DADS MAKING A DIFFERENCE: THE LORETO SPORTSMEN'S LUNCH LEGACY

THE LORETO SPORTSMEN'S LUNCH HAS QUICKLY ESTABLISHED ITSELF AS A CORNERSTONE EVENT FOR FATHERS ACROSS THE LORETO NORMANHURST COMMUNITY, CREATING MEANINGFUL CONNECTIONS BETWEEN DADS AND THEIR DAUGHTER'S SCHOOL.

Now in its third year, the event brought together past Loreto dads, raising an impressive \$118,475 through ticket sales, auctions, and raffles. This sum was included through matched funding from a very generous current family, a past and future family, and the Ex-Students' Association.

Led by Paul Timmins, who is a member of the Parent Association of Loreto, this event is an initiative that actively strengthens fathers' engagement with Loreto Normanhurst. "It's created a unique space where Loreto dads can connect while supporting the School's future," says Paul. This spirit of community has proven

especially valuable in strengthening bonds between current and past fathers, welcoming new dads, and ensuring that all fathers are as continually involved in their daughter's education as they might be in their son's.

The event's success demonstrates what can be achieved when Loreto Normanhurst fathers come together with a shared purpose of supporting their daughter's education and the broader school community. The funds raised support for our Priority Programs: The new Boarding School development, and the Bursary and Indigenous Scholarship Programs.

EX-STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION: PARTICIPATION - NOW AND IN THE FUTURE

SINCE ITS ESTABLISHMENT IN 1912, THE LORETO NORMANHURST EX-STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION HAS BEEN DEEPLY CONNECTED TO THE SCHOOL AND THE LORETO SISTERS AND HAS SUPPORTED A VIBRANT ALUMNAE NETWORK.

The Ex-Students' Association (ESA) has played a vital role in fundraising and providing assistance, including the Sewing Circle, which was launched in 1929 and created garments for Sydney orphanages until 1970.

The ESA honours Loreto Normanhurst values through two awards: the Prix d'Honneur for the School Captain and the Pat Taylor Award for a Year 12 student, who exemplifies the Loreto Normanhurst Spirit. The Pat Taylor Award recognises involvement in multiple school areas, reliability, and consistent behind-thescenes contributions. The ESA also provides a bursary to support a current student, demonstrating their commitment to educational opportunities within the Loreto Normanhurst community.

The ESA remains active in the school community annually hosting the Year 12 Ex-Students' Morning Tea and participating in events such as Normo Networking, Loreto Lunch and Lyrics, Open Day and the biennial Spring Fair. The ESA fosters a strong sense of giving back amongst alumnae. It encourages ex-students to volunteer their time through presentation and mentoring opportunities that benefit current students and the wider community.

Looking forward, the ESA is committed to being an inclusive and supportive force, adapting to societal changes while upholding its centuryold values. It aims to harness the time, talents, and treasures of its members to build a compassionate, thriving community, including supporting and raising funds for the Bursary Program; supporting and providing pastoral care to ex-students in need; mentoring and supporting programmes for young ex-students; promoting and supporting social justice/ service initiatives for ex-students to volunteer together in the name of the Association; and fostering year group connections amongst alumnae.

In 2024, the ESA made a significant financial contribution to the School's Annual Appeal, the Unity Circle Campaign. 
THE CURRAN FAMILY HISTORY AT LORETO NORMANHURST: A Q&A WITH CHARLES CURRAN AC

CAN YOU SHARE SOME OF YOUR FONDEST MEMORIES OF YOUR FAMILY'S INVOLVEMENT WITH LORETO NORMANHURST OVER THE YFARS?

My earliest memory of Loreto Normanhurst involved me at the age of about eight attending a Mass with my sisters Annette and Louise in the Chapel which in those days was on the first level of the Boarding School. During the happy years that my sisters were students at Loreto Normanhurst, there were many occasions when I attended concerts, sporting and other school activities.

We as a family were very proud when in her final year, my sister Annette was named as Head Girl, and this formed the foundation of the strong friendship that she developed with many Loreto nuns in subsequent years. It also involved her membership of the Ex-Students' Committee and having organised card days over several decades where donations were gathered to support bursaries at Loreto Normanhurst.

The wonderful experience that Annette enjoyed at Loreto Normanhurst led to her daughters Catherine, Jane and Sarah being students at the school and later going on to achieve tertiary qualifications.



HOW DID YOUR MOTHER'S AND SISTER'S EXPERIENCES AT LORETO NORMANHURST INFLUENCE YOUR DECISION TO SEND YOUR DAUGHTERS THERE, AND WHAT SPECIFIC **FACTORS MADE YOU CHOOSE THIS SCHOOL** FOR THEIR EDUCATION?

My mother, with her sister, had been students at Loreto many years ago, and she always spoke fondly of her days at Loreto Normanhurst. She showed us photographs of the school property from those early days, including large paddock areas to the rear of the property. As a family, we were pleased that we could contribute towards the cost of construction of the Curran Theatre at Loreto Normanhurst to honour the memory of my mother, Elizabeth Blanche Curran. When my mother passed away in 1993, we were so grateful when the Sisters offered the new Chapel, which had been opened in 1953, for the holding of her funeral, underlining their understanding of my mother and my family's deep commitment to Loreto Normanhurst. The Sisters had decorated the Chapel with a wonderful display of pink roses.

My mother displayed during her life the wonderful qualities imparted from her education at Loreto Normanhurst and it was never in doubt as to where my sisters would be enrolled. Then I had the opportunity of observing the quality of the education and the values gained by my sisters from their time at Loreto Normanhurst.

WHAT MOTIVATED YOU TO FUNDRAISE FOR THE SCHOOL DURING SISTER MARGARET ARMSTRONG'S TIME AS PRINCIPAL?

Dr Eddie Armstrong's daughter, Sister Margaret Armstrong IBVM, reached out to me. Our families were closely connected - her uncle John Armstrong, who'd been a Senator and Sydney's Lord Mayor, was married to my aunt Joan Curran.

When Sister Margaret asked for \$25,000, I suggested developing a comprehensive master plan first. This revealed \$500,000 in needed projects. I offered to lead the fundraising, and we kicked off with a dinner at Randwick Racecourse, where Sir Bede Callaghan, whose daughter was a Loreto nun, gave a rousing speech. We raised \$518,000 - setting an Australasian record for girls' schools at the time.

LOOKING BACK AT YOUR FAMILY'S MULTI-GENERATIONAL RELATIONSHIP WITH LORETO NORMANHURST, WHAT CHANGES OR IMPROVEMENTS HAVE YOU OBSERVED OVER THE YEARS?

Accompanying an improvement in facilities at Loreto Normanhurst, there has been a continual focus on maintaining and improving educational standards. What has been unchanging has been the spirit of Mary Ward which continues to provide guidance to all that happens at Loreto Normanhurst.

I would add to that answer the important role being played at Loreto Normanhurst in providing wider opportunities for entry to the school. This has been assisted by the Bursary Program and also the program to provide education for members of our indigenous community, with some of that work being undertaken in association with the Australian Indigenous Education Foundation, where I am proud to be an Ambassador.

WHY DO YOU THINK PHILANTHROPY IN SUPPORTING GIRLS' EDUCATION IS MORE IMPORTANT NOW THAN EVER? WHAT SPECIFIC CHALLENGES OR OPPORTUNITIES DO YOU SEE THAT MAKE THIS SUPPORT CRUCIAL IN TODAY'S WORLD?

Undoubtedly, philanthropy supporting girls' education is more important now than ever because of changes in our community directed to ensuring equality of opportunity for young emerging women. In my year at Law School at Sydney University, there were three female students.

A wonderful example of high achievement in the corporate world is seen in the career of Catherine Livingstone AC, a good friend and a Loreto Normanhurst graduate. Catherine was CEO of Cochlear, Chair of Telstra, CSIRO, and later Commonwealth Bank. She was also President of Chief Executive Women and the Business Council of Australia and Chancellor of UTS.

This long-overdue widening of opportunity for women in our community over recent decades underlines the importance of the girls in our schools today receiving the very best possible education to equip them to take advantage of the many and varied career opportunities now open to them.

WHAT MESSAGE WOULD YOU LIKE TO SHARE WITH CURRENT LORETO NORMANHURST STUDENTS AND THEIR FAMILIES ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF GIVING BACK TO THEIR SCHOOL COMMUNITY?

Each generation contributes what they can to build upon the work of those before them, helping create opportunities for future young women at Loreto Normanhurst. Through this simple act of giving - big or small - we become part of something greater than ourselves. When we share what we're able to, in whatever way meaningful to us, we help ensure that the educational legacy of our School continues to touch more lives with each passing year.

CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF VALERIE LHUEDE: A LORETO ALUMNA'S LIFELONG COMMITMENT TO NATURE. **CULTURE, AND GLOBAL EXPLORATION**

VALERIE LHUEDE, FROM THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 1940. EMBODIED THE SCHOOL'S VALUES OF COMPASSION. RESILIENCE. AND A LIFELONG LOVE OF LEARNING. HER EXTRAORDINARY LIFE SPANNED 101 YEARS, AND HER RECENT PASSING IN SEPTEMBER 2024 MARKS THE CELEBRATION OF A REMARKABLE CENTURY FILLED WITH ADVENTURE, DEDICATION, AND AN UNWAVERING SPIRIT.

Born in 1923, Valerie's education spanned multiple schools before her father enrolled her at Loreto Normanhurst in her teens. At Loreto, Valerie thrived as a weekly boarder, cherishing the structure and camaraderie of school life.

Valerie completed her Leaving Certificate at 16 and set her sights on studying architecture at the University of Sydney, However, when she realised that Mathematics was a requirement for matriculation, she made the decision to stay an extra year at Loreto. During this year, she focused on both Mathematics and Ancient History and, at 17, repeated her Leaving Certificate. Valerie went on to become one of the first women to study architecture in Australia.

Valerie's love for nature and the arts defined her life's work. One of her most significant contributions was her preservation work at Yerranderie, a ghost town in NSW that she transformed into an eco-tourist destination. Her custodianship of Yerranderie spanned nearly half of her life. She welcomed visitors to the refurbished miner's huts and post office, where she would guide tours and share captivating stories of the town's history. "It gave me great pleasure to weave a spell around my audience, to see the spark of curiosity in children and adults alike." Valerie once reflected.

Valerie's passion for Yerranderie was sparked by her father, Aubin René (Ren) Lhuede, who purchased the town in 1947 with dreams of revitalising its silver mines. Though the mining never resumed, Valerie's vision was different. She focused on restoring the town's historical buildings and ensuring it remained a living monument to Australia's past.


In 2011, at 89 years old, Valerie gifted the town of Yerranderie to the people of NSW, and today, it is managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service as part of Yerranderie Regional Park. Her efforts in conservation were recognised with a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in 2010, honouring her enduring legacy of environmental stewardship.

Valerie's adventurous spirit extended far beyond Yerranderie and her environmental work. A lifelong traveller, she explored the world, from kissing the Pope's ring and seeing the ceilings of the Sistine Chapel in Rome to exploring the lost city of Machu Picchu in Peru. Photography became a lifelong hobby that she turned into a career. Valerie's photography was published in renowned publications like The Reader's Digest and National Geographic.

Even in her later years. Valerie maintained a strong connection to Loreto. She often reflected on how her education at the school shaped her both intellectually and personally, fostering her lifelong curiosity and love for learning.

Valerie's legacy is one of service, exploration, and dedication to leaving a lasting, positive impact on the world. In everything she did, Valerie embodied the spirit of Loreto - leading with grace, resilience, and an unwavering commitment to the world around her. As we celebrate her remarkable life, we remember her contributions to our community and the profound impact she had on so many.
