

Tender, Loving Care

Plumeria is one of my favorite flowers due to their remarkable fragrance and because they remind me of Hawaii. When our family attended Pine Island's Mango Mania eleven summers ago, my mother, sister and I each bought a cutting of plumeria. We were told that all we needed to do is go home and stick them in a pot or the ground.

My mother stuck hers in a mulched mound in front of her home, where it had full sun. She never watered it, but did have it fertilized regularly. We just stuck ours in a pot, with no thought about the soil we stuck it in, and then we forgot about it. Years later it was still just a stick, so my husband planted it in the ground where it finally started to grow. We were spending most of our time in Georgia during those years, and we gave no attention to it at all.

Definition of *tender loving care*

: extra attention to make someone or something look or feel better



Now that you are done laughing at the contrast, there is a life lesson to be learned.

If our church is going to grow and thrive, each of us needs to grow and thrive, because WE ARE the church. Failure to thrive is a term used to describe inadequate growth or the inability to maintain growth, usually in early childhood. It is a sign of undernutrition, and many biologic, psychosocial, and environmental processes can lead to undernutrition. I think it is safe to say that my plumeria has failed to thrive in the eleven years we've had it. Whatever my mother has done for hers that we did not do for ours led to vastly different results!

Wouldn't it be sad if one of us ends up looking like my plumeria? Look around you. What do the people around you need from you? Is there someone you can affirm, encourage, support? Is there someone you who is failing to thrive? Is there someone who can benefit from your tender, loving care?

None of us really wants any one to fail to thrive. But we don't always recognize that it is the responsibility of each of us to be intentional in the lives of all of us to give the tender loving care needed to grow. Everyone is fighting some type of battle. We need to get to know each other better and establish a safe environment so we can start to uncover what kind of loving care is needed. We need to keep our minds off ourselves and be intentional to pay extra attention to each other so we all feel better – so we all grow better – so we all thrive.

Yes, it will take time and energy and God can give us both. We can nourish each other in the ways that He has gifted us to do so, in the situation He has us in right now. He is the One who will guide us in our quest to show His tender loving care to others.

To answer these questions, you need to meet Ann Monville. Ann was born in Illinois to a medical family. Her father was a physician who practiced family medicine and her mother was a nurse. One of nine children, Ann took a different path at first but found her passion in nursing after all. She has been a registered nurse for 18 years. Her specialty is Mother-Baby

Nursing, and she holds certificates in Maternal Newborn and Lactation.

Six years ago Ann accepted the challenging job of running the Charlotte County Health Department's Growing Strong Families program. Although there are other programs in town where nurses do home health visits for a specific issue, Ann's program is based on patient-driven care. This means she is not limited to one area but can assess each

case individually and really find out what is needed. She sets out to accomplish goals she makes with her patients. Whether the need is medical, food, housing, income, transportation, or education she finds the resources to meet the needs on a prioritized care system.

With basic needs like food and diapers, books are an extravagant item that most of Ann's 40 families just do not have, so when the church donated a significant number of books, she was very moved. "The books the SDA church donated are often the only books in the house," she stated.



Ann's passion for her patients and their families is very evident. She shared, "It is a privilege to go into someone's home, but you never know what need you will find". That is why Ann is so appreciative of the partnership she is developing with our church family. When she delivers a beautiful basket made by ladies of our church, filled with donated items along with diapers and diaper wipes, her families are thrilled and shocked. Ann tells her patients where the items come from and some have asked, "Why are they doing this for me?" She simply answers that we care.



school superintendent, communications director, and vespers coordinator at the Port Charlotte church.




