

20 TERMINOLOGIES ABOUT


Allah is the one and only God in Islam. He is the Creator and the one who sustains the entire universe.



Al-Khaliq means "The Creator". It describes Allah as the one who brings everything into existence.



Ar-Raaziq means "The Provider". This name of Allah reminds us that He is the one who provides all sustenance and provisions to His creation.



Al-Ahad means "The One". It highlights Allah's absolute oneness and uniqueness, with nothing like Him.



Ar-Rab means "The Lord". This name shows that Allah is the Sustainer, Cherisher, and Nurturer of everything.



Ar-Rahman means "The Most Merciful". It refers to Allah's boundless mercy that extends to all His creation.



Ar-Raheem means "the Most Merciful". This name emphasizes Allah's special mercy that is reserved for the believers.



Al-Malik means "The King". This name indicates that Allah is the sovereign ruler and owner of everything that exists.



At-Tawwab means "The Accepter of Repentance". It shows that Allah is always ready to accept the repentance of those who turn back to Him.



Al-Ghafoor means "The All-Forgiving". This name describes Allah's limitless capacity to forgive the sins of His servants.



Al-Asma Al-Husna means "The Most Beautiful Names". These are the 99 names of Allah, each describing a different attribute of His.



Al-Arsh means The Throne of Almighty Allah. Scholars agree that Muslims should believe in its existence without questioning its nature and without denying its presence.



Al-Qalam means "The Pen". It refers to the pen that Allah commanded to write the destiny of all creation.



Similar to Al-Arsh, scholars agree that belief in Al-Kursi's existence is essential, without questioning its nature or denying its presence.



"Kun-Fa-Yakun" means "Be, and it is". This phrase shows how Allah creates anything instantly with just a command.



A'alimul-Ghayb means "The Knower of the Unseen". It tells us that Allah knows everything, even what is hidden or unknown to us.




Al-Haq means "The Truth". This name affirms that Allah is the ultimate reality and the absolute truth.



Al-Kufr means "Disbelief". It refers to rejecting or denying Allah and His messages, which is a serious sin in Islam.



As-Shirk means "Polytheism". This term describes the act of associating partners with Allah, which is considered the gravest sin in Islam.



Abdullah means "Servant of Allah". It is a name that shows a person's devotion and submission as a servant to Allah.
