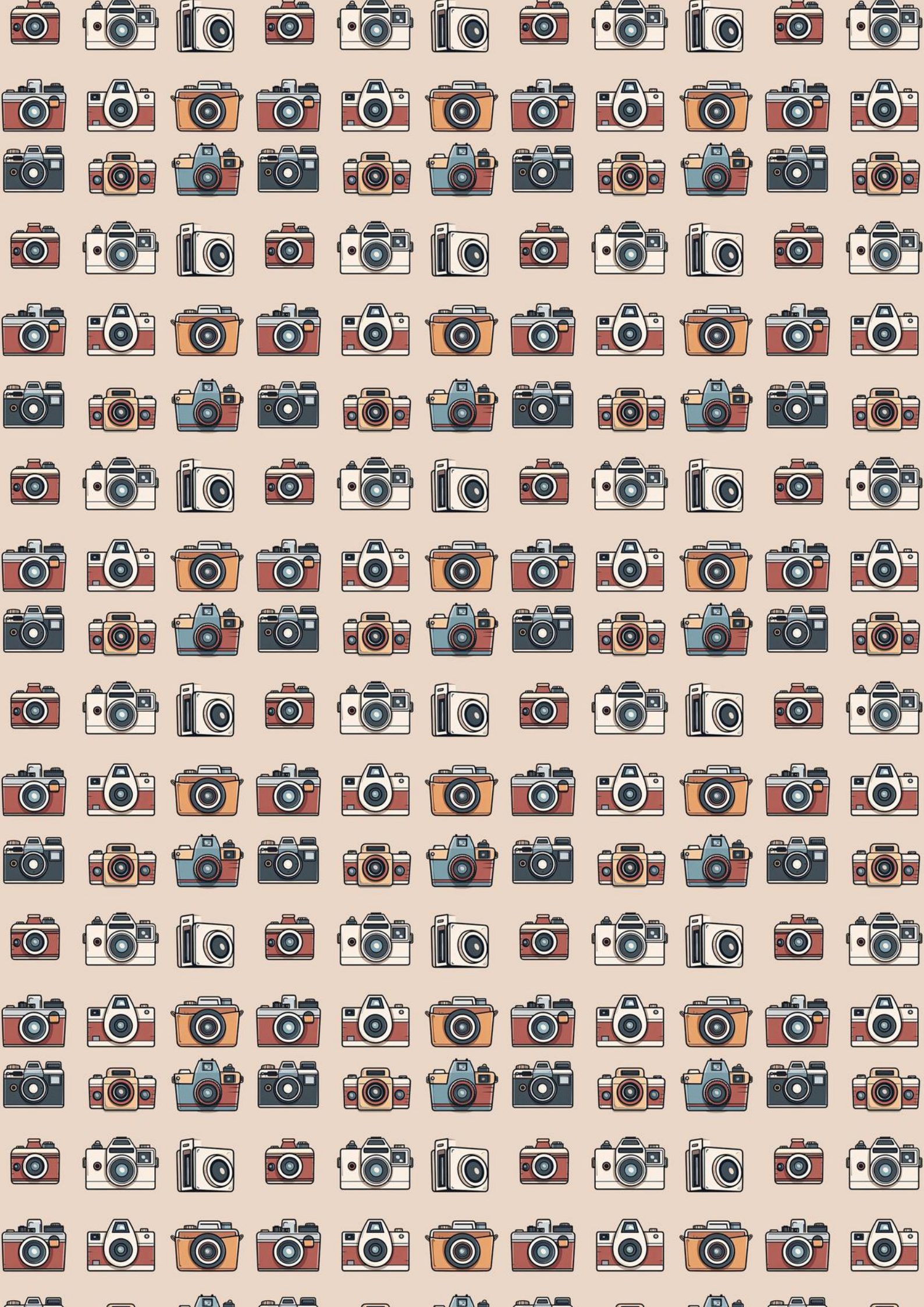

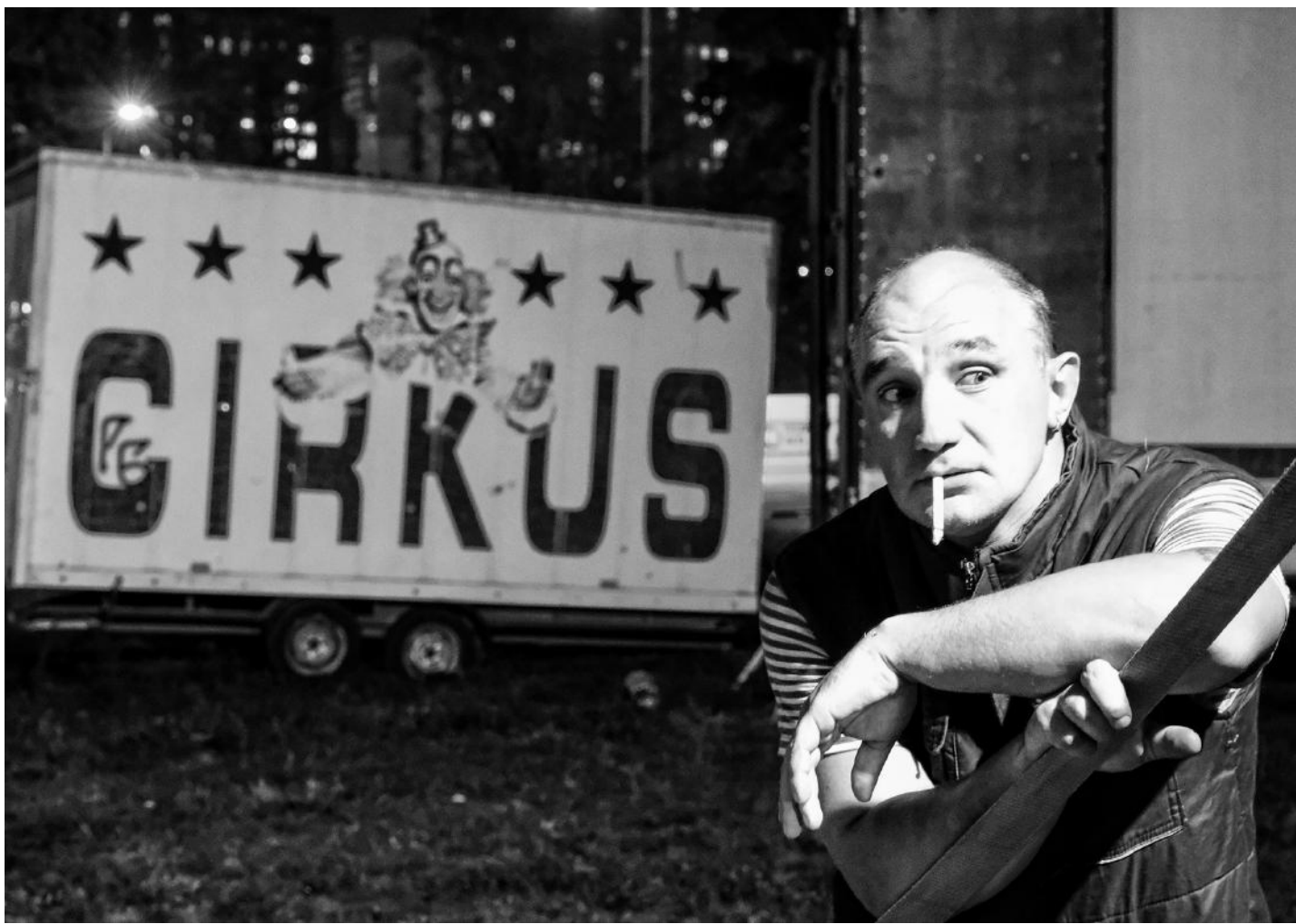

Mengzhu Li (Helen) is a visual artist and photographer based in both China and the UK. She graduated in 2023 with a Master's degree in Contemporary Photography and Philosophy from Central Saint Martins, University of the Arts London, after earning a Bachelor's degree in Photography from Beijing Institute of Fashion Technology. Her work explores personal and social identities among East Asian women, focusing on themes such as belonging, mother-daughter relationships in only-child families, and evolving gender dynamics in multicultural contexts.

Helen's photography is rooted in sensory and emotional experiences, utilizing imagery as her primary medium alongside video, text, handmade books, and installations. Her art emphasizes emotional connections, inviting audiences to reflect on the intersections of culture, gender, and social environments from diverse female perspectives. By linking her work to broader societal contexts, she seeks to uncover universal resonances and capture the responsibilities inherent in artistic creation.

## Artist Statement

### Fleeting Nourishment

As someone who has experienced the torment of bulimia, I attempt to deconstruct food to reveal the hidden emotions and desires of contemporary society. The roots of bulimia are closely tied to immense social pressure. In the cycle of eating, vomiting, and re-eating, the sustenance of food gradually shifts from the body to the spirit. The brief pleasure satisfies a craving, but it is followed by an overwhelming sense of emptiness that cannot be expressed.

I seek to raise public awareness of marginalized behaviors and emotions. What is the relationship between food, society, and individuals? Is it influenced by external labeling, or is it driven by mainstream aesthetics that pursue unhealthy or distorted body ideals? Or has the variety and evolution of food far surpassed its original purpose?

# Caroline Lutton

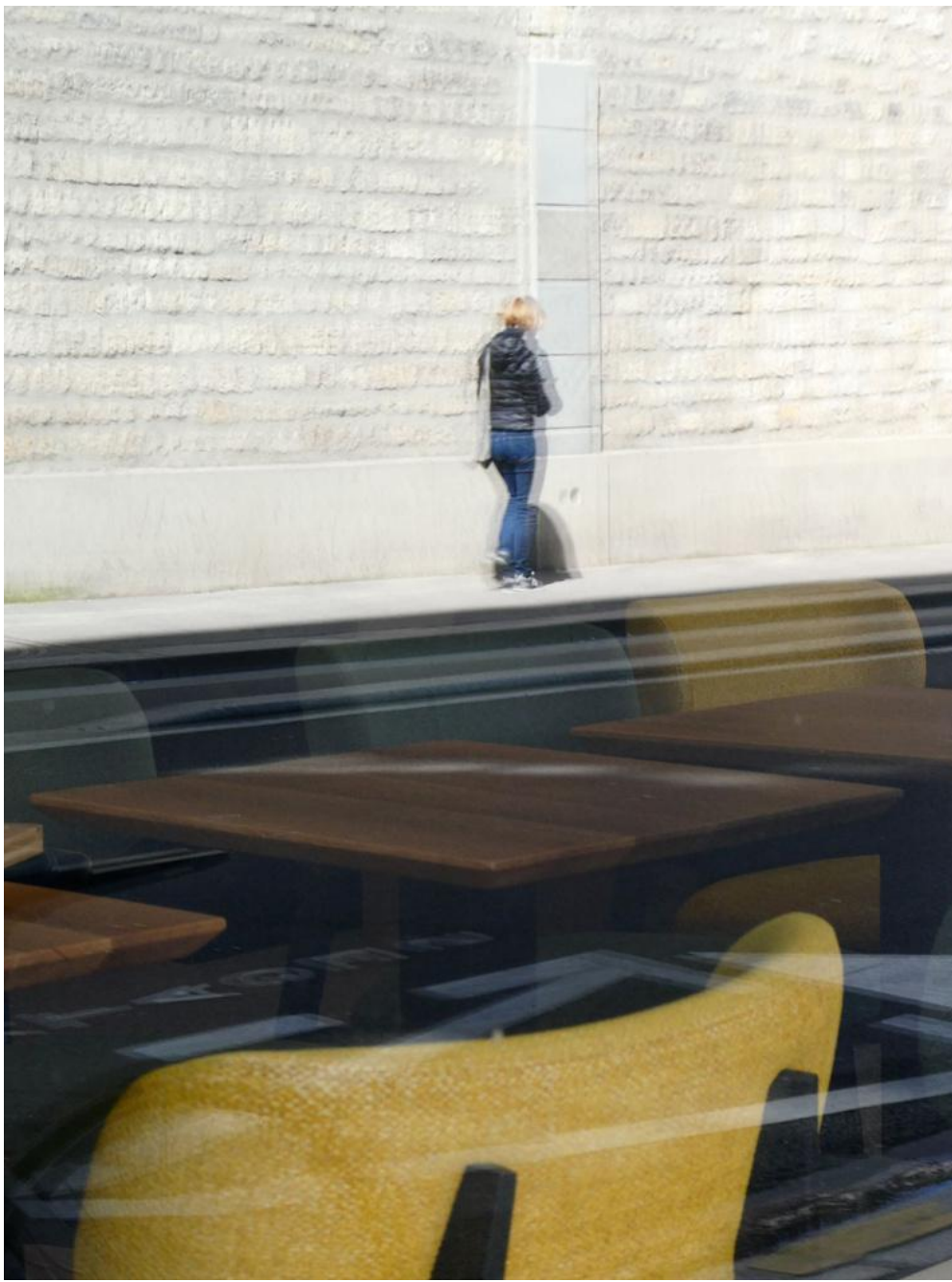

This project aims to rekindle our childhood appreciation of these magnificent plants, showing that their beauty does not fade with time, but can simply be appreciated in a different way. By showcasing the aesthetic qualities of dandelions, this project aims to encourage a deeper appreciation of the natural world and the art within it.

# Julieta Maccarino



I was born on April 6, 1992, in Argentina. With a decentralized, cooperative, and ecologically conscious approach, I have spent more than eleven years exploring visual storytelling. I trained as a film director at the Universidad del Cine in Buenos Aires, where I integrated photography into my creative process for short films, music videos, and live sessions. My practice later evolved through a deepening in documentary filmmaking, wildlife photography, erotic portraiture, botany, and horticultural therapy in regions such as Misiones, Chaco, and Calafate, where photography became the central focus of my artistic exploration. Through these diverse experiences, I have developed a unique perspective that connects the human body with the natural world, creating intimate and evocative images that invite reflection on our relationship with nature.

For the past year, I have been living in Barcelona, researching erotic and documentary self-portraiture from an ecofeminist perspective. My debut film, *Elección Natural*, was selected by the INCAA in 2023 and received awards from Ventana Sur, the VL Municipal Fund, and Construir Cine. I have worked for organizations such as Aves Argentinas, Generar Eco, Red Yaguareté, and Güirá Öga. My wildlife photographs have been featured in various environmental media outlets, as well as by the BBC and El País.

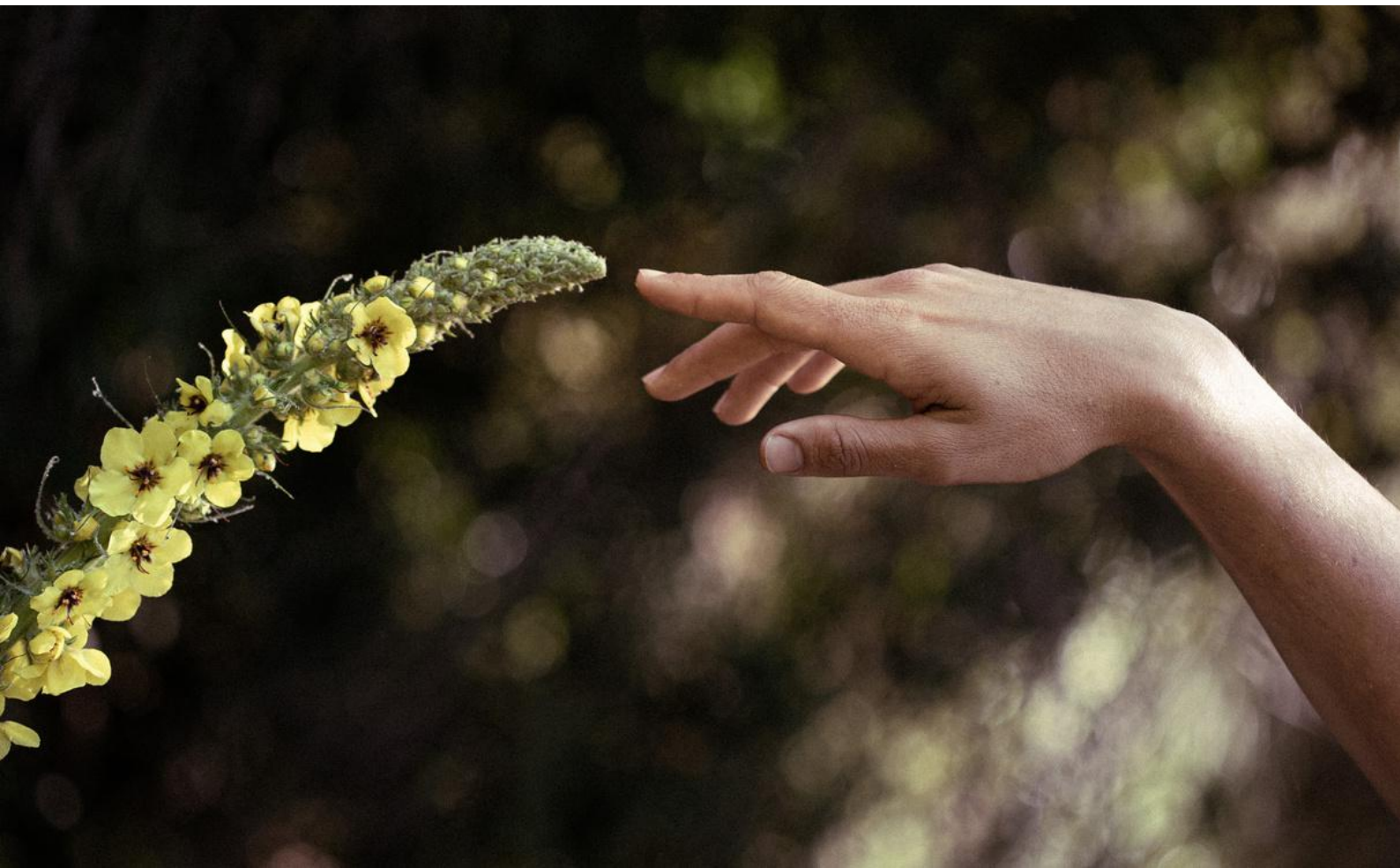
## Artist Statement

In my project *Terrafilia*, *Deaf Prayers*, I explore the profound relationship between erotic portraiture and wildlife photography by creating nude portraits within wild ecosystems. Through these images, I seek to blur the ideological boundaries that separate humans from nature, inviting viewers to inhabit the ephemeral, the imperfect, and the intimate.

Rooted in the Japanese wabi-sabi aesthetic and informed by ecofeminist perspectives, my work aims to create a sensory and spiritual atmosphere that inspires reflection on our connection to the environment. In my vision, the body becomes a living territory, while the territory itself transforms into a habitable body. By highlighting the macro context of each scene, I reveal a vital logic: the small sustains the great.

*Terrafilia* celebrates the imperfect, the transient, and the organic, offering an invitation to question the divisions between humanity and the natural world, and to recognize the beauty inherent in the fleeting and the unfinished.

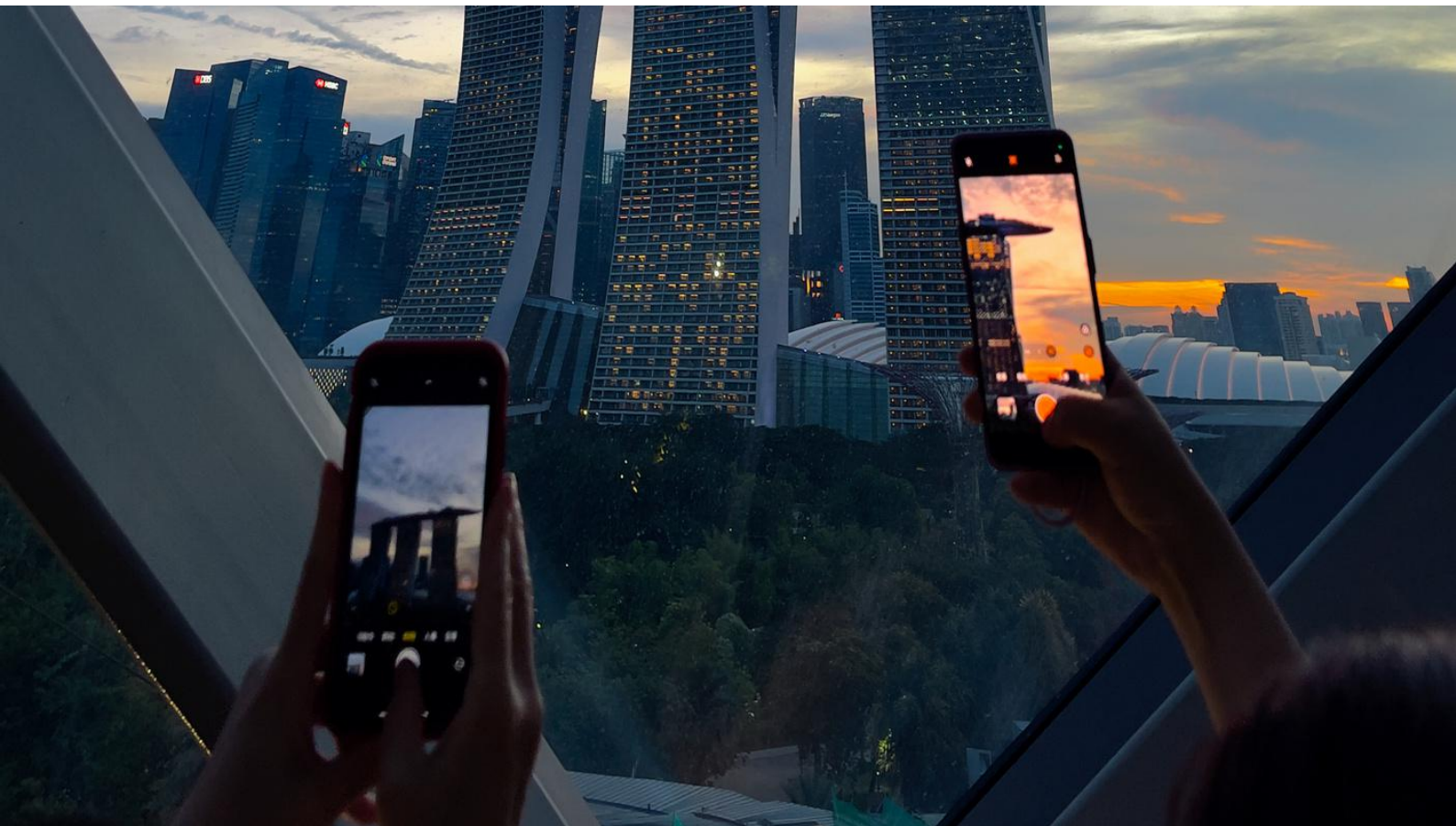

## Artist Statement

# Marina Danic

Marina Danic is a visual artist who lives and works between Serbia and United States. She studied documentary and feature film at Cleveland State University, and after graduating from the department of Journalism in 2011 at the Faculty of Political Sciences in Belgrade, she received her MFA in Creative Film and TV Production at the Faculty of Drama Arts in Belgrade. She has exhibited her photography in several countries such as Serbia, Argentina, Uruguay, Denmark, Great Britain, Austria, USA and Japan, and her work was published in numerous art magazines. Marina has won 1st prize for the photography for the international exhibition 'Soren Kierkegaard in images' in Copenhagen, as well as 1st prize for the multimedia photography project at the Art Academy NABA in Milan.

Her latest exhibition was a Feature shot magazine group exhibition in Clamp Art Gallery, in NYC.

Marina's images are records of life experiences made using an analog camera and a 35 mm support film, media which add to her shots a reflective feel and an intimacy with the world.

One of the author's interests which emerge from those pictures is the use of natural light, a factor that adds further suggestions to her shots. The journal component is something that characterizes Danic's entire work, a component from which her filmmaker mark emerges, and a component, above of all, through which she does an introspective work not far from the one done by the artists in the eighties, as an evidence, including also her use of the analog camera, of the link with the photography of the past. She has published two photobook projects: The Book of Dreams in 2021 and Serbiana in 2022.

## Project Statement

'Liberation'

I am sure that she never left. She kept on living away from me, parallel lives. And I dont know what her life is like. What I do know is that we will eventually meet and I will need nothing more after that. It will be the greatest encounter. Part of maturing is accepting my fault why we had to part and why so many years have been let to pass. Only we who have left ourselves somewhere know of this kind of sorrow. We are hard seashells, empty and cold forever searching for our flesh, our beating heart.

Taking a photgraphs has been healing me because in the moment of taking a photograph a special intimate bond is created.I come alive again. I enjoy that silence, that intimacy. It may be just the closest I will ever be to this world.

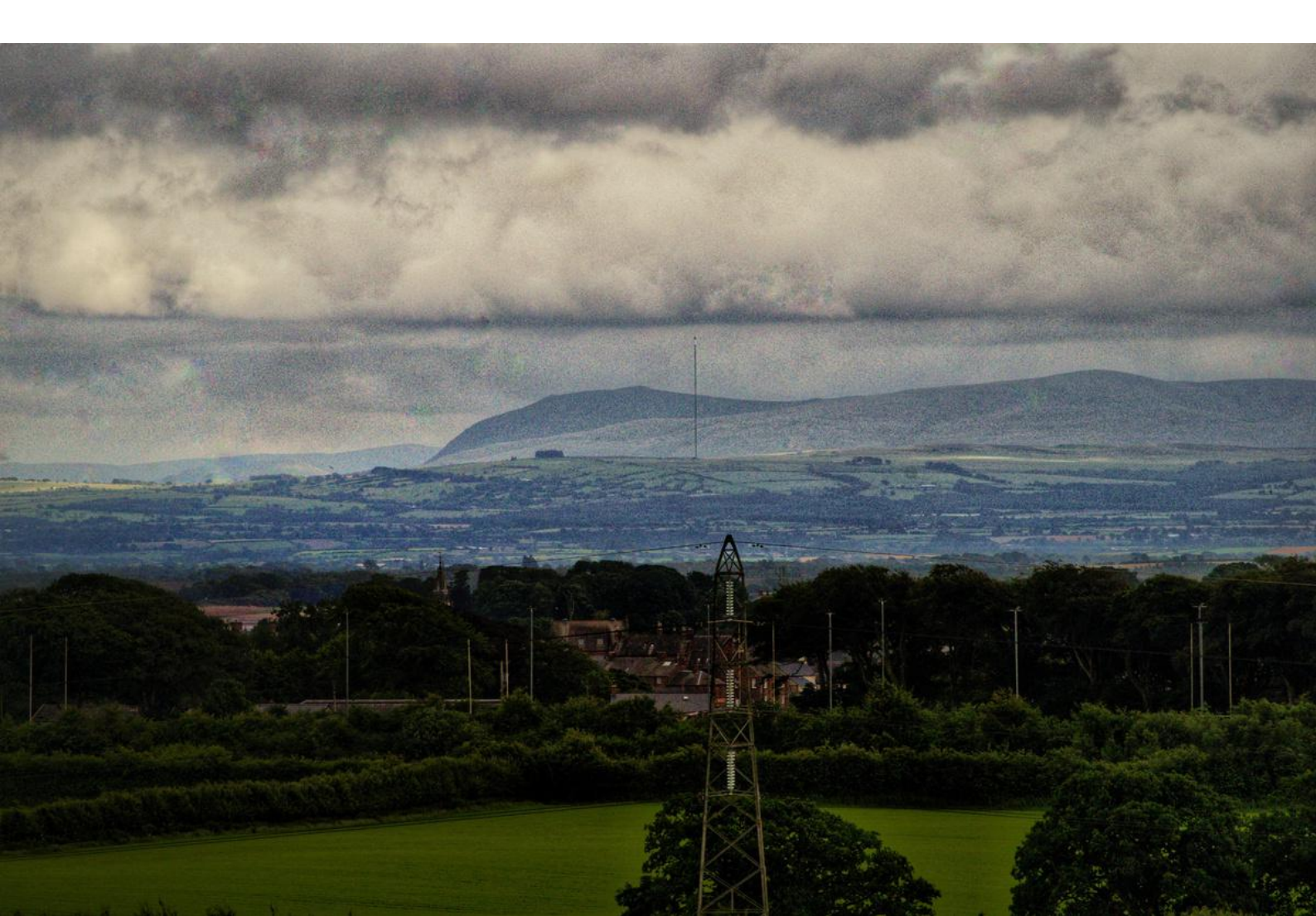

# Quang Huy Nguyen



I am a freelance photographer and filmmaker driven by the desire to tell meaningful stories through self-produced visual projects. My work seeks to capture the intersection of culture, humanity, and identity through a fashion-art-creative lens. With each project, I aim to leave a personal mark while constantly exploring new perspectives, pushing beyond my comfort zone, and growing through the process of learning and experimentation.

## Artist Statement

### BEAUTIFUL WOMB

The project exploits a creative perspective and Asian metaphor, regarding the stages in life that any woman would go through:

- Adolescence and the first physiological and psychological changes in life, also the period when the menstrual cycle officially begins.
- Youth and sublimation in love: The protective gloves signify the awareness of preventing sexually transmitted diseases (based on the idiom "No glove, no love").
- The years of growing up with motherhood through the image of "a drop of blood" inside the transparent globe, and the image of a "bloody flesh" newborn baby.
- The old age, menopause with hot flashes expressed through red makeup and flying hairs.

The hairstyle and butterfly-shaped makeup face were also chosen to evoke the idea of "Womb" - a sacred part created by nature inside a woman's body, the place that harbors and begins all life, contains not only charms but also strong inner strength, clarifying the message of protecting and cherishing the body as well as the hardships and sacrifices of women.

## Project Statement

Flow in Space is an artistic narrative about human body connecting to nature and elements as a metaphor of identity and unity.

We are one flowing energy, reflecting on surroundings, as the light interacting with our environment. Nature is where we encounter our own inner silence, where we can experience calmness, strength, hope, positive spirit and infinity. Connecting to the thematic "Feelings & Photography" this lyrical project showcases these strong emotions.

Photography here opens a space between the moving human body and the landscape. The presence of movement into the different type of landforms, plain, forest, riverside..., where body forms create a coherent atmosphere of silence and harmony. The idea presents the synergy of the moving body and the natural environment, where the bodyscape reflects the landforms and the artistic structures of topography.

My work becomes a visual diary — an offering for others to read and connect with. I aim to explore the relationship between the body and space.

At present, I am working on a project titled “Where Do I Leave My Soul?” — a performative representation.

It poses questions such as:

How does gender shape our sense of identity?

How does the self resist or submit to its portrayal?

What do we truly need in life, and what do we actually receive?

How is the body defined — socially, politically, and personally?

My body is not my body. My desires are not mine. My life is not my own.

Then what is the body, and how does it move through life to create space?

I am trying to witness that ongoing conversation between the body and space.

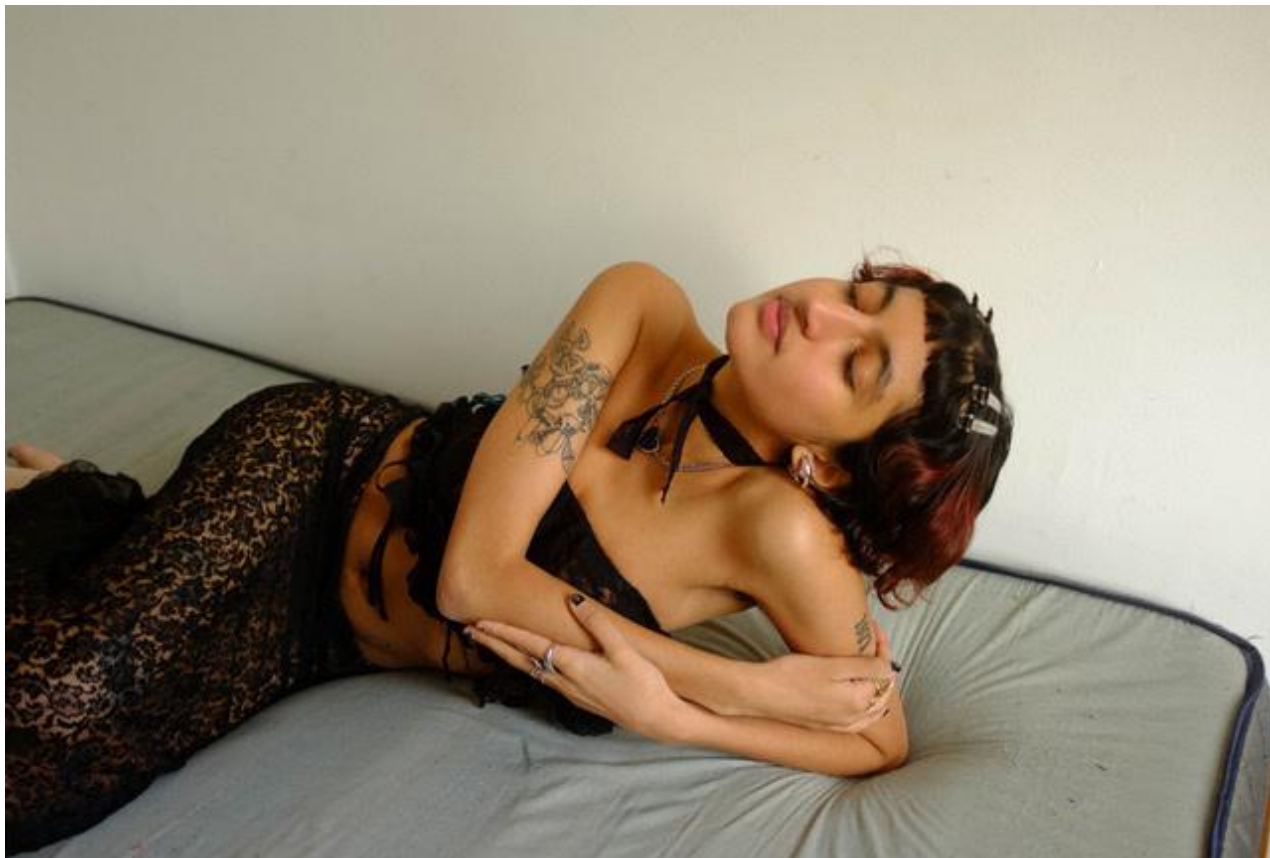

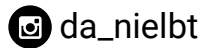

# Omar Danial Biuiiuktosun



Omar is a London-based visual artist and photographer. He works mainly with film and digital photography, focusing on finding beauty in both the light and darker sides of life. His style is cinematic but honest, capturing real moments with a sense of emotion and simplicity. Through his images, Omar explores the way everyday scenes can feel timeless, layered, and full of meaning.

## Project Statement

### *Street Layers*

Street Layers is an ongoing analogue photography series that explores the rhythm and complexity of urban life through the technique of in-camera multiple exposure. Shot entirely on black-and-white film, the project captures the layered visual essence of city streets—architecture, movement, light, and time collapsing into a single frame.

Rather than documenting a singular moment, Street Layers creates a dialogue between different parts of the same environment. I approach each composition as a visual rhythm: the city becomes a kind of score, with buildings, traffic, and pedestrians forming patterns of tone and tempo. These photographs aren't staged or manipulated digitally; they are constructed intuitively in the camera, letting intuition guide where one exposure should meet the next.

The project began as a personal response to life in London—particularly how overwhelming, beautiful, and fragmented the city can feel all at once. As the work evolved, I noticed how the images echoed the internal experience of urban living: layered, nonlinear, full of contradiction but also harmony.

Street Layers is not just about the physical city; it's about how memory and emotion reshape the spaces we move through every day. The overlapping exposures mimic the way we mentally carry one street into another, one season into the next. What appears chaotic at first often reveals a surprising order, a calm rhythm beneath the noise.

This series invites viewers to slow down and consider the invisible connections between places. In doing so, it hopes to shift how we see the cities we live in—not as disjointed structures, but as continuous, living experiences.

# Vassilis Ntinas Pilides

My name is Vassilis Ntinas Pilides, and for the past five years I've been working as a graphic designer and video editor at my family's advertising agency, based in Thessaloniki and Athens. Over the last two years, I've been exploring photography as a hobby, and I'm currently preparing an exhibition focused on the melancholic side of Thessaloniki. Through my images, I try to capture small, genuine moments that often go unnoticed.

## Artist Statement

I live in Thessaloniki. I'm a graphic designer, yet I find myself deeply drawn to the worlds of photography and cinema. What enchants me about this city is its dual nature—two faces, each whispering a different story to those willing to look.

One side is the graceful Thessaloniki—the face the city offers to its people and passing guests.

The other is the wistful Thessaloniki.

It dwells in abandoned buildings and withered trees, in forgotten corners where silence settles, beneath low-hanging skies and slow, persistent rain.

In recent months, I've been drawn more and more to this melancholic side of my city.

I'm currently curating an exhibition of my own photographs that capture this shadowed side of Thessaloniki—accompanied by an original video and a live performance.

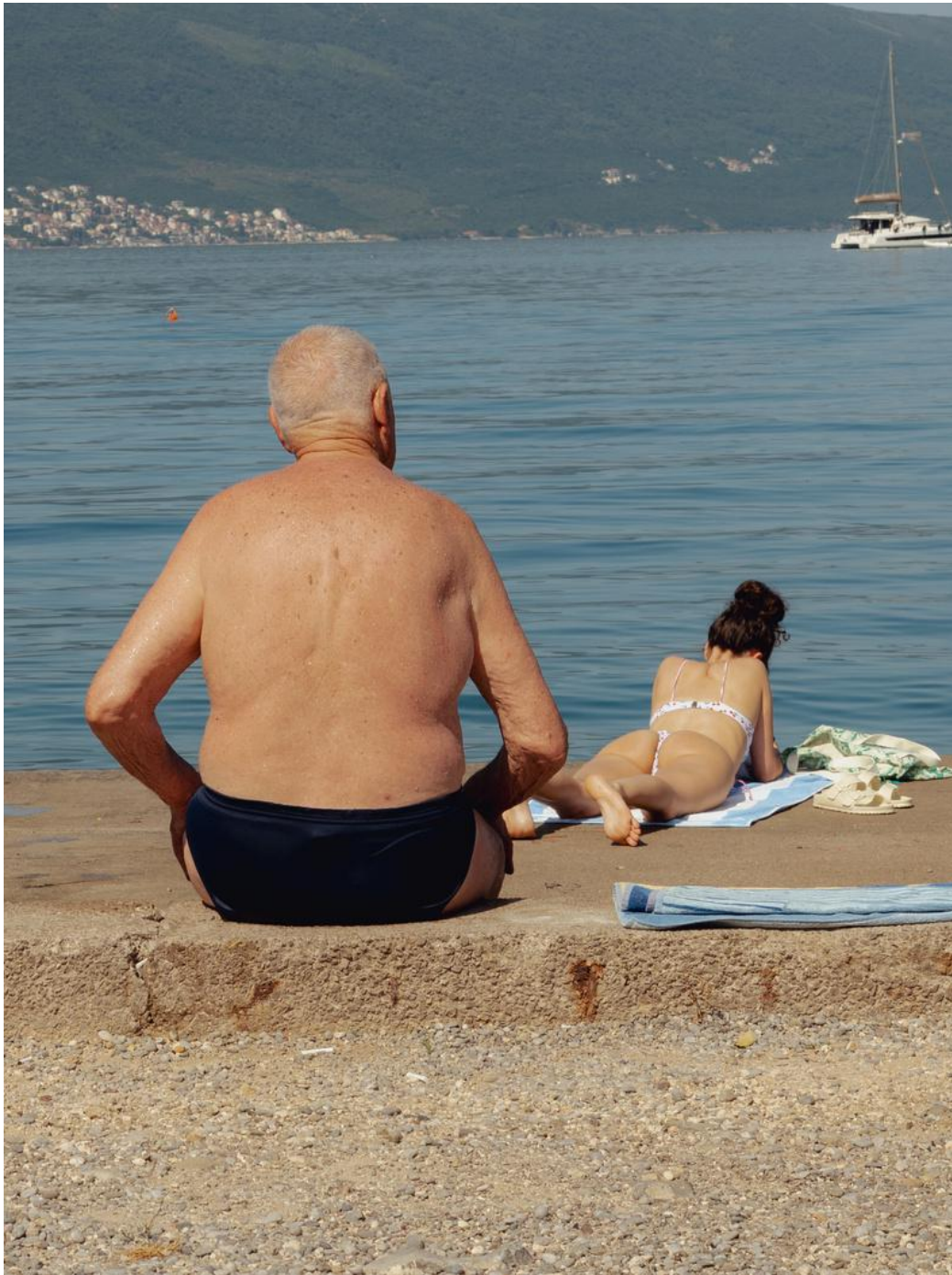

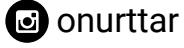








# Onur Tatar

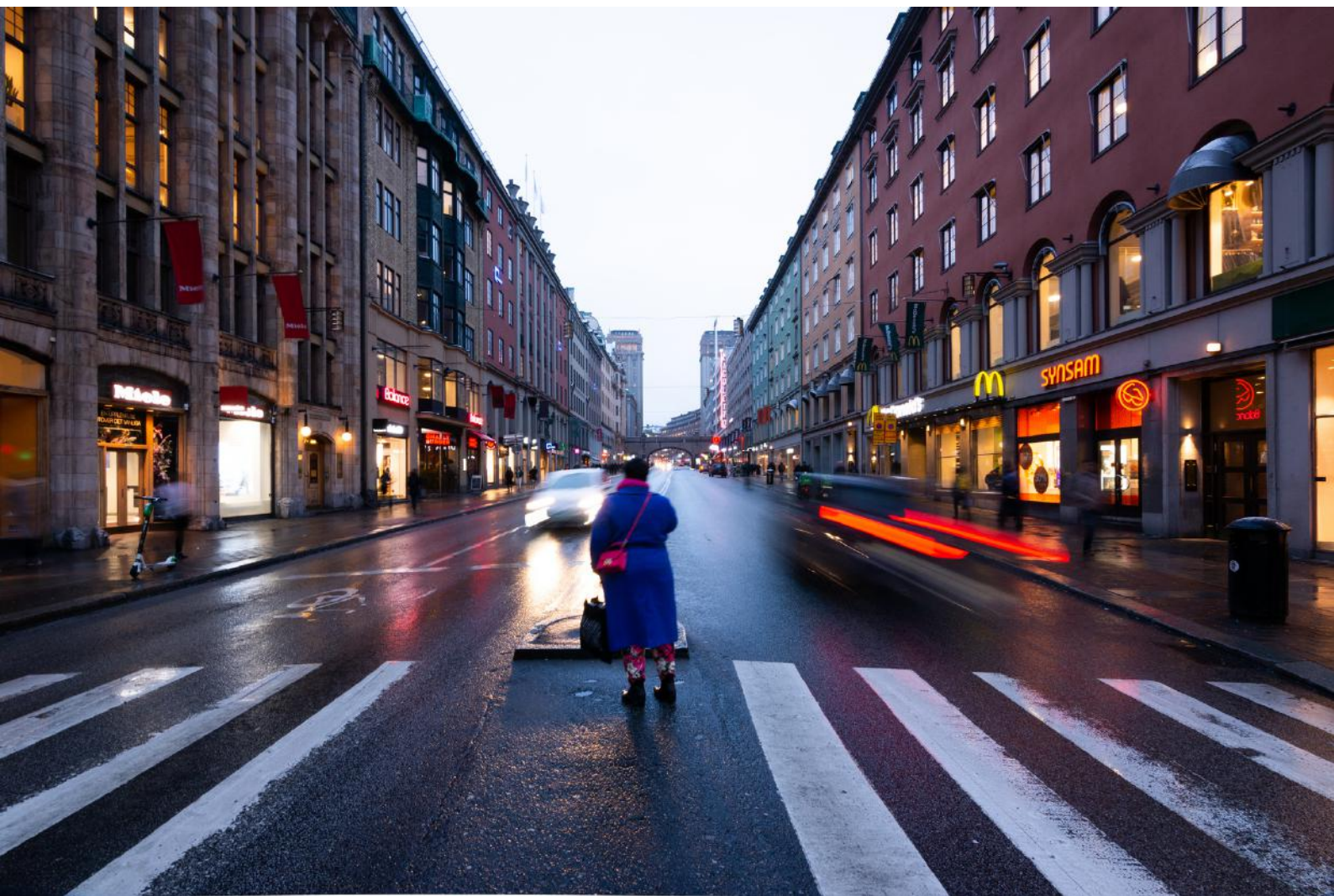

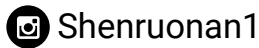

# Ruonan Shen



Ruonan Shen (b. 2001) is a visual artist and photographer based in London. She is currently a student in University of Arts London in Interior Design. Working primarily with conceptual portraiture, Shen's practice explores the aesthetics of identity, performance, and visual tension within constructed spaces.

Her recent works engage with gender expression and transformation, focusing on China's emerging drag scene as a lens through which to question the boundaries of beauty, strength, and self-presentation. Shen creates highly staged environments that balance intimacy and control, presence and absence.

Drawing from minimal aesthetics, theatrical artifice, and emotional ambiguity, Shen's photographs challenge normative visual codes while inviting moments of stillness and reflection. As an emerging artist, she is interested in photography not as documentation, but as reconstruction—a deliberate and quiet act of image-making on their own terms.

## Artist Statement

### Alienation of Home

The project is effectively convey my journey and changing relationship with the concept of "home". The "Home" section powerfully captures the bittersweet nostalgia of returning to a familiar space that no longer feels like a true home, with details like the "whispers in my ear, the empty refrigerator, and the stairs that I will fall down at any time" evoking a tangible sense of displacement and alienation. It's mirroring my own feelings of being caught between past and present. I have constructed several closed spaces in this group of images, almost 'theatre-like', trying to make the body echo the space. The movements of the young girl characters are soft and rigid. They are dressed in lace, slippers, and pink clothes, as if they were playing a kind of 'prescribed gentleness', which is not by choice but by some kind of social training from childhood. The self-covering on the stairs is a rejection of the external gaze and a resistance to 'being cute';

The gaze in front of the fridge is a freeze of emptiness, desire, and waiting, rejecting the idea that women must be docile and passive.

The girls in these images are not angry or rebellious, but they are waiting for a kind of break - they could be me or many others when they were children.

I hope to capture something in this body of work: 'you can't say it out loud, but you feel it all the time'.

How an invisible gender expectation silently shapes women's daily emotions and makes them feel suffocated or alienated in the details of ordinary life.



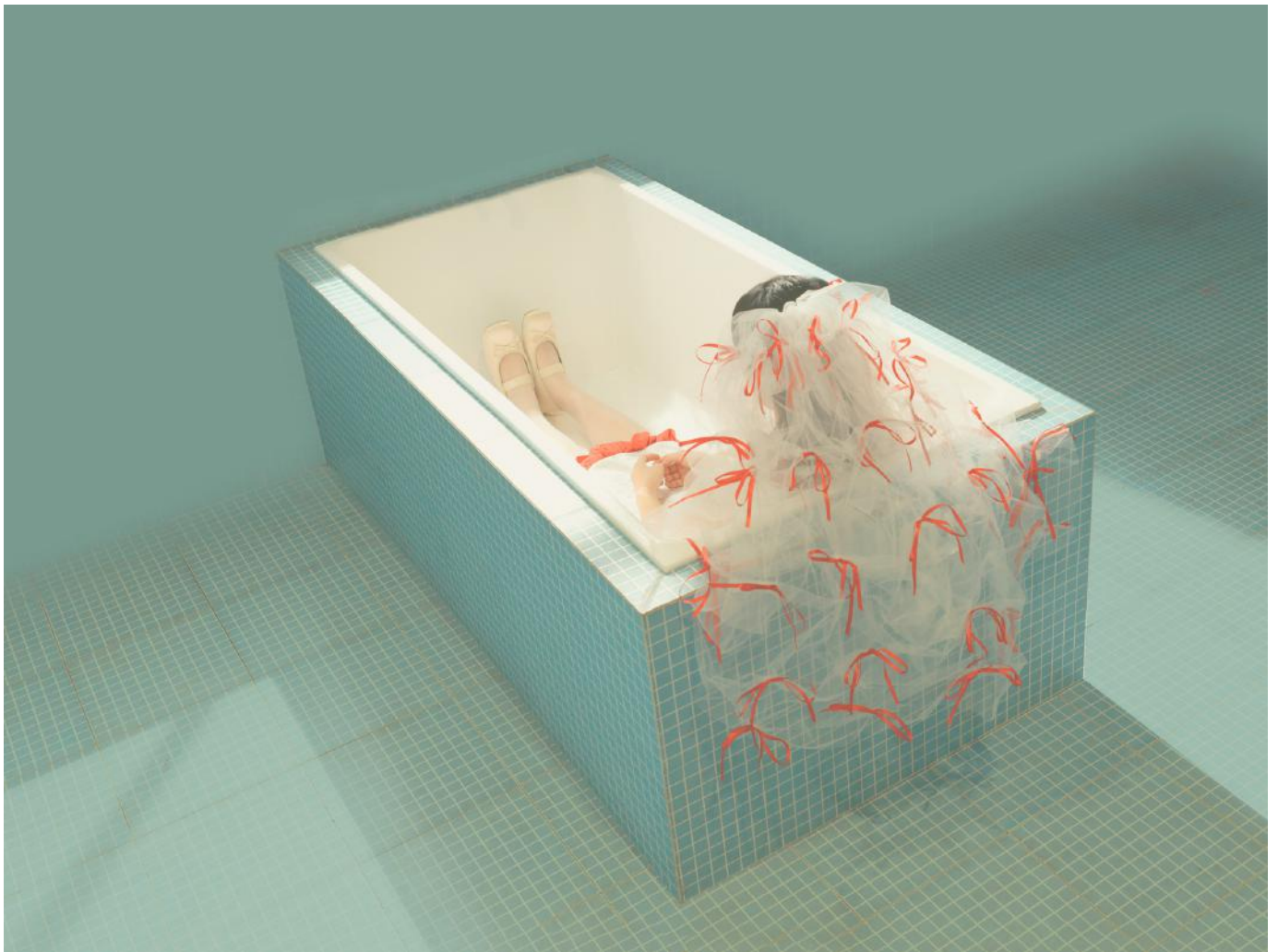

## Artist Statement

"Lived Through That" is a collection of portraits showcasing various musical artists of the 1980s and 1990s. Some are legendary today, some were legendary only in their day – but all of them embody what it means to hold a creative life. Oftentimes, it seems as though our culture is obsessed with youth, and never more apparent than in the music industry. There's an assumption that you can only be creative when you're in your twenties. I set out to show that we can still be creative, vibrant, and relevant forces as we age. Each of these individuals are still creating – whether it's still music or new mediums like writing or painting – and they're still powerful creative forces in their communities and in the world.

Our memories might recall these people as icons of their time – Cindy Wilson of the B-52s in her beehive hairdo or Krist Novoselic of Nirvana rocking alongside Kurt Cobain – and it is these experiences that form the basis of who they are. I wanted to show them in a new light and in the present where their creative light and energy still shines.

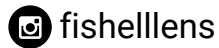

This format contains a lot of new and futuristic elements, and at the same time it preserves the foundation of photography - the philosophy of wabi-sabi - to see, accept and convey beauty in imperfection.

Most often, in this way I shoot people's lives, their cities, their homes, their relatives - their habitat.

I like that in one day I can visit several places on the planet at once: London, Berlin, Bali, New York ... and I myself live in Vietnam.

Recently I injured my leg while playing sports and I had to lie in bed for a month, but I continued shooting! And now I think that in addition to the freedom to move around the world, remote photography is a wonderful opportunity for people with disabilities because remote photography gives us opportunities to take photographs, to create beauty, convey their vision and catch photo-dzen anywhere, physically absent, but present in spirit.

## Artist Statement

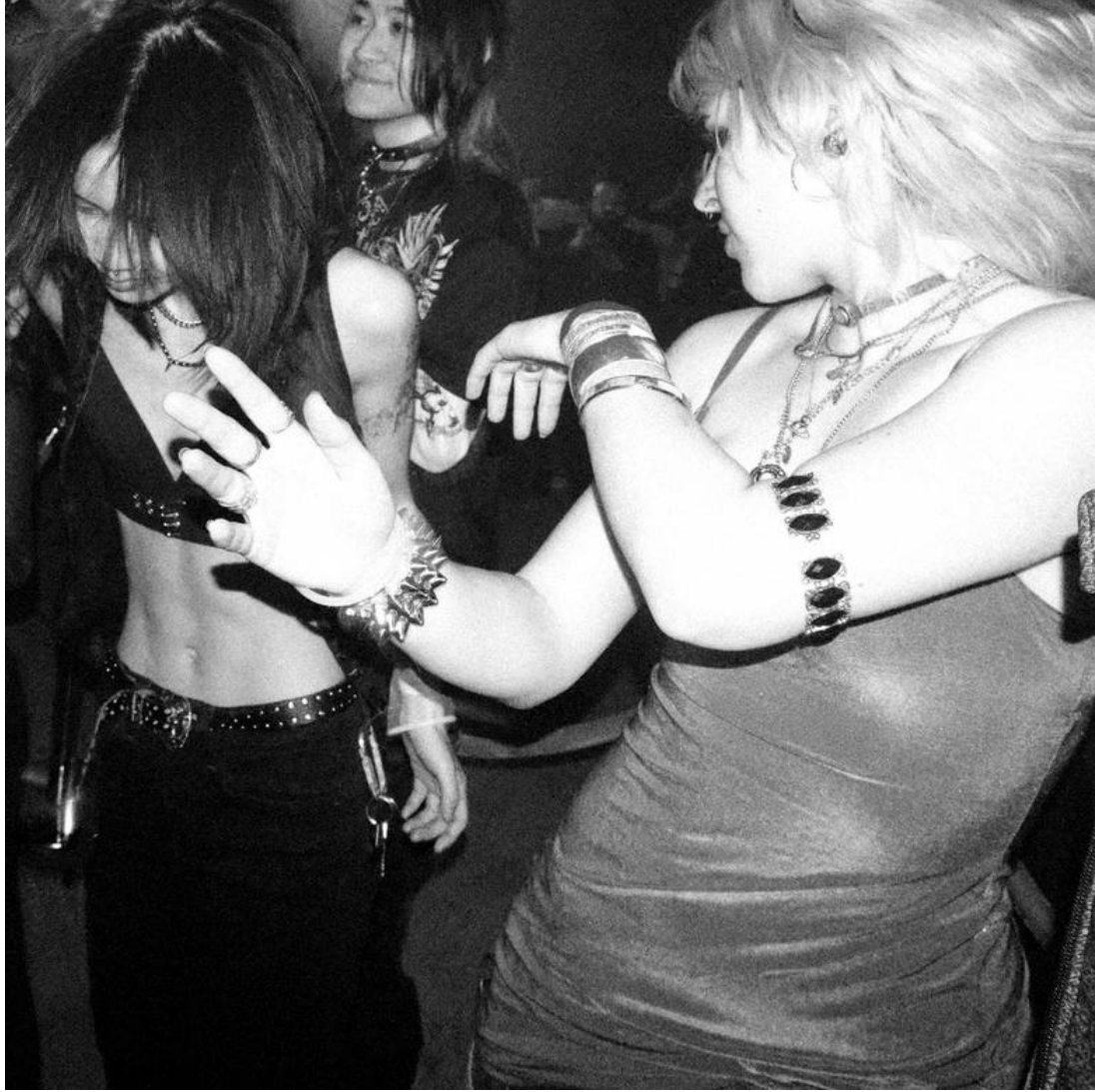

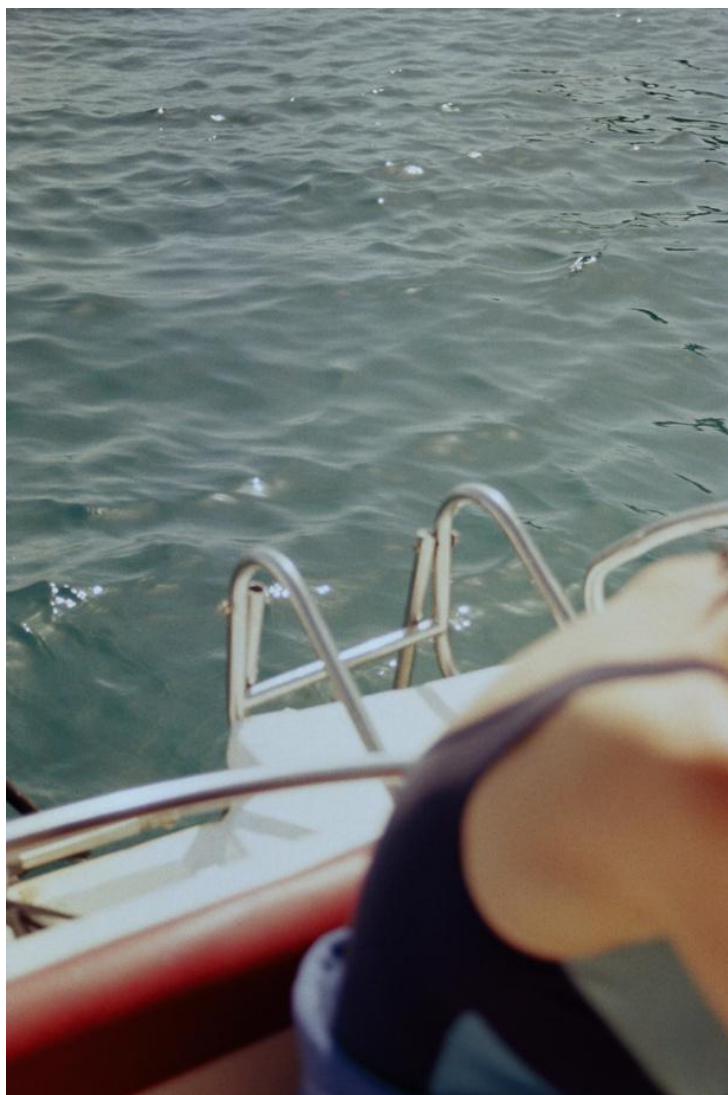

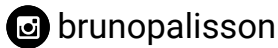

# Bruno Palisson



It was with a 'Goldy' Box camera, a gift from his father, that Bruno Palisson took his first photographs at the age of 10. Throughout his adolescence, he asserted himself through this medium, setting up a freelance practice at the age of 17. Three years later he began a professional career as an architectural photographer, working for agencies and magazines. At the same time, he was studying for a degree in architecture and in 1994, with his colleague Jean-Luc Calligaro, he founded the architecture agency Atelier PO & PO in Paris.

In 1997 he represented the company Polaroid in France for the brand's 50th anniversary and in 1999, he co-directed an artistic campaign for the candy brand Cachous Lajaunie as part of a collective. In 1999, he took part in the Festival d'Art sans Fin in Bern, and this work was presented in the program Tracks on Arte.

The artworks of Bruno Palisson, Photographer and Architect, are frequently shown and are part of Private Collections.

The Artist's work is particularly selected by various Photography Festivals such as «Les Voies Off» of Les Rencontres Internationales d'Arles (2019-2021-2022), the «Festival les Focales du Pays d'Auge» of Honfleur (2020), the «Surrealist Festival» of Fréjus (2021), the «Présence(s) Photographie Festival» of Montélimar (2022); and are published in professional magazines, such as L'Œil de la Photographie, Openeye, Fisheye and Réponses Photo.

## Artist Statement

A place. A sealed space. One that usually goes unnoticed. We travel from point A to point B, and what happens in between often fades into insignificance. And yet, in that suspended moment of shared time, something extraordinary can emerge—a space of absolute freedom, where you may become whoever you wish, and where time itself is shaped by deep silences or charged, fleeting exchanges.

This impromptu journey by taxi becomes a thread weaving through the story of Greater Paris—our living, breathing metropolis. It drifts through its liminal spaces: the cafés buzzing with intoxicated joy, the vibrant markets, the gateways of airports... offering a panoramic and offbeat gaze onto a city in the midst of transformation.

Aboard this vehicle, we meander through the city's arteries—its streets, which pulse like the bronchi of a vast urban lung. The taxi becomes both vessel and stage.

Everything can unfold here. A moment of life—intense, raw, ephemeral. A space where the artistic meets the everyday, and where the mundane becomes a poetic encounter.



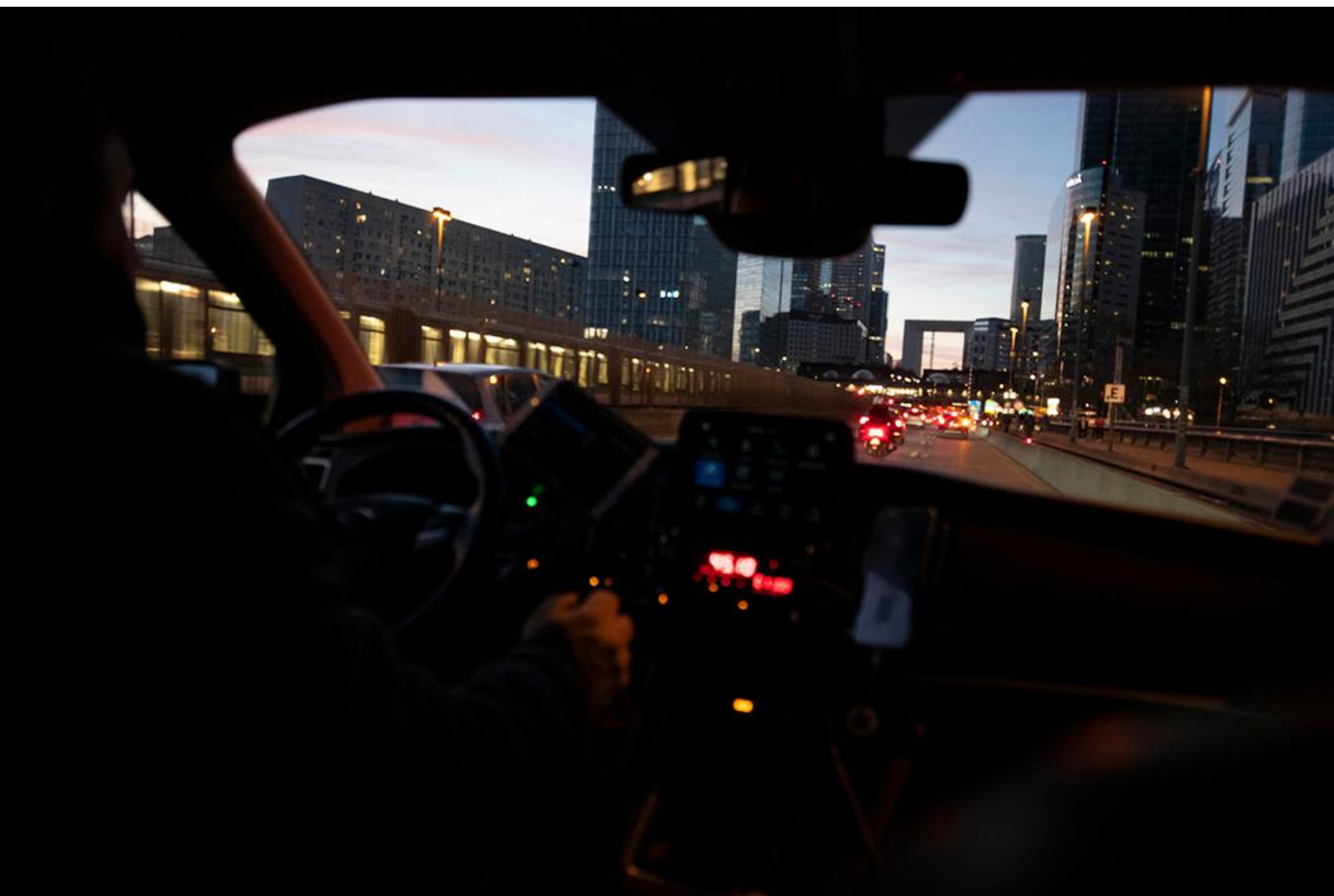

My main area of interest is not only classic photography, but also mix-media collages and photomontages. My last exhibition (Zieleniak'44) focuses on the subjects of transgenerational trauma related to what happened during second world war, especially the problem of war rape.

## Artist Statement

The (Un)Happy Family Album project is about transgenerational trauma and the role of blood ties in our lives. The basis of my work is a traditional family album and old photos that are used in process of creating collages. Old photos are mixed with contemporary photographs to find hidden family's secrets and roots of the problems passing from one generation to another. In my (un) Happy Family Album I want to show real faces, passions and suffering. Behind the traditional smiles of our ancestors there are real dramas, and unexplained stories and secrets. I try to talk about things that had a significant impact on my life - even though I may not have been born yet. Transgenerational trauma is often related to war, but not necessarily. It may also result from stories that took place after in a specific reality of rebuilding the country after the damage of war and the reality of the Polish People's Republic.

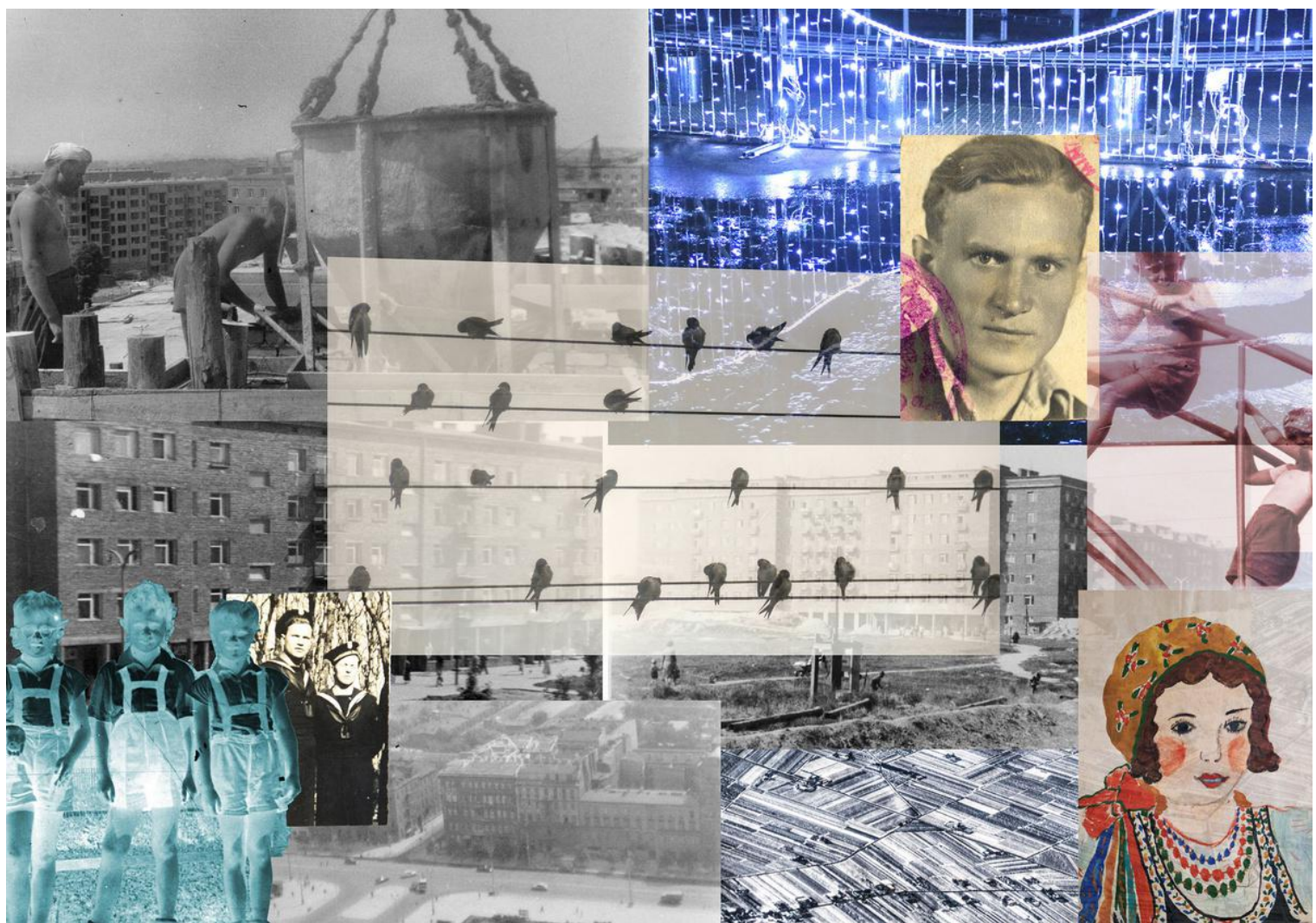

# Marta Fanasca



Marta Fanasca is a researcher, visual ethnographer, and photographer whose work explores gender, intimacy, and the emotional geographies of urban life through both ethnographic inquiry and street photography. Originally from Italy, she spent six years in the UK, where she was awarded a Ph.D. in Japanese Studies from the University of Manchester. While living and working in Tokyo, she developed a photographic practice attuned to the city's fleeting moods and affective layers. Her work embraces imperfection, softness, and slowness as both aesthetic and political choices, challenging dominant visual narratives that portray cities like Tokyo as hyper-technological, dystopian spaces. Through this lens, she investigates themes such as loneliness, temporality, and the presence of heritage in the contemporary urban landscape.

She is currently a Marie Skłodowska-Curie Global Fellow, conducting a project on commodified intimacy and gender performativity in contemporary Japan, with a specific focus on female/female sexual and emotional commodified intimacy. Her visual work is deeply informed by her academic research and seeks to translate ethnographic insight into poetic, multilayered imagery. Marta's personal photo exhibition *Dansō?! What is dansō?*, based on her research into *dansō* escorting culture (female-to-male crossdressers who perform a male identity in both daily life and in their work as non-sexual escorts for a female clientele) has been displayed three times in Italy and once in Japan. Her photographs have also been exhibited at Liverpool's Open Eye Gallery, and her virtual exhibition *Yūkaku-Love District*, a visual spin-off from her Marie Curie research on commodified intimacy, is accessible online via Artsteps: *Yūkaku Exhibition*.

## Artist Statement

Tokyo x Holga: Echoes of a Elsewhen

In this series, I explore the ever-shifting rhythms of Tokyo through the plastic lens of a Holga 120, using a Lomochrome Purple Petillant film and double exposure as tools to read, layer, and reimagine the city's flow. This series is rooted in a desire to capture the temporal dissonance of urban life, where speed, memory, and nostalgia constantly collide. The choice of Lomochrome Purple, with its surreal hues and dreamlike tonality, allows Tokyo's hard lines and modern surfaces to melt into something softer and melancholic, offering me dreamy palettes and vanishing layers. The film is hard to find, which makes using it feel even more special. Buildings, signs, and the sky blur into one another through the double exposure technique, creating ghostly images that echo both the permanence and the ever-changing soul of the metropolis. What is concrete becomes ethereal; what is momentary gains the illusion of depth and duration. Using a medium-format toy camera known for its imperfections, vignetting, and soft focus, I embrace the unpredictability of analog photography to resist the precision of digital urban representation. This work consciously resists the dominant aesthetic of "cyberpunk Tokyo", a visual trope saturated with digital manipulation, neon hyperreality, and dystopian futurism. Instead, I offer a counter-narrative: one that embraces softness, imperfection, and the tactility of analog photography. These images are entirely unedited, created in-camera without digital post-production. The Holga becomes my accomplice in channeling the city's unconscious; it is a tool for sensing rather than recording.

This body of work is an attempt to grasp the elusive pulse of Tokyo not as a single narrative, but as a choral story of time, light, and movement. I want to convey the idea that the city is not frozen in these frames; it flows through them, like a past that never fully settles and a future that always arrives slightly out of sync. Rather than documenting Tokyo as a spectacle of technological excess, I aim to evoke its moods: its hidden quiet, its layers of presence and absence, its pulse beneath the surface. Having lived in Tokyo at different times in my life, for more than five years in total, I envision the city not as a sleek sci-fi set but as an affective landscape: intimate, slow, perhaps eerie. A place of encounter between the fleeting and the enduring.

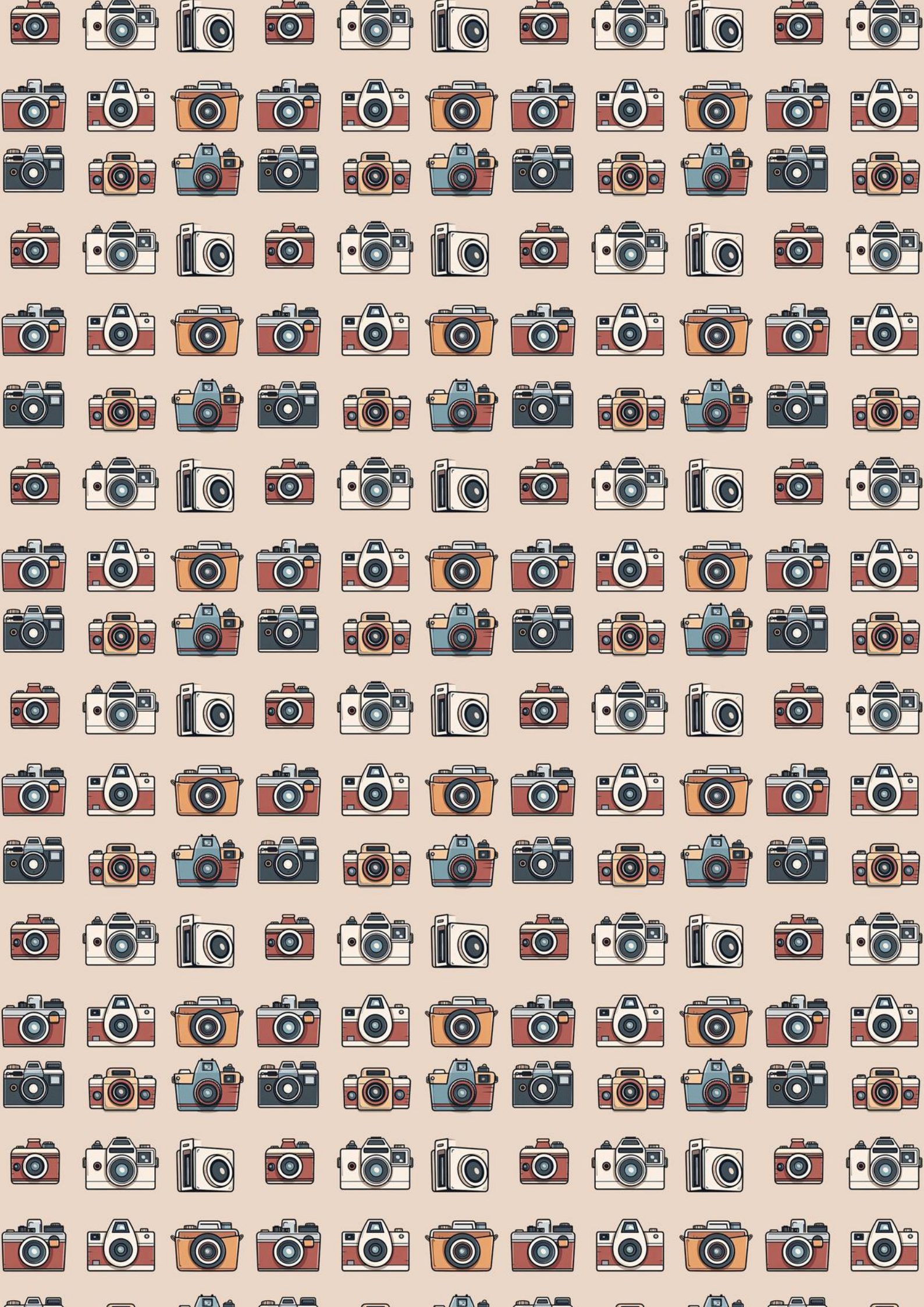


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
