followed. If anyone needs to make a call, students can visit the Student Wellbeing Centre at any time. Please refer to the mobile phone policy on the School App for further information.

Year 7 students are encouraged not to have a mobile phone. If they bring their mobile phone to school, they must hand it in to the Student Wellbeing Centre before homeroom. They can be collected after school.

No curriculum courses will require a student to have a mobile device in class.

Smartwatches are not permitted for all Year 7-12 students.

MONEY AND VALUABLES

Valuable items should not be brought to school. Money must be kept in the student's locked locker. If, for any reason, a large sum of money or valuable items need to be brought to school, they must be given to the Head of Year or the Dean of Student Wellbeing for safekeeping.

REPORTING TIMELINE

TERM 1

Assessment marks are loaded throughout the term on SEQTA Engage. Year 11 and 12 Parent/Teacher interviews (Student attends)

TERM 2

Assessment marks are loaded throughout the term to SEQTA Engage. Semester 1 reports will be uploaded to SEQTA Engage for all students. Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 Parent/teacher interviews (Student attends)

TERM 3

Assessment marks are loaded throughout the term to SEQTA Engage.

TERM 4

Assessment marks are loaded throughout the term in SEQTA Engage.

Semester 2 reports will be uploaded to SEQTA Engage for all Year 7-11 students.

Statement of Achievement and Activities document uploaded to SEQTA Engage. This statement will list all St Hilda's cocurricular activities and awards the student has participated in and received during the academic year. Students must have attended a minimum of 80% for the activity to be displayed on the statement.

ATAR predictions are issued in Years 11 and 12 after each set of in-school examinations.

Please Note: Assessment marks will only be published to SEQTA Engage after they have been marked, moderated and handed back to the students (where appropriate). Whilst the normal timeframe for this process is about a fortnight, it can be longer depending on the nature of the learning area and assessment task. Parents will be responsible for checking the online marks portal for updates, as parents will not be informed each time an assessment is uploaded.

The school is acutely aware that the implementation of 'live' assessment marks can lead to greater pressure and anxiety for our students. It is recommended that any concerns regarding an individual assessment be discussed with your child in a considered and supportive manner. Any queries or ongoing concerns related to the results of assessments should be emailed directly to the learning area teacher.

STUDENT WELLBEING/SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGISTS

STUDENT ASSIGNED LEARNING DEVICE – LAPTOPS

All Senior School students are assigned a laptop. This enables our students to be better equipped to learn anywhere and at any time.

SCHOOL UNIFORM AND UNIFORM SHOP

The school prides itself on its presentation, and the school uniform is compulsory for all students. All students are expected to wear their uniform correctly and with pride. They are required to maintain high standards of appearance within the school and outside in the community. The Uniform Policy must be adhered to at all times. Students not adhering to the policy will, after three warnings, be assigned a lunchtime detention.

It is essential that all students are properly dressed every day and that their uniform is clean and fits well. All clothing should be clearly labelled with your child's name.

- Boaters are compulsory to and from school in Term 1 and Term 4
- Pale blue shirt with yellow piping
- Grey skirt (regulation knee length) or grey pants
- Blue ankle sock
- Brown Lace-up school shoes
- Grey jumper (optional, only worn on school grounds)
- One pair of small gold or silver studs, no larger than 4mm in diameter, with one worn in each lower ear lobe only
- No make-up or nail polish
- St Hilda's hair ribbon or pale blue scrunchies
- The blazer is compulsory to and from school in Term 2 and Term 3 and for formal events throughout the school year.

All uniform items (except the brown shoes) can be purchased from the Uniform Shop located at the Bay View campus on Palmerston Street. Please refer to the School App for Uniform Shop opening times, price lists and policies.

The Uniform Shop will be open on additional dates prior to the commencement of the school year. Please check the School App for the current opening dates and times.

STUDENT WELLBEING

Student Wellbeing is overseen by the Dean of Student Wellbeing (7-12). The Wellbeing Team provides assistance to parents through information, counselling and the facilitation of communication between school and home. Counselling services are available for every student. Parents are encouraged to contact their Homeroom Teacher or Head of Year directly with any concerns regarding a student's progress in settling into a new school, academics and learning, social-emotional development, or general welfare.

STUDENT CARD / SMARTRIDER CARD

When students commence Senior School they will receive a Smartrider / Student Card, which includes their photo for easy identification and is barcoded for the Library and Technology Centre. The card is used to pay for public transport. As St Hilda's is a cashless school, the student card is required to purchase items from the Bay café and for printing. Lost cards should be reported to the Student Wellbeing Centre, and a new card will be ordered at a cost of \$7.00. All money on the lost card will be transferred to the new card. Parents can upload funds via My Student Account (MSA).

TRANSPORTATION AND PARKING

PARKING

Parking for parents is available at the front of the school and along Glyde Street. Please do not park or block our neighbours' driveways.

DROP OFF ZONES

There is a drop-off zone on Palmerston Street and Bay View Terrace.

Parents using the Bay View Terrace drop zone should proceed to the northern corner past reception to ensure the safety of all students and reduce congestion. Cars **should not** stop near the Chapel for drop-off.

BICYCLES

If students ride to school, they are not required to wear their blazers or boaters while riding; however, they must have them with them. Helmets must be worn at all times. Please use Palmerston Street or Glyde Street entrances for safety, and padlock bikes in the bike stands provided. Bikes are not to be ridden through school grounds.

TUTE CENTRE

The Tute Centre is available to all students and is located in the library.
