




Saskia

For my artist response I used a combination of Chuck Close's diagonal grid method and

layered technique to give texture. I painted the finer details of the facial features using a

mixture of swirls and hotdog patterns like that of Chuck's shown in his 1997 portrait. I

used a palette of complimenting mute colours layered in opposite directions to give a


lifted soft textured vibe as used in Chuck's 2012 portrait of Kara Walker. The brighter

glowing yellow green squares stand out to give the feeling of depth. The composition of

the painting is brought together by the graduating change of colour and the suddenness

of the overlapping circles and ovals in the finer facial details. When viewed from a

distance my face pops out of the page to give a photo realistic image.


