Blue Hills, Five Cays Lead Dengue Cases

Dengue is transmitted through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito, which also spreads other viruses like Zika and chikungunya.



Since the onset of the dengue outbreak in the Turks and Caicos Islands, the Ministry of Health (MOH) has reported a total of 172 confirmed cases so far. Among these cases, 90 were confirmed through testing at the Caribbean Public Health Laboratory, with the remaining cases identified locally through dengue rapid tests. The distribution of cases is concentrated with 167 on Providenciales and 5 on Grand Turk. Out of the 90 laboratory-confirmed cases, 74 were identified as type 3 Dengue, which is associated with more severe disease, while 2 cases were type 2 Den-

gue. To date, there have been no reported deaths related to dengue, but 18 individuals were hospitalized. The age groups primarily affected are those within the 20-59 years range, followed by the 6-19 years age group. The MOH said the most impacted communities in Providenciales are Blue Hills and Five Cays. Males account for a higher proportion of cases at 60.5% compared to females at 37.8%. Dengue is transmitted through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito, which also spreads other viruses like Zika and chikungunya. The Aedes

aegypti mosquito, present in the TCI, prefers laying eggs in artificial containers with water, emphasizing the importance of eliminating potential breeding sites. Symptoms of dengue include fever, nausea, vomiting, rash, severe headache, and body aches. Severe cases may exhibit symptoms such as abdominal pain, persistent vomiting, bleeding gums or nose, and fatigue. Preventive measures include protecting oneself from mosquito bites through the use of clothing, mosquito nets, and repellents. Additionally, it is crucial to eliminate mosquito breeding sites by regularly checking and emptying containers that hold water, such as tires and buckets. The Ministry of Health and Human Services says it is actively responding to the outbreak by implementing an Integrated Vector Management Plan, conducting vector control activities, and engaging in public education campaigns. Despite a reduction in reported cases due to these efforts, recent rains pose a risk of increased mosquito breeding. The public is urged to play a vital role in preventing the further spread of dengue by covering water containers, disposing of old tires, and maintaining clean environments. Citizens are encouraged to report standing water or potential mosquito breeding sites to the Environmental Health Department. The Ministry says it continues to offer free testing for dengue and emphasizes the importance of seeking medical attention for suspected cases. The public is reminded to avoid mosquito bites, and the Ministry is collaborating with regional and international stakeholders to enhance the response to the outbreak.

Cheshire Hall Medical Centre Lifts Security Alert, Resumes Visitation

The Cheshire Hall Medical Centre in Providenciales has lifted the heightened security measures that were implemented in response to a reported gun-related incident on Wednesday night in Blue Hills, where one man was killed and another hospitalized. In a release the hospital said: “We are pleased to announce that visitation to the in-patient unit at the Cheshire Hall Medical Centre has resumed as normal. “We would like to express our gratitude for your cooperation and understanding during the temporary suspension of visitation. As always, visitation to the emergency department for serious emergencies, as well as the operation of surgical and routine outpatient clinics, X-rays, and laboratory services, will continue without interruption. “We appreciate your patience and support as we worked to ensure the safety of our staff, patients, and their families. “Thank you for your continued support and understanding throughout this period.”



Cannon Mark Kendall Urges Action to Address Climate of Fear in TCI



Cannon Mark Kendall is calling on authorities to tackle the prevailing climate of fear in the Turks and Caicos Islands, during the opening of the Turks and Caicos Islands Legal year at the St. Monica's Anglican Church in Providenciales, Thursday, January 4.

In an unrestrained sermon, Cannon Kendall emphasized the need for collective efforts from the police, the public, and the wider justice system to alleviate this climate of fear.

Noting a dearth in reporting on the issue, Cannon Kendall stressed the importance of enacting Whistle-Blowing Legislation to protect potential witnesses and encourage the public to report crimes.

"More consideration to the effecting of the Whistle-Blowing Legislation is an imperative. Would-be witnesses must be protected, and the general public must see this happening, to encourage them to report, Cannon Kendall asserted, while expressing concerns about citizens avoiding jury duty due to fears of retaliation, suggesting also that attention be given to

the selection and protection of jurors.

"I believe that consideration must be given also for the selection and protection of jurors. Because of the way this country is, how we are made up, I believe that because of the family connections and other connections...yes, I know that judges may find it very difficult to put together a jury panel, and some people have legitimate excuses. But others, without any legitimate excuse will not want to serve on certain cases because of the climate of fear and the threat of retaliation if the judgement goes to wrong way in the mind of the persons charged," he further noted.

The Cannon highlighted the 2021 amendment to the Summary of Offenses Ordinance, which now includes causing fear or provocation of violence through words and other threats. He pointed out the escalating issues on social media platforms and expressed hope for successful prosecutions against those who threaten violence online.

"In 2021, the Summary of Offenses Ordinance

was amended to encompass causing fear or provocation of violence by use of words and other forms of threat. I am not on Facebook; I am not on Twitter (X) or whatever else...I am only on WhatsApp...I am a WhatsApp Turk.

"But I get information from time to time on what's happening on the whole gambit of social media. And the way I see social media heating up in the Turks and Caicos Islands, I am hopeful that we will start to see successful prosecutions and convictions in this vein, for those who provoke and scandalize others, to the extent that they threaten them with violence," he said.

Addressing the principle that "justice delayed is justice denied," Cannon Kendall recounted inmates' complaints about prolonged legal processes during visits to the prison. He urged against a repeat of having only two functional judges, emphasizing the commendable increase in judicial resources over the last two years.

"In visiting the prison in the past, in particular the inmates who were on remand invariably complained about their cases taking interminable time to be progressed," he revealed.

Advocating for the integration of technology in trials and court procedures, Cannon Kendall praised the establishment of family mediation frameworks and mediation centres as measures that have eased court caseloads.

He cautioned against repeated postponements and lengthy court cases, pointing out the imbalance between crime occurrences and convictions.

"Never again must the Turks and Caicos Islands, at any time, have only two functional judges in the Turks and Caicos...never again. I was away when this was happening, and I believe this was unexpected because of a resignation. But never again. And I must say over the last two years we have seen an increase of the number on the bench...and this, May Lady, is commendable," he said to Chief Justice Mabel Agymang.

He also expressed concern about nepotism, cronyism, and island insularity affecting the legal system, noting that the determination of right and wrong oftentimes were being influenced by the perpetrator's origin.

Cannon Kendall criticized the lack of representation for the powerless, citing instances where defence attorneys exploit legal technicalities to secure the freedom of defendants. He pointed out the malleability of the law to confound prosecutions and highlighted deficiencies in prosecutorial preparation.

"And I say to you in the legal fraternity, and in particular to you on the bench and magistrates, that as a lay person, and as a representative of the people of the Turks and Caicos Islands, for those who may not have a voice, and even those who are in prison and on remand, court dates are not to be postponed over and over, and court cases dragged out by the whims and fancies and machinations of council.

"Even worse, are the incidence of attorneys taking payments but not pursuing the matter for which their clients pay...just giving them a good runaround," he bemoaned.

Premier Touts Economic Success in New Year's Message



Looking ahead to 2024, the premier said government plans to accelerate the delivery of promises outlined in the Citizen's Contract, with a focus on housing, the environment, community renewal, credit union operationalization, agriculture, fisheries, MSMEs linked to tourism, and infrastructure improvements.

In his New Year's message, the Premier of the Turks and Caicos Islands expressed gratitude to the citizens and highlighted the island's economic success.

Quoting Psalm 100:5, he drew inspiration from

faith and acknowledged the responsibility entrusted to him by the people.

The Premier stated that amidst challenges and opportunities, 2023 had seen significant achievements. The key points of success included a robust economy, a thriving tourist industry outperforming competitors, heightened investor interest, and a deep pipeline of development projects. Notably, efforts to involve more locals in the tourism sector were underscored, with targeted concessions facilitating their entry.

In a commitment to social development, the government focused on justice principles, with interventions in education, healthcare, social assistance, housing, childcare, and aid for the elderly. He pointed out that to address the impact of inflation, the government removed duties on food staples, reduced CPF, increased the minimum wage, and provided support for families in need.

Emphasizing the promise to restore "service" to "public service," the Premier outlined strides made in improving working conditions and remuneration for public servants. Special attention was given to uplifting the pension of those employed before 1992 and launching a financial assistance program for seniors.

Acknowledging the concerns of those yet to benefit fully from the economy, the Premier as-

The Premier listed numerous accomplishments over the past year, including the establishment of the Informal Settlements Unit, the Grand Turk Enhancement and Sustainability Agency, and progress on constitutional amendments. Priority projects such as the South Dock Port Development and digitization of police records were highlighted.

Looking ahead to 2024, the premier said government plans to accelerate the delivery of promises outlined in the Citizen's Contract, with a focus on housing, the environment, community renewal, credit union operationalization, agriculture, fisheries, MSMEs linked to tourism, and infrastructure improvements.

Expressing concern over a recent uptick in violent crimes, the Premier emphasized continued support for the police force, encouraging partnerships with public safety personnel and calling on residents to be vigilant.

The Premier urged citizens to seize economic opportunities, encouraging entrepreneurial spirit, risk-taking, and continuous improvement. He reiterated the commitment to transformational leadership, pledging transparency, accountability, and decisions for the greater good.

The North Caicos Stars, a band of junkanoo students from North Caicos will be attending a workshop and parade in Nassau, The Bahamas to learn all aspects of Junkanoo Music, which also include how to fashion Junkanoo costumes. Cynclair Musgrove, former District Commissioner for North Caicos is managing the students, and who will also make the trip said all the students attend the Raymond Gardiner High School on that island. The average age of the band is 14 years old. One of the members, JNeyo Altidor, who described playing with the seven-member band to be a passion for all of them, told NewslineTCI that from the workshop in The Bahamas, they hope to gain more experience at playing additional instruments, learn to create more tunes thereby increasing in popularity and recognition, to the point of playing overseas. “We plan to take it worldwide. We want to play over the world. The feedback that we are getting from the community is that we are a very good band, and they think that we can go places. It has reached a point where people want to pay us to play at their events,” Altidor said. Lorenz Handfield, another of the band members,

echoed Altidor’s sentiments that the community has fallen in love with the band, and has thrown its weight behind them, inviting them to functions, and always lending their encouragements. Lorenz told NewslineTCI that not only does the North Caicos Stars wants to be a force to be reckoned with on the Junkanoo music scene, but who would like to place North Caicos on the tourism map. “For a long time, we have been trying to establish North Caicos as a tourism spot, because when tourists come to the Turks and Caicos they only focus on Provo. And so, that is why we put ‘North Caicos Stars’ on our band’s name because we want to be specific to people where we come from,” Lorenz said. He noted that despite spending a great deal of time on Providenciales, North Caicos is where his heart is. “It was a little band that used to perform in Primary School at the Adalaide Oemler, and then our PE teacher and Ms Musgrove decided that we should form a band,” Lorenz pointed out. He said the that the workshop should provide them the knowledge

to learn to play other instruments and create their own tunes.

He said the band had played at several high-profile events, including the 50th anniversary of the Raymond Gardiner High School...the concert featuring an overseas artiste, and the anniversary dinner. In the meantime, Musgrove said the sponsorships to make the Bahamas travel a reality, has been very encouraging from the community. “We have people who have signed on immediately. We have the Premier’s Office, the MP (Hon. Arlington Musgrove), as well as our government. Everybody is pledging their full support, because they see the benefit for something like this,” Musgrove said. She added: “And these are young men who have already possessed leadership qualities. It is amazing watching them practice...they do not have any adult supervision, but they work as a team. They are learning on to tune their instruments until they sound right...they have been doing it from Primary School.” Musgrove pointed out that Mrs Janet Walkin Principal RGHS, who she described as a silent giant, played a pivotal role in the establishing of the band, among other things, making sure to facilitate their training and growth. She also pointed out that the support from the parents and guardian has been invaluable, noting that they have thrown their full weight behind the students and their musical development. Musgrove told NewslineTCI that at one point the band, which was scheduled to render a performance at a particular event on that island, was forced to be the main band for the day, after the original band did not show up. She said that they caught everyone by surprise with their professionalism.

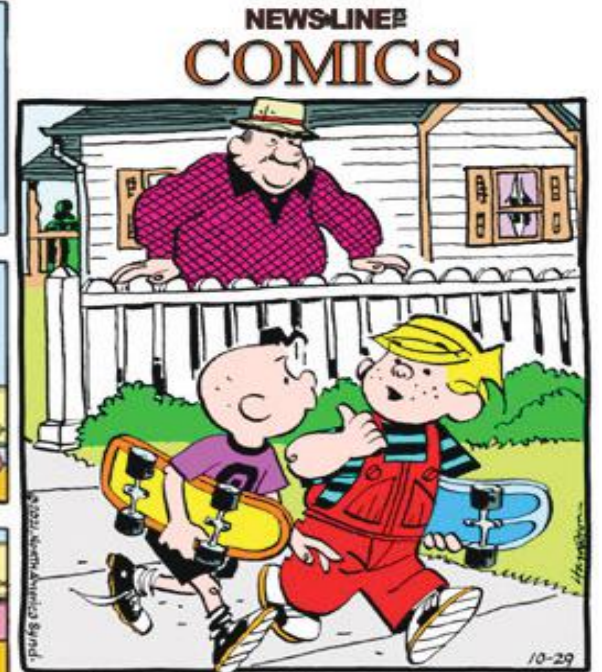

Turks & Caicos NATIONAL MUSEUM



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The Turks and Caicos Islands National Museum located in Guinep House on Front Street in Grand Turk is the National Museum of the Turks and Caicos Islands. Established in the 1980s and opened in 1991, the museum is publicly funded as a nonprofit trust. It exhibits prehistoric Lukayan culture and records the history of the islands of the colonial era and the slave trade, all related to the sea. An Arboretum is in adjacent to the museum. Guinep House one of the oldest stone structures in the island. The house, built prior to 1885, was named after the large Guinep tree in the front yard. It was built in local limestone by a former shipwright. The structural material of the building also came from local shipwrecks, including a ship's mast, which is one of the building's main supports. The building which was earlier a lodge for some of the divers was donated to the museum in 1990.

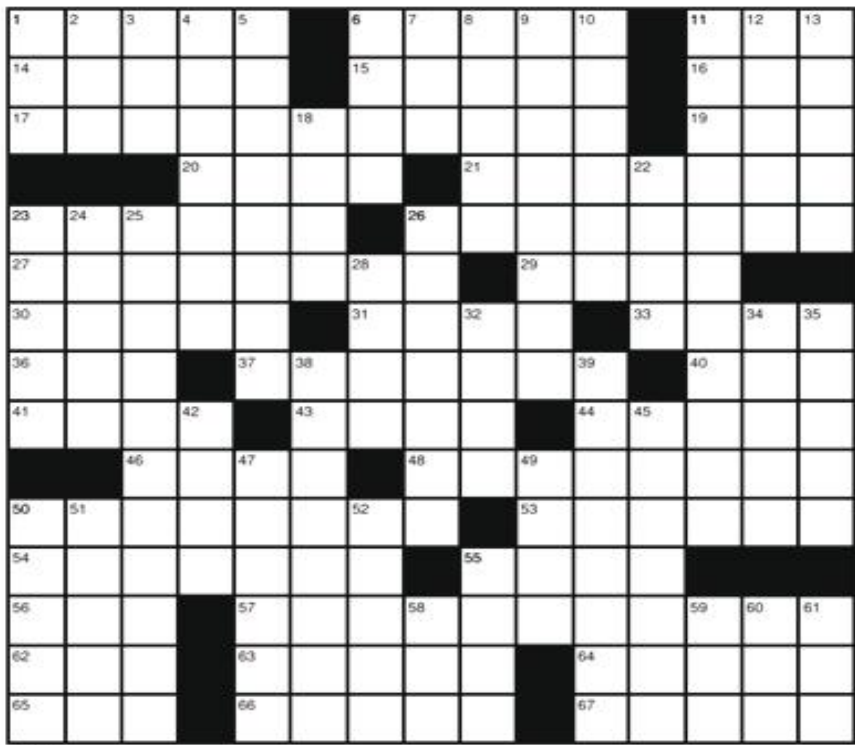

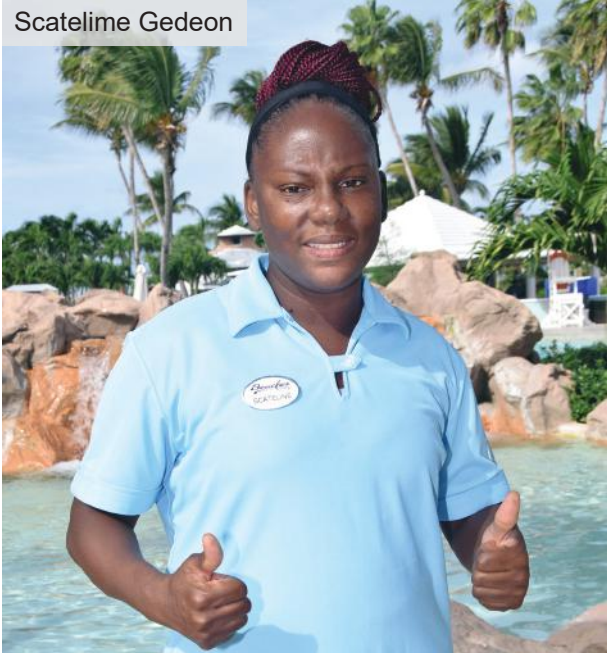

Mudjin Harbour, Middle Caicos, Turks and Caicos



Let's be frank. The best beach in the Caribbean is the one you're on right now. That means choosing our favorite beaches in the Caribbean each year is an almost impossible task — and one that, we admit, is completely subjective.

We all have our different tastes when it comes to beaches; some prefer the ultra-secluded, tucked-away beach; others are drawn to the all-day, bustling party beach. So which beaches made the cut this year? Our objective this year was to focus on beaches that are not just beautiful, but reachable.

That means just about every beach on this list can be driven to from a Caribbean airport — in other words, you won't need to charter a boat, say a secret password and commandeer a dinghy to reach them. You may have heard of some of these beaches; others may be new to your radar. But all of them are the essence of what makes Caribbean beaches so enchanting: that ideal shade of blue, the right softness of the sand, the marvelous alchemy that occurs when white sand and green hills meet the sun.

Long Bay, Antigua

It's not easy to choose in a destination that has 365 beaches, but we're smitten with this stretch of sugar-white and sparkling turquoise water on the eastern coast of Antigua.

Eagle Beach, Aruba

Aruba is filled with picture-perfect beaches, but nothing stands out quite like the seemingly endless, impossibly wide coastline that is Eagle Beach. Seven Mile Beach, Grand Cayman There's just something about Seven Mile Beach, Grand Cayman's signature strand, the way the water feels beyond crystal clear, the way it always feels a few degrees warmer. True sandy perfection.

Long Bay, San Salvador,

The Bahamas This is where Columbus was said to have landed in 1492, and when you get here, you'll feel like no one has been here since. Deliciously empty, with soft sand, calm waves and the feeling of total privacy.

Powerful earthquakes leave at least 55 dead, destroy buildings along Japan's western coast

A series of powerful earthquakes that hit western Japan have left at least 55 people dead and damaged thousands of buildings, vehicles and boats. Officials warned Tuesday that more quakes could lie ahead. Aftershocks continued to shake Ishikawa prefecture and nearby areas a day after a magnitude 7.6 temblor slammed the area.

Damage was so great that it could not immediately be assessed. Japanese media reports said tens of thousands of homes were destroyed.

Government spokesperson Yoshimasa Hayashi said 17 people were seriously injured and gave a slightly lower death toll, saying he was aware of the prefecture's tally.

Water, power and cell phone service were still down in some areas. Residents expressed sorrow about their uncertain futures.

"It's not just that it's a mess. The wall has collapsed, and you can see through to the next room. I don't think we can live here anymore," Miki Kobayashi, an Ishikawa resident, said as she swept around her house.

The house was also damaged in a 2007 quake, she said.

Although casualty numbers continued to climb gradually, the prompt public warnings, relayed on broadcasts and phones, and the quick response from the

general public and officials appeared to have limited some of the damage.

Toshitaka Katada, a University of Tokyo professor specializing in disasters, said people were prepared because the area had been hit by quakes in recent years. They had evacuation plans and emergency supplies in stock.

"There are probably no people on Earth who are as disaster-ready as the Japanese," he told The Associated Press.

Japan is frequently hit by earthquakes because of its location along the "Ring of Fire," an arc of volcanoes and fault lines in the Pacific Basin.

Katada warned the situation remains precarious and unpredictable. The March 2011 quake and tsunami in northeastern Japan had been preceded by other quakes.

"This is far from over," Katada said.

Predictions by scientists have repeatedly been proven wrong, such as with the 2016 quake in southwestern Kumamoto, an area previously seen as relatively quake-free.

"Having too much confidence in the power of science is very dangerous. We are dealing with nature," Katada said.

Japanese media's aerial footage showed widespread damage in the hardest-hit spots, with landslides

burying roads, boats tossed in the waters and a fire that had turned an entire section of Wajima city to ashes.

Japan's military dispatched 1,000 soldiers to the disaster zones to join rescue efforts, Prime Minister Fumio Kishida said Tuesday.

"Saving lives is our priority and we are fighting a battle against time," he said. "It is critical that people trapped in homes get rescued immediately."

A quake with a preliminary magnitude of 5.6 shook the Ishikawa area as he was speaking. Quakes continued to rock the area, reaching more than 100 aftershocks over the past day.

Nuclear regulators said several nuclear plants in the region were operating normally. A major quake and tsunami in 2011 caused three reactors to melt and release large amounts of radiation at a nuclear plant in northeastern Japan.

On Monday, the Japan Meteorological Agency issued a major tsunami warning for Ishikawa and lower-level tsunami warnings or advisories for the rest of the western coast of Japan's main island of Honshu, as well as for the northern island of Hokkaido.

The warning was downgraded several hours later, and all tsunami warnings were lifted as of early Tuesday. Waves measuring more than one meter (3 feet) hit some places.

Still, half-sunken ships floated in bays where tsunami waves had rolled in, leaving a muddied coastline. People who were evacuated from their houses huddled in auditoriums, schools and community centers. Bullet trains in the region were halted, but service was mostly restored by Tuesday afternoon. Sections of highways were closed.

Weather forecasters predicted rain, setting off worries about crumbling buildings and infrastructure.

The region includes tourist spots famous for lacquerware and other traditional crafts, along with designated cultural heritage sites.

U.S. President Joe Biden said in a statement that his administration was "ready to provide any necessary assistance for the Japanese people."

Israel is pulling thousands of troops from Gaza

Thousands of Israeli soldiers are being shifted out of the Gaza Strip, the military said on Monday, in

the first significant drawdown of troops since the war began, as forces continued to bear down on the main city in the southern half of the enclave.

The troop movement could signal that fighting is being scaled back in some areas of Gaza, particularly in the northern half where the military has said it is close to assuming operational control. Israel has been under pressure from its chief ally, the United States, to begin to switch to lower-intensity fighting. Word of the drawdown came ahead of a visit by Secretary of State Antony Blinken to the region and after the Biden administration bypassed Congress for the second time this month to approve an emergency weapons sale to Israel.

But fierce fighting continued in other areas of Gaza, especially the southern city, Khan Younis, and central areas of the territory. Israel has pledged to charge ahead until its war aims have been achieved, including dismantling Hamas, which has ruled Gaza for 16 years.

The military said in a statement on Monday that five brigades, or several thousand troops, were being taken out of Gaza in the coming weeks for training and rest.

In a briefing on Sunday that first announced the troop withdrawal without specifying how many forces were leaving, army spokesman Rear Adm Daniel Hagari did not say whether the decision meant Israel was launching a new phase of the war.

"The objectives of the war require prolonged fighting, and we are preparing accordingly," he said.

Israel has vowed to crush Hamas' military and governing capabilities in its war, which was sparked by the militant group's October 7 attack on southern Israel, which killed 1,200 people. Roughly 240 people were taken hostage.

Israel responded with a blistering air, ground and sea offensive that has killed more than 21,900 people in Gaza, two-thirds of them women and children, according to the health ministry in Gaza, which does not differentiate between civilians and combatants in its count.

Israel says more than 8,000 militants have been killed, without providing evidence. It blames Hamas for the high civilian death toll, saying the militants embed within residential areas, including schools and hospitals.

The war has displaced some 85 per cent of Gaza's 2.3 million residents, sending swells of people seeking shelter in Israeli-designated safe areas that the military has nevertheless bombed. Palestinians are left with a sense that nowhere is safe in the tiny enclave.

With tensions remaining high across the region, the US announced on Monday that it would be sending an aircraft carrier strike group home and replacing it with an amphibious assault ship and accompanying warships.

Outstanding Matthews on shortlist for ICC T20 honour

LONDON, United Kingdom (CMC)- West Indies Captain Hayley Matthews has been shortlisted for the International Cricket Council's (ICC) Women's Twenty20 International Cricketer-of-the-Year award.

The free-scoring 25-year-old joins Sri Lankan all-rounder Chamari Athapaththu, England left-arm spinner Sophie Ecclestone and outstanding Australian fast bowling all-rounder Ellyse Perry, as the players up for the honour.

Matthews proved one of the most dominant all-rounders in the shortest for-

mat this year, scoring 700 runs from 14 innings while averaging 63 with the bat and snaring 19 wickets.

The stylish right-hander headlined her side's three-match series against Australia last October, plundering 310 runs at an average of 155. She smashed a career-best 132 from 64 balls as West Indies chased down a record 213 in North Sydney.

She also topped her side's bowling with five wickets at 17 runs apiece.

Matthews, who made her international debut as a teenager, was appointed cap-

tain last year June, replacing veteran Stafanie Taylor.

Meanwhile, the 33-year-old Athapaththu averaged 31 with the bat and picked up eight wickets from 16 matches.

Ecclestone, 24, finished the calendar year with 23 wickets at an average of ten. The 33-year-old Perry, a two-time former winner of the ICC Women's Cricketer-of-the-Year honour, averaged 45 with the bat from 14 outings while picking up six wickets at nine runs apiece.

The winner of the award will be announced later this month.

Waugh calls on ICC to save Test cricket

AUSTRALIAN TEST legend Steve Waugh has urged the intervention of cricket's world governing body, the International Cricket Council (ICC), to help salvage the credibility of the game's longest format after South Africa followed West Indies' lead in selecting an under-strength Test side for the two-Test tour of New Zealand. Only last month, West Indies named seven uncapped players in a weakened 15-man squad for two Tests in Australia, and South Africa followed suit by picking an inexperienced squad – also featuring seven debutants – for their two-Test series in New Zealand next month. The New Zealand tour has clashed with the

SA20 – Cricket South Africa's money-spinning premier T20 domestic tournament – and the leading players have been allowed to focus their efforts on the shorter format.

"It's going to happen if the South African Cricket Board are any indication of the future, keeping their best players at home," Waugh lamented. "If I was New Zealand I wouldn't even play the series. I don't know why they're even playing. Why would you when it shows a lack of respect for New Zealand cricket?"

"It's pretty obvious what the problem is. The West Indies aren't sending their full-strength side [to Australia this summer]. They haven't picked a full-strength Test team for a couple of years now."

"Someone like Nicholas Pooran is really a Test

batsman who doesn't play Test cricket. Jason Holder, probably their best player, is not playing now. Even Pakistan didn't send a full side [to Australia]."

Holder, the Caribbean side's leading all-rounder, skipped the Australia tour along with batting all-rounder Kyle Mayers, with Cricket West Indies saying both players had "expressed a preference to explore T20 Franchise opportunities in January."

In the past, West Indies have also found Test selection hampered due to the unavailability of key players, owing to their focus on T20 franchise leagues.

While acknowledging there was little financial incentive for smaller nations to play Test cricket, Waugh called for a standardised fee to be implemented by the ICC.

"If the ICC or someone doesn't step in shortly then Test cricket doesn't become Test cricket because you're not testing yourself against the best players," he argued.

"I understand why players don't come. They're not getting paid properly. I don't understand why ICC or the top countries, who are making a lot of money don't just have a regulation set fee for Test matches, which is a premium, so people are incentivised to play Test Cricket."

"Otherwise they just play T10 or T20. The public are the ones who are going to suffer because it's not the full side playing, so it's not Test cricket." A plethora of T20 franchise leagues have emerged in recent years, with many spanning the early part of the year.

The SA20 runs from January 10 to February 10, the ILT20 in United Arab Emirates runs from January 19 to February 17, while the ongoing Australian Big Bash, which got under way December 7, goes until January 24.

Wayne Rooney fired as manager after 15 games at second-tier Birmingham



England great Wayne Rooney was fired as the manager of second-tier club Birmingham on Tuesday after 15 games.

Rooney earned only two wins since his controversial appointment in October. Birmingham was sixth in the Championship when he started, and has fallen to 20th.

The club was taken over last summer by a company owned by American businessman Tom Wagner, and it got rid of popular coach John Eustace, who had been in charge for 15 months and steered the club away from rele-

gation.

"Birmingham City has today parted company with manager Wayne Rooney and first-team coach Carl Robinson," the club said in a statement.

"Despite their best efforts, results have not met the expectations that were made clear at the outset. Therefore, the board feels that a change in management is in the best interests of the football club."

Birmingham lost at Leeds 3-0 on Monday, and supporters called for the removal of Rooney, the former Manchester United and England striker.

Randy Ford is liking what he is seeing from local athletes as far as the new track seas approaches, telling NewslineTCI that possibility is high for local athletes to return with medals from the high-quality regional event. Ford, who is also head of Quality Athletics Track Club, which he founded, would commit himself to say the quality of medals that the national team should return with, but stated that they will be gunning for at least four medals at this year's CARIFTA Championships. He said based on the performances of the athletes, the TCI should be able to field a collection of close to 20 runners, jumpers, and throwers for the regional blue-ribbon event.

"As it relates to the CARIFTA Games now, we should be able to field somewhere about 18 athletes. We have a wealth of talent... athletes that are experienced, that have medaled before, and so, four medals is not a far possibility. Of course, I am aiming for more than that, but worst-case scenario, we should be able to get our hands on four medals. The quality of the medals I won't say now, but quality performance is my hallmark for the upcoming season," Ford noted.

With respect to the Inter-High School Athletics Championships, Ford, who is also coach for the Clement Howell High School, said that his charges should stage good performances in both individual events and in the relays. He pointed that the majority make-up of the CARIFTA Team should come from his school.

"As it relates to the upcoming track season, Clement Howell doesn't have numbers, we have high quality athletes. However, I anticipate that a large portion of the CARIFTA Team will be Clement Howell Athletes. We are expecting some exceptional performance (at the Inter-High Championships). "The basic idea is to go out there and bring in high quality medals...to go for gold and silver medals, and in the process, we plan to give the public a treat...some good performances, quality relay running and quality individual performances," Ford pointed out. According to Ford, Quality Athletics Track Club works with a number of athletes, including graduates of the Clement Howell High and other schools that are still interested in track and field, and athletes in the United States and Jamaica.
