



BR. BRIAN CELEBRATES JUBILEE

At the Mass on 23 May ending the community's annual retreat, Br. Brian Harrington, O. S. B., celebrated the 25th anniversary of his monastic profession. Originally from Abbeville, LA, Br. Brian, son of the late Mr. Mark Harrington, Jr. and Mrs. Gloria Harrington, is an '86 alumnus of Saint Joseph Seminary College. Following graduation, he studied at Loyola University in New Orleans. He entered the monastery in 1988, professed simple vows in 1989, and then professed his solemn vows in 1993.

In the community, Brother Brian served first in the Seminary College as a prefect and then as Dean of Students. In 2003, he was named Subprior of the community and in 2008 became the Prior. Currently, he also manages the Saint Joseph Abbey Cemetery.



1957

Abbot David Melancon, the first Louisiana native elected as Abbot, served from 1957 - 1982. During that time, he also was elected president of the Swiss-American Benedictine Congregation, a post he held for 13 years, and in which he served as a voting member of the Second Vatican Council.



The Church of El Cristo Negro, Esquipulas, Guatemala. Saint Joseph Abbey sent three monks to found this mission to provide care for the shrine, its pilgrims, and the people of the surrounding area. In 1982, the monastery became independent and was named the Abbey of Jesus Christ Crucified.



In cooperation with the Knights of Columbus, the monastery established the 200 acre K.C. Abbey Youth Camp. In 2006, the community decided to close the camp and, in 2011, transferred it to the Archdiocese of New Orleans for its use.



1960

On 5 October 1960, Archbishop Joseph Francis Rummel of New Orleans blessed a new seminary with dorms, classrooms, administrative offices, a chapel, and Benet Hall Auditorium. The annex to the north side of the church was added at this time.



SAINT JOSEPH ABBEY CELEBRATES 125 YEARS OF SERVICE

In this glimpse of the main events during the second part of our 125 years, we start with the election of Father David Melancon as Abbot in 1957, beginning a period of expansion which has continued during the years of Abbot Patrick Regan and present Abbot Justin Brown. New ministries, new buildings and renovations of old ones are external expressions of the changes necessary for the monastic community and the Seminary College to meet present-day needs. We recognize that all is evidence of God's blessing, on which we rely as we move into the future.



The Abbey Christian Life Center opened under the direction of Fr. Hugh Baumann, and still continues to offer retreat programs for both clergy and laity.



1973

In the early '70s, the monastery, with much of the work being done by the monks, was renovated to include badly-needed accommodations.



1982

Father Patrick Regan, a noted liturgy scholar and professor in the Seminary College, was elected the fourth Abbot, serving in this position for almost



A bakery was built in the old milking barn, and Pennies for Bread & the Abbey began providing bread at no charge to charitable organizations in the metro area that feed the homeless and hungry.



1990s

The community opened a small gift shop, now known as the Abbey Gift Shop, a much-visited place to purchase books and religious articles, and obtain information about the Abbey.




1996 - 1998

Major renovations were made to the Abbey Church interior, including work on Dom Gregory deWit's paintings in order to better preserve them. A new altar and sanctuary, organ, choir stalls, and pews were installed, enhancing the beauty of the original structure.



Mid-1990s

During these years, the Abbey completed a major enlargement and landscaping of the cemetery, and opened burial sites to relatives and friends of the monastic community.



Father Justin Brown, the Prior of the community and an instructor and spiritual director in the Seminary College, was elected the fifth Abbot of Saint Joseph Abbey.



In 2001, the Abbey and Seminary College hosted the first Annual Abbey Youth Fest, a day of prayer, talks and music for Catholic youth from the Gulf South area. From an attendance of 1,200 that first year, it has grown to over 4,500 participants, making it one of the largest Catholic youth events in the SouthEast region.



2007

The community opened Abbey Woodworks, a coffin-making enterprise related to the availability of wood from the Abbey's land. Shortly after, persons in the funeral home business in Louisiana challenged the Abbey's right to engage in the sale of coffins. In a long-lasting legal battle which had world-wide publicity, the matter was finally settled in the Abbey's favor.



2011

With the production of soaps of various scents, MONK SOAP began its rise in popularity through sales in the Abbey Gift Shop and in local specialty shops.



2012

In an early morning in the fall of 2012, the monks and students awoke to fire on the second floor of Pius X Hall. The damage would necessitate a complete renovation of the northwest section that houses the administrative offices, including all the computer equipment where the fire had started.



The newly-renovated Vianney Hall was blessed, providing suitable housing for students who had been housed in temporary buildings.

Keynote speakers included Dom Quaglia, a Catholic speaker and youth minister from Atlanta; Leah Darrow, former model in New York City, and now a Catholic speaker; Fr. Mark Toups, Vocation Director, Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux; Fr. Tim Hepburn, Director of Vocations, Archdiocese of Atlanta; and Co-emcees Sister Marie Protectrice de la Foi of the Servants of the Lord and the Virgin of Matara in Washington, D.C., and Nick Adams, seminarian from the Diocese of Jackson.

Archbishop Aymond, with concelebrants Bishop Robert Muench of Baton Rouge, Abbot Justin Brown of Saint Joseph Abbey, and over 25 visiting priests, celebrated the Vigil Mass. 

RECTOR'S LETTER

President-Rector Gregory Boquet, O.S.B.

William H. Hinson tells us why animal trainers carry a stool when they go into a cage of lions. They have their whips, of course, and their pistols are at their sides. But always they also carry a stool. Hinson says it is the most important tool of the trainer. He holds the stool by the back and thrusts the legs toward the face of the wild animal. Those who know maintain that the animal tries to focus on all four legs at once. In the attempt to focus on all four, a kind of paralysis overwhelms the animal, and it becomes tame, weak, and disabled because its attention is fragmented. (from *Developing the Leader* Within You by John Maxwell)

So, too, there are four "legs" that make up the Program for Priestly Formation: Human, Intellectual, Spiritual and Pastoral Formation, which, unlike the legs that confuse the tiger, are meant for the seminarian's growth. The challenge of seminary formation is to make sure that all components are integrated in the young man aspiring to the priesthood. This must be done one step at a time, however, otherwise it would become a daunting and overwhelming task, because so much is being called for in this journey.

When a young man first enters the seminary, he is full of fire and zeal, which is the passion that paved the way for him to consider the priesthood and to take this important step. However, for growth to take place there is a need for acceptance and cooperation so that the training that the seminary seeks to impart can be fully embraced and incorporated into his life. This seminary in its 125 years of existence has been faithfully involved in this very important ministry and it is evident that with a record enrollment expected next fall, this tradition is not only appreciated, but will continue into the next 125 years.
